Park if we don't get some donations in the next two to three weeks," Kelly Seales, Pops chairman, said.

Two former COs plead guilty to federal charges

ABILENE, Texas — Two former correctional officers at Big Spring Correctional Center in Big Spring, Texas, have pleaded guilty to federal charges stemming from an investigation after an inmate committed suicide two years

Wednesday, Frederick Hernandez, 45, of Big Spring, appeared before U.S. District Judge Sam R. Cummings and pleaded guilty to one count of making false statements and aiding and abetting. He faces a maximum statutory penalty of five years in federal prison and a \$250,000 fine.

Last Friday, Christopher Moore, 42, of Dallas, pleaded guilty to one count of misprision of a felony. He faces a maximum statutory penalty of three years in federal prison and a \$250,000 fine. Judge Cummings ordered a presen-

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tence investigation report for each defendant with a sentencing date to be set after the completion of those reports.

According to plea documents filed in the case, from Aug. 22-23, 2012, Hernandez and Moore were assigned to the Flight Line Unit in the Special Housing Unit. Hernandez was the officer in charge. Part of their duties included making mandatory 30-minute safety checks of each cell and conducting six mandatory formal inmate counts during a 24-hour period, at 12:01 a.m., 3 a.m., 5 a.m., 10 a.m., 4 p.m. and 10 p.m. Each correctional officer is further required to certify that the mandatory 30-minute safety check of each cell and the mandatory formal inmate counts were made.

An inmate housed in the Flight Line Unit committed suicide during the 8 p.m.,





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

I-20 cleared after firey accident

Parts of Interstate 20 were shut down in Martin County most of Tuesday afternoon after a diesel truck caught fire during a two-vehicle collision.

According to Howard County Volunteer Fire Chief Tommy Sullivan, five volunteer firefighting units from Howard County responded to the call which came in around 1:15 p.m. Also responding were three firefighting units from Martin County and two more from northeast Midland County.

According to DPS, the crash occurred in Martin County on Interstate 20 near mile marker 163. The truck tractor semi-trailer (TTST) carrying diesel had broken down and was parked on the shoulder of I-20 with its reflective markers out to alert other motorists. The truck belongs to Chemoil.

The DPS said a second truck tractor semi-trailer owned by Card Moore Trucking was traveling from behind and "for some unknown reason struck the legally parked TTST," causing it to catch fire. No injuries were reported but Texas Department of Transportation officials closed the west bound lanes and one east bound lane to traffic. Vehicles were rerouted to the service road, causing traffic to back up in that area for some time.

"The heat of the fire melted the top of the tank and exposed all the diesel," Sullivan said. "We had to make a bigger fire before we could put it out. We had to push product out of the tank so we can put foam on top of it to put it out."

Sullivan said firefighters used both foam and water to contain the fire, which was extinguished within the hour. Diesel did leak onto the bar ditch, Sullivan said, so fire fighters created dikes to catch water and foam and keep the leaked diesel from reigniting until environmental crews sarrived. Those crews are expected to remove the soil contaminated by the diesel.

"We had the flames extinguished pretty quick but then we had to finish pulling off all the hot metal and cool it off, and we had to keep blanketing the diesel that was in the bar ditch. Diesel will flash at 110 degrees and with the heat it wouldn't have taken much."

Sullivan said the second TTST truck was carrying glass, which left the roadway blanketed with glass chards.

TxDOT reported the east bound lane was open about 4:30 with one west bound lane open to traffic approximately an hour later. According to the DPS, charges of failure to drive in a single lane will be filed.

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

Obama's new illegal alien dumping grounds

planeloads of illegal aliens were recently shipped to Massachusetts. The first reportedly landed at Hanscom Air

Force Base in Bedford. According to my tipster, approximately 160 illegal immigrants arrived on that flight and stayed nearly a week before being transferred to a Department of Homeland Security site and then released.

The second flight reportedly was diverted from Hanscom to Boston's Logan Airport this past weekend. I am told that both Massachusetts and New Hampshire officials were on hand. I reached out to Hanscom AFB for confirmation, but did not receive a call back by my deadline.

Question: How many other military bases are stealthily being used to redistribute, house, process and release illegal border crossers?

What we do know for sure is that the Obama administration already has converted several other military bases across the country into outposts for tens of thousands of illegal aliens from Central and South America.

San Antonio's Lackland Air Force Base opened its doors as an illegal immigrant camp last month. Port Hueneme Naval Base in Ventura County, Calif., will shelter nearly 600 illegal border-crossing children and teens. The Fort Sill Army post in Lawton, Okla., was ordered on Friday to take in 1,200 illegal aliens despite the objections

of GOP Gov. Mary Fallin, who blasted the White House, saying, "The Obama administration continues to fail in its duty to protect our borders and continues to promote policies that encourage, rather than discourage, illegal immigration."

A makeshift detention center in Nogales, Ariz., is being used as the central clearing station for the latest illegal alien surge. The deluge is a threat to national security, public safety and public health — not to mention a slap in the face to the law-abiding men and women in uniform on those bases and a kick in the teeth to law-abiding people around the world patiently waiting for approval of their visas.

Meanwhile, a law enforcement source in Texas tells me this week that countless illegal aliens are being released into the general public despite testing positive for tuberculosis.

"The feds are putting them on public transportation to God knows where," he said.

Another source, working in the border patrol in south Texas, tells me: "Our station, along with every other station, is flooded with women and small children. One lady yesterday had a baby as young as 8 months. And they're coming over with pink eye and scabies. So getting them medically cleared becomes a priority. They'll be here for almost a week, so we provide them with formula and diapers. We have a catering service contracted to feed them because it's too many for us to feed on our own. And of course, they end up being released because every family housing facility is full. They're supposed to show up for immigration court at a later date, but they don't.'

Same old, same old. I've reported for years on the feds' catch-and-release games and deportation Kabuki. The "notice to appear" letters — known as "run letters" — are a notorious joke in open-borders circles.

The latest "crisis" is a wholly manufactured byproduct of White House administrative amnesties, which are supported by a toxic alliance of ethnic-voteseeking Democrats and cheaplabor-hungry Big Business Republicans. The flood comes just as Obama's DHS announced a two-year extension for beneficiaries of the "Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals" (DACA) program. A whopping 560,000 illegal aliens have been granted amnesty under DACA and also have received employment authorization.

As I've said for two decades, il legal alien amnesties guarantee two things: more illegal immigration and more Democratic voters. Now we have a White House forcing U.S. military bases to provide interminable benefits and services to illegal aliens for political gain, while said White House evades responsibility for allowing military veterans to die waiting for the most basic of medical services.

And where's the GOP "leadership" in this country? Doing the bidding of the amnesty-loving U.S. Chamber of Commerce and demonizing Republican candidates at every level who are sick and tired of giving away the store and the country.

What lurks in a child's online world?

That is the most shocking takeaway from the story of the two 12-yearolds who repeatedly stabbed their friend — nearly to death

– on the imagined orders of a fantasy character?

Is it the preteens' apparent disconnect from the truth of what they were doing? One of the assailants childishly described her actions to police in their comfy Milwaukee suburb as "stabby, stab, stab."

Is it the girls' seeming belief in the reality of a cartoonish character known as Slenderman, a faceless being in a tie, jacket and hat? The girls reportedly found him on a harmless-fun-sounding website called Creepypasta Wiki.

Slenderman resembles the Invisible Man, played with evil lunacy by Claude Rains in a 1933 movie. "Slendy," as his "followers" call him, exists in an online subculture in which fans elaborate on a legend. (His creator, Eric Knudsen, says he's "deeply saddened" that his character inspired this terrible crime.)

Or is the most alarming part of the story that parents in Waukesha had never even heard of Slenderman, much less that this fictional presence had become an obsession of their sixth-graders?

The most jarring item in this

list has to be this last one.

Heartless crimes fueled by delusion are not new. In the '70s, the infamous "Son of Sam" shot and killed six people in New York, he said, on the orders of a neighbor's dog.

From what we know so far in the Wisconsin case, the girls, charged as adults with attempted murder after stabbing their friend 19 times, haven't shown they understand the seriousness of their actions.

One told police in a fairy tale cadence: "The bad part of me wanted her to die. The good part of me wanted her to live."

And as already noted, there isn't anything especially realistic about Slenderman.

He's not so terrifying as the vampire Dracula, who sent the "three sisters" to prey on his victims. And he's less plausible than Bigfoot, the hairy humanoid said to lurk in the woods surrounding every Scout campfire. What makes this case very

modern is that the parents seemed unable to act as intermediaries between their children and their children's darkest fantasies. And how could they when the imaginings were hidden in their kids' online lives?

The fairy tale goblins of yore were passed on through books the parents read — or at least put on their shelves. When the Creature From the Black Lagoon appeared on the television screen the family shared, the parents could say, "He's not real."

In a paper-based past, evidence

of an unhealthy fixation, written or drawn, would be found strewn around a child's bedroom. There would be comic books. Young people might reveal their preoccupation in semi-public phone calls, not messages quickly tapped out and silently sent by

electronic means. I offer no answers here. It's hard to expect parents — busy in their working lives and their own online adventures — to monitor the every interaction of children approaching adolescence. And how many could find these deep cyber-recesses if they wanted to?

Furthermore, how many would have seen danger in a fascination with such a silly character as Slenderman? (Some might have seen value in the creative activities he seemed to spawn.)

As I said, no easy answers here. These days, we are communicating in less physically public ways. Banning teens from participating in the online culture would seem impractical unfair and a handicap to their development.

Perhaps this is just a repeat of those rare but awful crimes involving children in the past, with a 21st-century update. Perhaps. But these girls should be studied carefully.

Obama holds up technical school as model for US

WORCESTER, Mass. (AP) — Saluting graduates as they leave the safety of high school behind, President Barack Obama held up a revitalized technical school in New England on Wednesday as a model for the United States as the nation works to prepare youngsters for a global workforce that's more competitive than

praised students and teachers alike for giving more than just "lip service" to the idea of skills-based education. He said the graduates were finishing senior year knowing how to run a restaurant, fix a computer or manage a household — skills that he said would let them begin their careers right away.

Worcester Tech," the president said.

Sixteen years ago, the Worcester campus was so outdated it was nearly shut down. Obama touted the school's remarkable transformation into a school with a demographic and educational profile that makes it a model of achieve-

"If it can happen in Worcester, it can happen in any place," Obama said.

Obama has been putting a spotlight on his education policies this week, drawing attention to efforts to lower student debt. But he also has been eager to showcase programs that break from the traditional classroom format or that are designed to improve the nation's science and technology workforce.

The Worcester school stands as an example of a triumph against the odds.

Six out of 10 students at the high school are underprivileged and qualify for free or reduced meals; 2 out of 10 have special needs. Yet, two years ago it was one of five schools nationally to win an award for student growth in high poverty areas. Last year, it was one of the Education Department's 286 national blue ribbon schools. And this year, its principal was named the Principal of the Year by the National

Obama reflected on his own struggle to overcome similar obstacles as a youngster growing up in Hawaii, adding that his family at times "had to scrape to get by." But ultimately, Obama said, the support of his teachers, family and community enabled him to finance a good education through grants and student loans.

Association of Secondary School Principals.

"All of this happened because people saw in me something that I didn't always see in myself," Obama said during a commencement ceremony whose festive spirit wasn't dampened by rain that sent family members reaching for their umbrellas.

The rebirth of the school in this city halfway between Boston and Springfield came after the Worcester community decided, with the help of state and federal grants, to build a new, \$90 million school that opened in 2006. The school has built relationships with businesses and universities, including a partnership with the

Tufts School of Veterinary Medicine, that provide students with real-life experiences through internships and cooperative education jobs — an idea that Obama himself has promoted.

Following his address at the school, Obama was to attend a fundraiser for the campaign committee working to elect Democrats to the Senate.

Obama told the graduates that despite At Worcester Technical High School, Obama the cynicism that's emerged in the aftermath of the recession and the winding down of two wars, students at this school and ones like them across the country are showing that the U.S. will not only compete with the rest of the world, but we are going to win."

"We don't settle, we outwork," Obama "I want the entire nation to learn from said. "We out-innovate, we out-hustle the competition. And when we do, nobody can beat us."

Tanishq Abraham has become one of the youngest people to graduate from high school. The Sacramento boy received his diploma at a private ceremony in front of family and friends on Sunday, and even got a congratulatory letter from the White House, KXTV in Sacramento reported.

Tanishq was home-schooled and graduated with a 4.0 GPA. He told KXTV the work wasn't easy, but not that hard either.

"The way my brain works is that when you give me something, information about that topic comes into my mind," he said. "I don't know what it is, but that's how it is for me."

His mom, Taji, said she suspected her son was gifted, but didn't know until the results of an IQ test. Tanishq joined Mensa, a group for people whose IQ is in the top 2 percent of the population, at the age of 4.

So what's next for him?

Tanishq is taking college courses and says he wants to be a scientist, but also president. He has his sights set on medical school at the University of California, Davis, and finding a cure for cancer.

The operation went undiscovered for a year until a bullet exploded in January and blew a hole in the floor just above where two children were sleeping.

The News Tribune reports 27-year-old Cody Hyman and 32-year-old Juliette Parker of Tacoma have been charged with possession of an explosive device, assault and reckless endangerment.

The couple, who now live in Texas, are set to be arraigned June 23 in Tacoma.

Police in Alabama say man tried to arrest mayor

WEAVER, Ala. (AP) — Police in eastern Alabama arrested a man they say impersonated an officer and tried to arrest the mayor.

The Anniston Star reports that police say 59-year-old Bobby Beck showed up at City Hall in Weaver on Tuesday with a badge and a pistol on his belt and said he wanted to talk to Mayor Wayne Willis. When told the mayor wasn't available, he held up a pair of handcuffs and said he'd be back later to arrest him.

He was being held on felony charges of impersonating a peace officer, making a terrorist threat and carrying a pistol without a permit. It wasn't immediately clear if he has a lawyer.

Police Chief Wayne Bush says Beck told police he worked for the FBI and planned to arrest Willis for working part-time as mayor.

State officials remove moose from Boise

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — State wildlife officials say Tuesday afternoon they have tranquilized a moose on the east side of Boise and are moving it to a remote area.

Idaho Department of Fish and Game spokesman Mike Keckler says the 400-pound yearling has been living on the east side of the city but has recently started moving toward downtown.

Keckler says it was a dangerous situation because moose are large animals and that area of the city has a popular path on both sides of the river that draws walkers, runners and bikers.

He says officials had to remove a

moose from the east side of Boise last year but it's not clear if it's the same moose. State Conservation Officer Bill Lon-

don said it was doubtful the moose would return to the city.

Biplane pilot uses fairway as runway in San Diego

SAN DIEGO (AP) — He was using decades-old equipment on a famously tough course, but he hit the center of the fairway.

The pilot of a 1929 biplane with a

sputtering engine and two passengers

aboard made an emergency landing Tuesday on a fairway at Torrey Pines Golf Course in San Diego. The plane sent stunned golfers scrambling, but it landed smoothly,

and no one was injured in the plane or on the ground. The Federal Aviation Administration says investigators examined the

single-engine Travel Air 4000 on the

course and it wasn't damaged.

The pilot's name was not released, and the owner, Daniels Aviation, couldn't be reached for comment.

Torrey Pines is among the nation's most elite public layouts. The seaside course is a PGA Tour stop and the site of Tiger Woods' 2008 US Open victory.

Radio-controlled copter lost on stadium roof

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Charlie Brown has his kite-eating tree, but one unidentified man says the Dallas Cowboys' stadium in Arlington ate his radio-controlled helicopter.

The man, who posted a video from his small remote-controlled, four-rotor helicopter on YouTube, says he lost his radio link with his aircraft Tuesday and the copter landed on the stadium roof. In his video, he said stadium security officers wouldn't let him retrieve the aircraft.

Dallas Cowboys spokesman Brett

Dallas Cowboys spokesman Brett Daniels says the copter has been found and retrieved and will be returned to its owner.

A Federal Aviation Administration statement says investigators will look into whether any FAA regulations regarding the use of model aircraft were violated.

Why do toadlets cross the road? To get to the woods on the other side — where they will live, eat mosquitoes and grow up to be full-sized American toads (bufo Americanus). After a couple of years, they'll make the reverse trek as adults — unless they get squashed by a car.

That's where the Toad Detour comes in.

The Schuylkill Center for Environmental Education sets up a roadblock each year in the Roxborough neighborhood, rerouting cars so the amphibians can cross the two-lane street without fear of, um, croaking.

The cycle starts in early spring when adult toads, which can fit in the palm of your hand, emerge from the woods to breed. They cross Port Royal Avenue, scale a 10-foot-high embankment and then travel down a densely vegetated hill to mate in the abandoned Upper Roxborough Reservoir. Their offspring make the journey in reverse about six weeks later.

So many baby toads were on the move Monday evening it looked like the road's muddy shoulder was alive. Volunteers scooped them up in plastic cups and deposited them on the habitat side of the street.

"I didn't expect at all that there were going to be so many of them in one area," said 17-year-old Kaitlyn Hunt.

Poll: Political polarization broader than ever before, extends far beyond the voting booth

WASHINGTON (AP) — Political polarization in America has broken out of the voting booth.

A new survey from the Pew Research Center finds Americans are divided by ideology and partisanship not only when they cast ballots, but also in choosing where to live, where to get their news and with whom to

And peaceful coexistence is increasingly difficult.

According to the poll, the share of Americans who hold across-theboard conservative or liberal views has doubled in the last decade, from 10 percent in 2004 to 21 percent today. Only 39 percent of Americans have an even mix of liberal and conservative positions, down from 49 percent 10 years ago.

The numbers of ideological purists are larger among the politically engaged than the general public, suggesting the ideological stalemates that have become more common in Washington and statehouses around the country are likely to continue. A third of those who say they regularly vote in primaries have all-or-nothing ideological views, as do 41 percent who say they have donated money to a campaign.

After 2 votes, Congress hopes to send veterans' health care bill to White House

WASHINGTON (AP) — After two overwhelming votes in two days, members of Congress say they are confident they can agree on a bill to improve veterans' health care and send it to the president's desk by the end of the month. The Senate easily approved a bill

Wednesday to help shorten wait times for thousands of military veterans seeking medical care, a day after the House unanimously adopted a similar measure.

The Senate bill would authorize about \$35 billion over three years to pay for outside care for veterans, as well as hire hundreds of doctors and nurses and lease 26 new health facilities in 17 states and Puerto Rico. The House would spend about \$620 million over the same period.

Just three lawmakers — all Republican senators — voted against the veterans measures, compared with 519 lawmakers who voted in favor.

Opponents said the Senate bill was a "blank check" to spend billions of dollars with little or no way to rein it

For White House, Cantor's defeat eliminates an irritant but brings little joy

WASHINGTON (AP) — For years, the White House saw House Majority Leader Eric Cantor as a chief driver of Republicans' staunch opposition to nearly all of President Barack

Obama's agenda. Now, Cantor's stunning primary loss seems likely to make politics even more difficult for

Rather than opening a pathway for the president, Cantor's defeat could push Republicans more to the right and harden the House GOP's hostility toward the White House, virtually dooming Obama's efforts to pass a legacy-building immigration bill or other major legislation.

Robert Gibbs, a longtime Obama adviser, said any glee at the White House over Cantor's defeat was "quickly replaced by the reality that this is the end of anything productive getting done legislatively in Congress either this year or maybe for the next several years." Cantor, the No. 2 Republican in the

House, was soundly defeated by his tea party-backed opponent, a littleknown economics professor named David Brat, in Virginia's GOP primary Tuesday. Despite being massively outspent by Cantor, Brat rode a wave of public anger over calls for more lenient immigration laws, reducing the prospects that already reluctant House Republicans might take up a bill this year.

The day after his defeat, Cantor announced he would serve out his term but resign his leadership post this summer, sparking a flurry of maneuvering among GOP lawmakers eager to take his spot.

Al-Qaida-inspired group vows to march on to Baghdad after seizing 2 key cities in Iraq

BAGHDAD (AP) — The al-Qaidainspired group that led the charge in capturing two key Sunni-dominated cities in Iraq this week vowed Thursday to march on to Baghdad, raising fears about the Shiite-led government's ability to slow the assault following the insurgents' lightning gains.

Fighters from the militant group known as the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant on Wednesday took Saddam Hussein's hometown of Tikrit, as soldiers and security forces abandoned their posts and yielded ground once controlled by U.S. forces. That seizure followed the capture of

much of Mosul, Iraq's second-largest city, the previous day. The group and its allies among local tribesmen also hold the city of Fallujah and other pockets of the Sunni-dominated Anbar province to the west of Baghdad.

A spokesman for the Islamic State said the group has old scores to settle with Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki's government in Baghdad. The Iraqi leader, a Shiite, is trying to hold onto power after indecisive elections in April.

Officials look at work commute in accident that injured Tracy Morgan; driver pleads not guilty NEW BRUNSWICK, N.J. (AP) — Ac-

cident investigators are looking into what role a truck driver's commute

played in the fatal New Jersey Turnpike crash that also injured comedian Tracy Morgan.

Wal-Mart driver Kevin Roper, who pleaded not guilty to death by auto and assault by auto charges on Wednesday, lived in Georgia, but his job was based in Delaware, said National Transportation Safety Board spokeswoman Kelly Nantel.

A criminal complaint alleges that the 35-year-old Roper, of Jonesboro, Georgia, hadn't slept for more than 24 hours before the accident when he allegedly swerved to avoid slowed traffic on the turnpike and plowed into Morgan's limo early Saturday. Wal-Mart has not explained what

Roper's driving route was. The company has said it believes he was in compliance with federal safety regu-

Roper's bail was kept at \$50,000. Roper and his attorney, David Glassman, refused to answer reporters' questions after the hearing about whether Roper was the author of tweets from a Twitter account bearing his name and featuring his picture and calling reports of his not having slept for 24 hours before the accident "complete

OSCE chief visits Ukraine refugees in Russia, calls for fighting to stop MOSCOW (AP) — The secretary-

general of the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe is visiting a camp in Russia for refugees from the conflict in Ukraine's east and calling for the fighting to stop. According to the Interfax news agen-

cy, Lamberto Zannier said Thursday that the conflict in the east "is craziness which must be stopped.' Zannier's appearance before the ref-

ugees at a holiday complex in Dmitriadovka, about 40 kilometers (25 miles) from the Ukrainian border, underlined the prominent role being played by the OSCE in the Ukraine crisis. Russia, which Kiev and the West allege has fomented the separatist unrest in the east, has spoken strongly in support of an OSCE-proposed "road map" for ending the conflict.

Russia says some 30,000 people have fled the fighting.

Subway strike in Sao Paulo averted on eve of World Cup as Rio airport workers walk off job SAO PAULO (AP) – A subway

strike in Sao Paulo that threatened to disrupt the opening of the World Cup was averted Wednesday night even as airport workers in Rio de Janeiro declared a 24-hour work stoppage in the main destination for soccer fans traveling to Brazil. Some 1,500 subway workers in Sao

Paulo voted against going back on strike in a pay dispute. They had suspended the walkout Monday amid a popular backlash and government pressure to end the transportation chaos in Brazil's biggest city. "We thought that right now it's

better to wait," union president Altino Prazeres said, but added that he wouldn't rule out resuming the strike sometime during the monthlong soccer tournament. "We get the feeling that maybe we aren't as prepared for a full confrontation with police on the day the World Cup starts." The union said its members would

hold a march Thursday morning demanding that 42 workers fired during the five-day work stoppage are World Cup organizers are counting

on Sao Paulo's subway system to carry tens of thousands of fans Thursday to Itaquerao stadium, where Brazil will play Croatia in the tournament's first game far from the hotel areas where most tourists are staying.

Texas' Perry refers to alcoholism to explain view of homosexuality SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Texas

Gov. Rick Perry, during a visit that focused primarily on economic issues, drew on a reference to alcoholism to explain his view of homosexuality. Perry's comments to the Common-

wealth Club of California came after Texas' Republican Convention on Saturday sanctioned platform language allowing Texans to seek voluntary counseling to "cure" being gay. The San Francisco Chronicle re-

ports that in response to a question about it, Perry said he did not know whether the therapy worked. Perry, a former and potential future

GOP presidential candidate, was then asked whether he believed homosexuality was a disorder.

The paper says that the governor responded that "whether or not you feel compelled to follow a particular lifestyle or not, you have the ability to decide not to do that."

Lawyers say General Motors wants to use bankruptcy as shield from wrongful death lawsuit

DETROIT (AP) — Lawyers for a Georgia family that is trying to reopen a wrongful death lawsuit against General Motors say the company is trying to move the case to federal court so it can use bankruptcy as a shield from the claim.

The lawyers, Lance Cooper and Jere Beasley, said Wednesday in a statement that GM's court filings run counter to a promise made by GM CEO Mary Barra to fairly compensate families of people killed or those injured in crashes caused by defective ignition switches.

GM spokesman Greg Martin called the company's filings procedural.

A federal bankruptcy judge in New York ruled in 2009 that the new GM is shielded from claims stemming from cars made before the company emerged from bankruptcy protection. Instead, the claims go against the old GM, which has limited assets. The judge now is being asked to decide if he will allow claims against the new company.

Cooper and Beasley say moving the case to federal court would allow the company to use the bankruptcy to send claims to the old GM.

Bush Sr. to celebrate 90th birthday with parachute jump

KENNEBUNKPORT, Maine (AP) — Former President George H.W. Bush can no longer use his legs, but he isn't letting that stop him from keeping a vow he made five years ago: to jump from an aircraft on his 90th birthday, which is Thursday.

"It's a wonderful day in Maine — in fact, nice enough for a parachute jump," the nation's 41st president announced on Twitter. Bush intends to jump

from a helicopter with a retired member of the Golden Knights,

the Army's parachute team, near his summer home on the Maine coast, spokesman Jim McGrath said.

The announcement was kept secret until the last minute, partly to give Bush himself the option of bagging it. The forecast Thursday called

showers across southern Maine.

McGrath said Bush likes both a surprise and an adrenaline rush. "It's vintage George

Bush," he said. "It's that passion for life. It's wanting to set a goal, wanting to achieve it. I'm sure part of it is sending a message to others that even in your retirement years you can still find challenges." The first time Bush

jumped from an airplane was when his plane was shot down in World War II over the Pacific. Later, he decided to jump from a plane of his own accord and marked his 75th, 80th and 85th birthdays by skydiving.

He said on his 85th birthday that he'd like to do it again on his 90th. Thursday's jump

would be his eighth. Other birthday festivi-

for clouds and scattered ties included a private dinner with more than 200 relatives and friends, including some from his White House days: press secretary Marlin Fitzwater, White House counsel Boyden Gray and political director Ron Kaufman, McGrath said. The event has been held on the home court of the Texas Longhorns.

The council also voted to create competitive cheerleading as a pilot program in 2015-16. Any continuation of the pilot program will require another vote.

A UIL committee approved a pilot program that would give district champions in Class 6A, the state's highest classification, a home game in the first round of the playoffs. The plan would be in effect for 2015.

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Sterling, NBA headed for trial over sale of team

LOS ANGELES (AP) – A trial will be held next month to determine whether Donald Sterling, who opposes his estranged wife's planned sale of the Los Angeles Clippers, was properly removed as an administrator for the family trust that owns the team.

A probate court judge in Los Angeles Wednesday denied Shelly Sterling's urgent request to confirm her authority as sole administrator of The Sterling Family Trust so that she can unilaterally proceed with a \$2 billion sale of the team to former Microsoft CEO Steve Ballmer. Instead, the judge agreed to an expedited hearing because of looming sales dead-

The development is the latest in a legal tugof-war following the NBA's decision to ban Donald Sterling for life after racist remarks to a girlfriend were recorded and publicized. Donald Sterling is fighting the decision and suing the league for \$1 billion. The league has con-

tended the comments were bad for business and damaged both the Clippers and the NBA. The four-day trial was

granted exceptionally quickly and will begin July 7. The deadline for the sale is July 15, which also is the date the NBA's owners hope to vote on whether they

will approve the sale.

Court filings Wednesday indicated the NBA has set a hard deadline of Sept. 15. If the sale isn't completed then, the league will undertake proceedings to seize and sell the team on its own.

Donald Sterling's lawyer, Bobby Samini, left the courthouse without comment after a clerk announced the trial schedule. Neither Sterling was present.

"I just want to resolve this as quickly as possible," NBA Commissioner Adam Silver told The Associated Press on Wednesday in Miami at an NBA Cares event.

The crux of the case will center on the question of whether the 80-year-old Donald Sterling is mentally competent to be a co-trustee of The Sterling Family Trust, which gives him the authority to determine the team's future. According to the trust's terms, he can be ruled "mentally incapacitated" after being evaluated by two doctors, said Pierce O'Donnell, Shelly Sterling's attor-

Shelly Sterling activated that clause in negotiating what would be a record-breaking deal with Ballmer as sole trustee. But Donald Sterling challenged the removal in a letter sent Monday to his wife's attorney said "any attempt to remove me as

a Trustee of the Sterling Trust is invalid and illegal. Furthermore, any assertion that I am 'incapacitated'... is false and without merit."

According to court documents, two doctors examined Donald Sterling in May and concluded that he suffers from "mild cognitive impairment consistent with early Alzheimer's Disease" or some other forms of brain disease after examining brain scans and having him undergo other tests.

Sterling voluntarily went to the doctors at the request of his wife, according to a person with knowledge of the proceedings who spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to discuss the details pub-

A third doctor reviewed the two doctors' findings as well as Sterling's brain scans and concurred with their conclusions that he "lacks the capacity to function as trustee.'

Donald Sterling's attorney, Maxwell Blecher, contested the doctors' findings in remarks Tuesday to The Associated Press.

"Anybody at his age level on a brain scan would probably show some impairment. But that doesn't mean you forget where your car keys are and you're incompetent,"
