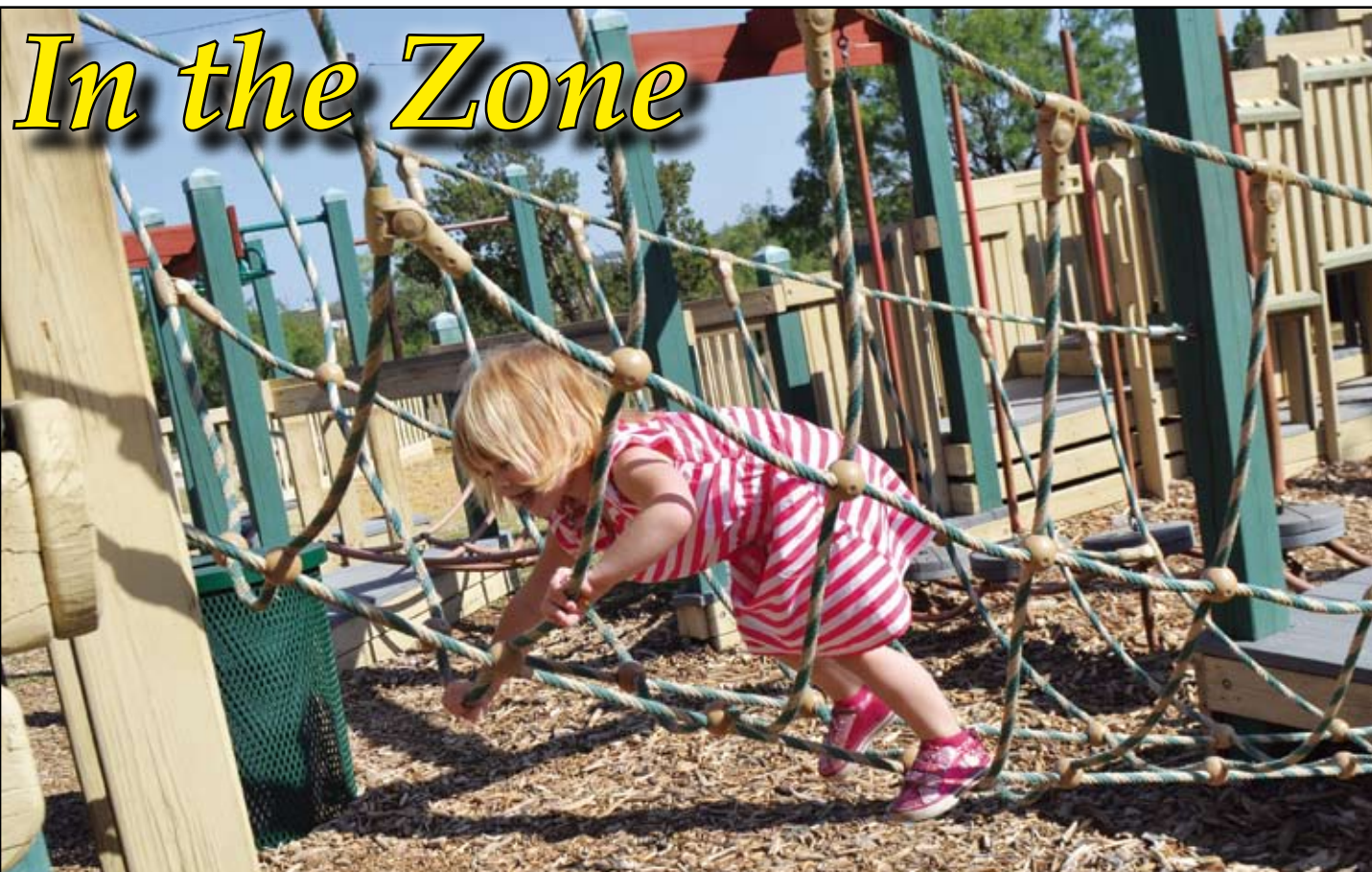

Possibility of rain looms over 'Pops'

About the only thing that can rain on the annual Pops in the Park celebrations is, well, rain.

Event officials have cleared a lot of hurdles in recent weeks — including a cash shortfall — to get ready for Thursday's event. Now, the only potential roadblock is Mother Nature.

The National Weather Service forecast for Thursday calls for hot temperatures, which is no surprise for a West Texas summer. However, it also calls for a 30 percent chance for isolated thunderstorms.

While rain in this parched area would no doubt be welcome, it would put a serious crimp in the highlight of Pops in the Park — the fireworks show which concludes the event.

Pops in the Park Committee Chairperson Kelly Seales said organizers will be watching the skies (and the weather forecasts) with great interest over the course of the next 48 hours.

"The committee meets today and

Having trouble 'getting along'? Dispute resolution might help

For residents locked into a dispute, they have an alternative to seek mediation services before heading to court at little or no cost.

"There is another resource besides the courts to help resolve issues," said Anastacia De Los Santos,

community resolution representative for the Texas Dispute Resolution System in Howard County. "For the most part there are no fees for citizens requesting mediation unless they are referred to mediation through the courts. There are fees associated with family cases, CPS and divorce. Citizens can voluntarily request mediation for almost any type of dispute."

The Dispute Resolution System, which operates out of Lubbock County, provides mediation services for several area counties, including Howard. De Los Santos' office is located on the third floor of

the Howard County Courthouse.

Some of the areas of disputes the office helps to mediate are, but not limited to: landlord/tenant problems, neighbor disputes, contractor issues, consumer and financial issues, custody and child support issues, community, estate, business, peer and workplace issues.

During her 10 months on the job, De Los Santos said she has helped to resolve disputes between area school districts and students and their parents. Also, the Texas Dispute Resolution System is the sole provider of the USDA Certified State Agricultural Mediation Program for Texas.

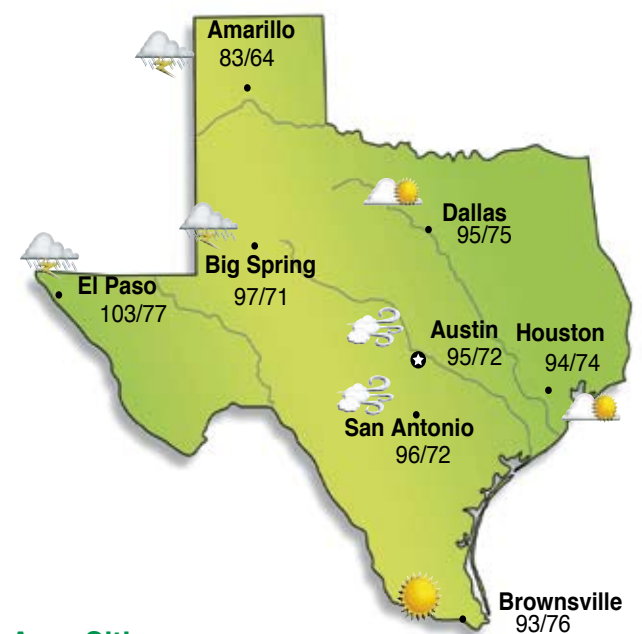

we'll develop some alternate plans just in case it rains," she said.

If things are high and dry Thursday, however, things will get started at 5 p.m., when the gates at the Comanche Trail Park amphitheater open. Vendors selling a wide variety of food and beverages will begin serving customers at that time.

"This is another resource that a lot of lay people don't know because they only hear about mediation when they have to go to court," she said. "I think it is a wonderful resource."

According to De Los Santos, the process begins once a claimant fills out forms with her office for consideration of their particular case. There are no qualifying factors, De Los Santos said, and income is not considered in the process.

"Letters are sent out to both the claimant and

the person they have the issue with or the business," she said. "Mediation is set up. The mediator will most likely come from Lubbock. They will come here to Big Spring, so they (the disputed parties) will not have to travel. This goes for not just Howard County, but the surrounding counties also.

We will meet together, but if there is a problem we can meet with each person separately. When both parties come to an agreement, they sign an agreement."

The more informal setting of these meeting helps lessen the pressure for both disputed parties, De Los Santos added.

"They don't feel bullied," she said. "They feel like they are giving their voice. That will open up a lot more for compromise between the two. It's good all around for both parties that they each have a voice that's being heard by an impartial party without the structure of a court."

Bird Poop:

Grounded for life

Earlier, our game warden, Matt Woodall had called. Since a woman had alerted him about an injured hawk, he anticipated our county's summer raptor, a Mississippi kite. After promising to let us know as soon as he had it, he added, "Later."

As evening approached, the phone rang. His delay had been caused by having to take a fawn to Melanie Gambrel, another local rehabber. To his telling me he was finally at his house was my reply, "And you haven't even had time to eat."

By nine o'clock, he had been able to grab a bite, and deliver the bird. When Matt removed the top of his carrier, Art and I, in unison, said, "That's not a kite! It's a peregrine falcon!"

Admitting he had wondered if it could possibly be one, he said the woman had first noticed it on her front porch. Since it wouldn't fly, she thought it was hurt. A contact on Facebook recommended she notify her local game warden.

In her conversation with Matt, she further described the bird's actions.

One wing flapped while the other remained near the body. With gloved hands, I anticipated a possible struggle. Its powerful talons meant instant death to many small birds in flight. Knocking larger birds, such as pigeons and ducks, out of the sky, this raptor was known to land and recover the success of its hunting prowess.

My hands closed around the large falcon. Raising it from the carrier, I was surprised by how passive it was. Its cloudy right eye was indicative of head trauma.

After gaining control of its legs and feet, I extended each long, pointed wing.

While the left retracted quickly, the right did not have the same resistance to being moved. With the wing possibly bruised, and the eye questionable, the bird's injuries on one side of its body indicated its having flown into something.

Looking down the legs to its large, yellow feet enabled me to see a metal band surrounding one of its legs. This form of identification would provide us useful information about its past. Years before, in receiving a banded red-tailed hawk, we learned a rehabber in Wyoming had cared for it. Fall migration had brought it as far as West Texas.

After thanking Matt for our surprise guest, we prepared for what came next. While Art held the falcon, I carefully opened its notched bill. Unlike other raptors, the curve of its bill has a tooth-like point. The strength of its jaws was a challenge for my fingers and safety.

After the falcon was given a liquid food supplement, and a medication to reduce inflammation, it was placed in a large carrier. As it stood near the gate, we could once again appreciate its striking appearance before turning out the light.

Its white chin, throat, and sides of its neck



were a striking contrast to its blackish crown and dark gray mantle. Under the eyes, on the sides of its head, were the typical black wedges. It was as if they pointed toward its buff-colored breast and belly that were adorned with small black bars.

The next morning, we delivered the peregrine to Gail Barnes in Lubbock.

Since we had other concerns in addition to the trauma it had sustained, she promised the falcon would be checked for any lead poisoning, and "asper," an upper respiratory infection. From the worn tips of its long tail feathers, we all were aware it had been down for a while.

Telling her we would contact the phone number listed on the band, Gail cautioned that often the information is not given by the answering service. She had already experienced the long wait that could occur.

Once home, Art gave me the information

he had taken from the band. A phone number and web site accompanied a number given the falcon. My first choice was the personal contact.

A pleasant, youthful voice soon took the information I provided. Telling her about the banded hawk from Wyoming, I added how important the information is to those of us doing bird rehabilitation.

"Just a minute," she said. "I'll look it up for you." With the number I had provided, she said the peregrine falcon had been banded Oct. 5, 2011 at South Padre Island in Cameron County.

When Gail called that afternoon, she quickly relayed that there were no broken bones, no lead, and no "asper." Then she paused. "It has a detached retina and is blind in that eye. It's non-releasable. The vet thinks it would make a great educational bird since it's so docile."

She added that once back at the wildlife

center, the falcon ate readily from the numerous and unfortunate casualties of cars and windows. Their remains were frozen and kept so that recovering raptors that require an avian diet could be fed. Then I shared with her the information gained from the band. The next day Gail called to say the peregrine was three years old. Knowing the location of the banding, she said the birds receive their bracelets when six months old.

When I referenced the advancing age of their current educational peregrine, Gail said she thought they'd keep the newcomer as a future replacement.

Although the species is widely distributed throughout the United States during migration, questions remain. The peregrine is a cliff breeder that frequents Canada, Alaska, and Greenland in the summer, and the southernmost boundary of Texas or on into Mexico in the winter. Why was it in

Sand Springs, a small community east of Big Spring, on June 12, 2014?

Records show that in Texas nesting has been confirmed in Big Bend, the Davis Mountains, and McKittrick Canyon. Mountains in Colorado, Arizona, and New Mexico have also verified nests.

Could Signal Peak and the western escarpment provide a lure for future generations even though the peregrines are known to avoid arid deserts?

Although the powerful falcon could no longer use its unmatched speed to dive and catch its prey, the magnificence of its stature would attract and educate children and adults for years to come. To have delivered it to the wildlife center on Friday, the 13th left us with many questions that have no answers.

Hand patterns tend to repeat themselves, and it is normal for players to plan the play of these hands in accordance with their previous experience. But similar hands should not always be treated the same way, as even the slightest difference in the setup might warrant a different approach.

Consider this deal where South won the club lead with the king and

cashed the A-K of trumps. Had the trumps divided 3-2, he would have made the rest of the tricks by drawing the missing trump and ruffing a club in dummy.

But when West failed to follow to the second trump lead, South stopped drawing trumps, playing the ace of clubs and ruffed a club with dummy's seven. East overruffed, and the grand slam went down the drain.

South was certainly unlucky to find the hearts divided 4-1 and the clubs 6-2, but he should have made the contract anyway.

After discovering the 4-1 trump division, declarer should have recognized the risks of trying to ruff a third round of clubs in dummy. Instead, he should have led a diamond to the ace at trick four and ruffed a diamond in his hand at trick five.

Then, after cashing the queen of trumps and leading a spade to the jack, he could draw East's last trump with dummy's jack and discard the five of clubs on it. He would then score the rest of the tricks with the A-K-Q-10 of spades and ace of clubs.

In effect, South's club loser is made to disappear by reversing the usual procedure of trumping a loser in dummy and instead trumping one of dummy's losers in his hand. There is nothing unusual about the hand — except the difficulty of resisting the more familiar pattern of play.

Free agency opens in the NBA

NEW YORK (AP) — Attention, shoppers! Free agency in the NBA is open, and LeBron James and Carmelo Anthony are available.

Players and teams could begin negotiating just past midnight EDT on Tuesday morning, though contracts can't be signed until July 10, after next season's salary cap has been set.

James, Dwyane Wade and Chris Bosh, who joined together in Miami in 2010 and led the Heat to two championships and four straight NBA Finals, all became free agents.

Though many expect that trio to stay with the Heat, Anthony could be persuaded to leave the New York Knicks for a team he believes gives him a better chance to compete for a championship. He was visiting Chicago on Tuesday, and Houston and Dallas also could try to pry the 2012-13 scoring champion away from the Knicks, who can pay him around \$30 million more than any team under NBA rules.

Longtime stars Paul Pierce, Dirk Nowitzki and Pau Gasol also are free agents, along with players such as Toronto's Kyle Lowry and Indiana's Lance Stephenson, who are coming off their best seasons in the league.

It's the most anticipated free agency class since 2011, when James led a class that included Wade, Bosh, and other All-Stars such as Amare Stoudemire and Joe Johnson.

That free agency period changed the NBA. This one might mostly change the Heat.

They are in need of an upgrade after getting smashed by San Antonio in the finals, and the Big Three could help give them the means to make one if they agree to salaries that won't clog up too much of the cap.

Knicks president Phil Jackson hopes Anthony also agrees to take less than a maximum salary, which would be more than \$125 million if he stayed in New York.

Also in New York, the Brooklyn Nets stagger into free agency without their coach after letting Jason Kidd leave for the Milwaukee Bucks. The teams agreed to a deal Monday, with the Bucks sending two future second-round picks to the Nets, who allowed Kidd to pursue other jobs after denying his request for more power in the organization.

Brooklyn has Pierce and Shaun Livingston among its key players who are free agents.

The Los Angeles Lakers have plenty of money to offer, along with the chance to play with Kobe Bryant. Teams such as Phoenix and Atlanta have some good pieces in place and enough cap space to add another.

Nets agree to deal Kidd to Milwaukee

NEW YORK (AP) — Jason Kidd had a seat in the coaching box and a jersey in the rafters. He wanted more. And now his celebrated return to the Nets has turned into an ugly exit.

Kidd is set to become Milwaukee's coach after Brooklyn agreed to a deal Monday with the Bucks, who paved the way for Kidd's arrival by firing coach Larry Drew.

The Nets will receive second-round draft picks in 2015 and 2019. They said a search for a new coach would begin immediately.

Kidd went 44-38 in his only season as Nets coach, but then sought control of the basketball department and was denied. The Nets gave him permission to talk to other teams about a job.

It was a stunningly quick ending to Kidd's reunion with the franchise he twice led to the NBA Finals as a player. The Nets hired him last June as coach just weeks after he retired as a player and retired his No. 5 before a preseason game in October.

Saunders struggles as Rangers fall to O's

BALTIMORE (AP) — Joe Saunders' perfect record against the Baltimore Orioles disintegrated with a flawed performance that left the left-hander in a dour mood.

Saunders yielded four home runs, two in the first inning, and that was enough to send the Texas Rangers to a 7-1 defeat Monday night.

Saunders (0-5) came in with a 7-0 record against Baltimore. No one in history had more wins without a loss against the Orioles, but that mark is now history.

In his last three starts, Saunders has given up 20 runs in 15 2-3 innings.

"They have been miserable," he said. "It's tough man."

This one hurt a bit more than usual, because the Rangers desperately needed a win after losing nine of 11.

"You see your guys scuffling and you see your guys battling and play-

ing hard. You try to pick them up and throw zeroes and instead you throw them in a hole the first inning," Saunders said. "It's not fun. It's not fun for me, it's not fun for them, it's not fun for anybody."

Steve Pearce hit two-run drives in the first and fourth innings to stake Baltimore to a 6-0 lead. It was the first two-homer game of his career.

Adam Jones and J.J. Hardy also homered for the Orioles, who hit a major league-leading 46 long balls in June. It was the first time Saunders yielded four homers in a game since June 30, 2009.

"The first home run to Pearce was a bad pitch, the other three were decent pitches," he said. "I have to get the ball down and get more groundballs, for sure."

Ubaldo Jimenez (3-8) allowed one run, none earned, and four hits with seven strikeouts in eight innings.

The right-hander walked only one after issuing 30 free passes in his previous seven starts.

Signed to a four-year, \$50 million contract in February, Jimenez was 0-4 in nine starts since May 8 and 0-6 with a 6.28 ERA in eight starts this season at Camden Yards.

This start, however, was a pleasure.

"It feels good, finally, to get the first win at home and finally being there for the team," Jimenez said. "I know it's been really tough for me in the first half, but I have a lot of confidence, a lot of faith, that things are going to change."

Saunders can only hope for a change, too. After giving up seven runs and nine hits in five innings, the left-hander is 0-8 over 12 starts since beating Houston last August.

"You try to handle it the best you can," he said.

Clippers sale hinges on legalities of family trust

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The \$2 billion sale of the Los Angeles Clippers will hinge on the technicalities of family trust law and whether Donald Sterling's estranged wife had the right to unilaterally negotiate a deal with former Microsoft CEO Steve Ballmer.

The July 7 trial will look at the trust's terms alone and not focus on whether the 80-year-old Sterling is mentally incapacitated, Superior Court Judge Michael Levanas said Monday.

Attorneys will argue about whether Shelly Sterling properly followed the terms of the trust in declaring Donald Sterling to be mentally incapacitated and what happens to a deal that hasn't been closed once a trust is revoked.

Shelly Sterling struck a deal to sell the team to Ballmer in May after Donald Sterling's racist remarks to a girlfriend were publicized and the NBA

moved to oust him as an owner.

She had two doctors examine her husband and they declared that he was mentally incapacitated and unable to act as an administrator of The Sterling Family Trust, which owns the Clippers. The terms of the trust say incapacitation can be determined by two licensed doctors without ties to the family who are specialists in their field.

In court filings, Donald Sterling's attorneys argued that he submitted to medical examination under false pretenses, there was undue influence in the doctors' findings, and that the examination and letters regarding his mental capacity were defective and incomplete.

"There was no duping," Shelly Sterling's attorney Pierce O'Donnell said Monday. Donald Sterling voluntarily went to Cedars Sinai Imaging Center

to get scans of his brain and there was no requirement to remind Donald Sterling, who is an attorney, or his legal team of the trust's conditions.

The judge said another issue likely to be "front and center" during the trial is what happens to a deal that hasn't been closed when a trust is revoked. Donald Sterling revoked the trust on June 9 — weeks after Shelly Sterling negotiated the deal with Ballmer.

Shelly Sterling's attorneys contend that finishing the deal is part of winding down the trust's affairs and that she has an obligation to close the deal or Ballmer will sue.

But Donald Sterling's attorneys argue that a revocation means probate court has no jurisdiction and that winding down affairs refers to passive actions, not a sale that markedly changes the assets in the trust and its value.

Today is Tuesday, July 1, the 182nd day of 2014. There are 183 days left in the year. This is Canada Day. Today's Highlight in History: On July 1, 1944, delegates from 44 countries began meeting at Bretton Woods, New Hampshire, where they agreed to establish the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank. On this date: In 1535, Sir Thomas More went on trial in England, charged with high treason for

rejecting the Oath of Supremacy. (More was convicted, and executed.) In 1863, the pivotal, three-day Civil War Battle of Gettysburg, resulting in a Union victory, began in Pennsylvania. In 1867, Canada became a self-governing dominion of Great Britain as the British North America Act took effect. In 1912, aviator Harriet Quimby, 37, was killed along with her passenger, William Willard, when they were thrown out of Quimby's monoplane at the Third Annual Boston Aviation Meet. In 1934, Hollywood

began enforcing its Production Code subjecting motion pictures to censorship review. In 1946, the United States exploded a 20-kiloton atomic bomb near Bikini Atoll in the Pacific. In 1963, the U.S. Post Office inaugurated its five-digit ZIP codes. In 1973, the Drug Enforcement Administration was established.
