An influx of counterfeit bills has Big Spring police telling business owners to be cautious.

"The Big Spring Police Department is

currently experiencing a increased volume of calls involving counterfeit currency," said Sgt. Tony Everett, BSPD information director. Everett

said since May 1, the

police have taken numerous reports involving the bills.

"Counterfeit \$5, \$10, \$20, \$50 and \$100 bills are being passed to our local business establishments," Everett said. "The Big Spring Police Department wants to make our citizens aware of the problem and asks to take extra precaution when dealing with currency."

He said the bills being passed appear to be a different shade of green than legitimate bills, and are slightly smaller.

Suggestions on scrutinizing your bills is to check for the watermarks, texture and security strip (\$5 and above).





square.

Just a week after opening the business, he married Minnie Russell, a school teacher. Together they had three sons.

Dorward supplied prescriptions for local physicians Dr. James N. Prince and Dr. John H. Hannabass. As the town began to decline in population, Dorward Drug became the focal point of the community by providing over-thecounter medicines, refreshments, ice — and, most importantly - aplace for community members to gather and

hear local and area news.

When the local telephone switchboard closed in 1918, the drugstore had the only telephone serving Gail and surrounding farms and ranches until the 1950s. Telephone messages received by Dorward at the store would be delivered to local residents or to outlying farmers

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and ranchers. Dorward also served

as a public servant by holding the offices of county treasurer and county judge.

Dorward passed away in 1956 and Mrs. Dorward in 1962.



The backlash will be coming

on the "World Wide Web" (yes, we used to call it that), I figured I'd pick a subject I knew a lot about and see what was there. So I typed in the word "rape" — a subject I learned about the hard way many decades ago and have been teaching and writing about for the past 30 years. To my surprise and horror, what popped up on my search were not sites aimed at pro-

but one horror story site after another about men wrongly accused of rape.

victims of rape,

Now, I am not one of those who believe rape is such a serious crime that even innocence is no defense. I am the mother of a son, as well as a daughter. I have seen that rape can destroy the lives not only of its victims, but also of those who are wrongly accused. I am a law professor, as well as a victim. I am not willing to imprison the innocent lest the guilty go free.

That is why rape is a problem that colleges and universities must address.

I understand why many administrators would like to leave it to the criminal justice system. But the criminal justice system

doesn't deal with shades of gray. It doesn't deal with hazy memories. It demands proof beyond a reasonable doubt precisely because the punishment to be doled out is prison. All of which means that your garden-variety campus rape, involving too much alcohol and no weapons or beatings or witnesses, and competing accounts as to whether and when anyone said yes or no, is not going to lead to a successful prosecution. That doesn't mean the complainant was not really raped. It just means it cannot be proved to the satisfaction of the criminal justice system. Colleges and universities deal

amount to a prosecutable crime every day of the week — from stealing and cheating to taking food that doesn't belong to you from the dorm fridge. We have honor codes and honor boards, faculty-student committees, teams of deans and

with wrongdoing that does not

resident advisers. How is it that we can do all of these things. but we can't fairly determine whether one student has abused another? We'll get sued, more than one

university lawyer has told me over the years. They don't mean they'll be sued by the victims who don't get attention, but by those who are accused of rape and demand lawyers and due process and procedural protections before they are "branded" a rapist and their life destroyed. And they're right. They will get

sued — unless they do it right. Doing it right means being clear at the outset about what

kind of conduct is expected of students. Doing it right also means providing both the accuser and the accused with advocates to help them navigate the process and assuring that the process itself is fair, that there is a meaningful opportunity to present the evidence and to seek review of any adverse ruling.

Thanks to the work of activists and the involvement of the administration, the heat is on colleges and universities at least to report accurately the number of assaults on campus, if not to take action to prevent and punish them. But beware of the backlash.

There is no evidence that women lie about rape any more than people lie about every other crime, and there's much evidence that the larger problem is underreporting. But there are crazy people in the world and one of them will report a rape that didn't happen. It will get more attention than most real rapes do, and we had best be ready. The backlash will be coming.

¶he time has come for me to take a long drive. My pilgrimage in search for America's hidden Hispanic heritage requires reporting from dozens of historical sites I'm determined to visit this

To get the most out of my journey, I have been mapping a route for months. But it hasn't been easy. After all, I'm planning a 21st-century road trip using 16th-century maps! I want to see the

relics left by our great-grand Spanish ancestors. I want to follow their trails. I want to visit the towns that have been named after them and the monuments built to recognize their great accomplishments. I want to pray in the churches they built.

I want to see the markers that document the history of Spanish interaction with Native Americans, African-Americans and other white Americans. I want to show how even some of our state borders were drawn with Hispanic intervention. I want people to understand that Hispanic roots are firmly planted all over this country.

It sounds like fun, right? Well, buckle up: I'm taking you on my

Through this column, the Internet and social media — Facebook, Twitter, Instagram and especially my HiddenHispanicHeritage.com website — I intend share my "Hispanic American history tour" with all who share my belief that the time has come to re-conquer American his-

tory so the contributions of our Hispanic ancestors are properly recognized.

I will be writing weekly columns, making daily blog entries and sharing photos and short videos from all the historical sites I visit.

But which way do I go? What are the must-see stops on my bucket list? Do I try to follow the trail of one of the Spanish conquistadors who explored North America — perhaps Alvar Nunez Cabeza de Vaca or Hernando de Soto or Francisco Vasquez de Coronado — or do I create my own route, covering portions of each of their trails?

On a cross-country road trip, what is the route that would cover the most significant Hispanic heritage sites?

Seeking an answer to that question has me looking at ancient maps while plotting a route with the Google Maps technology of the 21st century.

It's exciting!

Until last year, I ran the multimedia journalism program at Lehman College, in the Bronx, New York. Now on sabbatical from my position as a professor there, this is my opportunity to show my students how to apply our latest technology to the craft of storytelling.

My co-pilot will be my childhood buddy Gustavo Villageliu, who is just as big a history buff as I am and has been helping me plot our route. Gustavo is a recently retired Justice Department official and former immigration judge who lives in Virginia.

We are planning to spend more than a month on the road, and we'll be sharing a map of our route so everyone can track our

progress.

Followers of my Hidden Hispanic Heritage Facebook blog, (facebook.com/HiddenHispanicHeritage) already have been getting hints on where our journey will begin and how far we intend to travel — from southwest Florida to southern Arizona and back via a different

route. A bucket list trip for two old buddies? You bet! But we want this to be a rediscovery journey for many Latinos who may have lost track of their deep ancestral roots in this country. And we need you not only to join us through social media, but also to invite your friends to come

Although we already have a wish list of places we want to visit — in about a dozen states we will be seeking your suggestions, starting immediately, on our Facebook blog page or on Twitter @ColumnistPerez. I'm looking forward to your comments. I'll be checking all my social media accounts from the

Obviously, this is not a typical column. It's really an invitation to a multimedia, virtual road trip across the country.

So when you think of me in the next few weeks, think of 70 mph with Willie Nelson blasting on the radio, "On the Road Again ... " And think of yourself as another passenger on the Great Hispanic American History

Lemonade or murky water?

We have talked about the fact that Satan, or the Adversary, twists things... how he only slightly changed the Word of God, only diluting His instructions a little, but still sounding mostly like what God said to Adam

and Eve.

Did you ever wonder about the Adversary's statement, "God knows that when you eat of the fruit of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil..."? God had already given Adam and Eve the knowledge of good. They knew only good; they only thought good; they only saw good. God is only good; Satan is only evil. The Adversary wanted them EUNICE to learn the concept of evil.

Why would people initially seek to know evil? He told them the fruit would teach them the knowledge of good and evil, and they were curious... this is the

ancient version of "What is behind Door No. 1?"

The knowledge of Good and Evil sounded half like what God said. What could be wrong with that? Study for yourself the words you hear people say,

the things you see people do, and the feelings some of these stir up in you. The Adversary knows how to make things look and sound exciting, to stir up inside of you feelings that stimulate you, make you a little breathless with anticipation. Are those people speaking to you the pure Words of God that teach you nothing but good, or are they speaking half-truths with the forked tongue of the Adversary. Are they trying to lead you into God's fold where you are safe, or are they trying to entice you out into the world of dangers and

You may decide to listen to the allure of these new thoughts and ideas and reach out to touch these shiny, frilly, sensual things — just to see if it is right for you. But keep in mind, there is nothing innocent about simply tasting this thing. Once you step across that line... just outside of the safety of God's instruction... instantly the ground becomes loose and slippery beneath your feet and very steeply sloping. The things you are tempted to sample are usually only slightly watered down from God's teaching, but the Adversary has designed his world to be addicting...to slowly draw you in deeper... to give you a need for stronger and stronger doses of corruption to satisfy the lusts he has planted in you and set like a fishhook.

If you realize that you have done wrong... you have lusted for the sensuality of the world...God is willing for you to return to His protection. If you sincerely repent, Jesus will be responsible and pay the consequences for what you did while you sampled the Adversary's

But let's think again about watering down the truth of God's Word. The recipe for making lemonade calls for a specific amount of lemon juice, sugar and water. A person who sells lemonade, who does not really commit himself to making excellent lemonade, may try to save money by adding more water or using less sugar or less lemon juice. He begins this very cautiously, changing the recipe slowly, slowly so that the customers will not notice. After a while a new customer comes along and says, "Hey, this tastes more like water than

This person is not just being critical! He is trying to wake up the other customers who are being duped. Again, you cannot go along drinking half lemonade and half water forever. There comes a time when you will have to make a decision to follow God or to follow the Adversary. Which do you want to drink, lemonade or murky water?

what happens after we The book of Job asked

the question we all ask sooner or later: "If a man die, shall he live again?"

After years of suffering and serious arguments with his friends and with God, Job emerged with a powerful conclusion. "I know that my redeemer lives, and that in the end he will stand on the earth. and after my skin has been destroyed, yet in my flesh I will see God; I myself will see him with my own eyes — I, and not another. How my heart yearns within

me! " (Job 19:25-27).

The issue of life after death is central to the Christian faith. While most people believe that some kind of life exists after we die, Jesus provides the only verifiable evidence of life beyond the grave. Each of the Gospels gives an eyewitness account of Jesus' death, burial and resurrection.

Luke says, "After his suffering, he presented himself to them and gave many convincing proofs that he was alive. He appeared to them over a period of forty days and spoke about the kingdom of God." (Acts 1:3).

The Apostle Paul wrote, "The first thing I did was place before you what was placed so emphatically before me: that the Messiah died for our sins, exactly as Scripture tells it; that he was buried; that he was raised from death on the third day, again exactly as Scripture says; that he presented himself alive to Peter, then to his closest followers, and later to more than five hundred of his followers all at the same time, most of them still around (although a few have since died); that he then spent time with James and the rest of those he commissioned to represent him; and that he finally presented himself alive to me." (1 Corinthi-

ans 15:3-8 The Message).

Jesus promised something far better for us when we are "cleared away" by death's inevitability.

He said, "Do not let your heart be troubled; believe in God, believe also in Me. In My Father's house are many dwelling places; if it were not so, I would have told you; for I go to prepare a place for you. If I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you to Myself, that where I am, there you may be also" (John 14:1-3).

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
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
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
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Dear Annie: My husband of four years insists on keeping a picture of his cat as the

1. Pass. Partner's two-club response, indicating six to 10 points, makes it clear there is no game. There is consequently no point in bidding two notrump, which would be construed by partner as a game try showing upward of 16 points. Partner has furthermore denied possession of four spades, so there is no logical reason to bid that suit. The only sensible action is to pass and settle for a partscore in clubs. To bid again would express game aspirations that are not justified.

2. Three notrump. With a balanced hand, every suit stopped and no less than 25 points in the combined hands, three notrump is the standout choice. It would be wrong to bid only two notrump, which partner might pass. At the same time, a slam is out of the question once partner has limited his hand to six to 10

10, the possibility of game should not be dismissed. After partner's raise, you should re-evaluate your hand by counting potential tricks, rather than points, for both notrump and suit purposes. 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





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Judge rejects Sterling's bid for injunction against husband

LOS ANGELES (AP) - A judge Thursday rejected an urgent request Shelly Sterling's attorney asking that husband Donald Sterling and his lawyers be ordered to stop harassing her legal team and doctors in their dispute over the planned sale of the Los Angeles Clip-

A petition filed by Shelly Sterling's attorneys quoted allegedly threatening remarks made by Donald Sterling in phone calls and a letter sent by his lawyer to two doctors who declared him mentally incapacitated.

Superior Court Judge

Michael Levanas said the matter may involve "high emotions and some litigation posturing" and urged both parties to tone down their communications.

"The court does not feel that the statements set forth in the ... petition rise to the level of great and irreparable injury to a party as called for in the Code of Civil Procedure," Levanas said in a written

Outside court Donald Sterling's attorney Bobby Samini said, "Clearly from the court's ruling it's apparent Mr. Sterling is not a danger to anybody."

A trial next month will look into assertions that Donald Sterling is mentally incapacitated and determine whether he was properly removed as an administrator under the terms of the family trust, which owns the Clippers, leaving Shelly Sterling alone as trustee with authority to sell the team. 
