

Museum director Raney steps aside

On top of Heritage Museum's money woes, officials there now have to deal with the departure of their longtime director.

Nancy Raney confirmed today she has stepped down after 12 years as director of the museum.


A declining membership base and loss of grant money has left the museum strapped for operating revenue. That and other responsibilities were the reasons Raney cited for leaving the facility.

"I've been wrestling with this since our feed store (Elbow Creek Hay and Feed, which she operates with her husband) started going strong," Raney said. "I just feel there's *"I just feel there's more need for me to be at the store and at home right now."*

more need for me to be at the store and at home right now ... (The revenue loss) was a factor, but I felt the museum needed new blood. I just felt it was time for me to move on to the farm."

Raney joined the museum after graduating high school in 1994 and assumed director duties in 2002. She and Curator Tammy Schrecengost have been credited with vastly increasing the number of special events at the

Odessa died as a result of the accident, which took place at 6:20 a.m. at the intersection of FM 2401 and FM 1357.

According to the Department of Public Safety, Castelazo was the driver of a 2011 Chevrolet Silverado which was eastbound on FM 2401 when it ran a stop sign at the FM 1357 intersection. Castelazo's vehicle was struck by a 2011 Ford F-250 that was southbound on 1357.

The Chevrolet overturned upon impact and Castelazo was ejected.

He was prounced dead at 7:30 a.m. by Justice of the Peace Kay Machieck.

The driver of the F-250, 31-year-old Kevin Joe Thornton of Midland, was transported to Midland Memorial Hospital with non-life-threatening injuries.

DPS said road conditions were dry and skies clear at the time of the wreck.

The accident was investigated by Big Spring Highway Patrolman Christopher A. Lambert.



museum in the past several years, including Legends and Legacies (held in conjunction with the annual Big Spring Rodeo) and Breakfast With Santa, which drew hundreds of children and their parents to the museum each December.

But the museum has also been hit with a drastic loss in operating revenue. An annual grant from Dora Roberts Rehabilitation Center, which accounted for more than half of the museum's budget, was slashed this year. In addition, membership at the museum has steadily dwindled over the past 20 years.

Despite that, Raney said she thoroughly enjoyed the past 20 years.

"I've loved every minute at the museum. It's been a huge part of my life for a long time," she said. "When my husband and I first opened the feed store, I thought I could do both, but it's gotten to be too much. I've got a new mantra in my life: I can do anything, but I can't do everything."

Schrecengost has

assumed director/curator duties at the museum.

"Tammy is my very best friend. Leaving her and the museum is one of the toughest things I've ever done," Raney said. "But she will do a fantastic job."

A retirement reception for Raney will be held in the coming few weeks, although no date has been formally announced.

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Campus rape numbers ridiculous

or years, when I was on the speech circuit at colleges and universities, I would always inquire about how many instances of sexual assault had occurred on campus that year — not how many convictions, but how many instances. The answers I got were, quite literally, unbelievable. None, I would be told, which was almost as ridiculous of reports of one or two such

instances. At no campus I visited were there ever more than four or five.

You don't have to be a scholar in this area (which I happen to be) to know that these numbers were always ridiculous.

I had some of my own students

do a survey some years ago, and they came up with roughly the same numbers that everyone comes up with: something on the order of 1 in 5 or 1 in 6 coeds will tell you they have been forced to have sex against their will and without their consent, which is the legal definition of rape.

Most of these cases won't lead to criminal conviction, which doesn't mean the girls are lying or that they weren't raped, but only that proving rape when a lot of drinking is involved, when the boys stand by each other and the girls often don't remember precise details or don't report immediately and certainly don't have witnesses, can make prosecution difficult. But that hardly excuses the

"see no evil, hear no evil" attitude many colleges and universities have adopted.

Yes, I know it can be a difficult problem for the university administrators. On the one hand, you have a young woman raising a serious, potentially life-destroying claim. I always ask my students to put themselves not only in the shoes of the woman who says she was raped, but also in those of the man who is accused.

There never has been any evidence that rapes are dishonestly reported any more often than other crimes (notwithstanding centuries of legal hand-wringing about the dangers of spurned women taking revenge, cases that are both rare and mostly easily spotted), but there certainly are instances of innocent men facing such claims, and they deserve protection.

From a college's point of view, that means you have a boy's family "lawyering up" and threatening to sue the college if their son is treated "unfairly."

I remember one case, years ago, in which the boy's family threatened to sue the girl for libel and slander, a mostly empty threat that nevertheless terrified her. So the easiest thing for many colleges to do is to defer to the criminal justice system, except that system (rightly) imposes far higher standards (the punishment being loss of liberty) than colleges do for other offenses, which could lead to expulsion, suspension or at least (and often this is all the girl needs)

some accommodation that would allow her to complete her education without living in the same dorm or taking the same classes as the man who traumatized her.

For years, the Boston-based Victims Rights Law Center, on whose board I have served since its founding, has tried to work with colleges and universities to do a better job in this area — collecting data honestly, educating all students about rape prevention and providing assistance for women who need it to stand up and fight (not the men they accuse of rape, but the universities who refuse to even recognize there is a problem).

This week, the White House offered an assist, with the president proposing that universities conduct anonymous surveys to assess how big of a problem they have (in every case, it will be bigger than they officially thought), to adopt strategies that have worked at other campuses and to at least ensure that young women can report assaults confidentially (assuming they are not seeking to prosecute) and receive the help from the school that they need to complete their studies. It's hardly a revolutionary approach, but the mere fact that the problem has risen to a level where it has White House attention is a step in the right direction.

Boehner's whiny hypocrisy

[•]hen House Speaker John Boehner mocked his Republican colleagues for their reluctance to deal with immigration reform last week, we saw the ultimate display of: A. poor leadership; B. hypocrisy; C. a divided

Republican Party; D. a puppet rebelling against the puppeteers; E. a politician getting ready to retire. Those are just some of the many ways people from MIGUEL all extremes of the Perez political spectrum interpreted and reacted to Boehner's whinnying performance before a Rotary Club lunch audience in his Ohio district Thursday. "Here's the attitude," Boehner said of his GOP colleagues. "Ohhhh. Don't make me do this. Ohhhh. This is too hard." At first glance, depending on the viewpoint, it came off as either a betrayal of GOP principles or a rare act of courage by a leader who had forgotten how to lead. But there was one huge irony in Boehner's diatribe: The main person he should have been mocking was himself! It is Boehner who has been preventing an immigration reform bill from going up for a vote on the House floor, where it has a good chance of passing. It is Boehner who has been hinting that he is ready to move forward on immigration for months, only to take it all back as soon as his puppet strings are pulled by anti-immigrant zealots. It is Boehner who best represents the whiny Republicans crying: "Ohhhh. Don't make me do this. Ohhhh. This is too hard." Yet, in an astonishing display of hypocrisy, Boehner said: "We get elected to make choices. We get elected to solve problems, and it's remarkable to me how Amen many of my colleagues just

don't want to. They'll take the path of least resistance."

This is a man in dire need of a mirror! Does he not see that he is supposed to be the leader on that path?

Amazingly, as he complained about the whinnying of his colleagues, Boehner continued whinnying. "I've had every brick and bat and arrow shot at me over this issue just because I wanted to deal with it," he said. "I didn't say it was going to be easy." Yet allowing an immigration vote would be quite easy for him — as he was promptly reminded in a tweet from Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi: "If you want to pass immigration reform, ?@SpeakerBoehner, bring it up for a vote. It'll pass.' Anyone who has been following Boehner's fluctuating positions on this issue knows that when he ridiculed his fellow Republicans, he was describing himself perfectly. Not too long ago, he was claiming to be "hell-bent on getting this (immigration reform) done this year." But that was only until his tea party puppeteers began pulling his strings and forced him to change his tune. As if they had totally run out of legitimate excuses for blocking immigration reform, many Republicans — led by Boehner — began using the same asinine talking point: They couldn't consider any kind of reform, they claimed, because President Barack Obama could not be trusted to enforce new immigration laws. Mind you, in order to feed red meat and then try to reason with Boehner's anti-immigrant colleagues, Obama has deported more immigrants than any other president — making their latest excuse for blocking immigration reform both laughable and sad. But it was Boehner who was sent out to make that ridiculous argument. "There's widespread doubt

about whether this administration can be trusted to enforce our laws," Boehner said in February. "And it's going to be difficult to move any immigration legislation until that changes."

Nevertheless, since Boehner last week seemed to be ridiculing the position he defended only a couple of months ago, some of his conservative colleagues are throwing tantrums.

Bush holds ride for wounded veterans at his ranch

CRAWFORD, Texas (AP) — Former President George W. Bush says wounded U.S. military members joining him for his annual mountain bike ride "turned their circumstances into good" by displaying courage and sacrifice.

Bush spoke Friday at his Crawford ranch in Central Texas as part of the three-day Warrior 100K, a 100-kilometer ride. Sixteen current and retired members of the military wounded in Iraq and Afghanistan are participating in the ride.

This is the fourth year that Bush has hosted the event and he'll be riding the full 100K. He holds the gathering to show appreciation for the sacrifice of veterans.

Bush said he was surrounded by "extraordinary" people who were injured after volunteering to serve the nation.

The race is part of the Military Service Initiative at the George W. Bush Institute in Dallas.

3 West Texas detention officers die in wreck

SIERRA BLANCA, Texas (AP) — Three detention officers at a privately run unit in West Texas have died in an SUV rollover wreck after they got off work.

The Texas Department of Public Safety says the crash happened Thursday morning on Interstate 10 near Sierra Blanca. Sgt. Elizabeth Barney says the driver attempted to make an unsafe lane change.

All three who died worked at the West Texas Detention Facility in Sierra Blanca. DPS says the driver and another passenger were injured. The two survivors were in good condition Friday in an El Paso hospital.

DPS identified the fatalities as two El Paso men,

20-year-old Alan Pena and 25-year-old Rudy Arana, plus Taylor McKenzi of Cibolo (SEE'-boh-loh). His age wasn't immediately available.

West explosion trials delayed to June 2015

WACO, Texas (AP) — A judge has delayed the first of three civil trials in the West fertilizer explosion that killed 15 people.

State District Judge Jim Meyer in Waco agreed on Thursday to postpone the first trial six months to June 2015.

The Waco Tribune-Herald reports that an attorney for one of West Fertilizer Co.'s suppliers said he needed more time to prepare for what's already become a complex process.

More than 100 residents, business owners and insurers have sued Adair Grain, the plant's owners, as well as Illinois-based CF Industries and other companies that sold ammonium nitrate to the plant.

Those suing say the fertilizer companies had a responsibility to make sure chemicals were being stored and shipped safely.

South Texan with 8 DWI convictions gets 70 years

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) - A South Texas man with eight driving while intoxicated convictions has been sentenced to 70 years in prison for his latest DWI case.

Jurors in Corpus Christi sentenced 58-year-old Richard Vollick over a December traffic accident. Investigators say Vollick crashed his vehicle while exiting the Harbor Ferry.

The Corpus Christi Caller-Times (http://bit.ly/RbbYGF) reports another driver and a ferry worker saw Vollick's vehicle hit some metal sign posts that punctured the gasoline tank. Both tried to assist and found Vollick smoking a cigarette in a puddle of gasoline.

Vollick, who was also fined \$10,000 on Wednesday, has DWI convictions in Nueces, Aransas (uh-RAN'-zuhs) and San Patricio counties.

Convict indicted in Bryan deaths of woman, father

BRYAN, Texas (AP) — A recently freed convicted robber has been indicted in the deaths of a Central Texas woman and her father whose bodies were found in her burned home.

A Brazos County grand jury on Thursday indicted 34-year-old Dennis Wayne Brown III on charges of capital murder, arson, burglary and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle. Prison records show Brown was freed April 4 after serving 15 years for aggravated robbery.

The bodies of 32-year-old Noel Devin and 63-yearold Thomas "Mac" Devin were discovered April 7 by crews responding to a Bryan house fire. Investigators later determined the victims were stabbed.

Brown was arrested hours later at a Bryan motel where the woman's SUV was located.

Defense attorney Billy Carter says Brown, who remains in custody, has had mental health issues.

Synthetic drugs make 15 sick

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Investigators are trying to determine if illegal synthetic marijuana was used by more than a dozen people who ended up in Central Texas hospitals.

Austin police say at least 15 people have been treated for overdoses reported mainly in the downtown area and near the Austin Resource Center for the Homeless. Police did not immediately report any arrests.

Steers strand 11 in 5-1 playoff loss

SAN ANGELO - The Big Spring High School Steers didn't have any problem putting runners on base on Thursday afternoon at San Angelo Central's Bobcat Stadium in the opening game of their best-of-three bi-district playoff series with the Fort Stockton High School Panthers. They had 12 runners reach base in the game.

While getting on base may not have been a problem, getting those baserunners home was.

Big Spring stranded 11 run-

ners on the base paths - including eighth at second and third base – and committed a pair of costly errors that effectively squandered a solid pitching performance by senior righthander Gary Watkins.

It also left the Steers in a win-or-go-home situation as they head into Saturday's second game.

Ironically, it was Fort Stockton that found itself looking down the barrel of a loaded pistol early in the contest. Big Spring threatened to blow the game wide open by loading the bases in three of the first four innings of play. Each opportunity to put the Panthers on their heels came up just short, however.

Anthony Godwin got Big Spring off to a good – albeit painful – start in the first. The BSHS centerfielder reached base early by getting hit by a pitch.

The Panthers managed to lessen the damage moments later, however. Fort Stockton erased Godwin from the base paths by enticing the Steers' next batter, Hunter Hill, to bounce into a fielder's choice.

The Panthers' woes were far from through, though. Haegan Rodriguez drew a one-out walk and Watkins became the second hit batsmen of the inning to load the bases.

Fort Stockton averted disaster from there. The Panthers retired the ensuing to Big Spring batters on an infield pop and a strikeout.

Big Spring put Fort Stockton on the ropes again in the second. After Matt Beal had led off the frame with a walk, Adam Franco took advantage of a bad throw by the FSHS catcher to reach first. After notching the first out, Panthers' starter Brian Rios loaded the bases by plunking Godwin for the second time.

Again, the Panthers managed to get off the hook. Rios got Hill to ground to Matthew Zavalla at first. The FSHS first baseman alertly fired home to force Beal out at the plate. Big Spring's next batter flew out harmlessly to center to end the threat and preserve the 0-0 deadlock

Fort Stockton, which had lost both of its regular season games to Big Spring, grabbed the lead in the bottom of the third, turning an error and back-to-back doubles into a 2-0 cushion.

After Watkins had retired


throwing error.
