VA employees come to aid of food bank

Isaiah 58 Food Bank received tons of help — literally — from the local VA Medical Center.

Staff from the VAMC capped off their annual canned food drive Wednesday by donating more than 5,000 pounds of food items to Isaiah 58.

The donation was part of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's national Feds Feed Families campaign and easily eclipses the 2,500 pounds of food donated during last year's campaign.

"I'm proud of my co-workers that they gave so much back to the community," said Karen Davila, a program specialist at the VAMC who coordinated the food drive. "We were very excited by the final results."

Isaiah 58 officials were thankful for the voluminous donation.

"This is just wonderful," Joe McCright said. "Anytime we get a donation of this size, we're grateful."

Aside from filling the food

bank's pantry, the VAMC's donation also saved Isaiah 58 quite a bit of money, McCright added.

"We spend anywhere from \$500 to \$2,000 a week buying food from the Odessa food bank," he said. "This probably saved us several thousand dollars."

Davila said the drive, which lasted about five weeks, was in part so successful because of a friendly competition which developed between departments at the medical center.

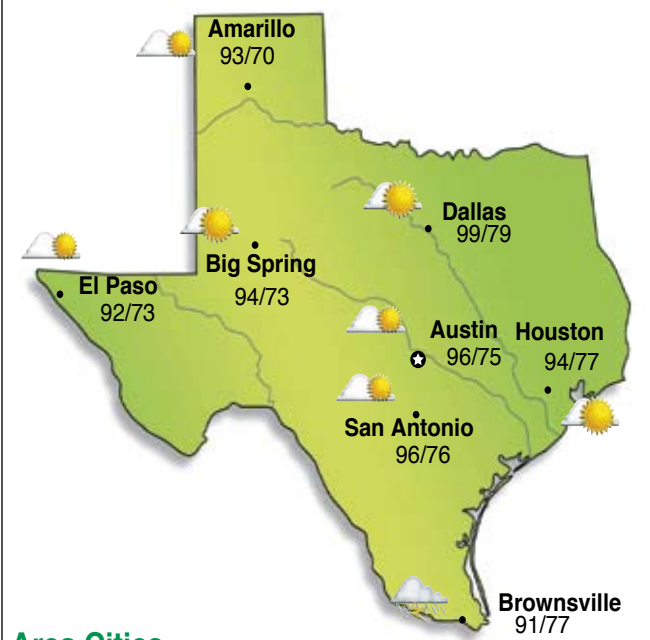

Obama and Cameron say West will 'not be cowed' by Islamic militants

NEWPORT, Wales (AP) — Faced with a mounting militant threat in the Middle East, President Barack Obama and British Prime Minister David Cameron declared Thursday that their nations will “not be cowed” by extremists who have killed two American journalists.

“We will be more forthright in the defense of our values, not least because a world of greater freedom is a fundamental part of how we keep our people safe,” the leaders wrote in a joint editorial in the Times of London.

Their comments come as world leaders gather at a golf resort in Wales for a high-stakes NATO summit. While the official agenda will focus on the crisis in Ukraine and the drawdown of the NATO combat mission in Afghanistan, the rise of the Islamic State group in Iraq and Syria will dominate discussions on the sidelines of the summit.

The militants have claimed responsibility for murdering two American journalists, releasing gruesome videos of their beheadings. Both the U.S. and Britain are deeply concerned about the potential threat to their homelands that could come from the foreign fighters who have joined the violent Islamic State group.

Cameron on Monday proposed new laws that would give police the power to seize the passports of Britons suspected of having traveled abroad to fight with terrorist groups.

Polish and Baltic hopes for permanent NATO bases frustrated by 1997 agreement with Russia

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — On the eve of a NATO summit, President Barack Obama gave the alliance’s eastern European members a soaring assurance of protection from any Russian threat. But Poland and the Baltic states are seeking more than lofty words: They want permanent bases with troops on their land.

And they probably won’t get that.

While the request from Poland, Latvia, Lithuania and Estonia will be on the agenda at the summit in Wales, European heavyweight Germany and other members strongly oppose it. They argue that it would violate a 1997 agreement with Russia in which NATO pledges not to put “substantial combat forces” in central and eastern Europe.

The eastern NATO members suspect, however, that the accord with Russia is just a cover for not wanting to further damage economic relations. And Poland argues that the agreement, known as the Founding Act, has already been invalidated by Russia’s annexation of Crimea.

Speaking in the Estonian capital, Tallinn, Obama declared on Wednesday: “You lost your independence once before. With NATO, you’ll never lose it again.” While that will be a heartening message for Poland and the Baltic states, there were no details of the kind of action that might back it up.

AP source: Justice Department to investigate practices of Ferguson Police Department

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department plans to open a wide-ranging civil rights investigation into the practices of the Ferguson, Missouri, Police Department following the shooting last month of an unarmed black 18-year-old by a white police officer in the St. Louis suburb, a person briefed on the matter said Wednesday night.

The person said the investigation could be announced as early as Thursday afternoon. Missouri officials were notified Wednesday of the probe.

The investigation will look at the practices in the past few years of the police department, including patterns of stops, arrests and use-of-force, as well as the training the officers receive, the person said.

The inquiry is separate from an ongoing civil rights investigation the Justice Department is conducting into the shooting of 18-year-old Michael Brown by Officer Darren Wilson on Aug. 9. A local grand jury is also investigating the shooting, which set off about two weeks of unrest in the streets of Ferguson and became a flashpoint in the national discussion of police treatment of minorities across the country. Attorney General Eric Holder two weeks ago visited the St. Louis suburb, where he met with investigators and Brown’s parents and shared personal experiences of having himself been mistreated by the police.

The person spoke on condition of anonymity because the investigation, first reported by The Washington Post, had not yet been announced.

Leader of al-Qaida says group has expanded into India subcontinent

NEW DELHI (AP) — Al-Qaida has expanded into India, the leader of the terror group said in a video released Thursday, vowing that its militants would bring Islamic law to the entire subcontinent and “wage jihad against its enemies.”

At least three Indian states with large Muslim populations have been put on alert in the wake of the video’s release, local TV stations reported, though there was no indication of an increased security presence.

The new group “is the fruit of a blessed effort of more than two years to gather the mujahedeen in the Indian subcontinent into a single entity,” al-Qaida chief Ayman al-Zawahri said in the video, which was seen online by the SITE monitoring group.

While his comments raised concerns in India, al-Zawahri’s message seemed largely directed at his own rivals in the international jihad movement, and with raising al-Qaida’s profile in the wake of repeated successes by the Islamic State militant group.

Al-Qaida has been increasingly overshadowed by the Islamic State, whose fighters have captured wide swaths of Syria and Iraq and recently beheaded two American journalists.

To fight Ebola in West Africa, some experts suggest an untested treatment: blood of survivors

LONDON (AP) — As West Africa struggles to contain the biggest ever outbreak of Ebola, some experts say an unusual but simple treatment might help: the blood of survivors.

The evidence is mixed for using infection-fighting antibodies from survivors’ blood for Ebola, but without any licensed drugs or vaccines in the deadly disease, some say it’s worth a shot.

“This is something that’s fairly simple to do,” said Dr. Peter Piot, director of London’s School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine and the co-discoverer of the Ebola virus.

Using blood of survivors is one of the experimental Ebola treatments under discussion at a two-day meeting that began Thursday in Geneva. The more than 200 experts assembled by the World Health Organization are looking at issues of safety and effectiveness and considering which treatments

should be prioritized for testing during the current outbreak.

There are about a half dozen medicines and vaccines in development. None has been rigorously tested in humans but early testing of one vaccine began this week in the United States.

Cardinal Dolan to stay as grand marshal in NYC St. Patrick’s parade with first gay contingent

NEW YORK (AP) — There is no more natural spot for Roman Catholic Cardinal Timothy Dolan — a proud, ebullient Irish-American — than grand marshal of the city’s historic St. Patrick’s Day Parade. But the honor now has an added significance: Parade organizers said Wednesday they will allow the first gay group to march under its own banner.

Dolan was quick to issue a statement of support for the parade organizers, accepting their decision. While supporters of gay and lesbian Catholics are cheering, some conservatives want the archbishop to withdraw from the event.

“I think we’re seeing the Catholicism of Pope Francis come to the Archdiocese of New York,” said J. Patrick Hornbeck, chairman of the theology department at Fordham University. “Cardinal Dolan’s statement is welcoming. He did not make this decision, but sees the parade as an opportunity for unity.”

Pope Francis last year said church leaders should focus more on mercy than on divisive social issues. He famously said, “Who am I to judge?” when asked about gays and lesbians who are seeking God.

But Pat Archbold, a writer for the theologically conservative National Catholic Register, called Dolan’s decision to remain as grand marshal a “total capitulation to gay identity groups.”

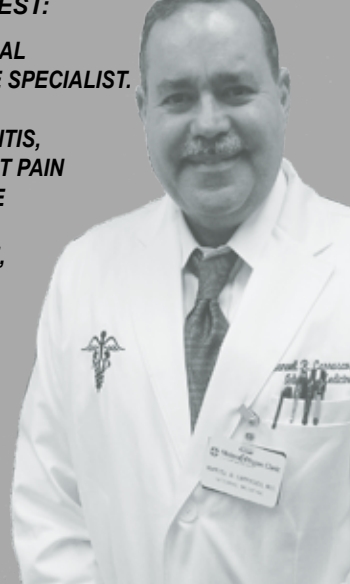

Dear Annie: My daughter has been married for 14 years to a wonderful, successful, caring husband, and they have four beautiful children. But she recently moved out of their home. I can't believe it.

Dear Beyond: We know this is breaking your heart, but you must try your best to stay out of it. Whatever problems are going on in your daughter's marriage are hers to deal with, good or bad. Try to spend time with the children, especially if you can bring them to your house, giving them a stable, calm place to visit. But don't take sides. The best you can do is talk to your other daughter and ask that she encourage her sister not to rush into anything she'll regret.

Dear Annie: We went to a family wedding last month. The ceremony was scheduled for 2 p.m., but the wedding party didn't show up until an hour later. The reception was at another location, and dinner was supposed to start at 5:30, but the wedding party showed up at 7. No one ate until 8.

Buyer's remorse on Common Core?

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) Millions of students will sit down at computers this year to take new tests rooted in the Common Core standards for math and reading, but policymakers in many states are having buyer's remorse.

The fight to repeal the standards has heated up in Ohio, where Republican legislators such as state Rep. Andy Thompson saying it's kind of "creepy the way this whole thing landed in Ohio with all the things prepackaged."

It's playing out in Louisiana, where GOP Gov. Bobby Jindal is in a nasty feud involving his former ally, Education Superintendent John White. Jindal has sued the Obama administration, accusing Washington of illegally manipulating federal grant money and regulations to force states to adopt the Common Core education standards.

The standards were scrapped earlier this year in Indiana and Oklahoma. Governors in North Carolina, South Carolina and Missouri have signed legislation to reconsider the standards, even though they still will be used in those three states this fall.

Like many critics, Thompson and Jindal base their opposition on federal support of the standards, but states led the Common Core movement that really took off in 2009 and that effort was voluntary. The Obama administration offered incentives to states to adopt college and career-ready standards, and Common Core fit the bill. The incentives included cash grants and permission to ignore parts of the much-maligned No Child Left Behind law.

The standards emphasize critical thinking and spell out what reading and math skills students should grasp at each grade level, while leaving how those skills are mastered up to districts and states. The hope was that higher standards shared across state lines would allow for shared resources, comparable student performance measures and smoother school-to-school transitions for children who move, such as military kids.

Nearly every state adopted the standards.

DEBATE SPREADS

The debate over Common Core has spilled into the national political realm. Among potential GOP presidential candidates in 2016, former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush supports the standards; Jindal, Indiana Gov. Mike Pence and Kentucky Sen. Rand Paul do not.

Teachers' unions, historically aligned with the Democrats, endorsed the standards and helped develop them. But they now complain about botched efforts to put them in place and say it's unfair to use Common Core-based assessments in new teacher evaluation systems rolling out in much of the United States.

The issue has gotten pulled into a general anti-testing backlash

in parts of the country. To ease the testing concerns, Education Secretary Arne Duncan recently said he would allow states to delay using students' test scores in teacher evaluation systems.

"What really has happened is that this has become a politicized issue and it's become an ideological symbol, interestingly, on both sides," said Patrick McGuinn, a political science professor at Drew University. He said the standards and the assessments designed under them are generally considered acceptable or of high quality.

CLASSROOMS PREPARE

Far from the political discourse, American classrooms continue to be transformed by the use of the standards, with new curricula developed and teachers trained. Some parents are perplexed by the new ways their children are completing their lessons.

Supporters like former Georgia Gov. Sonny Perdue, a Republican who helped lead the governors' group that identified the goals set by Common Core, say politics and mistrusts

have hijacked a needed and effective education overhaul.

The standards were a response from governors in a defensive mode to keep the federal government out of education, Perdue said, and he supported the changes out of concern for U.S. students' global competitiveness. The U.S. Chamber of Commerce is among backers.

"It's just a situation that I don't think should have become political, which has become politically toxic and I don't really know how to decontaminate that," Perdue said.

SHIFTING PUBLIC OPINION

A PDK/Gallup Poll released Aug. 20 found a dramatic change in the number of people aware of the standards. Last year, two-thirds of those surveyed said they'd never heard of the standards. This year, 81 percent said they had, and 6 in 10 said they oppose them.

Daniel A. Domenech, executive director of the national organization representing school superintendents, said polling provides more evidence it's important to "slow down to get it right."

Texas and Common Core

Texas refused to adopt Common Core, instead mandating curriculum standards known as the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills, though as much as two-thirds of the state's math standards are thought to overlap with Common Core requirements. Conservatives continue to worry about Common Core seeping into Texas classrooms, so much so that the Legislature in 2013 passed a law expressly forbidding school districts from using it as part of lesson plans. Then, in June, Republican Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott, the front-runner in November's governor's race, issued an opinion reiterating that schools using Common Core standards "in any way" would violate that law.

More fireworks in store in Monahans?

When the final buzzer sounded on Saturday in the Big Spring High School Steers' wild 58-56 win over Kerrville Tivy, many of the Steer faithful began looking ahead to this Friday's showdown with the Monahans Loboes.

Surely, they thought, the

game wouldn't be another Nintendo offensive shootout ...

Don't be too sure.

Big Spring, coming off one of the wilder wins in the school's history, will head into Week 2 of the 2014 season with the potential of facing its second straight offensive powerhouse. Monahans comes into the 7:30 p.m. showdown sporting one of

the state's highest scoring offensive squads.

The Loboes opened the season with a big bang last Friday. Monahans rolled up more than 500 total yards en route to pounding out a staggering 71-21 victory over the Alpine Bucks.

Monahans is led into Friday's game by the 1-2 punch of quarterback Daniel Rojo and running back Nick Jasso.

Rojo proved his ability to lead the Loboes' offense last week by scorching Alpine's defense for 266 yards. Overall, he completed 14 of his 30 passing attempts, including six to receiver Christian Morris for 96 yards and a TD.

In addition to Morris, Rojo also completed five passes to Matthew Chavez and Charles Michaelis Jr.

Monahan's Nicko Jasso ran

for 148 yards and two touchdowns on eight carries during the Loboes' 71-21 win over Alpine.

The Loboes' offensive prowess will pose another challenge to the young BSHS defense.

Big Spring defensive coordinator John Wright said he feels his team will do dramati-

Young Steers hoping to use lessons from Tivy assault to improve their defensive effort

Big Spring High School head coach Phillip Ritchey watched on in amazement on Friday evening as the Kerrville Tivy Antlers slapped the Steer defense around more than Larry and Curly in a Three Stooges comedy.

Only no one was amused or laughing as Tivy rolled up almost 700 total yards en route to scoring 56 points.

Rather than be dejected, Ritchey was pragmatic after watching his high-octane offense hand the Steers a wild

58-56 victory on a 41-yard "Hail Mary" pass from Tobyn Tannehill to Hunter Hill. The defense can only get better as a result of the lessons learned.

"They made some adjustments when they needed to," said Ritchey, noting the team was starting a junior-laden defensive unit in which nine of its 11 players were making their first starts.

"We knew they (Tivy) was a quality team and that they would throw it around a lot. They're a very crisp team that is hard to defend with a veteran defense, let alone one

with the number of new starters we have."

The good news, at least from Ritchey's perspective, is the defense got a crash course in how to – and, even more importantly, how not to – play defense at the varsity level.

The Big Spring offense, which surrendered a staggering 683 yards in the game, actually held its own early against Tivy. Despite start-

ing the game with temperatures well over 100 degrees on the turf field at the San Angelo Stadium, the Steers held the Antlers scoreless in each of their first two possessions, forcing a missed field goal on Tivy's first series and then getting a clutch tackle at the line of scrimmage that ended the Antlers' second series on a 4th-and-4 play near midfield.

Tivy got its offense in gear in the second. The Antlers reeled off 35 points in the frame, rolling up a staggering 277 yards and five touchdowns.

Tivy quarterback Cade Dyal, who posted a career-high 494 yards passing in the game – completed 10 of his 11 passing attempts for 186 yards and three TDs in the second quarter. He also rushed for another score.

Dyal continued to post big numbers in the third, hitting on eight of his 12 tries for 94 yards and two scores.

The Steers, who inserted Tannehill into the defensive secondary in the second half following an injury that sidelined Allen Ryle, gave up an

"They, traditionally, come more at you, which is better for us right now," said Wright.

Big Spring already proved its ability to score almost at will.

The Steers, who went into the season with seven starters back from a team that set the school's all-time scoring record in 2013, scored three times in the final 8 minutes of their game with Tivy to claim a thrilling come-from-behind victory.

Backed by a 500-yard performance by quarterback Tobyn Tannehill, the BSHS offense rolled up 669 yards in the contest.

Tannehill, the Midland-Odessa area Player of the Week, terrorized the Antler defense. He rushed for 241 yards on just 20 carries, including an 80-yard scamper with less than 3 minutes left in the contest that gave the Steers a huge boost offensively. He also passed for 280

yards, giving him a total of 521 yards.

Tannehill got a huge helping hand from the BSHS recving corps. Matt Yanez and Dee Parker — both making their first starts as receivers — combined for 12 receptions for 153 yards and 2 TDs.

Hunter Hill, who split time the backfield as a running back and spread out wide as a slot receiver, also played well. He caught three passes for 113 yards and two TDs, including the game-winner on a 41-yard "Hail Mary" pass from Tannehill as time expired.

The game marked the first-ever matchup between Big Spring and Kerrville Tivy.B

Rile, one of just two players who saw significant action last year (with Garrett Wigington) injured his hamstring in the game. He is not expected to play against Monahans.

Linebacker Dylan Marquez gave the Steers a boost in the second half by delivering a couple of hard hits, including a shot on Tivy receiver Hutch White in the third quarter that left the Antlers' receiver stunned.

"They had things thrown at them that we could never show

them in practice," said Ritchey. "That is only going to help us later on. We learned a lot from this game. Luckily, our offense gave them just as much trouble and we scored two more points."

"They (the defense) played their tails off the whole game," he said. "Hopefully, we can take what we learned from this game and use to get better."

follows low, South decides that, given the bidding, he has a better chance to make the contract by attempting an endplay than by finessing in trumps.

So he goes up with the ace of spades, cashes two more hearts and exits with a trump. There is no escape for West. He must either lead a diamond or yield a ruff-and-discard by returning a heart. Either way, South avoids losing a diamond trick and makes the contract.

Now let's go back to trick one when West leads the king of clubs. East should drop the queen under the king at this point to show that he has the jack. West can see that if he continues with the ace of clubs he might leave himself susceptible to an endplay later on, so he leads the three of clubs at trick two in an effort to forestall that possibility.

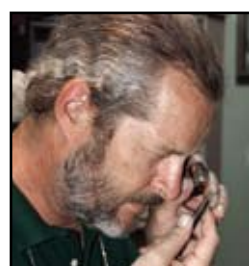
After East wins the club with the ten, he does not have to be an Einstein to realize that a third club lead would be ruffed by the declarer. East also realizes that West's purpose in underleading the ace of clubs at trick two must be to coax a diamond return at trick three.

So East returns a diamond, and the contract goes down the drain. The endplay is defused before declarer has a chance to strike the match.
