Bible Thoughts

"BAPTISM" By Ronnie Parker

For years religious leaders have disputed about the action, subject and design of baptism. The answer to cur questions on this subject, as all subjects, should come from the scriptures.

The Action: Baptism is a burial in water. The Bible definition of Baptism is, "therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death" (Rom. 6:4). Paul says, "having been buried with him in baptism, wherein ye were also raised with him through faith . . ." (Col. 2:12).

The Subject: Jesus says, "He that believeth and is bap-tized shall be saved" (Mark 16:16). The New Testament teaches that penitent believers are subjects of baptism. There is not a single command or example to be found where an infant is to be baptized by the authority of Christ.

The Design: The purpose of baptism is "for the remission of sins" (Acts 2:38). In Romans chapter 6, Paul shows that we are buried in baptism then raised to walk the NEW LIFE. The cleansing blood of Christ saves, not the water, but His blood is reached when we are baptized into His death.

May we plead with you to study the scriptures carefully and obey!
