

# Rains Hit Seven-Inch Mark at Sunnyside

Dollars in the form of raindrops pelted Castro County during the week as steady, soft but persistent showers blanketed croplands with 2.8 to seven inches of moisture.

The million-dollar showers enabled farmers to shut down their irrigation wells and let nature take its course. The rains couldn't have come at a better time

for the grain sorghum crop, most farmers agreed. But as the rainfall amount climbed to near-record August levels Tuesday, farmers with cotton surveyed the gray, drippy skies and said they'd like to see a stop to it.

A break came Tuesday night and is expected to let the soil dry a bit, but the forecast is for more rain during the next five days. Two high pressure systems in Nebraska and Central Texas are expected to join forces with a low pressure system now moving through Arizona and bring more moisture Friday and Saturday as the surprising "rain belt" tends to regenerate itself. The rains covered the entire

Panhandle and southeastern New Mexico, releasing the heaviest August moisture in recorded history in many areas, forcing the closure of several farm-to-market roads and building to flood level in parts of New Mexico.

Official totals in Dimmitt, recorded by US Weather Observer Howard Cook, are 4.68 inches since last Thursday. Cook's gauge caught .74 of an inch Thursday, a trace Friday, .53 Saturday, .27 on Sunday, 1.25 Monday, and 1.86 Tuesday, with the rainfall letting up Tuesday night.

Temperatures dropped to below normal levels for August as the rains rushed the fall weather. Low for the week was 50 degrees, Cook said. High was 92 last Thursday before the rains started.

Wettest area in the county is Sunnyside, where farmers have recorded as much as seven inches of rain since last Thursday. J. L. Moore at Sunnyside Grain & Supply said rainfall in the community has ranged from 5 1/2 inches up, with Milburn Hayden receiving 5.80 inches and R. B. Hayden on the draw recording an even 7.00 inches.

The rains tapered toward Hart — but not much. News Correspondent Myrt Loman, whose husband H. E. is the US Weather Bureau observer for Hart, said the official recording there is 5.81 inches since last Thursday and 8.26 for the month so far.

At Nazareth, Joe Lange of Dimmitt Wheat Growers had measured 5.70 inches on his home gauge up to Wednesday morning for an average of almost an inch a day since the rains started.

To the north, the rainfall eased up. Bill Simpson of Jumbo reported only a trace until Saturday and 3.25 inches until the rainfall stopped Tuesday night.

At Easter, L. G. Edwards at the Easter Store reported approximately four inches since last Thursday.

Lowest weekly total in the county, though, was reported by Dale Snyder at the Tam Anne Gin 12 miles west of Dimmitt. He said the rains skipped his area Thursday and Saturday, and that 2.80 inches have fallen during the week there.

From Bethel, Mrs. Charles Wales reported 4.00 inches since Sunday, with none before then. "And we're about ready for it to stop," she said.

Fred Kuntz at Flag Fertilizer Co. measured 4.75 inches during the past seven days, and Johnny Martin of Big Square reported he had received "at least 4 1/2 inches."

So the county's trend has been good rains in the north, better rains in the west and southwest, shoe-top downpours in the east, and a deluge in the south around Sunnyside.

The big celebration is over, and I imagine everybody is proud that it is, but without exception everyone seemed to enjoy their part in the promotion and staging of the pageant and other jubilee (Continued on Page 14)

### Dimmitt Postmaster Dies; Last Rites Conducted Friday

Funeral services were held at 3 p.m. Friday for Dimmitt Postmaster Ernest L. Davis, 54, who died Aug. 17 within three hours after appearing in the final performance of the Castro County Diamond Jubilee pageant.

Death came from an apparent heart attack during an after-show party for members of the cast. In the outdoor pageant, Mr. Davis had performed in a picnic scene depicting the 1890s.

Services were conducted in Bedford Street Church of Christ by Bill Brown of Lubbock, assisted by Rev. Frank Pollard of First Baptist Church.

Masonic rites and American Legion military honors, including a 21-gun salute, were performed at graveside. Burial was in Dimmitt Memorial Gardens under Lemons Funeral Home direction. Born Dec. 10, 1911, in Olustee, Okla., Mr. Davis moved to Texas with his family in 1930. He farmed near Hale Center and Plainview before moving to Castro County in 1955, when he bought a farm at Bethel. After a heart attack, he leased out his farm in 1961 when he received the temporary appointment as Dimmitt Postmaster. His appointment was made permanent by President John F. Kennedy in 1963.

His farming career had been interrupted by World War II, during which he served two years in the Pacific with the US Navy and took part in the battles of Saipan, Tinian and Guam. He was awarded the Bronze Star Medal.

At the time of his death, Mr. Davis was president of the 18th District Postmasters and Supervisors Association, member and former tail-twister of the Dimmitt Lions Club, member of the Free and Accepted Masons of Texas as

a 32nd degree Mason, adjutant of the Greer H. Estes American Legion Post 445, and member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 8056.

He is survived by his wife, Paulene; two daughters, Linda, a sophomore at Baylor University, and Elaine, a Dimmitt High School junior; his mother, Mrs. Nealy Davis of Hale Center; and a brother, Wesley, also of Hale Center.

Active pallbearers were Jack Eason of Hale Center, Joe Smith, C. L. Barlowe, Carl King, Joe Weatherford, John Hardy Wood, Raymond Hance and Ray Robertson.

Six others served as honorary pallbearers. They were Marvin Bridges of Hale Center, Joe Temple of Earth, Harmon White of Cotton Center, Nolan Grady of Hecroft, Donald B. Hooten and Gene Broadstreet.

### ASC Mail Balloting Starts

Castro County's farmers have received ballots and will vote during the next two weeks for community ASC committee members.

Jim Elder, chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said mail ballots have been sent to each known eligible voter. The ballots may be mailed back or returned to the county ASC office anytime before Sept. 7, and will be tabulated publicly by the county committee Sept. 9 at 9 a.m.

"In case eligible voters fail to receive a ballot through the mail, they may be obtained at the county ASC office," Elder said. "Generally, a farm owner, tenant, or sharecropper is eligible to vote if he is eligible to take part in one or more of the programs administered by the ASC committees."

Whether they like it or not, Dimmitt and Hart youngsters will start a new school year Monday morning.

Nazareth students will get an extra three days' reprieve, not starting classes until next Thursday.

Bells heralding the end of summer and the start of the busy 1966-67 school year will ring at 8:30 a.m. Monday at Dimmitt and Hart public schools.

Registration is now underway in most county schools and will end Friday afternoon in all of them.

At Dimmitt High School, new students will register all day Friday at the principal's office. Pre-enrolled students have been registering and paying their fees this week.

Supt. Paul Hilburn emphasized that all Dimmitt students should be registered Friday because Monday will be a class day and shouldn't be used for enrollment.

At Dimmitt Junior High School, seventh and eighth graders started enrolling last Thursday and are to finish tomorrow. Enrollment fee is \$3 per student, and lunch tickets, snack bar tickets and school insurance may also be purchased during registration. Eighth graders who will take typing must pay a fee of \$1.50 per semester at the time of enrollment, according to DJHS Principal Bill Reisdorph.

All Dimmitt elementary pupils, including new students, are enrolling this week at North and South Elementary Schools. Offices are open from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., and registration will close Friday. Pupils may pay fees, buy lunchroom tickets and pay insurance fees at the time of enrollment.

In Hart, all grades will register today and Friday, Supt. Andy Gardenhire said.

First graders will register today from 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at the elementary school. Second through eighth grades will enroll

Friday from 8:30 to 12 noon. All Hart High School students will register today at the principal's office. Seniors will enroll

from 8:30 to 10 a.m.; juniors from 10 to 11:30; sophomores from 1 to 2:30; and freshmen from 2:30 to 4.



## H-D NOTES



It sure is good to be home again. Last week I was at A&M University at New Agents' Training. The humidity there made me like Castro County even more than I did when I left. However, I did get a lot of good information to help me in my work. Next week both Mr. Hottel, the County Agent, and I will be at A&M for our State Staff Conference.

Many of you college bound girls are very busy now getting your wardrobes ready. Here are some tips for you girls on care of your wardrobes. You last minute shoppers will want to make sure a garment or material has been pre-shrunk or stabilized before buying it. Also, check the belt when buying dresses. Some expensive garments may have inexpensive paper-backed belts that are not durable.

After you have purchased a garment, keep the hangtags. They contain important cleaning information that will help you and your cleaner.

It's a good idea to file the hangtags at your dorm for handy reference. Besides the information included on the labels, here are some other clothing care tips.

1. Don't leave stains in any fabric too long, or they will set and become permanent. Blot away as much of the stain as possible, for rubbing will spread the stain and may damage surface fibers - especially silk.

2. If you use a spot remover, test on a hidden seam first. Some spot removers will affect a variety of fabrics and dyes.

3. Avoid pressing a garment in which there are spots or perspiration salts or body oils.

4. Have your clothing cleaned regularly. Abrasion from wear and dirt will wear out your clothes. Professional cleaning will restore the fabrics to their original beauty.

5. Rotate your wardrobe. Clothing, like people, needs a rest and fresh air. If any of you girls or other interested ladies would like a bulletin on stain removal come by the office and my secretary, Mrs. Hance, or I will give you one.

Now that I've talked particularly to the college girls, I have some tips for the high schoolers. However, this is good information for all girls and women.

High school coeds this summer are selecting back-to-school clothes in smart, snappy styles.

Most fashion fabrics are washable. Many jackets, skirts, shirts, blouses and slacks also feature a durable press finish. When combined with washability, this makes 'extended-life' garments for attention-prone girls.

A wardrobe of blouses and shirts is essential to any teenager. These mix and match colorfully with companion skirts, suits, shorts and slacks sets to give great fashion variety to year-round school wear.

Blouses and shirts come in cotton, broadcloths and lawns; also in heavier textures and weights of fiber combinations. Design highlights are the small-figured granny styles, tiny prints, mini-figures, multi-florals and Victorian motifs in a full range of colors.

Knits are still popular with high schoolers who wash and wear them to all types of activities - from classroom to country dances to Saturday games. Favored knits include A-line jumpers, poor-boy sweater and short-skirt sets, slacks sets, lightweight jacket and toppers, full-length stretch hose, and textured hosiery.

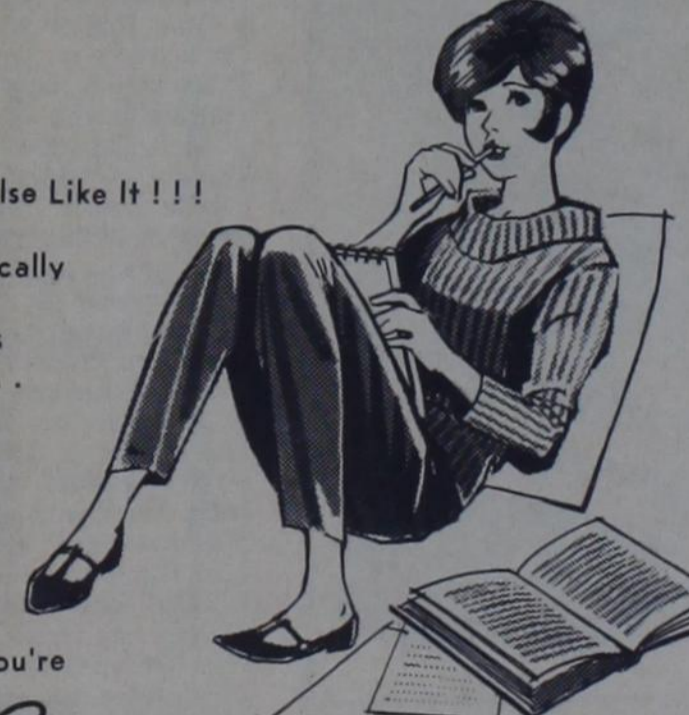

# Farmers Union Head Asks For Tighter Grain Market

Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman of Waco urged the Dept. of Agriculture Tuesday to "hold the line on any expansion of feed grain acreage until farmers are receiving 100 percent of parity prices."

Speaking in Lubbock to Farmers Union leaders from 12 South Plains counties, Naman said, "It is inconceivable to think that this administration, which has pledged itself to continue efforts toward assuring farmers parity prices would even entertain the thought of nullifying feed grain price gains by relaxing incentives for compliance with the program or otherwise permitting additional acreage within the program."

"Farmers are just now beginning to reap the benefits from the

sacrifices that they made by cutting production to bring supply in line with demand," he said. All taxpayers are grateful that the wasteful and costly oversupply of grain has now been brought to a manageable level. Nobody stands to gain from a return to a period of overproduction except those who have empty warehouses or who want to buy at low prices.

"Central Texas farmers who are participating in the feed grain program are now harvesting a crop and selling it on a market, which, with the price support payments, is still returning them only about 85 percent of parity. While at the same time all of their costs are 20 to 25 percent higher than the 1947-49 period when they received parity prices.

## Walter Rogers' NEWSLETTER WASHINGTON

Dear Fellow Texan:

The Judiciary can correct improper actions of the Legislature, for such is the proper role of the Judiciary in our tripartite system of Government. But to restrain a committee of Congress from meeting at all, from taking any action, is an outrageous assault upon the Congress, the people's branch, and upon the very structure of our Federal system.

Yet, this was the action threatened when a Federal judge in Washington granted a temporary restraining order against a hearing set by the House Committee on Un-American Activities to uncover the persons and their motives involved in "overt acts" against the U. S. war effort in Viet Nam. The injunction was thrown out by a three-judge appeal panel just in time for the hearing to begin, thus averting for the time being a certain showdown with Congress as to the proper roles of the two branches.

I hope you believe as I do, that your conviction is as strong as mine, that the Congress of the United States is the cornerstone branch of our governmental system. Those who serve in the Congress are the direct representatives of the people of this country, and an attack upon the exercise of Congressional functions, assails the people themselves. The separation of powers of the Legislative, Executive, and Judicial branches of the Government is delicate and subtle; many of us believe that the Constitutional powers of Congress have been repeatedly battled against these intrusions. No threatened assault, however, has been as blatantly aimed at the heart of Congress' right to act as was the ill-advised (and promptly set aside) ruling by the Federal judge in the instance of the hearing scheduled by the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

In 1867, Chief Justice Chase wrote these words in the Supreme Court decision in State of Mississippi v. Johnson, turning aside an application for an injunction to forbid President Andrew Johnson from enforcing the Reconstruction Acts: "The Congress is the legislative department of the government; the President is the executive department. Neither can be restrained in its action by the judicial department; though the acts of both, when performed, are, in proper cases, subject to its cognizance." After they are performed, then the acts of the President and Congress are in proper cases subject to judicial review and disallowance. The separation of powers set forth by Chief Justice Chase has never been denied by a subsequent court decision.

It is important to note that while the courts do not have the power to curb — before the fact — the actions of the President or Congress, the courts do have the power to nullify their actions. Congress, however, possesses no such power in relation to the Judiciary; it cannot nullify the actions of the Supreme Court. I have long held that Congress, as the body representing the people and their wishes, should be empowered to overturn a decision of the Supreme Court it finds to be against the interests of the people. In this Congress, as in past Congresses, I have introduced an amendment to the Constitution to accomplish this end, to permit the House and Senate, by two-thirds votes, to nullify decisions of the Supreme Court. The courts have the power of nullification and one Federal judge, at least, appears to favor a startling new (and, in my view, unconstitutional) doctrine that might be termed "advance nullification."

By the way, I am in full support of the efforts by the House Committee on Un-American Activities to strip the veil of mystery from those persons who oppose efforts of their country in Viet Nam by pursuing tactics and methods giving aid and comfort to our Communist enemies.







The 18th District hopeful was on a campaign swing that included speeches in Amarillo and Hereford and an appearance in the Dimmitt Rodeo Parade.

to spiraling college costs is tax concessions for the parents of college students.

He said he felt the tax relief is necessary "because of the present inflationary trends."

The Pampa rancher said he also endorses the Human Investment Bill to allow industries a tax reduction if they train unskilled workers.

"The bill will encourage industry to expand its training programs, which they can do so much more efficiently than government," he said.

Price called for increased teachers' salaries through reduced federal taxes "to leave more money in local areas to be spent by local officials."

Later the same day, speaking at a crop and cattle clinic in Hereford, Price attacked a recent Agriculture Dept. increase in US sugar imports.

"We could be growing this sugar right here in our area," he said.

by some congressmen for an explanation of why the Johnson administration has allowed a flood of foreign molasses to come into the United States, injuring the market of sugar beet producers," he said.

He also urged that producers' organizations and others directly involved take action to promote and develop markets for Panhandle agricultural products. "I am opposed to the administration's proposal to assess each cotton grower \$1 per bale to finance research and promotion," he said. 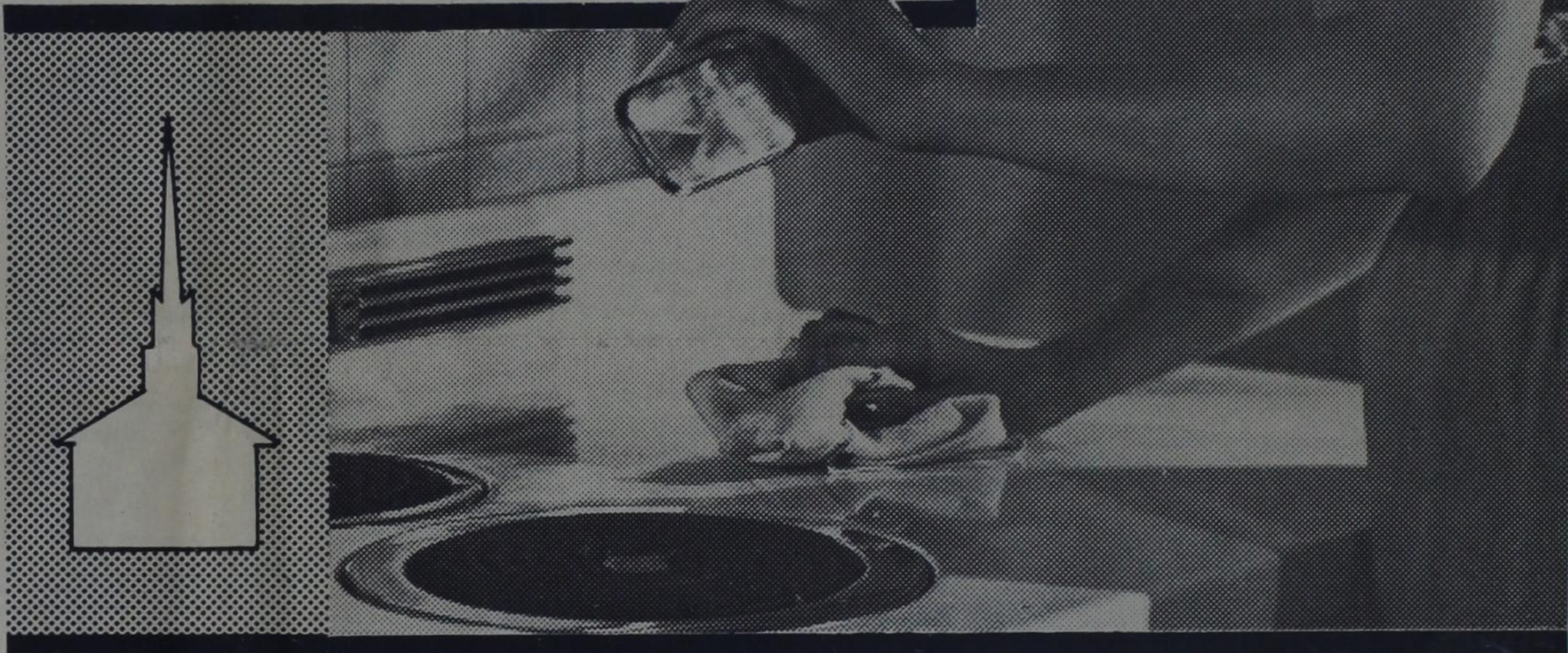

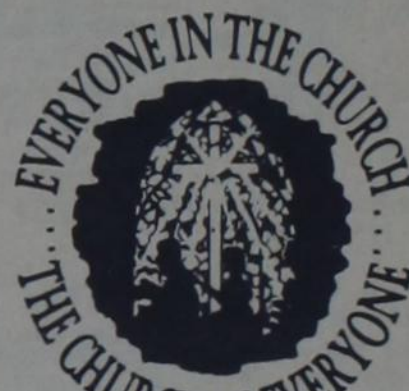

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

by Vern Sanford

Heinous, inhuman, unthinkable crimes — such as those that have left a trail of blood across Texas — must be stopped, say state officials.

Gov. John Connally and Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr both have strongly recommended changes in Texas' criminal laws.

Their proposals are the result of three terrible incidents — all committed over a period of two weeks. First, the sniping episode on the University of Texas campus during which Charles J. Whitman deliberately killed 16 innocent persons and wounded three dozen more; then the malicious murder of a watchman in Roscoe, Texas, by a West Texas teenager; and finally, the grotesque murder of three youngsters in Fort Worth.

Connally said he would ask the Legislature for a law requiring a compulsory life sentence for anyone who commits murder, then is found not guilty because of insanity.

Carr concurred — adding that he plans to appear personally before the Texas House committee on revisions of the code of criminal procedure in January.

Meanwhile, the attorney general has asked the governor to appoint a blue ribbon citizens committee to draft legislation for tougher laws and stronger penalties.

Up for study are: Stiffer penalties for crimes of violence.

Stiffer penalties for sex crimes. Clarification of laws dealing with carrying arms in public.

More effective methods of confining those who use insanity as a defense for crimes.

Both Connally and Carr made it clear they are firmly opposed to stringent laws regulating the sale of firearms.

**DRAFT CALL INCREASES** — Texas' draft call for October is the largest since May, 1953, when the Korean war ended.

State quota for October is 2,671, compared to 3,823 at close of the fighting in Korea, according to State Selective Service Director Col. Morris S. Schwartz.

September quota also is up — from 1,585 to 1,890. National call is for 46,200.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL ULES** — State Supreme Court chief justice may assign retired appellate court judges to duty on courts of civil appeals in case of vacancy or disqualification, Attorney General Carr has ruled. Assignment would be terminated by return to duty of regular judge.

In other opinions, Carr concluded that:

Alien employees of Texas colleges, their husbands, wives and children, are entitled to resident tuition rates in all state institutions of higher education.

Auto certificates of title laws do not permit creation of a joint estate with rights of survivorship out of community property.

Victoria County school superintendent has general supervision over independent school districts of less than 500 scholastics in county.

No credit union may serve as a depository for another credit union.

**WATER SPORT RECORDS** — The 1966 summer vacation season seems destined to go into the records as setting a new high for water recreational deaths and for establishing an amazing boating-skiing safety mark.

In a two-week study by the Parks and Wildlife Department, it was pointed out that during that period, 14 persons drowned in Texas, but none was a result of boating or skiing. Nine of the deaths were attributed to bathing accidents, and four were blamed on fishing.

Death toll for the season was increased to 181 and the total for the entire summer of 1965 was 200.

So, with a month of vacation time left, the department figures this year's death count will surpass last year's by a substantial margin.

A spokesman for the department said that the new law passed by the last Legislature had cut boating-skiing accidents.

Measures to enforce life-preserver requirement and other phases of the safety law helped cut the accident rate.

**COTTON DEADLINE EXTENDED** — Cotton farmers in Cameron, Willacy and southern portions of Hidalgo and Starr Counties have been given another 30 days — until September 30, midnight — to gather crops under the Pink Bollworm Control Program.

State Agriculture Commissioner John C. White extended the deadline after conferences with the U. S. and Mexican Departments of Agriculture and Pink Bollworm Advisory Committee concerning late and slow harvest.

White pointed out that only 26,858 bales had been ginned in the Zone 1 control area by August 7, compared with 177,426 by that same date last year.

Delayed spring plantings due to bad weather and adverse growing prompted the extension.

**ELECTION LAW CHANGES** — An election law committee, headed by Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, has named a subcommittee to meet September 29 and October 13 to study recommendations made to date. Afterwards the full committee will hold public hearings.

Texasians will have an opportunity to vote on one election law change in November. Already on the November ballot is a constitutional amendment calling for annual voter registration to replace the poll tax voting requirement.

AFL-CIO is opposing this amendment, seeking instead permanent registration.

Committee's recommendations will be made after the November 8 election.

**INTERSTATE SAFETY** — A program to make Texas' safest highways — the interstate system — even safer has been launched by the Texas Highway Commission.

Commission approved a \$3,200,000 plan which includes replacement of conventional sign supports and illumination pole bases with new units incorporating "break-away" safety features.

New bases and supports already are in place along newer sections of interstate highways in Texas. Program involves putting them in place of conventional equipment on older sections.

Instead of rigid, unyielding hazards, breakaway sign supports and pole bases shear on impact, pivoting up and away from an out-of-control vehicle. The vehicle then rolls to a more controlled stop.

### Sen. John Tower's

#### Washington Report

The House of Representatives has now passed and sent to the Senate a new Civil Rights bill. Most of the discussion and controversy about it involve the Housing Section of the bill.

As originally presented by the Administration, the Housing section eliminated a property owner's right to sell to whomever he wished. This was obviously unconstitutional. Knowing that such a section could not pass Congress, the House of Representatives added many exemptions and changes

to the Housing section. Now, we have reached the point where nobody knows exactly what it would do and who it might affect. Some say private homeowners and realtors acting as their sales or purchase agents are exempted from the bill. Others insist they still are covered.

Also, there are those who say

that once this basic bill is passed this year it will be easy to increase its scope in coming years so that private homeowners are then covered. In addition, there is no protection in the present Housing Section for an American's right to change his mind and to withdraw from the market property he previously wanted to sell.

Unless and until this confusion is precisely cleared up, I cannot give my support to the bill. In no event can I vote for the bill if in its ultimate form it violates the right of a homeowner to sell when and how he wishes. I also am most reluctant to establish the called-for Federal Housing Board to oversee property transactions by American citizens.

Additionally, some of the bill's provisions now substitute federally dictated standards for state jury laws. Such tampering with our traditional jury-trial system is not something to be lightly done.

I was pleased that the House added to the Civil Rights bill provision for penalties for agitators who cross state lines to incite civil violence and riot. Certainly no rights are won by riots, and we cannot tolerate the spreading wave of lawlessness now tormenting many of our cities. I note that no Texans have thus far resorted to such riots and that our cities have maintained law and order. I believe all Texans recognize that our efforts for the betterment of all our citizens proceed best and fastest in an atmosphere of responsible, orderly cooperation.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.**  
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 65 proposing an Amendment to Section 3-b of Article VII of the Constitution of Texas providing that school taxes theretofore voted in any independent school district or in any junior college district shall not be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by a change in boundaries nor shall bonds voted, but unused, be invalidated by such change; authorizing the levy of taxes after such change without further election in the district as changed; providing an exception in the case of the annexation or consolidation of whole districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.  
**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Section 3-b of Article VII of the Constitution of Texas be amended to be read as follows:  
"Section 3-b. No tax for the maintenance of public free schools voted in any independent school district and no tax for the maintenance of a junior college voted by a junior college district, nor any bonds voted in any such district, but unused, shall be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by change of any kind in the boundaries thereof. After any change in boundaries, the governing body of any such district, without the necessity of an additional election, shall have the power to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes

subsequently sold and delivered, and any voted, but unused, bonds of other school districts involved in such annexation or consolidation shall not thereafter be issued."

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.**  
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.  
**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, effective February 1, 1968, by deleting the following language:  
"and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor." and by substituting therefor the following language:  
"provided, however, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered annually, but such requirement for registration shall not be considered a qualification of an elector within the meaning of the term 'qualified elector' as used in any other Article of this Constitution in respect to an election. Any legislation enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory nature. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation. Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof; or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of en-

tering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."  
Sec. 2. That Section 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, by changing the word "may" to "shall" in the last clause thereof and by deleting the words "in all cities containing a population of ten thousand inhabitants or more."

(b) For each assessment year the owner wishes to qualify his land under the provisions of this Section, as designated for agricultural

tax. The additional tax shall equal the difference between taxes paid or payable, hereunder, and the amount of tax payable for the preceding three years had the land been otherwise assessed. Until paid, there shall be a lien for additional taxes and interest on land assessed under the provisions of this Section.  
(c) Upon receipt of the sworn statement in writing the local tax assessor shall determine whether or not such land qualifies for the designation as to agricultural use as defined herein and in the event it so qualifies he shall designate such land as being for agricultural use and assess the land accordingly.  
(d) Such local tax assessor may inspect the land and require such evidence of use and source of income as may be necessary or useful in determining whether or not the agricultural use provision of this article applies.  
(e) No land may qualify for the designation provided for in this Act unless for at least three (3) successive years immediately preceding the assessment date the land has been devoted exclusively for agricultural use, or unless the land has been continuously developed for agriculture during such time.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Section 9, Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 9. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or any part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same, for hospital and medical care for the transfer to the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, improvements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or separately owned by any city, town or county, providing that any district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants and assume the outstanding indebtedness incurred by cities, towns and counties for hospital purposes prior to the creation of the district, if same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a pro rata portion of such indebtedness based upon the then last approved tax assessment rolls of the included cities, towns and counties if less than all

the territory thereof is included within the district boundaries; providing that after its creation no other municipality or political subdivision shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district; providing that the annual taxes at a rate not to exceed seventy-five cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollar valuation of all taxable property within such district for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bonds, the indebtedness assumed by it and its maintenance and operating expenses, providing that such district shall not be created or such tax authorized unless approved by a majority of the qualified property taxpayers electors thereof voting at an election called for the purpose; and providing further that the support and maintenance of the district's hospital system shall never become a charge against or obligation of the State of Texas nor shall any direct appropriation be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of any of the facilities of such district.

Fishery biologists, checking fish populations in Buffalo Lake, reported picking up a six-inch walleye in excellent condition.
Leo Lewis, regional fishery supervisor, said the thriving specimen is one of 500,000 walleye fry stocked in Buffalo Lake three months ago as part of an experimental program started in 1964.

under the supervision of the Federal Bureau of Sports Fisheries and Wildlife.
The first experimental introduction of several thousand northern pike in Buffalo Lake apparently failed since none have been recovered.
The walleye predators, believed to be more adaptable to Texas waters than the voracious northern pike, are already being noted in Lake Meredith in the northern Panhandle. A third Texas lake - Possum Kingdom - also has lately provided substantial specimens of walleye growth.
In addition to the half million already released, 60,000 walleye fingerlings will be liberated in Buffalo Lake late this summer, Lewis said.

Senators shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

The Court of Criminal Appeals shall consist of five Judges, one of whom shall be Presiding Judge, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three Judges shall be necessary to a decision of said court. Said Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court. They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the state at a general election and shall hold their offices for a term of six years. In case of a vacancy in the office of a Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, fill said vacancy by appointment until the next succeeding general election."

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Dear Fellow Texan:

This week let us consider some of the critical money problems facing our rural electric cooperatives. These are the electric distribution systems that brought the conveniences of the city to the farm areas, bringing lights and power that set the farmer free from much of the darkness and drudgery in his labor in the past generation.

The rural electric cooperatives today face a critical money problem. The demands for electricity by farm consumers are doubling every eight to 10 years. But the amount of money to pay for the heavier lines, more sub-stations and bigger plants to supply the power is almost standing still.

The only way for farm systems to get the needed money is through the Rural Electrification Administration. But this agency must compete for money from the national budget with all other Federal departments and agencies. Because of this competition, the REA in the past few years has been held to about \$375 million for its loans to rural electric systems.

This money must be spread between nearly 1,000 rural electric coops now operating in Texas and 45 other states. But studies by the REA and rural electric cooperatives show that these systems are going to need about \$9.5 billion in new money during the next 15 years — just to keep up with the power demands of their consumers.

Because of this great need for new money, I have co-authored two Senate bills (S. 3337 and S. 3720) to create a Rural Electric Bank as a source of new money supply. This bank would be operated much like a federal land bank.

There is no question about the good job our rural electric coops

are doing. Their service is vital to the continued strength of this nation and to the development of our rural areas.

In Texas there are 59 REA borrowers, and all but two are rural electric cooperatives. These rural electric cooperatives provide service to nearly 490,000 consumers over 169,000 miles of line. They serve only 2.5 consumers per mile of line — and they get only \$334 per mile of line each year in revenue. But the average use of electricity more than doubled in the last 10 years. This use is up from 237 to 554 kilowatt hours a month.

Because of their farm nature, these rural electric cooperatives

operate under some severe handicaps as far as numbers of consumers and revenues per mile are concerned. Rural consumers simply live farther apart than their city cousins.

The commercial power companies in Texas, for example, serve 32.5 consumers per mile of line and their average revenue per year is more than \$8,000 per mile of line. This is 13 times as many consumers and 24 times as much revenue per year as rural cooperative power companies have.

Congress in the years ahead just isn't going to be able to provide all the new money that the rural electric cooperatives will need. Federal budget demands are heavy and are growing.

That's why the Rural Electric Bank will be a solution. It will help our rural electric cooperatives to continue to give service to the areas that they have helped so well to develop. I hope that we can pass this cooperative bank to help our rural areas to keep alive and growing.

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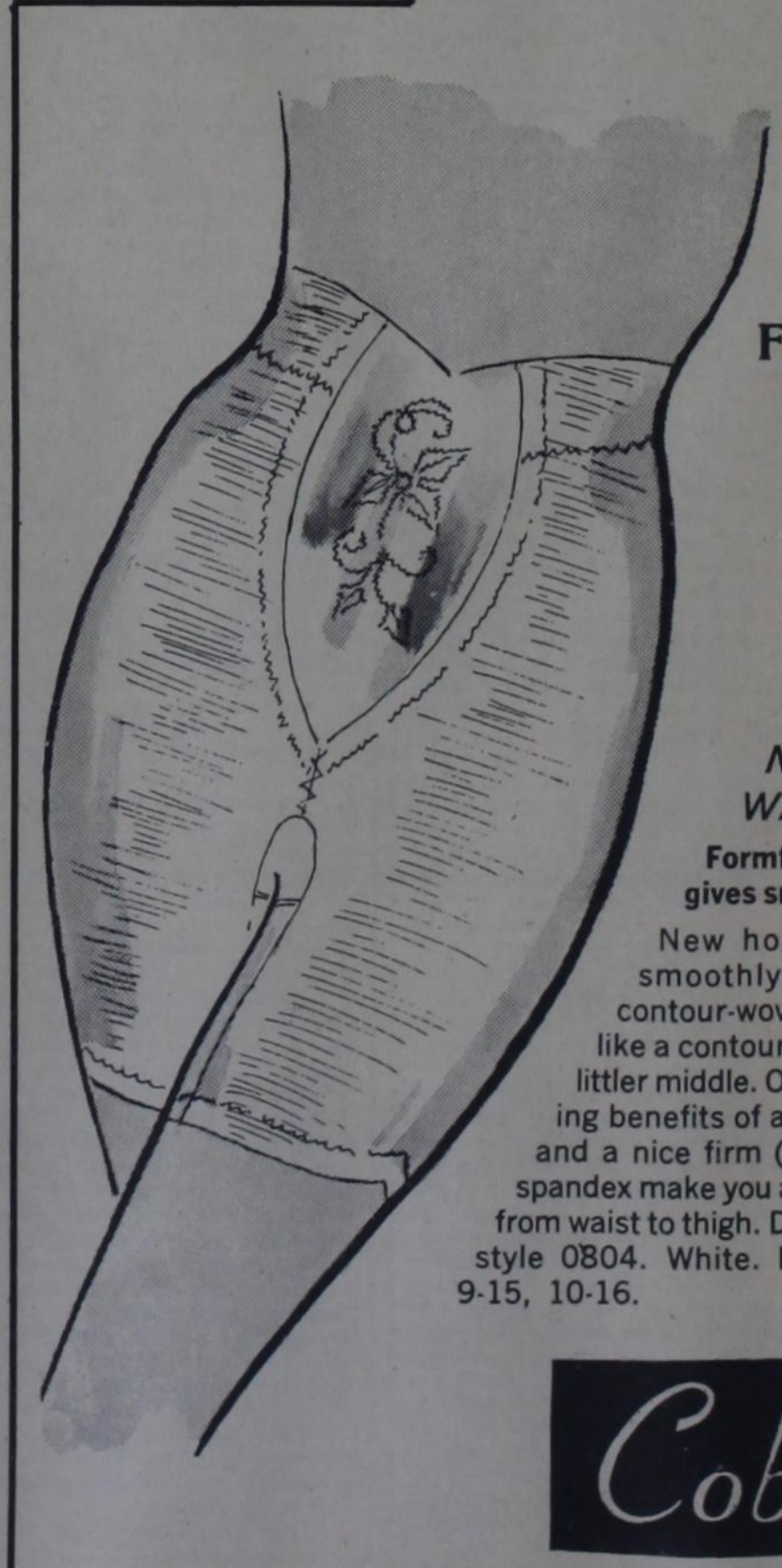

events. Nothing but praise was heard from those who attended extravaganza titled "Prairie to Paradise" with some admitting that they attended two or more nights. No doubt the large attendance was a factor in the huge cast making every effort to give the best performance possible.

We have had good rains, about five inches here in town. The rains have been fine and will probably provide enough moisture, in most places, to finish off the cotton and maize crops. Now that we have got the moisture for these crops, we are ready for some dry weather so that we can harvest some tomatoes that need plucking. There are several hundred acres of tomatoes in the county, and harvesting was to have begun Tuesday morning. The way I get it the tomatoes will be harvested by a machine in a one shot deal. The line is cut and gobbled up, tomatoes, vine and all, into the maw of the monstrous machine where the ripe tomatoes are separated from the pinks and green ones. To get maximum yield from the tomato crop it is easy to see that the harvest should be accomplished at the time when the largest number of tomatoes are ripe and before any of the fruit begins to deteriorate, for some fields that time is at hand. Ray Robertson told me that the expected yield from the crop is about twenty-five tons per acre, that's a lot of tomato juice or catsup. Please Mr. Weatherman, you let us have our jubilee, now let us gather our tomatoes.
