PD investigating unattended death

Big Spring police are investigating an unattended death at in the 1000 block of N. Main.

An autopsy has been ordered in the death of Big Spring resident Darren Zitterkopf, 49, whose body was discovered shortly after 4 a.m. Sunday.

Officers responded to 1002

N. Main No. 51 shortly after 4 a.m. Sunday in reference to a possible death. Upon arrival, they discovered Zitterkopf's body.

"It was learned that the resident had notified police," a Big Spring Police Department release stated. "The victim did not live in the residence but was an acquaintance of the resident."

No evidence of foul play or

obvious injuries were discovered, police said.

Because of the age of the victim and no obvious injuries, Justice of the Peace Bennie Green ordered an autopsy which will be performed today in Lubbock.

"This investigation is ongoing and no further information is available at this time," the BSPD release stated.

Stewart top carver at show & sale

Jimmy Stewart of Midland doesn't need a canvas or paintbrush to create a work of art. He just needs a good, sharp knife.

One of Stewart's pieces was named Best of Show at the Mustang Draw Wood Carver's Show which wrapped up a week-long exhibition Saturday afternoon at the Dora Robert Community Center.

"I've been doing this all my life," Stewart said. "I was 13 years old when I carved a relief. My dad and mom did a little painting, oil painting, so I guess I get my artistic influence from my parents."

A relief carving is when the artist carves figures or a scene into a flat piece of wood, Stewart explains. The resulting artwork is only slightly projected from the background.

Stewart's Best of Show piece is Human Life-like in the Round or basically a full-formed, 3-D carving of a woman in a posed position.

"The lady who posed for it is another carver. I didn't use her face. I used her for another carving, and I think my wife was getting a little bit jealous," Stewart said followed by a hearty laugh.

The wood doesn't inspire the artwork, Stewart said. In fact, it's the opposite.

"I get an idea of what I want to do, and I located the right piece of wood for it," Stewart explained. "That is usually my process."

As for the hours it takes to create a master-

Survey: Gas prices fall further

Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 3.9 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.78 a gallon Sunday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 gas outlets in Texas.

This compares with the national average that has fallen 3.9 cents per gallon in the last week to \$2.99 a gallon, according to gasoline price website GasBuddy.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices Sunday were 24.7 cents per gallon lower than the same day one year ago and are 38.1 cents per gallon lower than a month ago.

The national average has decreased 33.0 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 27.9 cents per gallon lower than this day one year ago.

"This past weekend we witnessed the national average declining under \$3 a gallon for the first time since Dec. 22, 2010 — an impressive feat that seems to have caught many motorists by surprise," said Patrick DeHaan, senior petroleum analyst with GasBuddy.

World Trade Center reopens for business

NEW YORK — Thirteen years after the 9/11 terrorist attack, the resurrected World Trade Center is again opening for business — marking an emotional milestone for both New Yorkers and the nation.

Publishing giant Conde Nast will start moving Mon-

day into One World Trade Center, a 104-story, \$3.9 billion skyscraper that dominates the Manhattan skyline. It is America's tallest building.

It's the centerpiece of the 16-acre site where the decimated twin towers once stood and where more than 2,700 people died on Sept. 11, 2001, buried under smoking mounds of fi-

ery debris.

"The New York City skyline is whole again, as One World Trade Center takes its place in Lower Manhattan," said Patrick Foye, executive director of the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey that owns both the building and the World Trade Center site.

He said One World Trade

Center "sets new standards of design, construction, prestige and sustainability; the opening of this iconic building is a major milestone in the transformation of Lower Manhattan into a thriving 24/7 neighborhood."

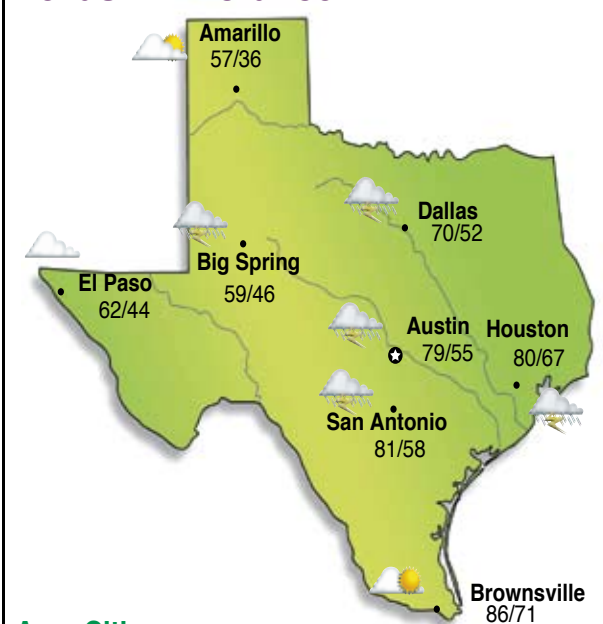

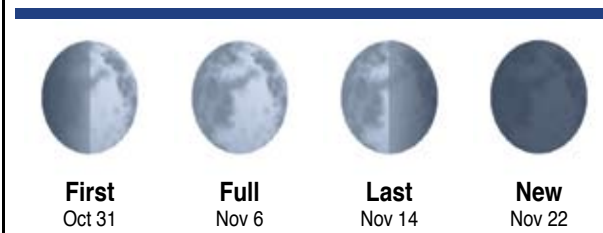

News in brief

On eve of election, candidates clash over Obama as focus shifts to turnout

WASHINGTON (AP) — On the eve of an election that will decide the Senate majority, it's time for closing arguments and an all-out effort to motivate people to vote.

Republicans have claimed new momentum in midterm campaigns that have centered on President Barack Obama, who is not on Tuesday's ballot. Under the weight of the unpopular president, Democrats are fighting to distance themselves from the White House and convince voters they deserve to maintain the Senate majority for the final two years of Obama's presidency. The GOP is sounding confident that it will take Senate control.

Obama has avoided the nation's most competitive contests in recent weeks, but encouraged Democrats to reject Republican cynicism during campaign stops in Connecticut and Pennsylvania for Democrats in governors' races. He was scheduled to spend Monday in private meetings with his economic team and Federal Reserve Chair Janet Yellen.

"Despite all the cynicism America is making progress," Obama said as he implored Democrats in Connecticut to vote. "Don't stay home. Don't let somebody else choose your future for you."

Meanwhile, GOP officials from Alaska to Georgia have seized on the president's low approval ratings, which have overshadowed an election season in which roughly 60 percent of eligible voters are expected to stay home.

Airwaves crowded in final weekend of campaign as candidates grab any last scrap of TV

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — Television airwaves were crammed with political ads over the weekend as candidates emptied their wallets for any last ad

time.

In Arkansas, for example, voters theoretically should have seen 34 political commercials a day since Friday, if advertising strategies worked as planned.

The pricey Senate race in Arkansas between Democratic Sen. Mark Pryor and Republican Rep. Tom Cotton, as well as two competitive House contests and one for a soon-to-be-open governor's office, filled the air between Little Rock's television programs.

Terminally ill Oregon woman who became 'death with dignity' advocate takes her lethal drugs

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Brittany Maynard stuck by her decision.

The terminally ill woman who revived a national debate about physician-assisted suicide ended her life Saturday by swallowing lethal drugs made available under Oregon's Death With Dignity Law. She would have been 30 on Nov. 19.

Maynard had been in the national spotlight for about a month since publicizing that she and her husband, Dan Diaz, moved to Portland from Northern California so that she could take advantage of the Oregon law. She told journalists she planned to die Nov. 1, shortly after her husband's birthday, but reserved the right to move the date forward or push it back.

Maynard ended her suffering from brain cancer right on schedule, after hinting at a possible delay in a video released last week.

US allowed no-fly area amid Ferguson unrest to keep press out; police said move was for safety

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. government allowed police in Ferguson, Missouri, to restrict more than 37 square miles of airspace for nearly

two weeks in August for safety reasons, but audio recordings show that local authorities instead wanted to keep news helicopters away during violent street protests.

On Aug. 12, amid demonstrations following the shooting death of 18-year-old Michael Brown, Federal Aviation Administration managers struggled to redefine an earlier flight ban so police helicopters and commercial flights at nearby Lambert-St. Louis International Airport could fly through the area — but not others.

"They finally admitted it really was to keep the media out," said one FAA manager about the St. Louis County Police Department in a series of recorded telephone conversations obtained by The Associated Press. "But they were a little concerned of anything else that could be going on."

At another point, a manager at the FAA's Kansas City center said police "did not care if you ran commercial traffic through this TFR (temporary flight restriction) all day long. They didn't want media in there."

Investigators: Spaceship's 'feathering' system deployed prematurely before craft broke apart

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Virgin Galactic's experimental spaceship broke apart in flight over California's Mojave Desert after a device to slow the craft's descent prematurely deployed, federal investigators said Sunday.

National Transportation Safety Board Acting Chairman Christopher Hart said that while no cause for Friday's crash of SpaceShipTwo has been determined, investigators found the "feathering" system — which rotates the tail to create drag — was activated before the craft reached the appropriate speed.

The system requires a two-step process to deploy. The co-pilot unlocked the system but Hart said the second step occurred "without being commanded."

"We have two different scenarios for gas prices from here on — if oil prices hold their current \$80 level, gas prices nationally may see their decline wind down, only dropping another few cents. But if oil prices can drop to \$78 or less, we could see the national average decline for several more weeks," DeHaan added. "It's hard to tell right now which way the market will go," he noted.

equipment in place, Conde Nast CEO Chuck Townsend planned to walk Monday into what Foye calls "the most secure office building in America."

Only about 170 of his company's 3,400 employees are moving in now, filling five floors of the tower, said Patricia Rockenwagner, a Conde Nast vice president and spokeswoman. About 3,000 more will arrive by early 2015.

The building is 60 percent leased, with another 80,000 square feet going to the advertising firm Kids Creative, the stadium operator Legends Hospitality, the BMB Group investment adviser, and Servcorp, a provider of executive offices.

The government's General Services Administration signed up

for 275,000 square feet, and the China Center, a trade and cultural facility, will cover 191,000 square feet.

From the northeast corner of the site, the tower overlooks the National September 11 Memorial & Museum built in the footprints of the twin towers. Its stated aim is to honor those who perished on that sunny September morning.

For years, the grisly pit where workers found mostly body parts was dubbed the "ground zero" of the aerial terror attack.

Now, the illuminated spire of One World Trade Center serves as a beacon to planes that fly over the city, seemingly at eye level with the high rise's open rooftop. The view stretches from Manhattan to the Statue of Liberty into New Jersey and Connecticut and all the way to the Atlantic Ocean.

At night, the incan-

descent steel-and-glass behemoth can be seen from vessels in New York Harbor approaching Manhattan.

An observation deck eventually will be open to the public.

The eight-year construction of the 1,776-foot high skyscraper came after years of political, financial and legal infighting that threatened to derail the project.

The bickering slowly died down as two other towers started going up on the southeast end of the site: the now completed 4 World Trade Center whose anchor tenant is the Port Authority, and 3 World Trade Center that's slowly rising.

The spirit of renewal did not quash memories of the horrific act

of terror, but the area has prospered in recent years beyond anyone's imagination. About 60,000 more residents now live there — three times more than before 9/11 — keeping streets, restaurants and shops alive even after Wall Street and other offices close for the day.

Still, it's a bittersweet victory, one achieved with the past in mind as the architects created One World Trade Cen-

ter.

T.J. Gottesdiener of the Skidmore, Owings & Merrill firm that produced the final design told The Associated Press that the high-rise was built with steel-reinforced concrete that makes it as terror attack-proof as possible.

He said the firm went beyond the city's existing building codes to achieve that.

"We did it, we finally did it," he said.

Lady Steers to face Pampa in bi-district round

The Big Spring High School Lady Steers finally have a name to center their playoff attention on.

The Pampa Harvesters probably aren't too thrilled to hear the news.

Pampa suffered a loss to Dalhart on Saturday afternoon in a District 1-4A "play-in" game and falls into a first-round matchup with Big Spring in the first round of the Class 4A state volleyball playoffs.

Pampa, by virtue of its loss to Dalhart, finished the regular season as the No. 3 seed in the District -4A race.

Big Spring and Pampa are scheduled to kick off postseason action on Tuesday. The two teams will face off beginning at 7:30 p.m. at Wayland Baptist University in Plainview.

The Lady Steers, who finished the regular season at 19-19, head into the matchup as the district runner-up from District 2-4A.

The Lady Steers are led

into the contest by a talented group of seniors, including Erin Pollard, Leksey Yarbar and Julianna Rodriguez.

A returning all-star selection, Pollard has been a one-person wrecking crew for the Lady Steers this fall. She finished the regular season as the team's leader in kills with 409 and blocks with 99. She also ranks third in aces (40) and digs (191).

Yarbar has pounded out 215 kills this season, while also contributing 40 blocks and 29 aces.

Rodriguez, a three-sport standout at BSHS, leads the team in digs with 386. She has also registered 140 kills, a team-high 79 aces and 264 assists.

Big Spring is also keyed by the play of Katie Wash and setter Emilie Smith. Wash has 253 digs and 127 assists this fall, while Smith has anchored a solid offense by serving up a team-best 554 assists and 50 service aces.

In other games involving District 3-4A teams, district champion Levelland will face

off with Borger, the No. 4 seed from District 1-4A, beginning at 6:30 p.m. at Bushland High School in Amarillo.

Sweetwater, the District 2-4A third-place finisher, will begin its postseason run with a first-round matchup against Dalhart tomorrow at 7 p.m. at Monterey High School in Lubbock.

Snyder will face off with No. 1-ranked Bushland tonight, starting at 7 p.m., at Wayland Baptist. Snyder was the No. 4 seed in the District 2-4A race.

Cards top sloppy Cowboys

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Carson Palmer gave the Dallas Cowboys just the gift they needed early in a game without Tony Romo — throwing an interception that was returned for a touchdown.

Palmer didn't make any other big mistakes, and Romo backup Brandon Weeden had a hard time avoiding the miscues that landed him in Dallas in the first place.

Palmer stayed perfect as Arizona's starter this season, throwing three touchdown passes, while Weeden couldn't get the Cowboys into the end zone until the game was out of reach in the Cardinals' 28-17 victory Sunday.

The Cardinals (7-1) rallied from a 10-0 deficit for their fourth straight win, including back-to-back victories over the top two teams in the NFC East. This is the latest they've had sole possession of the best record in the NFC since 1974.

"We are a scrappy group," said Palmer, 5-0 this season after missing two games because of a shoulder injury. "We have a great fight and mindset about us. Nothing is too big to overcome."

Romo was out with his third back injury in 18 months, and Weeden threw two interceptions and had several other misfires as the Cowboys (6-3) dropped their second straight. He finished 18 of 33 for 183 yards with a meaningless late touchdown to Dez Bryant.

"I was inconsistent," said Weeden, who was dumped by Cleveland just two years after getting drafted in the first round in 2012 and now has 25 touchdown passes and 28 interceptions in his career. "One thing I keep coming back to is the turnovers. Those are on me."

Things to consider after the Cardinals won a regular-season game in Dallas for the first time since 1989 (14 consecutive losses, not counting a playoff victory in the 1998 season).

victory Sunday.

McCoy didn't see the fourth-and-1 failure as a pivotal moment.

"There's a lot of football after that," McCoy said. "That's one play. ... The easiest way to say it is in all phases, we got beat."

Here are things to know in the wake of a rout that sends the two teams in opposite directions:

The Dolphins (5-3) earned their third consecutive victory as they began a stretch of four games in a row against playoff contenders. Receiver Mike Wallace said he'd prefer the rest of the NFL not take note of Miami's latest win.

"Hopefully not, so we can do the same thing next week," Wallace said. "Hopefully, nobody ever catches on. Hopefully, people just keep taking us easy, so we come away with wins like this."

The Chargers (5-4) lost their third game in a row.

"We'll get this back on track, I promise you," McCoy said. "No doubt in my mind."

"We'll find out what we're made of," Rivers said.

The win was Miami's most-lopsided victory since 1995, when it beat the New

This deal occurred in the Netherlands-Italy match at the 1966 world team championship.

With Benito Garozzo North and Pietro Forquet South for Italy, the bidding went as shown. The Italians were playing the Neapolitan Club system, and, in accordance with it, Garozzo opened one club, indicating 17 or more points. The two-club response by Forquet was artificial

and indicated two aces and a king.

From then on, the bidding was natural. Garozzo showed his diamonds, and Forquet jumped to three spades, indicating a long, strong spade suit. Garozzo raised to four, and Forquet passed, fearing North's clubs might be of poor quality since North had failed to cuebid the suit. West led his singleton diamond, and Forquet could take no more than 11 tricks to score a seemingly normal 650 points.

At the second table, with a Dutch pair North-South, the bidding was less scientific but more successful:

West North East South
Pass 1♦ Pass 1♠
Pass 2 NT Pass 3♣
Pass 3 NT Pass 6♣

West led the jack of hearts, and declarer had no trouble taking all 13 tricks. Three clubs was probably meant to inhibit West from leading that suit — though in the actual deal, West would hardly have led a club even if the suit had not been bid.

As seen from what happened at the first table, a diamond lead would have stopped the slam, since it would have cut declarer off from dummy's red-suit tricks before all the opposing trumps could be drawn. As it was, with the actual lead Holland gained 810 points on the deal.

Gordon fights with Keselowski in Texas melee

PORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Brad Keselowski is doing everything he can for a chance at another NASCAR championship. No matter how angry he makes other drivers.

Jeff Gordon was fighting mad at Texas, leading to a post-race confrontation with Keselowski and a big melee. Gordon's shot at a huge play-off victory got wiped out after hard contact during extra laps Sunday.

"It's his disregard for what's going on out there," said Gordon, the four-time champion

who in an earlier live postrace television interview used an expletive in referring to Keselowski. "He made an over-aggressive move. Those are moves you find if you've got a slamming, banging race. He cut my left rear tire. That was it for me. It's a real shame."

After spinning out, losing a lap in the pits and finishing 29th, Gordon became the second competitor in four races during the Chase for the Sprint Cup championship to confront 2012 champ Keselowski after the checkered flag.

Fireworks exploded in the sky, and on pit road, while Gordon teammate Jimmie Johnson celebrated his third consecutive victory in the Texas fall race.

Gordon was leading on a restart on Lap 335, one more than the race's scheduled length, when he took the outside line. When the No. 24 car drifted up a bit, Keselowski pushed through the gap before the contact.

"By the time it closed up, I was committed, and I stayed in it. That almost won me the

race," said an unapologetic Keselowski, who finished third. "I'm doing everything I can to win this championship, racing at 100 percent. That's something I'm not going to be ashamed for."

At Charlotte Motor Speedway last month, it was Matt Kenseth who lost his cool and attacked Keselowski.

Gordon stopped his car right by Keselowski after the Texas race, and there were plenty of punches thrown. NASCAR officials were in the middle of crew members and others

around Keselowski's No. 2 car.

It seemed the only contact among drivers was when Kevin Harvick shoved Keselowski into the fracas, and Gordon briefly appeared to grab hold of Keselowski's firesuit.

"I just turned him around and told him to go fight his own fight," Harvick said.

Keselowski's face was puffy, and he took a couple quick drinks of water to wash the blood from his mouth. Gordon was left with a cut on his lip.

York Jets 52-14. It was the worst loss for the Chargers since 1996, when they were beaten 45-7 by New England.
San Diego was shut out for the first time since 1999, while Miami earned its first shutout since 2006.

Tannehill had a career-high passer rating of 125.6 and called it a day after three quarters. He went 24 for 34 for 288 yards with three touchdowns and no turnovers, and ran for 47 yards.

"Obviously, I've become more comfortable in the offense," Tannehill said. "I think the receivers are getting more comfortable in the different things that we're running, and we're getting better at it."

While Tannehill flourished, Miami's front four dominated the Chargers' line, harriving Rivers into a lost fumble and three interceptions, two to Brent Grimes. Rivers passed for only 138 yards.
