Myers, Marquez Jr. win council seats

 It was "out with the old, in with the new" in the Big Spring City Council elections Saturday, as challengers ousted incumbents in both races. In District 1, newcomer Raul Marquez Jr. denied Marcus Fernandez's bid for a second term on the council, outpolling him by a 86-67 margin.

"I just feel very thankful, thankful to the people who came out and supported me, as a young man, to represent them on the council," Marquez said Saturday. Marquez declined to identify any specific issue that helped put him over the top in the voters' eyes, and instead concentrated on what will face him once he's seated on the council. "There's going to be a lot of

work," he said. "There's a lot of issues in different neighborhoods that I'd like to take care of. The major thing is the problems we're facing with trash and the landfill — that's something we definitely need to take care of, and an issue the community needs to come together on." Fernandez was very gracious in defeat.

"I believe in our system of government, which is nothing but the best," he said. "I tried my best; I did all I can do. Raul will do his best, also, I'm sure of that. And if there's anyway I can help him, I will." In the District 3 election, challenger Justin Myers

Council to seek moratorium on building permits

Between U.S. 87 and Oil Mill Road

 Big Spring City Council will consider putting a temporary halt to building permits in the city's northern corridor when it convenes at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday in council chambers, located at 307 E. Fourth. The council will consider an emergency resolution calling for a 90-day moratorium on the issuance of building permits in the area, which basically stretches north from Interstate 20, west of Highway 87 and east of Oil Mill Road. Interest in the area has been high from developers, but city

officials are hesitant to start issuing permits because zoning issues in the area haven't yet been ironed out. To give time for the city to finalize zoning and infrastructure needs for the area, officials are asking for the 90-day moratorium and that "no new permit of any nature shall be issued for construction within the Northern Sector ... except that permits for the construction of hotels, restaurants or other retail businesses in the area adjacent to Interstate 20 ... will be considered contingent on adequate sewer and water infrastructure being available." If approved, the moratorium will take effect immediately. Also Tuesday, new council members Raul Marquez Jr. and Justin Myers will be sworn in. Marquez and Myers won the District 1 and 3 races, respectively, in Saturday's municipal election. In other business, the council will consider:

- Canvassing of Saturday's election results.
- Amending city ordinance codes to allow for increasing the deposit required for water meter testing.
- Discussion on sewer needs in the northern corridor.

FISD administrators say they need three teachers

 FORSAN — Growth in elementary age students at the Forsan Independent School District has prompted officials to request an additional three new teaching positions for the 2014-2015 school year. "We have had a little more than 13 percent growth in the last year in our elementary school," said FISD superintendent Randy Johnson. "We are trying to make sure our class sizes remain as small as possible in those primary grade levels — first, second and third grade. "It's our hope to add another teacher to each one of those grade levels, so we can divide the student body for each class a little bit smaller," Johnson continued. "We are not at 22 (students) to 1 (teacher) in first or third this

year, but we are in second grade. By adding a fourth teacher to each one of those grade levels, it will help us drive those numbers back down where we like them to be." Officials will take the request to trustees during their monthly meeting set at 7 p.m. today in the district board room, 411 W. Sixth

Gasoline prices drop 2.6 cents in Lone Star State

 Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 2.6 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.41/g Sunday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 gas outlets in Texas. This compares with the national average that has fallen 1.8 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.62/g, according to gasoline price website Gas-

Buddy.com. Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices Sunday were 3.1 cents per gallon higher than the same day one year ago and are 5.0 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has increased 2.9 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 4.9 cents per gallon higher than this day one year ago.

"Pump prices have continued to recede across much of the country, although decreases have been small so far," said GasBuddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst Patrick DeHaan. "The national average peaked in the closing days of April and has moved down a few cents per gallon, and we'll likely continue to see prices dropping as we approach Memorial Day. "California continues to see

the largest decreases thanks to increasing supply and falling wholesale prices. On the other hand, Oregon and Washington may see slight increases in prices as supply remains tight. The national average by Memorial Day will be between 5-10 cents per gallon lower than today, which would represent a nice decrease over where gasoline prices were on Memorial Day 2013," DeHaan said.

Floyd William Parsons Jr.

Floyd William (Bill) Parsons Jr., a 1959 graduate of Big Spring High School, died May 1, at the age of 73 while hiking in a remote area of the Sonoran Desert he loved near Tucson, Ariz.

A graduate of the University of Arkansas, he served from 1964-66 in the Peace Corps in Bolivia and two years in the Teacher Corps in Rio Grande City, Texas. He later taught at the New York Institute of Photography and took freelance photos at the 1969 Woodstock rock festival, which he sold to The New York Times, Rolling Stone magazine and the Museum of Modern Art in New York City.

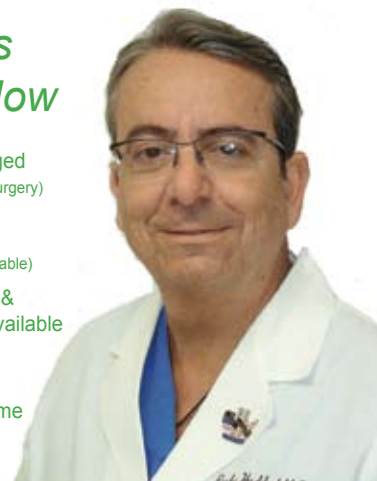

Fire burns 75 Panhandle homes

FRITCH, Texas (AP) — About 40 evacuees have spent the night at a high school gymnasium after a wildfire burned as many as 75 homes in the drought-stricken Texas Panhandle.

An official with the Sanford-Fritch Independent School District says classes were canceled Monday due to the fire near Fritch, 30 miles northeast of Amarillo.

Superintendent Jim McClellan says the gymnasium was opened to evacuees after the fire started Sunday afternoon.

McClellan said several students and staff members lost houses in the fire. Hutchinson County emergency management officials estimated at least 75 homes burned.



The Texas Department of Public Safety says no injuries were immediately reported in the fire between Fritch and nearby Lake Meredith.

Sr. Trooper Chris Ray said Highway 136 through Fritch

reopened this morning. Fritch Police Chief Monte Leggett noted 75 percent of the fire had been contained as of this morning.

Fritch is located some 30 miles northeast of Amarillo.

Police believe 3rd death linked to Murphy slayings

MURPHY, Texas (AP) — Investigators are trying to determine whether a romantic dispute led to the slaying of a couple at a North Texas home and then his ex-girlfriend taking her own life in Dallas.

Police say the bodies of a man and his girlfriend were discovered Saturday morning in a home in Murphy, about 15 miles northeast of Dallas.

Murphy police identified those victims as

40-year-old Jonathon Masin, who lived at the residence, and 38-year-old Amy Picchiotti of Dallas.

Dallas police hours later located a woman's body in an SUV in an apparent suicide. Police say 45-year-old Michele Boyer formerly dated Masin.

Police say a handgun similar to a weapon believed to be have been used in the double slaying was found near Boyer.

Killeen police detective shot serving warrant dies

KILLEEN, Texas (AP) — A Central Texas police officer has died of a gunshot wound suffered two days previously while trying to serve a warrant.

A Killeen Police Department statement says Detective Charles "Chuck" Dinwiddie died Sunday afternoon at Scott & White Memorial Hospital in Temple of a gunshot wound to the face suffered early Friday.

Police spokeswoman Carroll Smith says 49-year-old Marvin Louis Guy of Killeen remains in Bell County Jail charged with three counts of attempted capital murder.

Four officers were shot in the Friday incident. A police statement says two were treated and released and remains hospitalized in good condition.

Driver, 70, dies after run over using ATM

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston police say a 70-year-old man has died after being run over by his pickup truck as he tried to use an ATM.

Police did not immediately release the name of the man who was pronounced dead at a Houston hospital.

Police say the victim was driving a Ford F-450 on Friday afternoon when he pulled up to an ATM. Investigators say the man opened the door and was partly out of the truck when the vehicle began to roll backward.

Police say the man fell out of the vehicle and was run over.

The pickup truck hit a car but that driver was not hurt.

2 highway workers killed in El Paso accident

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — Two highway workers in West Texas have died after being hit by a vehicle in a drunken driving investigation involving a soldier stationed at Fort Bliss.

El Paso police say one bridge worker was dead at the scene early Sunday along Interstate 10. The other worker died at a hospital.

Police detained an 18-year-old driver later identified by Fort Bliss officials as a soldier with the 1st Armored Division.

El Paso police on Monday did not immediately release names of the victims or details on charges in what investigators call an alcohol-related accident.

Police say the driver ignored a traffic barricade.

easily defeated incumbent Glen Carrigan. Myers, the former president of the Economic Development Corp. board of directors, received 219 votes to 114 for Carrigan.

Like Fernandez, Carrigan was seeking a second term on the council.

"I'm disappointed, of course, but I want to congratulate Justin on his win," Carrigan said Saturday. "He ran

a very strong, but very straightforward, race."

Myers thanked the District 3 voters for their support.

"I'm just humbled that the voters of District 3 elected me to represent them, and I'm certainly going to do my best to do that," he said. "I don't know if there was any one specific issue that helped get me elected. The only thing I promised people during the campaign was that I would take every issue on a case-by-case basis ... and do the best I can for the city."

In other business, trustees will:

- set cafeteria prices for the 2014-2015 school year.

- consider budget amendments

Like Marquez, Myers said getting a new landfill ready for operation will be a major task facing the council.

"We're going to have to start planning now. Honestly, we probably should have been planning for this 10 years ago," he said. "We simply have to get a plan in place as soon as possible."

In other elections Saturday:

- District 1 incumbent Irene Galan Rodriguez narrowly won re-election to the Big Spring Independent School Dis-

trict Board of Trustees, out-polling challenger T.J. Stewart by an 81-72 margin. Incumbents Ken McIntosh and Fabian Serrano were unopposed in their bids for new terms in Districts 3 and 7, respectively.

- It will be the same cast of characters, so to speak, on the Howard College trustee board, as incumbents Marie Etheridge, John Freeman, Charles Warren and Adrian Calvio all

handily won re-election.

- Incumbent Lori Martinez and newcomer Kandy Alaman won at-large spots on the Coahoma ISD board. Alaman received 92 votes and Martinez netted 74 in Saturday's election. Brandon Atkins was third in the polling with 39 votes.

Voting was extremely light in Saturday's elections, with only 7 percent of registered voters

casting ballots, Election Administrator Sandra Bloom said.

Johnson admits rapid enrollment growth has pushed the campus, located in the Elbow community, to capacity — evidence, he said, the district needs the new elementary building currently under construction near the high school.

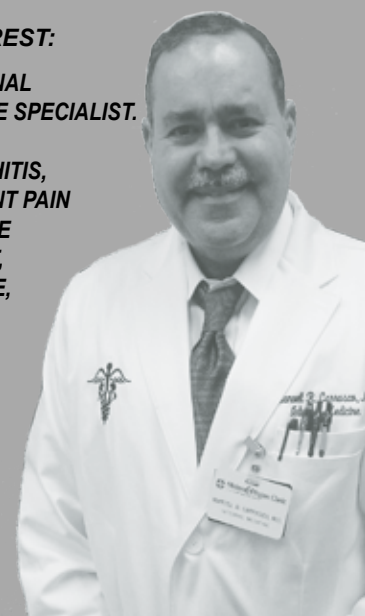

Cervantes claims gold in 1,600-meter run

AUSTIN - Jeremy Cervantes wrote his name deep into Forsan High School athletic history on Saturday in front of a large crowd at the Mike A. Myers Stadium in Austin. He also collected a little gold. Cervantes sprinted his way to first-place in the Class A, Division I, 1,600-meter run at the 2014 University Interscholastic League's State Track and Field Championships.

Big Spring teams miss out on medal chances

Make no mistake about it. The win was huge for Cervantes. In addition to winning the state crown in the event with a time of 4 minutes and 33.03 seconds, he shattered the Forsan school record in the meet. "He set a new school record in the process," said FHS coach Gary Huckabee. Cervantes won the state title

with a stellar effort over the final 400 meters of the event. In that span, he outraced Ozona's Omero Rodriguez to the finish line. He edged Rodriguez for the win by less than three-quarters of a second. Rodriguez completed the 1,600-meter race with a time of 4:33.75. Valley View's Micah Davidson was third at 4:36.30. In addition to Cervantes'

win, Buffalo faithful also watched on as Carlee Daniel, Madi Roman, Brittney Hergert and Raegan Haggard teamed to take fourth in the girls' 4x100-meter relay. The four put together a time of 49.84 seconds. The state meet didn't go quite as well for Big Spring. Shockingly, the BSHS boys' and girls' teams failed to medal in any event.

Big Spring senior Ryan Lopez highlighted the Steers' outing. He capped his high school career with a solid performance in the boys' 400-meter dash. He finished fourth in the final standings with a time of 49.23 seconds. Ingleside's Terrance Gross won the 400 crown at 47.45 seconds. The BSHS boys' 4x400-meter relay squad of Ian Gonzales, Lorenzo Jones, Tobyn Tan-

Dear Annie: I have twin teenage granddaughters who visit me every year for a week. They also bring along a friend (just one, thank goodness). I love having them, but I end up spending a fortune entertaining them. I pay for every meal, including restaurants, and we eat out a lot. I love to take them places, but I'm on a fixed income and would like to make it less expensive.

Do you think if I were to give each of my granddaughters a set amount of money they would be more frugal? They earn a lot of money babysitting, but I feel funny asking them to spend their own money on things when they visit me. Any suggestions? -- *Going Broke in Florida*

Dear Going Broke: You should not have to foot the entire bill for two teenagers and their friend. You are already giving them a free place to stay and any meals eaten at home. But please don't demand payment from the girls. Instead, ask the parents to help you with the cost of entertaining these young people for a week. They also could give the girls an allowance for personal expenses (movies with the friend, trips to a

restaurant, mall purchases). The extra girl's parents should similarly send her with personal money so she does not become a burden.

Taking the girls for a week is a lovely way to bond with your granddaughters, but it is also a favor to the parents. Explain the situation and ask them to help remedy the problem.

Dear Annie: Our nephew recently announced his engagement and wedding date. His fiancée's older sister is getting married two weeks before. The sister's future husband called my nephew and flat-out stated that it is inappropriate that they have chosen a date so close to theirs, as it will take away from their special day. He suggested my nephew move his wedding to December at the earliest.

However, the sister has not mentioned a word of this to my nephew's fiancée. We can't help but think that she, too, is upset about this and asked her fiancé to handle it. We are disappointed that what could be the happiest time of our nephew's life is filled with stress. What is the wedding protocol in this instance? -- *Aunt and Uncle from Wisconsin*

Dear Aunt and Uncle: It was very inconsiderate of your nephew and his bride to schedule their wedding two weeks after her sister's already-chosen date. It does indeed take away from their special day, and more importantly, it puts a terrible burden on family and friends in terms of gifts and travel expenses. It also appears to others as though your nephew's bride resents her older sister. We hope you can convince your nephew to give his guests a few months to

recover from the first wedding before attending the next.

Dear Annie: I read the letter from "Blue-Collar Grandparents," whose grandchildren are pulling out their hair. I'd like to suggest that they bring up the possibility of PANDAS (pediatric autoimmune neuropsychiatric disorders associated with strep).

If either of these kids has had numerous strep infections, perhaps they should be tested and assessed. I realize now that my son must have had this when he was 4, but I'd never heard of it then. He had seven strep infections in a row. He began displaying OCD behavior, which included pulling out nearly half of the hair on his head. Contract Bridge

Famous Hand

East dealer.
East-West vulnerable.

The bidding:
East South West North
2♣ 2♦ 2♥ Pass

Opening lead — ten of clubs.

This deal occurred in a preliminary-round match at the 1990 world team championship in Geneva. The declarer missed the winning — and correct — line of play, which is not easy to spot even with all 52 cards exposed.

East's two-club opening promised a sound pre-empt in clubs, and West's optimistic double of three diamonds at his second turn ended the auction.

South won West's ten-of-clubs

lead with the queen and could see only four potential losers — two spades (if East had the ace), a diamond and a club. In fact, if declarer could ruff his third club in dummy or West had the spade ace, he might even make an overtrick.

So at trick two, South played the club ace, planning to ruff a club next. But West ruffed and returned the ace and another diamond. This left South with a club and two spades to lose, so he finished down one.

Observe that it wouldn't have helped South to try to draw trumps immediately and settle for nine tricks. West can win the second diamond and put his partner on lead with a spade. East's king-of-clubs return then brings declarer to the same sorry fate, West ruffing the ace whenever South plays it.

However, declarer can guarantee the contract by means of an unusual safety play. All he has to do to assure nine tricks is to lead the nine of clubs at trick two! This leaves the defenders helpless.

If East wins the club and continues clubs to allow West to ruff the ace, declarer can overruff with one of dummy's high trumps. And if instead West ruffs the nine of clubs in order to play the ace and another trump, South eventually scores the club ace for his ninth trick.

This Date In History

Today is Monday, May 12, the 132nd day of 2014. There are 233 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On May 12, 1949, the Soviet Union lifted the Berlin Blockade, which the Western powers had succeeded in circumventing with their Berlin Airlift. On this date: In 1780, during the Revolutionary War, the besieged city of Charleston, South Carolina, surrendered to British forces. In 1870, an act creating the Canadian province

of Manitoba was given royal assent, to take effect in July. In 1914, author and broadcast journalist Howard K. Smith was born in Ferriday, Louisiana. In 1922, a 20-ton meteor crashed near Blackstone, Virginia. In 1932, the body of Charles Lindbergh Jr., the kidnapped son of Charles and Anne Lindbergh, was found in a wooded area near Hopewell, New Jersey. In 1937, Britain's King George VI was crowned at Westminster Abbey; his wife, Elizabeth, was crowned as queen consort. In 1943, during World War II, Axis forces in North Africa surren-

dered. The two-week Trident Conference, headed by President Franklin D. Roosevelt and British Prime Minister Winston Churchill, opened in Washington. In 1958, the United States and Canada signed an agreement to create the North American Air Defense Command (later the North American Aerospace Defense Command, or NORAD).

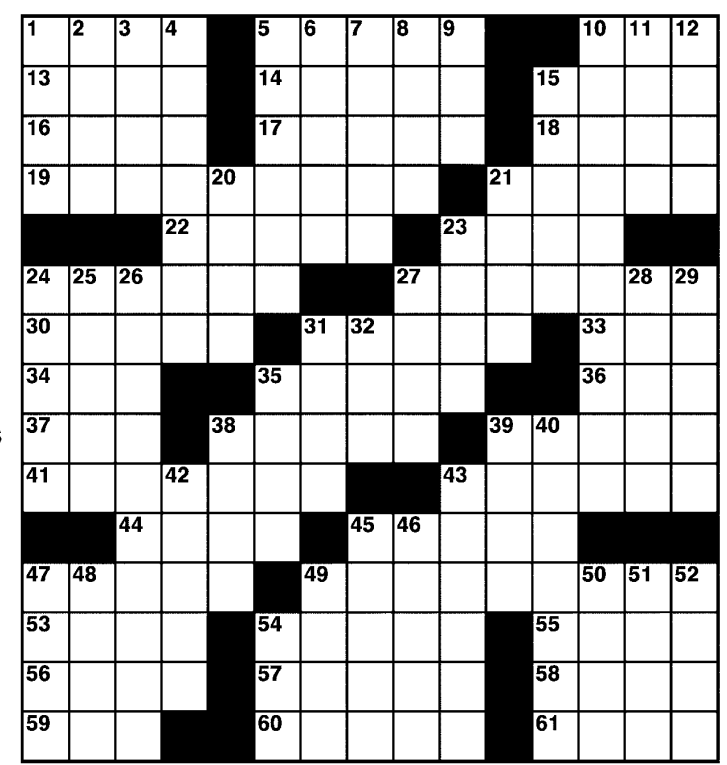
