increases represent the first such hike for local ambulance service in the past several years. "It's roughly a 1 percent across

the board increase," Ferguson said. "It's not a large jump for us."

Feguson said his department is proposing the new rate schedule to bring fees more into line with Medicare and Medicaid allowables.

One new fee the department wishes to charge is \$150 for a "refusal of service" — when ambulance crews

and once in high school. The law requires schools to show annual growth in student achievement or face consequences. It has been credited with putting a focus on how schools handle minority, low-income, English learners and special needs students, but also has led to complaints that teachers were teaching to standardized tests and that mandates were unrealistic and penalties ineffective. Beyond the federal requirements, many districts and states require other standardized tests.

Since 2012, President Barack Obama has allowed states to get a waiver from some of the more stringent requirements of the law, but

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



Amid hunt for accomplices to 3 days of terror, France mobilizes 10,000 troops

PARIS (AP) — France on Monday ordered 10,000

urgent because "the threat is still present" after the attacks that began Wednesday with a massacre on the satirical newspaper Charlie Hebdo and ended when the three attackers were killed Friday in nearly simultaneous raids by security forces.

Meanwhile, France's defense minister said Monday the country is mobilizing 10,000 troops to protect the population. Jean-Yves Le Drian said the deployment will be fully in place by Tuesday, and will focus on the most sensitive locations.

Interior Minister Bernard Cazeneuve said 4.700 security forces would be assigned to protect France's 717 Jewish schools.

The widow of one of the attackers crossed into Syria on Thursday, the day after the Charlie Hebdo massacre, and the same day her husband shot a policewoman to death on the outskirts of Paris, according to Turkey's foreign minister.

Jews scrutinize future in Europe against emigration to Israel after Paris market attack

MILAN (AP) — The killing of four French Jews in last week's hostage standoff at a Paris kosher mar-

ket has deepened the fears among European Jewish communities shaken by rising anti-Semitism and feeling vulnerable due to poor security and a large number of potential soft targets.

In the wake of the attacks, which follow deadly strikes on a Belgian Jewish Museum and a Jewish school in southwestern France, Israeli leaders have called on European Jews to immigrate to the Jewish state. But European Jews are deeply ambivalent about leaving, and their community leaders, along with top politicians, have urged people to stay in their homelands.

"The European Jewry is the oldest European minority and we have our experience of surviving under all possible circumstances," Moshe Kantor, president of the European Jewish Congress, told The Associated Press. "We will not give up our motherland, which is called Europe. We will not stop the history of European Jewry, that is for sure."

Kantor called for increased security at Jewish sites, concerted action against anti-Semitism across the continent and better coordination of intelligence forces against religious extremism. But he acknowledged that if any Jewish European does not feel safe, "I say you should leave in this case."

Many French Jews already are. Last year, 7,000 emigrated to Israel as anti-Semitism spiked across France, fed by tensions with the country's large Arab population after the outbreak of Israel's war against Palestinian militants in the Gaza Strip. That was double the previous year, making France, for the first time, the No. 1 source of immigration to Israel, according to the Jewish Agency, a nonprofit group that helps Jews move to Israel.

Divers find both black boxes in AirAsia crash, but only 1 retrieved from bottom of Java Sea

PANGKALAN BUN, Indonesia (AP) — Divers retrieved one black box Monday and located the other from the AirAsia plane that crashed more than two weeks ago, key developments that should help investigators unravel what caused the aircraft to plummet into the Java Sea. The cockpit voice recorder was found hours after

officials announced that the flight data recorder had been pulled from beneath a piece of the aircraft's wing and brought to the sea's surface, said Suryadi Bambang Supriyadi, operation coordinator for Indonesia's national search and rescue agency. He said the voice recorder was about 20 meters

(66 feet) away from the data recorder but remained lodged beneath heavy wreckage, and divers were struggling to free it at a depth of 32 meters. Searchers began zeroing in on the location a day earlier after three Indonesian ships picked up in-

tense pings from the area, but they were unable to see the devices due to strong currents. The two instruments, which emit signals from their beacons, are vital to understanding what brought Flight 8501 down on Dec. 28, killing all 162

people on board. They should provide essential information about the plane and all of the conversations between the captain and co-pilot for the duration

who are not tested end up not counting," Kati Haycock, president of the Education Trust, wrote in a blog accompanying the release by the civil rights groups

The Council of Chief State

School Officers said it supports annual testing because "every parent has a right to know how their child is performing academically in public school."

One reason the testing issue has been an area of focus is because of the role the results can play in teacher evaluations. Last year, Secretary Duncan said states can apply for extra time before they use student test scores to judge educators' performance.

Another factor is that millions of students this spring for the first time will take new Common Core-based assessments.

Several states and districts are already reviewing the quality and quantity of the tests

Speaking at Seaton Elementary School in a historically African-American neighborhood in Washington that has a large share of Hispanic students, Duncan said that Obama's proposed budget will include \$2.7 billion for enhanced programs under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act.

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

ing the East-West hands, the bidding went as shown. West's two-diamond bid showed both majors, and West later made a dubious decision to continue on to four hearts after East had competed to the three-level. East won the opening diamond lead with the ace, led a heart to the

king, cashed dummy's ace of clubs and returned a low spade, losing to North's queen. North led a diamond to South's king, and South returned the heart nine, taken by dummy's queen. When declarer now tried to cash the spade ace, South ruffed, cashed the heart ace and led a diamond, forcing dummy to ruff. Since declarer had no hearts left

in his hand, he had to lose all three of dummy's remaining spades to North at the end, so East finished down four - 400 points for the U.S. This windfall for the Americans set the stage for a series of astonishing developments at the other table, as we shall see tomorrow


