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Finances tight; SA continues to provide services

Although the homeless shelter still remains closed, the Big Spring Salvation Army continues to find sanctuary for people when the need arises.

Finances, employee and building maintenance issues all contributed to the decision to close the shelter a year ago, said Capt. Jeremiah Romack of the Big Spring Salvation Army, but officials are still helping people find shelter on a case by case basis.

"We are still finding shelter for people but in a non-traditional means," Romack said.

For people in short-term situations such as those who have lost their homes to fire, the Salvation Army helps secure lodging locally at a hotel room or other accommodation. For long-term cases, Romack said they find a place in a Salvation Army run shelter located in nearby cities.

"Fortunately, the Salvation Army is a huge organization, and we have a network to help people," he said. "Lots of time people come down here looking for 'gold' (jobs opportunities), and they find it's not what they thought and get stuck. We are able to help them get back home. If they have become drug dependent, we have programs such as one in Dallas to help get them back on their feet."

In the past several years, West Texas has been a magnet for people and their families looking to cash in on high-paying oilfield jobs

created by shale oil drilling. Unfortunately, one of the side effects of this latest oil boom has been a shortage of housing to shelter all the incoming workers and rapidly rising rents.

Also, for charitable operations such as the Salvation Army, donations have not been able to keep up.

"We haven't been able to

catch up with the economic boom in this area," he said. "The Salvation Army here provides many services, from operating the Boys and Girls Club, to the food pantry, helping people with utility expenses and the Angel Tree program. If one of those services begins to struggle, it really begins to impact all the services."

The Salvation Army will kick off its annual Kettle Drive at 10 a.m. Friday, Nov. 28, in front of Walmart.

"Every donation here stays local and helps fund the ser-

vices we provide to the community," Romack said.

Be careful with turkey fryers

Smells of good food cooking in the oven, sounds of football games wafting through the house and family time are staples for some on Thanksgiving Day.

Fried turkey has also become a favorite but for those cooking up this dish, safety needs to be taken into consideration. The Big Spring Fire Department offers a few safety hazards to avoid when using a turkey fryer this season and a few safety tips.

Turkey fryer hazards

Many units easily tip over, spilling the hot oil from the cooking pot.

If the cooking pot is overfilled with oil, the oil may spill out of the unit when the turkey is placed into the

cooking pot. Oil may hit the burner or flames, causing a fire to engulf the entire unit.

Partially frozen turkeys

placed into the fryer can cause a spillover effect.

James Newell Turner



James Newell Turner, 93, of Abilene, Texas, died Tuesday, Nov. 18, 2014, and entered back into the arms of his parents and family who have gone before him. A service will be held Friday, Nov. 21, 2014, at 2 p.m. in North's Memorial Chapel, 242 Orange St. George Price Jr. is officiating. Graveside services will be Saturday, Nov. 22, 2014, at noon in The City of Levelland Cemetery in Levelland, Texas, with burial to follow.

James was born Sept. 16, 1921, in Eureka, Kan. to A.K. Turner and Ophelia (Bertie) Phillips Turner. At birth, Jim was the third child of 12 born into the A.K. Turner family; five brothers and six sisters, of which only two survive him. Jim lived in Winfield, Kan., at a young age before his family moved to Abilene and Hamlin, Texas.

They eventually settled in Coahoma, Texas, where he was a star football player and basketball player, as well as being voted class favorite before graduating Coahoma High School. He then attended Texas Tech College before joining the United States Army Air Corps in 1942 and became a 2nd lieutenant and was a tail gunner and flew B-24 Liberators. He was later stationed in England, his final tour of duty before returning to the States to marry his fiancé, Jane (Janey) Eleanor Easton in Topeka, Kan., on June 30, 1945. From there, they moved to Takoma, Wash., to finish the remainder of his service. When

he was honorably discharged in August 1945, they returned to Coahoma to begin their civilian lives.

After three years there, co-owning and operating a water hauling and pulling unit business, Jim was hired by Stanolind Oil Company, later named Amoco, in Sundown. He, Janey and their first born son, Kenny moved to Levelland, Texas. A couple of years later they had their daughter, Becky. Jim worked for Amoco for 38 years, beginning as a roustabout and retiring as a measurement technologist. He also invented and designed a measurement sight scope used for checking oil well content production that is still being used today by many oil companies.

Jim was always a Methodist and was very active in Levelland's First United Methodist Church for the duration of time they lived there. He was also a lifelong member of Levelland Masonic Lodge and was a Boy Scout master when their son, Kenny, was a Boy Scout.

He and his wife Janey were also active with their children's square dance club, as well as their own adult square dance club. Jim was a perfectionist who enjoyed projects of all kinds, especially those in his own backyard.

He loved gardening, repairing and maintaining his own cars and later playing with his grandchildren, whom he loved very much. He enjoyed fishing, camping and long walks with his family. Jim loved his family and was always so proud of each one of their accomplishments.

After 47 years of marriage, his wife Janey passed away. Three years went by and he contacted Maken (Micky) Walker, whom he had met 50 years

ago while he was serving in Kings Lynn, England. They rekindled their relationship; she came to the United States they were married Nov. 11, 1995, on Veterans Day. Jim and Micky were volunteers for Meals on Wheels until health issues prevented them from doing so. In September 2011, they moved to University Place Retirement Home, to be near his daughter, Becky.

He was preceded in death by his parents; his wife, Janey; his son, Dr. Kenneth (Kenny) Turner; four of his brothers, Alex Turner Jr., Dennis Turner, John Turner and George Turner; and five of his sisters, Dorothy Young, Norma Grant, Emma Lee Chapman, Bernice Carter and Sue Sheedy.

Jim is survived by his wife, Micky Turner; his daughter, Becky and her husband Ronnie Nail of Abilene, Texas; grandchildren, Melissa (Rick) Muller of Southlake, Texas, and David (Mandi) Kinney of Graham, Texas; three great-grandsons, Riley Albus, Kolton and Karson Kinney; a sister, Mary Jo Stoker; a brother, Bill Turner; three stepsons and their wives, Robert and Jenny Walker, Gary and Trudy Walker, Stephen and Pauline Walker, all from England; numerous nieces and nephews; and many friends.

Obama immigration action has its limits, leaving unresolved the status of millions

WASHINGTON (AP) — As broadly as President Barack Obama may push the limits of his authority to shield from deportation millions of immigrants illegally in the United States, the fate of millions more will still be left unresolved.

Obama is preparing to flex his executive powers Thursday, using an 8 p.m. EST address to announce that he is sidestepping Congress and ordering his own federal action on immigration.

The reaction from congressional Republicans has been swift and fierce, heralding the start of what could be one of the most pitched partisan confrontations of Obama's presidency.

His measures could make as many as 5 million people eligible for work permits, with the broadest action likely aimed at extending deportation protections to parents of U.S. citizens and permanent residents, as long as those parents have been in the country for five years.

Other potential winners under Obama's actions would be young immigrants who entered the country illegally as children but do not now qualify under a 2012 directive from the president.

Police: Florida State University gunman shot dead by campus officers; 3 wounded

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Florida State University police fatally shot a gunman at the campus library early Thursday in a shooting that left three students wounded as hundreds studying inside the library fled or took cover in panic.

Officers confronted the gunman and ordered him to drop his weapon, but he fired one shot at them and they unleashed a volley of shots, Tallahassee Police spokesman Dave Northway said.

While police did not say if the wounded were shot by the gunman, senior Sarah Evans from Miami said she was inside the library and heard a male student say he had been shot. When she looked at him, he was on the ground with blood spreading on his pants leg.

Northway said authorities did not believe there were any other threats related to the incident. Shortly after 4 a.m., a loud tone sounded across the campus followed by an announcement that the campus was "all clear."

At the same time, authorities allowed hundreds of students who had been shepherded in a classroom building next to Strozier Library, a multistory building in the center of the Tallahassee campus, to return to their homes.

8 feet? Buried Buffalo braces for a few more feet from relentless lake-effect snow machine

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — A new blast of lake-effect snow began pounding Buffalo on Thursday, piling more misery on a city already buried by an epic, deadly snowfall that could leave some areas with more than 8 feet of snow on the ground when it's all done.

But the meteorological "kick me" sign on the city hasn't fallen off just yet. Forecasters say a rapid weekend warmup, with temperatures as high as 60 and heavy rain, could turn all that snow into floods.

"It is an extraordinary situation," Gov. Andrew Cuomo told reporters after touring the region Wednesday and talking to truckers who had been stranded more than 24 hours on the Thruway. "It will get worse before it gets better."

Even for Buffalo, a place that typically shrugs at snow, this was an epic snowfall — the kind of onslaught folks will be telling their grandchildren about.

The Buffalo area found itself buried under as much as 5½ feet of snow Wednesday, with another lake-effect storm expected to bring an average of 2 more feet by late Thursday.

NBC says Cosby project is no longer in development, TV Land stops airing 'Cosby Show'

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC has scrapped a Bill Cosby comedy that was under development and TV Land will stop airing reruns of "The Cosby Show," moves that came a day after another woman came forward claiming that the once-beloved comic had sexually assaulted her.

NBC spokeswoman Rebecca Marks said Wednesday the Cosby sitcom "is no longer under development." A TV Land representative said the reruns will stop airing immediately for an indefinite time. "The Cosby Show" also was to have been part of a Thanksgiving sitcom marathon.

The NBC sitcom and "Cosby Show" reruns joined a Netflix Cosby standup comedy special, which was indefinitely postponed late Tuesday, as mounting evidence of Cosby's faltering career. They occurred a day after model Janice Dickinson, in an interview with "Entertainment Tonight," became the third woman in recent weeks to allege she'd been assaulted by Cosby — charges strongly denied by the comedian's lawyer.

The developments, which involve allegations that were widely reported a decade ago as well as new accusations, have gravely damaged the 77-year-old comedian's reputation as America's TV dad at a time when he was launching a comeback. A year ago, a standup special — his first in 30 years — aired on Comedy Central and drew a hefty audience of 2 million viewers. His prospective new series was announced by NBC in January.

Cosby has never been charged in connection with any of the allegations. Former Pennsylvania prosecutor Bruce L. Castor Jr., who investigated a woman's claims that Cosby had sexually assaulted her in 2004, said Wednesday he decided not to prosecute because he felt there was not enough evidence to get a conviction.

Ebola hampers adoptions in West Africa, heightens need for aid to children

CHICAGO (AP) — The Ebola epidemic has put adoptions in impacted west African countries at a standstill for obvious reasons.

Tessa and Joel Sanborn understand. The arrival of their 5-year-old adopted son Devine, who is in an orphanage in Liberia, is on hold, indefinitely, as the state of emergency continues there.

"We love Liberia, and we want what's best for the country as a whole," says Tessa Sanborn, who lives with her husband and their six other children in Maple Valley, Washington, just outside Seattle.

But the waiting is still difficult, as it is for other parents in a similar predicament. And even as some families keep their commitment to adopt, despite the Ebola threat, the numbers of children in west African orphanages who've lost parents is only increasing because of the deadly virus.

Some aid workers also say a shortage of food and supplies is making it difficult to care for those of children, and that fear is hampering efforts to place those who've lost parents to Ebola, even within their home countries.

BSFD extinguishes residential blaze

At approximately 5:07 p.m. Tuesday afternoon, the Big Spring Fire Department responded to an unoccupied residential structure at the 1600 block of Lexington with five units and 10 personnel.

They were on scene within 3 minutes and found flames and heavy smoke visible from the south east bedroom window.

Suppression activities were started and the fire was brought under control within a half hour. The attack was then directed at finding and extinguishing remaining pockets of fire and embers.

At approximately 7:15 p.m. fire crews were released. No injuries were reported. The property is received substantial damage to the south half.

The cause of the fire has been ruled undetermined but remains under investigation at this time.

Secretary of State Kerry in Paris to continue meetings on nuclear deal

PARIS (AP) — The State Department says U.S. Secretary of State John Kerry will travel to Vienna later Thursday to join high-level nuclear negotiations with Iran as a deadline for an agreement fast approaches.

State Department spokeswoman Jen Psaki (SAH-kee) says Kerry will meet Thursday evening with the U.S. negotiating team in Vienna before talks with others. Psaki spoke shortly after Kerry held talks in Paris with the Saudi foreign minister and before he was to see his French counterpart.

Tears, anger for slain Miss Honduras, sister in country where violence against women is up

SANTA BARBARA, Honduras (AP) — Tears and anger poured out for the dark-haired beauty who was to have flown to London on Wednesday to represent Honduras at the Miss World pageant, only to be found shot to death with her sister on a remote river bank.

After the bodies of the reigning Miss Honduras, 19-year-old Maria Jose Alvarado, and her sister Sofia, 23, were discovered early in the day, police announced that the sister's boyfriend had confessed to killing them last week in a fit of jealousy over his girlfriend dancing with another man.

Dozens of relatives and friends of the beauty queen gathered for a candlelight vigil at the college she attended, remembering a down-to-earth young woman who aspired to be a diplomat, went out without makeup and worked as a model to help support a humble family.

This, too, may result in an extensive fire.

With no thermostat controls, the units also have the potential to overheat the oil to the point of combustion.

The lid and handles on the sides of the cooking pot get dangerously hot, posing severe burn hazards.

If you use a turkey fryer, please use the following tips.

Turkey fryers should always be used outdoors a safe distance from buildings and any other flammable materials.

Never use turkey fry-

ers in a garage or on a wooden deck.

Make sure the fryers are used on a flat surface to reduce accidental tipping.

Never leave the fryer unattended. Most units do not have thermostat controls. If you do not watch the fryer carefully, the oil will continue to heat until it catches fire.

Never let children or pets near the fryer even if it is not in use. The oil inside the cooking pot can remain dangerously hot hours after use.

To avoid oil spillover,

do not overfill the fryer.

Use well-insulated pot holders or oven mitts when touching pot or lid handles. If possible, wear safety goggles to protect your eyes from oil splatter.

Make sure the turkey is completely thawed and be careful with marinades. Oil and water do not mix, and water causes oil to spill over causing a fire or even an explosion hazard.

The National Turkey Federation (NTF) recommends thawing the turkey in the refrigerator approximately

24 hours for every five pounds in weight.

Keep an all-purpose fire extinguisher nearby. Never use water to extinguish a grease fire. If the fire is manageable, use your all-purpose fire extinguisher. If the fire increases, immediately call the fire department for help.

Always follow the manufacture directions and safety recommendations

I love writing for the newspaper for a variety of reasons, and one is that I get to peruse the Associated Press wire.

There, among the expected stories about the big news of the days, are little featurettes the AP calls Odds and Ends. The reason for this title, I believe, is that these nuggets show that people are odd and there's no end to it.

I'm sure there's a more official explanation out there somewhere, but I'm sticking with mine. Anyway, looking through Odds and Ends the other day, I found this little gem:

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — Alaska State Troopers say they have detained a man suspected of stealing women's underwear during burglaries in Kodiak.

KTUU-TV reports an 18-year-old was taken into custody Monday. Online court records early Tuesday didn't indicate he had been formally charged.

Troopers say the burglaries occurred over three months. Residents would return home to find items — mostly women's underwear — missing. They had been alerted to keep their doors locked.

The agency says the 18-year-old is suspected of breaking into seven homes and trying to get into three others.

For some reason, this story left me gob-smacked. I really shouldn't be surprised to learn someone has a penchant for stealing women's underwear. Work the police beat at a newspaper for any amount of time and you'll learn that people will steal just about anything that isn't bolted down.

We need to know: Is the press broken?

Today is the day I was not going to disappoint @RonSupportsYou, who, as his nom de Twitter implies, is a positive and hopeful person. Which probably means he is used to disappointment.

Ron, one of my earliest Twitter followers, sent me a series of messages a few weeks ago that read:

“You are entitled to write whatever type of column you like, but maybe it is time to write a positive column, as a change of pace.”

“Maybe there is something happening now that is good, that you are enthusiastic about. Let us know in a column.”

“It can't all be 'doom and gloom' column after column. Maybe surprise readers with a little variety, just for a change.”

“This was free advice & worth the price.”

It is good advice. Ron would like me to be more positive and, now and again, see the glass as half full.

Recently, I admit, I have been seeing the glass as empty, drained by greedy and grasping politicians who have drunk every drop and then stuffed the glass into their copious coat pockets so they can pawn it later.

But I am trying to take Ron's plea to heart. After all, there is good in this world, and perhaps I and others in the media have been casting too cold an eye on life.

Nor is Ron alone in his feelings. Jim Romanesko's media column recently featured a message from Beth English McMillan, the new “engagement editor” of The Tennessean in Nashville.

She wrote: “I really don't like news that makes me feel sick to my stomach ... and well that seems to be what our media in the U.S. likes to talk about. Why aren't we working harder to lift up the community by focusing on positive role models instead of the

negative ones?”

This resulted in some critical responses from journalists, including one from Amy Starnes, city editor of the Waco Tribune-Herald, who wrote that it is not the duty of newspapers to “become a community cheerleader” and that McMillan “lacks a fundamental understanding of what it means to be a journalist.”

Ulrik Haagerup, director of news at the Danish Broadcasting Corp., recently wrote a book titled “Constructive News,” whose message is that “negativity destroys the media and democracy.”

He writes that “people are sick and tired of the negative picture of the world presented to them by the press.” And he wants his book to serve as a “wake-up call to a paralyzed media industry infected by cynicism.”

I tried to think back to when I first got infected. I grew up in the world of Chicago journalism, where all rookie reporters were taught that the only way to look upon a politician is down.

This, I agree, is a negative view. But it proved, over and over again, to be an accurate one. In my lifetime, four governors of Illinois have been convicted of corruption and sent to prison. Some 31 Chicago aldermen have been convicted of crimes since 1973, and since 1976 there have been 1,485 federal convictions of corrupt politicians and businessmen in the courts of the Northern District of Illinois.

You can go to Wikipedia for a staggering list of state and local officials throughout the United States convicted of crimes, as well as separate lists for federal politicians convicted of crimes; United States representatives expelled, censured or reprimanded; United States senators expelled or censured; state and local political scandals; and state and local political sex scandals.

But not all of life is political scandal. There is also murder and mayhem.

As I sit writing this column, the lead story on MSNBC and CNN — as well as the apps for The New York Times, The Wall Street

Journal and The Washington Post — is the murder of four rabbis, three of them American, in Jerusalem by Palestinians armed with a gun, knives and axes. An Israeli police officer also later died of his wounds.

So, a tough day to be upbeat.

In truth, the media hold a mirror up to life. Is it our fault that the mirror is sometimes cracked? Or is it the fault of life itself?

Sometimes the mirror is shiny and bright. Sometimes the news is about all those doctors and nurses and aid workers who could stay home in safety and comfort but who go to Africa to treat Ebola victims.

There are also those who help the homeless and feed the hungry and those ordinary people who don't pass by a shivering body huddled under cardboard on a subfreezing night but make sure the person gets to a shelter. There are parents who show love to their children and children who show love back.

There are laughter and joy, and yes, firefighters still sometimes rescue kittens from trees.

The media should take care that we reflect reality. The news is usually about that which is not ordinary. So you can take small comfort that stories about viciousness and crime are stories that do not make up the sum of everyday life.

As the press does stories on random acts of mayhem, we should also do stories on random acts of kindness.

We do not have to achieve a false balance. We need to reflect what is actual and true.

So if you want the media to be better, build a better world.

I'm sorry, Ron. That's the best I can do today.

HAMPTON, N.H. (AP) — A New Hampshire man says he was working in his garage when a groundhog he had seen in his backyard charged at him.

Gary McGrath of Hampton tells WMUR-TV the groundhog got close, so he pushed him back with his foot Tuesday. But the animal returned. McGrath said he gave him a harder kick and closed the garage door.

But the groundhog sneaked through another opening — and McGrath ended up running to the front door.

His wife called an animal control officer, who got back into his truck for a short time when confronted by the groundhog. The animal was later put down in the yard. It will be tested for rabies.

Having been the victim of a groundhog attack — it's a long, boring story, trust me — I can sympathize with Mr. McGrath and can honestly testify that the little pests are disgusting, irritable creatures that deserve nothing but our scorn.

I doubt it had rabies, though. It was probably just being a groundhog.

Project to highlight Native connection to Route 66

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — More than two dozen American Indian tribes are teaming up with a tourism group and the National Park Service to tell a new story for travelers along historic Route 66, the famous byway that stretches from Chicago to California.

The plan is to create a guidebook using federal grant money that will highlight tribal sites along the 2,400-mile route.

The book will also detail the histo-

ries of Native communities that saw their stretch of the West change because of the road.

Representatives from the Park Service and the Chicago American Indian Center were among those at a meeting Wednesday to kick off the project.

The American Indian Alaska Native Tourism Association is leading the effort. Coordinator Virginia Salazar-Halfmoon says one goal is to dispel stereotypes about Native Americans and their varying cultures.

You deserve a factual look at . . .

Why Can't the Palestinians Have a State?

After the Arabs lost the West Bank and Gaza to the Jewish state in 1967, they denied Israel's right to exist—as well as the prospect of a Palestinian state.

When Israel defeated five invading Arab armies in 1967, it drove Jordan from eastern Jerusalem and the Jewish homelands of Judea and Samaria (later known as the West Bank) and repulsed Egypt from Gaza. Shortly thereafter, the Arab League issued its famous Khartoum Resolution: "No peace with Israel, no recognition of Israel and no negotiations with it." Since then, despite numerous Israeli offers of land for a Palestinian state, the Arabs continue to reject peace.

What are the facts?

Despite having lost wars to Israel in 1947, 1967 and 1973, all Arab nations—except Egypt in 1979 and Jordan in 1994—have steadfastly refused to accept peace with the Jews, denied the existence of a Jewish state and rejected all offers of land by Israel for a Palestinian state.

Indeed, Israel, backed by the U.S., has made several bold, groundbreaking land-for-peace offers to the Palestinians: In 2000 and in 2007 Israel offered about 95% of the land it captured in 1967, plus a Palestinian capital in Jerusalem. In 2005, Israel also unilaterally withdrew from Gaza, leaving it under Palestinian control.

Why then have the Arabs rejected peace with Israel, and why is there still no Palestinian state? In 1964,

the Arab League embraced the charter of Yasser Arafat's new Palestine Liberation Organization, which held that a) Palestinians had rights to the entire region of Palestine, b) Jews who had arrived in Palestine after 1917 were occupying Arab land and c) "armed struggle is the only way to liberate Palestine." In 1967, following the Arabs' humiliating defeat by Israel, the Arab League issued its "Three No's of Khartoum," denying Israel's right to exist and any desire for peace.

This ingrained Arab claim to absolute ownership of all the territory of Palestine—from the Jordan River to the Mediterranean Sea—and the absolute rejection of a Jewish state has persisted since Israel's war for independence in 1948. Indeed, when Palestinian politicians speak of ending "Israeli occupation," they are referring to Jewish occupation of present-day Israel.

Today in Palestinian public schools, students are taught that they will return to their "homes" in what is now Israel—even though these children and 95% of their parents have never lived in Israel. Palestinian news media and school books only show maps of "Palestine" encompassing all of Israel.

Likewise, Palestinians have maintained an implacable

commitment to the "liberation of Palestine"—meaning all Arab and Israeli territories—through violence. Even the so-called moderate Palestinian leadership in the West Bank regularly celebrates "martyrs" who murder innocent Israelis. In 2010 the Palestinian government named a town square for Dalal Mughrabi, the female jihadi who in 1978 helped hijack a bus and massacre 38 Israeli civilians, including 13 children. Most recently, Palestinian leaders praised the Arab man who killed a 3-month-old Jewish baby at a train station in Jerusalem.

Perhaps the greatest obstacle to a Palestinian state is the terror group Hamas. Now part of the ruling Palestinian coalition government, Hamas continues to stand—and act—on its original covenant of 1988 to "obliterate" Israel, "fight Jews and kill them," and "raise the banner of Allah" over every inch of Muslim lands. Hamas's charter also specifically rejects "so-called peaceful solutions." No wonder Hamas has launched more than 15,000 rockets at Israel and engaged in outright wars in 2008, 2012 and 2014.

Though Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas has—at the insistence of American Presidents George Bush and Barack Obama—participated in several rounds of peace talks with Israel, he has been unwilling to relent on deal-breaking demands that would make peace and a Palestinian state possible. For example, Abbas has refused to back off the Palestinian demand that as many as five million Arabs—descendants of refugees from Israel's 1948 war of independence—be allowed to "return" to Israel, a land most have never seen. Most importantly, Abbas refuses to acknowledge Israel as the Jewish homeland.

When we look for an answer as to why the Palestinians can't have a state, the preponderance of evidence compels one to conclude that they don't want a state. Palestinian actions and rhetoric demonstrate in any case that they are unwilling to accept a state next to the Jewish nation of Israel.

Following World War II, the Germans and Japanese surrendered and were forced to give up lands they had earlier occupied. In return they were granted peace and sovereignty. The Arabs, on the other hand, have never surrendered, despite losing numerous wars with Israel, and they have never accepted peace. Sadly, until the Palestinians are willing to give up their quest to conquer Israel, they are doomed to unending struggle and statelessness.

Plenty of great football action on tap for this weekend

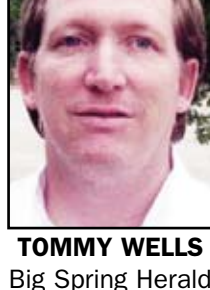

With apologies to Mark Twain, the early reports of the Sands High School Mustangs' demise were incorrect. In fact, the Mustangs are very much alive ... and doing quite well in the Class six-man football state playoffs.

Sands will try and move a step closer to a trip to Cowboys Stadium for the Division II state championship game on Friday night when they face Blackwell in the second round of the postseason. The game is scheduled to get under way at 6:30 p.m. at Cardinals Stadium in Hermleigh.

Don't be fooled by the records. Sands, now 5-6 overall, definitely has the firepower to hang with the Blackwell, which enters the game as 7-3. The Mustangs are averaging better than 70 points per game in their last two outings, including 96 in last week's bi-district romp over state-ranked Balmorhea.

The Mustangs are led into the contest by spreadback Dayton Eddleman and wide receiver Dyllan Tindol. The two, along wit Sergio Plata and Will McMorris, give Sands a solid 1-2-34 attack.

is scheduled to begin at 7 p.m. at historic Ratliff Stadium in Odessa. The Steers have the edge in the series recently, having won two of the past three meetings, including a lopsided 56-7 win in the area round a year ago at Ratliff Stadium. Andrews, however, has the latest win, taking a nail-biting 43-42 come-from-behind win last month at Memorial Stadium.

The Oct.3 loss has been a tough pill to swallow for the Steers. Not only did it spoil the loss end the Steers' bid for a perfect season, it also threw a dark cloud over the 2014 homecoming celebrations. In that game, the Mustangs used

a 22-14 run in the second half to grab a 43-42 cushion with less than 5 minutes to play. Big Spring drove the length of the field on its final possession, reaching the AHS 6 before electing to attempt a 23-yard field goal with 3 seconds left to snatch the win. The kick, however, sailed wide right – barely.

The loss has also been unsettling for the BSHS defense. In the Mustangs' win, the Steers surrendered more than 500 yards of total offense and allowed a double-digit lead slip away.

Andrews, which improved to 10-1 last week by decimating Borger in the bi-district round, should again pose a major challenge for the Steers' defense. The Mustangs are led by one of West Texas' top passers in Jase Hammack. The 6-foot-2, 205-pound senior completed 27 of his 32 passing attempts for a staggering 418 yards and five touchdowns in their last meeting with the Steers.

For the year, Hammack has completed 196 of his 308 passing attempts for 3,166 yards and 42 touchdowns. Making his even tougher to face is his ability to avoid turnovers. In the Mustangs' 11 games this fall, he has tossed just two

Overall, GCHS enters the second round of the postseason with an 8-3 record.

Much of the credit for GC's fast finish to the season goes to Ramirez and Zuniga, who both surpasses the 100-yard rushing mark against SC. Over the past three weeks, both have rushed for more than 200 yards.

As a team, the Bearkats are averaging more than 250 yards rushing per game this season. That ground game has enabled the team to roll up 625 points this fall.

The Bearkats' offense will get a stiff test from Ira. The Bulldogs, 11-0 and ranked No. 2 in the latest www.sixmanfootball.com poll, have held six of their opponents to less than 12 points or less, and have allowed a

grand total of 41 points in their last eight games.

Coyotes look to take next step

The Borden County Coyotes will try and take the next step in their quest to return to the six-man football state championship game on Friday when the third-ranked Coyotes face off with the Valley Patriots.

The two teams are scheduled to kick off the second round of the Class A playoffs at 7:30 p.m. on Friday in Ralls.

Borden County has been one of the more dominant teams in the state this season. The Coyotes have used a high-scoring offense to cruise to a 10-0 record in the regular season and the District 4 championship. They didn't miss a beat in their playoff opener last week, downing Anton, 75-44.

For the year, Borden County has rolled up 720 points offensively. The team eclipsed to 70-point mark in a game five times this fall.

In Valley, the Coyotes will be facing a familiar postseason foe. The two teams have met in the state playoffs in each of the past three years. Valley defeated BC by a 57-22 margin last November and by a 53-46 margin in 2012.

The District 2-A champion, Valley rolls into the second-round showdown with a 9-2 record. The Patriots advanced to the second round via a 78-29 bi-district win over Nazareth.

Valley, too, has a potent offense. The Patriots are averaging just under 60 points a game this season.

Defensively, the Coyotes appear to have the edge in the matchup. Borden County has allowed just 285 points this year in 11 games. Valley has given up 406.

Borden County enters the game as a 27-point favorite, according to www.sixmanfootball.com.

can throw the ball - including Big Spring. In their only loss this season, Andrews surrendered 62 points to Sweetwater.

Against Big Spring, the Mustangs gave up more than 600 yards to the Steers.

Junior Keegan Gray leads the AHS defense this fall. En route to averaging 13.8 stops per game, he has rolled up 138 tackles this season. Senior Micah Melton is the team's second-leading tackler with 89 stops.

Big Spring, much as it has all year, will need another Herculean effort from Tobyn Tannehill, Hunter Hill and the BSHS offense this week. In the Steers' seven regular-season wins, the Steers have averaged almost 50 points per game. In their two losses (to Andrews and Wylie), the offense generated just 48 points total.

Tannehill enjoyed one of his better nights of the season against Andrews in Week 5 of the season. The Big Spring senior completed 16 of his 27 passing attempts and threw for 270 yards and

four touchdowns. He also shredded the AHS defense for 168 yards on 24 rushing attempts.

Tannehill, as the Mustangs' know, is one of the state's top offensive threats. Through the Steers' first 10 games, he has completed 99 of his 191 passing attempts for 1,605 yards and 18 touchdowns. Add that to his 1,400 yards and nine TDs rushing and the BSHS standout heads into the contest having amassed more than 3,000 all-purpose yards and 27 TDs.

Hill was also a major thorn for the Mustangs, rolling up 86 yards and a touchdown on 14 rushing attempts, and catching four passes for 100 yards and two more scores.

For the year, Hill needs just 106 yards rushing to join Tannehill in surpassing the 1,000-yard rushing mark.

Another senior that the Steers will need to step up again against Andrews is receiver Matt Yanez. The team's top wideout this fall, Yanez caught a season-high nine passes for 131 yards in Big Spring's October showdown.

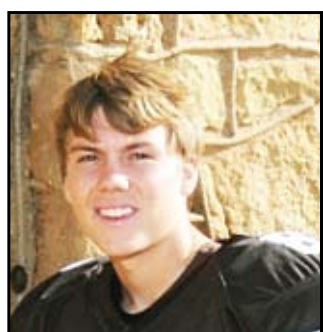

The winner of the Sands-Blackwell matchup will advance to play either Buena Vista or Loreaine in the third round.

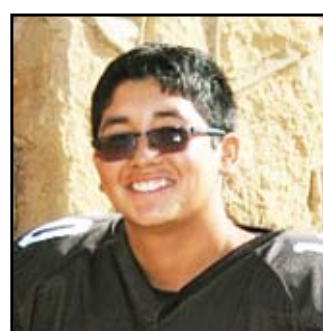

Contract Bridge

Imaginative Defense

West dealer.
Neither side vulnerable.

NORTH
♠ K 8 6
♥ A J 7 4
♦ K J 5
♣ Q J 8

EAST
♠ A 4
♥ 6
♦ 8 7 6 3 2
♣ 9 7 4 3 2

SOUTH
♠ 10 3
♥ Q 10 5 3 2
♦ A 10 9

The bidding:
West North East South
1 ♠ 4 ♥ Pass 3 ♥
Opening lead — queen of spades.

Assume you're West and South gets to four hearts as shown. You lead the queen of spades, which wins. East playing the four and South the three.

The missing spades are the A-10, and you realize that, given the bidding, you have almost no chance of beating the contract unless declarer has the ten. It is also clear that, even if declarer started with the 10-x of spades, the chances of setting the contract are far from bright, since South probably has every one of the remaining nine high-card points as yet unaccounted for. You are therefore unlikely to take more than two spade tricks and the ace of clubs.

Despite this dim outlook, though, there is a reasonable chance of scoring the setting trick in the trump suit itself, provided partner has the six (or ten) of trumps. Since that is your only real hope, you initiate your plan by returning the deuce of spades at trick two.

Partner wins dummy's eight with the ace and shifts to a club, just as you asked him to do when you led an unnecessarily low spade as a suit-preference signal at trick two.

After taking the club with the ace, you lead another spade. Partner then comes through with flying colors when he ruffs the king of spades with the six of hearts. Declarer overruffs with the ten but cannot stop you from scoring a trump trick, and you wind up plus 50 instead of minus 420, thanks to your thoughtful defense.
