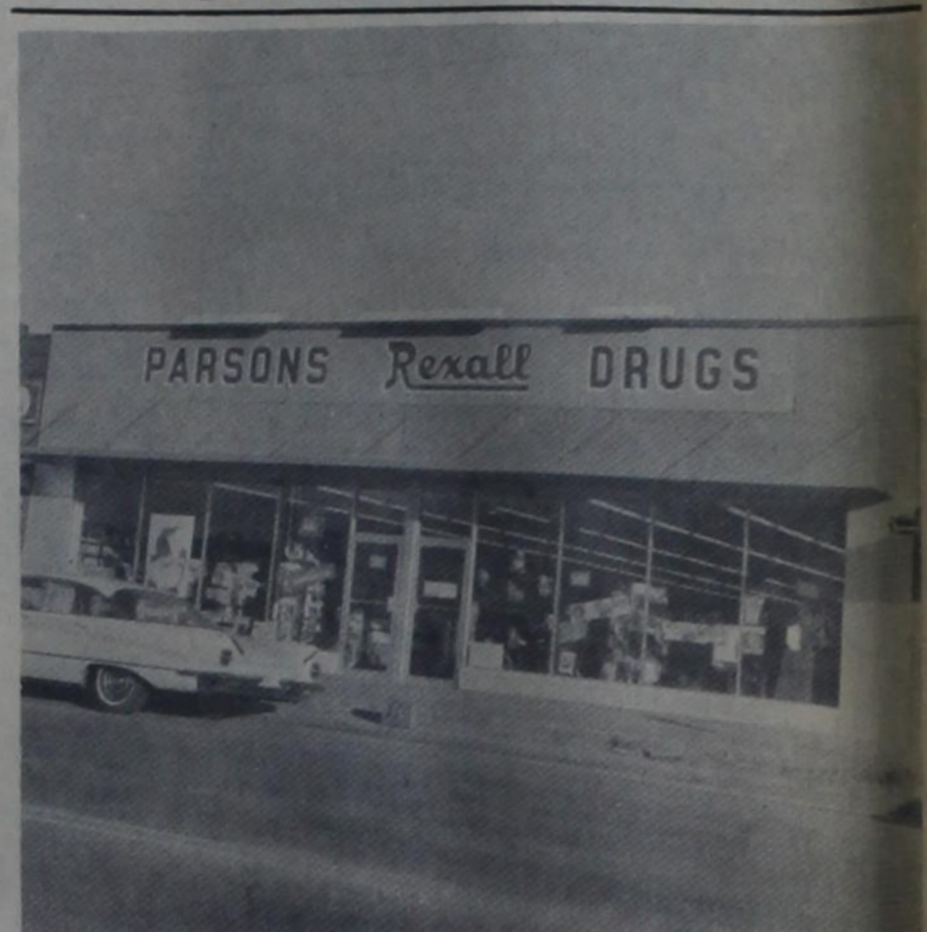

Adult Education Program Started

Dimmitt Public Schools is operating basic adult education program in North Grade School each Monday and Tuesday nights from 7 to 9:30 p.m.

There are approximately 70 adults enrolled in this program which is under the instruction of five local teachers and supervised by Weldon Skinner, principal of North Grade School.

This program is operated under Texas Educational Agency and financed under the Economic Opportunity Act.

Any adult who has less than an eighth grade education may attend these classes without any expense.

This program is designed to raise the educational level of adults in the United States says Paul Hilburn, Superintendent of schools.

Any adult with less than an eighth grade formal education is urged to attend these classes. Enrollment can be at any time since classes operate on an individual basis with students being able to move from one level to another at any time their educational attainment permits the transfer.

West Texas Telephone Co. To Have Brand Opening

West Texas Telephone Company will have grand opening and formal dedication of their new office Friday and Saturday announces Bill Woodard, manager.

The office will be open to the public from 2 to 5 p.m. Friday and from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday.

Representatives from the four towns served by the new facilities will cut the ribbon at the formal dedication of the new office Friday at 2 p.m. Public is invited to attend the dedication ceremony.

Short speeches will be given by Thomas L. Anderson, president of Trans-Continental Telephone and Electronics, Inc., Ray Hoffman, district supervisor for Stromberg-Carlson Manufacturing Co., and George Carlisle, representative of Southwestern Bell Telephone Co.

C. G. Lowery, vice-president of Trans-Continental will preside at the dedication.

During the two-day open house, twenty free telephone calls will be given away. The calls will allow for 30 minutes anywhere in the continental U. S. A. Ten calls will be given away on Friday and 10 calls on Saturday.

Woodard says, "All you have to do in order to win a phone call is to register at the door." Gifts will be given to all registering at the door. Refreshments will be served.

The new dial equipment in use today in Dimmitt, Nazareth, Hart and Sunnyside is of the most modern available to the industry according to Woodard.

Incoming calls from all over North America can be dialed directly to any subscriber in any of these towns, either through one operator at the distant end or when DDD (Direct Distance Dialing) is used, without passing through any operator. In this case, the far away subscriber would dial directly to the subscriber in the above towns.

The subscribers between Dimmitt and the other towns can dial each other without charge. This is known as free service or extended area service says Woodard.

Persons visiting the Dimmitt exchange should take particular notice of the large battery used to power the equipment. This provides direct current for operating the various switches and is also used for talking power. This large battery has about eight hours of reserve power which will keep the equipment operating in

case of a commercial power failure.

The large iron framework where thousands of wires are attached is known as the distributing frame. Here the outside cables are terminated on lightning protectors and the equipment cables are terminated on terminal blocks. They are then tied together as required by the use of jumper wires. Here numbers are changed, phones connected and disconnected and tests made when trouble occurs. That is why the test board is located closely to the distributing frame.

The switching equipment is divided into three basic groups. First, there is the linefinder group which finds the calling line and places dial tone on it after the receiver is lifted from the telephone. This connects to the middle or selector group which absorbs and uses the pulses generated by the dial of the telephone. These pulses direct the equipment to the proper hundreds groups desired. After this, the third or connector group takes over and from the last two digits of the dialed number finds the proper telephone line, connects the two telephones together and rings the called telephone. If the line is busy, it returns a busy tone.

The equipment associated with the toll trunks and the board is somewhat separated from the local equipment although connections can be made between the two. This is the equipment which ties Dimmitt to the rest of the nation and the world.

"The toll board is not only a technical piece of equipment but also attractive in its functional design," comments Woodard.

"Notice the beauty of the woodwork and the simplicity of the face equipment when you attend the open house," says Woodard.

The operators handle all calls leaving Dimmitt on the intertoll network. Here the toll tickets are written, the calls are timed, information is given and any other operator assistance which may be required.

Vandals Wreck \$450,000 Damage To Texas Highway Signs Annually

Highway signs are erected for the safety and convenience of the motoring public — not to provide gun-toting punks with a handy target for plinking.

Yet, a major share of the \$450 thousand vandalism to Texas highway signs annually is caused by gunfire, according to D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer.

Bullet-riddled roadside markers accounted for 85 per cent of all signs which had to be replaced

in one Texas Highway Department District in West Texas in one year.

Even a small highway sign costs about \$10 to replace. Larger, more elaborate signs costing hundreds of dollars have been targets for wanton vandalism too, Greer said.

If apprehended, vandals can be made to pay for the destruction they cause. But the person who operates a motor vehicle in Texas foots the greater portion of the bill for replacement through his motor fuel taxes and licensing fees, Greer said.

More important, destruction of signs causes inconvenience — and many times deadly peril — to motorists using the highways.

"So be a good sport during this 'Point your gun only at game, not our highway signs.'"

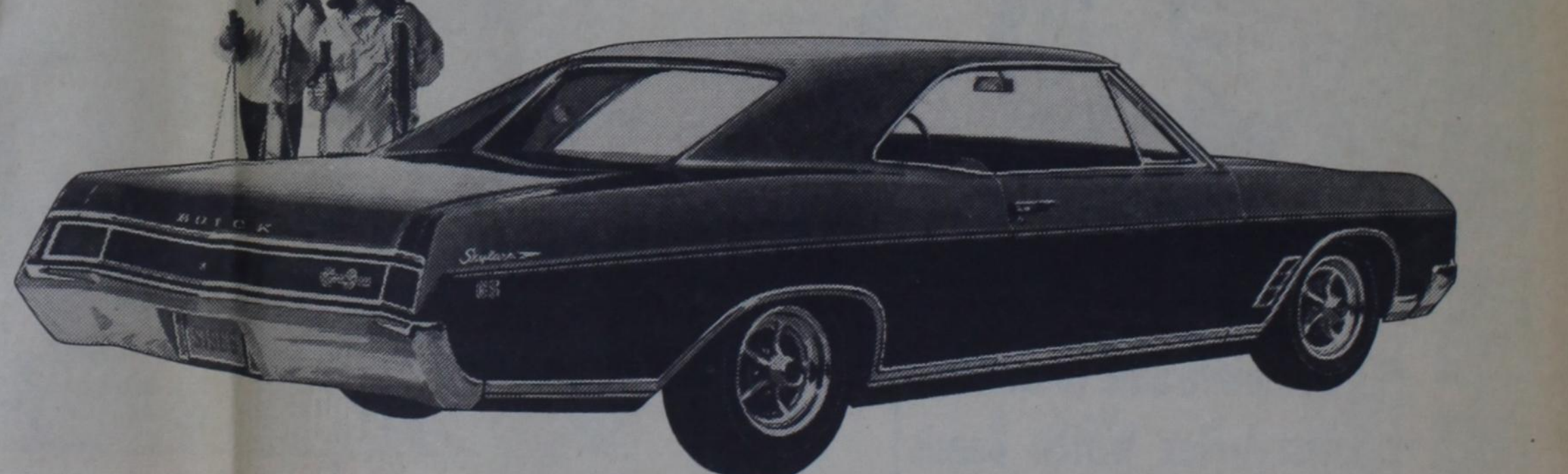

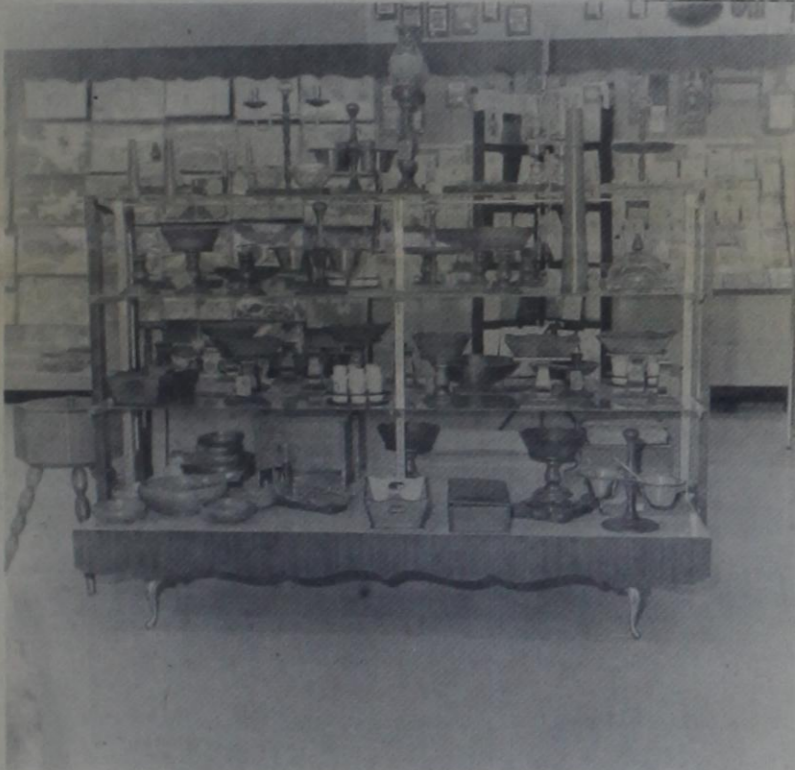

1966 Wheat Diversion Program Explained

Here are the provisions of the new wheat diversion program as authorized by the 1965 Agricultural Act.

(1) This is a volunteer program, but producers desiring to participate must sign-up prior to a final date. It has been determined that the sign-up period will be at the same time as the feed grain program sign-up, probably around February and March.

(2) The minimum and mandatory diversion for participation is 15 percent of the 1966 farm wheat allotment.

Example: Farm allotment 50.0 X 15 percent equals 7.5 acres to be set aside and devoted to a conserving use. (In 1965 this was 11.1 percent of allotment.) In this example the farm could have 50.0 acres planted, earn domestic certificate payments, and be eligible for price support on all wheat produced. There would be no diverted acreage payment.

(3) The maximum acres that

you may divert is 50 percent of allotment. In the above example, this would be 25.0 acres and the diverted acres payment would be 50 percent of county loan rate times 1966 projected wheat yield.

Example: County loan rate \$1.25 X 50 percent equals 62.5 cents per bushel times farm projected yield of 35 bu. equals \$21.87 per acre times 25.0 acres diverted. The domestic certificates are determined as follows: Farm Allotment 50.0 acres times 35 bushels per acre (projected yield) equals 1750 bushel (normal production) 1750 bushels times 45 percent equals 787 bushels (domestic certificates). The payment for the domestic certificates will be the difference between the 1966 county wheat loan rate and the parity price of wheat July 1, 1966, (based on Oct. 1965 parity) which was \$2.56 per bushel. This would be \$1.31 per bushel (\$2.56 less \$1.25 county loan rate equals \$1.31.)

(4) Diverted acres may be planted in a substitute crop in lieu of part payment. (To be determined by Secretary of Agriculture) except the mandatory 15 percent.

(5) Wheat acreage may be planted to feed grains or feed grain acreage to wheat, provided the farm has both a wheat allotment and feed grain base, and the operator signs-up to participate in both programs.

(6) The operator must comply with other allotment crops (cotton and peanuts) on the participating farm and with the wheat allotment

on all other farms in which he has an interest.

(7) Farms participating in the wheat program will earn diverted acreage and certificate payments even though the planted wheat is destroyed by hail or other natural disaster.

THE 1966 COTTON PROGRAM

The 1966 Cotton Program is a new program authorized by the Agricultural Act of 1965, and is a four year program, 1966-1969. However, not all provisions of the program may apply to subsequent years. The following provisions will apply to the 1966 crop if cotton farmers approve marketing quotas on the 1966 crop by two thirds majority in the November 23 Cotton Referendum.

(1) You may plant your entire allotment and sell on the market. No diverted acreage payment or price support payment.

(2) You may sign-up and reduce your cotton allotment by the minimum of 12 1/2 percent, 25 percent, or the maximum of 35 percent and become eligible for diverted acreage and price support payments.

The diverted acreage payment will be 10 1/2 cents per pound, times, the farm projected yield, times, the number of acres diverted.

Example: Farm allotment 100.0 acres, projected yield 500 lbs., domestic allotment 65.0 acres (65 percent of farm effective allotment). Farm diverts 12 1/2 percent, which is 12 1/2 acres.

Payment: 500 lbs. X 10 1/2 cents per lb. equals \$52.50. \$52.50 X number acres diverted at either level.

The price support payment will always be the domestic allotment, 9.42 cents per pound, regardless of the percent diverted, provided at least 90 percent of such allotment is planted.

Example: Domestic allotment 65.0 acres (65 percent of effective allotment), times, projected yield (500 lbs.), times, 9.42 cents per lb.

65.0 X 500 equals 32,500 lbs. X 9.42 cents equals 3061.50

(On a per acre basis: 500 lbs. X 9.42 cents per lb. equals \$47.10) The total price support payment for this farm would be \$3061.50 if diversion was 12 1/2, 25, or 35 percent since it is always figured on the domestic allotment.

Farms with a 1966 effective allotment of 10.0 acres or less may comply with the domestic cotton allotment program without reducing the cotton acreage. However, this type farm as well as all others must sign-up to earn payments.

Example: Farm allotment 10.0 acres, yield 500 lbs., domestic allotment 6.5 acres (65 percent of allotment.)

May plant 10.0 acres. Payment: 3.5 acres X 500 lbs. equals 1750 lbs. X 10 1/2 cents per lb. equals \$183.75 (diverted acreage payment.)

6.5 acres (domestic allotment), times, 500 lb. yield equals 3250 lbs. X 9.42 cents per lb. equals \$306.15 (price support payment). This farm could divert 35 percent or 3.5 acres from the 10.0 acre allotment. Plant 6.5 acres and receive diversion payment for 7.0 acres (\$367.50), plus, the \$306.15 (price support payment). TRANSFER OF 1966 COTTON ALLOTMENTS

The 1966 cotton program provides for the transfer of 1966 cotton allotments from one farm to another, and must be divided into three groups for explanation:

1. Transferring allotment from one farm to another within the county.
2. Transfer of allotment to farms outside a county.
3. Transfer of allotment by owners of farms in different counties within the State.

1. 1966 cotton allotment may be sold or leased to other farms and transferred to other farms within Castro County, provided the owner and operator of each farm signs the transfer agreement, without regard to the outcome of the transfer vote in the Referendum.

2. No cotton acreage may be purchased or leased and transferred to a farm outside of Castro County, unless two-thirds of the voters in Castro County approve such transfer in the referendum, November 23. However, Castro County farmers could lease or purchase allotments from other counties where such transfers have been approved, and transfer the acreage to Castro County Farms.

3. Owners who control farms in other counties in the State may transfer their acreage from one farm to the other without regard to the outcome of the transfer referendum.

1966 cotton acreage may not be transferred to a farm that does not have a 1966 cotton allotment, except land under the same ownership.

The maximum acreage that may be transferred to a farm is 100.0 acres, except under the ownership provision. No acreage may be transferred across the state lines.

The acreage that may be transferred to a farm having a yield greater than ten percent above the yield of the farm from which transferred, is determined as follows: Example: (1) Transferring farm, 50.0 acre allotment, 200 lb. projected yield. (2) Receiving farm: allotment 100.0 acres, yield 600 lbs. Multiply the yield, times, allotment (if entire allotment leased or purchased) of the transferring farm: 50.0 X 200 equals 10,000 lbs. Divide the yield of the receiving farm into the pounds from the transferring farm: 10,000 divided by 600 (yield of receiving farm) equals 16.7 acres to be planted on receiving farm, plus, the 100.0 acre allotment. Total acres to be planted equals 116.7. Final projected cotton yields have been established for each Castro County farm. If you plan to purchase or lease cotton acreage you should come by our office and obtain the yield for your farm.

December ushers in the busiest season of the year for most homemakers.

One way to save time — and money — is to shop with the plentiful foods list of the USDA as your guide to budget buying.

When foods are seasonally plentiful, you have a broader selection of color, size, and quality. But what's more important, they usually wear the most favorable price tags.

Topping the December plentiful are pecans — a favorite of most chefs because they add elegance, texture and flavor to stuffings and sauces as well as to desserts, salads, and entrees.

Also, December promises plenty of apples, oranges and frozen orange juice as well as onions and cabbage, peanuts and peanut butter.

Apple production is about 9 percent above the 5-year average with peak shipments moving to market now.

Both Texas and Florida citrus growers have recovered from the freeze damage of several years ago, so their orange shipments will be much larger. Total orange shipments will be much larger. Total orange crop is expected to run about 13 percent larger than average.

The late summer onion crop set a new record and cabbage production is the largest since 1956.

December marketings of turkeys are expected to be larger than last year with prices little changed. Increased broiler production points toward heavy offerings and attractive prices.

In September, I gave you the recipe for a Pumpkin Spice Cake. I have had several requests to repeat it, so here it is —

PUMPKIN SPICE CAKE
Substitute 3/4 cup canned pumpkin for 1/2 cup water when preparing spice cake mix as directed on the package. Add 1 cup finely chopped nuts. Bake in a greased 2 quart ring mold or tube pan or 9 inch baking pans in preheated 350 degree oven for 40-45 minutes. Cool for 10 minutes; remove from pan. Glaze with mixture of 1 cup confectioner's sugar, 1 teaspoon lemon juice and 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind; add just enough cream to make glaze slightly runny. Drizzle the lemon glaze over the top and sides of the cake.

Books and important papers damaged by water can be salvaged with prompt and proper treatment, says Sheryl Bailey, Texas A&M University Extension civil defense specialist.

The water-damaged books, and papers should be dried carefully and slowly. Books should be placed on end to dry with the leaves apart.

After exposure to the air for a time, they should be piled and pressed to keep the leaves from crumpling.

These drying and pressing procedures should be alternated until the materials are thoroughly dry, in order to prevent mildew.

If the books are quite damp, you may want to sprinkle starch or talcum between the leaves to take up moisture; after several hours, the powder can be brushed off.

The addition of a little heat and the separating of the pages are other desirable steps at the end of the process to prevent musty odors.

Here is a salad sure to be a favorite during the holiday season:

SHRIMP 'N' CRANBERRY SALAD
Shrimp Layer
3/4 lb. cooked, peeled, cleaned shrimp, fresh or frozen or

3 cans (4 1/2 oz. each) shrimp
1 cup chopped celery
2 tablespoons chopped parsley
1 tablespoon unflavored gelatin
1/4 cup cold water
1 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing
1/2 cup water

Thaw frozen shrimp or drain canned shrimp. Cut shrimp into 1/2-inch pieces. Add celery and parsley. Soften gelatin in cold water for 5 minutes; dissolve over hot water. Blend mayonnaise

and water. Stir in dissolved gelatin. Add to shrimp mixture and blend well. Pour into a 1 1/2 qt. mold; chill until firm.

Cranberry Layer
1 tablespoon unflavored gelatin
1/4 cup cold water
1 can (1 pound) jellied cranberry sauce
1/2 cup chopped pecans
1/2 cup crushed pineapple
1 tablespoon lemon juice
Salad greens

Soften gelatin in cold water for 5 minutes; dissolve over hot water. Mash cranberry sauce. Add pecans, pineapple, lemon juice, and gelatin; mix well. Pour over congealed shrimp layer; chill until firm. Unmold on salad greens. Serves 6.

If you think teen-age girls have been wearing their skirts too short, you can stop worrying, says Mrs. Lynn Stiles, Texas A&M University Extension consumer education specialist. Hemlines have dropped to the ankles in the newest teen-age fashion fad, the "granny gown."

The fad originated with teenagers on the West Coast. One report indicates that the master of ceremonies at a dance commented on the extremely short dress worn by a young performer. At the next program, the girl came in ankle-length attire—and the gag turned into a fashion rage.

Girls who could sew copied the demure-looking cotton dress—and the style became a favorite after-swim cover-up for feminine surfers. Granny gowns became so popular that ready-to-wear styles quickly appeared on the market. Now, teens from coast to coast wear "grannies."

The garments are favorites for lounge wear and party outfits. They come in soft and feminine cottons like dotted swiss, dimity and tiny floral prints. Granny gowns are "in" with pre-teen and children, too.

One style for little girls, in a quaint provincial print, features long ruffled pantaloons. With the younger set going back for the old-fashioned look, who can predict what type of fashion will be popular next? The hoop skirt may be on its way back.

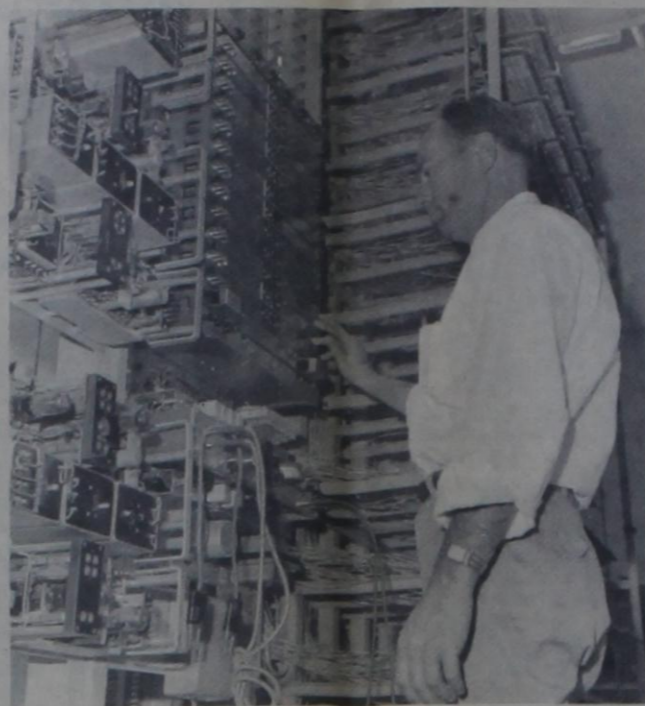

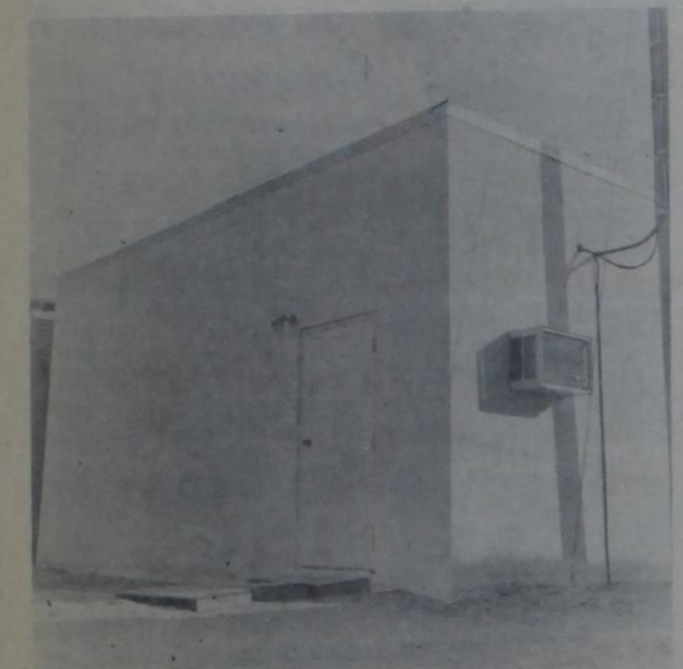

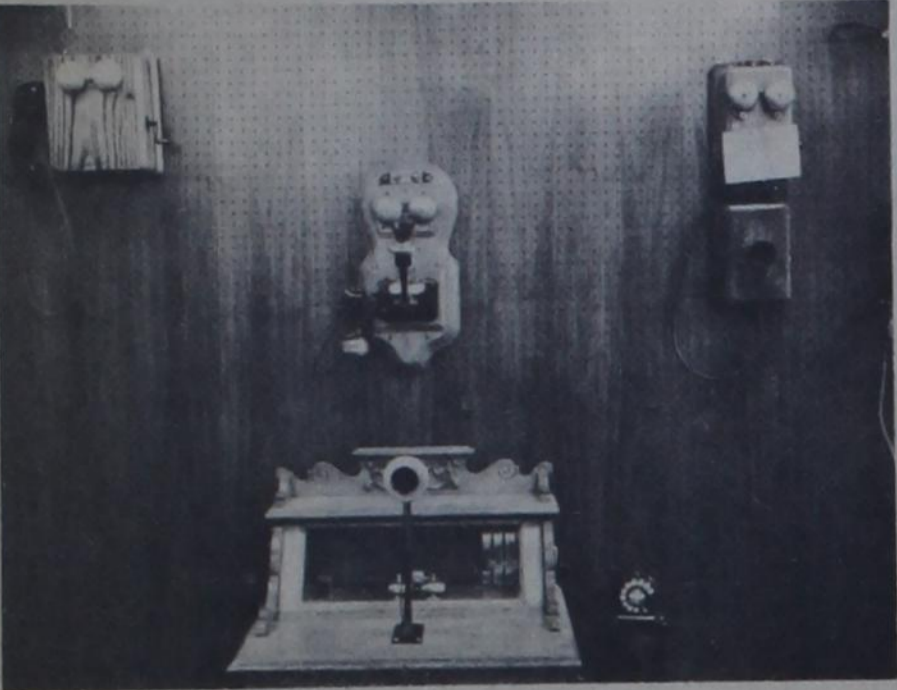

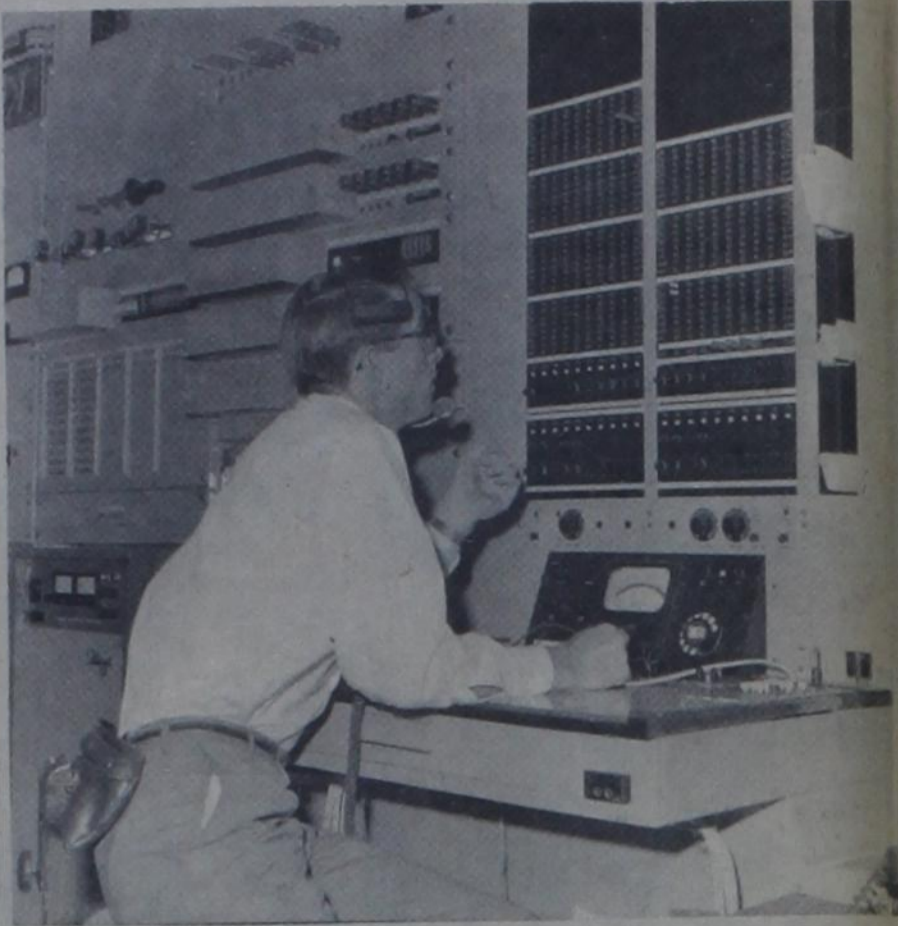


PICTURED ABOVE are some of the antique phones which will be displayed during the open house of West Texas Telephone Co. See story for details.

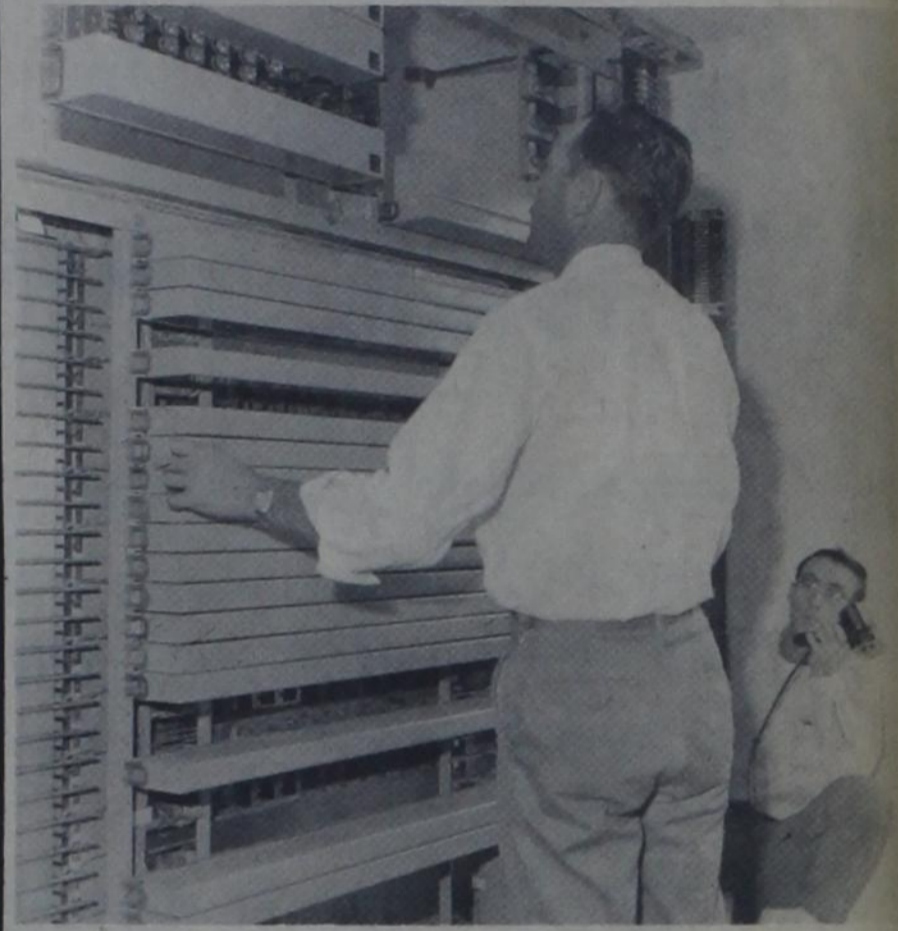
Antique Phone Collection To Be Shown Here

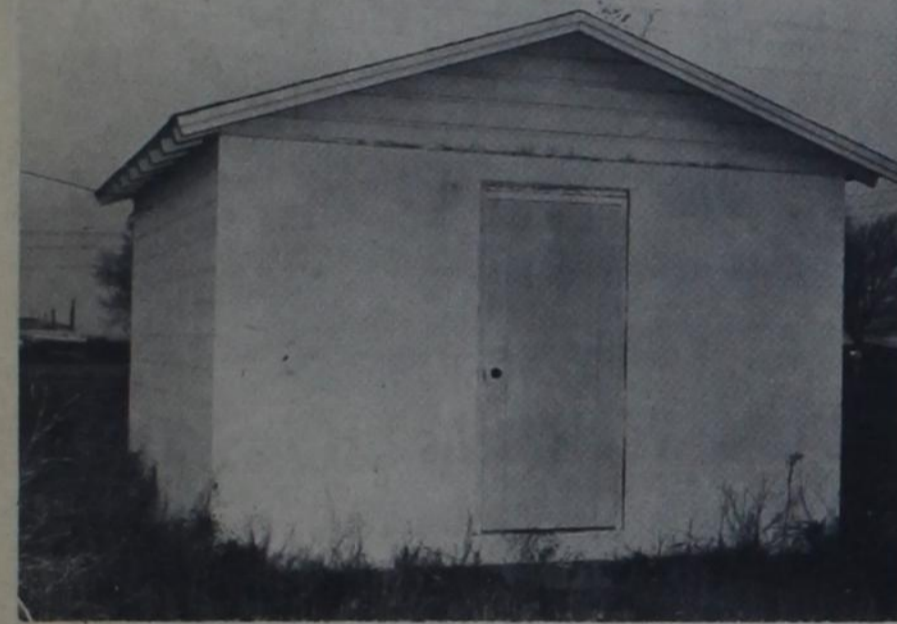

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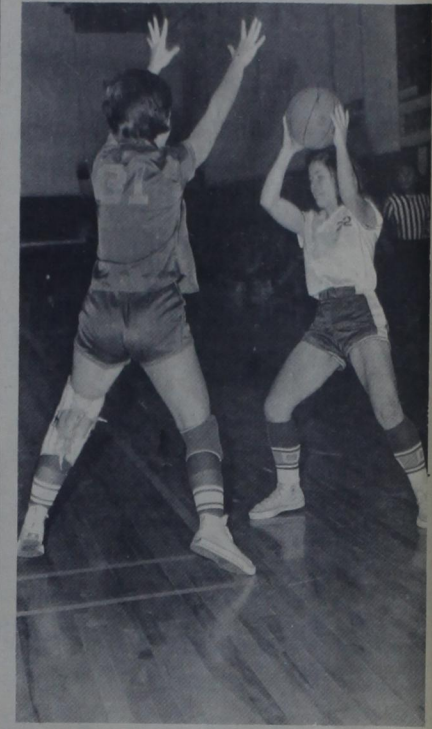

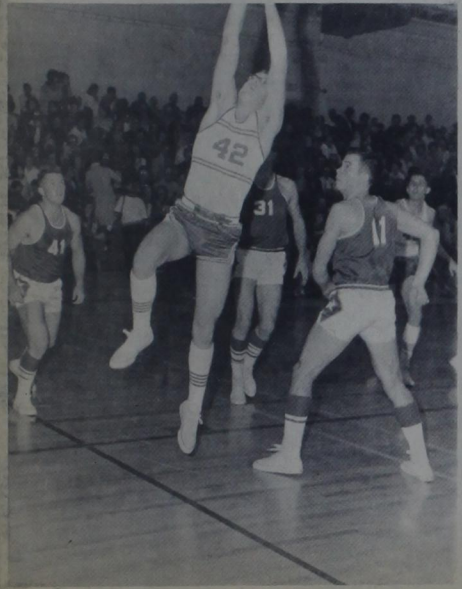

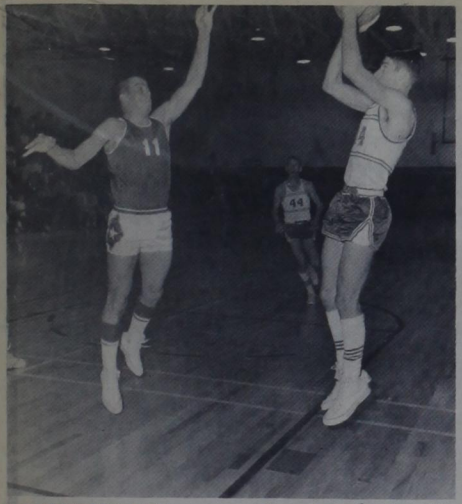
