Recharged after Hawaii vacation, Obama tests his sway in 2015 against GOP-run Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama this week will test whether he still has the sway to keep Washington focused on his own priorities, even as a new Republican-run Congress descends on the Capitol eager to take him on. Fresh off a two-week vacation, Obama immedi-

• DOMESTIC DISTUBANCE was reported in the ately began ramping up for his State of the Union address — his best chance to set the agenda for 2015 on his own terms. Obama will roll out new executive steps and proposals for Congress this week on home ownership, higher education and manufacturing jobs — a similar menu to the one Obama has offered in years past. Republicans have an entirely different blueprint

> for the start of the year. In full control of Congress for the first time of Obama's presidency, they planned an all-out offensive against his policies on immigration, foreign policy and the environment. In a sign of their divergent paths, just as lawmakers arrive in Washington to start the new Congress

> this week, Obama was heading out of town. He planned to spend most of the week in Michigan, Arizona and Tennessee showcasing how his own economic policies are fueling the economic recovery. The State of the Union comes early this year, on

> Jan. 20, and it is Obama's first with Republicans in control of both House and Senate.

Indonesia's aviation safety practices under fire after AirAsia crash, still no sign of plane PANGKALAN BUN, Indonesia (AP) — Highlight-

ing the depth of Indonesia's air safety problems, the transportation ministry revealed harsh measures Monday against everyone who allowed AirAsia Flight 8501 to take off without proper permits including the suspension of the airport's operator and officials in the control tower. The licenses and schedules of all airlines flying in

the country also will be examined to see if they are violating the rules, said Djoko Murjatmodjo, acting director general of air transportation.

The crackdown comes as searchers continue to fight bad weather while combing the Java Sea for bodies and wreckage of the Airbus A320 that crashed Dec. 28, killing all 162 on board.

The plane was traveling between Surabaya, Indonesia's second-largest city, and Singapore on a Sunday. Officials have since said its permit for the popular route was only for Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, and that AirAsia quietly switched three of those days. Officials in Singapore, however, have said the plane was authorized to fly on Sundays from its end.

While the airline is being investigated, Indonesia announced on Saturday that it banned all AirAsia flights between Surabaya and Singapore.

Analysis: Mexico scandals taint all levels of government, which offer only more of the same MEXICO CITY (AP) — As he heads to Washington

on Monday to meet with Barack Obama, Enrique Pena Nieto leaves behind a year that was hardly what he had envisioned. The Mexican president and his team started 2014

carrying out a slew of newly passed reforms, from breaking up telecommunications monopolies to opening the nation's energy sector, earning him international plaudits, including a Time magazine cover with his image above the caption "Saving Mexico." Then came a 1-2-3 punch of scandals: Soldiers kill-

ing 22 civilians in a questionable "shootout"; the abduction and presumed murder of 43 college students, allegedly at the hands of local officials and police in league with a drug cartel; and revelations that Pena Nieto and his treasury secretary live in luxury homes built and financed by a favorite government contractor. Tens of thousands have taken to the streets since

the 43 college students disappeared Sept. 26. Even institutions normally cautious about criticizing the government have spoken out, and a Mexican protester even disrupted the Nobel Peace Prize ceremony in Oslo, Norway. **MYERS & SMITH**



Romo, Cowboys rally past Lions, 24-20

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Face-down on the turf, Tony Romo pounded his hands into the ground like a petulant

Frustrated by yet another season-ending failure? Far from it. The Dallas quarterback was celebrating after giving the Cowboys the lead in a stirring playoff comeback.

Romo threw two touchdown passes to Terrance Williams, the second for the lead late in the fourth quarter, and the Cowboys rallied for a 24-20 wild-card win over Detroit on Sunday in their first playoff game in five years.

Dallas (13-4) wiped out an early two-touchdown deficit to advance to a divisional game in Green Bay, their first postseason visit there since a heartbreaking loss to the Packers in the Ice Bowl in 1967.

"You just have to stay in the moment and understand the game," Romo said. "It doesn't end after the first quarter, second quarter. You just have to keep calm. I've played enough

games to understand that. Maybe I didn't do that as well when I was younger."

The Lions (11-6) went 99 yards for one of two first-quarter touchdowns, but Matthew Stafford couldn't get them in the end zone again.

Detroit was driving with a 20-17 lead midway through the fourth quarter when referee Pete Morelli announced a pass interference penalty against Anthony Hitchens on a thirddown pass to Brandon Pettigrew. But officials reversed the call without explanation, and Sam Martin had a 10-yard punt after the Lions tried to draw Dallas offside on fourth-and-1.

Pettigrew said he didn't get an explanation, while Lions coach Jim Caldwell said he did – but didn't like it.

"Not a good enough one. I'm going to leave it at that," Caldwell said. "I'm not going to sit up here and act like that was the play that made a difference in the game. We still had our chances."

Romo took the Cowboys 59

yards in 11 plays, including a 21-yard pass to Jason Witten on fourth-and-6. The winner to Williams was an 8-yarder after Romo had several seconds to throw behind an offensive line among the league's best because Dallas has drafted linemen in the first round three of the past four years.

The Cowboys had to wait a little longer to celebrate. Rookie DeMarcus Lawrence gave the Lions the ball back with a fumble following Anthony Spencer's sack that knocked the ball loose from Stafford, who was 28 of 42 for 323 yards playing against his hometown team.

Lawrence redeemed himself on the clincher, sacking Stafford on fourth down near midfield in the final minute.

The Lions have not won a playoff game since the 1991 season, when they beat Dallas.

Dallas rode quick starts to a 4-0 December that carried it to the NFC East title, but a sluggish first quarter put the Cowboys in a hole.

Golden Tate bounced up from a flattening hit by C.J. Spillman on a punt return and beat Barry Church on a 51-yard pass to open the scoring. Church called out Tate on his radio show earlier in the week, saying the Cowboys were going to pay him back for a blindside block on linebacker Sean Lee that got Tate fined three years ago when he was with Seattle.

The Lions went up 14-0 on a drive that amounted to 99 3/4 yards. After Dekoda Watson ran into Martin to keep the drive alive, the 14-play drive ended with Reggie Bush badly faking Orlando Scandrick on an 18-yard scoring run.

Williams (three catches for 92 yards) pulled the Cowboys within seven when he took a short pass from Romo 76 yards to the end zone.

NFL rushing leader DeMarco Murray slogged his way to 75 yards on 19 carries against the NFL's best run defense, including a 1-vard plunge on fourth down that pulled Dallas to 20-14 late in the third quarter.

The Cowboys were coming off three straight 8-8 seasons that ended with losses that kept them out of the playoffs, with Romo on the field for two of them.

"I'm thrilled for him," said owner Jerry Jones, who gave Romo the first \$100 million contract in franchise history almost two years ago. "He whispered in my ear that he'll call me tonight, so I want to share how happy I am."

The 34-year-old who had back surgery in December 2013 and missed one game with another back injury this season, endured a season-high six sacks. Two were on consecutive plays in the fourth quarter by Ndamukong Suh, who was suspended Monday for stepping on Green Bay's Aaron Rodgers, but reinstated a day later.

"I'm speechless," a tearful Suh said after walking away from the podium and then returning. "Defense put it all out there. This team put it all out there. ... I didn't expect this outcome."

Bengals set NFL record in loss to Colts

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)

Very ugly. And very familiar.

It happens to Andy Dalton and the Bengals every year, which is why that incredible streak is now 24 years and counting since Cincinnati's most recent playoff win.

The Bengals made NFL history on Sunday when they lost an opening-round playoff game for the fourth year in a

Andrew Luck took apart their secondary, Dalton and the offense went nowhere in the second half, and the Bengals lost 26-10, extending their excruciating stretch of playoff futility.

"It's kind of like missing a field goal that you feel you should have hit," said kicker Mike Nugent, who set a Bengals record with a 57-yarder for one of their few bright spots.

Actually, it's more like slipping and falling without even getting the kick off.

No matter what they accomplish during the season — and their four straight playoff appearances are a franchise record — they come unglued in the biggest

"In the big moments, the guys that are our big guys have to make the plays," left tackle Andrew Whitworth said. "You see it every week. You look at the teams that win, their top guys make the plays that get them where they've got to go. It'll be no different

"When we get in those situations, our big players have to make huge plays."

Instead, they shrink. And it starts quarterback.

Dalton and Baltimore's Joe Flacco are the only quarterbacks in the Super Bowl era to lead their teams to the playoffs in each of their first four seasons. Flacco already has won a Super Bowl and has his team headed to New England next week after pulling out a win in Pittsburgh on Saturday.

Dalton is headed home after another lopsided one-and-done.

"You've got to play your best football once you're here, and today we didn't play our best,' said Dalton, who was 18 of 35 for 155 yards with three sacks, a fumble and a passer rating of only 63.4.

ENGLEWOOD, Colo. (AP) — Manning vs. Luck III.

Peyton Manning gets to face his former team and his successor after Andrew Luck and the Indianapolis Colts beat Cincinnati in the wild-card round Sunday.

They met last year in Indianapolis when Manning's emotions and the Colts both got the best of him in his homecom-

Manning won't get caught up in the hype of the marquee matchup this time, suggested Broncos wide receiver Demaryius Thomas. He pointed to his quarterback's coolness in this season opener when Denver beat Indy 31-24.

"We had them the first game of the season and he was fine," Thomas said. "It's a playoff game so it's a little bit different because if you lose, you're done and if you win, you keep going. I can't really talk for Peyton, but I think he's fine."

DeMarcus Ware said he was especially appreciative for the Broncos' bye, which they earned as the AFC's No. 2 seed, when he saw it was Luck whom he'll be facing next weekend.

Luck has an uncanny knack for comebacks even when things look bleak such as in last year's playoffs when he guided the Colts back from a 28-point deficit to Kansas

The Broncos jumped out to a 24-0 lead on the Colts in this season's opener. But Luck led a frenetic rally that came up

short when rookie Bradley Roby broke up a fourth-and-6 pass to Reggie Wayne in the final minute to secure Denver's 31-24 win.

"He's one of those guys that you have to play a 60-minute game against," Ware said. "He has really good pocket awareness. He's always one of those guys, just like Peyton, where he hits the open guy the majority of the time. He plays a fundamentally sound game.

"He's one of those quarterbacks you don't want to go against, but the thing is you've got to make sure you get pressure on him and make them one-dimensional."

Four months have passed since the Colts (12-5) and Broncos (12-4) saw each other, but Ware stressed "it's still the same quarterback," so "I think you've got to go back and see what you did well. You've also got to see how and where you didn't play well and make sure those things are corrected."

Thomas figures to cringe when he watches the film.

With Wes Welker serving a two-game suspension, Thomas played the slot and caught four passes for 48 yards with a couple of huge drops that night.

Welker returned, Thomas went back outside and had another stellar season that included a franchise-best 1.619 yards and 11 touchdowns.

"It's great" having Welker back, Thomas said. "I tried to play the slot and it wasn't for me that early in the season.





The bidding: West North East South Pass Pass 4 NT! Pass Pass Dble 7 NT Pass Pass Pass five of spades. Opening lead

This deal occurred at a national tournament more than 50 years ago. At one table, the bidding went as shown. West's four-notrump bid asked his partner to bid clubs or spades. East duly obliged with five spades, raised by West to six after South bid six diamonds. When this came around to South, he decided to

enture seven diamonds At this point, while West was cog-

itating whether to bid seven spades as a sacrifice, East doubled out of turn — and promptly led the ace of trumps to confirm the soundness of his double!

Naturally, the tournament director was summoned. He ruled that North-South could continue bidding in turn and, furthermore, that the ace of diamonds was a penalty card. (If a defender improperly exposes a card, it becomes a penalty card, which must be played at the first legal opportunity.) With seven diamonds clearly

hopeless, South now ran to seven notrump! He was hoping to find some way to make that contract with the aid of the exposed card. West led a spade. Declarer

finessed dummy's jack and then scored four heart tricks by taking repeated finesses against East's king. South had been hoping that East would show out of hearts and be forced to discard the ace of diamonds, but he had no such luck

Declarer next led a club to dummy's king and cashed the A-K of spades as East continued to follow suit. Finally, South played a club to the ace, prepared to concede down four, but at this point East's luck ran out. Having no more clubs, he had no choice but to discard the ace of diamonds, and the grand slam came rolling home!

Dear Annie: I lost my grandmother to suicide when I was 7. The day before Grandma died, she made comments to me about going away where I could not go with her and "going to be with her mother," who had died. I did not understand what she was saying. Several weeks after the

funeral, I told my mother what my grandmother said to me. For years after, it felt as though my mother blamed me for her mother's death. I grew up feeling this way.

Two years ago, I overheard my mother tell a friend on the phone that she did, in fact, blame me for my grandmother's death. I cannot tell you how much this hurt me. I am now in my 30s, and my mother and I have had other issues in the past, but never as hurtful as this. Since my grandmother's death, I have been in counseling for depression, my own suicide attempts and the unbearable guilt that I feel.

The therapists have told me that Grandma's death was not my fault, but how can I believe them when my own mother blames me? How do I explain to her that I was only 7 and didn't

understand what Grandma was telling me? I have crying spells and am hurting inside. Please help. -- Abandoned

Dear Abandoned: You

know your grandmother's death was not your fault. You understand that at the age of 7, you could not possibly be held responsible for her suicide. Your mother wants to blame you because it is less painful than blaming herself for not noticing how unhappy her mother was. But frankly, there is no reason to blame anyone. The depression you suffer from (and that Grandma apparently suffered from) is likely a form of inherited mental illness. Please discuss this with your counselor, and ask about having your mother come with you. It sounds as though she never fully processed what happened. She could use some help, too.

Dear Annie: My wife can't stop interrupting me while I'm talking. She either finishes my thought for me, or she just moves on to the next thing she wants to say without waiting for me to finish speaking.

My wife is aware that there is a problem, and she feels bad when I point it out, but she evidently can't do anything about it. She doesn't even realize she's doing it unless I tell her, "You interrupted me again." There are times when I don't feel like talking to her because I know she's just going to cut me off. What can either of us do? -- Cut Short

Dear Cut: If your wife truly wants to stop and you are willing to make the effort, you can train

each other. First check your own speech habits. Do you drone on and on? Do you restate the obvious? Do you repeat yourself? Work on shorter sentences, and then help your wife learn to wait until you are finished before speaking. This will require that she make a genuine effort, and you will need to remind her, gently, each time she interrupts.

Dear Annie: I am moved to respond to "Unhappy Mother of a Son." I have been living that life. After getting professional help, I finally came to realize the fault is not mine. My daughter-in-law quite simply does not, for whatever reason, want to share my son's life with me. And I have to recognize that my son has no appreciation for me or is too lacking in character to stand up for me.

If there are grandchildren, I would suggest "Unhappy" cultivate a relationship with them in whatever way possible. They have the right to make their own judgments. The hurt never goes away, but life is more than being a mother. -- Sad but Wiser

Dog's Head Out the Car Window - A **Dangerous Habit**

For most pups, the best part of a car ride is feeling the breeze in their furry faces as they stick their head out the window. Despite the feel good nature of this pleasurable experience, it's actually a very dangerous habit.

In the early days of automobiles, most cars did not have windshields and their top speed was approximately 45 mph. Given those conditions, drivers wore goggles to protect their eyes. Now that we have windshields to protect

us, you wouldn't consider sticking your unprotected head out the window at 45 mph. Then why let your dog?

Trips With Pets

Allowing your dog to let it stick its head out the window is a very dangerous habit. Their eyes are exposed to dirt, rocks, dust and other debris. These materials can easily puncture and scratch your dog's eyes. A line of pet goggles have come out which are to help prevent these types of injuries. However, even if you can train your dog not to paw them off his head, there are still many other dangers when your dog's head is out the window while driving.

Damage to the ears is another big concern. When the dog's ears flap in the wind, his soft ear flaps (pinnae) can easily become irritated, swell and become very tender. The constant and rapid flapping of the pinnae against your dog's head from high-speed winds causes trauma to the ear and results in swelling. Repeated trauma such as this can cause lifelong problems for your pup.

Allowing your dog to stick its head out the window can also lead to more severe outcomes, such as falling out of the car or getting his head stuck in the window opening. Taking a turn a bit too fast, traveling over bumpy terrain or an overly excited pup can cause your dog to lose balance and easily fall out of the window. These types of incidents

occur more frequently

than one might imagine and can cause severe injury or death to dogs.

It should go without aying; but another very dangerous idea is to allow your dog to ride in the bed of a pickup truck. All of the dangers of sticking its head out the window from inside the car are increased, since the bed of a pickup offers little or no protection from wind, debris, or falls. In addition, a pickup's metal bed can reach dangerously high temperatures on hot days, which can cause damage to the soft tissue


