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PD investigates armed robbery at Advantage Inn

 Big Spring police are searching for a man who allegedly robbed Advantage Inn at gunpoint early this morning.
 Around 4 a.m. today, police were advised a black male wearing a black hoodie entered the office of the hotel, located at 804 W. Interstate 20, displayed a handgun and demanded money.

"The clerk gave the suspect an undetermined amount of cash and the subject fled on foot," a news release from the Big Spring Police Department stated.
 Officers checked the area but were unable to locate the suspect.
 No further description of the suspect was released by the department, which stated it had no further information of the incident at this time.

Zubiate trial resumes today

118th District Court in Big Spring

Testimony is expected to resume today in 118th District Court in the trial of Leroy Zubiate, who is accused of shooting and seriously wounding a Big Spring man last November.
 Zubiate, a 30-year-old New Mexico native, is charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon in the shooting, which occurred Nov. 27 in east Big Spring.
 Juan Diaz, 23, suffered serious gunshot wounds to the face and legs during the incident. The shooting is believed to be the result of a domestic dispute between Diaz and Zubiate, police said at the time.
 Zubiate was arrested by U.S. Marshals in San Antonio about three weeks after the shooting.
 If convicted, he could be sentenced to between two and 20 years in prison.

Zubiate is represented by San Antonio attorney Sylvia Cisneros, while Howard County District Attorney Hardy L. Wilkerson is prosecuting the case.
 After the first day of testimony Tuesday, District Judge Tim Yeats adjourned the trial until today because a scheduling conflict with Cisneros, who had to appear in court in San Antonio Wednesday.
 Wilkerson is expected to rest the state's case today, at which time Cisneros will present Zubiate's defense.

TEA offers graduation toolkit BSISD registration for elementary ends Friday

AUSTIN – Commissioner of Education Michael Williams announced today that the Texas Education Agency, in collaboration with the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board and Texas Workforce Commission, has available a graduation toolkit for students, parents and school counselors.

The toolkit provides essential information regarding the new graduation plan under House Bill 5, which was passed by the Texas Legislature last year. House Bill 5 provides for a more flexible graduation program for all students who enter high school beginning in the 2014-2015 school year. Commissioner Williams believes that information and early planning are now critical steps for all students and parents in preparing for high school and beyond.

"Students now have more choices, which means parents and students must begin exploring their high school options as early as eighth grade," said Commissioner Williams. "This toolkit, which is available in English and Spanish, offers an excellent overview of the new state graduation requirements and endorsements, as well as vital information for postsecondary plans for college or the workforce."

The graduation toolkit provides a summary of the state's new graduation plan and descriptions of the five potential endorsements that can now be offered by high schools, as well as a checklist to begin planning for high school and beyond.

The toolkit offers students and parents an overview of the benefits to pursuing the Distinguished Level of Achievement graduation plan. House Bill 5 called on the Texas Education Agency, Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board and Texas Workforce Commission to collaborate in

touting the Distinguished Level benefits. Benefits of the Distinguished Level include:

Allowing a high school graduate to compete for top 10 percent automatic admission eligibility at any Texas public university;

Positioning a high school graduate (who is financially qualified) to be first in line for a Texas Grant to help pay for university tuition and fees; and

Ensuring a high school graduate will be a more competitive applicant at the most selective colleges and universities.

"It is critical for students and parents to be well informed on the changes to high school graduation plans so they can make thoughtful decisions early," said Commissioner of Higher Education Raymund Paredes. "This toolkit is designed to guide students and families through the benefits of each pathway to increase the likelihood of preparation and success in college and the workforce."

The toolkit also includes information on various workforce resources provided through the Texas Workforce Commission. All these resources are geared toward assisting students and parents in planning for any post-secondary goals for college or career.

"I encourage students, parents, and school counselors to use this toolkit as a starting point for discussions about their students' future endeavors," said Texas Workforce Commission Chairman Andres Alcantar. "This excellent resource will assist Texas students as they plan their high school years and postsecondary careers."

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Romo set to play for 1st time since back surgery

OXNARD, Calif. (AP) — Tony Romo will play his first game since undergoing back surgery for a herniated disk last December.

Romo will start for the Cowboys in Saturday's exhibition game against the Baltimore Ravens. Romo missed Dallas' exhibition opener against San Diego as the Cowboys are easing him back into things after his second back surgery in the

past two years.

Romo said he gave no thought to skipping the preseason to make sure he stayed healthy, saying the only way to get better at football is to play football. It will be his first chance to play in a game under new play caller Scott Linehan.

"I think you have to play in the preseason," Romo said. "Obviously, some people can't, but I do know from my perspective, this game is not some-

thing where you can show up and think that you can do it. I think it's been proven for too many times that if you take too long of a break or don't get reps under you that you will be exposed in certain areas."

Coach Jason Garrett said he has no expectations about what he will see from Romo and is just looking forward to seeing him back in a game.

"Just go out and play," Garrett said. "We ask our players

to get prepared for any situations. We try to prepare them as coaches and it's their job to go play."

Romo sustained the injury against Washington last Dec. 22 but stayed in and threw a game-winning touchdown pass to keep Dallas' playoff hopes alive. He had surgery two days before the Cowboys lost to Philadelphia with Kyle Orton at quarterback in a season-ending loss that kept Dal-

las out of the playoffs.

The surgery in December was the second procedure on Romo's back in an eight-month span. He had a cyst removed before the start of offseason practices last year and didn't do any significant work until training camp.

Romo was held out of competitive situations throughout the offseason this year and the Cowboys limited his throws early in training camp.

Archer leads Rays past Texas

ARLINGTON (AP) — Tampa Bay right-hander Chris Archer got his only two walks out of the way against the first three Texas hitters.

Then Archer started piling up the strikeouts. The hard-throwing right-hander got into such a groove that he didn't realize he struck out six Rangers in a row at one point in the Rays' 10-1 victory Wednesday night.

"It's just one of those situations where you get in the zone and you black out," Archer said. "Your hard work and practice takes over."

Archer (8-6) had a career-high 12 strikeouts in seven innings and Matt Joyce hit the first of Tampa Bay's three early home runs. After those two walks, Archer got out of the first when Alex Rios went down swinging to start the strikeout streak.

"When he struck out Rios," I felt a lot better," manager Joe Maddon said. "That was the real deep slider that we're used to seeing. I liked that."

It was Archer's third career game with at least 10 strikeouts, and two have come against the Rangers. He struck out 11 against Texas in a home game on Sept. 8, 2012, in his third career start.

After Joyce homered in the first, Sean Rodriguez and Brandon Guyer hit two-run shots in the second off righty Miles Mikolas (1-5).

James Loney drove in two runs with his third singles for Tampa Bay, which extended its AL record by allowing three runs or less in 17 consecutive road games. Only the 1908 Chicago Cubs had a longer stretch — 21 in a row.

Texas got its run when Leonys Martin had a leadoff double in the fifth and came home on Jim Adduci's sacrifice fly.

Rangers place Darvish on DL

ARLINGTON (AP) — Yu Darvish will miss at least a couple of starts for the Rangers because of right elbow inflammation.

Texas placed its ace from Japan on the 15-day disabled list Wednesday night, a day before his scheduled start against Tampa Bay. He will have an MRI on Thursday.

The move was retroactive to Sunday, a day after Darvish allowed two runs and nine hits over four innings in a loss at Texas. The Rangers said he didn't have any issues during that game, but felt tightness when throwing on the side Monday and that feeling never went away.

"Yu had expressed that he could pitch probably if we were in a different spot, a meaningful game (Thursday)," general manager Jon Daniels said. "He agreed, we agreed, it was better to be cautious. ... With the year we've had with injuries, we're not going to push it and take any chance at this point."

Darvish is the 14th player currently on the DL for the Rangers. That is the most in the majors, as are the team's 24 overall disabled list uses, including Darvish at the beginning of the season because of neck stiffness.

Texas purchased the contract of left-hander Alex Claudio from Triple-A Round Rock to be in the bullpen a night after the Rangers' 14-inning victory.

Phillips said the coaching staffs from Forsan and Grape Creek will determine the format for the JV and varsity scrimmages prior to the start, with each last approximately an hour.

The Big Spring Steers are scheduled to face Burkburnett at 11 a.m. at Chesley Field in Cisco, while the Coahoma Bulldogs take on Jim Ned beginning at 6 p.m. at Bulldog Stadium in Coahoma.

The Trump Echo

South dealer.
Both sides vulnerable.

Opening lead — ten of clubs.
The trump echo is a signal by which one defender tells the other that he started with three trumps. There are times when this knowledge is critical, as illustrated by today's deal.

West leads a club, which, given East's club holding, could easily be a singleton. So, after taking the ace, East returns the deuce, his lowest club, to tell West to return the lower-ranking of the two remaining side suits, diamonds.

West ruffs the club with the four — beginning a trump echo to indicate three trumps — and shifts to his fourth-best diamond, the five. Declarer takes East's queen with the ace and plays the king of trumps. West following with the deuce as East wins with the ace.

If there were no such animal as a trump echo, East might make the mistake of trying to cash the king of diamonds as the setting trick. He would have no way of knowing that West started with five diamonds and South with the singleton ace. But thanks to the trump echo, East knows his partner has another trump, so he leads another club for West to ruff, and South goes down one.

There are positive and negative inferences associated with the trump echo. In the present case, for example, East can tell from West's ruff with the four, followed by his later play of the two, that West has a third trump.

By the same token, if West had started with the doubleton 4-2, he would ruff with the deuce at trick two. When he later played the four, East would draw the inference that West had no more trumps, and he would try to cash the king of diamonds at trick five as his only hope of stopping the contract.
