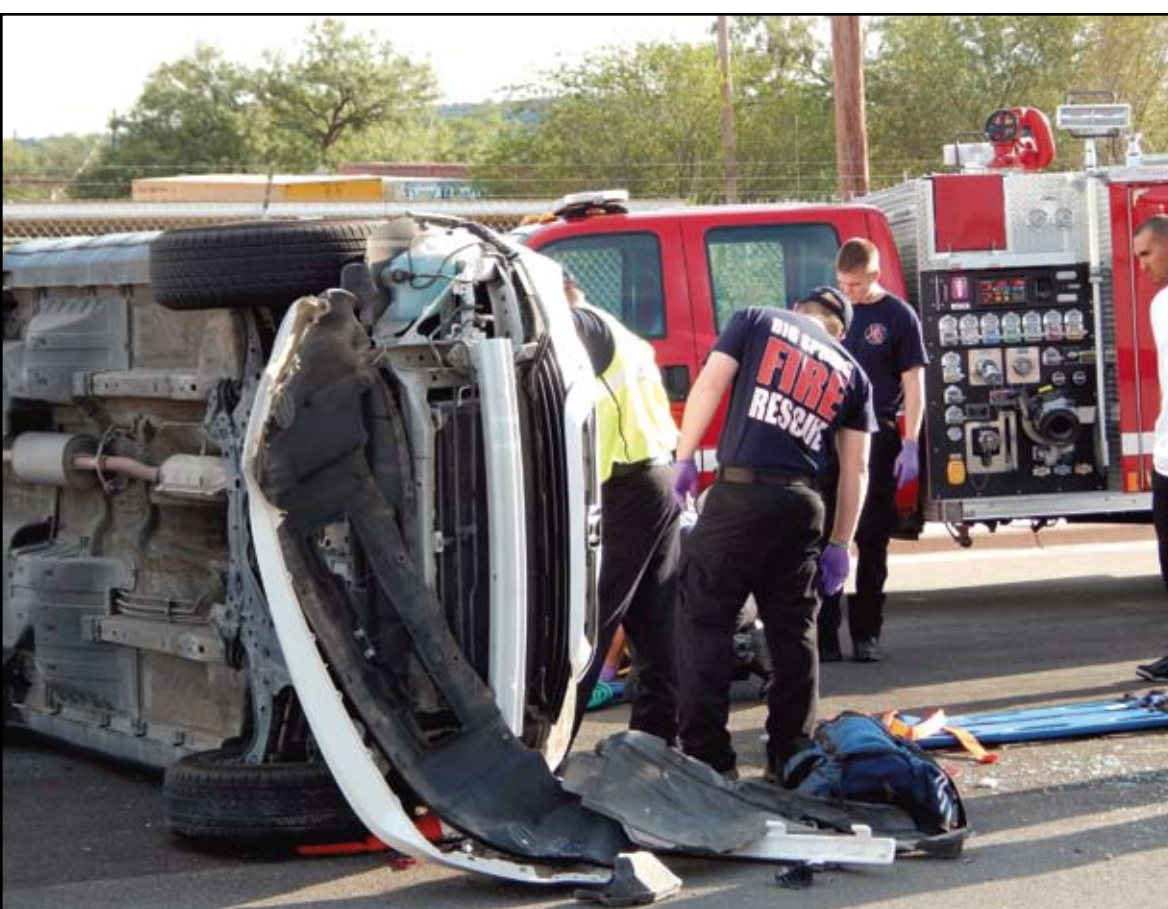

Early voting gets off to good start

Sen. Kel Seliger to visit Big Spring Wednesday

Early voting for the Nov. 4 general election is off to a brisk start, officials said.

More than 400 ballots were cast at the Howard County Elections Office Monday.

Election Administrator Sandra Bloom said 160 people voted in person, while 298 mail-in ballots were received.

Early voting for the general election continues through Oct. 31 at the county elections office, located on the first floor of the Howard County Courthouse. Voting hours are from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, except for Oct. 28 and 30, when the office will hold extended early voting hours (7 a.m. to 7 p.m.).

Early voting ends Oct. 31.

Although there is only one locally contested race — Republican Robert Fitzgibbons going against Democrat Carlos Leal for the Precinct 1, Place 2 Justice of the Peace position — County Elections Administrator Sandra Bloom is hopeful a large number of contested state and congressional races will cause voters to cast ballots.

"Plus, there's a state consti-

tutional amendment on the ballot (which would allow tax money to be transferred to a state highway fund to improve infrastructure on state roads)," she said. "I figure it will be an average turnout ... and maybe we'll have 8,000

Davis votes early, rejects talk of long odds

FORT WORTH, Texas — Trailing in polls and money with just two weeks until Election Day, Democrat Wendy Davis on Monday cast her ballot on the first day of early voting and rejected talk that her bid for Texas governor is headed for defeat.

"If our voters show up and vote, we will win. There is no question about that," Davis said.

But after a weekend U.S. Supreme Court decision

Big Spring Police Department officers were dispatched to the intersection of 11th and Scurry shortly after 6 p.m. Monday in reference to a pedestrian-vehicle accident. It was determined that a vehicle driven by McLellan struck Big Spring resident Robert

Pullin, 68.

Pullin suffered head injuries in the accident and was flown from the scene by helicopter to Odessa Medical Center, according to a BSPD news release.

"Due to Mr. McLellan's position with the city of Big Spring and the potential seriousness of the injury sustained by Mr. Pullin, it is the BSPD's protocol to request the assistance of the Department of Public Safety with the investigation of the accident," the news release stated. "DPS was contacted and responded, at which time the investigation was turned over to them."

No other information on the incident was available at press time.

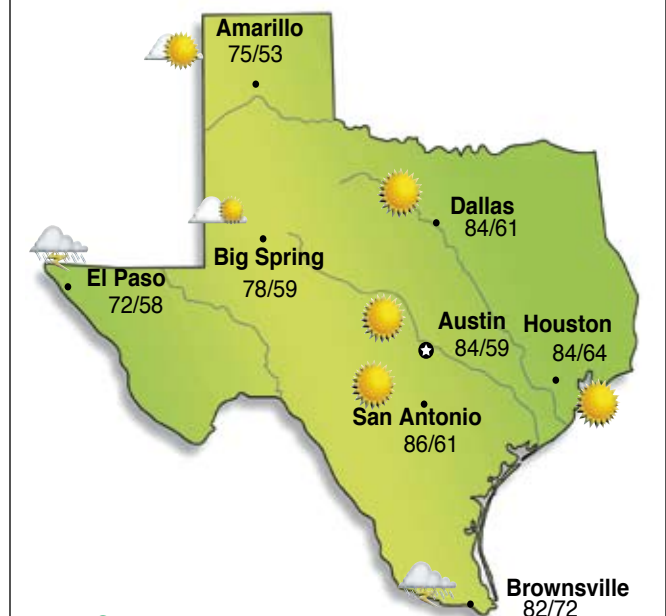

allowed Texas to enforce a strict voter ID law at polls through Nov. 4, even other Democrats are raising concerns over turnout. A record 14 million voters are registered to choose the first new Texas governor in 14 years, but the U.S. Justice Department says about 600,000 who are eligible lack an acceptable ID.

Republican Attorney General Greg Abbott has defended the law in court while running against Davis. He began

a final burst of campaigning in East Texas on Monday and has called the estimated number of disadvantaged voters under the ID law flawed.

Abbott opened early voting by tweeting to supporters that Davis campaigned with former Democratic House Majority Leader Nancy Pelosi, saying, "Don't let her California our Texas."

Davis cast her ballot in Fort Worth, which she has represented as a state senator since 2009. Her hometown newspaper has endorsed Abbott, and although Davis has been backed by other major

and midsize papers across Texas, she remains an underdog in the homestretch of a campaign that debuted to national attention a year ago.

The roughly \$6 million left in her campaign bankroll as of late September was about one-fifth of what Abbott reported. Some polls show her trailing by double digits.

After voting Monday, Davis' campaign latched onto a San Antonio Express-News story in which Abbott said he couldn't answer a hypothetical question about whether he would have defended a ban on interracial marriage.

It was the latest attack in a campaign-long narrative by Davis that Abbott wouldn't be inclusive as governor.

Asked whether she considered the race to have been nasty or negative, Davis said: "I think this has been a race that has defined for the people of this state what's at stake for them."

Democratic U.S. Rep. Mark Veasey, who joined the Justice Department in the voter ID lawsuit, predicted that the Supreme Court ruling would impact turnout among minorities.

"I am concerned there are

going to be people who will be discouraged and not show up at all," Veasey said. "I think it puts communities of color at a disadvantage."

Democrats haven't won a statewide office in Texas since 1994, a losing streak that many observers believe Davis will be pressed to break.

"She not only had to run a flawless campaign, he had to make a serious mistake," said Cal Jillson, a political science professor at Southern Methodist University. "And neither of those things have happened."

ballots cast."

Though there is only one locally contested race, several others will impact Howard County and much of Texas. In addition to the governor's race between Republican Greg Abbott

and Democrat Wendy Davis, State Sen. Kel Seliger, a Republican, is being challenged by Libertarian Party of Texas candidate Steven Gibson.

Gibson is not considered much of a threat, no Libertarian has won — or come close to winning — a legislative seat or statewide office in Texas.

That is not stopping Seliger from making a last-minute tour of his district. Wednesday, Seliger is to be at the Martin County Library in Stanton from 10-11 a.m., Glasscock Country Courthouse in Garden City from 1-2 p.m. and Hall Center for the Arts on the Howard College campus in Big Spring from 3-4 p.m.

For this election, at least, voters are required to produce acceptable photo identification when they cast their ballots. The U.S. Supreme Court Saturday rejected an emergency request from the Justice Department and civil rights groups to prohibit Texas from requiring voters to produce certain forms of

photo ID in order to vote.

Three justices — Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Sonia Sotomayor and Elena Kagan — dissented.

On election day, votes can be cast at five locations:

- Precinct 1 is housed at the Bauer Elementary cafeteria (this is a change from past elections).
- Precinct 2 ballots are being cast at Spring Town Plaza.
- Precinct 3 residents vote at First Baptist Church.
- Precinct 4 voters should cast ballots at the Garrett Coliseum East Room.
- Coahoma and Sand Springs residents are voting at the Coahoma Community Center.

Woman gets 10-year term

PECOS, Texas (AP) — A Texan has been sentenced to 10 years in prison for stealing Social Security benefits meant for her father whose body was found in a storage unit in Kentucky.

Judith Maria Broughton of Terlingua must repay \$245,000 in benefits stolen since her father's 1990 death.

Prosecutors say the daughter leased a unit in Lexington, Kentucky, to conceal the death of Luther Broughton. His mummified remains

were located in January.

Broughton in July pleaded guilty to willfully and knowingly stealing Social Security benefits. Broughton, who was sentenced Friday in Pecos, shared an account with her father. The benefits were deposited electronically.

Authorities are trying to locate her mother, Mary Elizabeth Broughton, whose benefits were also deposited into an account with her daughter.

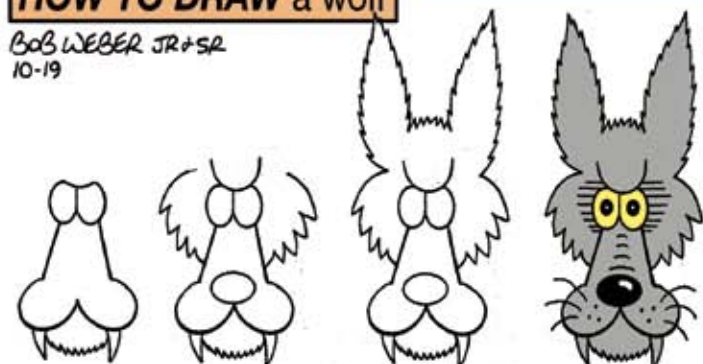

Bird Poop: Finding strength in numbers

Left behind, the threesome had that in common. Although their locations had varied, their commonality was lack of direction. Each had experienced in some way pain or the pangs of hunger. Found in a man's yard, one could not fly. Emaciated, another had finally weakened enough to be discovered on a golf course. Abandoned, the third had experienced similar discomforts.

Each had waited. Nothing circled above the treetops as in the summer. No doting parent brought relief. The silence above was unbroken by a piercing call.

By the middle of September, we had begun to anticipate seeing wintering raptors during fall migration. Their presence was always exciting.

The next day, a phone call from Diane Tracy in San Angelo turned our premise of what should be here upside down. It was only a week before the official first day of autumn. It seemed impossible that she would be telling us she had a juvenile Mississippi Kite.

Her examination of the bird had alerted her to the excessive swelling of one wing. Warm to the touch, the injured area was infected.

As her veterinarian examined the wing, she felt it was either a bad bruise, or a hairline

fracture. After giving it a shot to reduce the inflammation, she recommended an antibiotic for seven days. Willing to accept the challenge of the raptor's recovery, Diane kept it confined. In numerous instances, bruises, or soft tissue injuries, are overcome in a few days. The warmth of the affected area suggested a fracture. The bone would require more time for calcifying and strengthening to be completed.

A week later, the lessening of the swollen area was apparent. As Diane continued to give frequent updates, she kept repeating, "It won't eat on its own. It will eat if I hand its food to it."

By the end of September, the kite began to utilize an outside enclosure during the day. Exercise enabled it to start elevating.

Since the specie's migration had already occurred, Diane and I knew we'd have to depend upon Gail Barnes in Lubbock. The kite had to be held over during winter.

Earlier, Gail had informed me that she also had received a juvenile kite. Although she had thought the specie had left, this youngster had been found on a Lubbock golf course. "First, I'll have to see if I can get it though the weekend," she said. Not only did it survive a near starvation, it started to thrive under her care.

When I asked if her's would eat on its own, she replied, "No, neither one is ready. Before their rescue, Diane's and mine had progressed to where



they could catch an insect on the fly. Once they do that, they won't eat from a platter." At least we had learned why our kite seemed so obstinate.

With her contacts in the state, Gail called a rehabber in Austin. Having helped her in the past with non-releasable birds that had been left behind,

the man's next statement came as a surprise.

He also had a juvenile kite that had been unable to migrate. Willing to accept the Lubbock and San Angelo kites, he felt his bird would benefit from the company of the other two.

Since a possible transport to Austin seemed

likely within the next week, Art and I met Diane and her husband, Dale, in Sterling City on Oct. 8. Once back in Big Spring, we asked ourselves a familiar question: "What's best for the bird?" Within 30 minutes, we were headed to Lubbock.

When Gail released our charge in the aviary, the other kite

looked down at it. Art felt it was thinking, "What's that?" Soon, our bird had hopped to a lower perch.

Pointing to an area high above, Gail said our kite had to reach that perch. "Then we'll know if it can fly. Only flying can get it there."

Its recovery from injury would now be tested. If it did not reach the perch in two days, the kite would be taken in for x-rays.

The next evening, an email arrived. "It's flying!" The following morning, another email offered, "Both are flying!" When we talked the next day, Gail said if a kite could look happy, her's had. Apparently a roommate and kindred spirit had suddenly provided such elation.

Shortly, the two-some will arrive in Austin to over winter with a fellow kite. Allowed to feed and exercise without the rigors of migration, they will be in prime form.

Whenever the Mississippi kites reappear next year, the threesome will be released to join their specie in the sky. On that occasion, the worst of times will have turned into the best of times in the tale of three kites.

Contract Bridge

A fundamental rule of defensive play is that until proven otherwise, you never credit declarer with a hand that would allow him to make the contract. Rather, you try to picture holdings that would allow you to defeat the contract. At times these imagined holdings might seem far-fetched, but, even so, it's better to think in a positive manner that might lead to defeat of the contract than to

think in a manner that in effect concedes the contract.

Let's say you're West in today's deal, defending against four spades. You cash the king of diamonds and continue with the queen as everyone follows suit. You assume that South has a good seven-card suit for his opening three-spade bid. How would you continue?

Looking at dummy's impressive hearts and clubs, you realize that you can't defeat the contract unless your side can score two trump tricks. All your thoughts should therefore be devoted to visualizing trump distributions that would allow your side to collect a second trump trick in addition to your ace.

Instead of thinking directly of South's trump holdings, it might be easier to think of East's possible trump holdings. And after you do, you should conclude that the correct play at trick three is a low diamond! This play will produce the desired result if East has either the singleton queen or singleton jack. In both cases, you would score two trump tricks with your A-10 instead of only one after partner ruffs with the queen or jack.

Pistorius sentenced to prison for killing

RETORIA, South Africa (AP) — Oscar Pistorius was taken away in a police van Tuesday to start serving a five-year prison sentence for killing girlfriend Reeva Steenkamp.

A South African judge cited the "gross negligence" the Olympic runner showed when he shot Steenkamp multiple times through a toilet cubicle door in his home when she delivered the sentence. Pistorius' prison term begins immediately.

Pistorius could be released after 10 months in jail to serve the remainder under house arrest.

Masipa also sentenced Pistorius to three years

in prison for unlawfully firing a gun in a separate incident weeks before Steenkamp's 2013 shooting death. She ordered that sentence to be wholly suspended for five years on condition that Pistorius is not found guilty of another firearm offense.

Masipa delivered her ruling after reviewing arguments for a tough sentence as well as the defense case for a more lenient punishment for Pistorius. She said it was a balancing act after defense lawyers had argued that Pistorius had already suffered emotionally and financially after what he called an accidental killing.

Today's Highlight in History: On Oct. 21, 1944, during World War II, U.S. troops captured the German city of Aachen (AH'-kuhn). On this date: In 1797, the U.S. Navy frigate Constitution, also known as "Old Ironsides," was christened in Boston's harbor. In 1805, a British fleet commanded by Adm. Horatio Nelson defeated a French-Spanish

fleet in the Battle of Trafalgar; Nelson, however, was killed. In 1879, Thomas Edison perfected a workable electric light at his laboratory in Menlo Park, New Jersey. In 1917, members of the 1st Division of the U.S. Army training in Luneville (luhn-nay-VEEL'), France, became the first Americans to see action on the front lines of World War I. In 1945, women in France were allowed to vote in parliamentary elections for the first time. In 1959, the Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum, designed by Frank Lloyd Wright, opened to the public in New

York. In 1960, Democrat John F. Kennedy and Republican Richard M. Nixon clashed in their fourth and final presidential debate in New York. In 1964, the movie musical "My Fair Lady," starring Audrey Hepburn and Rex Harrison, had its world premiere at the Criterion Theater in New York.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Alex Gordon took a big rip at a batting-practice fastball, fouled it off badly into the cage, and ducked when the carom nearly hit him in the head.

Gordon let out a huge laugh, and so did a bunch of his Kansas City Royals teammates watching Monday's workout.

"I can't believe that just happened, dude," pitcher James Shields razzed.

It'll be more frustrating than funny if those are the same awkward swings the Royals and San Francisco Giants take once the World Series begins.

Going into Game 1 on Tuesday night at Kauffman Sta-

dium, both teams will deal with a familiar issue this deep in the postseason: Does an extended layoff translate into rest or rust?

Buster Posey and the Giants zipped through the playoffs, and now will try for their third title in five years. Lorenzo Cain and the Royals zoomed along, reaching the Series for the first time since 1985.

And then, they all got some time off. Almost an eternity, by October standards.

The Royals went 8-0 in the AL playoffs, giving them five idle days before Shields starts the opener. San Francisco went 8-2 on the NL side and

had four days to relax before Madison Bumgarner pitches.

"It's definitely different because we have played so many games over the last 7 1/2, eight months. But you just understand it's one of those things," Posey said.

As recent history has shown, hitters can be very vulnerable when they get out of rhythm.

"It affects a bit with your timing, especially when trying to adjust to pitchers," Kansas City second baseman Omar Infante said. "It's hard to recover that groove you have."

The slightly favored Giants and Royals held practices, studied video and checked out

scouting reports. But as several teams that stumbled in the World Series after long breaks discovered, nothing can duplicate playing a real game.

Triple Crown winner Miguel Cabrera and Detroit got nearly a week off in 2012, then the Tigers hit a combined .159 and totaled six runs in getting swept by the Giants.

Troy Tulowitzki and the Colorado Rockies rushed into the 2007 World Series, waited a week and got outscored 29-10 in Boston's sweep.

A year earlier, Magglio Ordonez and the Tigers looked so powerful in the playoffs, but fell apart a week later and hit

only .199 in a five-game loss to St. Louis.

Infante played on both of those Detroit teams that got wiped out. He actually excelled in 2012, hitting .333.

"It's a short series, you need some luck. We lost four in a row and they were coming from playing seven. In this series, I think both teams are even," he said.

Royals reserve Raul Ibanez, who's enjoyed postseason success in the past, said "determination and will" carry players in the fall. Yet the timing and confidence that lifts them for so long can be lost in a hurry.
