School choirs to perform

The Second Annual Christmas Dinner Theatre should provide a variety of entertainment tonight (Thursday), as theatre goers enjoy the song and dance routines of the Dimmitt High School and Junior High Choral Departments. The event will be from 7 to 9 p.m. in the Richardson Elementary School's west cafeteria.

"There may still be a few tickets available at the door," a spokesman said, "but I would recommend buying them as much in advance as possible."

Prices are \$4 for adults, \$3 for students and \$2 for preschool. Tickets may be purchased at the middle school office or at the high school. A dinner of ham, creamed

potatoes, fruit salad, homemade rolls and dessert will be served by the CVAE classes. Then the junior high and high school choirs and the show choir will perform.

Choir director Doug Henry has prepared a variety of entertainment ranging from Christmas songs and carols to singing and dancing to music from "Grease," songs of the

Doobie Brothers and the Oak Ridge Boys.

Solo performances by Shelley Young, Tammy Calhoun, Janis Hutcheson, Steve Anderson, Kayla Jones, Beth Webb and others are scheduled.

City grants bonuses, discusses retirement

The Dimmitt Board of Aldermen voted Monday night after an executive session to grant \$25 Christmas bonuses to city employees, after earlier tabling action on a proposal to update their retirement program.

Employees will receive certificates worth \$25, which are redeemable only with Dimmitt merchants, in an effort to support the local economy.

Gary Anderson, administrative assistant with the Texas Municipal Retirement System, spoke to the board about updating service credits for city employees.

"The city has the option each year of upgrading the credit an employee is allowed in his retirement account in order to try to keep up with inflation," Anderson said.

Under the updating system, retirement benefits are figured on an average of the last three years' salary for an employee, rather than an actual average over the entire time of employment.

The current update will be figured on the salaries from the years of 1979, 1980 and 1981. For example, if an employee earned \$800 per month in 1979, \$850 per month in 1980 and \$930 per month in 1981, his or her average salary for the three years would be \$860 per month.

If the city adopts the update and that employee retires in 1983, his or her retirement benefits would be based on an average salary of \$860 per month, despite the fact that in earlier years of employment he or she may have earned only \$600 per month.

Employees always pay 5% of their salary into the account, so the amount needed to make up the difference because of the updating must

be paid by the city. It may, however, be amortized over a 25-year period, instead of having to be paid in one lump sum.

Also, Anderson said, the city has some leeway in the program because of amounts paid in by the city (the city matches the employees' 5% on a 2 to 1 basis) on behalf of employees who do not reach retirement, such as those who quit or are fired.

The city currently pays an amount equal to 5.77% of the entire payroll into the retirement system. If no update is adopted, the rate paid in 1983 would go down to 5.11%. However, the update would only take 5.60%.

The board tabled any action on the matter until the next meeting in order to give them more time to study the facts and options available.

2 sentenced; cotton theft trial begins

Two men pled guilty to felony offenses and were sentenced Monday in Judge Jack Miller's 64th District Court here.

Santaigo Gonzales Jr., 20, of Garland, was placed on felony probation for eight years. He pled guilty to the burglary at Easter Community Gin on June 7. Gonzales was ordered to pay a fine of \$2,500, court costs of \$96, and make restitution of \$100. He also will have to reimburse the county for his court-appointed lawyer, and pay a \$15 a month reporting fee.

Jesus F. Aguirre, 32, of Dimmitt, was found guilty of driving while intoxicated, subsequent offense. He was arrested Oct. 16 on the charge, and has remained in jail since that time. He was sentenced to 45 days in jail and assessed a \$250 fine and \$96 court costs.

Several organizations are planning special activities for pheasant hunters who will be in the county for the opening day of pheasant season Saturday.

Dimmitt's Kiwanis Club, and three Hart organizations are sponsoring special meals for hunters in the area.

The Kiwanis Club will serve breakfast to hunters from 5:30 to 9 a.m. in the Castro County Expo Building. Cost is \$3.50 and hotcakes, eggs, sausage, sourdough biscuits, jelly, coffee, juice and milk will be served.

Season hunting permits will be on sale at the breakfast. For a \$50 donation each, hunters are entitled to a free breakfast and the right to hunt on more than 10,000 acres of Castro and Parmer County Land. The permits are for pheasants only. Also, hunters must furnish valid Texas hunting licenses.

These permits also will be available at Anthony's, Bruegel Brothers Elevator and Gin, Sheffy's Western Wear and Western Auto throughout the season.

Texas hunting licenses may be bought at the Castro County Courthouse. Also, Killingsworth True Value Hardware will open early Saturday to sell licenses.

The Hart Lions Club and FFA will sponsor a breakfast from 5:30 to 8:30 a.m. in the school cafeteria.

At a cost of \$3.50 per person, the menu will include sausage, eggs, hot cakes, and syrup.

The Lions Club has already sold all the hunting permits they had available, an estimated 250. Hunters having these permits will have access to over 25,000 acres in Castro County.

The proceeds will go to serve the needs of the Hart community and to other projects the Lions are involved in.

From 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m., the Hart Junior Class will sponsor a dinner, also in the cafeteria.

The charge will be \$3.50 per person. The menu includes baked ham, corn, green beans, hot rolls, potato salad, dessert, tea and coffee.

Hunters are advised that the bag limit is two cocks per day, and possession limit is four cocks.

The head and feet must remain attached to the carcass until it reaches its final destination. This is to insure that a hen was not shot. It is ILLEGAL TO SHOOT HENS.

The legal shooting hours for game birds are one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset.

Hunting is prohibited on any public road or road right-of-way. Calling devices, except recordings and electrically amplified calls, are permitted.

It is illegal to hunt on privately owned lands without consent of the owner or the owner's agent. Penalties are stiff, so hunters are encouraged to get permission before hunting on someone's land.

Hunters are urged to use safety during the season, which will last through Dec. 26.

Laney says

RR Commission, PUC may come under fire

State Representative Pete Laney said here Monday that he expects several "runs" will be made to revamp the Public Utility Commission and the Texas Railroad Commission during the 1983 session of the Texas Legislature.

Both commissions come up for their periodic legislative scrutiny in 1983 under the state's Sunset Law, and Laney said these Sunset hearings might provide the main issues in the upcoming legislative session.

Under the Sunset Law, the legislature regularly reviews the cost and effectiveness of every state agency, and is authorized to abolish or reorganize any agency.

Approximately 20 state agencies have been phased out since the Sunset Law took effect several years ago, Laney said.

Laney said that neither the

Railroad Commission nor the PUC would be phased out, but he expected to see organized efforts in the legislature to deregulate both agencies.

"I think there'll be a run made at deregulation, and on the possible election of public utility commissioners, and perhaps their election by geographic areas," he said.

Laney, a Hale Center Democrat who has served in the legislature 10 years, will succeed the retiring Bill Clayton Jan. 1 as Castro County's delegate in the House of Representatives. Castro was made part of the new 85th Representative District in last year's statewide redistricting.

Laney spoke to approximately 30 local residents at a coffee in his honor Monday afternoon in the courthouse assembly room.

Another key issue in the

next legislative session, Laney said, will be public school and state college financing (60% of the state budget), with a possible pay raise for teachers.

As one of only three or four farmers in the Texas Legislature, Laney said he hopes the state "can have some input on the formulation of agricultural policy at the national level" in 1983.

"Bill Clayton and I were the only farmers in the legislature before," he explained. "We've picked up three new farmers, although I think with one or two of them farming is a sideline rather than their main occupation."

More than half of all state representatives come from only eight metropolitan counties, Laney explained.

Still, he said, "They can outvote us but they haven't outsmarted us yet."

Proceeds will go to the Hart Cemetery Fund.

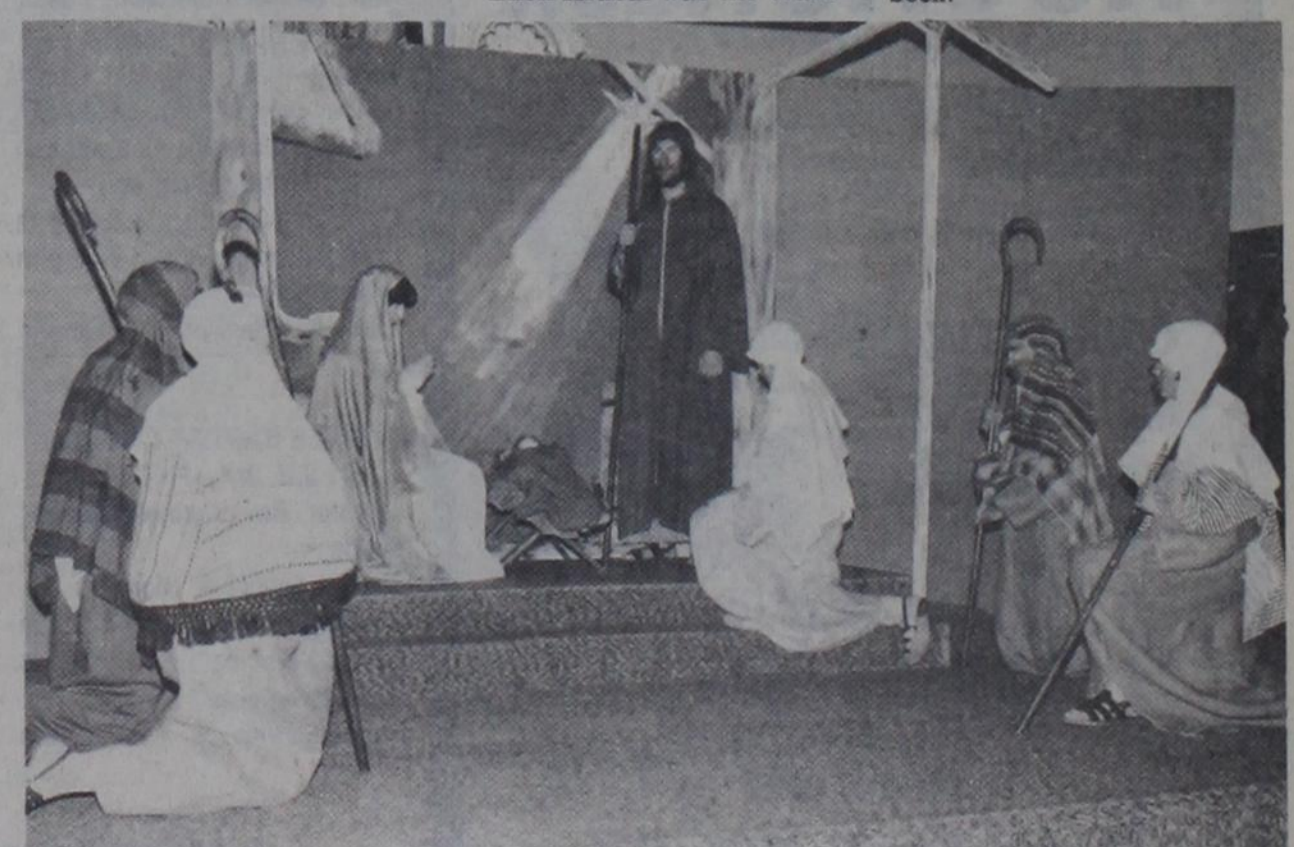
188 compete in bridge tourney

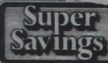

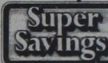

Members of the West Texas State University crops judging team won two team, as well as individual, placings in recent crop judging contests.

WT Junior Dale Wilhelm of Nazareth helped the judging team rate third as a team at the American Royal Collegiate Crops Contest in Kansas City, Mo., and fifth in the Chicago Board of Trade Crops Judging Contest.

At Kansas City, the WTSU

team placed third in commercial grain grading, fourth in identification and sixth in seed analysis. Individually, Wilhelm placed ninth overall, tenth in both seed analysis and commercial grain grading, and 11th in identification.

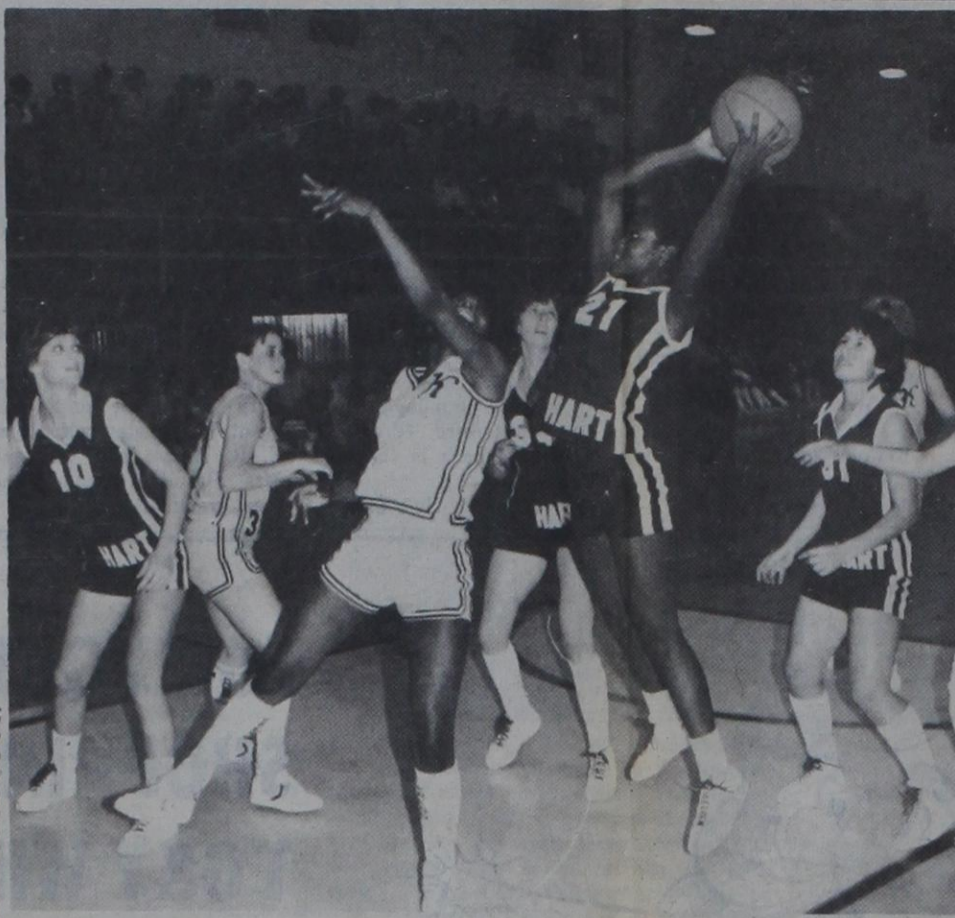

Bobcats capture Pioneer Classic title

After capturing the loose ball, Smith popped a 12-footer to give the Bobcats a 40-34 lead over the Bulldogs. Dimmitt went on to win, 64-57. Smith sank 24 points in the title game and was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player.

Dimmitt's Bobcats nabbed two all-tourney spots and the MVP award last weekend when they won the Second Annual Lions' Pioneer Classic basketball tournament in Plainview.

The Bobcats posted a 64-57 win over Plainview Saturday night to win the championship. John Smith led Dimmitt in scoring with 24 points and was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player. Jeff Watts and Kevin Cleveland also were named to the all-tournament team.

Dimmitt coach Kenneth Cleveland said the Bobcat defense was "a big factor in the final game."

"Plainview would not shoot outside," he said. "they kept trying to get it inside to their good player (Gil Wright). He did get 33 points, but we covered their inside game really well. They wouldn't shoot outside, and if we can hold people to 57 points a game, we're in good shape."

The defensive intimidation of Dimmitt's posts, 6-6 John King and 6-4 Watts, helped the 'Cats to the championship win.

King blocked five shots during the game, and scored 6 points, while Watts rejected two and added 11 points.

"King is a very good inside intimidator," Cleveland said.

"He is a block shot artist and that helps on defense. Smith had an outstanding final game. He is a very fine shooter and can break open games like that."

Smith hit 12 of 16 from the floor in the Plainview game. He hit three unanswered buckets in both the third and fourth quarters, to spark the Dimmitt offense.

Dimmitt registered wins over Slaton (79-47) and Andrews (61-52) enroute to the title.

"We played pretty well most of the way," said Coach Cleveland. "We have a lot of players who do different things which help us."

"Keith Gregory (5-10 post) came off the bench and did a very good job in all the games he played," Cleveland said.

Watts led the Bobcats in

rebounds with 30 for the tournament, and he scored 43 points.

Kevin Cleveland led all scorers with 61 for the tournament. He also had 22 credits.

Smith was the third leading scorer with 42. Coach Cleveland complimented the quarterbacking of point guard Fermin Gonzales. "He's our floor leader," he said. "He handles the ball most of the time, and he sure helps break the press. He did his job well."

Coach Cleveland said his team's free throw shooting also was a factor in his team's winning the tournament.

For all three games, Gonzales hit 6 of 7 for 86%, Cleveland sank 13 of 16 for 81%, King made 4 of 5, Gregory 9 of 12 and Watts 11 of 15.

Nazareth won 55-26 over Tahoka Saturday in the seventh place game.

The Swifts lost a 49-47 squeaker to Andrews in the opening round Thursday. They fell to Slaton 57-42 Friday, then bounced back for the win Saturday.

Mark Huseman led Nazareth in scoring with 48 points in the tournament. The 6-3 junior post was named to the all-tournament team.
