## Road program in holding pattern

Howard County officials are closely watching a potential hitch in their plans to renovate area roads using state grant money.

The county is one of many in Texas participating in a program under which the Texas Department of Transportation will help defray costs of repairing county roads adversely affected by heavy oilfield traffic.

Under the program, Howard County is eligible for \$3.8 million in TxDOT funds, County Judge Mark Barr. The agency will reimburse the county for 80 percent of the costs of repair work.

Those funds would be targeted in all sectors of the county, but primarily in the northwest quadrant, which has seen the heaviest oilfield-related traffic.

Most of the preliminary plans for road work are in place, but a potential snag is recent litigation filed against the transportation agency by officials in La Salle County, who are claiming TxDOT is not allocating sufficient funds to their area.

What effect that lawsuit will have on Howard County's plans are, in Barr's words, "anybody's guess." He is optimistic the county will still receive the reimbursements, but said the litigation has thrown any sort of timetable for repair work into flux for now.

## Larry Zane Shaw



Larry Zane Shaw, 86, of Knott, Texas passed away peacefully on May 2, 2014 in Oklahoma City, Okla., where he had lived for the past year with family. Funeral services will be 2 p.m. Tuesday at the Nalley-Pickle & Welch Rosewood Chapel. Interment will follow at Trinity Memorial Park.

He was born in Knott, Texas June 19, 1927, to the late Summer and Angeline Shaw. Larry graduated from Garner High School in 1944. He joined the U.S. Marine Corps in 1945 and joked throughout his life that as soon as the Japanese heard he had joined the U.S. military, they surrendered. He took great pride in his service and that his grandson, Chris Lepard, also served in the Marine Corps. After the war, he returned to Knott and entered the first-ever class of students at Howard College in Big Spring. He was proud to participate in Howard College's 50th year commencement with other students from the class of 1946-47.

Larry met Bertie Faye Hinson of Ackerly, Texas in 1947 and they were married in June of 1948. They were married for 56 years before Bertie died in 2004. On their 50th wedding anniversary, dad wrote to her: "...when one sees the beautiful pictures of you, Bertie, they can see why I was so attracted to you when I met you in 1947. I wasn't interested in anyone else after this, as I wanted you to be my wife and the mother of my children, so we were married in 1948, now after 50 years I still love you." Bertie adored Larry as well and understood him like no other. It was clear to those who knew them best that they were still hopelessly in love with one another their entire lives together.

Larry, with Bertie's support as well as their children, built a significant and often awarded farming business in the Knott Community, where they were active in the First Baptist Church, community, school and local politics. Larry was president of the Sands school district school board and instilled an interest in politics with many in his family that remains today. His farming operation, along with his employees, were recognized by the Fort Worth Star Telegram as cotton farm of the year in Texas at the height of his career. Larry received farmer of the year honors numerous times from several organizations and his farms were featured in the national Cotton Farming magazine as well as the prestigious National Geographic magazine.

Larry's love of politics was passed on to many of his relatives. Politics became a family wide interest under Larry's encouragement. His son, Larry Don Shaw, was elected and served in the Texas House of Representatives for many years. Working in his son's campaigns and watching his success as a legislator was a great source of pride and one of the highlights of his life. Larry attended the Democratic National Convention in New York with younger brother, Delano Shaw. He inspired numerous family members to run for public office, including his younger brother, Roosevelt Shaw, and his grandson, Shawn Lepard. Larry's message was that it was important to participate in the political process to try and make the world a better place.

Larry is survived by his daughter, Linda Johnson of Oklahoma City. Linda was his buddy and steadfast caretaker throughout his life and especially during the past years when his health declined. She was his rock, along with her husband, Eric Johnson, who always had Larry's back when he was unable to do the things he once handled with ease, all while allowing Larry to keep a sense of pride and control in his life. Larry was most grateful for Linda and Eric's support and knew it gave him years of independence.

Larry is also survived by his son, Larry Don Shaw, of Austin, and numerous loved ones: grandsons, Shawn Lepard and wife Jennifer, and Chris Lepard and wife Sally; granddaughters, Brooke Schuelke and husband Clint, Brittany McGough and husband Chase, and Aubrey Meyers and husband Knate; six great-grandchildren; sisters, Nelda Tobias and husband Dick, and Joann Peugh; and brothers, Roosevelt Shaw and wife Patsy, Franklin Shaw and wife Starlee, and Ronald Shaw and wife Jennie. He also had numerous nieces and nephews.

Larry was an especially positive and fun-loving spirit. From practical jokes, fireworks and wonderful old sayings, he was sure to put a smile on someone's face each day of his life. He often quoted the great Will Rogers saying..."I never met a man I didn't like." You couldn't be around Larry for long before being told upon goodbyes to "watch for snakes" instead of being told to be careful. He was dearly loved and will be missed by many far and wide. The world was a better place when he was around.

"We really don't know when we'll begin work," Barr said. "I don't think it will affect the amount of money we receive, though. We talked to our attorney (Wednesday) ... and he advised us to continue on as we would have."

For right now, however, officials are waiting for the green light from TxDOT before proceeding with repair plans.

"As soon as we get the go-ahead, we'll start advertising for bids," Barr said.

You know what, Washington is a wonderful place. You guys are wonderful teachers who do some great things. I think you can hold your head up and be proud that you teach at Washington Elementary."

Foster will retire at the end of this semester after 29 years in the education field. She began her career in the 1970s teaching sixth and seventh graders in Fort Worth, and then later teaching younger children in Sweetwater. She began her tenure with Big Spring Independent School District at Goliad Sixth and Seventh Grade Center teaching where she said she found her true calling as a teacher.

"I had not taught special ed. before and I always said I was never teaching special ed.," she said. "God had an opening for me at Goliad, and he knew where my spot was. He knew where my heart really was because once I got

there to that place in special ed., then I knew that is where I needed to be. I found that was my niche. I had a knack for that. That is where I stayed. I had no desire to be anywhere else or do anything else after that then special education."

Foster was quick to give some recognition to her special education aids, Jo Anna Bailey and Dolores Saucedo, and fellow teacher, Karen Thibeault, during her speech as well as laud the support and effort of the whole school.

"I am honored and humbled and very surprised," Foster said. "I think this is a wonderful award and I am very honored and happy to receive it but it truly is a team work thing. I couldn't have done it without all the support from the other teachers. We are all together. I am not alone in any of this. Our special education children require a lot of support in every area. The more that we have support from general education the better things are for all of our kids. These teachers have done a fabulous

job."

Mason representative Bo Clawson said the Foster's nomination submitted by her elementary principal Charlie Crisp stood above the rest.

"Most of you know Mirabeau B. Lamar was the second president of the Republic of Texas," Clawson told the crowd. He set up the Texas public school system. The Grand Lodge of Texas (Masons) decided to honor him by given this award. We are involved in a number of education programs. We give scholarship and host the teacher appreciation breakfast every year. It's our way of

saying thank you.

"Unfortunately teachers don't get good publicity," Clawson continued. "You let them mess up and they will be on the front page for weeks. There was a one room school in Idaho. A guy taught until he was 80 years old and when he retired 1,200 students came back for his retirement party. That was in a travel magazine. The only place I saw it. We want to say thank you for what you do. I lot of people can't do what you do."

Foster said she is looking forward to retirement.

"I am not setting the

alarm," she said. "I also look forward to enjoying my first grandchild that will be born in July. There are some very special people here. There are some very wonderful teachers that I have enjoyed knowing all this time, and I am not about to let our friendship drop. I've already been contacted by the retired teachers about their association here becoming a part of that so I'm sure that is something that is in my future as well.



Baltas provided much of HC's offense in the championship game, going 2-for-3 from the plate. As a team, Howard College managed just five hits in the contest.

Odessa College answered back in the bottom of the frame, scoring a run to tie the game at 1-1.

Jessica Elder and Flynn took control of the contest from there. The two pitchers both dominated the hitters over the next three innings. Neither team managed to push across a run in that span and sent the game into the sixth with the score knotted at 1-1.

Odessa College, 49-1 overall, got its offense in gear in the sixth. The Lady Wranglers sent 11 batters to the plate in the inning, breaking a 1-1 tie with eight runs on nine hits – eight of which came in a row.

Elder pitched the first 5.1 in-

nings for the HC women. She allowed just 12 hits in the contest, including a homer by OC third baseman Victoria Ruiz in the bottom of the second that tied the game at 1-1.

The Lady Hawks put themselves into position to earn a trip to the softball World Series with a gutsy effort on Saturday. After opening the tournament with a stunning loss to Midland College, Howard College worked its way through the loser's bracket to reach the finals.

Howard College, which had finished second in the Western Junior College Athletic Conference standings to Odessa in the regular season, rallied back from its early loss to Midland in grand fashion. They defeated Luna Community College on Saturday afternoon, and then gained a measure of revenge by claiming a 7-1 win over Midland College in the consolation semifinals.

HC finished the tournament with a 3-2 record.

**This deal occurred in the Mixed Pairs at the 2002 world bridge championships.** North-South were many-time women's world champion Judi Radin, playing with the irrepressible hero of many a deal reported in this column, Zia Mahmood (now known to all simply as Zia).  
**After Radin's three-club rebid,** Zia characteristically pressed on to slam, learning along the way via Roman Key Card Blackwood that North held either three aces or two

aces and the king of clubs.  
**Looking at all four hands,** it can be seen that the spades do not break 3-3 and the ace of hearts is offside, so six notrump seems doomed. But things changed dramatically after West selected the harmless-looking ten of spades as his opening lead.  
**Zia played low from dummy** and noted with great interest the appearance of East's jack as he won with the ace. If the opponents' plays were honest, this meant that West had the 9-8 of spades, giving Zia an opportunity to steal the slam-going trick.  
**So at trick two,** Zia put the six of spades on the table and, after West followed low, showed the courage of his convictions by letting the six ride. When it held, Zia had his 12th trick and the slam.  
**It might appear** that if West had covered the six with the eight, the slam would have gone down, but this is not necessarily true. The play of the eight would have given Zia a chance to shine in another way.  
**After taking the eight** with dummy's king, declarer would run his clubs and diamonds, reducing his hand to the Q-7 of spades and singleton king of hearts. West would come down to the 9-5 of spades and ace of hearts. The play of the king of hearts would then force West to win and lead a spade into South's Q-7, and the slam would still come home.

Today's Highlight in History: On May 5, 1862, Mexican troops defeated French occupying forces in the Battle of Puebla. (The Cinco de Mayo holiday commemorates Mexico's victory.) On this date: In 1821, Napoleon Bonaparte, 51, died in exile on the island of St. Helena. In 1891, New York's Carnegie Hall (then

named "Music Hall") had its official opening night. In 1914, actor Tyrone Power was born in Cincinnati. In 1925, schoolteacher John T. Scopes was charged in Tennessee with violating a state law that prohibited teaching the theory of evolution. (Scopes was found guilty, but his conviction was later set aside.) In 1934, the first Three Stooges short for Columbia Pictures, "Woman Haters," was released. In 1942, wartime sugar rationing began in the United States. In 1955, West Germany became a fully sover-

eign state. The baseball musical "Damn Yankees" opened on Broadway. In 1961, astronaut Alan B. Shepard Jr. became America's first space traveler as he made a 15-minute suborbital flight aboard Mercury capsule Freedom 7. In 1973, Secretariat won the Kentucky Derby, the first of its Triple Crown victories.
