1 dead in Glasscock accident

DPS: Icy roads contribute to Friday night fatality

A Pearsall, Texas man is dead after a one-vehicle rollover in Glasscock County Friday evening.

According to a Texas Department of Public Safety news release, 27-year-old Manuel Perez was pronounced dead by Glasscock County Justice of the Peace Kay Machicek at the scene of the accident. He was not wearing a seat belt, the DPS reports.

Four other people were injured in the accident.

According to the DPS, emergency personnel were called to a one-vehicle roll over at 8:15 p.m. Friday on State Highway 137, approximately 18 miles northwest of Garden City.

A 2013 Ford Eco driven by 35-year-old Juan Humberto Salas of Pearsall was traveling northbound on SH137 and attempted to pass on the left. The vehicle passed when unsafe causing it to go into a side skid to the west bar ditch where it overturned on its right and top. Salas was taken to Midland Memorial hospital for treatment and later release.

Also injured were passengers 21-year-old Rolando Villarreal-Garcia, 27-year-old Santiago Lopez-Rosales, and 25-year-old Ivan A. Castillo, all of Pearsall. All three were taken for treatment at Midland Memorial and later released.

Road conditions on Friday were icy due to snow and freezing precipitation that blew in Thursday bringing sub-freezing weather. The accident was investigated by Howard County DPS troopers.

Netanyahu, U.S. face off on Iran

WASHINGTON — Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and top U.S. officials were set to face off Monday in dueling speeches on the high-stakes Iran nuclear negotiations, a signature foreign policy objective of President Barack Obama.

The backdrop for the rift between the longtime allies was the annual policy conference of the American Israel Public Affairs Committee, the largest pro-Israel lobby in the U.S. Netanyahu was to address the gathering Monday morning and his speech was to be bracketed by remarks from two senior U.S. officials: U.N. Ambassador Samantha Power and National Security Ad-

viser Susan Rice.

Netanyahu's visit to Washington has sparked criticism in both the U.S. and Israel. The centerpiece of his trip is an address to Congress Tuesday, which came at the invitation of congressional Republicans and was not coordinated with the White House.

Iraq TV: Large-scale military operation to recapture Saddam Hussein's hometown begins
BAGHDAD (AP) — Backed by allied Shiite and Sunni fighters, Iraqi security forces on Monday began a large-scale military operation to recapture Saddam Hussein's hometown from the Islamic State extremist group, state TV said, a major step in a campaign to reclaim a large swath of territory in northern Iraq controlled by the militants.
The city of Tikrit, 130 kilometers (80 miles) north of Baghdad, fell into the hands of the Islamic State group last summer along with the country's second-largest city of Mosul and other areas in the country's Sunni heartland after the collapse of national security forces. Tikrit is one of the largest cities held by the Islamic State group and sits on the road to Mosul.
Security forces have so far been unable to retake Tikrit, but momentum has begun to shift after soldiers, backed by airstrikes from a U.S.-led coalition, recently took back the nearby refinery town of Beiji. Any operation to take Mosul would require Iraq to seize Tikrit first because of its strategic location for military enforcements.
U.S. military officials have said a coordinated military mission to retake Mosul will likely begin in April or May and involve up to 25,000 Iraqi troops. But they have cautioned that if the Iraqis aren't ready, the timing could be delayed. Past attempts to retake Tikrit have failed, and Iraqi authorities say they have not set a date to launch a major operation to recapture Mosul. Heavy fighting between Islamic State and Kurdish forces is taking place only outside the city.

Tourism on the rise in Malaysia in 2014 despite aura of tragedy from double plane disasters
KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — Two airplane catastrophes put Malaysia on the

map in a bad way in 2014. But they didn't hurt the country's tourism, and the higher visibility may even have helped: visitor numbers had their strongest growth in years.
For the past decade, Malaysia has run an elaborate campaign to market itself abroad as an ideal Asian destination, touting a multiethnic culture, lush rainforests and pristine beaches. Despite the effort to internationalize, its tourism industry still relies heavily on tightly-packed neighboring Singapore and in a renewed push the government had designated 2014 as "Visit Malaysia Year."
So when Malaysia Airlines Flight 370 went missing with 239 people on board en route from Kuala Lumpur to Beijing on March 8, it put the global spotlight on Malaysia and seemingly dealt a blow to its tourism strategy.
A double whammy came four months later when a Malaysia Airlines jet was shot down over rebel-held eastern Ukraine, killing all 298 people on board.

Los Angeles police kill man in struggle on Skid Row sidewalk that was captured on video
LOS ANGELES (AP) — In a fatal encounter captured on video, three Los Angeles police officers shot and killed a man on the city's Skid Row during a struggle over one of the officers' guns, authorities said.
The graphic video widely circulated on social media within a few hours of the incident Sunday brought attention to the death of the man who wound up wrestling with police amid the tents, sleeping bags and trash of Skid Row, where many of the city's homeless stay.
The three officers, one of whom is a sergeant, shot the man as they struggled on the ground for control of one of the police officer's weapons, after a stun gun proved ineffective, LAPD Cmdr. Andrew Smith said.

Rice has been particularly sharp in her criticism of Netanyahu's plans to address Congress, calling the move "destructive" to the fabric of the U.S.-Israel relationship.
The Israeli leader is deeply suspicious of Obama's efforts to reach a nuclear agreement with Iran, fearing the U.S. and its negotiating partners are prepared to leave Tehran on the

cusps of developing a nuclear weapon.
A Netanyahu adviser told reporters traveling with the prime minister to Washington Sunday that he was not coming to the U.S. capital to offend Obama.
"The prime minister is here to warn, in front of any stage possible, the dangers" of the agreement that may be taking shape, the adviser said, speaking anonymously under a policy that bars the official from speaking on the record.
The adviser said Is-

rael was well aware of the details of the emerging nuclear deal and they included Western compromises that were dangerous for Israel. Still, he tried to lower tensions by saying that Israel "does not oppose every deal" and was merely doing its best to warn the U.S. of the risks entailed in the current one.

Secretary of State John Kerry, who is in Switzerland for another round of nuclear negotiations, warned Israel against releasing "selective details" of the negotiations.
"Doing so would make it more difficult to reach the goal that Israel and others say they share," Kerry said.
The U.S. is seeking

to secure a framework agreement to curtail Iran's nuclear program in exchange for sanctions relief. The U.S. is negotiating alongside Britain, France, Germany, Russia and China.

Darvish: 'I didn't quit on team'

SURPRISE, Ariz. (AP) — Yu Darvish saved his best stuff for after his inning on the mound.

The Texas Rangers ace, who was shut down last August with elbow inflammation, threw 14 pitches without any discomfort on Sunday during an intrasquad game — his most extensive work since the injury ended his 2014 season.

Darvish struck out two of three batters he faced as curious Rangers fans, the usual large Japanese media contingent that follows his every move and a touring college team from the Japan watched through the fence on a back practice field behind Surprise Stadium.

Afterward, the three-time All-Star described his outing as "great," saying he was pleased with his performance, which included him hitting 94 mph on the radar gun.

But while he dazzled onlookers, Darvish delivered a surprise following the workout by speaking to beat writers almost exclusively in English for the first time since joining the Rangers in 2012. Standing in front of his locker, Darvish first shooed away Japanese reporters before addressing his injury and some of the criticism that followed.

After making his last start on Aug. 9 Darvish was accused in some circles of quitting on the Rangers, an allegation he shut down with a choice English curse word.

"I didn't quit on the team. I love this ballclub. I've never done that in my life. That's not true," he said.

Darvish didn't pitch over the final seven weeks last season due to what the team described as "mild elbow inflammation." Darvish had initially said he could keep pitching if the Rangers were in the playoff race, leading some to speculate about the actual severity of his injury.

Darvish, though, explained doctors advised him that if he kept pitching he would be risking further damage to his elbow ligament.

Big Spring cruise to area playoff title with 62-43 romp

The Clint Lions came into the area round of the Class 4A state playoffs with the honor of having beaten San Elizario twice in the District 3-4A race, and having stunned Monahans in the bi-district round, 57-56, in overtime.

On Saturday afternoon, Tyler Bryan, Ty Sealy, Dee Parker and the Big Spring High School Steers added another note to the Lions' season ... and it read "The End."

Backed by double-digit efforts from Sealy, Bryan and Parker, the Steers used a huge size advantage to their benefit en route to pounding out an easy 62-43 victory in front of a small crowd in the Pecos High School gymnasium. The game was played on Saturday in Pecos after Friday's originally scheduled game in Fort Stockton was postponed due to inclement weather.

"We knew we were going to have a size advantage coming in," said Big Spring head coach Ian Ritchey. "We knew we needed to take advantage of that and attack. A game like this was tailor-made for us."

Big Spring, 20-11 overall, use its size advantage to perfection early in the game. Sealy and Bryan, who stood almost 3 inches taller than any Clint starter, combined to eight points in the first 5 minutes of the game and led the Steers to an 11-4 start.

Kei'Shawn Broussard and Tobyn Tannehill also added to the BSHS start. Broussard knocked down a three-pointer early in the contest, while Tannehill pushed

Bryan led the BSHS third-quarter effort by throwing in four of his 10 points. Sealy, Broussard, Green, Parker and Eric Ortega also etched their names into the books in the frame.

Parker came on strong in the fourth to help the Steers' put the Lions away. The 6-foot-3 senior tallied six of his 10 points in the final frame and spearheaded a decisive 17-12 spree.

Broussard just missed hitting double digits, offensively. The junior guard tallied nine points in the contest despite fouling out midway through the fourth quarter.

Green, who starred off the bench for BSHS, and Tannehill finished with six and four points, respectively. Ortega and Jacob Scott also contributed by pitching in two apiece.

jack of diamonds falls as the A-K-Q are led, or by a heart finesse if that proves necessary, or, possibly, by a squeeze.

But it is much easier to proclaim the merits of seven notrump with the cards exposed than it is to bid it at the table. North's four-club bid was Stayman, asking partner to show a four-card major, and South's four-diamond response denied having one. North then leaped to six notrump, knowing that the combined point count was at least 35 or 36 — a point or two short of the 37 that would make a grand slam mandatory — and that was the end of the auction.

When the deal was over and Hamman had wrapped up 13 tricks, it seemed likely that the Italian North-South pair at the other table would either tie the result by also bidding six notrump or would gain 750 points by reaching seven notrump.

This was certainly a reasonable expectation, especially with the highly accurate Giorgio Belladonna and Walter Avarelli occupying the North-South seats. But when Eric Murray and Sami Kehela of Toronto held the East-West cards against them, the bidding surprisingly went:

It's difficult to fathom some of the oddities that occur in world-championship play. Consider this deal from the 1966 match between Italy and North America.

At the first table, with Lew Mathe North and Bob Hamman South for North America, the bidding went as shown. Certainly the North-South hands justify bidding a grand slam in notrump, since that contract is sure to come home with a heart lead, or if the clubs are divided 3-2, or if the
