20-year-old found killed in east Big Spring, police say

Police are investigating a fatal shooting that occurred in east Big Spring Thursday night.

Big Spring Police Department officers responded to the 1000 block of Stadium shortly after 8 p.m. in reference to a "shots fired" call.

"On arrival, officers found a male subject with a single gunshot wound to the chest," a BSPD news release stated. "The victim was sitting in a vehicle in the driveway of 1011 Sta-

A handgun was recovered at the scene, police say.

The shooting victim, subsequently identified as Mathew Burnett, 20, of Big Spring, was transported to the emergency room at Scenic Mountain Medical Center where he was pro-

nounced dead. Justice of the Peace Robert Fitzgibbons has ordered an autopsy, which will be performed Friday morning in

BSPD officials had no other information on the shooting as of press time today.

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What red ink?

As deficit declines, all sides seek more spending

WASHINGTON — The deficit is dead. Long live the deficit.

As the nation's ledger adjusts to decreasing levels of deficit spending, the voices in Washington calling for austerity are barely audible. Republicans want more defense spending. Democrats want more domestic spending. And President Barack Obama wants both. For the first time since the

2011 Budget Control Act put in place a series of automatic spending cuts, Obama might be in the best bargaining position to move the debate his way. And that's with Republicans in charge of Congress.

Obama on Thursday called for a 7 percent boost in government spending that would nullify those 2011 so-called sequestration cuts and increase domestic and defense spending by a total of \$74 billion in nearly equal amounts.

With deadline for possible prisoner swap past, Islamic State group silent

TOKYO (AP) — The fates of a Japanese journalist and Jordanian military pilot were unknown Friday, a day after the latest purported deadline for a possible prisoner swap passed with no further word from the Islamic State group holding them captive. "Government institutions are

working around the clock on the case of pilot Muath al-Kaseasbeh," Jordanian military spokesman Mamdouh al-Ameri said in a statement. "We will inform you of any developments in due He urged Jordanians not to lis-

ten to rumors.

Japanese officials had no progress to report after a late night that ended with the Jordanian government saying it would only release an al-Qaida prisoner from death row if it got proof the airman was alive.

"There is nothing I can tell you," government spokesman Yoshihide Suga told reporters. He reiterated Japan's "strong trust" in the Jordanians to help save the Japanese hostage, freelance journalist Kenji Goto.

Pakistanis fleeing military offensive find new dangers in restive eastern Afghanistan

KHOST, Afghanistan (AP) -Tens of thousands of Pakistanis have sought shelter at a sprawling refugee camp in a volatile region of Afghanistan after crossing the mountainous border to escape a military onslaught against insur-For decades Afghans have fled

into Pakistan to escape war and upheaval, but in recent months the tide has reversed, with some 60,000 Pakistanis — more than half of them children — taking refuge in the Gulan camp, some 20 kilometers (12 miles) from the border in the restive Khost prov-

"We knew the military operations would last a long time once they started," said Malik Omardin, a tribal elder who came from the Pakistani town of Datta Khel. "It's a mountainous area and the insurgents are very strong on their own territory, so the government will have a hard time finding and destroying the Tali-

More than 210,000 Pakistanis have crossed into Afghanistan from the neighboring North Waziristan province since the Pakistani military launched a long-awaited offensive in June against Taliban and other foreign militants, who have long used the lawless tribal region as a launch-pad for attacks in both

Mexican residents block US-backed plan for hydroelectric plant near vital community waterways SANTA URSULA, Mexico (AP)

 People in the hamlet of Santa Ursula began to worry when the logging started. In a few short weeks, more than a mile of densely forested riverbank was stripped from the Arroyo Sal to make way for heavy dredging equipment. Work was just beginning in late

2010 on an ambitious, three-year, \$30 million project to build a 15-megawatt hydroelectric plant directly adjacent to the Cerro de Oro dam, with support from a U.S. government agency.

Next came dynamite explosions as crews blasted through rock to create a tunnel designed to feed power-generating turbines. In Santa Ursula, some 1.5 miles away, the ground shook and cracks formed in homes, some residents say. Finally murky gray water began flowing from the taps, leading locals to fear the worst: contamination in the spring that provides drinking water for nearly 2,000 people.

"Let's make sure that we end this acrossthe-board sequester that doesn't differentiate between smart government spending and dumb government spending," he told a gathering of Democratic lawmakers in Philadelphia. That's not to say that

Obama's budget, set for release on Monday, stands any better chance than his previous budgets at winning congressional support i.e., zero. But as a negotiating document, it might not be so easily dismissed.

"President Obama would like there to be more nondefense spending, and will try to use defense spending to drive a wedge in the Republican Party, and build support for busting the sequester levels. He will likely succeed," said Kevin Hassett, an economist at the con-

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servative American Enterprise Institute and an adviser to Mitt Romney's 2012 presidential campaign.

Left out of all these equations is the nation's long-term fiscal picture. Amid the current wish lists for more child care, free community college, and bigger ship and submarine fleets, little is said about an aging population, a growing national debt and the demands on the government created by greater health care access.

That means that while the deficit is now at its lowest since 2007, it will likely be back with a vengeance within the decade.

Congressional The

Budget Office this week projected that based on current laws, deficits will eventually rise from \$468 billion this year to \$1.1 trillion in 2025. The factors behind the increase: baby-boomer retirements, increased federal subsidies for health care, increasing health care costs and rising interest on the federal debt. These are on the mandatory spending side of the ledger, not the discretionary costs that are subject to congressional appropriations. Without more revenue or reduced benefits, the deficit can only grow.

"I'm sure we'll have another knock-down, drag-out over discretionary spending," said Robert Bixby, executive director of the budget watchdog Concord Coalition. "Probably there will be some kind of deal between the White House and the Congress, but that deal may also be to ignore the entitlement and tax reform."

Republicans and Democrats have been doing the equivalent of whistling past the graveyard on the long-term deficit ever since Obama and House Speaker John Boehner failed to reach a historic deal four years ago. Since then, the budget cutting has focused on the easier stuff.

Long-term tax revenue has been off the table, as have any cost-saving

Forty-two years later

Tt has been 42 years since the United States Supreme Court held in Roe v. Wade that the right to decide whether to go forward with a pregnancy, prior to viability, belongs to a woman, in consultation

with her doctors. Forty-two years of marches and debates and occasional, horrible violence later, Roe remains the law of the land. But constitutional law is scant comfort when there is

Susan **ESTRICH** nowhere to get an abortion in your area — which, last time I checked, was true of more than 40 percent of the counties in the United States. The choice movement may have saved Roe in the courts, but on the streets, the access fight con-

The politics of abortion have changed even more. For the first few decades after Roe was decided, abortion was, frankly, a problem for many Democrats. The polls were equivocal, the right to life movement was expanding everywhere, and Democrats were carefully phrasing their "personal" opposition to abortion notwithstanding the Roe decision.

These days, it's the Republicans who are squirming about abortion, and not very discreetly. They made all kinds of noise about voting on a bill on Thursday, Roe's anniversary, to ban all abortions after 20 weeks. Of course, that would be unconstitutional on its face under Roe, but that wasn't the reason the Republicans dropped the idea.

They dropped it because even some members of their own caucus wouldn't support a bill that would deny a rape victim an abortion unless she reported it to the police — even though rape is one of the most underreported crimes. Unable to pull together a majority to pass a symbolic unconstitutional view, the Republicans settled instead for having a meaningless vote on an old bill that bars public funding of abortion, a bill that has no chance of ever being signed by the president.

You might think, with all the problems we face, the House of Representatives would have better things to do than sit around having symbolic debates and passing symbolic bills, but frankly that's never stopped them, and it didn't stop them now. What did was the change in politics.

"There was a lot of discussion in our retreat (last week) about this, and some of the new people did not want to make this the first bill they voted on, because the millennials have a little bit of a different take on it," Republican Rep. Ted Yoho of Florida told the press. "But you will see it come back, because the American people agree with it two to one. It's a hideous practice. It needs to stop."

Sorry, Ted. The two-to-one number is meaningless. The

question isn't whether you're for or against abortion; the question is who gets to decide: the woman, with the advice of her family her doctor, her minister, or the government. Ask the question that way, and the government loses, hands down. It isn't just the millennials who think the government should keep its nose out of the gynecologist's office. The millennials want to keep getting elected. The old timers seem bent on refighting the old battles.

Forty-two years should be enough time to spend debating symbolic bills and litigating unconstitutional laws.

The Republican bill doesn't help teen mothers. It doesn't address maternal health. It won't reduce infant mortality rates. There is so much we could and should do that we all agree on. Let's take care of the wanted babies; let's help women have healthy babies; let's spend our energy figuring out how to help prevent teen pregnancy. Kudos to Congress and Netanyahu

udos to Congress for inviting Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu to speak at a joint session on the issue of imposing tough sanctions on Iran and to Netanyahu for accepting

President Obama has continually snubbed Israel and Netanyahu whom he refuses to meet with in March, allegedly because he doesn't want to interfere with the upcoming elections in Israel. Obama has



been alarmingly lax in his dealings with Iran in its ambitions to acquire nuclear weapons and delivery systems.

Some Obama defenders are chastising Congress for breaching protocol in inviting Netanyahu, saying, "There appear to be no rules anymore." This, from the same people who routinely pooh-pooh President Obama's habitual lawlessness. Even some conservatives are cautioning against Netanyahu's addressing Congress, saying that if it proceeds as planned, it will play into Obama's hands and undermine its goal of strengthening sanctions against Iran because it will shift the focus away from Obama's indefensible position and toward Netanyahu's "chutz-

I wholeheartedly disagree. Netanyahu's speech will put the spotlight on the substance of his arguments. Netanyahu will have the world stage, and he'll make a powerful case that Iran is going full-bore and that at stake is not just Israel's security but also that of the United States. In the past few days, Israeli media have claimed that satellite images show new long-range ballistic missile launch sites near Teh-

It is simply wrongheaded to yield to the idea that Netanyahu and Congress should tread lightly for fear that some will attempt to depict it as an egotistical move

We must reject the premise that Netanyahu's speaking before Congress, which has every constitutional right to invite him, is about Benjamin Netanyahu. It is about a matter of the gravest importance to Israel's and our national secu-

on Netanyahu's part or a power play on the part of the Republican Congress to embarrass President Obama.

Why aren't these same critics panning Obama for his egregious behavior in failing to properly prioritize this matter as one not about Israel's elections but about a matter of national security? Why aren't they pointing out that it is Obama who should be criticized for conducting meetings with YouTube pop culture figures who eat Froot Loops out of a bathtub instead of with the leader of one of our best and most important allies? Why are they not taking Obama to task for his arguably anti-Semitic slur when he suggested that senators are only opposing his position to appease donors a lamely veiled reference mostly to Jewish groups? Does Obama just get to say anything he wants to, no matter how offensive?

Enough of the guarded behavior from our side.

Obama has been on a lawless tear for most of his time in office, usurping Congress' constitutional role and thumbing his nose at it and its authority and daring it to do anything to stop

Must our response always be like that of the fraternity pledge played by Kevin Bacon in the movie "Animal House" upon being paddled by the fraternity actives? "Thank you, sir. May I have another?"

So what if, as the feckless fear, future House speakers will engage in the same behavior as House Speaker John Boehner is in inviting Netanyahu? Are you kidding me? Do you actually think those in this modern Democratic Party — currently

led by Obama and Harry Reid (who has unilaterally modified Senate rules for partisan advantage) — are ever concerned at all about their violating protocol? They don't care about the Constitution; why would they care about protocol? This incident doesn't change anything.

And why should the current Congress be shy about breaching some technical protocol by inviting Netanyahu to speak, when Obama is brazen about stepping all over its authority at will? Even if Obama hadn't been trampling on the Constitution for years, the overwhelming grav of the issue on which Netanyahu will be speaking justifies a socalled breach of protocol here.

But in fact, Boehner has the authority to ask Netanyahu to speak, and it is his prerogative to invite whomever he chooses. He is neither usurping nor abusing his authority in inviting Netanyahu.

We are living in very perilous times, and President Obama obviously doesn't view many of the objectively dangerous threats we face — from members of al-Qaida to other Islamic terrorists to Iran — as even serious problems. Instead of fretting over how Congress is going to be viewed for doing the right thing and placing the issue of Iranian nukes front and center before Congress — and the world — we must vigorously support Congress' actions and do what we can to help focus attention on this critical issue.

It also doesn't hurt for Congress to be sending a loud message, within its own constitutional authority, that there are many in the United States probably the majority of Americans — who take these matters seriously and intend to take action to defend the security interests of the United States and its allies.

Gen 29 begins, "So Jacob lifted his feet, and went toward the land of the easterners." "Lifted up his feet" means that he walked energetically. Having received God's blessing, he was confident about his quest for a wife and was enthusiastic to reach his

When Jacob reached the area of Haran, he found flocks waiting to be watered. The stone over the mouth of the well was large and very heavy. The

shepherds always waited until all the herds were there, so there would be

several men to roll the stone. The very heavy stone could be a

clue to their character; in a desert area, water was scarce, and these Arameans did not trust each other. While they waited, Jacob inquired about Laban, his mother's brother. The shepherds pointed out that his daughter, Rachel, was approaching with her father's flock.

This gives us several background clues about Laban. Perhaps he does not have any sons and cannot afford to hire a

shepherd. Perhaps his flock is small enough that a young teenage girl shepherds them. Even so, she must be a skilled shepherd to do the job without

As soon as Rachel arrived with her father's flock, Jacob, alone, rolled the stone away and watered her sheep. Jacob already knew that he had found the woman he wanted for his wife. He kissed her and raised his voice and wept.

The sages surmise that Jacob may have wept because he came empty-handed; he did not have the bride price. Another old story tells that when Jacob left to seek a bride, Isaac had given him money and gifts for her family. But Esau had ordered his son, Eliphaz, to ambush Jacob and kill him. Eliphaz, who was raised in Isaac's home, did not want to kill Jacob. He took all of the wealth that Jacob carried and impoverished him. The sages say that 'a poor man is tantamount to a dead man;' in essence, Eliphaz obeyed his father.

When Laban heard of Jacob's arrival, he ran to meet him. He embraced and kissed him on each cheek, as was their custom. Laban knew that the family of Abraham was wealthy. He expected gifts from his nephew.

A disappointed Laban said, "Nevertheless, you are my flesh and blood!" And Jacob stayed in Laban's home. In this culture, Jacob would have been working for Laban while he stayed in his home. After a month Laban said, "Just because you are my relative, should you serve me for nothing? Tell me: What are your wages?"

Jacob knew that he loved and wanted Rachel for his wife. Since he had no money to pay the bride price, he answered, "I will work for you for seven years, for Rachel, your younger daughter."

Did you notice that Jacob stated the exact terms for his hire? He stated how long he would work, and for what amount – Laban's daughter, Rachel. He also added, "Your younger daughter," because Laban had two daughters. This is a model contract.

Laban agreed to this deal, making it almost sound like, "Oh, well. I might as well give her to you as to anyone else." He was getting a shepherd for seven years at no cost, but still he had rather have money.

"So Jacob worked seven years for Rachel and they seemed to him a few days because of his love for her." (Gen 29:20)

We should take a lesson from this today. Jacob loved Rachel and only Rachel all his life.

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
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
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Human nature vs God's nature Reflections

Did your parents ever say to you, "If I've told you once, I've told you a thousand times?" If you are a parent, have you caught yourself saying the same thing, or something similar, to your children?

Why do

stop doing those things. Sometimes you may want to "shake some sense into them" or yell at them to "stop it!"

What about yourself? Sometimes there are things that I might struggle with, but often I am more patient and understanding with myself than others. That is human nature. I know what I should

do, but many times I don't do it. I know what I should not doing, but I still do it anyways (Romans 7).

What if God looked at us (every person that has ever lived and will ever live) like we look at others? What if God treated us in the same manner that we treat each other? What if God gave us exactly what we deserve whenever we sin (violate His law)?

In previous articles we have seen how humanity chose to disobey God in the Garden of Eden (Genesis 3). In the next generation the first child to be born (Cain) commits the first murder against his own brother. Human nature is selfish and follows its own desires. Human nature is lead by emotions and feelings much of the time.

Within 1,656 years (Genesis 5 genealogies; 6:6) humanity had turned away from God to the point That the Lord saw that the wickedness of man was great in the earth, and that every intention of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually.

And the Lord was sorry that he had made man on the earth, and it grieved him to his heart. Following the flood, humanity started over through Noah and his family. After being delivered by God from the destruction, one would think that they would share that story with their children and grandchildren and so on through the generations. When my phone rings and someone asks for "William," I know they don't know me.

Names are important. When someone calls us by our name it opens doors of relationship. But even more important than our name is the voice of the one who calls us. The effect of hearing our name spoken by those who love us is different than when it is spoken by others.

God knows us by our name and calls us by

It is a measure of the intimacy by which we are known and loved. When Moses wandered off the beaten path with shattered dreams and settled for a future shepherding his father-in-law's sheep, God called his name: "When the Lord saw that he turned aside to look, God called to him from the midst of the bush and said, "Moses, Moses!" And he said, "Here I am." (Exodus 3:4).

When the boy Samuel was growing up in the Temple, God called his name: "Then the Lord came and stood and called as at other times, "Samuel! Samuel!" And Samuel said, "Speak, for your servant is listening." (1 Samuel 3:10). In the fullness of time, the angel Gabriel called to a young woman in Nazareth: "Do not be afraid, Mary; for you have found favor with God" (Luke 1:30). Those moments changed history.

Sometimes God changed a name in order to reflect His plan and purpose for a person's life. Jacob's name, which means "deceiver" or "supplanter," was changed to Israel, meaning "you have struggled with God" or "prince of God." When Jesus met the fisherman, Simon, "Jesus looked at him and said, "You are Simon the son of John; you shall be called Cephas" (which is translated Peter)." John 1:42).

Jesus said, "But he who enters by the door is a shepherd of the sheep. To him the doorkeeper opens, and the sheep hear his voice, and he calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he puts forth all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice." (John 10:2-4).

To God, no one is a number or a statistic. He knows you better than you know yourself. God knows you and calls you by name.

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

Portugal OKs citizenship plan for Sephardic Jews

LISBON, **Portugal** (AP) — Five centuries after burning thousands of Jews at the stake, forcing them to convert to Christianity or expelling them, Portugal is granting citizenship rights to their descendants as part of an attempt make amends.

The Portuguese Cabinet on Thursday approved a law offering dual citizenship to the descendants of those Sephardic Jews — the term commonly used for those who once lived in the Iberian peninsula.

The effective date of the law will be made public soon and similar legislation in Spain is awaiting final legislative approval.

The Portuguese rights will apply to those who can demonstrate "a traditional connection" to Portuguese Sephardic Jews, such as through "family names, family language, and direct or collateral ancestry."

Like Spain, Portugal says its sole reason for granting citizenship is to redress a historic wrong.

"There is no possibility to amend what was done," Portuguese Justice Minister Paula Teixeira da Cruz said. "I would say it is the attribution of a right."

The measure is the latest step in Portugal's modern efforts to atone for its past harsh treatment of Jews, whose ranks once numbered in the tens of thousands, but have been reduced to only about 1,000 today. In 1988, then-president

Mario Soares met with members of Portugal's Jewish community and formally apologized for the Inquisition. In 2000, the leader of Portugal's Roman Catholics publicly apologized for the suffering imposed on Jews by the Catholic Church, and in 2008 a monument to the dead was erected outside the Sao Domingos church where the massacre of thousands of Jews began at Easter in 1506.

Jose Ribeiro e Castro, a lawmaker who was involved in drafting the

legislation, sees the persecution of Sephardic Jews as a "stain" on Portuguese history.

He said he was contacted on social media by Sephardic Jews abroad who suggested granting citizenship rights to descendants of their persecuted ances-

"We wish it had never happened," Ribeiro e Castro said. "Given that it did happen, and that it can be put right, we thought we ought to do

Applicants will be vetted by Portuguese Jewish community institutions, as well as by government agencies. They will have to say whether they have a criminal record. Jewish community leaders say they expect the application procedure to take four months.

'We regard it as an act of justice," Michael Rothwell, a delegate of the Committee of the Jewish Community of Oporto, which is one of the vetting organizations, said of the new

tain to gain your 10th trick whether he returns a heart, a diamond or a club. If South wins the club and returns a low diamond, you insert the nine, forcing North to make a return that is sure to give you the gamegoing trick. If South returns the jack or ten of diamonds instead, you play the queen to accomplish the same result.

Finally, if South wins the ten of clubs and returns a low club, you discard a diamond to get home safely; if he returns a heart instead, you discard a diamond and ruff in dummy. All roads inevitably lead to Rome.

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Sin vs safety: judge weighs arguments on Gitmo female guards BY DAVID DISHNEAU All are housed at Camp 7, a top-

FORT MEADE, Md. (AP) — Religious-based restrictions on the use of female guards at Guantanamo violate the military's gender-neutral policy and weaken prison security, a government prosecutor argued Thursday in a dispute over assertions by detainees that their Muslim faith makes it a sin for them to be touched by woman soldiers.

A defense attorney for detainee Abd al-Hadi al-Iragi countered that the restrictions imposed by a temporary court order in November must be enforced and expanded, at virtually no risk to security or soldiers' careers, to protect his client's religious rignts.

The military judge, Navy Capt. J. Kirk Waits, gave no indication when he would rule. He recessed the hearing at the U.S. military base in Cuba after lawyers gave closing arguments. Associated Press covered the four-day hearing from a video feed at Fort Meade near Baltimore.

Waits issued an order in November barring female guards from jobs requiring them to touch Hadi — to apply and remove restraints, for example

 while escorting him to attorney-client meetings and court hearings. A similar ruling by another military judge earlier

secret unit housing about 15 men deemed "high-value detainees" by the Pentagon.

Some female soldiers have filed gender discrimination complaints with the military over the

Women were added to the escort teams in October, pursuant to a 2013 expansion of gender-neutral military jobs, prosecutors say. Defense attorneys say allowing women to handle prisoners upsets their clients, interferes with attorney-client meetings and could amount to unlawful pretrial punishment.

The men contend their faith prohibits physical contact between men and women who aren't married or closely related. The stricture in certain Muslim denominations is meant to prevent illicit sexual intercourse, according to the written testimony of Mohammad H. Fadel, an expert on Islam at the University of Toronto law school.

The judge seemed skeptical that routine handling of a prisoner could be sexually arousing.

"We're in the context of a prison. We're in the context of people, of many other guards also being present," Waits told defense attorney Marine Lt. Col. Thomas F. Jasper.

But Jasper said prisoners have a right to practice their religion under the U.S. Constitution and the Geneva Conventions. He said directing female guards to step back and let male soldiers touch the prisoners shouldn't pose a security risk.

Prosecutor Army Lt. Col. David Long cited case law giving substantial deference to prison administrators in operational decisions.

"Running a humane and wellfunctioning detention facility requires the proper staffing,'

The camp commander testified Wednesday that it was hard to find and train enough National Guard troops for the high-security jobs. Rotating their roles on escort teams minimizes the possibility of risky relationships with prisoners, he said.

Long said jailers already accommodate detainees' religious beliefs in many ways, including prayer breaks and preferences for food, apparel and facial hair. Enabling them to dictate the makeup of escort teams goes too far, he said.

"The detention facility cannot run with the guards and guard leadership responding to detainees issuing their requests or demands before they comply," Long said.

Hadi has been at Guantanamo since April 2007. He is accused of being an al-Qaida commander who organized deadly attacks on U.S. and allied forces in Afghanistan. He faces up to life in prison if convicted of the alleged war crimes. He appeared in court wearing a white tunic, a headdress and a long, gray beard.

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
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

ATTENTION PROPERTY **OWNERS** Property owners have certain rights that may reduce their property tax

burden **HOMEOWNERS**

Persons who own their residence on January 1, 2015, may claim their home as a residential homestead. The filing of this document is only necessary if the homeowner has changed homesteads since January 2014, or has become eligible for additional exemptions since last year. Homeowners may also defer the portion of the tax on their residence homestead if the value of the home was raised more than 5% above the previous year. Although the tax collection is deferred, interest continues to run on the unpaid portion of tax at a rate of 8% per annum and the deferred tax remains a lien on the property. To apply for the deferral, the owner should contact the appraisal district which appraised the property in question and complete an application

DISABLED PERSONS Persons who are disabled under Social Security law are entitled to additional exemptions on their residential homestead. Disabled applicants must apply with the appraisal district and furnish a determination letter from Social

Security. Disabled persons now receive all benefits on their home that are available to over 65 persons (see below) **PERSONS WHO ARE OVER 65**

YEARS OF AGE Persons who are over 65 years of

age or disabled persons may file for additional exemptions and a ceiling on school taxes for their residential homestead if they become 65 during 2014. Over-65 persons should apply for this exemption at the appraisal district office in their area. Over-65 persons are also eligible to defer paying the tax on their residential homestead it they wish. The taxes continue to accrue during the deferral along with an interest rate of 8% annually, but no attempt will be made to force payment during the deferral. Details and an application may be obtained from any appraisal district or the State

Comptroller. **DISABLED VETERANS**

Persons who have been declared by the Veteran's Administrations are eligible for additional exemptions on property they own. The declaration letter from VA is mailed annually, but the appraisal district only needs a copy in the first year of eligibility or if the

FARM AND RANCH OWNERS Farmers and ranchers may be entitled to receive an alternate method of appraisal determined by the farm income to the property. This method is available to farms and ranches commercially raising crops or livestock or which are used as a wildlife habitat under State guidelines. An application for agricultural use value and additional information is available from your appraisal district. Re-filing is only necessary if requested to do so by the Chief Appraiser

I think it is extremely odd for these women to be sleeping with this young man, who also still sleeps with his baby blanket. Isn't he too old for this? What is wrong with these women? Should I say something? -- More Than a Little **Grossed Out**

Dear More: Yes. We are surprised that a 14year-old boy wouldn't object more to the sleeping arrangements, and we suspect he will put a stop to it soon. If the mother and grandmother are doing this over the boy's objections, however, that is completely inappropriate and potentially abusive. You could ask your cousin about this, saying you find it odd and possibly damaging. You also could

suggesting he step up and

protect his son. Dear Annie:

I read the letter from "Help." whose husband naps when he gets home and then is up half the night. She seems to think everyone can handle regular nighttime hours.

If I slept every night from 11 p.m. to 7 a.m., I would be more tired as the week went on, because my body wakes me up multiple times at night. When I don't set an alarm, I sometimes don't wake up until 10 hours after I went to bed. If I get up after eight hours, I often need a nap later because I did not get enough actual sleep.

While I agree that seeing a doctor might be helpful, his wife can also suggest that he stay up all night one time and then try to sleep from 9 p.m. until 7 a.m. He might be able to manage that. -- John

Dear John: Why are you getting up so much at night? To use the bathroom? Because something (snoring, apnea, dryness, light, noise) is waking you up? While we understand that not everyone has a "normal" nighttime sleep cycle, a sufficient amount of sleep is important to your health.

If the problem is snoring, dry mouth, excessive urination or apnea, please see a doctor to find out whether there is any effective treatment for you. But also check your bedroom to make sure there isn't a lot of

light or noise, or

electronic gadgets that glow or vibrate. This, too, can interfere with restful, restorative sleep.

Dear Annie: I am responding to "Actively Confused," whose wife battled cancer and now resents his activities.

I am a lung cancer survivor. My wife took care of me for the better part of 18 months, showering me and feeding me through a tube. She also worked full time outside the home. At the time, I didn't much care what she wanted to

As I progressed, I realized she needed to get out of the house and do things for herself, even though it meant going without me. That was fine. As my mobility improved, I would do things with her even if those weren't my favorite things. We both knew that I needed to be more active, or I'd just waste away on the couch. It takes a long time to get your stamina back, and I still haven't after four

Together, my wife and I are getting through this, and we both realize that neither one of us is what we used to be. With her, our children and good doctors, nurses, therapists and prayers, I am still here to try. --Less Active, Not Confused
