That's why it's important the public arm themselves with as much knowledge about possible signs of suicide, Smith said.

"One of our jobs at West Texas Centers is to educate the public about the warning signs of suicide so they

can help their families," she said. "I think it's important everyone become educated. educate as many people as possible."

Several factors lead to an increased risk of suicide, including mental disorders such as depression, schizophrenia, conduct disorders

# Texas' fast-paced growth hasn't reduced inequality

FORT WORTH, Texas — The oil and gas boom and millions of new consumers have propelled revenue growth in Texas to nearly twice the national average. Yet, a new report from Standard & Poor's shows income inequality is putting a brake on the pace of expansion.

"Even for Texas, the growth rate is almost unsustainable,"

Pia Orrenius, a vice president and senior economist at the Dallas Federal Reserve, told The Associated Press. "This incredible growth has brought lots of people to the state, and the demand for ser-

vices is growing so fast. At some point, the state is going to have to deal with the income inequality issue." Even while wages and employment in Texas grow fast-

er than the national average,

the oil and gas sector lifting up the general economy, the state has a much higher percentage of low-paid, lowskilled immigrants and higher share of workers earning the minimum wage than the average state, Orrenius says. The budget in Texas, the second-largest state by gross domestic product, is already stretched by rapidly increasing health care and education costs, the Dallas Fed says in a third-quarter 2014 report.

According to 2012 U.S. Census data, the lowest 20 percent earn an average \$11,296 per year in Texas, while the top 5 percent earn \$317,661. Texas ranked eighth in the country in wealth gap in a February report by the Economic Analysis and Research Network of state and regional organizations, where it showed that in 2011, the top 1 percent in Texas earned 26.3 times more

#### Coast Guard rescues man missing after boat sank

PORT ARANSAS, Texas (AP) — The U.S. Coast Guard has rescued a 37-year-old man a day after his boat sank off Port Aransas while he and three others were fishing.

The Coast Guard says the boat sank Saturday before the men could call for help. The men, all wearing life jackets, then drifted overnight. Three of the men were rescued early Sunday afternoon when they were spotted by the crew of an oil supply ves-

The Coast Guard then began searching for the man who remained missing.

Lt. Eric Vryheid says the man was rescued Sunday evening after a tanker crew heard his cries for help and alerted the Coast Guard, which had a helicopter in the air searching.

Vryheid says the unidentified man was alert and conscious in the water.

#### 3 dead in Corpus Christi trailer park shooting

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — Police say a man has been arrested after three people were killed and a child injured in a shooting at a trailer park in Corpus Christi, Texas.

The Corpus Christi Caller-Times reports that when police arrived at the trailer park on Sunday evening, they found two women and one man dead outside of different residences.

The child, whose age was not given, was taken to an area hospital with gunshot wounds.

Police have not identified the victims or the suspect, a 63-year-old man. Neighbors and witnesses helped police locate the suspect.

Police say the exteriors of several homes were processed as crime scenes.

#### 10 injured after rear-end bus collision in Dallas

DALLAS (AP) — Authorities say 10 people have been hospitalized after two Dallas city buses col-

A Dallas Area Rapid Transit spokesman says the rear-end collision happened Sunday in the southern part of the city. The 10 people injured included both drivers and some children. The spokesman

says they were taken to area hospitals with nonlife-threatening injuries.

Their conditions are unclear.

One bus had stopped to board passengers when it was struck from behind. It's unclear what caused the wreck.

Transit officials say they will investigate the incident, including drug testing the drivers and checking for mechanical problems. The drivers are on paid leave pending the investigation's outcome.

#### Adoptability unclear for rescued Texas animals

SANTA FE, Texas (AP) — A Houston animal society says more than 100 animals rescued from a Santa Fe home are receiving veterinary care but may not be adopted. The Galveston Daily News reports the two men

who live at the home are cooperating with authori-

ties. Sheriff's deputies seized the animals Friday after a neighbor complained about the condition of the six-acre property. The animals included six giant tortoises, more than 70 Irish wolfhounds, macaws and snakes. Authorities say some animals were without food or

water. They found an unspecified number of dead animals The Houston Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals says the animals are part of the ongoing investigation and will not be adopted until

#### Iconic League City oak tree battles fungus

LEAGUE CITY, Texas (AP) — League City arborists say a deadly fungus is killing a massive oak tree that the city paid nearly \$200,000 to relocate

The Galveston Daily News reports the 100-yearold Ghirardi Compton Oak Tree is battling hypoxy-

About 30 to 35 percent of the 400-ton tree's trunk and limbs are covered in the fungus. It's also infected with wood-boring insects. Arborists have trimmed away infected limbs. A

local landscaper says the tree has shown signs of new growth and that areas that fought off the fungus are healing.

The city paid to move the iconic tree about 1,500 feet to make way for street expansion in 2012. The oak is named for one of League City's early farm families.

#### Houston doctor charged with poisoning her lover HOUSTON (AP) — Trial is getting underway for

a 43-year-old breast cancer doctor based at Houston's famed Texas Medical Center who's accused of poisoning a fellow physician boyfriend with coffee laced with ethylene glycol. The chemical is common additive in automotive antifreeze but also is used in labs at the University

of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Center where Ana Maria Gonzalez-Angulo and another cancer researcher and doctor, George Blumenschein, both Court documents identify the couple as in "a casual sexual relationship" when Blumenschein became ill and survived kidney failure after she made and served him two cups of coffee at her home

early last year. Gonzalez-Angulo was arrested five months later and charged with aggravated assault. Her attorney says she's innocent. Opening arguments before a Houston jury are

scheduled for Monday.

#### Oklahoma drivers get toll bills from Texas

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Some Oklahoma drivers are getting toll bills for driving on Texas turnpikes without paying tolls — in some case years Jerry Gowman of Oklahoma City told The Okla-

homan that he received a \$56 bill from the North Texas Tollway Authority for charges dating to early 2012. Chelsea Vaughn of Durant said she and her husband got a bill for \$265 for charges dating back about a year and a half.

The Texas agency switched to electronic fee collection in 2010 — leaving out-of-state drivers with no way to pay the tolls — but the driver's license plates were recorded by cameras at the toll booths. The turnpike authority has now acquired Oklahoma Tax Commission records that provides the drivers' home addresses — and the authority is billing them.

loved one, getting fired from a job or the stress of serious conflict, such as the break-up of a relationship or bullying.

Warning signs need to be taken care of immediately, Smith said.

According to the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention, most of the time people who kill themselves show one or more of these warning signs before they take action. They need to be taken care of immediately, Smith said.

Warning signs include, but are not limited to:

- Talking about wanting to kill themselves, or saying they wish they were dead
- Looking for a way to kill themselves, such as hoarding medicine or buying a gun
- Talking about a specific suicide plan
- Feeling hopeless or having no reason to live
- Feeling trapped, desperate, or needing to escape from an intolerable situation
- Having the feeling of being a burden to oth-
  - Feeling humiliated • Having intense anxi-
- ety and/or panic attacks
- Losing interest in things, or losing the

- pleasure • Insomnia
- Becoming socially isolated and withdrawn from friends, family, and others
- · Acting irritable or agitated
- Showing rage, or talking about seeking revenge for being victimized or rejected, whether or not the situations the person describes seem real.

If someone says they want to commit suicide or they are better off dead, take them seriously, Smith said. Suggestions from the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention include:

• Begin by telling the

ability to experience suicidal person you are concerned about them.

- Tell them specifically what they have said or done that makes you feel concerned about suicide.
- Don't be afraid to ask whether the person is considering suicide, and whether they have a particular plan or method in mind. These questions will not push them toward suicide if they were not considering it.
- Ask if they are seeing a clinician or are taking medication so the treating person can be contacted.
- Do not try to argue someone out of suicide. Instead, let them know

are not alone and that they can get help. Avoid pleading and preaching to them with statements such as, "You have so much to live for," or "Your suicide will hurt your family."

"I advise anyone who is facing someone who is an immediate harm to themselves or someone else to call 911 or take them to the nearest emergency room or call our Mental Health hotline," Smith said. "Use your judgment."

The Standard & Poor's report being released Monday suggests that the gains flowing to the

top 1 percent around the U.S. come at a broader cost to society. Not only does rising inequality appear to stunt overall economic growth, but S&P links it to a slowdown in average yearly gains in state tax revenues.

Most economic activity comes from consumer spending, but consumers have become increasingly reluctant to spend as median incomes have barely increased over three decades and remain lower than they were in 2007 when the Great Reces-

Median sion began. household incomes, adjusted for inflation, were \$54,045 in July, about 4.6 percent lower than in late 2007. By contrast, the top 1

percent of earners have prospered for more than 30 years. Adjusted for inflation, their average incomes have nearly tripled to \$1.26 million since 1979, according to the IRS. But S&P notes that the

affluent tend to save a greater share of their income and spend it on untaxed services, meaning that states are unlikely to see much of an increase in sales tax collections based on the gains among this group. With no state or cor-

porate income tax, Texas relies on sales and franchise tax, equal to 1 percent of a company's profit margins, and a specific tax for oil and

The state's third-largest source of revenue is production and severance tax, which falls solely on the oil and gas sector. In three years, its share has nearly doubled from 4.9 percent of state revenues in 2010 to 9.4 percent in 2013. Texas' rapid growth



# Cowboys start road trip beating Titans 26-10

(AP) — DeMarco Murray is giving the Dallas Cowboys the ability to run over opponents, at least when he holds onto the ball.

Murray fumbled on his third carry of the game and wound up running for 167 yards and a touchdown Sunday, helping the Cowboys beat the Tennessee Titans 26-10 in their home opener.

"I told him that was his third carry and he was going to get about 30, so hold onto the ... ball." Dallas coach Jason Garrett said.

With Murray leading the way, the Cowboys avoided an 0-2 start, and they dominated holding the ball for more than 41 minutes by rushing for 220 yards. Tony Romo was sacked four times but didn't have a turnover a week after being intercepted three times by the 49ers.

"DeMarco is turning straight beast mode," Cowboys receiver Dez Bryant said. "I know he

NASHVILLE, Tenn. is going to keep doing that. If he runs the ball like that, all the running backs, it just makes our jobs that much easier."

The Titans ran all over Kansas City winning their opener but missed too many tackles against the Cowbovs. That cost the Titans (1-1) their first 2-0 start since 2008, the last time the franchise made the playoffs.

"The thing that hurts most is that we did this at home," first-year Titans coach Ken Whisenhunt said. "We're working hard to be a good team for our fans here. I'm really disappointed that we didn't do a better job with that."

Here are some things that stood out Sunday:

COWBOY UP: Dallas scored the first 16 points. and the final score could have been worse if the Cowboys didn't have to send Dan Bailey out for four field goals. He connected from 48, 44, 51 and 48 yards. Dallas finished with a 368-314 edge in total offense

with Murray's fumble the only turnover. When the Titans pulled within 16-10 in the third quarter, Romo drove the Cowboys 80 yards and found Bryant for a 3-yard TD.

MCCLAIN HAVING FUN: Dallas linebacker Rolando McClain made a doozy of an interception, slipping his hand just under the ball in a play that fooled officials into calling it incomplete until Garrett challenged for a review that  $overturned \, the \, call. \, That$ cost McClain a touchdown. But the former top 10 draft pick who walked away from the NFL twice in Baltimore the Cowboys with seven tackles Sunday.

"I told the coaches that all those years of playing tight end at Alabama paid off," McClain said. "I knew it was an interception. I just wanted to get into the end zone." MALIGNED DALLAS

D: The Cowboys, last in total defense last season, came up with very key plays in Tennessee. They intercepted two passes, turned into 10 points, and they forced the Titans to turn the ball over on downs in the fourth quarter after having first-and-goal at the 6.






