The members of St. Mary's Episcopal Church made enough food for at least 400 people to dine on at their annual St. Andrew's Day Scottish Music Festival and Evening Prayer.

However, freezing weather and snow flurries Sunday night kept about half of that number from attending, but those who came left with a full stomach and an ear full of good music in one of the best St. Andrew's Day events to

date.

Under the direction of Linda Hill, St. Mary's musical director, the event drew about 200 people from the area, including as far as Midland/Odessa and Lubbock.

Returning this year was E.J. Jones of Asheville, N.C., a favorite of St. Mary's, along with Doug Frosbese of Dallas, and Richard Kean of Houston, who played a medley of traditional Scottish tunes on the Great Highland Bagpipes. Joining the trio was Stephen Cameron of Georgetown on snare drum. Also, Jones per-

formed several traditional Scottish airs on the Scottish Smallpipes. Besides touring the country as a professional bagpiper, Jones, who is a Texas native, makes bagpipes for a living.

This year's program featured some special additions to the "Song of Scotland" section of the event, including a performance of "Loch Lomond" by the men of the choir; the women of the choir sang the lilting "Skye Boat Song." The choir consisted of local singers and choir members of St. Mary's and St.

Nicholas of Midland.

The choir was under the direction of Dr. Keith Graumann, conductor of the Big Spring Symphony. Darryl Knapp of Midland served as organist.

Also performing Sunday were trumpeters Michael Santorelli and Eric Baker, Samuel Hale on French Horn and Rocky Harris on the trombone. The quartet performed also performed before the event began. The Rev. Cannon Mike Ehmer was the

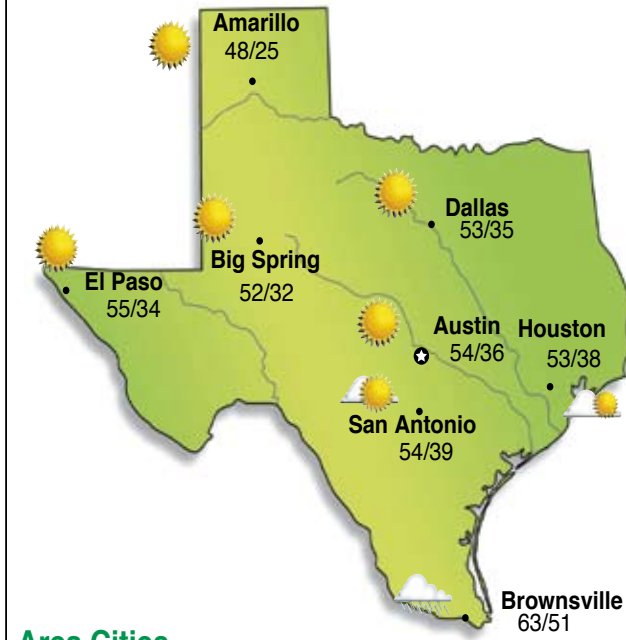

Big Spring man dies following accident

A Big Spring man has died from injuries he sustained in a two-vehicle accident in Andrews County.

According to officials with the Department of Safety, 44-year-old Jerry Allen Chancy of Big Spring was pronounced dead at Odessa Medical Center by Dr. Halpert at 8:23 a.m. Monday, the day after the accident.

The accident occurred at 2:14 p.m. Sunday, approximately one mile east of Andrews County on Highway 175 by mile marker 256, the DPS reported.

Chancy was driving a 2005 GMC Sierra westbound on State Highway 175 while Harvey Lee Long, 58, of Andrews was driving a 1997 Freightliner TTST with flat bed trailer eastbound. Chancy failed to pass left and the truck struck the freightliner, DPS reported.

State Farm to raise auto rates statewide

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — Auto insurance rates will rise an average of 4.4 percent beginning Dec. 8 for Baton Rouge customers of State Farm Mutual Automobile Insurance Co.

State Farm is Louisiana's largest auto

insurer, covering about one in three vehicles. The company said it will increase auto premiums for liability, collision and comprehensive coverage. Comprehensive covers losses from theft, storm damage, fire, vandalism and windshield damage.

The Advocate reports (<http://bit.ly/1t85fZC>) State Farm's auto rates will rise an average of 3.7 percent statewide.

The auto rate increase will generate \$40.4 million annually from State Farm's 1 million customers, which averages

out to about \$40 per customer. However, rates and increases will vary depending on a number of factors, including repair costs, where a person lives, his coverage and the discounts for which he qualifies.

For example, New Orleans customers will see their rates rise an average of 5.7 percent, while in Lafayette, rates will rise an average of 2.5 percent. In West Baton Rouge Parish, rates will increase an average of 2.5 percent.

The company's last automobile rate increase, an average of 3.5 percent statewide, took effect in February.

The latest rate increases start Dec. 8 and, for existing customers, take effect when they renew their policies.

Auto insurance rates in Louisiana are, and have been, among the highest in the United States.

The highest rates in Louisiana are found in Orleans, St. Bernard, Plaquemines and Jefferson parishes. Rates on the West Bank will rise an average of 5.2 percent, according to State Farm, and 5 percent in the Metairie area.

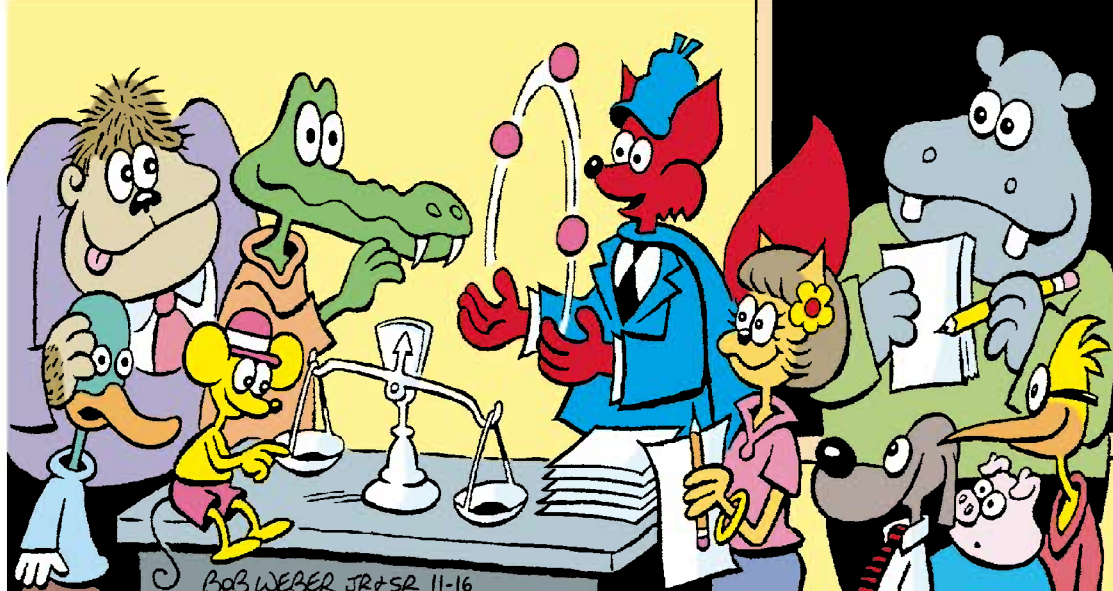

Bird Poop: Victims of a human ego

Stepping through the doorway of the barn was to enter their world. Housed in various mews were recovering and, hopefully, releasable raptors.

Wanting to show us the latest arrivals, Gail Barnes opened the entry to the first room. On the dirt floor across the mews stood two, close together. To our left, another perched atop a shelf covered with an artificial, rough turf.

As she approached the duo, they separated. Quickly grabbing one of them, she extended a wing so we could see the damage that had been inflicted.

No surprise was the anger in her voice. Caught by law enforcement, two men had been found in possession of the birds. The hawks' flight feathers had been purposely cut to keep them from flying.

"They'll have to go through a molt before we can release them," she continued.

During the lengthy time for that to be accomplished, the raptors would be fed, exercised, and monitored.

"It's a status thing!" she added. When we asked what had happened to the men, she said they had been deported back to Argentina.

Coloration and markings indicated

the Swainson's hawks were adults.

The end of summer would signal their next migration.

Would they be ready?

"These birds have had previous migrations. We'll have to see how it goes," she answered.

All of us knew that in rehab we deal with "what if" and "maybe." As summer progressed, and our deliveries to the wildlife center continued, we would receive updates on their progress.

During August, the two were exercising in the flight cage with other Swainson's hawks.

As we watched the raptors fly from one end to the other, we could readily see their strengths or limitations.

While one of the duo had attained the agility and stamina needed for release, the other was worrisome. Granted, it could fly from one end to the other.

Its flight path, however, was at an angle, almost crooked, and its landings awkward. It appeared to be flying sideways.

Although it was capturing and killing live mice within this flight facility's contained environment, questionable was it duplicating this feat during migration.

Our next update was



heartening and troublesome. Release of the most flight-worthy afforded plenty of time for migration. Although its cohort had grown stronger, it had not improved in its directional approaches.

Replacement of the flight feathers had been successful for one bird. The other hawk's feathers had not grown back as nature intended.

Admitting that this hawk was incapable of the rigorous flight demanded during this year's migration or future ones, Gail wished there was a place for release where it could fly, hunt, and perhaps be successful. South Plains could not keep it

as an educational bird since they already had a Swainson's.

Trying to help her in her search, we learned that many Swainson's hawks, especially the young, don't make the first annual migration to South America. They may winter in Central America, Mexico, or southern parts of Texas.

The difference in those birds and hers was their superiority in flying and hunting. They could easily wander from one area to another.

The unknown was an unpredictable frigid winter.

The premise of migration as providing a

continuing food source was timeless in its application.

Later, during a conversation with Gail one evening, I suggested placement of her hawk in another educational facility. Her posting the bird's availability might get a response.

With her next call came an enthusiastic "Bingo!" Wild Wings in Centennial, Colo. needed a replacement for their aging Swainson's.

Fostering a greater public awareness of the important roles native birds play in the environment, Wild Wings encourages and supports protection of ecosystems in which

birds live. It also is dedicated to providing a safe home and excellent care to birds that are otherwise unable to survive on their own in the wild.

The paperwork to facilitate the transfer has begun with U. S. Fish & Wildlife and the state of Colorado.

Although seemingly endless, the process is slowly plodding forward. A cultural symbol, the hawk that was trapped to satisfy a human ego now awaits a new home.

South dealer.
Both sides vulnerable.

The bidding:
South 4♠ West Pass North Pass East Pass
Opening lead king of hearts.

Let's say you're in four spades and West leads the king of hearts, East following low. West shifts to the diamond ten, and, when you cover with the king, East wins with the ace.

East continues with the queen of diamonds, West contributing the nine, and then plays the jack. When you ruff high, West discards a heart, and the question is how to proceed from this point on.

It might seem that you must eventually rely on a club finesse to make the contract, but actually you have a

much better chance than that. Instead of putting all your eggs in that one basket, you can improve your chances by attempting a squeeze.

Accordingly, at trick five you lead a low trump to the eight, ruff a heart, cross to the queen of trumps and ruff another heart. The purpose of the heart ruffs is to place the burden of guarding against dummy's jack of hearts entirely on West. This portion of the plan succeeds when East is forced to relinquish his queen on the third heart lead.

Next, you lead your two remaining trumps, producing this position:

North
♥ J
♣ A 6
West
♥ A
♣ Q 10
East
♦ 6
♣ 9 5
South
♣ K J 7

When you now lead a club to the ace and return a club, East following low to both clubs, you go up with the king, knowing full well that the king will catch West's queen. This is because West — who is known at this stage to have started with precisely two spades, five hearts, two diamonds and, therefore, four clubs — was forced to unguard his clubs as the trumps were led.

Strong: 5 losses won't happen again at Texas

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Longhorns are expected to play in a bowl game, something that looked like a long shot a month ago when they were 3-5 after a shutout loss at Kansas State. Now a three-game surge has first-year coach Charlie Strong predicting the bad times are over at Texas (6-5), not just this season, but for the long term. Another five-loss season “will never happen in this program again,” Strong said Monday.

That's a strong statement from the coach of a team that could still finish 6-7 if it can't upset No. 5 TCU on Thanksgiving and lose the bowl game the players fought so hard to get to. And check out Texas' history over the last 29 years: 14 seasons of five or more losses, including four of the last five years. But a winning streak behind one of the Big 12's best defenses has clearly eased some of the pressure on Strong, who until now was most notable

for the tough discipline that led to suspensions or dismissals of several players for rules violations or arrests. A month ago, Texas walked off the field after a 23-0 loss at Kansas State, Texas' first shutout defeat since 2004, looking like a team spiraling into disaster. “At 2-4 and 3-5, I was like ‘Who are we going to beat?’” Strong said. Turns out it was Texas Tech, West Virginia and Oklahoma State. The

Longhorns controlled all three games, winning each by at least 17 points. Last week's 28-7 win at Oklahoma State put Texas above .500 for the first time since a season-opening win over North Texas. “I said to the coaching staff, we're not coaching hard enough. The talent is here. Coach (Mack) Brown left us some really outstanding players. It was all about us getting connecting with the seniors,” Strong said. Now the question is

not if Texas will get to a bowl, but where and who the Longhorns will play. The most striking possibility is a potential match with old rival Texas A&M in the Texas Bowl on Dec. 29, a game that pits the Big 12 against the SEC. One of college football's oldest rivalries broke up when the Aggies left the Big 12 for the SEC after the 2011 season and Texas administrators have publicly dismissed the chance of putting the game back on the

schedule in the regular season. “Whoever we play in the bowl game, we'll be happy,” Strong said. “It's just all about TCU right now. Strong also dismissed any suggestion he could be a candidate for the Florida job. Strong is a former Florida defensive coordinator and won a national championship with the Gators before taking his first head coaching job at Louisville before the 2010 season.

Steelers rally past Titans

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — This time, the Pittsburgh Steelers beat their struggling opponent. Ben Roethlisberger and Le'Veon Bell were an impressive duo in Music City on Monday night. Roethlisberger threw a 12-yard touchdown pass to Antonio Brown with 9:01 left, lifting the Steelers to a 27-24 victory over the Tennessee Titans. Pittsburgh (7-4) staged an impressive rally in the second half to take sole possession of second in the successful AFC North heading into the bye. Bell ran for 204 yards — an NFL high for a single game this season — and a TD. William Gay returned an interception 28 yards for a score, and Shaun Suisham kicked two field goals.

“Not a perfect night but really a great night for us in that we were down by 11, and we had an opportunity to bounce back,” Pittsburgh coach Mike Tomlin said. “And I think anytime you can do that and gain victory you grow from it and grow from it in the right ways.” Bell had 33 carries in the best game by a Steelers running back since 2010. “When 26 gets the ball in his hands you never know what's going to happen, and it's awesome,” Roethlisberger said.

Roethlisberger had never beaten the Titans at LP Field, missing the Steelers' win here in 2010. With Bell running through and over the Titans, the Steelers took the pressure off Big Ben by holding the ball for 39 minutes, 49 seconds with a 386-312 edge in total offense. “He got rolling, and we couldn't make a play and that's disappointing,” Titans coach Ken Whisenhunt said. “That's the way it went. We tried a lot of different things to try to stop their run game.” The Titans (2-8) blew a 24-13 lead in their fourth consecutive loss. They sacked Roethlisberger five times and intercepted a pass in the end zone.

No. 8 Baylor falls to No. 13 Kentucky, 74-64

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — A double-digit halftime lead over Kentucky wasn't enough to make Baylor coach Kim Mulkey comfortable, and her unease grew as the Lady Bears' edge reached 14 points early in the second half. She had good reason to feel nervous as the No. 13 Wildcats regrouped to do all those things her young team had done in building the lead. The No. 8 Lady Bears eventually wore down in a 74-64 loss that Mulkey saw coming long be-

forehand. “We lost our momentum at the end of the first half,” Mulkey said. “We were playing with excitement and youth out there and I thought the difference out there was (the Wildcats') composure, their poise and their leadership, senior and juniors did what you're supposed to do when you're behind and playing at home. “They made got some good shots and got to the free-throw line in the second half. We didn't respond, but we'll get

better.” Baylor (1-1) shot 47 percent and outrebounded Kentucky 24-16 in taking a 34-24 lead at the break. The second half was a different story as the Lady Bears shot just 32 percent and were beaten 24-18 on the glass by the Wildcats. “With about five minutes to go (in the first half) we were trying to break it open and we had a double-digit lead,” said Mulkey, whose team committed nine of its 24 turnovers in the second half. “We turned

the ball over, missed a free throw and quit getting to the foul line in the second half. Experienced juniors and seniors extend that lead.” “Everything was going our way, but we kept fighting ourselves.” Baylor's biggest problem was failing to contain Kentucky senior guard Jennifer O'Neill, who scored 18 of her 22 points in the second half to rally the Wildcats in a game that the Lady Bears seemed to control with that 14-point lead.

AP: Winston's hearing delayed again

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — A person familiar with the decision says Jameis Winston's Florida State student code of conduct hearing has been moved a second time to Dec. 2. The person spoke to The Associated Press Monday on condition of anonymity because the university has not

released any details about the hearing. AP has reported that Florida State originally scheduled the hearing the week of Nov. 17, then changed it after Winston family adviser David Cornwell requested a delay. The Heisman-winning quarterback is facing a hearing to de-

termine whether he violated four sections of the code of conduct — two for sexual misconduct and two for endangerment. A former female student said he assaulted her in December 2012. FSU finishes the regular season Nov. 29 and plays in the ACC title game Dec. 6.

Edgar Hoover described civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr. as "the most notorious liar in the country" for allegedly accusing FBI agents in Georgia of failing to act on complaints filed by blacks; King, who denied making such a claim, replied, "I cannot conceive of Mr. Hoover

making a statement like this without being under extreme pressure." On this date: In 1883, the United States and Canada adopted a system of Standard Time zones. In 1886, the 21st president of the United States, Chester A. Arthur, died in New York. In 1928, Walt Disney's first sound-synchronized animated cartoon, "Steamboat Willie" starring Mickey Mouse, premiered in New York. In 1936, Germany and Italy recognized the Spanish government of Francisco Franco. In 1942, "The Skin of Our Teeth," Thornton Wilder's Pulitzer

Prize-winning allegory about the history of humankind, opened on Broadway. In 1959, "Ben-Hur," the Biblical-era spectacle starring Charlton Heston, had its world premiere in New York. In 1963, the Bell System introduced the first commercial touch-tone telephone system in Carnegie and Greensburg, Pennsylvania.

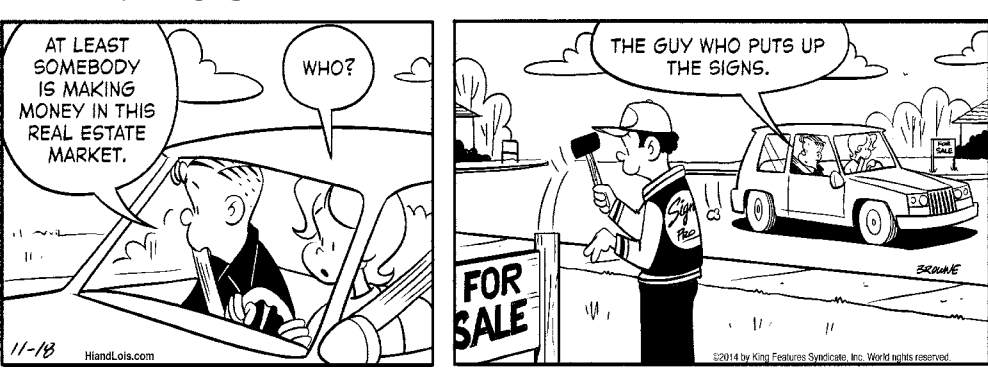

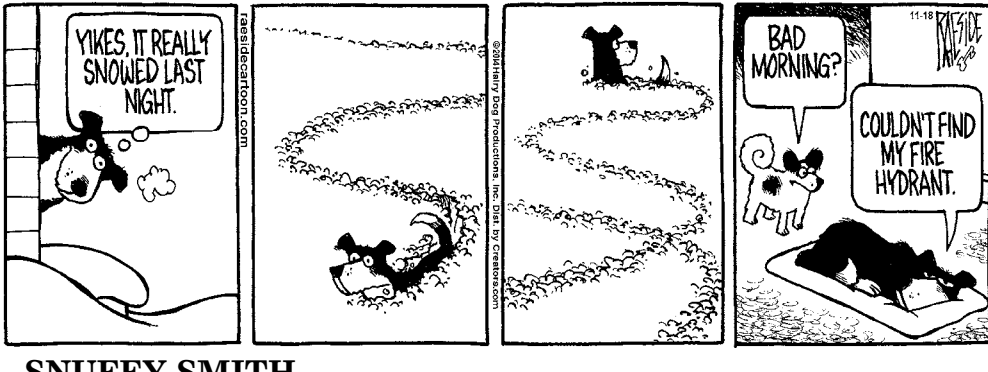

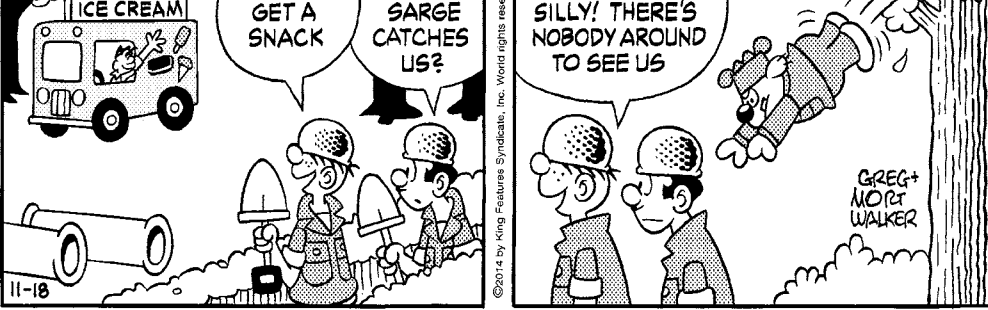
