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Murder suspect surrenders

A suspect in Sunday's shooting that left one man dead and another seriously wounded has surrendered to authorities.

Nicholes Hernandez Limon, aka Nick Hernandez, 25, of Big Spring, turned himself into the Dawson County Jail in Lamesa shortly after 7 p.m. Monday, said Sgt. Tony Everett, Big Spring Police Department public information officer.

Limon is charged with murder in connection with the

shootingdeath of Dylan Headrick, 17, of Big Spring, which occurred Sunday evening at Moss Lake. Headrick was killed and Rudy Hernandez II, 19, was

seriously injured in the shooting, which occurred at one of the lake's west side pavilions at about 8:50 p.m.

Big Spring ISD changes commencement policy

Big Spring High School seniors who have completed required coursework will be able to walk the stage at

new graduation policy during a special meeting Monday evening.

The issue over whether to allow seniors to participate in commencement if they hadn't passed state exit exams has been a touchy subject for the past several years. Several times, students and parents have petitioned the school board to allow such partici-

pation, but trustees resisted in the past, saying it was unfair to the students who had passed state requirements.

BSISD trustees agree to build five residences

Big Spring Independent School District is getting into the landlord business.

During a special meeting Monday, BSISD trustees approved the purchase of five duplex-style modular homes for teachers having a hard time finding affordable housing.

The homes will cost the district \$71,750 apiece and should be installed by late June, officials said. Just who will live in them and how much rent they'll pay has yet to be determined.

"We're working with that," our attorneys on Superintendent Chris Wigington said. "Who gets to live there, how much rent we'll charge, if they'll have to sign a contract or lease to live there are things we're still working out."

The homes will be located across from the BSISD softball complex on Eighth Street, a location that was formerly the site for a nursing home. The homes will be split into duplexes, each offering about 780 square feet of living



Both victims were transported via ambulance to the hospital, where Headrick was declared dead from gunshot wounds to the chest. Hernandez, who was wounded in the abdomen, is listed in serious but stable condition.

After talking to "numerous" witnesses, police applied for and received an arrest warrant Monday charging Limon for murder, Everett said.

Within a few hours,

Limon surrendered to authorities. "Limon will be ar-

raigned in Dawson County and arrangements will be made to return him to Big Spring," Everett said. "At this time he is charged with murder and more charges are expected to follow."

An autopsy of Headrick's body is expected to be conducted today in Lubbock.

Bird Poop: An unfortunate encounter

f you had to wait in line to renew your driver's license, at least you had an interesting view. Traffic on Interstate 20 varied. Frequenting the pine trees and lush turf just

outside the front windows of the De partment of Public Safety building, different avian pop ulations

appeared

through-

out the

year. After gaining the right to continue driving on state roads, and exiting the building, you could hear the chatter and tunes of numerous songbirds hidden within the trees' dense needles. Often in May, great-tailed grackles adorned the very tops.

With the ritual complete, we'd drive back into Big Spring. No longer in our thoughts would be that haven for feathered friends.

Late one morning, however, the DPS contacted us again. Excited, an employee had just witnessed a free-for-all between a roadrunner and "some other kind of bird."

"It's hurt," she continued. "It's on the grass underneath one of the trees."

Not knowing the victor from the vanquished, I asked, "Which one?" "The other one," she replied. From the parking lot, we could see a slender. long-tailed bird lying in the shade. Obviously,

the roadrunner had won that donnybrook.

Muffled by the deep grass, our approach was unheard. Only after we placed a net over the yellow-billed cuckoo did it respond. Even with one eye swollen shut and feathers missing from its right wing, its struggle against my hand was intense. After placing the bird

inside a deep, cardboard container, we drove home

During the '80s and '90s, yellow-billed cuckoos shared their guttural songs as a summertime announcement of impending showers. Having aptly been dubbed "rain crows," they did not hesitate to utter the sounds that echoed throughout neighborhoods.

To us, the songs meant a possible infestation of "webworms" might have begun. This seasonal specie often feasted on an outbreak of tent caterpillars that wrapped mulberry trees in decorative webs. A white moth flittering and frequenting an area was a positive sign of the destruction to come.

As we greeted a new century, the decline in the cuckoos' visits coin cided with the absence of the moth that had brought the temporary defoliation of so many trees. Extremely water dependent, and with a life span of only about 25 years, many mulberries had been planted, not for their fruit, but for their ability to provide quick shade for parched lawns. Slowly, they were dying. For a cuckoo to be on the western outskirts of

town instead of the old growth trees of neighborhoods was puzzling. The roadrunner, however, could be expected to frequent the DPS and surrounding natural terrain.

Hunting for lizards, small snakes, scorpions, tarantulas, mice and rats, the chaparral was also known to grab and eat small birds, such as sparrows. Spending most of its time on the ground, the predator was exemplary in running, leaping, and stalking.

My imagination raced as I thought of the roadrunner and the prominent streaking on its back and breast. Its tail would be almost as long as its body. Handsome with its crested

head, and the pale blue, orange-red bare skin back of its eyes, the bird was the embodiment of stealth and cunning.

That the two species had met was unfortunate. About two feet in length, the paisano was nearly twice the length of the cuckoo. No more than three ounces, the insectivore was outweighed four fold.

With the punishment received on the back of my hand and lower arm from the reluctant cuckoo came the realization that it had fought with ferocity for survival. Bedraggled now, with broken feathers and a small cut above its eye, it lay asleep on its side at the bottom of our box.

As towels cradled its tired body, the coloration of its back was a familiar grayish-brown. When Art turned on another light, it showed tinges of olive.

Below, it was a creamy white. Its long tail, with white spots on the underside, was as distinctive as its rust or bronze primaries that we would see when extending its wings for any possible injury.

Its beak, from which part of its name is derived, curved downward, with the lower mandible a deep yellow. Its upper beak had a partial coloring of yellow as well.

Even though its recovery was lengthy, the vellow-billed cuckoo was able to recover

from the stress and trauma of an unwelcome encounter. It was released before its migration to the south for winter

With a growing lack of rainfall, and the death of many trees other than mulberries, we are grateful to have experienced the rain crows of the past. Even though it is adapted to arid terrain and a year-round resident, the roadrunner learned through its confrontation with a seldom-seen specie that the interloper could be quite a brawler.

Even though her titles were honorary Ms. Raye began wearing a uniform with the rank displayed on it and

caring for the wounded servicemen both in surgical units and wards throughout her history with the USO and that she would often "pull rank" pointing out the oak leaf or bird emblem on her collar.

One story tells of an account where as an Army colonel she allegedly pulled rank on an Air Force captain and treated the wounded onboard the aircraft while she was en route to a military base for a USO show.

It also tells that when she died she was buried at Fort Bragg and the only woman in the special forces part of the cemetery.

It is interesting that years later, after the end of the conflict, Ms. Raye was actually awarded many of the ribbons that she once displayed, along with awards and commendations from the military in appreciation for her

In 1993, President Bill Clinton awarded her with the Presidential Medal of Freedom and made the following quote:







NBA starts process to strip team from Sterling

The NBA began the formal process of seizing the Los Angeles Clippers from Donald Sterling on Monday, notifying the league's longest-tenured owner of the specific charges against him in a document that claims his racist comments damaged its relationship with players, sponsors and fans.

In a release titled "Summary of Sterling Termination Charge" posted online on Monday night, the NBA also said Sterling lied to the league during its investigation into his comments and destroyed evidence it was seeking in the

probe.

Sterling has a chance to respond and the right to a hearing before the other owners vote on June 3 on whether to strip him of his team — technically, terminating his membership in the NBA. He would still have the rights to the proceeds when the team is sold.

Sterling's lawyer declined comment Monday. A lawyer for his estranged wife, Shelly Sterling, said she will fight to retain her 50 percent ownership of the team.

The summary issued by the league included two sections — one listing the charges against Sterling, and the oth- ers and Clippers employees, er detailing the provisions of the NBA constitution he is accused of violating.

"Termination of LAC's entire membership - including Mrs. Sterling's interest in the team - is called for by the Constitution and related agreements," the summary concludes, "and is the only viable means for bringing Mr. Sterling's interest in the Clippers to an end."

Among the league's claims: -Sterling's discriminatory actions and positions have harmed the NBA and its teams, other owners, playand damaged its relationships with its fans, business partners and community leaders.

-Sterling disparaged blacks and other minorities in a way that will "significantly undermine and call into question the NBA's commitment to diversity and inclusion."

-Sterling destroyed evidence, lied to and misled the NBA investigator.

-Refused to pay the \$2.5 million fine imposed on him by Commissioner Adam Silver on April 29.

To support its case, the league said Sterling's actions

violated his duty to the other owners in four distinct ways three articles of the NBA constitution and a New York state law:

 Article 13(d) of the league constitution allows the league to seize a team if an owner "fails or refuses to fulfill its contractual obligations ... in such a way as to affect the Association or its Members adversely." Sterling, the league said, failed "to use best efforts to see to it that the sport of professional basketball is conducted according to the highest moral and ethical standards.'

Duncan helps Spurs rout OKC, 122-105

SAN ANTONIO (AP) – The San Antonio Spurs were not going to believe Serge Ibaka was really injured until the Oklahoma City Thunder took the court in the opener of the Western Conference finals without their athletic big man.

Their skepticism was unwarranted.

Ibaka is indeed injured and Oklahoma City needs to find a way to replace his defensive presence against San Antonio.

Tim Duncan had 27 points and the Spurs took advantage of Ibaka's absence to score more than half their points in the paint, beating the Thunder 122-105 Monday night in the opener of the best-of-seven series.



"We play team defense, we don't just rely on Serge," Durant said. "He does a great job of blocking shots, but it's all because of our team defense. He's a big part of what we do. Collison started in place of Ibaka and was 0 for 3 from the field with three rebounds and one blocked shot.

Ibaka was averaging 12.2 points, 7.3 rebounds and 2.23 blocks in 33.9

Parker scored all but two of his points in the first half.

Manu Ginobili took over in the second half, scoring all 18 of his points with a series of breakneck drives and 3-for-4 shooting on 3-pointers.

After starting Collison and bringing in 7-foot post Steven Adams to spell him and Perkins, Oklahoma City continually altered its lineup in an attempt to derail San Antonio's attack. At one point the Thunder had Westbrook and fellow point guards Reggie Jackson and Derek Fisher on the court.

In most cases, you don't have to be a genius to decipher the message; the cards usually speak for themselves, and all you have to do is to understand what they say It did not take South long to go wrong on this deal. He won East's nine of spades with the queen and led a low diamond to dummy's ace. East showed out, and there was now no way to make the contract. South con-

tinued diamonds, but West took his queen and led another spade, and declarer eventually went down one, losing a diamond, three spades and a heart.

Had declarer instead played the king of diamonds at trick two, he would have made five notrump! The question is whether South should have known that leading the king of diamonds was a better play than leading a diamond to the ace.

The answer is yes. The telling card was West's lead of the deuce of spades, presumably his fourth-best spade. There were two clues South could have latched onto to read the message contained in that lead. One was that since West apparently had four spades, East had to have five. It followed that if the diamonds were divided 3-0, West was more likely to have all three of them than East

The other clue rests on the pre-

sumption that West would have led

from a five-card suit if he had one.

Once West is credited with nothing

longer than a four-card suit, it fol-

lows that he cannot be void of dia-

monds. Therefore, playing the king of diamonds at trick two is a much





CORVALLIS. Ore. (AP) — Wayne Tinkle, who coached the past eight seasons at Montana, was hired as Oregon State's new head coach Monday night.

Tinkle took the Grizzlies to the NCAA tournament three times in his tenure with the team. Montana finished below .500 only once during that span.

The 48-year-old replaces Craig Robinson, brother-in-law of President Barack Obama, after he was fired earlier this month following six seasons with the Beavers where he failed to make the NCAA tournament. The once-proud Beavers have not been to the NCAA tournament since 1990.

Tinkle went 158-91 with the Grizzlies, compiling the second-most victories in school history. The only slight on his resume at Montana was an inability to get an NCAA tournament

Grizzlies have not had since beating Nevada in the first round in 2006. The Beavers are expected to introduce Tinkle at a news conference

Wednesday. Montana has a history of producing successful coaches, including Jud Heathcote, Mike Montgomery and Larry Krystkowiak. Heathcote went from Montana to Michigan State; Montgomery went to Stanford; and Krystkowiak left Montana for the NBA before ending up at Utah and starting to turnaround the Utes program last season.

Tinkle was an assistant under Krystkowiak and often draws comparisons to him.

Robinson was unexpectedly fired May 5, a little more than a month De Carolis announced that Michelle Obama's older brother would return for a seventh season as basketball coach.
