to the pool is free for one day only, said Johnny Womack, city public works director.

"We want everyone to have an opportunity to have fun, so be patient with us," Womack said. "We can only let in about 600 people at that time, so when we are at capacity we will have

to shut the doors. Then about two hours later, we will ask everyone in the pool to leave, so we can let in the next group of people."

## VMC hosting vet ceremony Monday morning

The Vietnam Memorial Committee will hold a brief ceremony on Memorial Day to honor all U.S. veterans who have given their lives in the service of their country.

"This is one day out of the whole year that is to honor those who have given all for us, for our freedom, for our county in the past 200 years, and we asked to take just a moment to honor and remember those heroes who gave the ultimate sacrifice," said Don Boling, a member of the memorial committee and U.S. Marine veteran.

The service will begin sharply at 11 a.m. Monday at the Big Spring Vietnam Memorial site, located behind the SouthWest Colligate Institute for the Deaf campus.

"There is very little sitting room, just some benches around the memorial, so the

public may want to bring in some folding lawn chairs for sitting," Boling said.

Keynote speaker will be Kenneth Carson, a Vietnam veteran. Randy Cotton, pastor of Trinity Baptist Church, will give the opening invocation and Dean Thomas, retired chaplain for the VAMC, will provide the closing prayer.

Boiling added the Crossroads Young Marines hope to participate by posting the colors. Their participation is tentative since the youths will have to be excused from classes. Big Spring and Coahoma schools will be in session that day to make up for a bad weather day.

"We hope the public will show up to honor those who have given their lives for their county," Boling said.

A Memorial Day observance will also be held at Trinity Memorial Park at 2 p.m. Monday.

# This Memorial Day, be sure and watch your kids around water

Last year, 82 children drowned in Texas and most between Memorial Day and Labor Day — when water activities peak.

That's why the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services (DFPS) is urging all adults to "watch kids around water" this Memorial Day weekend and all summer long.

"We can all make a difference just by being aware of what's happening around us," said DFPS Commissioner John Specia. "Be on

the lookout for children when they're around water. Don't let them out of your sight. It only takes minutes for a child to drown and the younger the child, the greater the danger."

Fifteen kids have drowned in Texas this year — more than half were five years old or younger and all but three were under the age of 10. Four children drowned in bath tubs (27 percent), four in pools (27 percent), and two in ponds (13 percent). Other locations include a river, a lake, a creek, and a septic tank.

Children under the age of one most often drown inside the house. Older children most often drown outdoors. Outdoors, children most often drown in pools, especially backyard and apartment pools.

Most young children who drown in pools were out of sight less than five minutes and were in the care of one or both parents at the time. Indoors, the bathtub is the most dangerous location.

## Basic Water Safety Tips

Inside the house

- Never leave small children alone near any container of water.

- Keep bathroom doors closed and secure toilet lids with lid locks.

- Never leave a baby alone in a bath for any reason. Get the things you need before running water, and take the child with you if you must leave the room.

- Warn babysitters or caregivers about the dangers of water and stress the need to constantly supervise young

children.

- Make sure small children cannot leave the house through pet doors or unlocked doors and reach pools or hot tubs.

Outside the house

- Never leave children alone around water whether it's in a pool, wading pool, drainage ditch, creek, pond, or lake.

- Constantly watch children who are swimming or playing in water. They need an adult or certified life-guard watching and within reach.

- Secure access to

swimming pools with fences, self-closing and latching gates, and water surface alarms.

- Completely remove the pool cover when the pool is in use.

- Store water toys away from the water, when not in use, so they don't attract a small child.

- Don't assume young children will use good judgment around water.

- Be ready for emergencies. Keep emergency telephone numbers handy and learn CPR.

- Find out if your child's friends or neighbors have pools.

- Denim or cut-off shorts are not allowed in the water.

- Children ages 3 and

younger must wear swim diapers at all times when in the water.

- Please help us ensure a safe and fun environment.

- Leave all tobacco products and lighters outside the Aquatic Center.

- Abusive or profane behavior or language will not be tolerated.

- No running, fighting or rough play.

- Glass or metal containers, illegal or unlicensed weapons, alcohol and illegal controlled substances are strictly prohibited.

- No pets other than

official service animals are allowed inside the Aquatic Center.

- Please do not talk to the lifeguards while on duty (except to report an emergency).

- Please leave the Aquatic Center and parking area in a timely manner — no loitering.

- Lifeguards and Aquatic Center staff may require swim tests at their discretion.

- Stay off all ropes and guard stands.

- Guests must obey all rules and follow the

directions of lifeguards and Aquatic Center staff.

- Aquatic Center staff or lifeguards may eject and/or deny future entrance to any person for violation of these rules or for any act or threatened act they deem hazardous to the health and safety of any person, potentially harmful to property or detrimental to good order.

# Taking the pledge in Westwood

In New Hampshire, the “pledge” used to be a promise not to raise taxes if you were elected president, the “read my lips” formula that helped get George H.W. Bush elected (and perhaps defeated). In Westwood, the “pledge” these days is the promise not to go to Israel on a trip sponsored by the American Israel Public Affairs Committee, the Anti-Defamation League or Hasbara Fellowships.

The winning candidate to head the UCLA student council took the pledge, beating the second-finisher, who refused to do so, by 30 votes. The winner isn't talking to the press. The runner-up is talking intolerance big-time.

The various pooh-bahs in the UC system, namely Chancellor Gene Block and President Janet Napolitano, which is to say two of the biggest pooh-bahs there are in this jewel of the public Ivies, are talking about how what the students did, as Block put it, by “delegitimizing educational trips offered by some organizations but not others ... can reasonably be seen as trying to eliminate selected viewpoints from the discussion.” Napolitano agreed, saying that “principles of civility, respect and inclusion” were

violated by these students.

Gabriel Levine, the pledge's Jewish author, doesn't buy that any more than the Manchester Union Leader used to buy a weasel's way out on taxes. He says he wasn't trying to intimidate anyone. “An election is a chance to pin people down and find out what they believe.”

It is. It's why candidates sometimes run, with reason and support, knowing they will lose. It's why every group on the planet sends out questionnaires and tries to sponsor a debate in the hopes of cementing their issue on the short list with the “family farm” and no taxes.

Ask me to explain agricultural politics in one word, and it will be Iowa, as in the first-in-the-nation Iowa caucus. Do all kinds of groups use elections as leverage, as an opportunity to pressure would-be leaders to take a stand? Absolutely.

My issue isn't with Levine. It's with the other kids on campus, who either agreed with him or didn't care enough to vote on the issue or vote at all. And it's with the administration, which apparently didn't even notice when all of this was happening, after a contentious debate about divesting from Israel (what organizing principle would put Israel No. 1 on a list of one) led to questions about students feeling conflicted about having traveled on trips subsidized by “Islamophobic” groups, and only

started commenting last week, which sounds suspiciously like the time when you'd have parents flooding the campus.

This is not a place where Israel should have found itself on the losing side of a foolish electoral mandate. This is Westwood. This is the Westside of Los Angeles. It doesn't get any more liberal, any more Democratic, any better educated, any richer or more Jewish than right here on the Westside of Los Angeles. There are more prominent Jews who attended UCLA or taught at UCLA or helped build UCLA... Well, I needn't go on. Asking about buildings at UCLA named after Jews is a joke line. And that makes it far worse.

It takes a kind of apathy you hate to acknowledge and a level of underlying antipathy no one wants to acknowledge for a blatantly anti-Israel pledge to carry the day in an open election with no one paying attention in the middle of one of the richest, most educated, most liberal and most Jewish congressional districts in the country. The Museum of Tolerance is down the block.

And all of this could happen in Westwood. Actually, it just did.

# Peace with Colombian drug rebels? Keep dreaming

When Colombians go to the polls to vote in a presidential election Sunday, they will be going through *deja vu*.

After 50 years, you would think they would have moved on to different issues. But nah, Colombians have no such luck. They will again be voting on whether to make peace or war with the leftist, drug-trafficking rebels, who have caused them so much pain for a half-century.

From a handful of candidates, two already are projected by the polls to face each other again in a mid-June runoff: President Juan Manuel Santos, who wants Colombians to keep waiting for a never-ending peace process, and Oscar Ivan Zuluaga, a former finance minister who speaks for Colombians who are tired of waiting and have come to the sad realization that the rebels have no intention of giving up their weapons after 50 years of war.

After all, these so-called Marxist rebels are not ideological dingbats — a la Che Guevara — stupidly believing they are liberating people who don't want to be liberated. These are major league cocaine dealers who don't want to give up a very lucrative business.

You may be able to negotiate with political opponents on ideological grounds by listening to their concerns and even implementing some of their demands. But how do you cut a peace deal with a band of criminals wearing Guevara masks?

Nevertheless, Santos seems to be basing his entire second-term re-election campaign on the need to continue his peace negotiations with the rebels,

while Zuluaga seems ready to dump the negotiations and return to the hard-line policies of former President Alvaro Uribe.

Uribe is still popular and widely credited for saving Colombia from complete chaos — with Santos as his former hard-line defense minister — but Santos, who replaced Uribe in 2010, turned out to be a much weaker president than his predecessor and mentor. In an egotistical quest to be the one who brings peace to Colombia, Santos has repeatedly caved to rebel demands and allowed Colombian security to regress — perhaps not as far back as to the wild days before Uribe, but it's certainly moving that direction.

For this reason, Uribe has become a fierce critic of Santos.

He endorsed Zuluaga for president and gave him a huge boost in the polls, with one recent survey putting Zuluaga ahead of Santos for the first time since the campaign began last year.

And so, once again, as if time refused to move forward in Colombia, those elusive peace talks are the main issue in this presidential campaign.

Santos presents himself as the only candidate who could complete the peace negotiations he began in 2012 with the guerrilla leaders of the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia (FARC). He recently told Reuters that the election, “ultimately ... comes down to a choice between war and peace,” with him, of course, as the self-proclaimed peace candidate.

Yet Colombia has lost 200,000 people to the military conflict that began when the FARC was created in 1964, and too many Colombians seem to be fed up with peace promises from a band of criminals who clearly have no interest in giving up the weapons and armies that protect their drug empire.

They see that while Santos' negotiations reportedly have made progress on agricultural reforms and allowing future rebels to participate in politics, the rebels have refused to budge on dismantling their drug-trafficking enterprises.

Santos has been the odds-on favorite since the campaign began last year. But Zuluaga has been gaining popularity by reminding Colombians that past peace negotiations have been used to fool the government and strengthen the FARC, that only Uribe's hard-line policies can achieve significant military gains against the rebels, and that “the only thing we can discuss (with the rebels) is submission.”

Zuluaga says he would talk to the rebels, but only after they lay down their weapons and face prison time for their crimes. He wants to regain the progress that was made under Uribe and lost under Santos. And according to the polls, the Colombian people are rapidly lining up behind him.

A recent poll released by the Colombian National Consulting Center and CM& News had Zuluaga winning Sunday's election, with 24 percent of the vote and going into a runoff with Santos, who received 22 percent.

The same poll projects Zuluaga would beat Santos by a 2 to 34 margin in the runoff.

Stay tuned. If the Colombian people boot out Santos for being too soft on the rebels, perhaps peace can finally be achieved in Colombia — by military force, if necessary.

# Vanishing generation: A memorial tribute

Tom Brokaw called them "The Greatest Generation."

They grew up in the Great Depression. They

drove some of the first automobiles on the first paved highways in America. They went to work for the Works Progress Administration and built our nation's infrastructure. They strung wires across our country and brought electricity and telephones to homes throughout America. They bought radios and invented the first television. They landed on the beaches at Normandy, raised the flag atop Mount Suribachi on Iwo Jima and defended our freedom in World War II. They were the first to enter space and chose to go to the moon. Today, their generation is vanishing from the earth. They once numbered more than twelve million but only 1.2 million survive. One thousand members of the WW II generation die every day.

On Memorial weekend we remember those

who have gone before and paved the way for our future.

My father's brother entered Nuremberg, Germany on April 14, 1945 as a tank commander in the final push to occupy the city. Years later, when my wife and I went to Nuremberg to serve an English speaking church, he remembered, with the quick smile that always illuminated his face, that it was difficult to get a tank through the narrow streets of the old city.

He was wounded in the battle and spent three months convalescing in the hospital in Nuremberg. With the war over, he toured Italy and Switzerland for few months following the war, then headed home. His first agenda

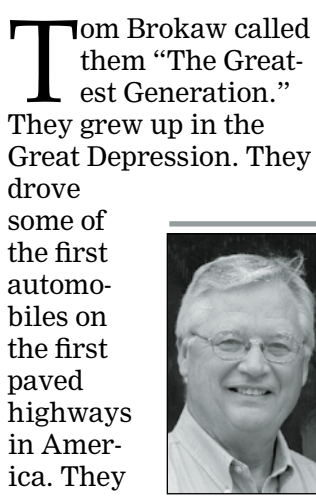

was to seek out the love he left behind. They were soon married and spent more than sixty years as husband and wife.

He was a gifted artist. One of his paintings hangs on the wall of my office, a family treasure reminding me of his love and encouragement across the years.

In his later years the sounds of artillery returned to haunt him, one of the incurable symptoms of post-traumatic stress. Crowds and locations with loud noises bothered him. But he remained outgoing, enjoying friends and family.

As his health declined he faced death with the same courage, confidence and faith with which he faced it in his youth. He was buried January a year

ago at the Oakwood Cemetery in Waco, Texas.

## News in brief

### Tennessee governor signs bill to allow electric chair if lethal injection drugs unavailable

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — As the rest of the nation debates the feasibility and humanity of lethal injections against a backdrop of scarce drugs and botched executions, Tennessee has come up with an alternative: the electric chair.

Republican Gov. Bill Haslam signed a bill into law Thursday allowing the state to electrocute death row inmates in the event prisons are unable to obtain the drugs, which have become more and more scarce following a European-led boycott of drug sales for executions.

Tennessee lawmakers overwhelmingly passed the electric chair legislation in April, with the Senate voting 23-3 and the House 68-13 in favor of the bill.

Tennessee is the first state to enact a law to reintroduce the electric chair without giving prisoners an option, said Richard Dieter, executive director of the Death Penalty Information Center, a Washington-based nonprofit organization that opposes executions and tracks the issue.

“There are states that allow inmates to choose, but it is a very different matter for a state to impose a method like electrocution,” he said. “No other state has gone so far.”

### Bangkok quiet after coup as Thai junta summons members of family at heart of political crisis

BANGKOK (AP) — Thailand’s ruling military on Friday summoned the entire ousted government and members of the politically influential family at the heart of the country’s long-running conflict, a day after it seized control of this volatile Southeast Asian nation in a non-violent coup.

There was virtually no military presence on Bangkok’s streets, which were less crowded than usual but still filled with vendors and people heading to work after a 10 p.m. - 5 a.m. curfew the night before. There were no reports of overnight violence.

Countries including the United States, Japan and Australia expressed concern and disappointment over the coup, with the U.S. saying there was “no justification” for the takeover, Thailand’s second in eight years.

It was unclear why more than 100 people — including the ousted prime minister and several members of the influential Shinawatra family — were ordered to report to the army, which said it was summoning the high-profile figures “to keep peace

and order and solve the country’s problems.”

### Mortar strikes election gathering for Assad in southern Syria; report says attack kills 21

BEIRUT (AP) — A mortar shell struck an election gathering in southern Syria for President Bashar Assad, killing a number of people, state media and opposition activists reported Friday.

Assad, rarely seen in public since the start of Syria’s 3-year-old conflict, has not been seen campaigning since he announced his candidacy last month and was not at the gathering in the southern city of Daraa, where the uprising against his rule began. More than 160,000 people have been killed in the fighting as the revolt morphed into civil war that’s also sent millions fleeing for their lives and turned once-prosperous cities into rubble-strewn warzones.

The state-run SANA news agency said the mortar strike late Thursday killed an unspecified number of people.

The Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, which relies on activists on the ground for its reports, said the shelling targeted an “electoral tent” where Assad’s supporters had gathered and killed 21 people, including 11 civilians.

There was no immediate claim of responsibility for the attack. Rebels trying to overthrow Assad frequently fire mortar shells into Syria’s major cities, including the capital, Damascus, from opposition-held suburbs.

### UNICEF defends \$90,000 rent from Myanmar general’s kin, says family not on sanctions list

YANGON, Myanmar (AP) — The United Nations children’s agency has defended a decision to pay nearly \$90,000 a month for its new office in Myanmar — a three-story house owned by the family of an ex-army general who was slapped with U.S. sanctions during the country’s dictatorship.

UNICEF said in a press release Thursday it carried out an “extensive search,” looking at more than 40 locations, before signing the deal.

Without mentioning the name of the Maj. Gen. Nyunt Tin — whose family owns the property — UNICEF said he no longer holds public office and was not currently subject to criminal charges or international sanctions.

Nyunt Tin was one of the most powerful ministers under the former junta regime led by Than Shwe.

### ‘Carjack City’: Detroit gas stations and police take steps to guard against armed auto thefts

DETROIT (AP) — When they pull up to a gas station these days, Detroit drivers are looking beyond the price per gallon at a far more threatening concern: carjackers.

The armed auto thieves have become so common here that parts of the bankrupt metropolis are referred to as “Carjack City,” and many motorists fear getting out of their vehicles even for a few moments to fill a tank.

So gas stations are taking steps to protect customers, and the city has formed a special police team to go after suspects. Convicted carjackers will even get their faces and prison sentences plastered onto billboards.

“You need to catch these people and make a good example of them,” said Mousa Bazzi, who owns a Mobil station in a semi-desolate neighborhood bordering Detroit’s east riverfront. He keeps his business well-lit and continually has two to four employees inside to ensure “there’s always an extra hand or two” in case of trouble.

Authorities blame many of the carjackings, ironically, on improvements in vehicle security. Anti-theft equipment, GPS systems and advanced locks now prevent many vehicles from being driven without a key in the ignition.

### Doctors make mini dialysis machine for tiny babies to avoid problems of adult-sized machines

LONDON (AP) — Doctors in Italy have designed a miniature dialysis machine for babies, used for the first time last year to save a newborn girl, according to a new report.

Usually, doctors adapt standard dialysis machines for babies, but that can be risky since the devices can’t always be accurately tweaked. About 1 to 2 percent of hospitalized infants have kidney problems that may require dialysis, which cleans toxins from the blood when the kidneys aren’t working.

“Only a small number of (babies) need this treatment, but it could be life-saving,” said Dr. Heather Lambert, a pediatric kidney specialist and spokeswoman for Britain’s Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health.

Lambert and colleagues at the Great North Children’s Hospital in Newcastle are working on a similar small dialysis device and other scientists have experimented with prototypes.

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# Injury-riddled Rangers hand Tigers 9-2 loss

DETROIT (AP) — Less than a week ago, the Detroit Tigers were rolling through the American League behind a terrific starting rotation. By the time Thursday's game ended, their pitching had collapsed so badly that infielder Danny Worth took the mound for the final inning. "Regardless of your team, you are going to go through a stretch where you don't

get the starting pitching you need, and it taxes your bullpen, and things start to snowball from there," manager Brad Ausmus said. This time it was rookie Robbie Ray who struggled, allowing seven runs in a 9-2 loss to the Texas Rangers. Ray was optioned to Triple-A Toledo after the game. Ausmus said the Tigers would call up right-hander

Corey Knebel before Friday night's game, with a corresponding move to be announced to clear room on the 40-man roster. Shin-Soo Choo homered and Chris Gimenez had four hits for Texas, which was without Prince Fielder. This was supposed to be Fielder's first game back in Detroit after the Tigers traded him in the off-season, but he could miss the

rest of the season because of a herniated disk in his neck. Yu Darvish (4-2) allowed two runs and six hits in seven innings, striking out six and walking three. The Rangers broke through quickly against Ray (1-1), who lasted only 3 1-3 innings. Ray allowed seven runs, nine hits and four walks, and the AL Central-leading Tigers lost their fourth straight.

Ian Kinsler, who was traded to Detroit for Fielder in an offseason blockbuster, went 1 for 3 in his first game against the Rangers. The Tigers breezed to a 27-12 victory before being swept in a three-game series at Cleveland. Star right-handers Justin Verlander and Max Scherzer were both knocked around in that series.

## Surgery to end Prince's season

Prince Fielder is expected to have neck surgery next week and miss the rest of the season. Fielder has been out with a herniated disk in his neck, and surgery was recommended after a follow-up exam and another scan Thursday with Dr. Drew Dossett. General manager Jon Daniels said the team would get second opinion about surgery, but were "expecting that to be confirmed."

Daniels said Dossett was tentatively scheduled to do a cervical fusion Tuesday. That operation has a typical recovery time of three to four months, and the GM said he anticipated Fielder being able to be fully recovered before spring training next year.

The Rangers already have a majors-high 13 players on the disabled list. Fielder became the 14th when that move is made Friday. Fielder had played in 547 consecutive games, then the longest active streak in the majors, before receiving a nerve root block injection Saturday to treat his neck. He had played all 162 games four of the past five seasons, and missed only one game in 2010.

Before that, the durable first baseman that turned 30 earlier this month hadn't missed a game since Sept. 14, 2010. The last time he had missed consecutive games was Aug. 24-25, 2007, while with Milwaukee.

**Dear Annie:** I have worked for a long time at a large manufacturing company. I am a hard worker and believe in teamwork. Over the years, however, the company has let workers get away with everything: personal emails and texting, using their computers to watch TV shows, movies and hockey games, abusing overtime and sick days, taking photos of proprietary equipment, etc. Sometimes, workplace rules are ignored and accidents occur.

We are well-paid individuals with great benefits. The head office has put major changes in place to improve profit and productivity. I cannot blame them for trying to fix this aspect of things, but I have lost respect for management because the existing rules and policies are not enforced.

I strongly believe we will lose our jobs because the company will fail. I

have made suggestions to management and human resources, to no avail. Fellow workers who are long term simply want to see their pensions kick in, and the younger employees just want to see their workday end and get a paycheck.

I am hoping someone might see this letter and recognize themselves and do something about this situation. I am open to suggestions. -- *Frustrated Employee*

**Dear Frustrated:** The problem with being an employee is that you cannot control what management does, nor can you make other employees shape up without the cooperation of the higher-ups. We agree that this is frustrating, but it is also outside your ability to remedy. You have taken what steps you can to effect change, but nothing has happened. If you can accept that these things are not your responsibility, you may be able to ignore them and keep working. Otherwise, it's time to put an updated resume back into circulation.

**Dear Annie:** On Easter, our 8-year-old daughter accidentally came across her Easter basket and gifts in our home. Her facial expression was filled with questions, and my wife and I decided to tell her the truth: that her parents are the Easter Bunny. She then asked about Santa Claus and the Tooth Fairy. I told her yes, we are those, as well.

Was I wrong? What is the appropriate age to have this conversation with your child? -- *No More Secret Santa*

**Dear Santa:** There is no specific time to tell your children these things, but by the age of 8, we suspect your daughter was figuring it out on her own. And most kids don't

appreciate remaining in the dark while their peers are more informed. Telling her the truth probably made her feel more mature and trusted.

You could have softened the blow by discussing the idea of Santa, the Tooth Fairy and the Easter Bunny, helping her understand that parents enjoy this type of pretending for their children and that using one's imagination can be fun and creative. But please put a positive spin on your daughter becoming old enough to know the real story behind the presents. We think she'll be just fine.

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## Contract Bridge

## Test Your Play

**1. You are declarer** with the West hand at Six Diamonds. North leads the ace and another spade. How would you play the hand?

**West**  
♠ Q

♦ A K J 10 5  
♣ A K Q 6 4

**2. You are declarer** with the West hand at Three Notrump. North leads the jack of hearts. How would you play the hand?

**1. The danger** is that the opposing clubs might be divided 4-1, in which case if you were to discard a heart on the king of spades at trick two, you would very likely finish down one.

The best method of play is to ruff the second spade lead, draw trumps and then play the A-K of clubs. If both opponents follow suit, you have the rest of the tricks, but if either opponent shows out on the second club, you still have two heart finesses to fall back on to save the day. Thus

you make the slam on the suggested line of play if North held something like ♠A1098 ♥K1097 ♦7643 ♣9, but you would almost surely go down if you made the mistake of prematurely discarding a heart on the king of spades at trick two.

**2. After winning the heart**, you must resist the temptation to immediately develop the diamond suit. Four diamond tricks and four tricks in the majors would not be enough, and when you attempted to score the ninth trick by leading a club, the enemy would grab the ace and cash at least three hearts to put you out of business.

Instead of pursuing such a hopeless course, you should win the heart and lead a low club at trick two. This play offers a legitimate chance for the contract. If North has the A-x or A-x-x of clubs, he must play low; otherwise, you'll wind up scoring two spades, two hearts, a diamond and four clubs for nine tricks.

Once you succeed in "stealing" a club trick, you can then attack diamonds, intending to finesse if South follows low. Unless North turns up with all three missing diamonds, you make the contract.

Tomorrow: A sacrilegious play.

Pirates cut ties with Wandy

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Languishing near the bottom of the NL Central a year after making the playoffs, the Pittsburgh Pirates couldn't wait any longer for struggling left-handed starter Wandy Rodriguez to get it together.  
The Pirates designated the 35-year-old veteran for assignment Thursday, less than 24 hours after Rodriguez gave up six runs in 1 2-3 innings in a 9-8 victory over Baltimore.  
"In our mind we felt best served to cut ties because in my mind I'm thinking, 'You know what? I've seen guys of his ilk pitch backwards and recreate themselves.' ... We didn't feel that was our best option," manager Clint Hurdle said. "He's healthy his arm is healthy. He said it best, 'Sometimes you give everything you got and it's not good enough.'"  
Rodriguez was 0-2 with a 6.75 ERA in six starts this season. He spent time on the disabled list earlier in the year with a right knee inflammation.  
The Pirates plan to fill Rodriguez's spot in the rotation with either right-hander Brandon Cumpton or left-hander Jeff Locke, an unlikely All-Star a year ago. Cumpton is 0-1 with a 4.26 ERA in two starts with Pittsburgh this season and has been dominant at Triple-A Indianapolis.

After the injection, Fielder took a couple of days off before an exam Monday. Daniels said the slugger's strength tested normal then and that his symptoms had largely gone away, so he was given clearance to resume baseball activity.

"His symptoms have

gotten worse," Daniels said Thursday, describing Fielder as frustrated for not feeling like himself and being able to help the team.  
"Talking to (Fielder) and seeing him, you knew this was something that was bothering him," Daniels said. "We were hoping the injection could get him through the season, and sometimes you have that kind of response. The initial response was positive. But when he had the setback on Tuesday, we kind of felt this is where it was headed."
