Alleged gunman, robbery suspect indicted

 A Big Spring man accused of firing off shots inside a local automobile dealership, stealing a car and leading authorities on a high-speed chase is one of 23 people indicted during this week's session of the Howard County Grand Jury.

Michael Brandon Fosse, 29, was indicted on a single count of aggravated robbery for his alleged role in a lunchtime rampage that occurred Feb. 26. Police records show offi-

cers were called to 87 Auto Sales, 111 S. Gregg shortly after noon that day in reference to an armed robbery. "While en route, officers were advised the suspect had stolen a gray Cadillac from the business," Big Spring Police Sgt. Tony Everett said in February. It was later learned Fosse had allegedly

displayed a semi-automatic firearm and fired two rounds inside the building before departing in the stolen vehicle. Howard County Sheriff's Officer Sgt. Jimmy Mayes later observed the suspect vehicle on Highway 87 and gave pursuit. The chase, in which speeds exceeded 100 mph, ended when the vehicle

turned into Boyce Galvanizing, located at U.S. 87 and Moore School Road. "After a short standoff, Sgt. Mayes talked Fosse out of the building, at which time he surrendered," Everett said. If convicted, Fosse faces a possible sentence of between

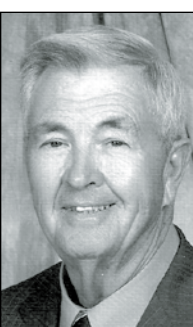

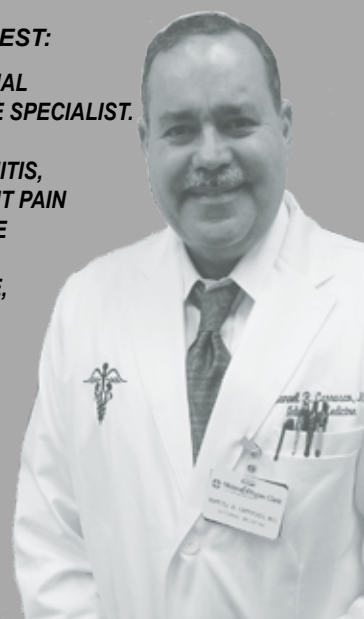

while waiting in line.

"We want everyone to have an opportunity to have fun, so be patient with us," Womack said in an earlier interview.

to shut the doors. Then about two hours later, we will ask everyone in the pool to leave, so we can let in the next group of people."

The Weather Channel website is predicting sunny skies with highs in the late 80s to early 90s this weekend.

After this weekend, the pool will stay open for the summer until Aug. 23. Operating hours will be Tuesday through Fri-

day, noon to 8 p.m.; Saturday, 11 a.m. to 8 p.m.; and Sunday, 1 p.m. to 8 p.m.

Daily entrance fee is \$5 for adults and children older than 2. Children 2 years old or younger are not charged. Children ages 11 and younger must be accompanied by a person who is 16 years of age or older. A parent or guardian must accompany any child that is younger than 5 years of age

or under 48 inches tall at all times, whether in or out of the water.

Children ages 3 and younger must wear swim diapers at all times when in the water.

The aquatic center is located in the Comanche Trail Park on 911 Golf Course Road.

Focus on the killer, not the motives

Of all the things that have been said in the nonstop chatter since an obviously deranged young man killed six college students here in Southern California last weekend, by far the dumbest comes from Washington, D.C., where The Washington Post's film critic actually said that these mass murders were tied to white men in Hollywood promoting “escapist fantasies” that “revolve around vigilantism and sexual wish-fulfillment.”

Wrote Ann Hornaday, who hopefully knows more about film than about crime, “As Rodger bemoaned his life of ‘loneliness, rejection and unfulfilled desire’ and arrogantly announced that he would now prove his own status as ‘the true alpha male,’ he unwittingly expressed the toxic double helix of insecurity and entitlement that comprises Hollywood’s DNA.”

There’s more: “For generations, mass entertainment has been overwhelmingly controlled by white men, whose escapist fantasies so often revolve around vigilantism and sexual wish-fulfillment (often, if not always, featuring a steady through-line of casual misogyny).”

And more: “How many students watch outsized frat-boy fantasies like ‘Neighbors’ and feel, as Rodger did, unjustly shut out of college life that should be full of ‘sex and fun and pleasure’? How many men, raised on a steady diet of Judd Apatow comedies in which the shlubby arrested adolescent always gets the girl, find that those happy

endings constantly elude them and conclude, ‘It’s not fair?’”

So Apatow, a happily married man and the father of beautiful daughters, is responsible for a seriously ill young man’s murdering six students because that young man — unlike Seth Rogen or a character in an Apatow movie — didn’t get the girl?

This is nuts. Just nuts. How many of us didn’t get the girl or guy we wanted, didn’t get the job we wanted, had our hearts broken any number of ways? We don’t kill. This is not what people do after watching escapist movies and getting dumped by real people. If it were, our college campuses would be wastelands.

Maybe Hornaday is auditioning for a job as a loudmouth screamer who wants to blame Hollywood for everything.

Maybe she’s out to become the new Ann Coulter of culture: wrong, tasteless and offensive, but plenty of airtime. No doubt she’ll succeed. If I had more readers, I’d probably be giving her a boost.

It would be funny (OK, entertaining, because that is what this discussion is really about: ratings and attention. Maybe Hornaday will get her own show if she’s crazy enough.) if this were not a life-and-death problem.

Elliot Rodger was a dangerous and sick young man. He should not have been buying guns and living on his own. His parents knew he was troubled, but clearly they didn’t know just how seriously ill he was — or they didn’t know what to do about it. He had therapists who didn’t know just how imminent a danger he posed. He was a college student, but they apparently didn’t know or do anything. He

had parents who thought they were doing enough and weren’t. I have no doubt that they (not Seth or Judd) will blame themselves forever, Ms. Hornaday.

And now six kids — it could have been any of our kids — are dead.

Could we please focus on the killer and not the movies? Could we please try to figure out how to keep sick and dangerous kids who have easy access to guns from killing our children?

I’m happy to rant and rave till the cows come home about discrimination against women in almost every aspect of life — from Hollywood to the op-ed pages of even The Washington Post (which has improved somewhat, in gender terms, since I self-immolated trying to make it an issue). I’m glad to see women with a voice in the op-ed pages. I realize that women, as Hornaday clearly proved, can be every bit as uninformed and offensive as men, but equality doesn’t always mean excellence.

But as a parent and a professor, I would like to believe that campuses are safe places. We need to help the parents of deeply disturbed kids get help for their children, we need to help campuses step up to mental health issues, and we need to deal with the sale of guns to young people who should not be allowed to buy them. That’s a big list. Judd Apatow and Seth Rogen really don’t belong on it.

Jackson: ‘Courage is acquired’

The lion in winter walks into the room. His sideburns and mustache have gone gray. There is a little excess baggage beneath his chin. But Jesse Jackson’s stride is still firm, and his handshake firmer.

His voice is quieter now, but the rhythms are the same, the hint of his South Carolina birthplace still an undertone in his speech.

He is 72. Martin Luther King Jr. was assassinated at 39; Robert Kennedy at 42; John F. Kennedy at 46.

I ask Jackson whether he expected to live this long.

“I did not,” he says. “We had the most death threats of any (presidential) candidate ever.”

When he ran for president in 1988, New York City resembled a war zone. Memories that are distant now were fresh then: the Howard Beach incident, the Bernhard Goetz incident, the Tawana Brawley incident.

Ed Koch, the voluble mayor of the city, was relentless in his attacks on Jackson. One day during the New York primary campaign, I see Jackson wearing an ill-fitting raincoat lined with body armor. I ask him why he is wearing it.

“Because this is the only place in the country where a major political leader, the mayor, has created a climate of violence,” Jackson says.

But Jackson does not cut down his public appearances. If anything, he seems to increase them. He leads marches of people over the bridges and through the streets of New York. He is always at the forefront, always at the point.

The Secret Service has begun urging reporters to group around him closely, especially those reporters tall enough to block a sniper’s view. It has become, to say the least, a unique

campaign.

Today, Jackson looks back on it with something like resignation. He says he has no death wish, no desire to be a martyr.

“A coward dies a thousand times before his death,” he says. “Courage is acquired.”

In the main lobby of the Chicago office of the Rainbow/PUSH coalition, which he founded, there is a disconcerting display. It is a life-size re-creation — a diorama — of the balcony of the Lorraine Motel in Memphis, Tennessee, where King was shot to death April 4, 1968.

On the balcony are life-size cutouts of four men. From left to right, they are Hosea Williams, one of King’s chief lieutenants, Jackson, King and Ralph Abernathy, whom King called his best friend in the world.

It is the day before King is assassinated on almost exactly the spot he stands in the diorama.

The diorama is placed so that every visitor must see it. Even though the real Lorraine Motel is now part of the National Civil Rights Museum, I find the diorama disturbing. Why re-create an assassination site in the entrance to your office?

Others, however, find it an appropriate honor not just to King but to his disciples.

Many come to the office and pose for pictures in front of the diorama, sometimes with Jackson himself.

Jackson was only 26 at the time King was killed. But Jackson was already a veteran, having led his first sit-in at the segregated library of his hometown of Greenville, South Carolina, when he was 18.

It was a peaceful and ultimately successful sit-in — the library was desegregated — though Jackson and seven others were arrested, handcuffed and jailed.

Some published accounts are murky as to how long the “Greenville 8” spent in jail, with one saying it was for 45 minutes.

So I ask Jackson how long he was jailed. “Forever,” he responds dryly.

The civil rights movement would split between those who insisted that nonviolence was the only realistic and moral solution in the struggle against white racism and those who thought violence a proper response to the violence being done to them.

I ask Jackson whether he ever considered taking the violent path, especially after King’s assassination and the nationwide riots that followed.

“As a practical matter, no,” Jackson replies. “The violent ones were the segregationists, and they hurt all in the line of fire. We expressed our anger differently. We chose not armed struggle but to get the attention of the oppressor.”

“Malcolm (X) said, ‘Liberation by any means.’ But the only means available to us was mass demonstration, economic leverage and our votes. The white people of the South got freed by black people and the civil rights marches.”

I ask Jackson about the future. “Leadership at some point must be bold,” he says. “Van-ity asks: ‘Is it popular?’ Politics asks: ‘Will it work?’ But there is another question: ‘Is it right?’”

What about the current cynicism toward government and politics?

“I have seen enough progress to not have my spirit broken,” he says. “I have come too far in my lifetime to despair now.”

The lion’s roar is somewhat muted; the tenor and tone are softer. But it endures.

Miracle of the Mundane

Did Jesus do dishes? The very question sounds sacrilegious. That might be the point. Sometimes our "religion" prism causes us to miss the real miracle about Jesus. The whole idea of "religion" tends to confine our thinking to "church" related activities and theological conversations. To most people, Jesus never enters day-to-day conversation because to do so is to introduce

"religion," and daily life is uncomfortable with religion.

Those who knew Jesus, who met him, heard him, saw him, ate with him and walked with him were struck by his humanity. He was real, but, as some say, "not real religious." He went to the synagogues and spoke there, but it was the religious people who had difficulty with him.

He ate with tax collectors, visited with prostitutes and befriended lepers, violated religious laws by healing

the sick and allowing his disciples to harvest grain on the Sabbath.

Jesus' divinity was there for all to see: he made the blind see, caused the deaf to hear, lifted the lame to walk and raised the dead. Even the wind and the sea obeyed him.

But, as important as all those things were, especially to the individuals who experienced it, he elevated the mundane to the miraculous.

John described him like this: "That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we have looked at and our hands have touched—this we proclaim concerning the Word of life." (1 John 1:1) The Word became flesh and

lived among us and we saw his glory, glory as the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth." (John 1:14). The writer of Hebrews wrote: "For we have not a high priest who is not touched with our infirmities but was tempted in all ways like as we are, yet without sin."

The Bible never says that Jesus did the dishes. It does say that he washed feet. Which, it seems to me, required a great deal more humility than washing dishes. I expect dishes were prized possessions in most homes of Galilee. They weren't cheap.

You could not pick up dishes at the local Walmart or the Dollar store. They were all hand crafted and

often passed down from generation to generation. Most homes likely had little more than the bare essentials when it came to dishes. They did not pile up in the sink waiting for someone to unload the dishwasher. But I wouldn't be surprised if Jesus helped his mother out, or even lent a hand to Martha in the kitchen at Bethany, and washed dishes.

I always think my wife will be most impressed when I buy her flowers. She does appreciate them and she likes them.

But what she really seems to like is the times that I do the dishes. It may be that the most spiritual thing you may do today is to do the dishes. It could be a God thing.

Analysis: Both sides seek political gain over VA issues, accuse the other of doing the same

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republicans and Democrats alike want it both ways when it comes to any misdeeds at veterans hospitals, each side accusing the other of seeking unseemly political gain from the misfortune of the nation's warriors, while simultaneously maneuvering for an advantage in midterm elections.

The Democratic Senatorial Campaign Committee jumped in on Thursday, charging Republicans in key races with "politicizing (a) horrible crisis" for political gain — then accusing them of compiling "shameful, anti-veterans" records.

The same two-sided tactic had previously occurred to Republicans and their allies.

One House committee chairman, Rep. Jeff Miller of Florida, said the problems now coming to light at VA hospitals shouldn't be used for political gain.

Yet the Republican National Committee announced it was making automated calls to voters in 10 states with Democratic-held Senate seats on the ballot. Veterans "deserve an independent investigation, not another political cover-up," the calls said.

Texas official says lethal drug source can be secret after agency cites 'substantial threat'

DALLAS (AP) — Texas can keep secret the name of its supplier for its execution drugs, the state attorney general determined after law enforcement argued that suppliers face serious danger.

In the decision, Attorney General Greg Abbott's Office cited a "threat assessment" signed by Texas Department of Public Safety director Steven McCraw that says pharmacies selling execution drugs face "a substantial threat of physical harm."

Thursday's decision was a reversal for the state's top prosecutor on an issue being challenged in several death penalty states. It came the same day that Missouri Attorney General Chris Koster said his state should consider creating its own laboratory for execution drugs rather than relying on "uneasy cooperation" with outside sources.

Under Abbott, who is also the Republican nominee for governor in the nation's busiest death penalty state, the Texas Attorney General's Office had since 2010 rejected three similar attempts by the Texas Department of Criminal Justice to keep secret its source of the drugs used to carry out lethal injections.

While courts have consistently refused to stop executions over the privacy issue, lawyers for death row inmates say they need the information to verify the drugs' potency and protect inmates from unconstitutionally cruel and unusual punishment.

25 years on, protesters who saw Tiananmen crackdown still have their wounds, ideals

BEIJING (AP) — Some went missing. Some lost

their freedom. Some can't escape the images inside their head, or the guilt they feel for surviving.

The June 4, 1989, military crackdown to end weeks-long student protests is a key moment in the history of Communist-ruled China for the outside world. Within China, it is all but erased. Even personal acts of memory are considered subversive.

While China's economy, society and cities have transformed in the last 25 years, the demonstrators and their supporters are keen to remind the world that other things haven't changed — that China's political masters are still suppressing dissent and freedom of expression. They call for the Communist Party to stop hiding what happened on that bloody night in which an untold number of people were killed. Some cling to their democratic fight.

"I am the captain of a sunk ship," Wu'er Kaixi, who was a 21-year-old protest leader, said in an interview conducted in English. "I will always question of myself, 'Why didn't I die?' I believe, for the rest of my life. ... I will try my best to remember the guilt and try to realize the dreams of those who died that night."

Driverless cars were not legal, so what was Google's answer? An unorthodox lobbying campaign

MOUNTAIN VIEW, Calif. (AP) — About four years ago, the Google team trying to develop cars driven by computers — not people — became convinced that sooner than later, the technology would be ready for the masses. There was one big problem: Driverless cars were almost certainly illegal.

And yet this week, Google said it wants to give Californians access to a small fleet of prototypes it will make without a steering wheel or pedals.

The plan is possible because, by this time next year, driverless cars will be legal in the tech giant's home state.

And for that, Google can thank Google, and an unorthodox lobbying campaign to shape the road rules of the future in car-obsessed California — and maybe even the rest of the nation — that began with a game-changing conversation in Las Vegas.

The campaign was based on a principle that businesses rarely embrace: ask for regulation.

SpaceX's Elon Musk unveils spacecraft designed to fly astronauts to space station

HAWTHORNE, Calif. (AP) — A company that has flown unmanned capsules to the Space Station unveiled a spacecraft designed to ferry up to seven astronauts to low-Earth orbit that SpaceX founder Elon Musk says will lower the cost of going to space.

The futuristic, cone-headed craft dubbed Dragon V2 featured landing legs that pop out and a propulsion system designed to land almost anywhere "with the accuracy of a helicopter," Musk said Thursday at the Southern California rocket builder's headquarters near Los Angeles International Airport.

The technology would enable rapid reloading and

reusability of the spacecraft, he said. He noted that in the past, many rockets and space craft return to Earth in a fireball, rendering them unusable.

"You can just reload, propel it and fly again," Musk said. "This is extremely important for revolutionizing access to space because as long as we continue to throw away rockets and space crafts, we will never truly have access to space. It'll always be incredibly expensive."

"If an aircraft is thrown away with each flight, nobody will be able to fly or very few (can)," he said. "The same is true with rockets and spacecraft."

A 1st in 52 years: Teens from New York, Texas declared co-champions at National Spelling Bee

OXON HILL, Md. (AP) — When the confetti flew, the two boys stood in the center of the stage and shook hands. They held up the trophy together. Both were champions, a Spelling Bee finish unseen in more than half a century.

After all, it wouldn't have seemed right for one of them to finish second. Sriram Hathwar and Ansun Sujoe had essentially used up the entire list of words the Bee had to offer. The one time Sriram misspelled, Ansun did too. Then they were spot on for their final 12 spellings combined, acing dark-corner-of-the-dictionary stuff like "thymelici," "encaenia," "skandhas," "sdrucchiola" and "holuschick."

Sriram had been a favorite to win. Ansun had come out of nowhere. When it was all done, 14-year-old Sriram from Painted Post, New York, and 13-year-old Ansun from Fort Worth, Texas, had each won \$30,000 in cash as co-winners of the 87th Scripps National Spelling Bee.

"I think we both know that the competition is against the dictionary and not against each other," Sriram said. "I'm happy to share this trophy with him."

Not since 1962 had the Bee ended in a tie. It came about because the rules state that only 25 words remain once the competition is down to two or three spellers. Sriram thought he was a goner when he stumbled on "corpsbruder" (a close comrade), but Ansun then couldn't handle "antigropelos" (waterproof leggings).

Mark Zuckerberg, wife Priscilla Chan donate \$120 million to SF Bay Area schools

MENLO PARK, Calif. (AP) — Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg and his wife, Priscilla Chan, are donating \$120 million to the San Francisco Bay Area's public school system.

The couple's gift will be spread over the next five years and is the biggest allocation to date of the \$1.1 billion in Facebook stock the couple pledged last year to the nonprofit Silicon Valley Community Foundation.

"Education is incredibly expensive and this is a drop in the bucket. What we are trying to do is catalyze change by exploring and promoting the development of new interventions and new models,"

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — San Antonio Spurs coach Gregg Popovich stared blankly at a reporter, dumbfounded as he often is when dealing the media.

Is there any way to explain the Jekyll-and-Hyde nature of the Western Conference finals, where the home team has won each game in a blow-out?

“You’re serious?” Popovich said. “You really think I can explain that? Good Lord. And they pay you, don’t they?”

Tim Duncan had 22 points

and 12 rebounds, Manu Ginobili scored 19 points and San Antonio rolled to a 117-89 victory over Oklahoma City in Game 5 Thursday night, taking a 3-2 lead in the best-of-seven series to put the Thunder on the brink of elimination.

The latest lopsided win in the West finals came two days after the Thunder used their superior athleticism to fluster the veteran Spurs in Oklahoma City in Game 4.

“We’ve just got to worry about the next game,” Kevin Durant said. “We’re guar-

anteed 48 more minutes. It’s been an up-and-down series, but we’ve got to find a way to win it in Game 6. If we want to get to where we want to get to, we’ve got to win in San Antonio, but we’ve got to get to the next game.”

The series resumes Saturday in Oklahoma City.

Durant scored 25 points, but Russell Westbrook had only 21 points and seven assists after finishing with 40 points and 10 assists in Game 4.

“Nothing,” changed defensively, Westbrook said. Yet,

he was unable to charge the lane as effectively as he did while putting up 24 shots and reaching the free throw line 14 times on Tuesday.

He shot 6 for 12 from the field and 7 for 9 on free throws while again being guarded primarily by 6-foot-8 forward Kawhi Leonard.

“I think I did OK,” Leonard said. “We all did well as a group defensively, by just keeping a hand up and forcing difficult shots for everyone.”

That added aggression was key to winning, Popovich said

before Game 5, and his team responded.

The Spurs had 23 assists, shot 30 free throws and out-rebounded the Thunder 48-35. San Antonio also was 13 for 26 on 3-pointers and limited Oklahoma City to four fast-break points.

Leonard and Danny Green each had 14 points, Boris Diaw added 13 and Tony Parker scored 12 for the Spurs, who are a win away from returning to the NBA Finals after losing in seven games to Miami last year.

Heat, Pacers preparing for Game 6 battle

MIAMI (AP) — By now, Lance Stephenson’s list of egregious acts from Game 5 of the Eastern Conference finals are well-known: He blew air into LeBron James’ ear, interrupted a Miami Heat huddle and got caught flopping for the second time.

James was held to seven points on a night that he was rendered silent for long stretches because of foul trouble.

Instead, the buzz was almost entirely about Stephenson, who has become a Heat frustration and Internet sensation. Images of his already-infamous ear-blowing stunt were widely distributed on social media moments after it occurred in Game 5, and he didn’t back down Thursday when asked about his desire to pester the Heat.

And on Thursday, the Heat tried to get their focus back on themselves.

Heat coach Erik Spoelstra almost never holds a practice the day after a road game, especially when the team plane lands around 3:30 a.m. as was the case in the wee hours of Thursday. But Spoelstra deviated from the norm on the day before Game 6 of this East title series, not for any one on-court issue but rather so the two-time defending NBA champions could relieve some frustration.

Contract Bridge

Bidding Quiz

You are South, both sides vulnerable. The bidding has been:

East	South	West	North

What would you bid now with each of the following four hands?

- ♠K93 ♥Q8653 ♦10 ♣AKJ4
- ♠AQ874 ♥K962 ♦K5 ♣K8
- ♠KJ98 ♥AK10 ♦83 ♣AKJ7
- ♠Q6 ♥AQJ94 ♦K9 ♣AQJ3

1. Pass. A player who doubles for takedown is not obligated to bid again if partner makes no more than a minimum response. The doubler must remember that partner's forced reply does not promise any strength whatsoever and, in fact, will often be based on a weak hand (usually 0-8 points). Consequently, if the doubler lacks extra values beyond those already guaranteed by the double, he is expected to pass a minimum response.

In this instance, there is no good reason to bid again over one spade. Game is not possible, considering partner's failure to identify a promising hand by making a jump-response or cuebidding the opponents' suit. A raise to two spades would indicate greater values than you have, and a bid of two hearts would imply a better suit and a stronger hand.

2. Two spades. Bearing in mind that partner's response might be based on nothing more than four small spades, you should still feel reasonably safe in bidding for eight tricks. Counting the distribution and trump fit, your hand is worth about 18 points, which warrants a single raise — but no more. The raise invites partner to go on to game with maximum values for his previous bid.

3. Three spades. A raise to three promises greater values than a raise to two, and usually shows about 20 points. It invites partner to bid again with a smattering of values, and allows him to pass with a worthless hand.

4. Two hearts. That's all you can safely bid — even though you might feel like bidding more. It's true that you have a bit more than the double and the two-heart bid indicate, but your prospects for game will require a voluntary move forward by partner. By doubling and then bidding two hearts, you have already indicated that your hand was too strong for a mere one-heart overcall. You should let partner do the rest. He is presumably just as eager to bid game as you are.

This Date In History

Today is Friday, May 30, the 150th day of 2014. There are 215 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On May 30, 1814, the first Treaty of Paris was signed, ending war between France and the Sixth Coalition (the United Kingdom, Russia, Austria, Sweden, Portugal and Prussia), with France retaining its boundaries of 1792. On this date: In 1431, Joan of Arc, condemned as a heretic, was burned at the stake in Rouen (roo-AHN'), France.

In 1883, 12 people were trampled to death in a stampede sparked by a rumor that the recently opened Brooklyn Bridge was in danger of collapsing. In 1911, the first Indy 500 took place at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway; the winner was Ray Harroun, who drove a Marmon Wasp for more than 6 1/2 hours at an average speed of 74.6 mph and collected a prize of \$10,000. In 1922, the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C., was dedicated in a ceremony attended by President Warren G. Harding, Chief Justice William Howard Taft and Robert Todd Lincoln. In 1937, ten people were killed when police fired on steelworkers demonstrating near the Republic Steel plant in South Chicago. In 1943, during World War II, American troops secured the Aleutian island of Attu from Japanese forces. In 1962, Benjamin Britten's War Requiem had its world premiere at the new Coventry Cathedral in England.

Hunter-Reay hoping to keep rolling in Motor City

DETROIT (AP) — Ryan Hunter-Reay recalls rooting for the Andrettis and Unsers when he was growing up in South Florida, hoping an American would win the races he watched on TV.

"I've always been patriotic," he said Thursday along the banks of the Detroit River. Now, Hunter-Reay hopes he can give kids in the United States someone to cheer for in open-wheel auto racing. He is the first American since 2006 to win the Indianapolis 500.

Soon, he will get two chances to sustain success because the Detroit Grand Prix will feature full-length IndyCar races Saturday and Sunday.

Belle Isle's 2.36 mile, 13-turn street circuit will be put to a test by a lot of racing and some patching that was needed at

Turns 12 and 13 because a water main broke this week.

Detroit Grand Prix Chairman Bud Denker said \$4 million will be invested in the track after this year's races.

Simon Pagenaud and Mike Conway won the 2013 Detroit Grand Prix races on an improved surface that held up much better than it did in two years ago when pot holes and grooves spoiled the show.

Conway hopes to repeat, but if he does not, the Brit would be happy for the desperately seeking attention sport if Hunter-Reay finishes first again.

Will Power would, too. "It is good for the sport if we can have an American regularly contending, winning sometimes at least and challenging to win the series championship," Power said.

"I hope Ryan has success that boosts interest in our sport."

Barely, Hunter-Reay won the Indy 500 on Sunday. He was 0.060 seconds ahead of three-time Indy champ Helio Castroneves in the second-closest margin of victory in the history of the race. Hunter-Reay became the first driver from the U.S. to win open-wheel racing's signature event since Sam Hornish Jr. did it eight years ago.

The 2012 series champion said he has slept 3 to 4 hours a night lately, taking advantage of opportunities to boost his profile and promote the sport. Hunter-Reay rang the bell at the New York Stock Exchange and posed for pictures at the top of the Empire State Building. He was in Texas on Wednesday at a lunch with Texas Motor Speedway sponsors.

CFL owners, players break off contract talks

TORONTO (AP) — Canadian Football League training camps will open as scheduled Sunday despite another breakdown in contract talks between

the league and its players.

Negotiations ended Thursday afternoon after the CFL rejected the union's latest proposal,
