Late Joe Pickle honored as fine, community-minded man

Friends and family described Joe Pickle, former editor of the Big Spring Herald, as a kind man who loved Big Spring and left a lasting legacy in the community during a plaque dedication ceremony held Saturday at the Heritage Museum.

"He came from a strong, loving family, and he passed it on not only to us, his family, but to the community," said Gary Pickle, the son of Joe Pickle, after thanking the community for honoring and remembering his father.

For four decades, Pickle served the community as a journalist, retiring as the paper's editor in 1975.

"I don't think I am being dramatic in the least in saying the Herald would not be where it is today without Joe Pickle and the efforts of his staff," said Steve Reagan, Herald Staff reporter. "They made the Herald what it is. I didn't get the pleasure of meeting Joe until after he left the paper but over the years he would continue to be an editor of sorts by giving me a call now and then and by letting me know what I did right and what I hopefully, rarely did wrong. All can say of my

want to meet and this honor is long deserved."

Long-time colleague Marj Carpenter, a former Herald staff reporter during Pickle's tenure, said he was the best boss she ever had.

"Somebody asked me a few years back if I would name three men in my life that I greatly admired ... one of them I said was Joe Pickle," Carpenter said. "I remember the first time I saw him, and I remember the last time I saw him."

She first met Pickle when she interviewed for a reporter's staff back in the early 1970s.

St. Mary's parish gearing up for St. Andrew's Day

At the first signs of fall, the members of St. Mary's Episcopal Church in Big Spring begin many hours of hard work that will culminate in their 13th Annual St. Andrews Day Service/Scottish Music Festival and Scottish Reception.
This popular and unique Big Spring tradition will be held this year at 7 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 16, at St. Mary's. The event features stirring music for pipes and drums;

majestic and beautiful music for brass and organ; choral anthems, hymns and Scottish folk songs; and the presentation of flags accompanied by patriotic songs from the U.S., England and Scotland.
In kitchens around Big Spring, members of St. Mary's are busy making preparations for the gala reception that features traditional Scottish fare. Among the foods being served at the reception coordinated by Cynthia Marshall are ham,

brisket, Scotch eggs, scones, banoffee pies, lemon curd tarts, Scottish shortbread, sausage rolls, macaroons, assorted tea sandwiches, mincemeat pies and mulled wine and cider.
Special guest musicians for the event are E.J. Jones of Asheville, N.C., Doug Frobese of Dallas, Texas and Richard Kean of Houston, Texas - Great Highland Bagpipes; and Stephen Cameron of Georgetown, Texas - Scottish snare drums. Dr. Keith Graumann of the Big Spring

Symphony will serve as choral director, and Darryl Knapp of Midland will serve as organist.
The prelude to the service will consist of four pieces for brass instruments from the British Isles. Brass players for the event will be Michael Santorelli and Eric Baker, trumpet; Samuel Hale, French Horn; and Rocky Harris, trombone. The Rev. Canon Mike Ehmer of Lubbock will officiate at service.
An addition to the musical section of the Festival

this year will be a selection of traditional Scottish Airs played by E.J. Jones on the Scottish Smallpipes, and two arrangements of traditional Scottish folk songs. The Men of the choir will sing "Loch Lomond," and the women will sing "The Skye Boat Song."
There is no admission charge for the St. Andrew's Day Festival and Reception but donations will be accepted. St. Mary's is located at 10th and Goliad in Big Spring.

Carpenter said she wanted to make the move from her job at the newspaper in Andrews to Big Spring because the town was up and coming.
"I heard there was an opening over here and that Big Spring was moving and Web Base was opening," she said. "Joe was interviewing me and he said 'I have to tell you I made room for a reporter because I didn't like the way this young guy was writing.' I thought that didn't sound very good if he fires people if he doesn't like the way they write."
"He said, 'Well, he was a young kid and he'd go to city council and this one very vocal member of the council would follow him out and tell him what he said and nearly write the story for him and he would run it,'" Carpenter recalled. "I thought that sounds a little scary, this poor kid, he fired him because he didn't like what he wrote. He said, 'I felt sorry for him so I put him to selling ads and he's good at that and he is doing fine.' I thought he is a caring man. I decided right then I liked Joe Pickle."
Carpenter added Pickle wanted to hire someone who could grow to love the town. And she did.
"The last time I saw him was the last day he was here when he was leaving (to live in Austin)," she said. "We went by Big John's. I was going to buy him lunch. When I ordered mine I said 'no pickles.' 'No Pickles,' he said 'I've never gotten mad at you but once before but that gets me mad.'"
Carpenter describe Pickle as a kind man without a "mean bone in his body," but a person who could be tough when needed.
"Once, one of the preachers brought in a story to me that said they were going to have a healing service out at the Dora Roberts Community Center," she recalled. "It said they were going to heal at least three sinners of all their ills and if there was anybody ill, they could come out there and they could be completely healed no matter what they had. He brought me that story and he said he didn't want it changed. I said 'I can't run it. I can rewrite it and say you are going to have a meeting out there and you invite people to come but I can't run that you are going to heal people because we run facts in the paper. I don't know if you are going to heal someone. Now if you do it. I will run a story afterwards.'"
"He said 'Where is your editor?' He went into see Joe and shut the door. He came out in a huff and left. Joe came out laughing. I asked 'What did you tell him?' He said, 'He could buy an ad. He could run anything he wanted to in an ad but we run facts in the newspaper section.'"
Pickle's outreach in the community went far beyond the years as a community journalist. He helped found the YMCA, Friends of the Library, Howard College and the First Baptist Trust. He, at one time, served as the president of the Big Spring Area Chamber of Commerce and was named Chamber Man of the Year in 1974. He was very involved with the creation of the Colorado River Municipal Water District and served on the board as the secretary-treasurer for 46 years.
"Even though we hit the years where they closed the base and all that mess and all that tragedy, he never lost his spirit about Big Spring," Carpenter said. "One of the last things he told me, 'It will come back. I won't be here and you may not be here but it will come back.' It's starting to come back."

Big Spring Mayor Larry McLellan read a proclamation naming Saturday, Nov. 8, 2014, as Joe Duke Pickle Day in Big Spring. The plaque dedicated to Joe Pickle will be on permanent display in the downstairs lobby of the Heritage Museum.

Hundreds of kids harmed by detergent 'pods:' Study

CHICAGO (AP) — Accidental poisonings from squishy laundry detergent packets sometimes mistaken for toys or candy landed more than 700 U.S. children in the hospital in just two years, researchers report. Coma and seizures were among the most serious complications.

The cases stem from the more than 17,000 poison center calls about the products received in the past two years. The calls involved children younger than 6 and most weren't seriously harmed. But one child died last year and the potential risks highlight a need for even safer packaging, the researchers said.

Some manufacturers already have revised packaging and labels in efforts to make the detergent packets or "pods" safer for children. The study found calls dipped slightly after some of those changes were made.

The products contain concentrated liquid laundry soap and became widely available in the U.S. two years ago. Some are multicolored and may look enticing to young children. Poisoning or injuries including mouth, throat and eye burns can occur when kids burst the capsules or put them in their mouths.
In the study, 144 had eye injuries, 30 went into comas and 12 had seizures.

Exposure to household cleaning products is among the top reasons for calls to poison centers involving young children. In 2012, detergent packet calls accounted for a fraction — about 6 percent — of the 111,000 calls involving young children and cleaning products, according to the American Association of Poison Control Centers. Many calls involve regular laundry detergent, which can cause mild stomach upsets, but poison center experts say the new concentrated laundry packets seem to cause more severe problems.

Jessica Morin of Houston says her 9-month-old daughter, Marlow, was sickened earlier this year when Jessica's grandmother mistook a detergent pod for a teething toy and put it in the baby's mouth.

"I called poison control and they said to take her to the ER immediately," Morin said. Marlow was repeatedly vomiting and under-

went tests, but doctors at Texas Children's Hospital found no serious damage and she didn't need to stay overnight.

"We were very lucky," Morin said. "We don't have those pods in our house anymore."

The researchers examined 2012-13 data from the poison control centers group.

Overall, there were 17,230 poison center calls about young kids getting into the packets.

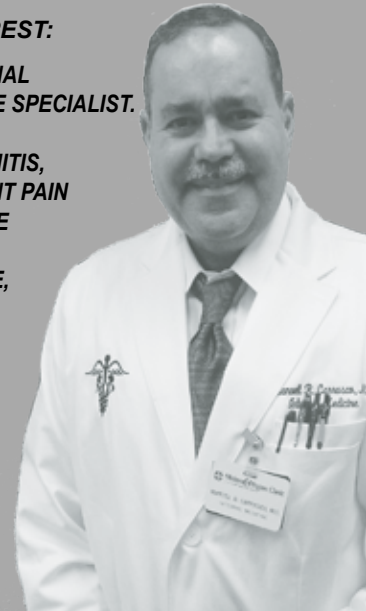

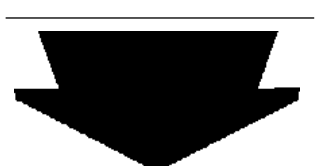

This deal occurred during the 1980 World Team Olympiad in the match between Pakistan and the United States. At the first table, the U.S. North settled in six notrump after learning — through Key-Card Blackwood — that the opponents held either an ace or the king of spades. He made the slam with an

overtrick, for a score of 1,470 points, after East led a spade.
The outcome seemed relatively normal, but at the second table — with a Pakistani pair now holding the North-South cards — there were fireworks galore:
East South West North
Pass 1♠ Pass 2NT
Pass 4♣ Pass 4NT
Pass 5♦ Pass 6♣
Dble Pass Pass Redble
East's double of six spades had a conventional meaning. Although it did not call for West to lead a specific suit, the double in effect said that if West led the right suit, East could defeat the contract.
Usually, a double of a slam by a defender not on lead indicates a void — and East's double here was based on his void in hearts.
However, it was difficult for the American West to find the lead necessary to stop the slam. The bidding had not revealed that North-South together held eight very good hearts and never mentioned the suit. So West led a diamond, and South made the contract with an overtrick for a score of 2,420 points. Had West led a heart and collected 400 points, he would have been 2,820 points better off!

THIS DATE IN HISTORY

Today is Monday, Nov. 10, the 314th day of 2014. There are 51 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On Nov. 10, 1944, during World War II, the ammunition ship USS Mount Hood (AE-11) exploded while moored at the Manus Naval Base in the Admiralty Islands in the South Pacific; the blast annihilated the Mount Hood and damaged nearby vessels, leaving 45 confirmed dead and 327 missing and presumed dead.

On this date: In 1775, the U.S. Marines were organized under authority of the Continental Congress. In 1871, journalist-explorer Henry M. Stanley found Scottish missionary David Livingstone, who had not been heard from for years, near Lake Tanganyika in central Africa. In 1919, the American Legion opened its first national convention in Minneapolis. In 1928, Japanese Emperor Hirohito (hee-roh-hee-toh) was formally enthroned, almost two years after his ascension. In 1938, Kate Smith first sang Irving Berlin's "God Bless America" on her CBS radio program. Turkish statesman Mustafa Kemal Ataturk died in Istanbul at age 57. In 1942, Winston Churchill delivered a speech in London in which he said, "I have not become the King's First Minister to preside over the liquidation of the British Empire."

Lesser came off the bench to give Big Spring its first lead since a 2-1 early in the first game by serving off a pair of points.

The Lady Steers closed out Game 2 with a dominating effort. Big Spring scored 10 of the final 17 points in the game and cruised into Game 2 with a 2-0 lead.

Big Spring continued to force the issue in the final frame. The Lady Steers rallied from a 1-0 deficit early to score five straight points and grab a 5-1 cushion.

The Prowlers managed to fight back to within 12-9 midway through the frame before Pollard and Yarbar

began picking the FSBS defense apart with hard kills from the center of the court.

Rodriguez, Yarbar, Ward and Lesser also starred offensively for Big Spring. Rodriguez finished with nine kills, four aces and 11 digs. Yarbar chalked up six kills, an ace and a team-high three blocks.

Ward recorded a game-high 12 digs, while Lesser contributed nine digs, a kill and an ace.

Smith also turned in a stellar effort for the Lady Steers, closing out the game with 34 assists, a kill, six digs and a block. She also served up an ace.

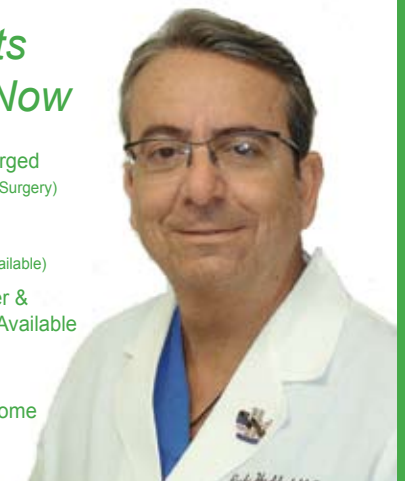
