



## World honors D-Day's fallen, 70 years on

COLLEVILLE-SUR-MER, France — Gone are the screaming shells, seasick soldiers and bloodied waters of 1944. Today, a sun-splattered Normandy celebrated peace, with silent salutes, tears and international friendship marking 70 years since the D-Day invasion helped change the course of World War II and modern history.

Not many of the 150,000 Allied soldiers who slogged onto storm-torn beaches or parachuted into Normandy remain alive to pass on the legacy of that "longest day." Some survivors stood, somber-faced and proud, alongside President Barack Obama and French President Francois Hollande as they paid tribute to history's biggest amp-

# **Victim identified as Guzman;** husband 'person of interest'

A body discovered in Big Spring Wednesday has been identified as a Lubbock woman missing since late Friday.

Lubbock TV station KCBD reported that the Lubbock County Medical Examiner has identified the body as that of Rachel Guzman, 41, of Lubbock.

Guzman was last seen at her home on S. Loop 289 in Lubbock at about 11 p.m. Friday. Family members told KCBD they first noticed Guzman's absence Sunday, then became particularly fearful for her safety when she failed to report for work Monday.

Wednesday afternoon, Lubbock detectives and Big Spring police discovered Guzman's body on an isolated stretch of property in the vicinity of Scenic Mountain Medical Center.

Rachel Guzman's husband, Epifanio Jose "Joe" Guzman, 43, was booked into Howard County Jail Wednesday on a Lubbock County warrant charging him with indecency with a child by sexual contact. Bond was set at \$750,000.





hibious invasion.

The veterans' hands which once wrested France from Nazi occu pation, saluted wizened faces. Some rose to their feet with difficulty. Thousands of onlookers applauded.

will never "France forget what it owes these soldiers, what it owes the United States,' Hollande said at the Normandy American on a bluff Cemetery overlooking Omaha Beach.

"Vive l'Amerique! Vive la France! And long live the memory of those who fell here for our liberty."

Taking the stand at a site he called "democracy's beachhead," Obama said: "America's claim our commitment to liberty, to equality, to freedom, to the inherent dignity of every human being — that claim is written in blood on these beaches, and it will endure for eternity."

In all, 19 world leaders, more than 1,000 veterans and many others gathered to honor the troops and civilians who fell in mighty battles that helped bring Eu

At 6:30 a.m., the moment on June 6, 1944, when Allied troops first waded ashore, a U.S. military band played taps. D-Day veterans from the 29th Infantry Division and serving soldiers stood at attention.

rope peace and unity.

"Twenty-nine, let's go!" they shouted, then downed shots of Calvados, Normandy's apple brandy.

Hundreds of Normandy residents and other onlookers applauded, then formed a human chain on the beach.

The glorious sun that rose as they arrived shone through the day on a land where paratroopers' corpses once hung from trees and medics dragged wounded soldiers from bloodswirled waves.

But the peace and stability that its wartime history brought continues to be challenged, as bloodshed in Ukraine poses new threats to European security and East-West relations.

Hollande, who invited Ukraine's presidentelect to the D-Day commemorations as well as Russian President Vladimir Putin, alluded to the conflict.

"It is because France itself experienced the

barbarity (of war) that it feels a duty to preserve peace everywhere, at the frontiers of Europe as in Africa," Hollande said.

He was hosting the world leaders in Ouistreham, a small port that was the site of a strategic battle on D-Day.

The secretly planned Operation Overlord included landings on five Normandy beaches. code-named Gold, Juno, Sword Omaha, and Utah.

The D-Day invasion was a turning point in World War II, cracking Hitler's western front as Soviet troops made advances in the east. At least 4,400 Allied troops were killed the first day, and many thousands more in the ensuing three-month Battle of Normandy, before the Allies could march to Paris to liberate the French capital from Nazi occupation.

German Chancellor Angela Merkel and a few German veterans also took part in Friday's ceremony, as a gesture of the European unity that the Allied victory brought. Ceremonies large and small were taking place across Normandy and around the world.

А ceremony with Prince Charles at the Cathedral of Bayeux, just south of the beaches, left British veteran Richard England deeply shaken.

"It brought it all back, I'm afraid — all the boys I lost, my brother-in-law who was killed almost at the end, and the lovely chaps that fought with me who were older than me and are no longer with us," said England, of the 8th Durham Infantry Battalion. "They weren't here, unfortunately."

Several thousand veterans, family members and others gathered at the Normandy American Cemetery and Memorial, with its 9,387 white marble tombstones on a bluff overlooking the site of the battle's bloodiest fighting at Omaha Beach, the emotional centerpiece of American pilgrimages to honor the men killed in Normandy.

Serving soldiers of the 173rd Airborne brigade, the ceremony organizers, served as ushers, wearing maroon berets. For the ceremony, small U.S. and French flags were placed in the ground at each grave

In addition to the fallen troops, Allied bom-

bardments killed an estimated 20,000 French civilians, and Hollande paid tribute to them Friday in Caen, which like many cities of Normandy was largely destroyed

in the bombings. France has only tentatively come to grips with the invasion's toll on civilians. The Allied bombings — especially the deadly onslaught in Normandy during the invasion launched on D-Day — were used as a propaganda tool by the Vichy government, which collaborated with the Nazis. Historians now believe that nearly as many French civilians died in Allied air raids as Britons during the German Blitz.

"This battle was also a battle of civilians," Hollande said. He said Normandy's residents "helped the victory happen. They opened their doors to the liberators."

of educators who have lost students to wars in Iraq and Afghanistan himself included.

He wants to keep the memory of D-Day alive as the number of survivors dwindles, and brought 12 students to Normandy for a course on the lessons of D-Day.

"I make them promise to bring their grandchildren," he said, "to serve as a bridge to the next generation."

U.S. Senator John Cornyn (R-Texas) issued the following statement in honor of the 70th anniversary of D-Day:

"On this day, we honor the men who stormed the beaches of Normandy 70 years ago today. These heroes will always be honored by the country they served and the nations they helped to free.

"As we pay tribute to the heroes of D-Day, may we remember their sacrifices and those of their family members. May we remember their bravery and their commitment to the mission that would change the course of history."

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A terrible way to select judges

t happened again this year. At first, I was embarrassed, but now I just laugh. "Who should I vote for?" friends ask. At first, as a lawyer and a law professor, I felt like I should know the answer to that. But I didn't - and still don't. In Massachu-

setts, where I come from, judges are appointed for life. In California, some judges are appointed by the governor, but then they stand for retention after their first term.

And there are other seats on the Superior Court, the local trial court, where you don't get appointed; you

just run. "You" meaning former prosecutors.

Superior Court judges don't just preside over criminal cases. But as I perused my absentee ballot looking for at least a few names I might know and support, I almost started laughing about the many varieties of prosecutors on the ballot — and not just any kind of prosecutor. "Gang prosecutor" sound tough enough? How about gang "predators"? Not just sexual assault prosecutors, but sexual "predator" prosecutors. Prosecutors with 98 percent conviction rates.

Geniuses? Brilliant judges to be?

Not necessarily.

I think I have a pretty good idea of what it takes to be a good judge, having appeared in front of some great judges and some who were not so great.

Certainly, it helps to know your way around the courtroom, how to make easy calls as to what is admissible and what isn't, and in that, prosecutors, who probably spend more time in court than any other kind of lawyer, are obviously very knowledgeable.

But being a judge, or at least a good judge, also requires other skills. You need to be able to understand almost any area of law, to be able to try a criminal case and also a fraud case, to supervise discovery in a complex business transaction gone wrong, to corral lawyers whose instinct is to fight over everything in endless submissions.

You need to be smart and organized.

As I look at the list of former prosecutors of every stripe asking for my vote, how am I to know who is smart and organized, who will be able — with tight budgets, meaning very little help from clerks and support staff — to move the process forward fairly and smoothly even if some or all of the lawyers have no desire to do so? The short answer: I haven't a clue.

And being smart and organized isn't even the most important piece. At the end of the day, at least if you ask me after three decades in this business, the most important quality in a judge is big surprise — judgment. Dare I call it wisdom? Dare I call it, as it sometimes is, courage?

Every case has winners and losers. Most of the time, cases turn out roughly as they should, roughly as you might predict. But not always. Definitely not always. I'm not (just) talking about innocent people getting convicted (which happens, but rarely). I'm talking about civil cases where truth and justice don't triumph maybe because one side had a bad lawyer, or because the other side did a better job of picking a "favorable" jury, or because the hometown team killed the outsiders. I have been involved in cases that made me feel proud of our justice system and cases where the best I could do was to apologize, and not for my mistakes, but for the fact that the rule of law, as administered by men and women,

is far from perfect. What makes the difference, particularly when things go very wrong, is having a judge with the wisdom and courage to right those wrongs. I have seen that, as well, from judges who agree with me on nothing when it comes to partisan politics, but are people of wisdom and courage.

I don't know how you find such people on a ballot. And if I don't know, I don't think my non-lawyer neighbors are likely to fare much better. It is a terrible way to pick judges.

**Discovering self-loathing Hispanics** 

herever they went in North America, usually years before any of the other European explorers, the Spanish conquistadores drew a map and named the landmarks they found along the way.

No wonder so much of our country is named in Spanish!

The conquistadores named rivers, mountains, towns and even territories that later became states. They trekked thousands

centuries by the British, French and Dutch to minimize Spain's accomplishments.

"Please, he (Juan Ponce de Leon) DID NOT discover Florida," one of them wrote me. "People lived there for thousands of years. Why spread ignorance when we know the facts?"

Following that twisted logic, the only way Spanish explorers could have been credited for a "discovery" was if the New World had been uninhabited. It's crazy!

In fact, ignorance is not being able to recognize great accomplishments. Ignorance is refusing to listen to the great historians who are clear about what really happened and what words we should use to describe it. "I would suggest that we say that Juan Ponce's voyage constituted the first known, or documented, discovery of Florida,' said Dr. Michael Gannon when I met him last year. It was April 2, 2013. People in Melbourne Beach, Florida, were celebrating the 500th anniversary of de Leon's great discovery, and Gannon, considered the ultimate authority on Florida's Spanish history, was telling everyone that we were "honored to be alive on an anniversary of this magnitude." Because our Hispanic heritage is so often hidden, and because the Black Legend still affects us today, most of the country missed a unique opportunity to celebrate our "Discovery Day." But yes, we were celebrating a great discovery! And with Gannon as the keynote speaker, no one felt there was ignorance being spread. It's simple: Discoveries occur not only when new land is found, but also when new cultures and peoples are encountered Europeans had no clue that the New World existed until the Spanish found it. That's why Christopher Columbus made such a huge discovery! And that's why those who followed him also made tremendous discoveries throughout the Americas. Those who deny their accomplishments, perhaps unwittingly, are still promoting the Black Legend. If the Native Americans had crossed the Atlantic and found Europe with all its people, surely they would deserve credit for such a great "discovery." But that's not what happened. So I also ask, "Why spread (Black Legend) ignorance when we know the facts?' Throughout the Americas, including many parts of the United States, there are countless places that were inhabited by natives

and yet "discovered" by Spanish explorers. If the British, French or Dutch had been the first to see and explore these places, surely these accomplishments would not have been censured by the Black Legend or questioned by those who are still misinformed and promoting its twisted propaganda.

That term was coined by Spanish writer Julian Juderias in his 1914 book, "La Levenda Negra y la Verdad Historica (The Black Legend and the Historical Truth)," where he described the unfair and biased way in which the people of Spain and Latin America had been depicted during the previous three centuries. Juderias described the Black Legend as "the environment created by the fantastic stories about our homeland that have seen the light of publicity in all countries, the grotesque descriptions that always have been made of the character of Spaniards as individuals and collectively, the denial - or at least the systematic ignorance — of all that is favor able and beautiful in the various manifestations of culture and art the accusations that in every era have been flung against Spain." Yet now, if you express your pride in your Spanish heritage, there are Hispanics ready to accuse you of embracing "white supremacist concepts and colonialism." It's absurd! Every so often, I run into Latinos who — with holier-than-thou attitudes — reject their own roots because of Spanish atrocities that occurred 500 years ago and were no different that those committed by other European explorers. "And what would you have done if you lived in the 16th century?" I like to ask. "How long could you have survived with your 21stcentury human rights and moral standards?" Throughout the United States, there are numerous places where great Spanish discoveries and Hispanic accomplishments have been hidden right before our eyes. But people need to see them, especially the Black Legend-influ enced, self-loathing Hispanics. America's hidden Hispanic heritage needs to be uprooted and exposed, and through this column, in the next few weeks, I intend to do much more of that. Stay tuned. You may be fascinated by the places and people we will "discover."

#### Catholic group exempt from contraceptives rule

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — A federal judge has granted nearly 200 Catholic employers an injunction to temporarily prevent the U.S. government from forcing them to provide insurance coverage for contraceptives.


The Catholic Benefits Association filed a lawsuit in March alleging that a provision of the Affordable Care Act forced them to violate their religious objections to contraception and abortion-inducing drugs.

On Wednesday, U.S. District Judge David Russell of Oklahoma City granted an injunction that exempts members from any fines or penalties arising from not complying with the provision while their objections are litigated.

The association — which includes archdioceses, an insurance company and a nursing home across almost 2,000 Catholic parishes nationwide — believes in the Catholic teaching that their ministries should include health care to their employees. But members "also believe in the Catholic teaching that any artificial interference with the creation and nurture of new life is wrong," Russell said.



# At retooled Belmont, stars align for Triple Crown

NEW YORK (AP) — Martin Panza celebrated California Chrome's charge to Preakness Stakes victory three weeks ago like most fans at the packed Pimlico Race Course — bumping fists, slapping hands and thinking ahead to Saturday and the possibility of the first Triple Crown winner in 36 years.

And then Belmont Park's director of racing operations thought about everything else: the tens of thousands of additional people who show up for

the Belmont Stakes whenever a horse has a chance at history; the millions more in expected wagers; and the need for more of everything, from seating, concessions to bathrooms, security and about 1,000 additional workers.

Local officials and business leaders celebrated too, seeing the race and the added interest of a Triple Crown contender as a boon of sold-out hotel rooms, dinners out and free publicity, so long as the writers and broadcasters were aware the

track is actually on Long Island, as NBC's Bob Costas noted Wednesday, and not in New York City.

If California Chrome triumphs, it will happen on Panza's turf — or rather, his dirt – at an marquee New Yorkarea event that the track's new management team reimagined earlier this year as a fusion of sports and entertainment worth attending even when the Triple Crown is not on the line.

They have filled the under-

card with high-stakes races, increased the day's total purse to \$8 million — the secondrichest day in American horse racing behind the final slate of the Breeder's Cup - and surrounded the action with music from rapper and actor LL Cool J, former New York Yankees center fielder Bernie Williams and Frank Sinatra Jr. singing "New York, New York."

"For the first year of us doing this, under this new format, it's not going to get any better than this," Panza said in an interview near his track office, which was filled with boxes of Belmont Stakes caps.

"From our end, what we need to do now is observe how the day goes and see what we can do for next year, always thinking that there could be another Triple Crown on the line."

# Duncan, Spurs roll past Heat in Game 1, 110-95

With warmer than 90-degree temperatures at court-level at the AT&T Center, the NBA Finals rematch between Miami and San Antonio began Thursday setting off a firestorm of "beat the Heat" puns nationwide.

The air conditioning failed early, Le-Bron James was carried off late and the Spurs rolled in the fourth quarter at home picking up a 110-95 victory in Game 1.

"It was tough on both teams," said San Antonio head coach Gregg Popovich of the air conditioning failure stemming from a power outage. "They were pretty dead. We tried to get guys in and out. It was really hot out there.

"Hopefully, we can pay our bills."

As those in the audience fanned themselves through the duration of the game, players were affected as well. None suffered more than James, who struggled to stay on the court throughout the entire fourth quarter. First James asked out of the game with 7:31 remaining. He came back three minutes later but lasted just 30 seconds before cramping up after a layup cutting the Spurs' lead to 94-92.

In the final four minutes without James on the floor, San Antonio outscored the Heat 16-3 on its way to the victory. The Spurs are now 6-0 all-time in the first game of the NBA Finals,

ment after the game. "It was the whole left leg, damn near the whole left side. I was losing a lot throughout the game. It was extremely hot in the building and both teams, fans and everybody could feel it."

While James struggled, others excelled in the high temperatures. No one was better than San Antonio forward Tim Duncan, who racked up 21 points on 9-of-10 shooting with 10 rebounds. He became the first player since Wilt Chamberlain in 1972 to score at least 20 while grabbing double-digit rebounds and shooting 90 percent from the floor in a Finals game.

At 38 years old, he also became the oldest player to lead his team in scoring in the championship series since Kareem Abdul-Jabbar (40) in 1987.

"I don't think I've ever played in anything like this since I left the islands," said Duncan of his birthplace, the U.S. Virgin Islands. "It was pretty bad out there. I thought we played through it well. I think it affected both teams. Pop continued to switch guys in and out, keep us as fresh as possible and we finally got to a point where we took care of the ball and we got a chance to make a run and made them pay."

The heat was clearly a factor, but the NBA was unapologetic for not postponing the matchup following the game. NBA president of basketball operations Rod Thorn addressed the issue afterwards claiming the electrical issue which resulted in the broken air conditioning unit wasn't an unplayable situation. "Had the referees felt at any time or had I felt at any time – I was in sitting in the second row midcourt – that the game shouldn't be continued, then they would have come over and said something to me. Never did," Thorn said. "I never said anything to them regarding the fact the game should be canceled. In live sporting events, sometimes things

transpire that you don't expect. Obviously, the conditions were the same for both teams. There wasn't anything that could be done about it. We ascertained that very early."

With James playing just five minutes in the fourth quarter, San Antonio was better than ever. The team made 14 of its 16 attempts in the final period including all six shots from behind the arc. The Spurs outscored Miami 33-12 without James on the floor in the second half.

No longer being blanketed by one of the top defensive players in the league, guard Danny Green finally broke free in the fourth scoring 11 of his 13 total points. Point guard Tony Parker shook off an ankle injury which had his status of playing as questionable and racked up 19 points and eight assists.

Tiago Splitter also scored 14 points improving San Antonio's record to 34-1 when the center scores at least seven.

"I'm just very proud of my team," Parker said. "We kept believing, kept pushing. We know it's not easy.'

With James on the bench, the rest of the "Big Three" was just as absent down the stretch. Center Chris Bosh started the period with his team's first eight points but both he and guard Dwyane Wade were held scoreless after James' injury. Wade and Bosh finished scor-

# Error lifts Texas to win

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) - J.J. Hardy and the Baltimore Orioles were ready to go home at the end of a long trip that ended with their All-Star shortstop's unprecedented three-error game.

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
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

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The bidding has been One Spade on your left, Two Notrump (13-15 points, balanced distribution) on your right, Three Notrump on your left. Which card would you lead in the following four hands?

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1. Six of clubs. The opening lead frequently determines the outcome of a hand. Unfortunately, opening leads are not always clear-cut and often present a scrious challenge.

The leader is normally guided by two factors: the bidding and the hand he is looking at. Later on, after seeing dummy, he is in a much better position to make critical decisions, but at the outset he must, in effect, take a shot in the dark.

Here the best chance of stopping three notrump lies in establishing your clubs. You should be willing to concede the first trick to declarer in the hope that partner will gain the lead early enough to return a club and sink the contract.

The alternative lead of the king of clubs might prove fatal to your cause. If partner started with only two clubs, it would become impossible for you to run that suit, since you have no outside entry card.

2. Jack of hearts. Defense is essentially a partnership project —

without a good suit of his own, the opening leader may decide to try to establish tricks for his partner rather than for himself. Here the heart lead is made in the hope of finding partner — who has virtually all of your side's high-card strength — with length in hearts plus enough side entries to allow him to eventually establish and run the suit.

establish and run the suit. 3. Four of clubs. This offers a better chance than a diamond lead. If partner has either the ace or queen of clubs, you are in business right away, while he would probably need two diamond honors for a diamond lead to prove effective. A club is therefore the better percentage lead.

4. Four of hearts. This is a very close proposition, and a good case can also be made for the queen-of-clubs lead. Sequence leads are usually better than broken-suit leads, for they seldom cost a trick, while leading low from an honor-card holding can hand declarer a trick he could not get otherwise. On the other side of the coin, however, is the matter of timing.

Here, it might take a while to establish two tricks in clubs if the enemy has the A-K of that suit, whereas a heart lead, if successful, may establish the rest of your suit and four tricks — immediately. Either lead can of course succeed or fail; the problem is to estimate which one is more likely to succeed in the long run.

# Kentucky gives Calipari 7-year, \$52.5 million deal

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — Kentucky gave coach John Calipari a new seven-year, \$52.5 million contract that will pay a base package of \$6.5 million next season and \$8 million over each of the final three seasons.

Already one of college basketball's highest-paid coaches, Calipari led the Wildcats to the 2012 NCAA championship and is coming off his third Final Four appearance in five years with Kentucky, a 60-54 title-game loss to Connecticut in April. He has often been rumored as a potential candidate for NBA coaching openings.

Calipari quickly reiterated his happiness with Kentucky, later using social media to state his commitment after Los Angeles fired coach Mike D'Antoni. He continued that theme with his new contract that pays more than most pro coaches.

"I've said over and over that I have the best job in the country," Calipari said in a release Thursday night. "With the continued support from our administration and the greatest, craziest, fans in college basketball, we have accomplished a lot in our five quick years, but we still have lofty goals for the future.

"We want to continue to help young people and their families reach their dreams, while at the same time maintaining our success on the basketball court, in the classroom and in the community."

Besides building a 152-37 record at Kentucky, Calipari has established himself as a master recruiter in landing top-three freshman classes annually. That includes next year's group which figures to make the Wildcats a title contender again, and with this contract the school appears to have locked him in for the long term.

"It has long been our goal over the last three to five years that Cal enjoy this as his final stop in coaching," athletic director Mitch Barnhart said in the release.

## Saunders to coach Timberwolves

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — The Minnesota Timberwolves' best days came with Flip Saunders on the sideline.

Now that the organization is shrouded in uncertainty surrounding the long-term future of star forward Kevin Love, Saunders is returning to the bench to try revive a franchise that hasn't made the playoffs in 10 years.

With the team's coaching search complicated by Love's status, the Timberwolves decided the best course of action was to have Saunders, who was hired last season as president of basketball operations, step in for a second stint as coach until the situation stabilized, two people with knowledge of the situation told The Associated Press on Thursday. The people spoke on condition of anonymity because the team has not officially announced the move. A news conference was scheduled for Friday

Saunders previously coached the Timberwolves from 1995-2005. He won 411 games in 10<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> seasons in Minnesota and guided the Wolves to the only eight playoff appearances in franchise history, including the Western Conference finals in 2004. He has a career record of 638-526 in 16 seasons as an NBA head coach, a career that also includes stops in Detroit and Washington.

Saunders is joining a short list in the NBA of coaches that also have final-say executive authority, one that includes newly hired Stan Van Gundy in Detroit, Doc Rivers with the Los Angeles Clippers and, to a certain extent, Gregg Popovich in San Antonio. Saunders will continue to work closely with GM Milt Newton in the front office while handling coaching duties.

When Rick Adelman retired at the end of the regular season, he did so in part to try to help the Timberwolves move forward with a plan to show Love, a three-time All-Star who can opt out of his contract next summer, that there was a long-term plan in place.

But Love's tenuous situation didn't help the search process, with trade rumors serving as a caution sign for several high-profile candidates.

Saunders was in the market for a coach with extensive head coaching experience, either in the NBA or at a major college program, one that could command the respect of a young locker room and also handle the media scrutiny that comes with the questions surrounding Love. Names like Tom Izzo, Billy Donovan and Fred Hoiberg came

and went without any traction.

The Wolves hosted Memphis coach Dave Joerger for an interview two weekends ago, but Grizzlies owner Robert Pera sweetened his contract to keep him around. Sam Mitchell, Lionel Hollins, Scott Skiles and several others received consideration as well.

Unable to find what they felt was the right fit for a delicate job, Saunders and owner Glen Taylor met this week to reassess the situation. Taylor said when he brought Saunders back as team president that he would not put him back on the bench. He fired Saunders as coach once before, in 2005 when Latrell Sprewell and Sam Cassell, unhappy with their contracts, submarined the follow-up to the team's stirring run to the Western Conference finals.

Saunders was also hopeful that he could find someone other than himself to take over the team. But with Love's status preventing them from pursuing the coaches they felt would fit best, the two decided that Saunders should take over for at least this season if not longer.

The Timberwolves have not given up on convincing Love to play out this season in Minnesota.

# **Bradley Wiggins set to miss Tour de France**

LONDON (AP) — Former Tour de France winner Bradley Wiggins expects to miss this year's race, complaining that his team is focusing on his bitter rival and defending champion Chris Froome's title defense.

Wiggins, who became the first British rider to win cycling's showpiece two years ago, was not selected to compete with Froome at the Criterium du Dauphine, the tuneup event for the Tour.

It was a clear indication that he was unlikely to line up in Yorkshire on July 5 for the Tour's start in England.

Speaking to the BBC Breakfast program on Friday, the 34-yearold multiple Olympic gold medallist voiced his disappointment at being left out by Team

Sky despite a recent surge in form and his victory at the Tour of California last month.

"I am gutted," Wiggins said. "I feel I am in the form I was two years ago. Now if I want to go to the Tour again, the reality is that I might have to go elsewhere. I also understand that cycling is a team sport and it is all about Team Sky winning and Chris is defending champion."

Wiggins' contract with Sky expires at the end of the season.

Although Wiggins told French newspaper L'Equipe there is still a chance he may make the Tour if Froome picks up an injury at the Dauphine from June 8-15, it's unlikely Wiggins will be riding in France this summer.

"Having missed the Tour again this year, I wouldn't like to leave it there," said the former pursuit specialist, who could now turn his focus on competing on the track at the Commonwealth Games in Glasgow, Scotland, in August. "I'd love to go back at some point so there is the chance that I would go back to the Tour next year."

Froome will warm up for the Tour at the Dauphine while Wiggins is still expected to compete at the Tour de Suisse.

Froome, who also won the weeklong Dauphine in France last year as part of his dominant season, will be surrounded by a team made of strong climbers in the mountainous event, including last year's Dauphine runner-up Richie Porte.

IOC to contribute to Munich memorial

MUNICH (AP) — The International Olympic Committee will contribute \$250,000 toward a memorial for the victims of the attack on the Israeli team at the 1972 Munich Games.

The Sueddeutsche Zeitung newspaper reports the IOC, headed by the German Thomas Bach, pledged the contribution toward the \$2.3 million project.

The IOC confirmed the

report when contacted by The Associated Press on Thursday.

The German Olympic Sports Confederation has already pledged \$27,000 for the project. Taxpayers will fund the rest.
