





Bible Thoughts

"SERVICE THAT EXCELLS"

By Ronnie Parker

The scribes and Pharisees of Jesus' day considered themselves to be models of righteousness and goodness. They were not. Jesus found them to be proud, pious, hypocrites. He said, "For I say unto you, that except your righteousness shall exceed the righteousness of the scribes and Pharisees, ye shall in no wise enter into the kingdom of heaven" (Matt. 5:20). The follower of Christ was not permitted to measure himself by the Pharisee for Christ wanted his followers

to excel such "righteousness."

Jesus also asked, "What do ye more than others?" (Matt. 5:47). The Saviour was teaching that His disciples must not be satisfied to live as other men. The false standards of men were below the standards of Christ. The Christian calling demands that Christians surpass others. They are to "exceed." They must "do more" and "be better" than others of the world. But they must never be filled with pride.

The Pharisee who went into the temple to pray made the error of measuring himself by other men. He said, "God, I thank thee that I am not as the rest of men." His error was pride. 

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



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PUBLIC NOTICE

All persons who wish to qualify to vote beginning February 1, 1967, must register with the County Tax office on or before January 31, 1967. In this county all persons between the ages of 21 and 60 years are required to register before they can qualify to vote.

Those persons who are over 60 years of age or who will become 60 years of age before any election they plan to vote in are NOT required to register.

New Residents of the State who have not been here the required length of time to qualify to vote and persons who will become 21 years of age after the January 31 deadline may register anytime during the year so long as they register at least 30 days before the election they plan to vote in.

It is suggested that if you will fulfil your residence requirement of 12 months in the State and 6 months in the county, or will become 21 years of age soon after the registration deadline, you should come ahead and register this month. We can mark your registration certificate to become effective on the date your qualifications are fulfilled.

out the aid of modern equipment, but the personal satisfaction derived from teaching was the same then as it is now," she said in 1956, when her former students gathered here to honor her.

On Aug. 28, 1906, she married Percy Estes, member of another pioneer family here. They joined the First Methodist Church in Dimmitt the same year.

TWO YEARS after her marriage, Mrs. Estes gave up teaching and devoted the rest of her life to her family.

The Esteses became one of the best-known families in Castro-County. In addition to his farming and ranching, Mrs. Estes served as county judge from 1926 to 1932. Their two-story family home at Fourth and Belsher was among the first in South Dimmitt and was for many years a land mark of the city.

MRS. ESTES is survived by a son, Robert, of Bovina; a daughter, Mrs. Helen Richardson of Dimmitt; three brothers, Glen Greer of Hereford, Joe Greer of Maco, and three grandchildren. Her oldest son, Greer, for whom the American Legion post here is named, was killed in action in World War II.

Walleyes Do Well At Lake Meredith

Cold-insulated Panhandle fishery crews caught 206 walleyes in new Lako Meredith, according to fishery biologist Jack Crabtree of the Texas Park and Wildlife Depart-

THEY ALSO learned that Meredith wallayes, released during the last two summers, have shown remarkable growth. Fish from lastyear's stocking averaged 15 inches with a few going above this mark. Walleyes are a shender fish and 15 inchers will probably weigh between 1 and 1½ pounds, related

Other game fish released in Lake Meredith are also showing rapid. White crappie were the second most abundant fish caught, averaging three-fourths of a round each

Five juvenile blue catfish were also captured in check nets, two of which weighed five pounds. Blue catfish may exceed 100 pounds in large lakes under fav-

orable conditions.

Game fish captured during the survey made up 77 percent of the catch. Rough fish (carp, chad, bullheads, etc.) comprised 23 per


