## Gasoline prices down 5.7 cents

Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 5.7 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.62 per gallon Sunday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 gas outlets in Texas. This compares with the national average that has fallen 4.9 cents per gallon in the last week to \$2.82/g, according to gasoline price website GasBuddy.com. Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices Sunday were 43.4 cents per gallon

lower than the same day one year ago and are 25.4 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has decreased 24.9 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 41.4 cents per gallon lower than this day one year ago. "As we begin Thanksgiving week, Americans are gearing up to hit the road, and when they do, they'll be spending far less on their fuel bill than a year ago," said Patrick DeHaan, senior petroleum analyst with GasBuddy. "For

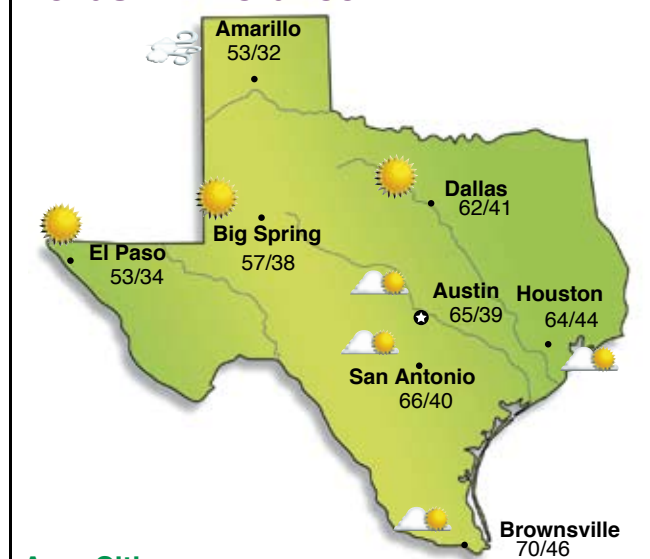

# News Briefs

## Uncertainty fuels speculation on Ferguson case as weekend passes without grand jury decision

FERGUSON, Mo. (AP) — The final weekend before the Thanksgiving holiday passed without a grand jury decision on whether to indict a Ferguson police officer, fueling new speculation about the timing as protesters demand justice for Michael Brown.

After meeting Friday but apparently not reaching a decision, the grand jury was widely expected to reconvene on Monday to consider possible charges against Darren Wilson, the white suburban St. Louis officer who fatally shot the black 18-year-old after a confrontation in August. There was no official confirmation about when the grand jury would meet again.

Protesting on Sunday night, Reggie Cunningham said he doubted Wilson will be indicted and it seemed authorities were delaying an announcement “to spin this in the most positive way possible.”

“The more that they drag this out, the angrier people are going to be,” said Cunningham, 30, of St. Louis.

The shooting triggered riots and looting, and police responded with armored vehicles and tear gas. Many in the area thought a grand jury decision on whether to charge Wilson with a crime would be announced Sunday, based partly on a stepped-up police presence in the preceding days, including the setting up of barricades around the building where the panel was meeting.

## British banker can plea in trial for killings of Indonesian women, Hong Kong judge says

HONG KONG (AP) — A Hong Kong judge on Monday deemed a British banker charged with murdering two Indonesian women fit to enter a plea in his case based on the results of psychiatric reports.

The judge in Rurik Jutting’s case also adjourned pre-trial court proceedings until July 6 to give the prosecution more time to analyze DNA and other forensic evidence.

Prosecutor Louise Wong told the judge that the government lab needed 28 weeks to examine more than 200 items of evidence collected from the crime scene, but she added that investigators requested the case be given priority.

Jutting’s lawyers said he did not object to the request for the lengthy adjournment.

No trial date has been set yet and Jutting did not enter a plea. He spoke only once, calmly saying “I do” when the judge reminded him to continue giving instructions to his lawyers and asked him if he understood.

## Attempted murder charge filed against mother of newborn left in Sydney storm drain for 5 days

SYDNEY (AP) — A 30-year-old Sydney mother has been charged with trying to kill her newborn son by abandoning him in a roadside drain for five days before passers-by heard his cries, police said Monday.

The week-old baby was in serious but stable condition in Westmead Children’s Hospital a day after cyclists found him in a 2.5-meter (8-foot) deep drain beside the M7 Motorway in the suburb of Quakers Hill, police said in a statement.

His mother, Saifale Nai, did not appear in court to answer the attempted murder charge. Her lawyer did not enter a plea and the magistrate formally refused her bail.

Nai will remain in custody until her next court appearance on Friday. She would face a potential maximum sentence of 25 years in prison if convicted.

“Police will allege the baby, believed to have been born on Monday (Nov. 17), was placed into the drain on Tuesday,” the police statement said.

## 12-year-old boy with fake gun at playground dies after being shot by Ohio police; probe begins

CLEVELAND (AP) — A 12-year-old boy was fatally shot by police in Cleveland after brandishing what turned out to be a replica gun, triggering an investigation into his death and a legislator’s call for such weapons to be brightly colored or bear special markings.

The boy, identified by the Cuyahoga County medical examiner as Tamir Rice, died from his wounds Sunday, a day after officers responded to a 911 call about someone waving a “probably fake” gun at a playground.

Deputy Chief Ed Tomba said one officer fired twice after the boy pulled the fake weapon — which was lacking the orange safety indicator usually found on the muzzle — from his waistband but had not pointed it at police. The boy did not make any verbal threats but grabbed the replica handgun after being told to raise his hands, Tomba said.

“That’s when the officer fired,” he said.

Police described the weapon as an “airsoft” type replica that resembled a semi-automatic handgun. The orange safety indicator had been removed, police said.

## Desperation leads Chilean mothers to grow marijuana to help their seizure-stricken children

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — Paulina Bobadilla was beyond desperate. The drugs no longer stopped her daughter’s epileptic seizures and the little girl had become so numb to pain, she would tear off her own fingernails and leave her small fingers bleeding.

Bobadilla was driving on a mountain road with Javiera, intent on ending it all by steering their car off a cliff.

“All I wanted to do was to die along with her,” the 34-year-old mother recalled of that day in April 2013. “I told her: ‘This is it.’ But then she said, ‘Mommy, I love you.’ I looked at her and I knew I had to continue fighting.”

Bobadilla’s desperation to ease her daughter’s condition is an emotion familiar to other Chilean parents who say medical marijuana can help their children and who, rather than wait for Congress to act, have taken matters into their own hands.

Despite the risk of jail time, about 100 parents have formed a group, Mama Cultiva or “Mama Grows,” to share knowledge about cultivating marijuana to extract cannabis oil for their seizure-stricken children.

## One Direction, Katy Perry win 3 American Music Awards; Iggy Azalea, Sam Smith, Swift shine

One Direction won three honors at the American Music Awards, including artist of the year over powerhouse acts like Beyonce and Luke Bryan, while breakthrough newcomer Iggy Azalea beat out heavyweights Eminem and Drake in the rap categories.

Katy Perry, who was absent from Sunday’s award show because of her world tour, matched One Direction for most wins with three.

The boy band won also won favorite band, duo or group — pop/rock and favorite album — pop/rock for “Midnight Memories” at the fan-voted show.

“This has been a real perfect day ... America feels like a second home to us,” Liam Payne said onstage with his band mates when they won the night’s first award. The group released its new album, “Four,” last week.

They wore all black as they sang the groove “Night Changes” at the Nokia Theatre L.A. Live. Taylor Swift kicked off the AMAs as a mad woman and man eater by feeding a boy a poisonous apple, holding burning roses and giving crazy eyes during a performance of her song about her dating life according to the media.

## Schools close, residents ready for evacuation in Buffalo region as snowmelt threatens flooding

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — Families rushed to pack up their valuables and schools closed in advance — not of snow but possible flooding.

Temperatures were expected to hit nearly 60 degrees on Monday, causing Buffalo area residents to prepare for evacuations caused by runoff from melting snow, and overflowing creeks.

“Hopefully the rain won’t be here until later and this will be a slow thaw, but flooding is our major, major concern here,” said Michelle Pikula, whose house is along the Buffalo Creek.

The National Weather Service has issued a flood warning for Monday and cautioned that trees weakened by heavy snowfall and saturated soil could come crashing down. High wind gusts of up to 60 mph also could topple electrical wires and trigger power outages. Forecasts call for rain showers on Monday and a chance of rain and snow showers by early Tuesday.

## Israel police say Palestinian youth attacked by Jews in Jerusalem

JERUSALEM (AP) — Three young Israelis attacked a Palestinian youth in Jerusalem on Monday, police say, the latest sectarian incident in the increasingly tense city.

Police spokeswoman Luba Samri said the unidentified youth is in good condition in a Jerusalem hospital, and that police are investigating the attack.

Tensions in Jerusalem are spiking, mostly over Palestinian claims that the Israeli government of Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu wants to change the status quo at a sensitive holy site in the city by allowing Jews to pray there.

Netanyahu has repeatedly denied the claims but some members of his right-wing coalition favor letting the prayers go forward.

## Chinese foreign minister holds out hope for Iran nuclear deal, even as talks turn to extension

VIENNA (AP) — Talks on Iran’s nuclear program appear likely to run beyond their Monday midnight deadline, but China’s foreign minister says negotiators are still working on elements of a deal.

U.S. Secretary of State John Kerry and Iranian Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif agreed Sunday to start discussion on continuing the talks past the target date But Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi says negotiators are still having “consultations” on a final agreement that meets both U.S. demands for strict curbs on Tehran’s nuclear program and Iran’s push for sanctions relief.

Wang arrived Monday, joining the foreign ministers of the other countries negotiating with Iran — the U.S., Russia, Britain, France and Germany.

## British banker can plea in trial for killings of Indonesian women, Hong Kong judge says

HONG KONG (AP) — A Hong Kong judge on Monday deemed a British banker charged with murdering two Indonesian women fit to enter a plea in his case based on the results of psychiatric reports.

The judge in Rurik Jutting’s case also adjourned pre-trial court proceedings until July 6 to give the prosecution more time to analyze DNA and other evidence.

0 and 17 years in placement in relative or foster care, said Dana Rodriguez of the HCCWB.

While the welfare board has run its own “angel” program for several years, officials are changing things up this holiday season.

“About this time, you

would normally start seeing the Christmas Angels in a couple of our local business ... that is the Christmas tree that had the ornaments with a child’s name on it who is currently in foster care through Child Protective Services,” Rodriguez said. “However, we are having to go about it a little differently this year.

“As a representative of the welfare board, I am

contacting local businesses and schools to help us out by sponsoring a number of kids,” she added. “I will supply you with the first name of the child, age and a couple of ‘wish list’ items for each child.” Rodriguez said children in the program can be “adopted” by an individual, a staff, department or by the entire office, “Whatever works for you.”

Gifts should be returned to Rodriguez by Wednesday, Dec. 3, unwrapped but labeled with the child’s name.

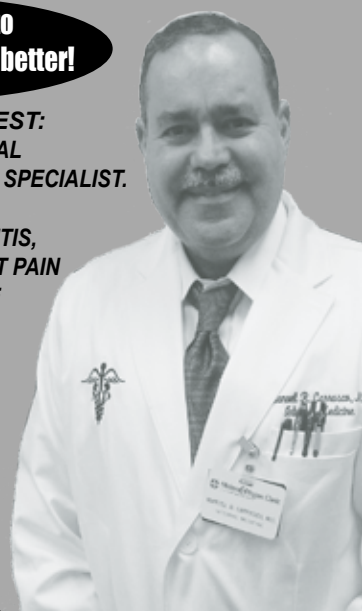

## Texans, Chiefs earn BSYFL crowns with Super Bowl wins

Elijah Darrow rushed for 98 yards and the game's only touchdown on Saturday and helped carry the Big Spring Texans to a thrilling 8-0 victory over the Big Spring Cowboys in the Division II championship game on a rainy afternoon at Blankenship Field.

With the victory, the Texans avenged their only loss during the regular season and finished the 2014 season with a 7-1 record.

"They played like champions today," Texans' head coach Brian Fontana said. "I'm proud of everyone of them. Both teams played really well."

Both the Texans and Cowboys defenses starred early in the contest. Both teams came up huge in the first two quarters of play, forcing their opponents to turn the ball over on downs on each of their first three possessions.

As a team, the Texans managed just 22 total offensive yards from scrimmage in the first half. The Cowboys fared little better, netting a total of 28 yards.

The Texans offense found

its groove midway through the third quarter. After stopping the Cowboys on a fourth-down play at the 50, Darrow gave the Texans the spark their offense had needed. On the Texans' first play of the second half, he took a hand-off from Ja'various Ford and sprinted around the left side for 36 yards and a first down at the Cowboys' 14.

Three plays—and two illegal

procedure penalties later, he finished off the drive by scoring on a 15-yard scamper. He tacked on the ensuing two-point conversion and staked the Texans to an 8-0 lead with 49 seconds left in the third.

The Cowboys threatened to run their way back into the game moments later. A 22-yard run by Shawn Cerda on the second play of the Cowboys' first possession of the fourth quarter moved the ball to midfield.

X'Zavier Knox and the Texans defense put down the threat from there, however. Ford scooped up a Cowboys' play two plays later.

The Cowboys staged another threat late in the game.

Cerda intercepted a Texans' pass to end a nine-play drive that took more than 7 minutes off the game clock, giving the Cowboys the ball at the Texans 47.

The Cowboys reeled off an 11-yard run later in the frame and drove to the Texans 39 before tragedy struck.

Darrow ended the Cowboys' final threat by intercepting a pass on a fourth-and-2 play.

As a team, the Texans finished the game with 101 total

**A hand once played** by Italian star Pietro Forquet illustrates the theme that in bridge you never give up. He reached four spades as shown (playing the highly artificial Blue Team Club System), and West led the K-A and another heart.  
**Forquet won with the queen** and, expecting no trouble whatsoever, cashed the ace of trumps. When East showed out, the entire picture changed. What had seemed like an

easy contract a moment earlier now appeared impossible to make.  
**But Forquet thought** the matter over and concluded that he could still make four spades if West had three diamonds in addition to the five spades and three hearts he had already shown up with. Accordingly, Forquet next led a club to the ace and continued with the A-K-Q of diamonds, ruffing the queen after East showed out.  
**He then cashed the king of clubs**, producing this position with declarer needing to score three tricks:

West East  
♦J 10 9 7 Immaterial  
South  
♠Q 6  
♠9 7  
**Forquet led a club**, and West, who seemed to have two sure trump tricks, suddenly found he had only one. West could not afford to ruff with the seven, which declarer would overruff with dummy's eight, so he ruffed with the nine. Forquet found the correct counter to this when he discarded the jack of diamonds from dummy. It now did not matter whether West returned the jack, ten or seven — whichever card he chose, Forquet had the rest of the tricks.

production shall be kept for the life of the wells. Brine production data shall be provided to the Commission as soon as practicable upon request. The Commission may direct the operator to conduct sonar caliper surveys of the wells or other tests in the event data indicate the solution-mined interval has become structurally unstable or otherwise represents a hazard to the environmental health and safety.

E. Mechanical Integrity Testing: Mechanical integrity shall be demonstrated annually by means of a hydrostatic fluid pressure test. The results shall be reported annually to the Commission's office in Austin, Texas.

F. Cavern Volume: The maximum permitted cavern capacity (cavern size, not brine storage volume) shall not exceed 1,000,000 barrels. The permittee shall apply for an amendment to the existing permit to increase cavern capacity in excess of this volume.

G. Injection Fluid: The injection fluid is limited to fresh water pumped from water supply wells owned by the permittee. The injection rate of fresh water and the total amount of fresh water injected shall be recorded and reported annually to the Commission's office in Austin, Texas.

H. Groundwater Monitoring: The designated monitor well is the water supply well located within approximately 950 feet in a west-northwesterly direction from the subject brine mining well. Until the brine mining injection wells are properly plugged and abandoned, the designated monitor well shall be sampled at least once a month and analyzed for specific electrical conductance. The baseline value for electrical conductance is 1490 umhos/cm. The upper limit value for specific electrical conductance shall be 1863 umhos/cm (125% of the baseline value). If the results of a routine sample analysis show that specific electrical conductance exceeds the upper limit value, the permittee shall immediately cease injection operations and notify this office.

I. Completion Report: Any change in well completion requires filing a new Form W-2 in duplicate with the District office.

J. Storage and Disposal: This permit does not authorize the storage or disposal of any substance other than the resident brine within the cavity developed through injection for fresh water.

K. Plugging and Abandonment: A plugging and abandonment plan shall be submitted to this office for review prior to plugging operations.

L. Operator Change: This permit is not transferable without the consent of the Director. Any request for permit transfer shall be filed with the Director or Director's Delegate.

Provided, that should it be determined that injected fluids are not confined to the cavern and well, then the permission given herein shall be suspended until the nature of the leak is determined and remedied.

# Broncos rally for win over Dolphins

DENVER (AP) — Demaryius Thomas came up 13 yards short in his bid to tie Calvin Johnson's NFL record of eight straight 100-yard games. His consolation prize wasn't too shabby. Thomas caught three of Peyton Manning's four touchdown throws in Denver's 39-36, come-from-behind win over the Miami Dolphins on Sunday. Coming up just short of

Megatron's mark didn't seem to bother Thomas too much. "Nah," Thomas said. "I just wanted to win the game. I had a decent game, helped the team. The main thing is we won the game." The Broncos (8-3), who had lost two of three, entered the fourth quarter trailing by 11. Thomas' third TD and Emmanuel Sanders' 2-point reception pulled

Tannehill hit Jarvis Landry from a yard out and Lamar Miller's 2-point dive made it a three-point game with 1:34 remaining. Miami's onside kick was recovered by — who

else? — Anderson, who also had four catches for 28 yards. Actually, Anderson needed a 26-yard scamper on second down to seal the win. "You just have to give it up to the big boys up front. They took so much heat the outside and the media all week," said Anderson, who had come to the defense of the much-maligned O-line last week.

Rodriguez helped Big Spring weather the storm by throwing in 11 of the Lady Steers' 13 third-quarter points. Overall, she buried three three-point shots and a pair of free throws in the frame.

"Julianna played a huge role in pushing the ball in the fast break, hitting four three-pointers, and also attacking the middle of the 1-3-1 zone to draw the foul and get to the free throw line," stated Smalley.

"She took care of the ball and helped us limit turnovers."

Diamonique Mays tallied Big Spring's only other points in the third.

The Lady Steers held a 32-26 lead at the start of the fourth quarter.

Defensively, Rodriguez led the BSHS squad in rebounding with six boards and four steals. Mayes and Castillo both added five rebounds, while Ruiz chalked up four steals.

"Overall, I'm very happy with the outcome of the game," Smalley said. "The girls are beginning to show their intensity on the floor."

With the win, Big Spring improved to 2-2 heading into tonight's showdown with Coahoma.
