COAHOMA — Coahoma fifth graders scored above both regional and state averages in their math and reading STAAR assessments while eighth graders scored above average for the region and on par for the state for their reading tests.

"The greatest area of student growth came in the performance of the fifth graders on the math assessment," said Amy Jacobs, CISD Superintendent. "This year's fifth grade class scored 81 percent, a 26 precent increase over their met

South Korea's president pushes to disband coast guard, tackle corruption after ferry disaster

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — South Korea's president announced plans Monday to disband the coast guard and root out corruption and collusion between regulators and shipping companies that furious citizens believe led to a ferry disaster last month that left more than 300 people dead or miss-

President Park Geun-hye's first televised address to the nation since the April 16 sinking began with a deep bow and ended with her tearfully reading the names of passengers and crew who died trying With her approval ratings plummeting ahead

of mayoral and governor elections in about two weeks, the speech sought to acknowledge widespread anger over government failures as well as chart a path forward. Most of the victims were students from a single

high school near Seoul who were traveling to the southern tourist island of Jeju. "We failed to rescue students who we could have

saved," Park said. "The ultimate responsibility for not properly dealing with this incident is mine." Park has apologized before, but critics have called

for her to formally address the nation and respond to claims that incompetence, corruption and bad leadership doomed the ferry and those trapped inside it. In Monday's speech, Park decried the accumulation of "widespread abnormal practices" that she said triggered the sinking.

Serbian capital braces for flood surge that threatens Serbia's main power plant

BELGRADE, Serbia (AP) — Belgrade braced for a river water surge Monday that threatened to inundate Serbia's main power plant and cause major power cuts in the crisis-stricken country as the Balkans struggle with the consequences of the worst flooding in southeastern Europe in more than a century.

At least 17 people died in Serbia in the five days of flooding caused by unprecedented torrential rain, laving waste to entire towns and villages in the Balkans and sending tens of thousands of people out of their homes, authorities said. At least another

17 died in Bosnia, but the death toll is expected to rise as floodwaters recede in some locations, laying bare the full scale of the damage.

The coal-fired Nikola Tesla power plant supplies electricity for half of Serbia and most of Belgrade. It is located in Obrenovac, the worst flood-hit town near Belgrade where some 7,000 people have been evacuated from their homes, which were mostly completely submerged in water. Some 2,000 people are still believed trapped in higher floors of buildings, without power or phone lines.

Predrag Maric, a Serbian emergency official, said Monday that the situation in Obrenovac is still critical. He said that so far thousands of soldiers, policemen and volunteers have managed to "defend" the power plant from the surging Sava River waters by building high walls of sandbags.

Russian President Putin orders troops near Ukraine to return to their home bases

MOSCOW (AP) — Russian President Vladimir Putin has ordered troops deployed in regions near Ukraine to return to their home bases, the Kremlin said Monday.

The move appears to indicate Putin's intention to de-escalate the crisis over Ukraine, the worst in Russia's relations with the West since the end of the Cold War. The West has protested the deployment of 40,000

Russian troops near the border with Ukraine, seeing it as a possible preparation for grabbing more land after the annexation of Crimea in March. Putin has previously said he has ordered troops

to return from the area near the Ukraine border, but the United States and NATO have said they see no sign of a pullout and have threatened more sanctions if Russia tries to derail Ukraine's presidential vote set for Sunday. The Russian Defense Ministry insisted that there

were no buildup near the border, saying that the troops in the regions in western Russia are involved in regular training.

Al-Qaida-inspired group in Libya vows to fight rogue general whose troops attacked parliament TRIPOLI, Libya (AP) — An al-Qaida-inspired

group in Libya said Monday it will fight troops

loyal to a renegade general behind an attack on the country's parliament the day before and join forces with Islamic militias who were targeted by the general's secular followers.

The announcement by the influential Lions of Monotheism Group further adds to the quagmire in Libya, three years after the overthrow of dictator Moammar Gadhafi.

On Sunday, forces loyal to Gen. Khalifa Hifter, a

former rebel in the fight against Gadhafi, stormed the parliament in the Libyan capital, Tripoli, saying they were suspending the house in a struggle against Islamist lawmakers and officials whom they blame for allowing extremists to hold the The attack saw militia members backed by truck-

mounted anti-aircraft guns, mortars and rocket fire raid the parliament building in the heart of Tripoli, sending lawmakers fleeing for their lives as gunmen ransacked the legislature. The brazen assault — in which two people report-

edly died and more than 50 were wounded — was a significant challenge to the country's weak central government.

an elementary school around lunchtime Friday and asked her son, who also attends the school, to point out her daughter's alleged tormentor, the Sonoma County Sheriff's office

The mother grabbed the boy by the throat in front of a number of children, the statement said.

Bridge is a truly fascinating game, and here is a hand to prove it. The deal occurred in the French Open Pairs many years ago and was reported by Jean Besse in the British Bridge World magazine. A brief inspection of the four

hands shows that declarer has 12 easy tricks, since the trumps are divided 3-2. However, South went down one, and we can all lend a sympathetic ear to the tale of just how this unexpected result came about. Declarer won the club lead with the king and led a low trump to dummy's king, on which French star

George Theron dropped the queen! This remarkable play produced the desired effect. South was naturally afraid that East's queen was a singleton, which would make West's original spade holding J-9-7-2. If that were the case. South could not afford to play a spade to the ace next, since West's J-9 would then both become tricks, and the slam would go down.

So, to guard against this possibility, declarer crossed to the ten of diamonds and led a low trump toward dummy's ten. This would ensure only one trump loser if the situation was as South feared. Declarer didn't mind if it turned out that East originally had the Q-J alone, since that would be his only loser.

But West won the spade with the jack, stewed for a while and finally returned a club. Theron ruffed, and six spades went down one.

In the post-mortem that followed, Theron twitted his partner for taking so long to return a club. West replied that he was not sure Theron had another trump, whereupon Theron, with tongue in cheek, said that he had indicated three trumps by playing high-low!

Tomorrow: A small but significant clue.







Nation loses one of its winningest hoop coaches

(AP) — Don Meyer, one of the winningest coaches in college basketball who came back from a near-fatal car accident and liver cancer before closing out his career, died Sunday in South Dakota. He was 69.

Meyer led his teams into the playoffs 19 times and compiled a 923-324 during his 38-year career, most of which he spent at Lipscomb in Tennessee and Northern State in South Dakota. The former Northern

State coach died Sunday morning of cancer at his home in Aberdeen, where he had recently gone into hospice care, spokeswoman Brenda Drever said. "He won his greatest

victory and is now run-

ning again and gearing up to pitch nine innings,' the Meyer family said in a statement. "The family appreciates the outpouring of love, prayers and concern."

Four months after a near-fatal car accident and a cancer diagnosis, Meyer passed Bob Knight as the NCAA's winningest coach in men's basketball history in 2009. The native of Wayne, Nebraska, retired following the 2010 season at Northern State and a 13-14 record — only his fourth losing season. Some of the greatest

names in college basketball were his biggest fans, including Duke's Mike Krzyzewski, who surpassed Meyer's record in 2012 and once said Meyer did "a wonderful job of giving back to our great game." Former Tennessee women's coach Pat Summitt, who holds the all-time win record for college basketball, has called Meyer "truly one of the best teachers in the history of the game."

Jerry Meyer played for his dad at Lipscomb from 1989-1992, and credits his dad's success with a seamless, on-and off-court philosophy that lent itself to an exciting "He was a tough coach

to play for, very demanding physical and mentally. But that's what made him a great coach, and that's why all his players, he influenced their lives so much and produced so many coaches,' Jerry Meyer said.
