Craddick files texting ban bill for third time

Craddick filed House Bill 80 on Monday, an act that would make reading, typing or sending a text while driving a misdemeanor, whether it is a normal text message, an email, instant message or

Craddick for a subsequent offense will increase to between \$100 and \$200.

The session is still two months away but lawmakers are making clear their priorities in the first day of bill filing.

So far, the list of freshly filed bills includes some that are sure to be controversial, including issuing driver's permits to undocumented immigrants, increasing the

state's minimum wage and legalizing same-sex marriage. Others include ending certain transportation diversions and changing aspects of the franchise tax.

Forty-four other states already have a ban on texting while driving. In Texas, state law bans texting for drivers under 18 and 38 cities have local regulations to ban texting while driving for all drivers, which Craddick said creates a confusing patchwork of lo-

cal ordinances. "The Texas Legislature has a responsibility to give our law enforcement officers the tools they need to make our

roadways safer," he said. The draft Craddick filed



PD investigates attempted child enticement report

No formal charges have been made after a report of an attempted kidnapping of a child Saturday, but the investigation continues, according to Big Spring Po-Police were dispatched to

the Roy Anderson Sports Complex on Saturday, Nov. 8, just before noon after receiving a report in regards to a suspicious incident, said Sgt. Tony Everett, BSPD public information "Officers learned that a

child was in the parking lot when an older white, male told the child to come to him and that he had something

for the child," Everett said. "The child then ran off, locked himself in his own vehicle and later contacted his mother. At the time of this, the older white male was within his own vehicle described as a white Chevrolet Silverado with a black grill guard." According to Everett, the

child's mother contacted police once she learned of the incident, went to the parking lot and was able to record the license plate of the suspect's vehicle as it was driven off. The license plate given to the police, Everett added, is registered to an elderly female who resides in Big Spring.

"At this point within the

investigation, officers do not have the required information to formally charge anyone with a criminal offense," Everett said. "The charge, enticing a child, requires an element to the offense to prove the individual intended to interfere with the custodial rights of the guardian. At this time we do not know what the intent of the older white/male

The Criminal Investigations Division is following up on this incident.

This is an ongoing investigation and the Big Spring Police Department has no further information available at this time, Everett said.

for the 84th Legislature also includes a proposed amendment that will require driver's license applicants to have knowledge of the effects of using a cellphone or other actions that distract drivers. Texas Department of Trans-

portation reported that in 2013, nearly one in five crashes in Texas involved driver distraction, according to a release from Craddick. Of the 95,267 crashes in Texas that involved distracted driving, there were 19,994 serious injuries and 507 deaths. "Writing a text, updating Fa-

cebook or checking your email messages is not worth injuring yourself or someone else," Craddick R-Midland, former House Speaker, said. Another notable proposal is

that the texting ban would not apply if the vehicle is stopped and outside a lane of travel. It also may not apply if the driver is reading a text related to an emergency. Though texting would be

banned, the bill explicitly states that making a phone call would be allowed if voice-operated technology, push-to-talk or hands-free devices are used. The bill is named the Alex

Brown Memorial Act, after a Texas teenager who lost her life in a vehicle accident while driving to school. Her parents, Jeanne and Johnny Mac Brown, founded the Remembering Alex Brown foundation to raise awareness and support a statewide law. Craddick introduced similar

bills in 2011 and 2013 but failed to get them passed. In 2011, Gov. Rick Perry vetoed the bill; in 2013, the bill died in the Senate Committee on Transporta-Some 350 bills have already

Here are some noteable ones: · A team of Democrats has filed legislation to repeal Texas' ban on same-sex marriage. One lawmaker, state Rep. Garnet Coleman, D-Houston, filed a constitutional amendment to overturn the ban, House Joint Resolution 34, but acknowledged a court ruling is more likely to bring same-sex marriage to Texas than legislation. But he said bills can give advocates something to organize around. • State Reps. Dan Flynn, R-

Canton, and James White, R-Woodville, filed legislation, House Bill 106 and House Bill 164, respectively, that would allow Texans to openly carry handheld guns. • Senate Joint Resolution 12 and Senate Bill 139, filed by



they prefer its more visceral sound, complete with occasional scratches and surface noise. Others say vinyl's popularity stems from the simple, defiant fact that it's not digital. "I think the connection to

the music is further enhanced when the listener actually has to physically get up, touch this album, place it on a turntable and drop the needle on the vinyl," says Allen Clapp, lead singer of the Orange Peels rock band and owner of Sunnyvale's Mystery Lawn Music studios and record label. "It's an intentional act, and it's a much more engaging process than launching a music streaming program on your computer."

"I think society and culture are seeking experiences that bring us back to the material world", says Oakland Museum of California's René de Guzman. "You can see this in the interest in the handmade crafts, the artisanal restaurants, foodie culture. ... Records are an indicator of this sort of (compensation) that we are currently experiencing to the digital age. That's why I think records are having a resurgence."

These days, vinyl records represent just 2 percent of overall album sales, says Billboard magazine. Yet, the sales have been on the upswing for six straight years, something even digital music can't claim. Nielsen SoundScan reports that digital album sales in 2013, after years of growth, remain unchanged from 2012 at roughly 118 million downloads. And individual digital song sales last year dropped 6 percent, to 1.26 billion downloads, marking the first decline since the iTunes Store opened in 2003.

Meanwhile, Amazon.com reports that its vinyl sales have rocketed some 745 percent since 2008. Observers think the vinyl resurgence is fueled by hipster newcomers and nostalgic fans returning to the fold.

"A lot of people who got out of vinyl in the late '90s, early 2000s are coming back," Stevenson says. "I hear all the time how people regret selling all the stuff they had (on vinyl) and now they are trying to replace it." Vinyl's biggest supporters tend

to view the format almost as a lifestyle choice, rather than just a music preference.

"As I often tell my wife, who does not completely understand my obsession, my vinyl collection is power— it is a super power," says Bay Area collector David Katznelson, who now runs the vinyl-only reissue label Sutro Park. "The collection is made up of a lot of genres and genres within genres. It reflects what I am into now and all the phases I have gone through."

Alec Palao is another avid vinyl fan, who counts some 7,000 albums and 10,000 45s in his collection. Even after all these years, he says there's still nothing like listening to a good song on vinyl.

"My way of giving myself an adrenaline jolt, akin to your double espresso shot at Starbucks, is to put a killer '60s soul or garage 45 on the turntable and crank it to the max," says the El Cerrito music historian. "Sorry, but no CD or MP3 will ever match that thrill."

I can relate to most of those statements since I also have a passion for records. I grew up on them. I went to sleep every night of my life through my teen years listening to music piped into my bedroom through a speaker I had mounted in the ceiling of my Brownfield bedroom. I would take a stack of 10 or 12 albums, place them on the spindle of our stereo in the living room, head to bed and drift off with the harmonies of some gospel quartet soaking my brain. Leah was never able to sleep with my music playing so I am thankful for the invention of inexpensive earbuds. Quartet singing is essentially a thing of the past and my music appreciation has greatly expanded, but music still soothes my soul and carries me away. Especially when it is drifting from two 12" speakers inside a mahogany cabinet. If any of you have one you don't want anymore, I'll gladly take it off your hands. No one would treat it better than this nostalgic

record lover. You may not agree with anything I've said, but I column as I see 'em.

UC silent when prof trashes free speech

may be a thief, but you're a terrorist," quoth University of California, Santa Barbara feminist studies professor Mireille Miller-Young. It

was March 4. The professor had just grabbed an antiabortion poster from the Survivors of the Abortion Holocaust at the campus free speech area. The professor didn't like a poster of an aborted fetus; I don't blame her. But she had no

right to take the poster. Thrin Short, 16, and her sister Joan, 21, pursued the professor and her student entourage. They also recorded what ensued. Miller-Young got physical. The Shorts called the police. In August, Miller-Young apologized and pleaded no contest to theft and battery charges. A judge sentenced her to three years of probation, 108 hours of community service and 10 hours of anger management counseling.

What has the university done about this professor's illegal and outrageous attempt to silence dissent? Was there even an investigation? "It's a personnel matter that we're handling internally," spokesman George Foulsham answered.

Katie Short, mother of Joan

and Thrin and now their attorney, filed a lawsuit against UC and the professor last week. How much do the plaintiffs want? Short, who is a lawyer with the Life Legal Defense Foundation, would not say. But she did tell me the suit is more about the university than it is about one professor.

As far as Short knows, UCSB did not punish Miller-Young. The lawsuit contends that the university never contacted the plaintiffs, which would suggest there was no investigation. Nor did the university apologize. Michael D. Young, vice chancellor for student affairs, sent an email to students in March to remind them, "The price we pay to speak our own minds is allowing others to speak theirs, regardless of how oppositional their views are to our own." Young also wrote that UCSB was being tested by "outsiders coming into our midst to provoke us, to taunt us and attempt to turn us against one another."

That is, the university would not comment on the professor after she was found guilty, but early on it did offer up an opinion on Miller-Young's victims. Short tells me she wants the

university "to take some responsibility" for what happened. The university should send a

clear message that the professor's behavior was not only illegal but also anti-intellectual. George Washington University

With eye on future climate treaty, US and China strike emissions deal, prod others to act

BEIJING (AP) — A groundbreaking agreement struck by the United States and China is putting the world's two worst polluters on a faster track to curbing the heat-trapping gases blamed for global warming. With the clock ticking on a worldwide climate treaty, the two countries are seeking to put their troubled history as environmental adversaries behind them in hopes that other nations will be spurred to take equally aggressive action.

The U.S., a chief proponent of the prospective treaty, is setting an ambitious new goal to stop pumping as much carbon dioxide into the air. China, whose appetite for cheap energy has grown along with its burgeoning economy, agreed for the first time to a self-imposed deadline for when its emissions will top out.

However, it wasn't clear how either the U.S. or China would meet their goals, nor whether China's growing emissions until 2030 would negate any reductions in the U.S.

The dual announcements from President Barack Obama and Chinese President Xi Jinping, unveiled Wednesday in Beijing, came as a shock to environmentalists who had pined for such action but suspected China's reluctance and Obama's weakened political standing might interfere. In Washington, Republicans were equally taken aback, accusing Obama of dumping an unrealistic obligation on the next president.

In fact, the deal had been hashed out behind the scenes for months. U.S. officials said U.S. Secretary of State John Kerry floated the idea during a visit to China in February, and Obama followed up by writing Xi in the spring to suggest that the world's two largest economies join forces.

Obama, Xi unveil array of agreements as they seek to downplay persistent tensions

BEIJING (AP) — Following an intense two days of talks, President Barack Obama and Chinese President Xi Jinping unveiled an array of agreements on climate change, military cooperation and trade as they sought to overcome persistent tensions between the world's two largest economies.

Areas of discord still bubbled to the surface during their rare joint press conference in the heart of the Chinese capital. Obama gently pressed Xi on human rights and rejected rumors that the U.S. is fueling pro-democracy protests in Hong Kong, while the Chinese president repeatedly reminded his American guest that his nation wants to be seen as an equal to the United States.

As he closed his first visit to China in six years, Obama said he and Xi have reached a "common understanding on how the relationship between our two countries should move forward."

"Where we have disagreements, we will be candid about our intentions, and we will work to narrow those differences where possible," Obama said shortly before departing for Myanmar, his second stop on a three-country trip through the Asia-Pacific region.

Both Obama and Xi heralded a joint commitment to cut greenhouse gases, an agreement that came about after months of secret talks between officials from both countries. The pact is meant to signal to other heavy-polluting nations that the U.S. and China are in sync on the need to tackle climate change in the lead-up to a high-stakes summit in Paris next year.

Reports of drones flying near manned planes and airports are up dramatically

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government is getting near-daily reports — and sometimes two or

three a day — of drones flying near airplanes and helicopters or close to airports without permission, federal and industry officials tell The Associated Press. It's a sharp increase from just two years ago when such reports were still unusual.

Many of the reports are filed with the Federal Aviation Administration by airline pilots. But other pilots, airport officials and local authorities often file reports as well, said the officials, who agreed to discuss the matter only on the condition that they not be named because they weren't authorized to speak publicly. Michael Toscano, president of a drone industry trade group, said FAA officials also have verified the increase to him.

While many of the reports are unconfirmed, raising the possibility that pilots may have mistaken a bird or another plane in the distance for a drone, the officials said other reports appear to be credible

The FAA tightly restricts the use of drones, which could cause a crash if one collided with a plane or was sucked into an engine. Small drones usually aren't visible on radar to air traffic controllers, particularly if they're made of plastic or other composites

Ebola deaths in capital

BAMAKO, Mali (AP) — Malian authorities on Wednesday reported two new deaths from Ebola that are not believed to be linked to the only other known case in the nation, an alarming setback as Mali tries to limit the fallout from the epidemic ravaging other countries in the region.

The announcement came just a day after Malian health authorities said there had been no other reported cases — let alone deaths — after a 2-year-old girl who had traveled to Mali from Guinea successible to the virus in lete October.

Communications Minister Mahamadou Camara

said Wednesday that a nurse working at a clinic in the capital of Bamako died Tuesday, and tests later showed she had Ebola. A patient she had treated who died on Monday was later confirmed to have had Ebola.

It was not immediately clear why health workers at Clinique Pasteur in Bamako did not suspect the patient — a Guinean national — had Ebola. Nearly 5,000 people have died this year in West Africa from the virus, which first erupted in Guinea, which borders Mali.

European Space Agency says landing craft separates from probe for descent to comet 67P

DARMSTADT, Germany (AP) — The European Space Agency's unmanned Rosetta probe successfully released a lander toward the surface of comet 67P/Churyumov-Gerasimenko on Wednesday, putting it on its final seven-hour journey to a historic rendezvous with the fast-moving lump of dust and ice.

The audacious landing attempt is the climax of a decade-long mission to study the 4-kilometer (2.5-mile) wide comet. It is also the end of a 6.4 billion-kilometer (4 billion-mile) journey on which Rosetta carried its sidekick lander Philae piggyback.

"It's on its own now," said Stephan Ulamec, Philae Lander Manager at the DLR German Aerospace

Center. "We'll need some luck not to land on a boulder or a steep slope."

If successful, it will

be the first time that a spacecraft has landed on a comet. Confirmation of a landing should reach Earth by about 1603 GMT (11:03 a.m. EST).

ESA announced early Wednesday that the 100-kilogram (220-pound) lander's active descent system, which uses thrust to prevent the craft from bouncing off the comet's surface, could not be activated. Instead, the agency is relying on ice screws and a harpoon system to secure the lander.

Workers on Ebola front say need for help urgent

WASHINGTON (AP)

— Health workers on the front line of the Ebola crisis say the need for urgent help isn't letting up, as Congress begins considering President Barack Obama's \$6.2 billion emergency aid request to fight the disease.

Despite reports that the number of infections is slowing in some parts of West Africa, cases still are rising in other areas — and aid organizations say thousands of health care workers are needed to treat Ebola over the next few months.

"We're not yet at a point where we can have confidence that we're turning the corner, even in Liberia," said Andy Gleadle of the Interna-

tional Medical Corps, which is running a treatment center in Liberia and plans to open another in that country and two more in Sierra Leone.

Even with increasing global attention to the epidemic, it takes time to train new health workers, build field hospitals, and buy protective equipment for doctors and nurses.

Doctors rush to central India after 12 women die following sterilization surgery

NEW DELHI (AP) — A team of doctors rushed to central India on Wednesday after at least 12 women died and dozens of others fell ill following sterilization surgery held as part of a free, nationwide program aimed at limiting births in the world's second-most populous nation, officials said.

The case highlights the risks women face in reproductive health in a country struggling with high population growth and widespread poverty.

A total of 83 women, all villagers under the age of 32, had the operations Saturday as part of the federal government's free sterilization campaign and were sent home that evening. But dozens later became ill and were rushed in ambulances to private hospitals in Bilaspur, a city in central Chhattisgarh state.

By Wednesday morning, at least 12 women had died, officials said.



My question to you is: Should I nicely tell him he needs to see a dentist? -- S.

Dear S.: Yes, dear. Otherwise, you will be stuck with this situation for the rest of your married life, and over time, it will put a terrible and unnecessary strain on your relationship. Today is Wednesday, Nov. 12, the 316th day of 2014. There are 49 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On Nov. 12, 1984, space shuttle astronauts Dale Gardner and Joe Allen snared a wandering satellite in history's first space salvage; the Palapa B2 satellite was secured in Discovery's cargo bay for return to Earth. On this date:

In 1787, severe flooding struck Dublin, Ireland, as the River Liffey rose. In 1815, American suffragist Elizabeth Cady Stanton was born in Johnstown, New York. In 1927, Josef Stalin became the undisputed ruler of the Soviet Union as Leon Trotsky was expelled from the Communist Party. In 1936, the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge opened as President Franklin D. Roosevelt pressed a telegraph key in Washington, D.C., giving the green light to traffic. In 1942, the World War II naval Battle of Guadalcanal began. (The Allies ended up winning a major victory over Japanese forces.) In 1948, former Japanese premier Hideki Tojo and several other World War II Japanese

leaders were sentenced to death by a war crimes tribunal. In 1969, news of the My Lai Massacre in South Vietnam in March 1968 was broken by investigative reporter Seymour Hersh. In 1977, the city of New Orleans elected its first black mayor, Ernest "Dutch" Morial, the winner of a runoff.




