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Energy push prompts safety courses

To meet the needs of the growing energy industry, Howard College now offers safety training courses for area workers and businesses. "We have open enrollment and Chad (Averette, director or work force training) will

also work with business to create specialized classes that might need a H2S (hydrogen sulfide gas) awareness class or lock out/tag out (electrical/mechanical safety use in the oil field) for their employees, said Kinsey Hansen. HC executive dean. "These are training classes that businesses

have been telling us that they want."

The college received funding last year to establish the program through a grant from the Permian Basin Workforce Center, Hansen said. Those who finish a course will receive a wallet card which states they completed the

safety training course, Averette said.

Currently, the college offers two courses — H2S awareness and lock out/tag out — but plans to expand as the year progresses, said Hansen, who gave an update on the new program to trustees during their monthly meeting Mon-

day.

"Our short term goals are to add safety courses for the wind turbine industry and then add rig pass drilling safety," Hansen said. "We will continue to identify additional courses businesses

But don't worry if your cat or dog is uglier or better looking than you — or even better dressed. There are all sorts of contests Felix and Lassie can enter.

This year's fair runs from Sept. 25-27 and organizers are promising there will be lots for young and the not-so-young to do once they walk through the front gates. Admission is \$6 for the fair, which will be held at the Howard County Fairbarns.

For the young, however, the fair actually begins as early as Monday, across town. Set for the Broughton Agriculture Complex at Howard College, area fifth graders are invited to Ag in the Classroom, which explains the impact and history of agriculture in the county.

"Exhibits have been planned to educate and entertain the children," said fair official Sandy Stewart.

Musical entertainment, the traditional Fair Queen and



Kountry Kids Kontest are part of the 2014 fair, as well as the obvious — contests featuring art, baked goods, canned goods and a whole lot more.

The fair and carnival (Yes, there is a carnival.) will begin at 5 p.m. Thursday and Friday. Saturday, the fair opens at 10 a.m. and the carnival will crank up the ferris wheel at noon.

Some of the highlights include:

- Musical entertainment each evening. Thursday will be Gospel Night from 6 until 9, featuring music from the First Church of the Nazarene and Bob and Marla Rainwater and Spring Creek Fellowship Tributary. Friday at 7, the Spade Olton Band will perform country music, while the Freeride Band will take the stage at 7 Saturday to perform a variety of popular

Murder trial begins for Anguiano

The prosecution began laying out its case this morning in the trial of a Big Spring man accused of murder in the September 2013 shooting death of his girlfriend.

Dakota Wade Anguiano

faces between 5 and 99 years, or life, in prison if convicted of the murder of 17-year-old Abigail Valencia in the 1300 block of Tucson on Sept. 19, 2013.

Jury selection was held Monday in the 118th District Court. District Attorney Hardy Wilkerson is prosecuting

the case.

On the evening of Sept. 19, Big Spring police responded to the Scenic Mountain Medical Center emergency room in reference to a gunshot victim. Upon arrival, they found Valencia suffering from a single gunshot wound to the left side of her head.

BSPD Sgt. Tony Everett said Valencia had been brought to the emergency room by Anguiano, who said he and Valencia were walking in the area of Circle Drive and

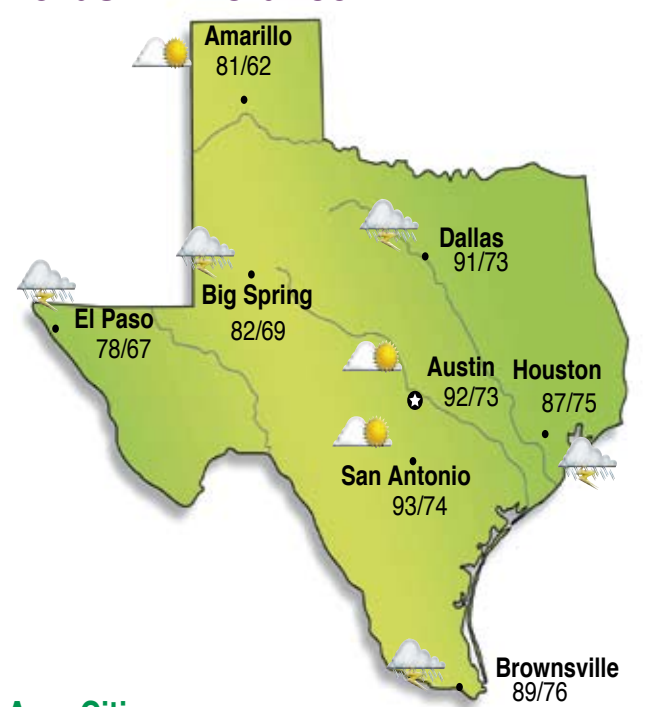

History books spark latest

Texas classroom battle

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — As Texas mulls new social studies books for its 5-plus million public school students, some academics are decrying lessons they say exaggerate the influence of Christian values on America's Founding Fathers.

Some conservative activists, meanwhile, complain about what they see as liberal biases in the same books.

It's the latest ideological battle over what gets taught in the classrooms of America's second-largest state. But this time activists from the right and left are united in criticizing the proposed books, though for very different reasons.

The state Board of Education won't vote to approve new books until its November meeting. They won't go into classrooms until the next academic year.

But the board is holding a public hearing on the books in Austin on Tuesday — and emotions may run high.

Texas worker charged with tampering with pizza

GEORGETOWN, Texas (AP) — An 18-year-old pizza store employee in Texas has been charged with a felony after police say he rubbed his genitals on food he was preparing for a customer.

The Georgetown Police Department arrested Austin Symonds last week and charged him with tampering with a consumer product. A Papa Murphy's customer who ordered food on Sept. 2 told police he caught Symonds. Police say Symonds admitted that he would have given the pizza to the customer if he hadn't been caught.

A store employee tells the Austin American-Statesman that Symonds has been fired.

Symonds was released from the Williamson County Jail after posting \$10,000 bond. Online jail records didn't indicate an attorney.

Madisonville police dog found dead in patrol car

MADISONVILLE, Texas (AP) — A Central Texas officer has been put on administrative duty after his police dog was found dead in his patrol SUV after his shift ended.

Madisonville police Chief Chuck May said Tuesday that his department and Texas Rangers are investigating the accidental death of the dog named Baron.

May says the 5-year-old Belgian Malinois was found dead in the police vehicle at the officer's

home.

The police chief says the officer began work Thursday night, got off around midday Friday and went home. The dog was discovered dead several hours later.

May says Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine experts would determine a cause of death, which was pending Tuesday.

Temperatures in the area reached the low 90s Friday.

Madisonville is about 90 miles northwest of Houston.

Couple sentenced in child's death

PASADENA, Texas (AP) — A Pasadena man has been sentenced to 12 years in prison and his wife has received probation for injuring their 10-month-old son who died after being scalded.

A Harris County judge sentenced 24-year-old William Cain and 22-year-old Vickie Cain last week. Both pleaded guilty to charges of child injury by omission in the death of William Jace Cain.

The baby was scalded from the waist down and had suffered cardiac arrest when his parents brought him to the hospital in March 2013. Authorities ruled his death a homicide caused by "complications of thermal injuries."

Vickie Cain received deferred adjudication pending successful completion of probation and 240 hours of community service.

Supreme Court Justice Thomas appears in East Texas

TYLER, Texas (AP) — The U.S. Supreme Court justice best known for his silence on the bench will speak to an audience in East Texas.

Justice Clarence Thomas is scheduled to appear Tuesday night at the University of Texas at Tyler.

The 66-year-old Thomas has served on the bench since 1991. It's been more than eight years since he asked a question in the courtroom during arguments in the case — a silence that stands out since the eight other justices actively question lawyers about their cases.

Thomas is one of the court's conservatives and has been part of narrow majorities on several key issues in recent years.

Man sentenced for stabbing, hiding body under bed

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A San Antonio man has been sentenced to 33 years in prison for fatally stabbing his girlfriend and then stuffing her body underneath his bed.

The San Antonio Express-News reports that authorities said Robert Lyn Myers stabbed Cecelia Lomas Stegall in January 2013 with a steak knife, wrapped her in a blanket and then stuffed her body under his bed.

His 50-year-old girlfriend's body remained there for three days before Myers moved it to a closet in a nearby vacant apartment. An anonymous Crime Stoppers tip alerted police to Stegall's death.

The 41-year-old Myers had claimed self-defense.

He was sentenced on Friday after pleading guilty to murder in exchange for the 33-year prison term.

Police: Drunk prowler stole candy

ALTOONA, Pa. (AP) — Police say a central Pennsylvania couple saw a man urinating with his pants down around his ankles moments before he broke into their home and grabbed a handful of Chick-O-Sticks from their candy bowl.

Online court records don't list an attorney for 29-year-old Earl Munoz who remained jailed Tuesday. The Johnstown man faces a preliminary hearing Sept. 24 for the burglary Altoona police say occurred shortly after 4:25 a.m. Saturday.

The Altoona Mirror reports the couple first saw Munoz as the husband was leaving to drive his wife to work.

When the husband returned 20 minutes later, he found an open window and a shoeprint on a bucket beneath the window.

The husband reported only candy was stolen. Police say Munoz had a Chick-O-Stick wrapper in his pockets — along with two small bags of cocaine.

Man arrested at Frisbee tourney

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — A man wanted for an armed bank robbery in New York eluded authorities for four years until they caught up with him while he played at an ultimate Frisbee tournament in Oregon.

KVAL-TV says police in Eugene, Oregon, arrested Jahson Marryshow around 5 p.m. Sunday.

The Ulster County sheriff's office in New York says the 32-year-old, formerly of Woodstock, New York, was indicted in late 2010 on charges of robbing a Bank of America there. Marryshow is also accused of stealing a car and setting a barn on fire as a diversion.

The U.S. Marshals Service and local police got a tip that he was living in Eugene. Police say Marryshow didn't try to flee Sunday.

Sycamore Street when a black Cadillac Escalade came around the corner and fired on the couple, wounding Valencia. Anguiano added a friend drove by and let him take his vehicle to transport Valencia to the hospital.

"Patrol officers attempted the find the crime scene," Everett said in a press release issued shortly after Anguiano's arrest. "As

investigators talked to witnesses, Anguiano's story began to unravel."

It was later determined, Everett said, that the shooting occurred at 1317 Tucson. At that point, Anguiano was arrested on a charge of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

Valencia later died of her wounds at a Lubbock hospital, at which time charges against Anguiano were upgraded to murder.

The trial is expected to last about two days.

Bird Poop: Swainson's hawk given a second chance

Startled to see a hawk on his front lawn, the homeowner was even more taken aback by a relentless attack against the raptor.

Swoop after swoop, mockingbirds were pursuing this perceived danger.

With precision timing, the songbirds easily pecked the hawk's head before turning to strike again.

In desperation, and outnumbered, the hawk took flight.

Even though it slowly rose above his roofline, the bird of prey struggled to clear the top of the chimney.

From below, the man watched as the hawk appeared to hit the edge of the uppermost row of bricks. As a few feathers drifted above the roof, the bird fell behind the chimney and assumedly down on the other side.

Hurrying toward

his backyard, he was fearful of where it might have landed. His caution had been warranted. Floating with outstretched wings, the hawk was in his swimming pool.

Quickly grabbing a pole net used for gathering leaves and spent blossoms from the surface, the man managed to lift the hawk to safety. Exhausted, wet, and bedraggled, the bird was destined to meet Diane Tracy.

When our contact in San Angelo called in early August, she said, "The hawk didn't clear the chimney and fell off the other side." Once dry, it was allowed to remain in her care for two days of R&R.

At first, she had thought it to be a young red-tailed hawk. As a light, first-year juvenile, it also resembled another raptor. Upon looking at its wing linings, however, she called to say it was a Swainson's hawk. Only the red-tail has dark leading edges on its wings.

When she tried to release it, she discovered it was too weak to

fly. Realizing there was more to the bird's story than just mockingbirds, a failed attempt to fly over a house, and its adventure in the swimming pool, Diane weighed the hawk.

After telling me the bird had only half the weight it needed to be healthy and flight worthy, she kept it two more days before meeting us in Sterling City. Once home, we put

the hawk on the scales again. It had gained while in Diane's care, but still needed more time for recovery.

Through the summer of 2014, raptors, including this Swainson's hawk, were being found not only out in the counties. Inside many cities, the raptors were appearing more frequently. With a limited food source and continuing drought, they were desperate to find enough food during their southerly migration.

Having described the hawk's condition to Gail Barnes in Lubbock, we took advantage of her husband, Larry, being in Sweetwater on business. He could save us considerable mileage, and take the Swainson's back to Lubbock.

Before placing the bird inside its carrier, we enjoyed one last look. Across its creamy upper chest, its brownish bib was developing. Its brown upper parts and head were a sharp contrast to its pale belly. Dark bands accented its grayish tail. Against its dark flight

feathers, light wing linings were notable.

Placed in a mew in the barn, the Swainson's was soon accessing a lower perch. Once it had attained the highest perch, Gail moved it to the flight cage. Twelve days after its encounter with the sentinels of a homeowner's yard, the hawk was beginning to fly from end to end of the lengthy facility.

With its release the following week came freedom and another chance. The smaller species had caused a chain of events that prevented the Swainson's hawk from becoming a victim of starvation.

Feeling that whether a dog, cat, or hawk deserved a pecking and escorted exit from the premises, the mockingbirds, through their constant and nagging harassment, had assured the survival of this summer visitor.

Murray running the show for Cowboys' offense early this fall

IRVING, Texas (AP) — DeMarco Murray reversed field and sprinted around right end for the first down, sliding just before the sideline with the Cowboys running out the clock during their win at Tennessee.

The play in the fourth quarter Murray paid a lot of murray and the Cowboys' sudden fascination with the running game. It was his career-high 27th carry, which means the Cowboys kept giving him the ball and counted on him to make the smart play after he lost a fumble early for the second straight game.

Murray finished with 29 carries for 167 yards in a 26-10 victory marked by 43 running plays from

the Cowboys, their most since a win at Indianapolis in late 2010. He entered Monday leading the NFL with 285 yards.

"I think he is a star on the rise and I think that is something that he is going to continue to have to work on, protecting the football," tight end Jason Witten said. "But when he has that type of game, I hate to even talk about that. That is a big game for us, and just the demeanor that we want to have as a football team."

The Cowboys (1-1), who finish a two-game road swing at St. Louis on Sunday, stuck with the running game in the season-opening loss to San Francisco even after falling behind 28-3 at halftime.

Playing from ahead against the Titans, the show of force was more dramatic behind an offensive line with three first-round picks from the past four drafts.

When Dallas decided the lead was safe and sent Murray to the bench, Lance Dunbar got three straight carries for another first down. The 220 yards rushing were the most for the Cowboys in almost two years. Tony Romo's offense suddenly looks like a run-first attack.

"Obviously, we featured the running game," coach Jason Garrett said. "Tony was more of a complementary player, but I think he played a good game for us."

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Contract Bridge

The Step-by-Step Approach

South dealer.
Both sides vulnerable.

Opening lead — four of spades.
Assume you're declarer in four hearts and West leads the spade four. Obviously, you must lose two spade tricks, so making the contract depends on whether you lose one diamond trick or two.
If West has the king of diamonds, it's easy enough to hold yourself to one diamond loser by leading low toward the queen at some point. But if East has the king and you lead low to the queen, you will eventually lose two diamond tricks and go down one.
You should start by making a tentative assessment of which opponent

is more likely to have the king. Since East made a vulnerable overcall on the two-level, you should conclude that he probably has the king.
Your next step is to visualize opposing distributions that would allow the contract to be made even though East has the king of diamonds. For example, you could mentally assign the singleton or doubleton king of diamonds to East and then easily manage the play so as to make the contract.
But by far your best chance is to try to find a way to force East to lead away from his assumed king of diamonds, since that would solve your problem even if he had three or more diamonds including the king.
Accordingly, after East wins the opening spade lead with the nine and continues with the king and then the ten of spades, you ruff high. After drawing trumps, you next cash the A-K of clubs, ruff a club and lead dummy's last spade, the queen.
But instead of ruffing it, you discard a diamond! This puts East on lead and forces him to return a diamond from the king or yield a ruff-and-discard. Either way, you make the contract.
As happens so often when you're declarer, you could not be 100 percent certain of the ultimate outcome. All you could do was to follow your convictions and hope everything would eventually work out.

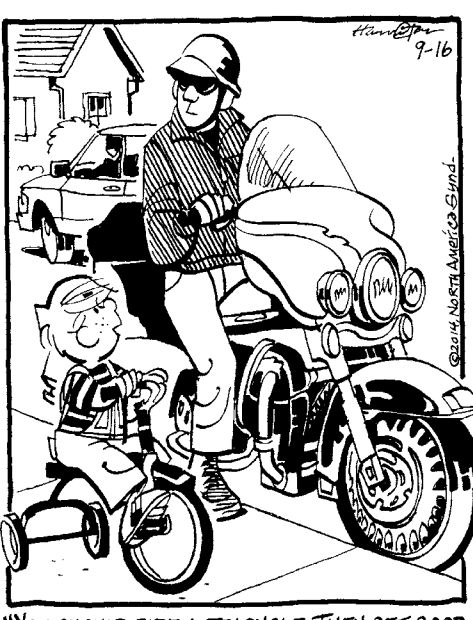

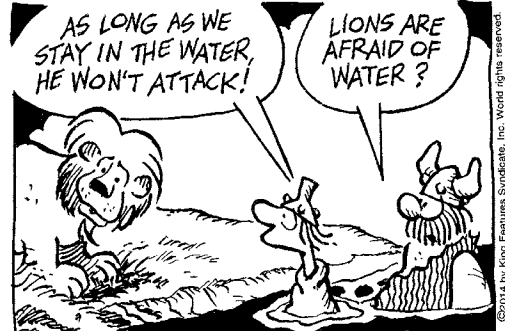

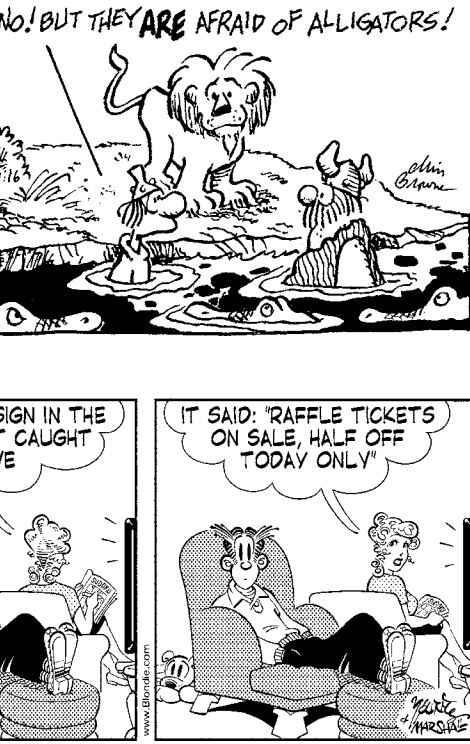

Keselowski wins opening round of NASCAR's Chase

JOLIET, Ill. (AP) — Brad Keselowski saw one shot in front of him to steal the win in the opening race of the Chase for the Sprint Cup championship.

He had twice picked this way through the field Sunday at Chicagoland Speedway, and found himself watching spirited, side-by-side battle for the lead between Kevin Harvick and rookie Kyle Larson. As everyone else held their breath, Keselowski saw his opening and pounced.

He used a daring three-wide drive through the middle to grab the lead for good.

"I just saw a hole and I went for it," he said. "I didn't know if my car would stick or not, but I knew I'd regret it if I didn't try it."

The win in the first race of the 10-race Chase automatically advances Keselowski, the top seed in the 16-driver field, into the second round. NASCAR this year has debuted an elimination format and four drivers will be knocked out after every third race.

Keselowski opened the 2012 Chase with a win at Chicago and went on to his first Sprint Cup title. He failed to make the Chase last year and was ineligible to defend his title, but has raced this entire year as if he's on a mission to win a second championship.

Now he can race for fun the next two weeks as he awaits the Chase reset following the Sept. 28 race at Dover — all because he went for broke on Sunday.

Mets' deGrom ties MLB record with 8 Ks at start

NEW YORK (AP) — Mets pitcher Jacob deGrom has tied a major league record by striking out his first eight batters.

The rookie whiffed eight consecutive Miami Marlins to begin Monday night's game at Citi Field, matching the mark set by Jim Deshaies of the Houston Astros against the Los Angeles Dodgers on Sept. 23, 1986.

Deshaies and deGrom are the only pitchers to accomplish the feat since 1900.

A top contender for NL Rookie of the Year, deGrom tied the record

by freezing Jeff Mathis with a 95 mph fastball for a called third strike. The shaggy-haired righty then gave up a sharp single to opposing pitcher Jarred Cosart on a 1-0 pitch.

As deGrom quickly piled up Ks, the small crowd began clapping whenever he got two strikes on a hitter. He received a warm ovation following Cosart's base hit.

The previous Mets record for strikeouts to start a game was six by Pete Falcone against Philadelphia on May 1, 1980.
