Robbery suspect indicted

A Big Spring man accused of participating in a June robbery has been indicted by the Howard County Grand Jury.

Heriberto Medina-Torres, 22, currently in custody at the county law enforcement cen-

> ter, was among those indicted during the most recent session of the grand jury. He stands accused of aggra-

> vated robbery in connection with the June 9 holdup of Big A Shaved Ice.

> Officers were called to Big A, located at 1811 Gregg, early in the morning. Witnesses said

a male subject wearing a dark gray hoodie and red pants, with a red bandana covering his face, entered the building armed with a handgun and demanded money. Employees complied with his de-

mands and he fled the scene with an undisclosed amount of cash. "Following up on tips from citizens, a suspect was identified," BSPD Public Information Officer Sgt. Tony Everett stated in a news release. "The suspect was interviewed at the law enforcement center ... (and) dur-

ing the interview, the suspect confessed to the robbery and was arrested." A second suspect in the Big A Shaved Ice robbery, 18-year-old Fabian Rios, was stabbed to death at a Lubbock residence in August. Suspects in his death have been

taken into custoday and are awaiting trial. Aggravated robbery is a first degree felony punishable by between 5 and 99 years,

A public hearing will be held Tuesday over the proposed 2015 tax rate for the Howard College district as the college's board of trustees will initiate the approval process once again.


Trustees were ready to approve the proposed rate at their last board meeting when college officials received a call from the county tax assessor/ collectors' office informing them because of a computer glitch some of the original tax figures given to several Howard County taxing entities were incorrect.

The new figures meant college officials would have to up the proposed rate by about







SAN ANGELO – The Big Spring High School Steers made sure the large crowd on hand at San Angelo Stadium got their money's worth on

Saturday evening. And then some.

Matt Yanez, on the final play of the Steers' season opener, outleaped a crowd of defenders in the end and snagged a 41-yard "Hail Mary" pass from Tobyn Tannehill and then alertly pitched the ball to teammate Hunter Hill, who finished off a wild come-frombehind victory over Kerrville Tivy by cradling the gamewinning touchdown while falling to the ground.

Yanez's assist helped Big Spring erase a 12-point deficit in the final 6 minutes of the contest and emerge with a

stunning 58-56 victory.

"I knew we had to score a touchdown to win," said Yanez, a senior wide receiver making his first start. "I just jumped. When I caught it, I saw Hunter out of the corner of my eye and I threw it toward him,"

"I was stunned," said Ritchey. "It's kind of hard not to look back at how our season ended last year. We were up three points there late in the game and then they came back and scored. I'm thinking to myself, "Seriously. Not again."


