Auto wreck takes out internet, TV

An automobile accident forced thousands of Big Spring residents off-line this morning.

Almost 8,000 Suddenlink customers were without TV, internet and telephone service today following an automobile accident which brought down a utility pole carrying fiber optic cables belonging to the company.

Gene Regan, senior director of corporate communications for Suddenlink, said the service interruption affected approximately 7,800 customers in the Big Spring area.

The accident also affected local Verizon customers.

Details of the time and location of the accident were unavailable.

Suddenlink technicians were at the site of the accident making repairs this morning, Regan added.

"There is no estimated time as to when repairs will be completed," he said. "We apologize to our customers and are doing everything we can to restore services as soon as possible."

Transmission line fire out

FORSAN — Howard County volunteer firefighters have contained a morning wildfire caused by a short in the power transmission line near the city of Forsan.

"We kept it to about a half acre," said Tommy Sullivan, Howard County Volunteer Department fire chief.

Conway named Professor Emeritus

Linda Conway, former Professor of English and administrator at Howard College, was recently designated as Professor Emeritus and will be formally recognized during commencement ceremonies at 7 tonight.

"During her years of service, Linda Conway has championed the importance of the classroom and the student in the mission and purpose of Howard College," said HC President Dr. Cheryl T.

Sparks. "We are so proud to be able to recognize her dedication and commitment to our institution, our students, and our community."

Before a person can be designated as Professor Emeritus, they must complete 20 years of service to the college district, be retired from the college district, and be nominated by three faculty members.

The college president makes the final selections for consideration by the board of trustees.

Conway spent 31 years with Howard College, retiring in 2012. She served as a professor of english, district administrator, Southern Association of Colleges and Schools liaison and was a member of the administrative cabinet.

"Linda led by example

throughout her years of service with us," Sparks said. "She had a reputation of a master teacher and was well respected by her students and colleagues."

Among her honors, Conway was named Educator of the Year, an award selected solely by students.

Having the college be connected to the community was also important to Conway. She established Kids' College, which quickly became a summer tradition for the Big Spring area.

"Linda has been a dear friend to Howard College and its community throughout her years of service and will remain so for many years to

mission line — owned by Elbow Creek Wind Farms — shorted out, catching a pole on fire which snapped and dropped to the ground, shutting down the system and starting the grass fire.

Firefighters received the call about around 8:20 a.m., Sullivan said.

"It has a domino effect," Sullivan said. "This line is tied into

TXU transmission lines. Once it failed, it knocked the whole system down. Everybody has to switch routes, and then everyone has to reboot and bring their load back up slowly."

Sullivan said TXU has already isolated the line from the rest of the system and added that Elbow Creek Wind Farm has already sent an investigator out to determine the cause of the shortage.

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What do you say about a vulgarian?

My friends from outside of Los Angeles are horrified. “Donald Sterling is a pig?” they say with surprise. “A racist, ignorant, loud-mouthed fool?” And Jewish, to boot. This is not, my mother would have said, good for the Jews.

No one I know who lives here is shocked at the news. I don’t even think of him as Jewish. I think of him as Donald Sterling, the guy who used to crowd the front section of the newspaper with full-size ads praising himself for being honored by his own charities.

The most shocking thing, my assistant joked with me, is how small the house is that the mistress got in Beverly Hills. Shelly Sterling suing over a \$1.8 million condo? It must have been the cars. We laugh. Before you jump on me for insensitivity to racism, my assistant is African-American. It’s just that Sterling never had a reputation as a good guy.

Don’t get me wrong — I’m shedding no tears. No one forced him to give the interview he did on CNN. Attacking Magic Johnson? I don’t think so. Here comes a whole new round of “sorrlys.” Won’t work.

Nor will the missus come out on top on this one, even if she is heaving the old boy under the bus as fast as she can. Today he has dementia? Last week, he was apparently fine to

run the team, and she was just mad about the midsize condo and the cars. This week, holy war. If he’s going to have to sell the team - and he is — she might as well get her half.

Sterling says it’s just one mistake in 35 years as a good team owner. Don’t believe it. It’s never one mistake. One mistake, and your wife isn’t saying you have dementia. One mistake, and someone, somewhere, would be jumping to his defense.

But what to do with such a guy?

Very simple. Move on. Let him, hopefully, be an example — but not an example of Jews, because he isn’t, or of Angeleños, because he isn’t, or even of self-satisfied billionaires, because he isn’t that, either.

He’s who he’s always been: a vulgarian who didn’t just happen to get rich. There are many wonderful rich people out there, but if you have all of the other talents, being selfish and self-righteous and ego-driven and having a wife who is willing to put up with almost anything (except, apparently, the cars), even going out as a trio with your girlfriend as long as she signs a friendship agreement and doesn’t rock the boat, well, that probably can’t hurt.

And he’s not alone. He is, no doubt, surrounded by people every day who have heard him say worse things than he did on the recording or on CNN and never said a word to him: didn’t correct him, stand up to him, warn him, castigate him,

nothing.

It wasn’t because they agreed with him. It’s because you can get used to almost anything, particularly if you’re being paid decently.

I’m not talking only about the high-priced aides who are overpaid to be underwhelming. I’m also talking about all of the invisible people who heard him loud and clear and turned the other cheek — the people who drove him all these years, who cooked his dinner, made his bed, took care of him when he was ill. Perhaps we’ll soon see them paraded about, to tell us how Sterling took their child to a game or paid for a nurse for a sick mother. I hope he did something.

Are they to blame? Of course not. Not any more than anyone else. But the whole world wasn’t in the dark about this guy. If we’re going to hold sports leaders to a high standard, and I’m all for that, let’s hold the players to that same standard, as well as the leaders of other large corporations. And if that makes some people uncomfortable, maybe it’s about time. And if it causes some of the folks around them to speak out, if only as a friendly warning, then that’s good, too. It’s the only good that’s going to come of this.

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President Obama discriminates

Our national Latino leaders still dance around it. They come close to saying it, but they still won’t admit it. So I’ll say it for them: The Obama administration discriminates against Latino immigrants.

Clearly, that should have been the conclusion of a new study that showed while 75 percent of undocumented immigrants are Latinos, 97 percent of those deported in 2013 were from Mexico, Central America or South America.

But when a group of national Latino organizations released the study’s findings, instead of blasting President Barack Obama for discriminating against Latino immigrants, they kept playing softball with the president, saying only that Latino immigrants are “disproportionally deported” and calling again on Obama’s deaf ears.

“We are calling on the president for executive action,” said Hector Sanchez, chairman of the National Hispanic Leadership Agenda, a collection of 37 major Latino organizations. “President Obama has the authority to halt deportations using various forms of prosecutorial discretion and has the authority to expand affirmative relief.”

Of course, Latino leaders have been calling on Obama to do this for years — to no avail.

Some of these leaders last week acknowledged that Obama has an “obsession with deportations” that are “devastating” Hispanic communities all over the nation. Their report recognized that soon Obama will have deported 2 million immigrants, and “the number of Latino deportees will equal the populations of Wyoming, Vermont, and North Dakota combined.” It acknowl-

edged that this is “a direct result of discriminatory policies at the federal state and local” levels. And yes, they even called it “a civil rights crisis.”

But instead of saying, “Mr. President, you are discriminating and, as our first black president and alleged civil rights leader, you should be ashamed,” they keep pitching him softballs.

Instead of telling him, “We thought you were our friend, we got people to vote for you, and you betrayed us,” instead of giving Obama the scolding he deserves, they keep hoping the president will react to the same pleas he hasn’t heard for years.

“Enough is enough,” Sanchez said. Unfortunately, since pro-immigrant advocates have been using that hollow threat for years, it only proves that our Latino leaders have no leverage left with the president and that nothing will change until they have the courage to really challenge Obama and the Democratic Party.

Like a typical Democrat, Obama obviously assumes that as long as Republicans keep alienating Latinos with draconian anti-immigrant measures in Congress and at the state level, Democrats can keep winning the Latino vote by default in upcoming elections.

Why bother working for the Latino vote, Democrats ask themselves, when you can get it for free?

Somehow, Latino leaders need to show the president and his fellow Democrats that there will be a price to pay for continuing to take the Latino vote for granted and earning it without doing anything to deserve it.

And last week was a missed opportunity to do just that.

When Latino leaders came up with those figures showing Obama’s discrimination to be self-evident, instead of repeating “enough is enough,” they needed to cast a strong vote of no confidence against Obama

and his fellow Democrats. Unfortunately, many of those same leaders are too closely engaged to the Democratic Party to even consider taking such a radical position.

They don’t seem to understand that you gain no leverage with politicians by begging for compassion but by showing how you can hurt them at the ballot box.

We have reached the point where much more radical alternatives are needed, and unless they are willing to really lead, much more radical leaders, too.

Unfortunately, this sad scenario is not likely to change until new and much more independent leaders begin using Obama’s alarming deportation statistics — and his discrimination against Latino immigrants — to turn Latinos against the Democratic Party.

Don’t get me wrong: Latinos are used by Democrats and abused by Republicans. Most Republicans are much less deserving of the Latino vote than most Democrats. But Latino voters will get no respect as long as we keep voting for the lesser of two evils.

This sad scenario will remain until Latinos unite behind a third-party candidate to send a strong message to both Democrats and Republicans, or until our leaders organize a campaign to keep the Hispanic vote at home on Election Day.

I know, this sounds terribly unrealistic, especially since the same leaders who claim to be fed up with Obama’s deportations will soon be encouraging us to vote for another Democrat.

But I can dream, can’t I?

Nigeria, a call for justice

On April 14, the Islamic extremist group, Boko Haram, abducted more than 300 girls who were taking exams at the Government Girls Secondary School in Chibok, Nigeria. Fifty-six managed to escape. But 276 remain captive. Amnesty International reported that the Nigerian government had four hours of warning before the abduction, but did not act for fear of engaging the armed

rebels. It appears the majority of the girls are Christians who are being threatened with their lives to convert to Islam.

The Boko Haram leader initially vowed to sell the girls, some of them into Cameroon and Chad.

More recently, he has sought to use many of them as hostages, promising their release in exchange for Boko Haram prisoners held in Nigeria.

This Saturday, France will host a summit where representatives from Chad, Cameroon, Niger, Benin, the United States and Britain will meet with the president of Nigeria. The event has refocused the world on the

widespread problem of Islamic extremism and human trafficking.

Around the world, the poor, oppressed and helpless continue to be forced into prostitution and slave labor. They become victims in wars that seem to never end.

The absence of human dignity, respect, compassion and justice is appalling.

According to the U.S. Department of State, "There are approximately 600,000 to 800,000 children, women and men trafficked across international borders annually." 80 percent of these are women and girls. Up to 50 percent are minors.

Sometimes we are overcome with the evil that

exists in the world. But widespread violence and injustice is not new. King David wrestled with the same realities in Psalm 10. He wrote:

"Why do you stand afar off, O Lord? Why do you hide yourself in times of trouble? In pride the wicked hotly pursue the afflicted. ... His eyes stealthily watch for the unfortunate. He lurks in a hiding place as a lion in his lair. ... O Lord, You have heard the desire of the humble. You will strengthen their heart. You will incline your ear to vindicate the orphan and the oppressed, so that man who is of the earth will no longer cause terror."

Jesus had no illusions about the world and its evil. He predicted we would have wars and rumors of wars. That nation would continue

to rise up against nation. But He also had no illusion about the purpose of His coming. He said, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon Me, because He anointed Me to preach the gospel to the poor. He has sent Me to proclaim release to the captives and the recovery of sight to the blind, to set free those who are oppressed, to proclaim the favorable year of the Lord." (Luke 4:18-19).

In a world that harbors pervasive evil, we must continue to pray and work for the release and rescue of these girls in Nigeria while we seek to establish justice and righteousness around the world.

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Thunder to take on Spurs after clipping LA

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Mr. Unreliable was rock-solid and relentless yet again.

Kevin Durant's reward is another trip to the Western Conference finals with the San Antonio Spurs.

The league MVP made the most foolish headline in recent newspaper history look even worse Thursday night with a spectacular 39-point performance, propelling the Thunder into a matchup with the San Antonio Spurs for a spot in the NBA finals.

While Russell Westbrook struggled and Oklahoma City's role players foundered, Durant carried

his teammates through Game 6 against the Los Angeles Clippers. Durant accounted for nearly half of their points with buckets or assists as the Thunder finally finished off their opponent, 104-98.

Durant also had a season-high 16 rebounds, and he might have to do even more when the Thunder visit San Antonio for Game 1 on Monday night. He's confident Oklahoma City is capable of getting past the West's No. 1 seeds with teamwork sprouting from years of playoff runs.

"Experience has helped us out a lot, just being with each other for so

long," Durant said. "We've got a long ways to go. We definitely can get better. This is definitely a series that pushed us to the brink. We were in a tough spot. We stayed together and persevered."

When the Thunder were down by 16 points and struggling to make any shot early in Game 6, they looked all but ready to fold up and head home for a series-deciding finale.

Instead, Westbrook overcame a slow start to finish with 19 points and 12 assists as the Thunder reached the conference finals for the third time in four years, closing

out Los Angeles with two straight wins.

Two days after the Thunder erased a late 13-point deficit to win Game 5, the Thunder rallied from that early defeat and maintained their lead throughout the fourth quarter, shaking off any memories of their Game 4 collapse on the same Staples Center court.

"I thought tonight's game was something that we've done all year," Thunder coach Scott Brooks said. "We've all stuck together and found ways to win."

Durant hit five 3-pointers and Reggie Jackson added 14 points for

Oklahoma City, which will face the Spurs in a rematch of the West's last two champions. The Thunder eliminated San Antonio in six games in 2012.

"Both teams are really good," Brooks said. "Both teams play hard. Both teams have great experience, so it's going to be a great series."

Oklahoma swept the Spurs 4-0 during the regular season.

The Clippers led for almost every minute of the first three quarters, but Durant kept the Thunder close and eventually ignited a 30-10 run stretching across the final two quarters.

Parker suffers Grade 1 strain

Breathe easy, San Antonio. It looks as if Tony Parker is going to be just fine.

Parker has a Grade 1 strain of his left hamstring, the least severe level of the injury and he is listed as day-to-day, the Spurs announced Thursday.

The team had the day off after eliminating the Portland Trail Blazers in Game 5 of the Western Conference semifinals Wednesday night, but Parker came in to get an MRI exam of the injury that caused him to miss the entire second half of the clincher.

Just as the Spurs appeared to be finding their playoff legs and asserting themselves as the team to beat in the powerful Western Conference, Parker's gave out. He felt his left hamstring tighten early in the second quarter, went to the locker room to get it examined and only played briefly before calling it a night.

The soon-to-be 32-year-old Parker missed 14 games with various injuries during the regular season, but the Spurs went 11-3 in those games and still managed to post the best record in the NBA. Still, the prospects of losing Parker — the inexhaustible throttle on the Spurs' relentless engine — was enough to make a team hell bent on returning to the NBA Finals a little nervous after their 104-82 victory over Portland sent them back to the Western Conference finals.

"If we want to have a chance to make it to the Finals, we need him healthy," guard Manu Ginobili said.

Parker suffered a Grade 2 strain of his right hamstring in Game 3 of the NBA Finals last season against the Miami Heat. He didn't miss a game because of it, but the discomfort definitely limited effectiveness as the series wore on. He was 9 for 35 in the last two games, including 3 for 12 for 10 points in the Game 7 loss at Miami.

But Parker told the San Antonio Express-News that his latest injury wasn't as serious as the one that bothered him last June.

"It's OK; not too bad," Parker told the newspaper. "Not as bad as the NBA Finals. NBA Finals was a Grade 2. This one is Grade 1. So should be fine for Monday."

The Spurs will host Game 1 of the conference finals on Monday.

Experts: NBA likely to win in Sterling legal fight

(AP) — A cadre of attorneys and a flurry of lawsuits could certainly slow down the NBA's plan to force Donald Sterling to sell the Los Angeles Clippers over his recent racist comments, but legal experts say the league will likely prevail in the end.

And that goes for Sterling's wife, Shelly, who has said she'd like to keep her stake in the team even if her husband is ousted.

The NBA's constitution, which Donald Sterling signed as controlling owner of the Clippers, gives its board of governors broad latitude in league decisions including who owns the teams. NBA Commissioner Adam Silver is pushing for a swift vote against Sterling, which requires a minimum of three-fourths of the other 29 controlling owners to agree.

Silver also has imposed a lifetime ban on Sterling and a \$2.5 million fine. The ban does not apply to Shelly Sterling.

SI.com and ESPN.com, citing unidentified sources, reported Thurs-

day that Sterling's lawyer, antitrust litigator Maxwell Blecher, wrote a letter to Rick Buchanan, the NBA's executive vice president and general counsel, threatening to sue the league and saying Sterling will not pay the \$2.5 million fine.

"Sterling's own signature will come back to haunt him," said Michael McCann, founding director of the Sports and Entertainment Law Institute at the University of New Hampshire. "You agree to certain basic understandings. That's what makes a sports league different from other businesses."

The key to the NBA's authority, attorneys say, is Article 13(d) of the league's constitution. That section says that, whether Sterling intended to or not, an owner cannot "fail or refuse to fulfill" contractual obligations to the NBA "in such a way as to affect the Association or its members adversely."

There's plenty of evidence Sterling's comments, revealed in a recorded conversation with a female companion, affected the league

adversely. They provoked threats of a player boycott, led sponsors to withdraw support and created a racially charged image problem in the midst of the NBA playoffs that even President Barack Obama remarked upon.

If Article 13(d) was violated, the legal experts say the board of governors has solid grounds to force Sterling to sell the team along with any other owners, in this case his wife.

As long as the NBA meticulously follows its own constitution and rules regarding the Clippers sale, it will be difficult for Sterling to find a legal theory that would stand up in court, said Daniel Lazaroff, director of the Sports Law Institute at Loyola Law School in Los Angeles.

"This is not an antitrust issue. This is not a First Amendment issue," Lazaroff said. "It's a question limited to the interpretation of the NBA constitution and bylaws, and whether those terms are met."

Another question involves California family law. It's a community property state, meaning spouses

jointly own property they acquired while married. The Sterlings were already married when he bought the Clippers in 1981.

Although a potential divorce could complicate the Clippers' sale, McCann said the couple's joint ownership actually works to the NBA's favor because — legally speaking — they are a single entity. So if the NBA forced Donald Sterling to sell, even under a divorce scenario, Shelly Sterling would have to sell, too. They have been married since 1955.

"The NBA is well positioned to ultimately prevail," McCann said.

For his part, Donald Sterling has repeatedly said he does not want to sell the Clippers. In his recent interview with CNN's Anderson Cooper, he cast doubt on going to court if the NBA governors ultimately do vote to force him out.

"People want me to hire a wall of lawyers and them to have to hire a wall of lawyers and go to war," Sterling said on CNN. "I don't think that's the answer."

WNBA gets ready to tip off 18th season

Maya Moore and the Minnesota Lynx have put together quite a run over the past three seasons, winning two WNBA championships and reaching the finals the other year.

With a strong nucleus back, the Lynx could easily return to the finals although Minnesota will have to overcome some early injury problems to defend its title.

While the Lynx mostly stood pat this offseason, there were some major changes across the league, which will begin its 18th season on Friday night with five games.

A new collective bargaining agreement was signed this winter allowing teams to add a 12th player to their roster giving teams more depth. The Los Angeles

Sparks made major news with an ownership change that saw a group led by Magic Johnson take control of the team.

There was also a blockbuster trade as New York acquired Tina Charles from Connecticut, giving the Liberty another marquee player and sending the former MVP home.

The biggest key for the

Lynx to repeat will be how quickly the team can get healthy. Minnesota is already without three of its top six players as Devereaux Peters, Rebekkah Brunson and Monica Wright all have knee injuries. Brunson, who led the team in rebounding last season is expected to be sidelined for at least two months. Peters and Wright could be back sooner.

- (a) How many spades does North have?
- (b) How many clubs does North have?
- (c) Does North have a minimum, medium or maximum opening bid?
- (d) Is two spades a forcing bid?
- (e) What would you bid now?

Answers:

- (a) Five spades. He would not bid spades twice with only a four-card suit.
- (b) North has at least five clubs, and could have six or seven.
- (c) Medium. He would pass two clubs with a minimum opening bid and would have jump-shifted to two spades over one heart with a maximum opening bid.
- (d) No. Holding three spades and a relatively weak hand, it would be proper for you to pass two spades.
- (e) Four spades. North can probably make 10 or 11 tricks opposite your hand with spades as trump.

- (b) Probably three or four diamonds headed by the ace, but in any case, four diamonds is a cuebid that accepts hearts as trumps and shows interest in a slam.
- (c) Nine or ten.
- (d) You could go directly to six hearts, which is the recommended bid, or use Blackwood first, planning to bid six hearts if partner shows either one or two aces. Partner might have something like:
♠862 ♥KJ983 ♦A76 ♣Q3.

New charges filed against Hernandez

BOSTON (AP) — Former New England Patriots tight end Aaron Hernandez, already jailed in connection with a 2013 shooting death, looks forward to proving his innocence on charges that he ambushed and gunned down two men after a chance encounter inside a Boston nightclub a year earlier, his lawyers said.
Hernandez has been charged with two counts of first-degree murder and other offenses in the July 2012 killings of Daniel de Abreu and Saifiro Furtado. A third man was wounded in that attack.
An indictment Thursday places the gun in Hernandez's hands weeks before he signed a five-year, \$40 million contract with the Patriots and went on to catch 51 passes and score five touchdowns during the 2012 NFL season.
Hernandez, 24, has pleaded not guilty in the killing last year of Odin Lloyd, 27,

a semi-pro football player whose body was found in an industrial area near Hernandez's home in North Attleborough. He was released by the Patriots last summer after being arrested in Lloyd's death.
His attorneys, Charles Rankin and James Sultan, said their client was looking forward to his day in court on the latest charges. "It is one thing to make allegations at a press conference, and another thing to prove them in a courtroom," they said in a statement.
According to Suffolk District Attorney Daniel Conley, the night of the 2012 shootings unfolded when Hernandez and an associate went into the Cure Lounge at about the same time as the other men. The prosecutor would not describe what he called their "chance encounter," but said there was no evidence that Hernandez knew the victims beforehand.
