Robbery suspect indicted

A Big Spring man accused of participating in a June robbery has been indicted by the Howard County Grand Jury.

Heriberto Medina-Torres, 22, currently in custody at the county law enforcement center, was among those indicted during the most recent session of the grand jury.

He stands accused of aggravated robbery in connection with the June 9 holdup of Big A Shaved Ice.

Officers were called to Big A, located at 1811 Gregg, early in the morning. Witnesses said a male subject wearing a dark gray hoodie and red pants, with a red bandana covering his face, entered the building armed with a handgun and demanded money. Employees complied with his demands and he fled the scene with an undisclosed amount of cash.

"Following up on tips from citizens, a suspect was identified," BSPD Public Information Officer Sgt. Tony Everett stated in a news release. "The suspect was interviewed at the law enforcement center ... (and) during the interview, the suspect confessed to the robbery and was arrested."

A second suspect in the Big A Shaved Ice robbery, 18-year-old Fabian Rios, was stabbed to death at a Lubbock residence in August. Suspects in his death have been taken into custody and are awaiting trial.

Aggravated robbery is a first degree felony punishable by between 5 and 99 years,

Trustees were ready to approve the proposed rate at their last board meeting when college officials received a call from the county tax assessor/collectors' office informing them because of a computer glitch some of the original tax figures given to several Howard County taxing entities were incorrect.

The new figures meant college officials would have to up the proposed rate by about

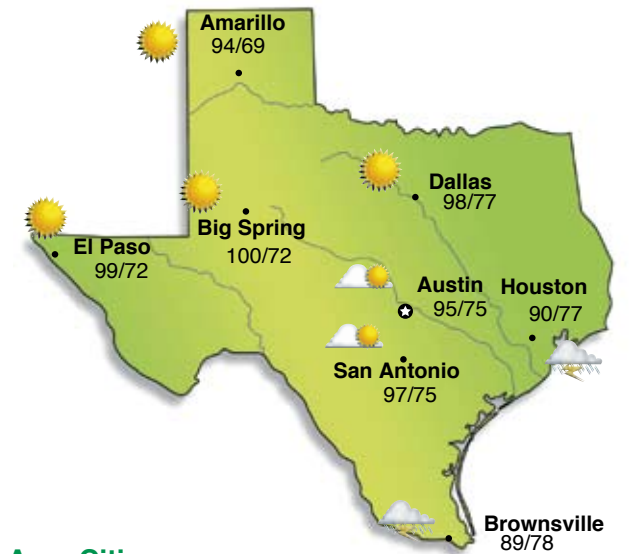

Others indicted by the grand jury include:

Big Spring rallies for 58-56 victory over Kerrville Tivy

SAN ANGELO – The Big Spring High School Steers made sure the large crowd on hand at San Angelo Stadium got their money's worth on Saturday evening.

And then some.

Matt Yanez, on the final play of the Steers' season opener, outleaped a crowd of defenders in the end and snagged a 41-yard "Hail Mary" pass from Tobyn Tannehill and then alertly pitched the ball to teammate Hunter Hill, who finished off a wild come-from-behind victory over Kerrville Tivy by cradling the game-winning touchdown while falling to the ground.

Yanez's assist helped Big Spring erase a 12-point deficit in the final 6 minutes of the contest and emerge with a

stunning 58-56 victory.

"I knew we had to score a touchdown to win," said Yanez, a senior wide receiver making his first start. "I just jumped. When I caught it, I saw Hunter out of the corner of my eye and I threw it toward him."

"Fortunately for us he caught it gracefully," he added.

Hill's reception – which came while he was falling to the ground – highlighted a thrilling offensive shootout by both teams. Big Spring and Kerrville Tivy combined for more than 1,000 total yards and a staggering 114 points.

The end result was a bit of poetic justice for the Steers, said Big Spring head coach Phillip Ritchey. The game-winning reversal was almost an exact reversal of how Ste-

phenville ended the Steers' 2013 season.

"I'm stunned," said Ritchey. "It's kind of hard not to look back at how our season ended last year. We were up three points there late in the game and then they came back and scored. I'm thinking, 'Seriously. Not again.'"

Fortunately for the Steers, Yanez, Hill and quarterback Tobyn Tannehill wouldn't let the Steers go down.

Tivy didn't make Big Spring's road easy, especially in the second quarter. After being held scoreless in the first 12 minutes of play, the Antlers reeled off a 35 points in the second quarter, including a 24-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Cade Dyal to Hunter White with 11 seconds left in the first half that put Tivy up 34-31 at the intermission.

Kerrville Tivy was far from

through creating headaches for the BSHS defense. The Antlers opened the second half with a 4-play, 75-yard scoring drive – spanning just 49 seconds – that pushed the Antler lead to 11, at 42-31. Dyal, who passed for 494 yards and six TDs, capped the drive with a 44-yard strike to White on a 2nd-and-10 play.

Big Spring managed to take away some of the Antlers' momentum on their next series. The Steers rolled 65 yards in 13 plays before Dee Parker capped the effort with a juggling catch over two defenders in the end zone.

Parker's TD – an 11-yard strike from Tannehill – cut the Tivy lead to five, at 42-37 with 4:55 left in the third quarter.

The Antlers answered right

back. Tivy pounded out a 14-play, 81-yard drive series on its ensuing possession, and pushed its lead to 12, at 49-37, at the starter of the fourth quarter.

Big Spring's chances didn't improve any over the next few minutes. The Steers, hampered by a pair of penalties, were forced to punt away their first series of the fourth, giving a potent Tivy offense the ball with just 8:28 left.

Yanez said the Steer offense knew they could keep the team in the game - if they got the chance.

"The whole game our defense was struggling with their offense. They were tired and kind of down," he said. "I told Coach Wright 'you stop them and we'll score.'"

The BSHS defense, which had been stung for touchdowns on seven straight possessions and lost senior safety Allen Ryle to a leg injury, answered Yanez's challenge in grand fashion. Garrett Wigington and the Steer defense stuffed two quick running plays and then forced an incomplete pass to set up Tivy's first punt.

More importantly, the BSHS defense allowed the Antlers to run just 1:30 off the clock before turning the ball back over the Steers offense.

Seven plays later, Tannehill made the Tivy defense pay for its offense's mistake. He capped a 7-play, 59-yard drive by hooking up with Hill on a 17-yard TD pass.

Hill's third TD of the game pulled Big Spring to within 49-43 with 5:12 left.

The pressure shifted back to the Big Spring defense from there.

Once again, the junior-laden squad proved equal to the task. The Steers bowed its neck and forced Tivy to punt once again.

Despite giving up huge amounts of real estate, Ritchey said he was proud of the way the Steer defense responded.

"They made the adjustments they needed,"

he said. "They came up big for us when we needed them most."

Unfortunately for the Steers' the Antlers didn't do Big Spring any favors with the punt. Dyal's kick sailed into the end zone, pinning the Steers at their own 20 with just 2:17 left in the contest.

It didn't take Tannehill long to fill the stadium with electricity. On the Steers' first play, he took the snap from center and dropped back into the pocket. Seconds later, he displayed the legs that made him the district 200-meter champion by pulling down the ball and sprinting up the middle, avoiding a would-be tackler at the 30 and sprinting into the end zone.

Tannehill's 80-yard TD scamper gave Big Spring a stunning 52-49 lead with just 1:59 left to play.

Surely the Steers' wouldn't see a lead fade away again, right?

Wrong. Tivy did the unthinkable from there. The Antlers reeled off an 9-play, 70-yard drive on its ensuing series. Dyal hit White with the go-ahead touchdown on a 27-yard pass play with just 26 seconds left.

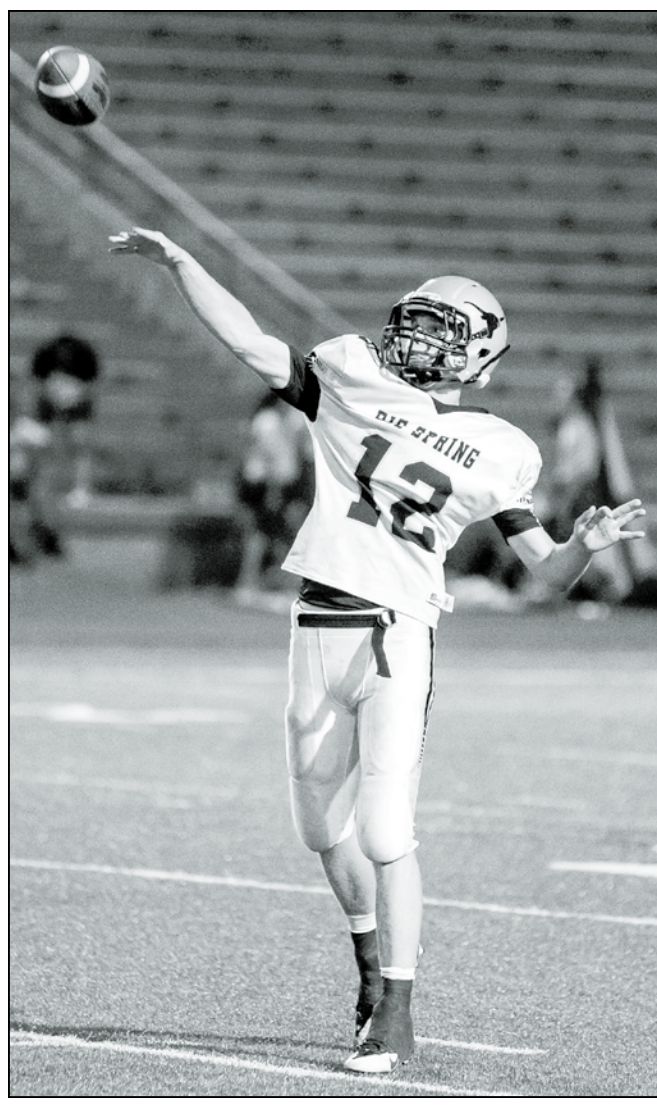
"I was stunned," said Ritchey. "It's kind of hard not to look back at how our season ended last year. We were up three points there late in the game and then they came back and scored. I'm thinking to myself, 'Seriously. Not again.'"

Tannehill made sure tragedy wouldn't befall the Steer Nation again.

On first down, he rifled a 16-yard pass to Yanez that moved the ball to the BSHS 41. On the next play, he found Yanez again for an 18-yard gain to the Kerrville 41.

With just three seconds left, Ritchey said he knew his team needed a big play to snatch victory from the jaws of defeat.

"I had confidence that our offense could do the job," said Ritchey. "We got to a point where we had to throw it up and hope for the best. There wasn't anything special that we designed with that."

Big Spring quarterback Toby Tannehill accounted for more than 500 total yards on Saturday. The BSHS senior rushed for 241 yards and threw for 280 more, including the game-winning 'Hail Mary' that gave the Steers a 58-56 win.

Tannehill agreed, saying the play was simply get into the end zone.

"Everyone went vertical," said the BSHS senior. "Everyone just went deep. I just threw it up and hoped someone would catch it."

Yanez and Hill answered the wish.

"It was an amazing athletic play by everyone," said Ritchey, who praised his offensive line for giving Tannehill the time needed to throw the ball into the end zone.

Big Spring showed plenty of big-play ability early in the contest. The Steers scored on their first two possessions of the contest and looked as if they would blow the game open.

Hill opened the game with a big play. On the Steers' first play from scrimmage, he took a handoff from Tannehill and sprinted around the left side, and then outran the Tivy defense 64 yards for a touchdown.

Hill added another TD minutes later, scoring on a 5-yard run that gave the Steers a 12-0

lead with 5:40 remaining in the first quarter.

Tivy rallied back in the second. Dyal keyed a 35-19 run in the run by tossing TD passes of 32, 10, 54 and 24 yards. The Antlers also garnered a 1-yard TD run in the frame.

The Steers' second quarter touchdowns came via 43-yard pass from Tannehill to Hill, a 35-yard run buy sophomore running back Preston Alexander and a 17-yard pass to Parker.
