

A Big Spring man has died from injuries he sustained in a two-vehicle accident in Andrews

Bird Poop: Victims of a human ego

tepping through the doorway of the barn was to enter their world. Housed in various mews were recover-

ing and, hopefully, releasable raptors. Wanting to show us

the latest arrivals, Gail Barnes opened the entry to the first



room. On the dirt floor across the mew stood two, close together. To our left, another perched atop a shelf covered with an artificial, rough turf.

As she approached the duo, they separated. Quickly grabbing one of them, she extended a wing so we could see the damage that had been inflicted.

No surprise was the anger in her voice. Caught by law enforcement, two men had been found in possession of the birds. The hawks' flight feathers had been purposely cut to keep them from flying.

"They'll have to go through a molt before we can release them," she continued.

During the lengthy time for that to be accomplished, the raptors would be fed, exercised, and monitored.

"It's a status thing!" she added. When we asked what had happened to the men, she said they had been deported back to Argentina.

Coloration and markings indicated the Swainson's hawks were adults.

The end of summer would signal their next migration.

Would they be ready?

"These birds have had previous migrations. We'll have to see how it goes," she answered.

All of us knew that in rehab we deal with "what if" and "maybe." As summer progressed, and our deliveries to the wildlife center continued, we would receive updates on their progress.

During August, the two were exercising in the flight cage with other Swainson's hawks.

As we watched the raptors fly from one end to the other, we could readily see their strengths or limitations. While one of the duo

had attained the agility and stamina needed for release, the other was worrisome. Granted, it could fly from one end to the other. Its flight path, how-

ever, was at an angle, almost crooked, and its landings awkward. It appeared to be flying sideways. Although it was cap-

turing and killing live mice within this flight facility's contained environment, questionable was it duplicating this feat during migra-

Our next update was



heartening and troublesome. Release of the most flight-worthy afforded plenty of time for migration. Although its cohort had grown stronger, it had not improved in its directional approaches.

Replacement of the flight feathers had been successful for one bird. The other hawk's feathers had not grown back as nature intended.

Admitting that this hawk was incapable of the rigorous flight demanded during this year's migration or future ones, Gail wished there was a place for release where it could fly, hunt, and perhaps be successful. South Plains could not keep it as an educational bird since they already had a Swainson's.

Trying to help her in her search, we learned that many Swainson's hawks, especially the young, don't make the first annual migration to South America. They may winter in Central America, Mexico, or southern parts of Texas.

The difference in those birds and hers was their superiority in flying and hunting. They could easily wander from one area to another.

The unknown was an unpredictable frigid

winter. The premise of migration as providing a continuing food source was timeless in its application.

Later, during a conversation with Gail one evening, I suggested placement of her hawk in another educational facility. Her posting the bird's availability might get a response.

With her next call came an enthusiastic "Bingo!" Wild Wings in Centennial, Colo. needed a replacement for their aging Swain-

Fostering a greater public awareness of the important roles native birds play in the environment, Wild Wings encourages and supports protection of ecosystems in which

birds live. It also is dedicated to providing a safe home and excellent care to birds that are otherwise unable to survive on their own in the wild.

The paperwork to facilitate the transfer has begun with U.S. Fish & Wildlife and the state of Colorado.

Although seemingly endless, the process is slowly plodding forward. A cultural symbol, the hawk that was trapped to satisfy a human ego now awaits a new home.



Strong: 5 losses won't happen again at Texas

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Longhorns are expected to play in a bowl game, something that looked like a long shot a month ago when they were 3-5 after a shutout loss at Kansas State.

Now a three-game surge has first-year coach Charlie Strong predicting the bad times are over at Texas (6-5), not just this season, but for the long term.

Another five-loss season "will never happen in this program again," Strong said Monday.

That's a strong state- for the tough discipline ment from the coach of a team that could still finish 6-7 if it can't upset No. 5 TCU on Thanksgiving and loses the bowl game the players fought so hard to get to. And check out Texas' history over the last 29 years: 14 seasons of five or more losses, including four of the last five years.

But a winning streak behind one of the Big 12's best defense has clearly eased some of the pressure on Strong, who until now was most notable

that led to suspensions or dismissals of several players for rules violations or arrests.

A month ago, Texas walked off the field after a 23-0 loss at Kansas State, Texas' first shutout defeat since 2004, looking like a team spiraling into disaster.

"At 2-4 and 3-5, I was like 'Who are we going to beat?" Strong said.

Turns out it was Texas Tech, West Virginia and Oklahoma State. The

all three games, winning each by at least 17 points. Last week's 28-7 win at Oklahoma State put Texas above .500 for the first time since a seasonopening win over North Texas.

"I said to the coaching staff, we're not coaching hard enough. The talent is here. Coach (Mack) Brown left us some really outstanding players. It was all about us getting connecting with the seniors," Strong said.

Now the question is

Longhorns controlled not if Texas will get to a bowl, but where and who the Longhorns will play. The most striking possibility is a potential matchup with old rival Texas A&M in the Texas Bowl on Dec. 29, a game that pits the Big 12 against the SEC.

One of college football's oldest rivalries broke up when the Aggies left the Big 12 for the SEC after the 2011 season and Texas administrators have publicly dismissed the chance of putting the game back on the

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — A double-digit halftime lead over Kentucky wasn't enough to make Baylor coach Kim Mulkey comfortable, and her unease grew as the Lady Bears' edge reached 14 points early in the second half.

She had good reason to feel nervous as the No. 13 Wildcats regrouped to do all those things her young team had done in building the lead. The No. 8 Lady Bears eventually wore down in a 74-64 loss that Mulkey saw coming long beforehand.

"We lost our momentum at the end of the first half," Mulkey said. "We were playing with excitement and youth out there and I thought the difference out there was (the Wildcats') composure, their poise and their leadership, senior and juniors did what you're supposed to do when you're behind and playing at home.

"They made got some good shots and got to the free-throw line in the second half. We didn't respond, but we'll get better."

Baylor (1-1) shot 47 percent and outrebounded Kentucky 24-16 in taking a 34-24 lead at the break. The second half was a different story as the Lady Bears shot just 32 percent and were beaten 24-18 on the glass by the Wildcats.

"With about five minutes to go (in the first half) we were trying to break it open and we had a double-digit lead," said Mulkey, whose team committed nine of its 24 turnovers in the second half. "We turned




