Several organizations are planning special activities for pheasant hunters who will be in the county for the opening day of pheasant season Saturday.

Dimmitt's Kiwanis Club, and three Hart organizations are sponsoring special meals for hunters in the area.

The Kiwanis Club will serve breakfast to hunters from 5:30 to 9 a.m. in the Castro County Expo Building. Cost is \$3.50 and hotcakes, eggs, sausage, sourdough biscuits, jelly, coffee, juice and milk will be served.

Season hunting permits will be on sale at the breakfast. For a \$50 donation each, hunters are entitled to a free breakfast and the right to hunt on more than 10,000 acres of Castro and Parmer County Land. The permits are for pheasants only. Also, hunters must furnish valid Texas hunting licenses.

These permits also will be available at Anthony's, Bruegel Brothers Elevator and Gin, Sheffy's Western Wear and Western Auto throughout the season.

State Representative Pete Laney said here Monday that he expects several "runs" will be made to revamp the Public Utility Commission and the Texas Railroad Commission during the 1983 session of the Texas Legislature.

Both commissions come up for their periodic legislative scrutiny in 1983 under the state's Sunset Law, and Laney said these Sunset hearings might provide the main issues in the upcoming legislative session.

Under the Sunset Law, the legislature regularly reviews the cost and effectiveness of every state agency, and is authorized to abolish or reorganize any agency.

Approximately 20 state agencies have been phased out since the Sunset Law took effect several years ago.

The legal shooting hours for game birds are one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset. Hunting is prohibited on

any public road or road rightof-way. Calling devices, except recordings and electrically amplified calls, are permitted.

It is illegal to hunt on privately owned lands without consent of the owner or the owner's agent. Penalties are stiff, so hunters are encouraged to get permission before hunting on someone's land. Hunters are urged to use safety during the season,

Gary Anderson, administrative assistant with the Texas Municipal Retirement System, spoke to the board about updating service credits for city employees.

"The city has the option each year of upgrading the credit an employee is allowed in his retirement account in order to try to keep up with inflation." Anderson said.

Under the updating system, retirement benefits are figured on an average of the last three years' salary for an employee, rather than an actual average over the entire time of employment.
