Council eyes renovation plan at spring

Big Spring City Council members are expected to approve the financing of a plan to renovate the town's namesake when they meet at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday in council chambers, located at 307 E. Fourth St.

The council will consider increasing the city's motel tax fund by slightly more than \$22,000 to finance refurbishing the Big Spring at Comanche Trail Park.

The increase will be financed through existing fund balances, city officials said.

In August, the council approved a \$22,000 contract with KDC Associates of

Midland to provide architectural services for the spring upgrade.

Debbie Wegman, director of the local Convention and Visitors Bureau, said a committee has met with the ar-

Bearish oil market keeps gasoline prices on downward slide

Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 0.4 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.70 a gallon Sunday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 gas outlets in Texas.

This compares with the national average that has fallen 1.7 cents per gallon in the last week to \$2.89 a gallon.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices Sunday were 25.4 cents per gallon lower than the same day one year

ago and are 27.0 cents per gallon lower than a month ago.

The national average has decreased 25.5 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 29.8 cents per gallon lower than this day one year ago.

"Just a week ago, I was be-

coming concerned that the national average would level off unless crude oil prices kept dropping," said Patrick DeHaan, senior petroleum analyst with GasBuddy.

"Suddenly, the market turned bearish again and crude dropped as low as \$74 a

barrel before closing the week out at a \$2 per barrel loss," he added. "Either way, the decline in crude price renews the downturn at the pump that had stabilized last week and helped the national average tip back into a downward decline."




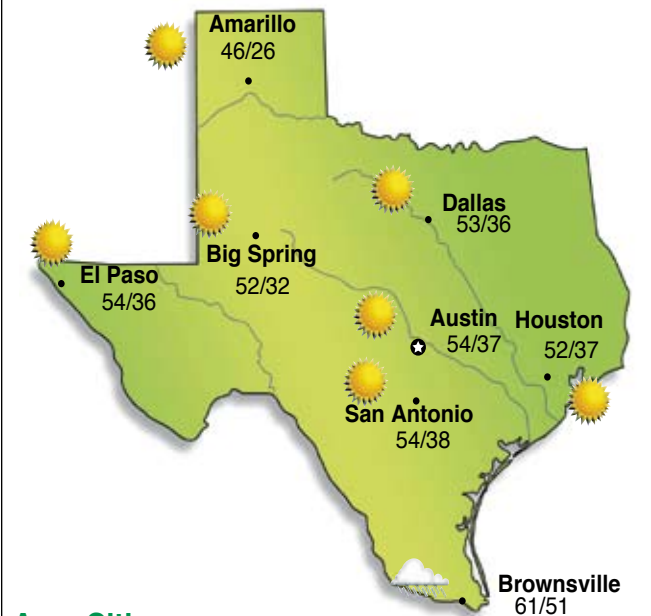

## Islamic State group beheads US aid worker Peter Kassig, Obama calls slaying 'pure evil'

BEIRUT (AP) — The Islamic State group has beheaded Peter Kassig, releasing a video Sunday showing a masked militant standing over the severed head of a man it said was the former U.S. Army Ranger-turned-aid worker, who was seized while delivering relief supplies in Syria last year.

President Barack Obama confirmed Kassig's slaying after a U.S. review of the video, which also showed the mass beheadings of a dozen Syrian soldiers.

The 26-year-old Kassig, who founded an aid group to help Syrians caught in their country's brutal civil war, "was taken from us in an act of pure evil by a terrorist group that the world rightly associates with inhumanity," Obama said in a statement.

He denounced the extremist group, which he said "reveals in the slaughter of innocents, including Muslims, and is bent only on sowing death and destruction."

The slain hostage's parents, Ed and Paula Kassig, said they were "heartbroken" by their son's killing, but "incredibly proud" of his humanitarian work.

## DEA agents surprise at least 3 NFL teams' medical staffs with checks after Sunday games

Federal drug enforcement agents showed up unannounced Sunday to check at least three visiting NFL teams' medical staffs as part of an investigation into former players' claims that teams mishandled prescription drugs.

There were no arrests, Drug Enforcement Administration spokesman Rusty Payne said Sunday. The San Francisco 49ers' staff was checked at MetLife Stadium in East Rutherford, New Jersey, after they played the New York Giants. The Tampa Bay Buccaneers' staff was checked at Baltimore-Washington International airport after playing the Redskins. The Seattle Seahawks, who played at Kansas City, confirmed via the team's Twitter account that they were spot-checked as well.

The operation was still ongoing, and other teams may be checked later Sunday, Payne said.

"DEA agents are currently interviewing NFL team doctors in several locations as part of an ongoing investigation into potential violations of the (Controlled Substances Act)," Payne said.

## Collision course: After Obama's trip abroad, confrontations with Republicans await

BRISBANE, Australia (AP) — After a productive trip abroad, President Barack Obama returned home Sunday on a collision course with Republicans on immigration and an oil pipeline project, showdowns that threaten prospects for cooperation over his remaining two years in office.

The contentious immigration debate could mean a year-end fight over keeping the government running, if some GOP lawmakers get their way.

On the foreign policy front, there is a Nov. 24 deadline in nuclear negotiations with Iran, and questions are surfacing within the administration about whether to overhaul U.S. policy toward Syria.

Given his faltering political support in the U.S. and his party's recent election losses, his trip to China, Myanmar and Australia appeared to offer respite.

The president, who arrived in Washington late Sunday, basked in policy breakthroughs with China and warm welcomes in Myanmar and Australia.

## New report details rise of child homelessness in US, says more affordable housing needed

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The number of homeless children in the U.S. has surged in recent years to an all-time high, amounting to one child in every 30, according to a comprehensive state-by-state report that blames the nation's high poverty rate, the lack of affordable housing and the impacts of pervasive domestic violence.

Titled "America's Youngest Outcasts," the report being issued Monday by the National Center on Family Homelessness calculates that nearly 2.5 million American children were homeless at some point in 2013.

The number is based on the Department of Education's latest count of 1.3 million homeless children in public schools, supplemented by estimates of homeless pre-school children not counted by the DOE.

The problem is particularly severe in California, which has one-eighth of the U.S. population but accounts for more than one-fifth of the homeless children with a tally of nearly 527,000.

## Japan slides into recession in wake of tax hike, undermining global growth prospects

TOKYO (AP) — Japan's economy unexpectedly slipped back into recession as housing and business investment dropped following a sales tax hike, hobbling its ability to help drive the global recovery.

The world's third-largest economy contracted at a 1.6 percent annual pace in the July-September quarter, the government said Monday, confounding expectations that it would rebound after a big drop the quarter before.

The news cast a pall over financial markets: Japan's share benchmark fell 3 percent, and many others in Asia also declined. Shares were lower in early trading in Europe and Dow Jones and S&P futures were off 0.5 percent, suggesting a dismal start for the week on Wall Street.

An economy is generally considered to be in recession when it shrinks for two consecutive quarters.

## 'Campaign to create fear' sends Rohingya fleeing Myanmar in larger numbers, activist says

SITTWE, Myanmar (AP) — The captain of the small fishing vessel has spent most of his life helping fellow Rohingya Muslims escape persecution and hatred in Myanmar, but now even he is worried about the panicked pace the exodus has taken in recent weeks.

"Everyone is going now," Puton Nya said. "I'm afraid that soon, no one will be left."

Bouts of vicious violence, together with discriminatory government policies, have sent an estimated 100,000 Rohingya fleeing this Buddhist-majority nation by boat in the last two years, according to the Arakan Project, a human-rights group that monitors the Rohingya.

Director Chris Lewa said the pace is accelerating, with more than 15,000 people leaving since Oct. 15 — twice the number that fled during the same period last year.

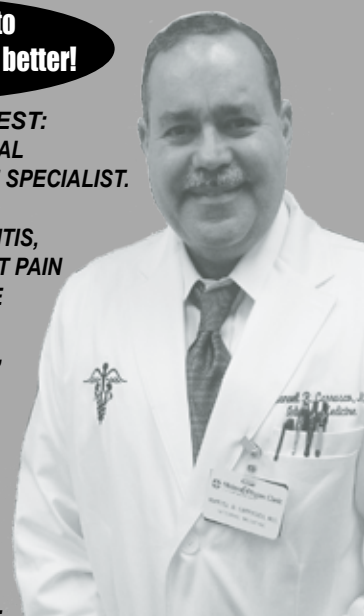

the 2014-15 basketball opener for both teams.

"We played great team defense, improved on our communication with each other," said Smalley, who took over the reins of the BSHS basketball program when former coach Mike Warren stepped down. "We are starting to play as a unit."

Smalley said the team struggled a bit with their new offensive schemes early against the Lady Wolves, but

that she expected some early season issues and was pleased with how the team was adjusting.

"We pushed the ball well in transition, but struggled to get into a rhythm offensively," she said. "We are running all new offenses this season so our team chemistry will take some time to develop. Overall, I'm very pleased with the effort our girls gave."

Big Spring struggled to get its offense going

in the first quarter. The Lady Steers managed just two shots from the field in the opening frame and held a slim 4-3 lead into the second.

The Lady Steers hit stride in the second. Big Spring pounded out a 12-10 run in the stanza and carried a 16-13 lead into the half.

The Lady Steers stretched their lead to five in the third, at 27-22, with an 11-9 spree.

Big Spring, which is scheduled to host Stan-

ton in the Steer Gym on Tuesday evening, finished off the win with a 12-11 run in the final eight minutes of the game.

Big Spring didn't fair as well in their second game, falling to Odessa High School on Saturday, 23-16.

Big Spring struggled from the field against OHS, hitting only 7 percent on 3-point attempts and went just 1-for-9 from the free throw line.

Defensively, Smalley said the BSHS girls did well.

"We played great team defense," she said. "We improved our blocks and forced OHS to take low percentage shots."

Diaz led all Big Spring scorers against OHS with five points. Tiffani Ruiz added four, while Diamonique Mayes contributed three. Jackie Castillo and Marah Walsh both tallied two.

# Mallett leads Texans past Browns, 23-7

CLEVELAND (AP) — For once, Ryan Mallett walked off an NFL field without thinking about what he could have done to help, how he would have done things differently.

This was all new to Mallett, and he savored the moment.

This victory belonged to him.

Mallett made the most of his first career start, throwing two touchdown passes — his first to defensive star-turned-wide receiver J.J. Watt — and led the Houston Texans to a 23-7 win on Sunday over the Cleveland Browns, whose reign atop the AFC North lasted all of one week.

"It made the four years, the wait worth it," Mallett said. "I couldn't ask for a better start to my career."

Mallett, handed the starting job during the bye week, completed 20

of 30 passes for 211 yards and led the Texans (5-5) back to .500 just as their season seemed to be slipping away.

There were some shaky moments, including two underthrown passes that could have been TDs, but Mallett delivered the spark the Texans needed. Those years as Tom Brady's backup paid off, and the big-armed Mallett, who always looked the part but wasn't able to show what he could do, came through.

The maximum permitted cavern capacity (cavern size, not brine storage volume) shall not exceed 1,000,000 barrels. The permittee shall apply for an amendment to the existing permit to increase cavern capacity in excess of this volume.

G. Injection Fluid:

The injection fluid is limited to fresh water pumped from water supply wells owned by the permittee. The injection rate of fresh water and the total amount of fresh water injected shall be recorded and reported annually to the Commission's office in Austin, Texas.

H. Groundwater Monitoring:

The designated monitor well is the water supply well located within approximately 950 feet in a west-northwesterly direction from the subject brine mining well. Until the brine mining injection wells are properly plugged and abandoned, the designated monitor well shall be sampled at least once a month and analyzed for specific electrical conductance. The baseline value for electrical conductance is 1490 μmhos/cm. The upper limit value for specific electrical conductance shall be 1863 μmhos/cm (125% of the baseline value). If the results of a routine sample analysis show that specific electrical conductance exceeds the upper limit value, the permittee shall immediately cease injection operations and notify this office.

I. Completion Report:

Any change in well completion requires filing a new Form W-2 in duplicate with the District office.

J. Storage and Disposal:

This permit does not authorize the storage or disposal of any substance other than the resident brine within the cavity developed through injection for fresh water.

K. Plugging and Abandonment:

A plugging and abandonment plan shall be submitted to this office for review prior to plugging operations.

L. Operator Change:

This permit is not transferable without the consent of the Director. Any request for permit transfer shall be filed with the Director or Director's Delegate.

Provided, that should it be determined that injected fluids are not confined to the cavern and well, then the permission given herein shall be suspended until the nature of the leak is determined and remedied.

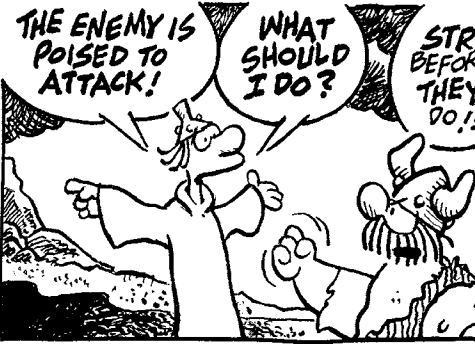

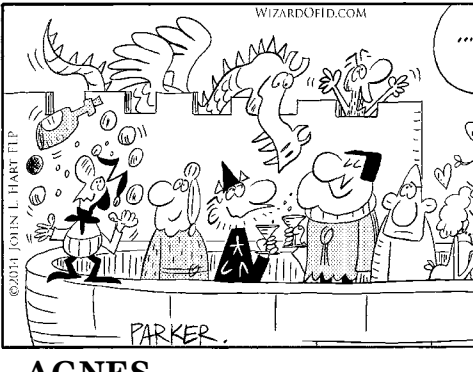

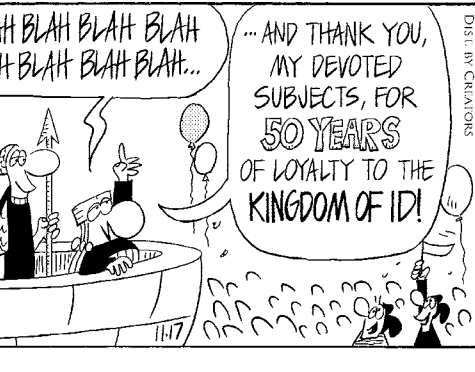

Today's Highlight in History: On Nov. 17, 1889, the Union Pacific Railroad Co. began direct, daily railroad service between Chicago and Portland, Oregon, as well as Chicago and San Francisco.

On this date: In 1558, Elizabeth I acceded to the English throne upon the death of Queen Mary. In 1800, Congress held its first session in Washington in the

partially completed Capitol building. In 1869, the Suez Canal opened in Egypt. In 1917, French sculptor Auguste Rodin (roh-DAN') died in Meudon at age 77. In 1934, Lyndon Baines Johnson married Claudia Alta Taylor, better known as Lady Bird, in San Antonio, Texas. In 1947, President Harry S. Truman, in an address to a special session of Congress, called for emergency aid to Austria, Italy and France. (The aid was approved the following month.) In 1968, NBC outraged football fans by cutting away from the closing minutes of a New York Jets-Oakland Raid-

ers game to begin the TV special "Heidi" on schedule. (After being taken off the air, the Raiders came from behind to beat the Jets, 43-32.) In 1973, President Richard Nixon told Associated Press managing editors in Orlando, Florida: "People have got to know whether or not their president is a crook. Well, I'm not a crook."

Harvick wins Homestead to claim 1st championship

HOMESTEAD, Fla. (AP) — Kevin Harvick jostled his 2-year-old son on his lap, egging him on to speak into the microphone and tell the world his daddy was the NASCAR champion. "Say, 'We win,'" said Harvick, who beamed during the celebration. Keelan Harvick clammed up in the moment and stayed quiet. That's OK. Kevin Harvick made the only statements needed on the track, making it clear that winning mattered most under NASCAR's new championship formula and his decision to bolt for buddy Tony Stewart's race team was indeed the right call. Harvick staked his claim as the best in Sprint Cup, using a relentless dash through the field in the closing laps to win Sunday's season finale at Homestead-Miami Speedway. Harvick staved off challengers Denny Hamlin, Ryan Newman and Joey Logano and erased any concern that NASCAR would be stained with a

winless champ. Did the new Chase — one where wins, not playing it safe, promised a better shot at a title — work? As Harvick took one final spin with his fifth checkered flag of the season, the answer was a resounding yes. "If you want to win the championship, you're going to have to figure out how to win races," Harvick said. "That's what it came down to, was winning the race." Harvick, who had to win last week at Phoenix just to advance into Sunday's final four, wrapped up his third victory of this Chase and fifth of the season. He leaned this week on Stewart, a three-time champion, and Jimmie Johnson, the six-time champion who moved from California to North Carolina to chase a career in NASCAR about the same time as Harvick made the move east. Harvick's top move, though, was the one to Stewart-Haas Racing after 13 seasons with Richard Childress failed

to produce a championship. Stewart promised Harvick he could have all the resources needed at SHR to win a championship. All it took was 36 races to prove the paring was a perfect match. "Tony was pretty adamant that we could race for wins and championships," Harvick said. "That was really what it was all about. I just wasn't excited about going to work. This just gave me an opportunity to race with one of my good friends." Newman, winless on the season, finished second. Hamlin faded to seventh and Logano was a distant 16th. All four teams were forced to make tough strategy decisions that ultimately decided their fate. Joe Gibbs Racing decided not to pit Hamlin, which moved him to second on the restart. Richard Childress Racing gave Newman two tires, while Harvick crew chief Rodney Childers made the risky call for four tires.
