County Day in Austin deadline nears

The deadline to order shirts for Howard County Day at the state Capitol is fast approaching.

The specially-designed, black Howard County shirt costs \$29 and the deadline to order one in time for the biennial event is Jan. 7. Orders are being taken at the Big Spring Area Chamber of Commerce building, 215 W. Third St.

Every two years, when state lawmakers meet for session, a group of Howard County residents and leaders make a day trip to the state Capitol in an effort to leave an impression on the minds of the legisla-

Howard County Day at the state Capitol is set for Feb. 10. Reservations are now being taken for a chartered bus heading to Austin for the event. The cost to reserve a seat is \$40 and the deadline is Feb. 2.


Also those who attend are asked to wear the Howard County shirt and khaki pants or skirts.

A full day of activities are planned for the Austin trip. The bus will leave at 4:30 a.m. from the east parking lot of the Dorothy Garrett Coliseum. At 10 a.m., event organizers

are hoping to fill the chamber balcony with Howard County supports when the house reads a resolution making Feb. 10, 2014 Howard County Day at the Capitol. A second resolution is expected to be read at 11 a.m. on the floor of the senate.

At noon, a group photo is schedule to be taken in the rotunda of the state Capitol and then the Big Spring High School choral group, "Rhap-

5 things to know

BRACKETTVILLE, Texas (AP) — A Texas businessman wants to revive Alamo Village, the movie set built by John Wayne for his epic film about the historic Alamo siege. It's been closed since 2009. Here are five things to know about the 400-acre park's history:

- Nearly a half-dozen Alamo-themed TV shows or movies were made there, as well as hundreds of other productions. One was the acclaimed 1989 TV miniseries "Lonesome Dove," where Alamo Village served as a stand-in for San Antonio, Fort Worth and Santa Rosa, New Mexico. A cantina used in the series, which also was a restaurant for tourists, has a saloon bar that came from a San Francisco

brothel. — Wayne's 1960 movie was nominated in 1961 for seven Oscars: best picture, supporting actor (Chill Wills), color cinematography, editing, sound and two for music, including the song "The Green Leaves of Summer." It only won

— "The Alamo" was among the top ten grossing movies in the U.S. in 1960, with nearly \$8 million in box office receipts. But that equaled only two-thirds of its \$12 million budget, a good part of it financed by Wayne himself. TV rights purchased a decade later by NBC put the film in the black, ac-

cording to IMDb.com. - Happy and Virginia Shahan owned the 22,000-acre ranch. He was a former mayor of Brackettville and lured

Will 'The Alamo' fall?

Movie set used by John Wayne fading away

BRACKETTVILLE, Texas - Time and Mother Nature are threatening to dismantle the Alamo. Not the original, but the replica 18th-century Spanish mission and Old West movie set John Wayne built for his Oscar-nominated 1960 movie and that for decades was a tourist mecca and film production site.

"It's not just something that represents history to a movie set — it is now history for sure," says Rich Curilla, the one-man curator and custodian of the now-closed Alamo

Village. Alamo Village, a 400-acre plot of land about 120 miles west of San Antonio, was carved out of a large ranch in the late 1950s for Wayne's directorial debut. Starring Richard Widmark as Jim Bowie and Wayne as Davy Crockett, "The Alamo" had an estimated \$12 million budget, huge for its

time. The4-foot-thick Alamo facade was modeled off a 1936 map of the historic building - drawn up for the Texas centennial that year - and set construction took nearly two years.

"To Hollywood, a movie set is just a means to an end," said Curilla, a film and Alamo historian who spent his

summers in college during the late 1960s at the site and began working there full-time in 1988. "I think Wayne was cognizant of building a monument and not just a movie set."

In its heyday. Wayne's Alamo hosted Jimmy

Stewart, Dean Martin, Raquel Welch and even Willie Nelson. It's where James Arness

In all, nearly 40 major film and TV productions, plus hundreds of commercials, documentaries and music videos were shot at Alamo Village. And musical shows, comedy skits and staged gunfights drew hundreds of tourists daily.

"It was magical," said Penny Loewen, who was 18 in 1979 when she arrived from tiny St. Francisville, Illinois. She stayed for three years,





Judge busy with more than Perry case

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The Republican judge overseeing the criminal case against Gov. Rick Perry is also preparing to join the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals in January.

That's not all Judge Bert Richardson has on his plate. The 58-year-old San Antonio judge is also juggling a regular docket and high-profile murder cases while Perry's high-powered legal team tries convincing Richardson to dismiss abuse-of-power charges. Richardson is an avid photog-

rapher outside the courtroom and away from his rising national profile. He told the San Antonio Express-News that his taking pictures for a running magazine helps him forget about his day job and blend into the crowd.

Perry is accused of trying to leverage his power to force the resignation of Travis County District Attorney Rosemary Lehmberg following her conviction on drunken-driving charges.

schools still crave bond relief AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Fast-

growing Texas school districts that are absorbing the bulk of new enrollment in the state want more financial latitude to build more classrooms.

Nearly three dozen districts last year maxed out a state-mandated cap on local school bond debt. Data from the Texas Education Agency shows that is up from just five districts in 2008 and none in

The Austin American-Statesman reported Friday that districts will again lobby lawmakers for relief starting in January. But many cast doubt on the chances

of success in the Republicandominated and debt-loathing Legislature.

Schools say the problem is declining state funding. Conservative analysts say districts are inappropriately financing shortterm items such as buses and should re-examine spending.

More than 600 districts sued the state in 2011 over \$5.4 billion in classroom cuts.

New state building plans vetoed by Perry resurface

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Rising office rent prices in downtown Austin has lawmakers again pushing for two new state buildings after Gov. Rick Perry vetoed those construction plans in 2013. One proposed 360,000-square-

foot addition would be the first new office building in the Capitol complex since 2000. The Texas Facilities Commission says construction would cost \$174 million but also get nearly one-fourth of the state's existing leases in Austin off the books.

Republican state Sen. Kevin Eltife told the Austin American-Statesman that the plans make sense given escalating rent prices as the Austin economy flourishes. Perry had cited waiting for a

new master Capitol complex plan due in 2016 when he vetoed the construction two years ago. Supporters are now hoping for better luck under Gov.-elect Greg Abbott, who takes office in Janu-



nod became a man to save us from our sins, which he did finally and completely on the Cross. We commemorate his death and resurrection on Easter, but his suffering on our behalf began much earlier than

Seminary professor Bob Tuttle, in his 2006 book, "Shortening the Leap," puts that in perspective poignantly: "The Jesus of glory still bears the marks of the Incarnation, and not just in his hands, his side and his feet, but in his navel, because the suffering began in the man-

ger, not on the Cross." Tuttle continues: "All of the Incarnation was a passion narrative — cradle to grave. Mel Gibson's movie The Passion doesn't know the half of it. It hurts God

to be squeezed into sperm and

implanted in a mama."

Bishop Fulton Sheen, in his "Life of Christ," made this very point as he put Christ's incarnation in terms of a gripping metaphor. "It is hard for a human being to understand the humility that was involved in the Word becoming flesh," wrote Sheen. "Imagine, if it were possible, a human person divesting himself of his body, and then sending his soul into the body of a serpent. A double humiliation would follow: first, accepting the limitations of a serpentine organism, knowing all the while his mind was superior, and that fangs could not adequately articulate thoughts no serpent ever possessed. The second humiliation would be to be forced as a result of this 'emptying of self' to live in the companionship of

form of man and accepted the limitations of humanity, such as hunger and persecution; not trivial either was it for the Wisdom of God to condemn Himself to association with poor fishermen who knew so little. But this humiliation which began ... when He was conceived in the Virgin Mary was only the first of many to counteract the pride of man, until the final humiliation of death on the Cross." These great theological think-

ers don't make this stuff up. They're not fashioning their theology out of whole cloth. God's revealed Word tells the story.

The writer of Hebrews explains: "Therefore he had to be made like his brothers in every respect, so that he might become a merciful and faithful high priest in the service of God, to make propitiation for the sins of the people.

For because he himself has suffered when tempted, he is able to help those who are being tempted."

The Apostle Paul, in his letter to the Philippians, describes it this way: "Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death,

even death on a cross.' I think we sometimes forget to emphasize sufficiently that Christ's selfless, substitutionary death on the Cross so that we could live was preceded by his 30-plus years on this planet as a human being, suffering all the indignities of humanity so that he could fully experience, literally in the flesh, what we created mortals experience — and far worse. (His separation from the Father and his acceptance of

God's wrath for all of our past, present and future sins were greater suffering than we could imagine, well beyond anything any of us will ever experience.)

Our God is personal and relational. He created us in his image to enjoy fellowship with him and with one another. Our omniscient Creator doesn't merely understand our suffering intellectually. He doesn't just comprehend our human relationships by way of analogy in the sense that he has always enjoyed fellowship within the Holy Trinity.

Jesus Christ became and remains not just the Deity but a human being who has related to us and continues to relate to us not just as our God but also as a

Among the unspeakable marvels of God is that though he is utterly beyond our comprehension — his perfection, his infinity and his wisdom are unfathomable to us — he is also wholly accessible to us. He not only is available but invites us to have a personal relationship with him.

Because he loves us, he died on the Cross for us. But never forget that years before he completed his work on the Cross, he was born for us — as a little, dependent baby in his earthly mother's arms — in Bethlehem.

It is the event of his birth that we celebrate at Christmas, without which there would have been no Cross, without which there would be no life everlasting for us.



But he did have serious rivals for that honor in 2014. One of them is the self-proclaimed Islamic State, a radical organization (also known as ISIL and ISIS) that proclaimed a caliphate in territory spanning large swaths of Syria and Iraq. Beheading American journalists was only its most visible atrocity. "The array of violations and abuses perpetrated by ISIL and associated armed groups is staggering," said Zeid Ra'ad Al Hussein, the U.N. high commissioner for human rights.

The group managed the nearly human rights environment in Syria. During the civil war, said Human Rights Watch, dictator Bashar Assad has subjected "tens of thousands of people to arbitrary arrests, unlawful detentions, enforced disappearances, ill-treatment, and torture." He also used poison gas against rebels in 2013 and apparently again this year.

Autocracy showed staying powsia's Vladimir Putin hosted the Winter Olympics, seized Crimea from Ukraine and launched a

crackdown on dissent unparalleled in his country since Soviet days

The World Internet Conference somehow chose to convene in China, whose government blocks thousands of websites. In response to protests in Hong Kong, Beijing set a record for the number of social media posts it deleted.

Religious extremism fared well in many places. In Nigeria, the Islamist group Boko Haram -- whose name means "Western education is sinful" -- kidnapped more than 200 schoolgirls, who have not yet been recovered.

Pakistan's Taliban massacred 145 people, including 132 children, at a school in Peshawar, the country's worst terrorist attack. Jihadi militias in Libya captured Tripoli, forcing the elected Parliament to flee the capital.

That was just one reason enemies of the Arab Spring were cheering. Former Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak was acquitted for his role in the killing of 239 protesters before the 2011 The military regime that

overturned that revolution took measures to stamp out protests and shut down independent civic organizations. The lone success in the region was Tunisia, where secularist parties won national elections and the presidency and Islamists accepted defeat. In Afghanistan, where the U.S.

has spent 13 years trying to implant democracy, outside election monitors found "highly worrying indications of potentially widespread fraud" in the presidential runoff, such as many polling stations reporting 100 percent of the votes for one candidate. Botswana, the only African

nation to have consistently held free elections ever since gaining independence, had another one. Violent demonstrations in Burkina Faso forced the resignation of Blaise Compaore, who took power in a military coup in 1987. He had been in power even longer than 90-year-old Robert Mugabe

of Zimbabwe, who carried out a mass purge of his government, apparently to ensure that his wife will someday succeed him.

A U.S. Senate committee exposed the CIA's record of subjecting suspected terrorists to waterboarding, sleep deprivation, "rectal feeding" and other barbarities. But the Obama administration ignored a treaty signed by Ronald Reagan requiring prosecution of those who engage in torture. The only CIA employee involved in the program who has gone to prison is the one who exposed it.

Brazilian President Dilma Rousseff, a former leftist guerrilla who was tortured in prison during the 1970s, wept upon receiving the report of the National Truth Commission about the military junta that was in charge then. Two former Chilean air force officers were sent to prison for the fatal 1974 torture of Alberto Bachelet, whose daughter, Michelle, is now president.

Americans and Cubans who thought they would have to wait for the death of Fidel Castro for normal relations and more commerce saw them happen during his lifetime. The day after announcing the change, President Barack Obama imposed sanctions on Cuba's closest ally, Venezuela, for human rights violations against protesters, some of whom were killed.

Venezuela's was just one of the governments that felt beset by dangers requiring brutal methods of self-defense. But there and in many other places, many of the worst dangers are posed by those in power.





Beachside memorials and prayers across Asia mark 10th anniversary of Indian Ocean tsunami

BANDA ACEH, Indonesia (AP) — Crying onlookers took part in beachside memorials and religious services across Asia on Friday to mark the 10th anniversary of the Indian Ocean tsunami that left more than a quarter million people dead in one of modern history's worst natural disasters.

The devastating Dec. 26, 2004, tsunami struck a dozen countries around the Indian Ocean rim, killing 230,000 people. It eradicated entire coastal communities, decimated families and crashed over tourist-filled beaches the morning after Christmas. Survivors waded through a horror show of corpse-

As part of Friday's solemn commemorations, survivors, government officials, diplomats and families of victims gathered in Indonesia, Thailand, Sri Lanka, India and elsewhere. Moments of silence were planned in several spots to mark the exact time the tsunami struck, a moment that united the world in grief.

"I cannot forget the smell of the air, the water at that time ... even after 10 years," said Teuku Ahmad Salman, a 51-year-old resident who joined thousands of people in a prayer service in Banda Aceh, Indonesia.

"I cannot forget how I lost hold of my wife, my kids, my house," he said sobbing, recounting that he refused to believe for years that they had died but finally gave up looking for them.

Sony's 'The Interview' woes highlight struggle to meld gadget, entertainment businesses

TOKYO (AP) — Sony's iconic gadgetry and the star appeal of Hollywood may have appeared to be a perfect match when the electronics giant bought Columbia Pictures in 1989. A quarter century later, it's apparent that Sony Corp. has not attained the magic synergy it was hoping for.

The stolid silence of Sony's Tokyo headquarters over the hoopla surrounding Sony Pictures Entertainment's "The Interview" underscores the longstanding divide between the Japanese parent company and its U.S.-led and -run motion pictures subsidiary, successor to Columbia Pictures. Marrying the cultures of Sony Corp., a quintes-

sentially Japanese company, and its Hollywood studio was such a challenge that company founder Akio Morita and his successor as chairman, Norio Ohga, never really tried, analysts say. Instead, they left Sony Pictures to mostly run it-

"They're separate businesses run by separate management," said Damian Thong, a senior analyst at Macquarie Capital Securities (Japan). "Since the late 1990s it's been run basically as a stand-alone business." Sony Corp. in Tokyo refused requests for com-

ment on developments related to "The Interview," referring all inquiries to Sony Pictures in the U.S. After first withdrawing the movie from a planned Christmas release on as many as 3,000 screens, Sony Pictures made the movie available on various

digital platforms Wednesday, a day after Sony and independent theaters agreed to release it in over 300 venues on Christmas.

Vermont in the 1960s as part of the counterculture, back-to-the-land movement that turned the state from solid Yankee Republican into one of the bluest in the country.

With Christmas visit to US troops, Obama marks end of combat in Afghanistan, says world safer

KANEOHE BAY, Hawaii (AP) — President Barack Obama marked the end of more than a decade of combat in Afghanistan by paying tribute to America's military, telling troops on Christmas

Day that their sacrifices have allowed for a more peaceful, prosperous world to emerge out of the

At an oceanfront Marine Corps base in Hawaii, Obama told troops that while tough challenges remain for the U.S. military in hotspots like Iraq and West Africa, the world as a whole is better off because American troops put country first and served

He said Americans and their president could not be more thankful.

"Because of the extraordinary service of the men and women in the American armed forces, Afghanistan has a chance to rebuild its own country," Obama said to applause from Marines and their families. "We are safer. It's not going to be a source of terrorist attacks again." Thirteen years and \$1 trillion later, the U.S. is

preparing to pull the vast majority of its combat troops out of Afghanistan by year's end, as the U.S. and its partners seek to turn the page on a bloody chapter that started the day that al-Qaida militants struck American soil on Sept. 11, 2011. From a peak 140,000 troops in 2010, the U.S. and NATO plan to leave just 13,500 behind for training and battlefield

Although there are reasons for cautious optimism, including a new Afghan president whose seriousness of effort has inspired U.S. confidence, the broader picture still looks glim.

Ahead of polls, some Israeli ultra-Orthodox women call for greater representation

JERUSALEM (AP) — A struggle for women's rights is brewing within Israel's deeply conservative ultra-Orthodox community, where women, largely shut out of politics, are beginning to demand greater representation in the country's par-

More than 20 percent of Israeli lawmakers are female, but not one woman serves from the country's two ultra-Orthodox, or haredi, parties. In haredi communities, women are expected to manage a home, raise children and provide an income for the family, often while the husband studies Torah.

Those beliefs remain firmly entrenched, but in the run-up to the March 17 elections, traditional views of the role of women in haredi politics are being challenged in mainstream and ultra-Orthodox media — a shift that activists say marks a major stride toward more equitable representation.

The two haredi parties in the Knesset, Shas and United Torah Judaism, have long been central players in Israeli coalition governments, often figuring as kingmakers. Each party represents observant Jews who tend to vote based on their rabbis' instructions, and who largely oppose having women as lawmakers because it would be considered

Only a few haredi women have served in parliament, but never as members of ultra-Orthodox parties, and those who have served usually faced a backlash from their communities.

Women do serve in the Jewish Home party, which mainly represents less conservative Modern Or-

James hears plenty of cheers in return to Miami

MIAMI (AP) — LeBron James was running the gamut of emotions Thursday when he arrived at the arena that he called home for the past four seasons.

So did the Miami Heat fans who were seeing him again.

They booed the four-time NBA MVP when he and the Cleveland Cavaliers took the court for warmups, booed the first few times he touched the ball, gave him plenty of cheers but still a mixed welcome when he was introduced as a starter, then cheered when he turned the ball over on one of his first touches.

But perhaps the truest measure of how James is remem-

bered came during the first timeout of the game, when the Heat unveiled a tribute video for their former star — a minute-long series of clips commemorating his four NBA Finals runs and two titles in Miami, after which he waved to the crowd and got a lengthy standing ovation.

"I'll look forward to seeing it one day," Heat coach Erik Spoelstra said. "It was an incredible run. He was a major part of it. None of us have forgotten his contribution. I'll look back on it with incredible pride and perspective that I coached one of the all-time greats."

No, Miami isn't happy he

left.

Also, no, Miami hasn't forgotten what he meant to the Heat.

"I gave everything and more to this city when I was here," James said before the game, his first time back at the arena since leaving Miami for Cleveland this past summer. "Never disrespected this city or the franchise, or any of my teammates. Everything is professional. I gave it all. That's all I can do."

James took a seat on the scorers' table near midcourt for the last 30 seconds or so of that video, watching it on the giant overhead screen.

"I've got a lot of memories

here, man," James said.

It was predictably an emotional return for James, who acknowledged feeling butterflies when he walked in and headed toward the visitors' locker room. He scored 30 points, but his Cavaliers lost to the Heat, 101-91.

Many from the nearest seats took pictures when James did his traditional powder toss before taking the court, and he exchanged huge hugs with several Heat players moments later. He also pointed toward the Heat bench and tapped his heart.

"What me and my teammates created here while we were here, it's going to last forever," James said. "You can never take that out of the books. You can never take that from anything. Whatever else that comes with it, we'll deal with it then."

He said he didn't "circle" Thursday's game on his calendar, saying he's long past things like that.

"LeBron was an enormous figure here," Cavaliers coach David Blatt said. "He was part of a great run. Obviously, there's going to be emotion and a lot of feeling and a lot of excitement. You just can't look past that because you want to. That's going to happen. You just have to try to roll with it. I thought he handled it well."

Spurs fall to Westbrook, Thunder

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Russell Westbrook smiled as he walked off the court in San Antonio, blowing a kiss to a spectator and waving at the few Oklahoma City Thunder fans in attendance.

The joyful tidings were a drastic change from the scowling, screaming, chest-thumping passion Westbrook showed after essentially walking into the Spurs' home on Christmas and kicking aside their presents.

Westbrook had 34 points and 11 as-

sists, and ignited a decisive run in the fourth quarter to help Oklahoma City beat San Antonio 114-106 on Thursday.

"Regardless of what's going on like I

"Regardless of what's going on, like I said before and I'm going to keep saying it, my job is to attack," Westbrook said. He led the Thunder to their sixth

straight regular-season victory over the defending NBA champions in the first meeting between the teams since San Antonio topped Oklahoma City in six games on the way to a fifth title.

The Thunder were without reigning MVP Kevin Durant, and the Spurs were missing Finals MVP Kawhi Leonard, but there was still plenty of firepower thanks to Oklahoma City's emotional point guard

Westbrook was 14 for 28 from the field and had five rebounds and five steals over 35 minutes.

"You've just got to rally behind him," said Thunder guard Anthony Morrow, who had 15 points. "He's a leader, natural born. He comes out there, he plays hard."

Serge Ibaka had 21 points, including going 3 for 4 on 3-pointers for Oklahoma City (14-16).

It was a physical rematch between the rivals, with referees having to separate Kendrick Perkins and Manu Ginobili in the first half, and Westbrook and Cory Joseph in the second.

"I thought they outplayed us almost in every facet of the game," San Antonio coach Gregg Popovich said. "When somebody retrieves 50 percent of their shots, you can't say you're focused or playing competitive in any way, shape

James, Curry lead NBA All-Star voting

Cowboys' Martin making quick impression in Dallas

IRVING, Texas (AP) — Zack Martin's best test so far of durability as a pro came with a right ankle injury serious enough to keep him out of practice for a week with the Cowboys.

The rookie right guard's response: I'm playing.

"It certainly fits with everything I know about him," Dallas coach Jason Garrett said. "He's a little bit of a throwback. He reminds you of linemen who played 25 years ago. He just has this way about him."

Martin is possibly the last firstround piece of a rebuilt offensive line for the Cowboys, a versatile blocker with more starts at Notre Dame than anyone in school history. And now he's the first rookie lineman named to the Pro Bowl in Dallas franchise history.

"It's kind of an exclamation point on the season that he's had," said center Travis Frederick, a first-round pick last year and another first-time Pro Bowl player. "We talked about it several times throughout the season, how he's never really come in and played like a rookie. He's always played like a veteran."

Tyron Smith, a two-time Pro Bowl pick at left tackle, was Dallas' top choice from 2011.

Martin's resolve was tested just weeks after the Cowboys picked him at No. 16. He was already the guy Dallas took instead of Johnny Manziel, who was unexpectedly still on the board. And then he got caught up in a play that ended standout linebacker Sean Lee's season in the first full squad workout of the offseason.

Lee was about to engage with

Martin in a noncontact drill when his left knee gave way, tearing the anterior cruciate ligament. There was video for all to see, and it was easy to forget that Lee's knee buckled before Martin rolled over the top of him.

Martin stood tall when he was questioned about the play by reporters.

"It sucks to be kind of grouped into that play and him getting hurt," Martin said at the time. "I think he would say it first over anyone. You've got to move forward."

And that was the message from many of the veterans who pulled Martin aside, including Lee and tight end Jason Witten.

Harry Hiestand, Martin's line coach at Notre Dame, knew from the outset that his old pupil wouldn't have trouble getting over the Lee incident, promising that "he's not

reliving it."

Martin ha

Martin has spent the last five months proving it as a key component of soon-to-be NFL rushing champion DeMarco Murray's pursuit of all-time league leader Emmitt Smith's franchise record from 19 years ago. He has 1,745 yards, needing 29 yards to beat Smith's total of 1,773.

The 24-year-old Martin sprained his right ankle in a win at Philadelphia that gave the Cowboys the NFC East lead, and played without practicing in a division-clinching win over Indianapolis last week.

He came out only after the 42-7



1. Three clubs. You should continue to paint a picture of your distribution by bidding three clubs. Partner will assume you have a 5-4-1-3 pattern, though he might also allow for the possibility that you are 5-5-0-3 or 5-4-0-4.

superior game or slam in clubs. If partner has something like • 62 ♥ Q5 ♦ A98 ♣ KQ10832, six clubs would be an excellent contract, while three notrump would most likely go down after a diamond lead.

2. One notrump. Not all bids are cut-and-dried. In this case, it could be argued that one spade is a better rebid than one notrump. Which bid you make is largely a matter of which school you come from.

The great advantage of the notrump rebid is that it immediately limits the size and shape of your hand to 12 to 14 high-card points and balanced distribution.

The chief advantage of rebidding one spade is that it caters to the possibility that partner has four spades. The drawback is that the one-spade bid could be based on unbalanced distribution and anywhere from 12 to 18 high-card points, and is therefore highly ambiguous.

3. Partner should have four spades for his one-spade rebid and six diamonds for his jump-rebid of three diamonds over one notrump. His four-club bid must be based on three-card club support, so partner's distribution is virtually certain to be Your three-club bid might lead to a 4-0-6-3. Your next bid should be based on the high probability that this is his actual pattern.







Illini open Big Ten bowl slate at Heart of Dallas Bowl

DALLAS (AP) — Illinois needed to win its last two games to become bowl eligible, then had to wait another week before finding out if there would be more football.

Louisiana Tech knew after winning six of seven at the end of the regular season that it was going to a bowl. And the Bulldogs have already played an extra week, a tight 26-23 loss to Marshall in the Conference USA championship game.

Now the Illini (6-6) of the Big Ten and the Bulldogs (8-5), both coached by the sons of coaches, meet Friday in the Heart of Dallas Bowl that is played at historic Cotton Bowl Stadium. It's the first of 10 bowl games involving a Big Ten team, and the last of five for Conference USA.

"You want to go into your winter workouts with success and you want your seniors to leave with success," third-year Illinois coach Tim Beckman said. "They have done a great job with this program. I'm proud of them. We have made strides from

Day 1, and we are doing it on and off the football field."

This is the third time in five seasons the Illini go into a bowl 6-6. They won the previous two for a winning record, but that was before they

went 6-18 in Beckman's first two seasons.

Skip Holtz is wrapping up his second year at Louisiana Tech, which last played in a bowl game in 2011. The Bulldogs overcame a 2-3 start this season that included games against Oklahoma and Auburn, then both top-five teams.

'We knew it was going to be a challenging start," Holtz said. "We talked about we're a work in progress as a young team, and we had to grow and develop as the year went on, and I felt like they really did that."

The Bulldogs got a big boost from two graduate transfers: quarterback Cody Sokol and defensive end Houston Bates, who was a starter at Illinois before returning to his home state to finish his career. There was also the addition of defensive coordinator Manny Diaz.

"Kind of the land of misfit toys, when you look at Manny, myself, Houston Bates, Cody Sokol, that have all come together and gelled to put together something pretty special this season," Holtz said.
