## 1 dead, 1 critical after Sunday shooting

*Police: Details sketchy about incident at Moss Lake pavilion*

One man is dead and another seriously wounded following a weekend shooting at Moss Creek Lake. Dylan Headrick, 17, was killed and Rudy Hernandez

III, 19, was critically wounded during the shooting, which occurred at one of the lake's west side pavilions around 8:50 p.m. Sunday. Sgt. Tony Everett, public information officer for the Big Spring Police Department, said both men were

transported by ambulance to Scenic Mountain Medical Center, where Headrick was pronounced dead from gunshot wounds to his chest. Hernandez, who was shot in the abdomen, was listed in critical condition. Everett said details of the

incident were sketchy. "As of this time, the motive for the shooting is unknown," he said. "Police have started interviewing numerous witnesses and looking for (other) witnesses who fled the scene prior to police arrival."

An autopsy of Headrick has been ordered and will be performed Tuesday in Lubbock, Everett added. *Contact Staff Writer Steve Reagan at 263-7331 ext. 234 or by e-mail at reporter@big-springherald.com*

## Wall run cyclists stop at memorial

Hundreds of motorcyclists rode into Big Spring Saturday and headed straight to the Vietnam Memorial, one stop on a long journey to arrive in Washington, D.C. by Memorial Day. Participates in the southern route of the Run for the Wall halted briefly to lay a wreath at the memorial and visit with a small group of resi-

dents who welcomed the riders before heading back out on the road. They also added one more to their group. Local resident Jerry Groves joined the riders on their trip. "It's my first time, and I am looking forward to it," Groves, a Vietnam era veteran, said. "A lot of these people have been here many times before, and I know a lot of them. I was the coordinator

for the Run for the Wall stop here for the past ten years, now retired. It's time for me to go." Groves suspects the experience will be an emotional one. "Last time I was in Washington DC (1973), it was not there," he said. Groves is a long-time member of the Big Spring Vietnam Memorial committee and has helped build, maintain and

add on to the spot throughout the years. On his first ride through the Southern route, Robert DeLuna of California said he was impressed by the Big Spring memorial. "We have some great stops here," DeLuna said. "This is just amazing. This is the first time I've seen it." DeLuna, a U.S. Army vet-

# News in brief

## South Korea's president pushes to disband coast guard, tackle corruption after ferry disaster

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — South Korea's president announced plans Monday to disband the coast guard and root out corruption and collusion between regulators and shipping companies that furious citizens believe led to a ferry disaster last month that left more than 300 people dead or missing.

President Park Geun-hye's first televised address to the nation since the April 16 sinking began with a deep bow and ended with her tearfully reading the names of passengers and crew who died trying to save others.

With her approval ratings plummeting ahead of mayoral and governor elections in about two weeks, the speech sought to acknowledge widespread anger over government failures as well as chart a path forward.

Most of the victims were students from a single high school near Seoul who were traveling to the southern tourist island of Jeju.

"We failed to rescue students who we could have saved," Park said. "The ultimate responsibility for not properly dealing with this incident is mine."

Park has apologized before, but critics have called for her to formally address the nation and respond to claims that incompetence, corruption and bad leadership doomed the ferry and those trapped inside it. In Monday's speech, Park decried the accumulation of "widespread abnormal practices" that she said triggered the sinking.

## Serbian capital braces for flood surge that threatens Serbia's main power plant

BELGRADE, Serbia (AP) — Belgrade braced for a river water surge Monday that threatened to inundate Serbia's main power plant and cause major power cuts in the crisis-stricken country as the Balkans struggle with the consequences of the worst flooding in southeastern Europe in more than a century.

At least 17 people died in Serbia in the five days of flooding caused by unprecedented torrential rain, laying waste to entire towns and villages in the Balkans and sending tens of thousands of people out of their homes, authorities said. At least another

17 died in Bosnia, but the death toll is expected to rise as floodwaters recede in some locations, laying bare the full scale of the damage.

The coal-fired Nikola Tesla power plant supplies electricity for half of Serbia and most of Belgrade. It is located in Obrenovac, the worst flood-hit town near Belgrade where some 7,000 people have been evacuated from their homes, which were mostly completely submerged in water. Some 2,000 people are still believed trapped in higher floors of buildings, without power or phone lines.

Predrag Maric, a Serbian emergency official, said Monday that the situation in Obrenovac is still critical. He said that so far thousands of soldiers, policemen and volunteers have managed to "defend" the power plant from the surging Sava River waters by building high walls of sandbags.

## Russian President Putin orders troops near Ukraine to return to their home bases

MOSCOW (AP) — Russian President Vladimir Putin has ordered troops deployed in regions near Ukraine to return to their home bases, the Kremlin said Monday.

The move appears to indicate Putin's intention to de-escalate the crisis over Ukraine, the worst in Russia's relations with the West since the end of the Cold War.

The West has protested the deployment of 40,000 Russian troops near the border with Ukraine, seeing it as a possible preparation for grabbing more land after the annexation of Crimea in March.

Putin has previously said he has ordered troops to return from the area near the Ukraine border, but the United States and NATO have said they see no sign of a pullout and have threatened more sanctions if Russia tries to derail Ukraine's presidential vote set for Sunday.

The Russian Defense Ministry insisted that there were no buildup near the border, saying that the troops in the regions in western Russia are involved in regular training.

## Al-Qaida-inspired group in Libya vows to fight rogue general whose troops attacked parliament

TRIPOLI, Libya (AP) — An al-Qaida-inspired group in Libya said Monday it will fight troops

loyal to a renegade general behind an attack on the country's parliament the day before and join forces with Islamic militias who were targeted by the general's secular followers.

The announcement by the influential Lions of Monotheism Group further adds to the quagmire in Libya, three years after the overthrow of dictator Moammar Gadhafi.

On Sunday, forces loyal to Gen. Khalifa Hifter, a former rebel in the fight against Gadhafi, stormed the parliament in the Libyan capital, Tripoli, saying they were suspending the house in a struggle against Islamist lawmakers and officials whom they blame for allowing extremists to hold the country ransom.

The attack saw militia members backed by truck-mounted anti-aircraft guns, mortars and rocket fire raid the parliament building in the heart of Tripoli, sending lawmakers fleeing for their lives as gunmen ransacked the legislature.

The brazen assault — in which two people reportedly died and more than 50 were wounded — was a significant challenge to the country's weak central government.

## Northern California mom accused of grabbing boy, 12, by the throat for bullying her daughter

SANTA ROSA, Calif. (AP) — A Northern California woman is facing charges that she grabbed a 12-year-old boy by the throat while confronting him about bullying her daughter, authorities said Sunday.

Delia Garcia-Bratcher, 30, of Santa Rosa came to an elementary school around lunchtime Friday and asked her son, who also attends the school, to point out her daughter's alleged tormentor, the Sonoma County Sheriff's office said in a statement.

The mother grabbed the boy by the throat in front of a number of children, the statement said.

No adult saw the confrontation, and Garcia-Bratcher apparently had not checked in with the school office before coming on campus.

standard percentage on the fourth grade math assessment in 2013. The fifth graders scored 82 percent in reading.

"Our scores on the first round of assessments are a result of the hard work of our students and teachers. The targeted instruction delivered by our teachers paired with the instructional leadership of our campus administrators led to improved student performance," Jacobs said.

Coahoma ISD eighth graders had an 82 percent passing rate on the STAAR reading assessment. Due to the large

percentage of eighth graders who tested in Algebra I, only partial eighth grade math scores have been received, Jacobs said. Scores for the Algebra I assessment are scheduled to be received in the upcoming weeks.

The fifth and eighth grade students who did not meet standard on the first round of assessments retook the STAAR assessments last week.

"Although we have been very pleased with our results in the early rounds of assessments, especially in individual student growth, we want to continue to ad-

dress the instructional areas in need in order to continue to improve as a district," added Jacobs.

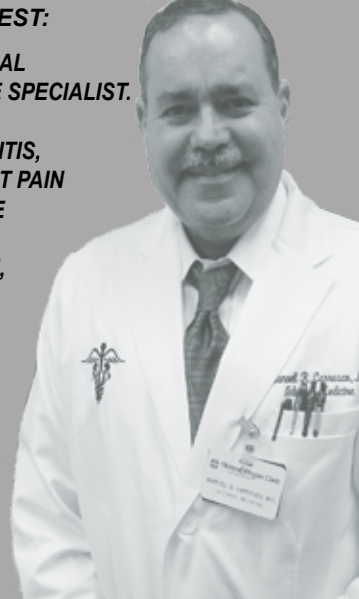

The Pacers limited the Heat to just four offensive rebounds and 6-of-23 shooting from beyond the arc. LeBron James went 1 of 5 on 3s and shot just two free throws, and Miami fell so far behind so fast, it never even had a chance to tie the score.

Sure, opening this best-of-seven series at Bankers Life Fieldhouse helped. The hometown crowd that sometimes serenaded the Pacers with boos during the first two rounds spent most of the first half on its feet, chanted "Defense" every time it looked as if the Heat might come back and finished the game with its customary chant of "Beat The Heat!"

But the biggest difference was on the court.

Indiana shared the ball, limited its turnovers, maintained its poise and got contributions from everyone in a game it had to win.

Roy Hibbert finished with 19 points and nine rebounds, Lance Stephenson had 17 points and eight assists, and George Hill added 15 points as the Pacers looked more like the team that was so dominant over the first half of the season, rather than the one struggled so mightily in the second half. The challengers in this matchup insist they know it's only a start.

this unexpected result came about. **Declarer won the club lead** with the king and led a low trump to dummy's king, on which French star George Theron dropped the queen! **This remarkable play** produced the desired effect. South was naturally afraid that East's queen was a singleton, which would make West's original spade holding J-9-7-2. If that were the case, South could not afford to play a spade to the ace next, since West's J-9 would then both become tricks, and the slam would go down. **So, to guard against this possibility**, declarer crossed to the ten of diamonds and led a low trump toward dummy's ten. This would ensure only one trump loser if the situation was as South feared. Declarer didn't mind if it turned out that East originally had the Q-J alone, since that would be his only loser. **But West won the spade** with the jack, stewed for a while and finally returned a club. Theron ruffed, and six spades went down one. **In the post-mortem** that followed, Theron twitted his partner for taking so long to return a club. West replied that he was not sure Theron had another trump, whereupon Theron, with tongue in cheek, said that he had indicated three trumps by playing high-low!

Opening lead — jack of clubs. **Bridge is a truly fascinating game**, and here is a hand to prove it. The deal occurred in the French Open Pairs many years ago and was reported by Jean Besse in the British Bridge World magazine.

**A brief inspection** of the four hands shows that declarer has 12 easy tricks, since the trumps are divided 3-2. However, South went down one, and we can all lend a sympathetic ear to the tale of just how

**Dear Annie:** I am in my second marriage. My two adult children were pre-teens when I married "Lenny" 15 years ago. The problem is, Lenny has a bad temper and little patience. He flies off the handle and gets upset easily. It makes life difficult. He doesn't frighten me, and I can easily tell him to stop when these episodes begin, but they upset the whole family.

Now that my kids are grown, they have told me that they always resented my "putting them in this position" by marrying Lenny. They are respectful to him, but have no interest in sitting down and having a conversation with him. When the kids are in the house, I often run around trying to keep everyone calm. It makes me nervous. Lenny tried counseling, but not for very long. He said it wasn't helping.

How do I keep a relationship with my kids? I don't want to be divorced a second time. While I am sure that Lenny would never harm me, I'm not certain how he would react if I asked him to leave. He does have some good qualities, but it's hard to remember them when he has these outbursts. Please help me keep my

kids in my life. What can I do? -- *Helpless*

**Dear Helpless:** You can call the Domestic Violence Hotline (thehotline.org) at 1-800-799-SAFE and ask about protected ways to leave your environment. You also can ask for help in discussing ways to get Lenny to return for counseling in anger management. If you decide to stay with Lenny, you can arrange to see your children outside of your home, having a relationship that doesn't include Lenny. Do not push them to be with him.

**Dear Annie:** "Nude Bodies Are OK" says nude art is not porn, but you cannot always control what happens when viewing nudity. I have counseled people who were addicted to pornography, and it robs men of their confidence and self-respect. Some people become addicted after a single viewing. I have seen couples divorce and children separated from parents because one of them couldn't stop using porn.

Suggesting that porn is OK for any length of time and in any form encourages people to try doing what their own good sense warns them is dangerous. Women should not be encouraged to think that a husband who uses porn is "safe" from affairs and that it will somehow strengthen the marriage in the bedroom. This is ludicrous. ## This Date In History

Today is Monday, May 19, the 139th day of 2014. There are 226 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On May 19, 1864, American author Nathaniel Hawthorne, 59, died in Plymouth, New Hampshire. On this date: In 1536, Anne Boleyn, the second wife of England's King Henry VIII, was beheaded after being convicted of adultery. In 1780, a mysterious darkness enveloped much of New England and part of Canada in

the early afternoon. In 1913, California Gov. Hiram Johnson signed the Webb-Hartley Law prohibiting "aliens ineligible to citizenship" from owning farm land, a measure targeting Asian immigrants, particularly Japanese. In 1921, Congress passed, and President Warren G. Harding signed, the Emergency Quota Act, which established national quotas for immigrants. In 1935, T.E. Lawrence, also known as "Lawrence of Arabia," died in Dorset, England, six days after being injured in a motorcycle crash. In 1943, in his second wartime address to the U.S. Congress, British Prime Minister Winston Churchill pledged his country's full support in the fight against Japan. That same day, top U.S. and British officials meeting in Washington reached agreement on May 1, 1944 as the date for the D-Day invasion of France (the operation ended up being launched more than a month later).

Nation loses one of its winningest hoop coaches

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) — Don Meyer, one of the winningest coaches in college basketball who came back from a near-fatal car accident and liver cancer before closing out his career, died Sunday in South Dakota. He was 69.

Meyer led his teams into the playoffs 19 times and compiled a 923-324 during his 38-year career, most of which he spent at Lipscomb in Tennessee and Northern State in South Dakota.

The former Northern State coach died Sunday morning of cancer at his home in Aberdeen, where he had recently gone into hospice care, family spokeswoman Brenda Dreyer said.

“He won his greatest victory and is now run-

ning again and gearing up to pitch nine innings,” the Meyer family said in a statement. “The family appreciates the outpouring of love, prayers and concern.”

Four months after a near-fatal car accident and a cancer diagnosis, Meyer passed Bob Knight as the NCAA’s winningest coach in men’s basketball history in 2009. The native of Wayne, Nebraska, retired following the 2010 season at Northern State and a 13-14 record — only his fourth losing season.

Some of the greatest names in college basketball were his biggest fans, including Duke’s Mike Krzyzewski, who surpassed Meyer’s record in 2012 and once said Meyer did “a won-

derful job of giving back to our great game.” Former Tennessee women’s coach Pat Summitt, who holds the all-time win record for college basketball, has called Meyer “truly one of the best teachers in the history of the game.”

Jerry Meyer played for his dad at Lipscomb from 1989-1992, and credits his dad’s success with a seamless, on-and-off-court philosophy that lent itself to an exciting game.

“He was a tough coach to play for, very demanding physical and mentally. But that’s what made him a great coach, and that’s why all his players, he influenced their lives so much and produced so many coaches,” Jerry Meyer said.

CHICAGO (AP) — Magic Johnson joked about his involvement in the controversy surrounding Los Angeles Clippers owner Donald Sterling on Sunday while delivering the keynote address at the National Restaurant Association Show.

Johnson’s remarks focused on his restaurant and food services businesses, but he did briefly mention the Sterling situation at the start of his 50-minute talk.

“These last two weeks, I don’t know,” he said. “I thought I should go back to the food service

industry because these last two weeks have been unbelievable.

“But I’m glad to be here and even with that said, I still have a big smile on my face.”

Johnson, the NBA Hall of Famer turned entrepreneur, was thrust into the news because part of Sterling’s racist rant on the audio released by TMZ last month focused on him. Sterling complained that his female friend, V. Stiviano, had posed for a picture with Johnson and posted it on Instagram.

Within days of the tape

being released, NBA Commissioner Adam Silver announced that Sterling was banned from the league for life and he was fined \$2.5 million. Silver also announced he would ask the other NBA owners to force Sterling to sell.

Sterling made no public comments for a week before agreeing to do a lengthy sit-down interview with CNN. He apologized during the interview, but then veered into an attack of Johnson, saying he wasn’t a good role model for children.

Canada beats Sweden in OT at ice hockey worlds
