

WHAT WE MUST DO By Ronnie Parker

Since Christ is the supreme authority in religion, we must go to His teaching to find out what we must do to be saved from our sins. Just before Christ ascended into heaven he gave to his apostles the great commission in which he revealed the terms of salvation.

"Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost; Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you; and lo. I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world. (Matt. 28:19-20). "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature. 

Cotton Acreage Allowance Told

Farmers may plant unused upland cotton allotment acreage to any crop without affecting their Stabilization and Conservation County Committee said this week.

"HOWEVER," he noted, "if a farmer plants other crops for which acreage allotments or bases are in effect he should be careful, of course, not to plant in excess of the acreage permitted under programs for thses crops. The Chairman added that cooperators in the cotton program are also required to maintain the conserving base that has been estab-

The inspection report is not an appraisal of the property, nor does it make recommendations for the client to buy or withdraw, explains the specialist.

Items included in the inspection vary with the organizations, says Mrs. Berry, but most inspection lists include several hundred items. Most include foundation, site drainage, termites, plumbing, electrical supply, heating and hot water systems, downspouts and gutters, chimney, all fixtures, inside and outside masonry and painting, and the structure itself. NOT EVERY Texas city has a qualified home inspection consultant. Often building contractors, electricians, plumbers and other pro-

essionals can assist with the inspection. The cost of an inspection will save marty times that amount


