Voting totals near 1K

More than 1,000 Howard County residents are expected to cast ballots by the end of the first week of early voting, officials predict.

Through Thursday, 957 people had voted early in the Nov. 4 general election. Election Administrator Saundra Bloom said 633 people voted in person, while 324 mail-in ballots were received.



Those totals are lagging behind early voting tallies from recent elections — Bloom said about 3,000 people voted early in the 2010 general election.

"It seems like a lot of people are waiting to vote," she said. "The last day (of early voting) is always the busiest day, though, so we'll see."

Early voting for the general election continues through Oct. 31 at the county elections office, located on the first floor of the Howard County Courthouse. Voting hours are from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, except for Oct. 28 and 30, when the office will hold extended early voting hours (7 a.m. to 7 p.m.).

Halloween Art Bash coming to HC

Even the ghouls like to express their creativity, but they will not be invited to the Howard College Art Department's big Halloween Art Bash.

Or maybe, they will.

About 165 students ranging from fifth grade to high school from How-

ard County schools will be participating in a workshop hosted by the art department in conjunction with UTPB "Pots and Prints."

"We will be doing Raku ceramics and printmaking," said Stacey Slaten, HC professor of arts.

Raku is a special pottery technique that creates a unique metallic or glazed finish. The HC Art Depart-

ment received a grant earlier this year from the Big Spring Convention and Visitor's Bureau to purchase special Raku equipment.

"UTPB will also be bringing their equipment, and I have an advanced ceramics student, Stephanie Delaney, who I am helping her build

Campaign signs spreading like weeds

COLUMBUS, Ohio — Pesky. Illegal. Effective?

Lawn signs touting local and statewide candidates are in full bloom along highways, street corners and other public spaces. It's the sign of the season. And despite legal restrictions, the markers can sprout invasively.

Campaigns hope voters see them as a signal of the community's support for the candidate or issue. But repeat exposure can rub some the wrong way.

"They just mushroom," said Elizabeth Lessner, a central Ohio restaurateur. "It used to be they put one sign on the corner and now there's 50."

Lessner is one of the Columbus Sign Ninjas, a group that sprang up in the perennial battleground state to take down campaign clutter from public spaces.

State and local sign laws can vary. Ohio, like other states, prohibits such advertising

from being placed in the public right of way — which would include interstates and state routes. Officials don't want signs to obstruct drivers' views or present safety hazards.

The ninja members use social media to report signs and

occasionally call out campaigns seen as big offenders. Some candidates have apologized for their sign placement on the group's Facebook page, which boasts nearly 300 members.

Karen Thomas, a Columbus resident and ninja mem-

ber, has been uprooting stray signs since 2008. Her first take came after she passed multiple markers near the interstate exit for a mall. Thomas recalled, "If I want them to go away, I'm going to have to pull over and pick them up."

So she did. And she continues to snatch signs when she runs errands, carefully avoiding vehicles that whiz by her.

"I don't lollygag," said Thomas, a corporate financial consultant.

It's not just residents who get irked by the signage.

In Providence, Rhode Island, large signs for his opponent led to a complaint from Republican mayoral candidate Dan Harrop. Harrop told the city solicitor's office this week that signs for independent candidate Buddy Cianci far exceed the size allowed by city ordinances.

Signs are a fast, cheap and easy way to grow name recognition and increase a

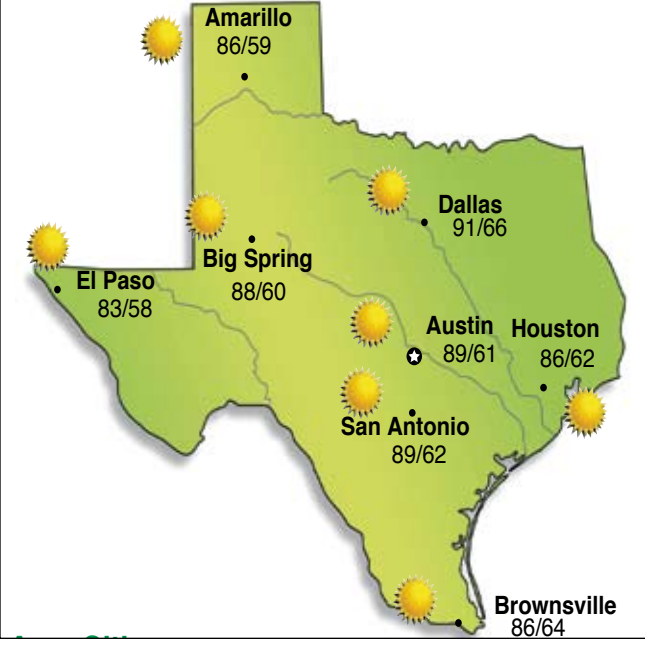

Although there is only one locally contested race — Republican Robert Fitzgibbons going against Democrat Carlos Leal for the Precinct 1, Place 2 Justice of the

Peace position — County Elections Administrator Sandra Bloom is hopeful a large number of contested state and congressional races will cause voters to cast ballots.

"Plus, there's a state constitutional amendment on the ballot

(which would allow tax money to be transferred to a state highway fund to improve infrastructure on state roads)," she said. "I figure it will be an average turnout ... and maybe we'll have 8,000 ballots cast."

For this election, at least, voters will be required to produce acceptable photo identification when they cast their ballots. The U.S. Supreme Court recently

rejected an emergency request from the Justice Department and civil rights groups to prohibit Texas from requiring voters to produce certain forms of photo ID in order to vote.

Three justices — Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Sonia Sotomayor and Elena Kagan — dissented.

On election day, votes can be cast at five locations:

• Precinct 1 will be

housed at the Bauer Elementary cafeteria (this is a change from past elections).

• Precinct 2 ballots will be cast at Spring Town Plaza.

• Precinct 3 residents can vote at First Baptist Church.

• Precinct 4 voters can cast ballots at the Garrett Coliseum East Room.

• Coahoma and Sand Springs residents can

vote at the Coahoma Community Center.

Voting hours on Election Day are 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

candidate's visibility in a neighborhood. They've been around since the infancy of the country's democracy, said Benjamin Bates, a professor of communication studies at Ohio University.

Candidates and their supporters will place signs near the roadways because they hope more voters will see them.

"It's sort of the principle that any publicity is good publicity," Bates said.

Ben Donahower, a Pennsylvania-based political consultant who sells lawn signs, said he advises campaigns to place signs on private property. That means supporters have names and faces.

"Any candidate can go out and spend a day putting out a bunch of signs along a highway," Donahower said. "It's a different scenario to talk to somebody and say, 'Do I have your vote?'"

From one bad war to worse one

In 2004, Stuart Bowen of Texas was asked by a friend to take on a difficult and important job, which he did.

Bowen's friend was George W. Bush, and the job was to investigate corruption and waste in Iraq, where his buddy George had launched a misguided and very costly war, as well as an effort to reconstruct that country's fractured economy. The watchdog soon learned that Air Force transport planes had been airlifting whole pallets of shrink-wrapped \$100 bills from the U.S. to Baghdad — totaling some \$14 billion!

The bales of cash were delivered to the care of L. Paul Bremer III, a laissez-faire ideologue who'd been installed by the Bush-Cheney regime to rebuild Iraq as a regulation-free corporate utopia. It was quickly obvious to Bowen that the utopia included no accounting of where the \$14 billion went, though during the next decade he determined that “billions of dollars (were) taken out of Iraq illegally.” But he couldn't get the Bushites to mount a full-fledge investigation and prosecution.

Finally, in 2010, he and his team got a break, learning that about \$1.5 billion had been stolen and stashed in a bunker in rural Lebanon. However, the Obama administration wouldn't pursue this lead. Neither did the CIA, FBI or the Iraqi govern-

ment.

Then, Bowen was stunned that the U.S. embassy in Lebanon was resisting his own attempts to visit the bunker, actually preventing him from entering that country. When two of his investigators did get into Lebanon, our embassy denied them permission to see the bunker, claiming it was too dangerous.

And here we go again — into yet another war in a wide and tumultuous swath of the world involved in centuries-old religio-ethno conflagrations that Eurocentric Americans don't comprehend and cannot resolve. For a clue about what we're stepping into in Iraq and Syria, with our high-tech fighter jets, drones and ultimately with our soldiers on the ground in this new war against ISIS, let's remember Afghanistan.

Beginning in the yesteryear of the Cheney-Bush regime, the promise was that our Afghan excursion would promptly dispatch the Taliban, train an effective Afghan military force and create a stable democratic government.

But it turned out to be both the longest war in American history and a dismal failure on all counts.

After 13 years, more than 2,000 U.S. deaths, nearly 20,000 of our troops horribly maimed and over a trillion dollars spent — what have we won?

Far from defeated, the Taliban is again on the offensive, Afghanistan's elections are a farce, government corruption is rampant, the infrastructure we built is already crumbling, there is no

national unity, and more than \$100 billion of the money we sent for reconstruction and training was simply stolen by the elites and shipped in suitcases to their foreign bank accounts.

The good news is that our nation's Afghan debacle is scheduled to end this year. The bad news is that it won't — a contingent of U.S. troops will remain, we will keep paying \$5 billion a year to sustain the Afghan army and police, and we're on the hook for billions more each year to fund that country's bankrupt government.

So hi-ho, hi-ho — off again we go to Syria, Iraq and beyond to conquer ISIS in what is already being called “a long war.” Last year, Bowen's office was formally shut down, with none of the missing cash recovered or accounted for.

Remember Bowen's 10 years of frustration as Washington starts shoving new billions of dollars into the morass of its newest ill-defined war. The tab just for the direct military cost of this latest ISIS, et al misadventure will be as much as \$22 billion — a year. How much of our cash for this misadventure will be stolen or “missing”? And just think how much good that money would do if we invested it here in our own people?

The crossroads of Conquistadors

Using 16th-century maps but traveling on 21st-century highways — and even some waterways — my cross-country trip has been roughly following the route of Alvar Nunez Cabeza de Vaca, the Spanish conquistador who spent almost eight years traveling across the North American wilderness from 1528 to 1536 — from Tampa, Florida, to Mexico City.

But when Cabeza de Vaca's trail finally headed south into Mexico, my Great Hispanic American History Tour — faithful to the mission of promoting the hidden Hispanic heritage of the United States — had to turn north, on the trail of the other conquistadors who came to North America.

After all, when you get to southern New Mexico and Arizona, you are entering another crossroads of conquistadors.

Shipwrecked off the coast of Florida and unable to establish what would have been Spain's first North American colony, Cabeza de Vaca and his fellow castaways knew that moving west along the Gulf Coast, they would eventually hook up with Spanish forces in what they described as “the land of the Christians,” or New Spain.

Of the 300 men on the ill-fated 1529 Panfilo de Narvaez expedition, only Cabeza de Vaca and three other crew members — Andres Dornate, Alfonso Castillo and the slave Estevanico — realized that remarkable and historic feat. A fifth survivor, Juan Ortiz, was captured by Florida natives and lived as their slave until he was rescued by another Spanish expedition 10 years later.

But even after Cabeza de Vaca and the other survivors reached present-day Texas, before veering south into present-day Mexico, they had to keep moving west. Friendly natives had warned them that the natives to the south would not be so friendly and that their lives would be in danger. When Cabeza de Vaca finally reached Spanish forces, in what is now the state of Sinaloa in northwestern Mexico,

he had traveled almost entirely across North America on foot and rafts, nearly reaching the Gulf of California, also known as the Sea of Cortez.

Although their journey had been an awful odyssey and although Juan Ponce de Leon and other Spanish conquistadors who came earlier had encountered mostly hostility from the natives, the stories they told in Mexico City and Spain — about the huge potential of the North American frontier — triggered several other Spanish expeditions to North America, by sea from the Caribbean and by land from Mexico. Mexico's gold already had enriched Spain's coffers.

In 1539, the Hernando de Soto expedition also landed in the Tampa Bay area, rescued Ortiz — who became the group's guide and interpreter — and went on to explore the territory that later became Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina, Tennessee, Alabama, Mississippi, Arkansas and Louisiana.

In 1559, conquistador Tristan de Luna led another Spanish expedition, which settled in present-day Pensacola, Florida, but was wiped out by a hurricane. In 1565, Pedro Menendez de Aviles established America's first permanent European settlement, in St. Augustine, Florida.

But on the western side of the continent, the land expeditions also began in 1539. That's when Marcos de Niza — with Estevanico as his guide — led a small group of explorers from Culiacan, Mexico, and crossed today's southeastern Arizona and reached present-day New Mexico on a mission to find the fabled Seven Cities of Cibola. Zuni Indians reportedly killed Estevanico, the first African to step ashore on what is now the continental United States — although there are those who believe he simply went to live with them to escape from his enslavement.

But de Niza returned to Mexico claiming to have seen Cibola, a mountaintop city of gold as large as Mexico City. And although he saw it only from a distance, he created the incentive for more expeditions.

He was followed later that year by the Spanish commander of San Miguel de Culiacan, Melchor Diaz, who was assigned

to investigate de Niza's findings. Diaz went into present-day New Mexico with 15 horsemen but returned to Mexico rejected by “snows and fierce winds from across the wilderness,” and he claimed to have found no evidence of the bountiful land described by de Niza.

Nevertheless, the following year, with de Niza as the guide, Francisco Vazquez de Coronado led a massive expedition from Mexico all the way to present-day Kansas, never finding the cities of gold and realizing that the golden structures de Niza had seen were only adobe buildings glittering in the sunlight. But they discovered huge North American landmarks, including the Colorado River and “the biggest hole in the world,” now known as the Grand Canyon.

By 1542, only 50 years after Christopher Columbus discovered the New World, the Coronado and de Soto expeditions had explored huge portions of the current U.S. mainland, and Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo, sailing from New Spain, had explored the Pacific coast and claimed western North America, including California, for Spain.

And by 1559, when de Luna landed near Pensacola, or 1565, when Menendez settled in St. Augustine, or 1566, when Pardo reached the Carolinas, or 1598, when “the last conquistador,” Juan de Onate, led another huge expedition into New Mexico, the Spanish were no longer coming to explore North America. They were coming to stay.

It was all before the British arrived and settled in Jamestown in 1607, all part of that first American century, which started with Ponce de Leon in 1513.

Next week, the Great Hispanic American History Tour goes back to the U.S.-Mexico border, this time in southern Arizona, to explore the Coronado National Memorial and to pick up a new, northbound trail.

Did you ever wonder?

The sacrifice of Isaac

After Isaac's birth, Abraham continued to "sojourn in the land of the Philistines for many years."

Sojourn is a word used to describe that he lived in the land but did not buy any land to make it his own. At that time, land was usually not bought peacefully; it was conquered and claimed until someone stronger took it by force.

The Philistine king Abimelech recognized that "God is with you in all that you do," so he made a covenant with Abraham that they would live peaceably as neighbors in Abimelech's land.

All these many years God had been testing Abraham. Would he weaken over the years and slide back into the pagan ways of immoral behavior and worshipping many gods, or would he continue to love God and serve only Him? Some of the tests Abraham passed and some of them he failed, like not protecting his wife from the kings who desired her. His tenth trial was a drastic one.

God spoke to Abraham, telling him to take his son and bring him as an offering on Mount

Moriah. Read along with me as Gen 22 presents this to us as a conversation between God and Abraham. I like to think it went this way. God said, "Please take your son." Abraham interrupted Him, "Which son?" God: "Your only son." Abraham: "But I have two sons." God: "The one whom you love, Isaac, and go to the land of Moriah; bring him up there as an offering upon one of the mountains which I shall tell you."

Since God gave him a direct command, Abraham did not hesitate to obey. Early next morning, Abraham split the wood for the sacrifice himself and he loaded the firewood on a donkey. He took Isaac and two other young men with him and traveled to Mount Moriah.

Let's take a minute to examine God's wording carefully. On first glance it sounds as if God plainly tells Abraham to 'sacrifice' his son, Isaac. God actually says, "Bring him up as an offering." But to Abraham, too, it must have sounded as if he was to sacrifice his son.

After they reached the mountain and Abraham built the altar, Isaac said, "Father, here we have the fire and the wood, but where is the lamb for the offering?" Abraham answered, "God will provide for Himself the lamb for the offering."

We said that Abraham sojourned in the land of Canaan

for many years, but the Bible does not tell us how many years. From other records, the sages established that Isaac was 37 years old at this time and could have easily defended himself against a man 137 years old. They say that as he began to realize that he was to be the sacrifice, he asked his father to bind him so that he would not automatically fight to preserve his life and he climbed onto the alter willingly.

When Abraham lifted the knife to slaughter his son, an angel appeared, saying, "Do not harm your son. I know now that you are a God-fearing man, since you have not withheld your son from Me." Then Abraham saw a ram caught in the thicket by his horns.

Abraham has spoken prophetically, "God will provide for Himself the lamb for the offering." And because of his faithfulness, God repeated His blessing on Abraham and his descendants. Sometimes it is very hard, but at some time in our life each of us must stand fast and wait upon the Lord.

Methodist panel hears appeal over gay wedding

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — A Methodist pastor who was disciplined for officiating at his son's same-sex wedding will soon find out whether he can remain an ordained minister in the nation's second-largest Protestant denomination.

The Rev. Frank Schaefer was suspended and then defrocked last year after refusing to promise to refrain from conducting same-sex marriages in the future. The action against Schaefer — who officiated at his son's 2007 wedding in Massachusetts — was taken after a church trial in Pennsylvania.

An appeals panel restored Schaefer's pastoral credentials in June, but that decision is being challenged. The United Methodist Church's Judicial Council, the denomination's highest judicial body, heard arguments in the case Wednesday in Memphis.

The Rev. Scott Campbell, who represents Schaefer, told the council that Schaefer's defrocking was wrongly imposed as a punishment for a possible future action, something

church rules do not allow.

The Rev. Christopher Fisher, representing the Eastern Pennsylvania Annual Conference, said the punishment was appropriately directed at Schaefer's refusal to promise that he would uphold the

Methodist law book in its entirety, "the same condition required of every United Methodist elder," Fisher said.

While Schaefer is not the only Methodist minister to face church discipline for his stance on homosexuality, he is the most high-profile.

Contract Bridge

Bidding Quiz

You are South, both sides vulnerable. The bidding has gone:

West North East South
1♣ Pass 1♦ ?

What (if anything) would you bid with each of the following five hands?

1. ♠AQJ6 ♥KJ93 ♦A872 ♣10
2. ♠AQ ♥K84 ♦Q93 ♣KJ852
3. ♠J9543 ♥Q ♦AK7 ♣Q865
4. ♠AJ8 ♥AQ6 ♦KJ3 ♣QJ94
5. ♠KQ862 ♥KQJ54 ♦A9 ♣2

1. Double. With some 15-point or better hands, you might not have a convenient way to enter the auction, but you have no such problem here. The double tells partner that you have a hand of at least opening strength and support for both unbid suits — which is exactly what you have. Partner will choose whichever major suit he prefers and relieve you of any guesswork as to which suit to bid.

2. Pass. Again you have 15 points, but this time you can't double because you don't have sufficient support for the unbid suits. Furthermore, West's club bid has taken a lot of starch out of your hand, since your club honors are badly placed. It is therefore too dangerous to do any-

thing but pass.

3. Pass. There is some temptation to bid one spade, but with such a weak suit you might get your head chopped off by a double. Overcalls are normally based more on tricks than points, and you don't have many tricks here.

4. One notrump. The only question here is whether to double or bid one notrump. A one-notrump overcall shows 15 to 18 points, balanced distribution and stoppers in the opponents' suits — precisely what you have. A double would suggest distributional values, which you lack. Game is unlikely, but the partscore is worth fighting for.

5. One spade. Here the plan is to bid both suits in normal fashion (higher-ranking suit first). It is true that a double might locate the proper trump suit more quickly, but there is also a danger that the bidding will climb too high and too fast in one of the minors, and you could find yourself bucking a high-level contract before bidding either of your suits.

With two long suits and a good hand, you usually do best by bidding one of them instead of doubling for takeout, with the intention of bidding your second suit at your next turn.

News in brief

3 others quarantined in NYC after 1st Ebola case, a doctor who treated patients in West Africa

NEW YORK (AP) — A doctor who became New York City's first Ebola patient was praised for getting treatment immediately upon showing symptoms, and health officials stressed that the nation's most populous city need not fear his wide-ranging travel in the days before his illness began.

Mayor Bill de Blasio and Gov. Andrew Cuomo urged residents not to be alarmed by the doctor's diagnosis Thursday, even as they described him riding the subway, taking a cab and bowling since returning to New York from Guinea a week ago. De Blasio said all city officials followed "clear and strong" protocols in their handling and treatment of him.

"We want to state at the outset that New Yorkers have no reason to be alarmed," de Blasio said. "New Yorkers who have not been exposed are not at all at risk."

The doctor, Craig Spencer, a member of Doctors Without Borders, reported Thursday morning coming down with a 103-degree fever and diarrhea. He was being treated in an isolation ward at Manhattan's Bellevue Hospital, a designated Ebola center.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, which will do a further test to confirm the initial results, has dispatched an Ebola response team to New York. President Barack Obama spoke to Cuomo and de Blasio Thursday night and offered the federal government's support. He asked them to stay in close touch with Ron Klain, his "Ebola czar," and public health officials in Washington.

Canadians search for answers to gunman's motivations in Parliament shooting

OTTAWA, Ontario (AP) — Government leaders gathered in a show of resolution a day after a deadly attack on Canada's Parliament, as authorities and everyday Canadians sifted through confounding shards of the gunman's life seeking to understand what motivated the man to storm the nation's seat of power.

The emerging portrait of Michael Zehaf-Bibeau is a fragmented one: A misfit who went more than five years without seeing his mother. A crack

cocaine user who once told a psychological evaluator he wanted to go to jail to beat his addiction. A committed Muslim who said he wanted to become a better man, but in recent weeks seemed to come unglued. A homeless shelter resident who talked about wanting to go to Libya — or Syria — and became upset when he couldn't get a passport.

A day after the 32-year-old Canadian launched what the prime minister called a terrorist attack, a top police official said Thursday that Zehaf-Bibeau — whose father was from Libya — may have lashed out in frustration over delays in getting his passport.

"I think it was central to what was driving him," said Royal Canadian Mounted Police Commissioner Bob Paulson on Thursday.

Bibeau shot a soldier to death at Canada's national war memorial Wednesday, then stormed the Parliament building, where he was gunned down by the sergeant-at-arms. Police said he was armed with a lever-action Winchester rifle, an old-fashioned, relatively slow-firing weapon.

Police get constitutional training, riot gear for grand jury decision in Missouri shooting

FERGUSON, Mo. (AP) — Missouri police have been brushing up on constitutional rights and stocking up on riot gear to prepare for a grand jury's decision about whether to charge a white police officer who fatally shot a black 18-year-old in suburban St. Louis.

The preparations are aimed at avoiding a renewed outbreak of violence during the potentially large demonstrations that could follow an announcement of whether Ferguson police officer Darren Wilson will face a criminal trial for the Aug. 9 death of Michael Brown.

Police and protesters have repeatedly clashed since the shooting, which prompted a national conversation about race and police tactics. Images of officers in riot gear and armored vehicles confronting protesters have drawn widespread criticism.

Many protesters want Darren Wilson indicted for murder. Grand jury proceedings are secret, but legal analysts say recently leaked information about Wilson's testimony to investigators may be an attempt to prepare the public for the possibility that he might not be charged.

The decision could be made public

within the next month.

Spread of same-sex marriage putting some gay people on the spot: Do you say 'I do or I don't'?

LOS ANGELES (AP) — When gay marriage became legal in Pennsylvania earlier this year, Elissa Goldberg was ready to say "I do." Her longtime partner's reaction, however, was "I'm not so sure."

The couple had been together more than 20 years, which Anndee Hochman figured already made them good as married. They owned their Philadelphia home together, kept their money in a joint bank account and were both named as parents on their 13-year-old daughter's birth certificate.

"I didn't really see what the additional benefits would be," says Hochman, a freelance writer.

But deep down, she acknowledges, there was another reason.

"It had to do with coming out as a lesbian at a time when there was a certain pride in living outside the box," said Hochman, 52, adding she wasn't ready to give up a lifestyle she'd come to embrace.

California start up creates gun technology that tells dispatch how, when cop guns are fired

WATSONVILLE, Calif. (AP) — A Silicon Valley startup has developed technology to let dispatchers know when a police officer's weapon has been fired.

The latest product by Yardarm Technologies would notify dispatchers in real time when an officer's gun is taken out of its holster and when it's fired. It can also track where the gun is located and in what direction it was fired.

Santa Cruz County Sheriff Phil Wowak, whose agency is among two testing the technology, said it will allow the sheriff's office to see whether deputies are in trouble and unable to ask for assistance.

"That's the worst nightmare for any police officer in the field," he said.

The system will not include a remote disabling mechanism. Yardarm was pursuing that technology and demonstrated it at a conference in Las Vegas last year, but it has since abandoned that effort, according to the Capitola, California, based company's marketing vice president, Jim Schaff.

Sweden calls off weeklong search for suspected submarine in Stockholm archipelago

STOCKHOLM (AP) — Swedish au-

thorities called off their weeklong search for a suspected submarine in the Stockholm archipelago Friday, saying the presumed intruder had probably escaped into the Baltic Sea.

Naval and amphibious forces were ordered back to base, while some ground forces remained in the search area, military officials said.

"We assess that the (vessel) that violated our waters has now left," Rear Adm. Anders Grenstad said.

Sweden's military launched its biggest anti-submarine operation since the twilight of the Soviet Union last Friday after receiving what it said were credible eyewitness reports of some type of underwater craft in the archipelago that extends from the capital, Stockholm, into the Baltic Sea.

Grenstad said it was probably not a large submarine, but a smaller underwater craft that could navigate shallow waters in the archipelago. He didn't rule out that there were more than one.

Whistle-blower sees little change in South Korea 10 years after exposing cloning fraud

CHUNCHEON, South Korea (AP) — The whistle-blower who exposed breakthrough cloning research as a devastating fake says South Korea is still dominated by the values that allowed science fraudster Hwang Woo-suk to become an almost untouchable national hero.

In an interview with The Associated Press after almost a decade of silence, Ryu Young-joon, one of Hwang's former researchers, said the cost of telling the truth still weighs on him but he doesn't regret his decision to out Hwang as a false prophet.

The revelations in 2005 rocked South Korea which had celebrated Hwang's research as a historic achievement, focused unfavorable international attention on the country and diminished the reputation of its scientific establishment. The memory of the scandal is still painful today and Hwang, though convicted of embezzlement and violating bioethical laws, discredited and relegated to the scientific backwater of pet cloning, retains a loyal following among sections of the public and media.

In the nearly 10 years since Hwang's accomplishments were found to be built on lies, Ryu feels little has changed in a society where cozy ties between government, business, the media and academics stifle criticism and foster blind nationalism. And junior researchers still face great pressure to produce the results their scientific mentors want and lack a formal channel for whistle-blowing.

South Korea, said Ryu, is still obsessed with joining the ranks of advanced countries.

CDC unveils Ebola fast-response teams

NEW YORK (AP) — The government's new federal Ebola response squads were getting their first test Thursday, dispatched to New York to help care for the city's first case, a doctor who had treated a patient with the disease in west Africa.

The squads — likened to public health SWAT teams — were set up to rush to any U.S. city where a new Ebola case might be identified.

Meanwhile, the government has formed a second set of teams to prepare hospitals in cities deemed most likely

to see a new Ebola case, should one turn up. Three of those teams have already been sent out.

Health officials this week first shared details about the two sets of health squads.

The teams are "ready to go — boom — if we have another case of Ebola," said Dr. Jordan Tappero, one of the leaders of CDC's Ebola response effort.

The government has been criticized for its handling of the first person diagnosed with Ebola in the U.S. Thomas Eric Duncan, a Libe-

rian, came down with Ebola symptoms last month, a few days after arriving in Dallas from West Africa.

He was admitted to a Dallas hospital in late September and died Oct. 8.

Duncan's illness and death created public fear as health officials had to track down and monitor scores of people he came in contact with. No one in the community has been infected, but two nurses who cared for him were. Since then, CDC officials have said they should have sent more people to Dallas.

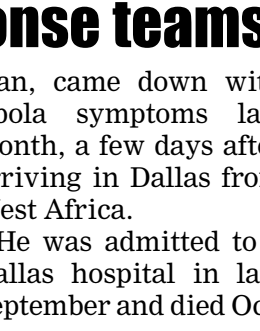
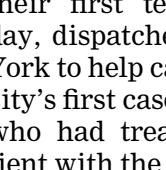

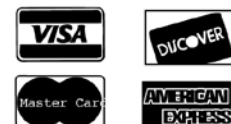

Romo-McCoy brings intrigue to Cowboys-Redskins

ARLINGTON (AP) — Tony Romo could barely walk the last time he saw the Washington Redskins. Colt McCoy barely came away with a win in his last visit to the home of the Dallas Cowboys.

There's a good chance they will be the opposing quarterbacks when the Cowboys (6-1) go for a seven-game winning streak for just the second time since 1993 when the Redskins (2-5) visit on Monday night.

It's not surprising that Romo

is leading Dallas because he's hit just about every benchmark along the road to recovery from a herniated disk in his back. He sustained the injury before leading a season-saving drive at Washington last December, and had to endure a painful plane ride home before surgery five days later that kept him out of a loss to Philadelphia in a playoffs-or-bust finale.

Nobody saw the McCoy thing coming. The former Texas quarterback was the third-stringer

behind Robert Griffin III and Kirk Cousins at the beginning of the season and hasn't started an NFL game since 2011.

With Griffin sidelined by a dislocated ankle and Cousins struggling with turnovers, McCoy came on to lead a comeback win over Tennessee last week. Now he's likely to start in his first trip to the \$1.2 billion home of the Cowboys since beating Nebraska for the 2009 Big 12 championship.

It's hard to imagine the

drama being any higher than when McCoy threw a pass out of bounds and off a railing with the clock approaching 0:00, and the referees put a second back on the clock. The Longhorns kicked a field goal for a 13-12 win.

Emotions will be high.

"I can't even sometimes take my mind there," said McCoy, the winningest quarterback in Texas history. "But I'm really just trying to approach this as a professional and know that

this is our next game, this is our next opponent. It's a game in our division that we really need to win."

The Cowboys had to win to keep their playoff hopes alive last year when Romo, injured back and all, threw a fourth-down touchdown pass to DeMarco Murray with 1:08 left to beat the Redskins. While he didn't get a chance to break what ended up being a three-year rut of 8-8 finishes without a trip to the playoffs.

Even so, Hosmer liked what he saw during a workout Thursday as many Royals got their first look at San Francisco's waterfront ballpark.

Starting in Game 3 of the World Series on Friday against the Giants, they might also discover what makes AT&T Park so unique.

Tim Hudson starts for San Francisco against

Jeremy Guthrie as the Royals play their first game in San Francisco since 2005, when they took two of three. Buddy Bell was their manager back then, Tony Grafano batted third and Jeremy Affeldt was in the bullpen.

The 35-year-old Affeldt now pitches for the Giants and came on in relief Wednesday night in a 7-2 loss. He said he figured the Royals could handle the new park.

"That's an athletic team over there. So I think they can make adjustments. I don't think we'll go in thinking that they're at a disadvantage because of not being at our ballpark," he said.

Seven players on the Royals' 25-man roster have played at AT&T Park with other teams. Of the most frequent visitors, Josh Willingham has hit .352 with five homers in 16 games and Omar Infante has batted .307 in 19 games, STATS said.

Among the pitchers, Guthrie did fine in two starts and Jason Frasor made two relief appearances.

Cain played one game at the stadium in 2010 when he was with Milwaukee. The AL Championship Series MVP practiced with coach Rusty Kuntz to gauge the bounces.

Lakers' Nash ruled out for season

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Steve Nash hoped for one more chance to show off his playmaking skills after fighting injuries and time for two miserable years with the Los Angeles Lakers.

Instead, Nash couldn't even make it to opening night in the 19th season of his remarkable career.

Nash will miss the entire season because of a back injury, the Lakers announced Thursday, putting the two-time NBA MVP point guard's career in doubt.

The Lakers and the 40-year-old Nash an-

nounced their joint decision less than a week before the start of the regular season. He played in only 15 games last season with nerve root irritation, but hoped for a comeback season after several months of rehabilitation.

The Canadian star played in just three pre-season games, feeling more back pain in the second outing. He then strained his back while carrying travel bags several days ago.

"Being on the court this season has been my top priority, and it is disap-

pointing to not be able to do that right now," Nash said. "I work very hard to stay healthy, and unfortunately my recent setback makes performing at full capacity difficult. I will continue to support my team during this period of rest, and will focus on my long-term health."

Nash will "focus on rest and rehabilitation," according to the team's news release. He is in the final season of his three-year contract with the Lakers, but the club's announcement made no mention of possible retirement.
