SWCID to get some much-needed housing

Howard College officials are taking steps to ease a housing crunch at SouthWest Collegiate Institute for the Deaf.

During their Monday meeting, college trustees approved a plan officials hope will soon

result in three housing "pods" being constructed at SWCID.

Each of the three pods will consist of five 900-square-foot cottages, which will each house a family, or four students, College President Dr. Cheryl Sparks said.

The cottages will replace

manufactured housing currently being used on the cam-

The project will be the culmination of a three-year process to provide adequate housing at SWCID, Sparks

"We've had increased en-

rollment at SWCID, so we needed additional housing," she said. "The first thing we did was purchase manufactured housing for the students. Since then, we've been working on a more permanent solution."

Private donations raised

so far should be sufficient to finance construction of site infrastructure — water lines, electricity, etc. — and at least the first of the three pods. Hopefully, that first step will entice further contributions

Transmission tower to *be demolished Friday*

The demolition of the old transmission KWAB-TV tower just east of Memorial Stadium will be akin to folding a piece of paper — except the "paper" is 500 feet long and weighs several thousand pounds.

The tower, the last vestige of the TV station that served Big Spring for more than 20 years, will come down Friday morning in a demolition that will feature no explosions and very little drama, officials say.

Terry Hansen of Howard College, which owns the land encompassing the old TV

station, said the demolition process will consist of folding the sections of the tower upon themselves.

Crews will cut the the guy wires holding the top section of the tower, causing it to fold down, then do the same for the middle and base sections before the tower finally collapses in an easterly direction.

Hansen said the process does not pose any kind of threat to homes in the area.

"(Demolition officials) said they can bring the tower down anywhere we want them to ... I don't believe any homes in the neighborhood will be affected," he said.



Taliban storm Pakistani school, killing at least 84 people in worst attack in over a year

PESHAWAR, Pakistan (AP) — Taliban gunmen stormed a military-run school in the northwestern Pakistani city of Peshawar on Tuesday, killing at least 84 people, officials said, in the worst attack to hit the country in over

The overwhelming majority of the victims were students at the army public school, which has children and teenagers in grades 1-10.

The horrific violence, carried out by a relatively small number of militants from the Tehreek-e-Taliban group, a Pakistani militant group trying to overthrow the government, also sent dozens of wounded flooding into local hospitals as terrified parents searched for their children.

The attack began in the morning hours, with about half a dozen gunmen entering the school — and shooting at random, said police officer Javed Khan. Army commandos quickly arrived at the scene and exchanged fire with the gunmen, he said.

Outside the school, shooting was initially heard along with one loud bang of unknown origin. Details were sketchy in the face of the overwhelming tragedy. Pakistani television showed soldiers surrounding the area and pushing people back.

Australian prime minister lays flowers at memorial

SYDNEY (AP) — Tearful Australians laid mounds of flowers at the site where two of 17 hostages were killed Tuesday when police swooped into a cafe to rescue them from a gunman — an Iranian-born self-styled cleric described by the prime minister as a deeply disturbed person carrying out a "sick fantasy."

The 16-hour siege that ended in a barrage of gunfire early Tuesday left the

gunman, 50-year-old Man Haron Monis, dead, and a nation that has long prided itself on its peace rocked to its core.

At a news conference later in the day, Prime Minister Tony Abbott called the siege Australia's first brush with terrorism in more than 35 years and addressed the most glaring question that has emerged from the crisis: How did Monis — a man with a lengthy criminal record — slip through the cracks?

"How can someone who has had such a long and checkered history not be on the appropriate watch list? And how can someone like that be entirely at large in the community?" Abbott asked. "These are questions we need to look at carefully and calmly and methodically. That's what we'll be doing in the days and weeks ahead."

Woman feared ex-husband before rampage that killed her. 5 relatives

PENNSBURG, Pa. (AP) — A woman who told neighbors she feared her exhusband would kill her was among six people found fatally shot in three suburban Philadelphia homes, and her Marine veteran former husband was on the run.

Suspect Bradley Michael Stone, 35, remained at large early Tuesday, causing one local school district to close schools as a precaution.

His former wife, 33-year-old Nicole Stone, was found dead after a neighbor saw Stone fleeing just before 5 a.m. Monday with their two young daughters.

Police then made the grim discovery of five people killed in two other houses: Stone's sister, brother-in-law and 14-year-old niece were dead. A 17-year-old

nephew was left clinging to life. And hermother and grandmother

Bird Poop: A kestrel for Christmas

rom the Midland office came the directions to the ranch. Only a few miles from its gate and cattle guard, the game war-

den was fortunate this time to be in the right county at the right time. In the

farthest, most western part of his

district, the officer was familiar with long drives. Once he had picked up the bird, he would check out some other calls as he worked his way back to the Texas Parks & Wildlife headquarters.

As he neared the ranch owner's home, a bevy of dogs ran to greet him. Varying in sizes, shapes, and questionable pedigrees, the animals had either been dumped by the gate, or had somehow found their way to a dog's paradise.

Amidst the barking and tail wagging came the couple that had spent most of their married life in the rugged western part of Texas. After calming the dogs and directing them back to the house, they walked with the officer to the barn.

The tall, wooden structure was a haven during winter months. One side offered the horses a choice of individual stables. Opposite this area were towering stacks of hay and a loft. Their chickens felt free to come and go, as did sparrows and mice, either for a nesting site or the grains scattered on the dirt

every movement. Over the course of days, the woman had noticed that the bird could fly, but not elevate. Apparently, it was subsisting on the mice and sparrows it could catch with its feet. She and her husband had been successful in herding it into the room.

Hurrying toward the opening the officer had created, the bird tried to escape. Startled and trapped when a large towel suddenly covered it, the small raptor began to protest with shrill, ear-piercing

screams.

By the time the game warden delivered it to Midland, only 30 minutes remained for the workday. From the receptionist's description of size, coloration, beak and talons, we knew TP&W had one of our country's smallest falcons. Traffic and distance precluded our getting the bird until the following day.

Before placing the American kestrel in our carrier, extension of its narrow, pointed wings led to no obvious breaks. However, on the right wing was a tiny lump at the third joint, or wrist of the wing structure.

With a wingspan of nearly 24 inches, this bird of prey would normally hover and glide with ease. Was this

calcification of a break? Would the kestrel eventually fly?

Our drive back to Big Spring was a dusty one. December's winds would have been even worse around Lamesa if we had tried to deliver the falcon to South Plains in Lubbock. Since the bird would

have to spend a few days with us, a large carrier with a log for perching was provided. Mindful of its slender toes and needle-sharp talons, I was able to transfer it to temporary quarters without feeling the wrath it could inflict on my fingers.

For five days, the weather kept challenging the weather forecasters. By early morning, their predictions from the previous night had been cast aside.

It was enjoyable to once again experience the presence of a male kestrel. As he relished a freshly thawed mouse, we could observe his distinctive attire.

The rusty patch on his bluish-gray crown and the two black stripes down the sides of his white face made colorful accents to his head. A terra cotta color on

his back was barred with black. His slateblue wings that tapered toward his black primaries would hopefully some day give him the ability to fly again while seeking prev.

With his buff-colored belly adorned with black spots and his rufous tail heightened by a broad black band ending with a white tip, he was a handsome dude.

On day six we took advantage of a crisp,

but calm morning. At the wildlife center, Gail Barnes also felt the tiny spot on the bird's wrist. Later in the day, she called to confirm the

calcification. The kestrel's being in the barn had supplied it with a ready food source while it had been recovering from its misfortune. Due to its inactivity while mending, muscle tone and stamina would have to be reestablished before it could be a strong flier. With time, she thought it would be

releasable. Christmas had come early that year. Our gift was to know that the smallest of falcons might once again claim

the sky as his own.

Murray could Cowboys' next game with injury

IRVING (AP) — NFL rushing leader DeMarco Murray has a broken left hand in what could be a damaging blow to the playoff hopes of the Dallas Cowboys.

Murray was set for surgery Monday and might be sidelined Sunday at home against Indianapolis, already a playoff qualifier. Even though the Cowboys just beat Philadelphia to take the NFC East lead, they might have to win both of their remaining games to end a fouryear postseason drought.

If the Eagles beat division

also-rans Washington and the New York Giants in their final two games, Dallas (10-4) could be knocked out by a loss to the Colts even with a win against the Redskins in the regularseason finale.

Cowboys executive vice president Stephen Jones said on his radio show Monday that it was "probably a tough expectation" that Murray would play against Indianapolis (10-4), though he wouldn't rule it out.

"The biggest question we have to ask ourselves is, is he functional to do his job," coach

Jason Garrett said. "Can he hold the football, can he carry it under duress, can he block, can he do the things necessary to play the position. He's as strong-willed and determined an individual as I've ever been around. If anybody has a chance to come back, he does."


Murray has 1,687 yards rushing and needs 87 yards to break all-time NFL rushing leader Emmitt Smith's franchise record of 1,773 yards. The fourthyear back is 409 yards ahead of Pittsburgh's Le'Veon Bell in the race for the rushing title.

Lance Dunbar and Joseph Randle split carries as Murray's backup in Sunday's 38-27 win over Philadelphia. Murray was injured near the end of the game. Television footage showed him leaving the field while wincing in pain.

The Cowboys have had Ryan Williams on their practice squad all season. He was taken 33 picks ahead of Murray by Arizona in the 2011 draft. The Cardinals released him after three mostly injury-plagued seasons. Randle, a fifth-round pick last year, has 34 carries for

237 yards and two touchdowns, including a 17-yarder on his only carry against Chicago two weeks ago.

Dunbar has 26 carries for 91 yards but has done most of his damage as a receiver with 16 catches for 207 yards. He doesn't have any touchdowns. An undrafted free agent in his third season, Dunbar had a breakout game on Thanksgiving last year with a team-high 82 yards before sustaining a knee injury in that game against Oakland, knocking him out for the rest of the season.

Manziel: Loss in first start was 'humbling'

BEREA, Ohio (AP) — Along with being sacked, embarrassed taunted, and generally mistreated Sunday by the Cincinnati Bengals, Johnny Manziel got humbled.

The Browns rookie quarterback said Monday that his first NFL start, a 30-0 loss that essentially eliminated Cleveland from the playoffs, was the toughest day he's ever had on a football field.

"It's the first game I've ever not scored a point in and been shut out," Manziel said. "I've played in a lot of games from high school through college, and that one, and I've never been shut out until then. It was definitely tough."

And humbling?

"Absolutely," he said. "Very humbling."

Unable to move Cleveland's offense, Manziel completed just 10 of 18 passes for 80 yards. He was intercepted twice, chased around like a fox trying to escape hungry hounds and looked lost in the Browns' biggest game of the season. This wasn't the debut he, legions of his fans or anyone in Cleveland's organization had in mind when he was promoted to replace Brian Hoyer after 13 games.

"You just don't really envision that in your head when you're good throughout the week and you have a really good week of practice," Manziel said. "You feel really confident and really prepared, and then something like that happens."

The Browns ran just 38

offensive plays, gained 107 total yards, crossed the 50-yard line just once and got only five first downs - two of them via defensive penalties.

The team was bad, Manziel was bad but coach Mike Pettine, whose decision to start Manziel is now being debated as aggressively as his choice to bench Hoyer last week, said the performance doesn't cast any doubts on his potential to be a franchise quarterback.

"I think it's too small a sample size," Pettine said. "When you look at how we played around him, I think it's very unfair to judge what somebody's career is going to be like off of their first start. I'm sure you could go back and find a lot of regrettable performances in the first start."

Pettine reiterated the Browns (7-7) will stick with Manziel over the final two games against Carolina and Baltimore. The team isn't viewing it as an audition for Manziel's future. Pettine said there's a chance the team could go into the offseason with its quarterback situation unclear because three games isn't long enough to accurately evaluate any quarter-

"We'll have a sense (of Manziel), but I still think there will be question marks," Pettine said. "No matter what happens. We'll have a sense, but it's something that I don't think it's going to confirm one way or the other the opinion."




