





### Electrical Merit Badge Meeting Held

One of the many various special events observed by the Boy Scouts of America in celebration of National Scout Week was an electrical merit badge meeting, held in the Reddy Room of Southwestern Public Service Company, Thursday, February 11 at 7:30 p.m. Southwestern Public Service Company hosted the meeting.

The evenings activities began with a scout opening and was followed by an explanation of the merit badge book by Cleo Meharg, District Manager, of Southwestern Public Service Company. Mr. Jack Brock, Advancement Chairman, then spoke to the boys on their advancement in connection with the electrical merit badge. The requirements and other vital information was given to the scouts along with electrical merit badge books enabling the boys to have a definite guide in achieving this badge.

The first speaker of the evening was Mr. Tom Field, Utilizational Representative. Mr. Field's topic was "Common Electrical Terms". He explained terms such as volts, amperes, watts, kilowatts, etc. on a level which the boys could easily understand. Mr. Bill Cunningham, Operating Engineer, then presented a film from General Electric Company of Dallas entitled, "Principles of Electricity". This film dealt with electricity from the point of generation, its principal

### Substitute Crops For Wheat And Grain Acreage Program Announced

USDA has announced that farmers taking part in 1965 wheat and feed grain programs again may substitute non-surplus crops on land diverted from wheat and feed grain production.

These crops are guar, sesame, safflower, castor beans, and flaxseed, plus mustard seed on feed grain acreage. The plantings on wheat cropland can be done only on that acreage voluntarily diverted below the farm's 1965 effective allotment.

Current legislation provides that acreage diverted from feed grains may be used for specified annual non-price-support field crops and flaxseed when they are not in surplus supply and will not be if produced on diverted acreage. The same crops can be planted on diverted wheat acreage (except for mustard seed which is not provided for under legislation). The accompanying reduction in or withdrawal of the diverted acre payments results in savings on program costs.

Price support by Law is not available for flax production on diverted acreage. The other substitute crops are not price-supported.

Following are the percentages of the individual farm acreage diversion payment rate which will be made for authorized plantings on diverted acres for the 1965 crop year, compared with those in effect in 1964:

of flow through transmission and distribution lines to the service entrance of a customer's residence.

One of the most captivating parts of the program was presented by Mr. Leroy Durbin, Journeyman Meterman. Mr. Durbin gave a demonstration on correct fusing and proper procedure for checking circuits when a fuse has been blown or when a breaker operates. Mr. Durbin also demonstrated transformers and transformer ratios and discussed how to read a watt hour meter register. Proper procedures on splicing of wire was also shown by the boys. Mr. Durbin then instructed the boys on how to figure their electric bill.

Mr. Charles Stimson, Safety and Personnel Engineer, gave the scouts some sound pointers on "Safety and First Aid in Regard to Electricity". With the assistance of a local scout, Larry Shea and Resi-Ann, he gave a demonstration on mouth-to-mouth respiration. Resi-Ann is a specially designed manikin for teaching this type of respiration. This tied into the portion of his subject of rescue methods for a person who had received an electrical injury.

Following Mr. Stimson's speech, Mr. Glenn Bickel, Power Sales Engineers, talked with the boys on "Career Opportunities in the Electrical Industry."

Mr. Bickel, gave the group some facts and figures on the demand for electricity in our modern world and the estimated use in the future.

The Scouts then took control of the closing of the meeting with a skit presented by five of the local boys. Light refreshments were then served the boys and time for visiting and further discussion of the material that had been presented was fully participated in by both boys and their leaders alike.

The towns represented at this meeting were Dimmitt, Hart, Tulia, Earth, Springlake, Olton, Matador, Petersburg, Floydada and Plainview with a total of 132 scouts in attendance.

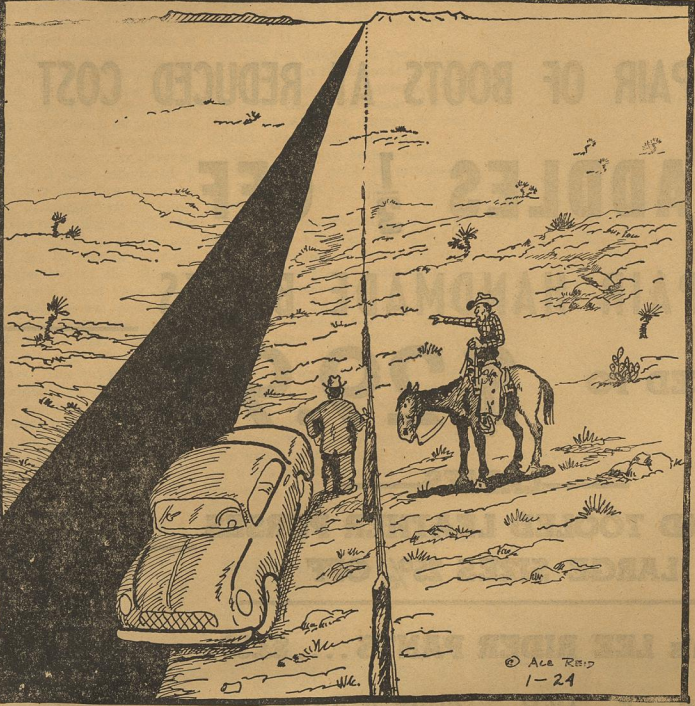

### Treasury Retains Bond Refund Option

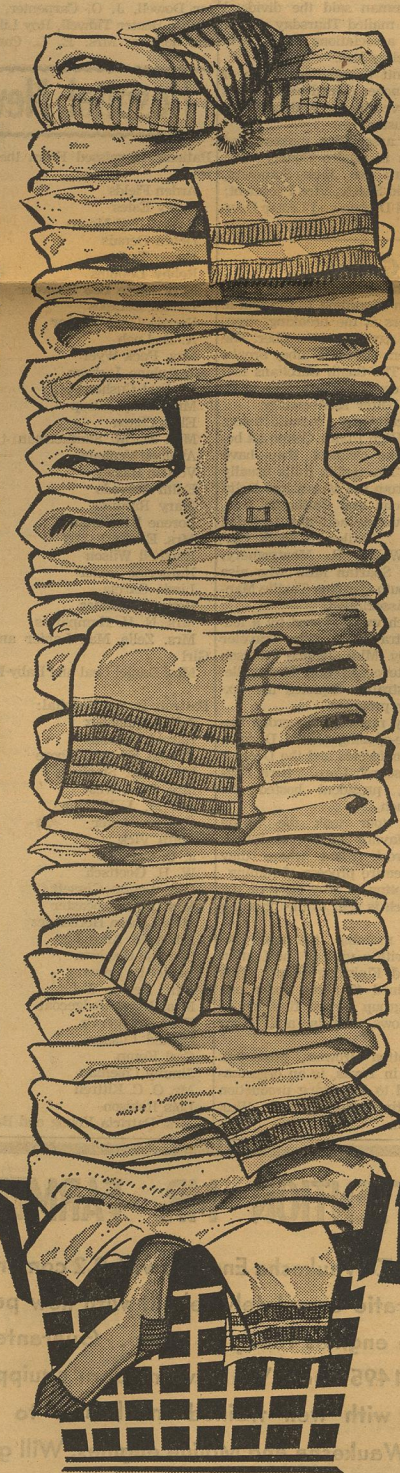

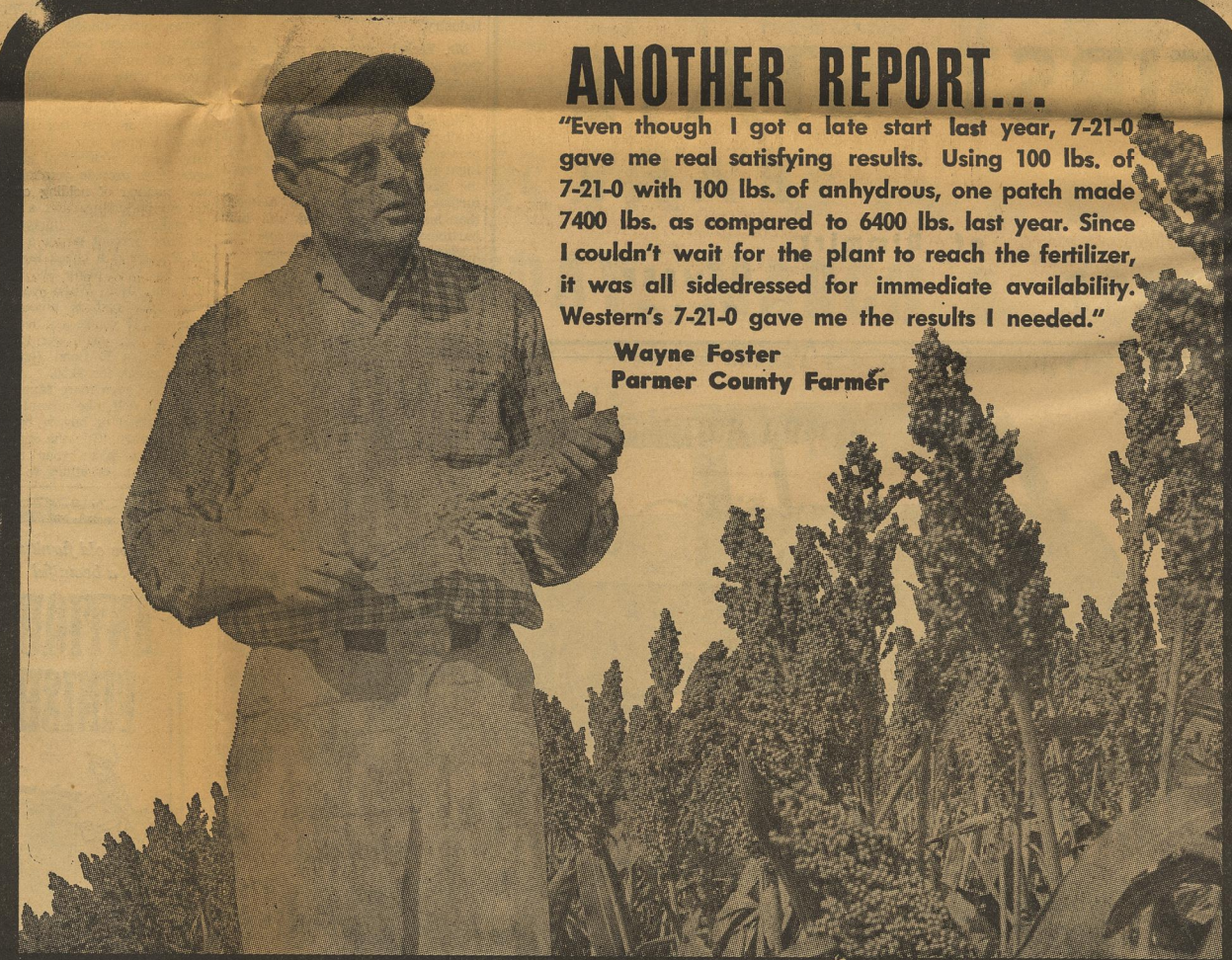



### Dimmitt Teachers Assist In Planning PAH Program

Mrs. Avis Smith, teacher at Dimmitt High School, and Mrs. Mabel Newman, teacher at Dimmitt Junior High School, are serving as members of the steering committee of the Plains American Heritage Program coordinated by Wayland Baptist College, under the supervision of C. F. Ogilvie, assistant professor of history.

These members have recently assisted in planning the American Heritage banquet, set for March 1, and American Heritage Week, April 5-9. Speaker for the March 1 banquet, scheduled for 7:15 p.m. in Slaughter Memorial Center at Wayland, is Robert H. Lawrence, executive director and secretary of the Texas Bureau for Economic Understanding.

The Texas Bureau has been acclaimed for its sponsorship of studies of America's Heritage in public schools of Texas. Its primary aim is to give financial and consultative assistance to public school educators who want their students to have a deeper appreciation of the ideals which gave rise to the United States and a better understanding of the nature of the Communist assault on these ideals.

This year the Bureau is sponsoring Multiple - County "projects" where schools from four to ten counties work together to enhance their students' understanding of their fundamental heritage. Participating in the Plains program are schools in Hall, Castro, Floyd, Lamb, and Swisher counties.

Prior to the initiation of the work of the Texas Bureau in 1948, Lawrence served both industry and the Federal Government in the general fields of research, education, and information. He was stationed in the Southern American Republic of Venezuela and in Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands for about seven years. He is much in demand as a speaker before educational, civic, and religious groups throughout Texas.

One phase of the American Heritage program supported by Texas Bureau for Economic Understanding is the student competition in the spring. Ogilvie points out that two types of contests are being held in the participating junior high schools. First, individual students are making three-dimensional displays, incorporating themes of free enterprise on the Bill of Rights. The other type of competition is a group project supported by home-rooms or classes, where a group prepares a skit or musical presentation based on some phase of American heritage.

The participating senior high schools are entering two contests for individuals. In one of the contests, students prepare an essay. In the other, students may choose to write and deliver a speech or another type stage presentation.

In these contests, individual students compete in their separate categories for prizes of a \$25 bond for first place, a \$10 bond for second place, and a \$5 bond for third place.

In the group competition, only one prize is given: a \$25 bond to the winning class or group.

### Senator YARBOROUGH'S REPORT

Dear Fellow Texans:

The President's Budget Request for the next fiscal year has been sent to Congress; as a new member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, many of my hours will be spent in detailed study of it. Join me for a quick look at the 1966 U.S. Government budget.

The largest single source of total government revenue is individual taxes, which contribute 38 cents of every dollar. The other major source is corporation income taxes, supplying 22 cents out of every dollar. Payroll taxes and excise taxes provide 15 cents and 11 cents respectively, and the remaining 14 cents comes from miscellaneous sources.

On the spending side it should first be noted that, contrary to charges that the federal government is growing at the expense of the private sector of the economy, the amount of government spending as a percentage of our gross national product is not increasing, it is decreasing. In 1965, government spending is estimated to amount to 15.2 per cent of GNP, down 1 per cent from 1964. In contrast, the percentage in 1953 was 20.6 per cent.

In the same way the size of the public debt as a percentage of GNP has fallen steadily. The great bulk of our public debt (about two-thirds of the total) resulted from our huge expenditures to defend the cause of freedom in World War II. The amount of public debt accumulated since 1946 amounts to only 7 per cent of today's GNP. As it is, our national debt as a percentage of our gross national product has declined from a high of 133.1 per cent in 1946 to 49.5 per cent today. This is prudent management.

Now for the services which the government will provide. In fiscal

1966, 40 cents out of every dollar will go to national defense. This expenditure of \$51.6 billion is down from \$52.2 billion estimated in 1965 and \$54.2 billion in 1964. Due to the increasingly more efficient operation of our defense establishment it is now possible to maintain and improve our military forces without increasing defense outlays each year.

Expenditures for international affairs will amount to 3 cents of every dollar, or \$4.0 billion, which is \$59 million less than in 1965. I have long advocated a cutback in foreign aid; fortunately it is at last approaching a more reasonable level.

The budget plays unprecedented attention to education, outlining a broad program of improvement and innovation to bring the finest possible education to every American. The budget shows a 75 per cent increase in expenditures for education in fiscal 1966.

For health, labor and welfare the budget asks for \$8.3 billion, up \$2.1 billion from 1965.

Other proposed fiscal 1966 expenditures and the change from 1965 are as follows:

Space Research and Technology: \$5.1 billion, a decrease of \$200 million.

Conservation and development of natural resources: \$2.7 billion, a decrease of \$44 million.

Commerce and Transportation: \$2.3 billion, a decrease of \$568 million.

Veterans Benefits and Services: \$4.6 billion, a decrease of \$76 million. (This decrease is one which concerns me; it will get a very careful scrutiny from Congress.)

All the foregoing, together with a few miscellaneous items, add up to a total of \$99.7 billion, in the 1966 fiscal year administrative budget.

In the months to come my colleagues and I on the Senate Appropriations Committee will be giving each of these expenditure requests the closest scrutiny, ever mindful of the need for formulating our fiscal policies to promote national strength, economic progress, and individual opportunity.
