TNM sets rally for Saturday

Group advocates for Texas to secede from United States

To commemorate Texas Independence Day, members of the Texas Nationalist Movement will read the original Texas Declaration of Independence on the Howard County courthouse steps Saturday.

"Whether you agree with Texas secession or not, if you are a Texan, you should be proud of your Texas heritage," said Kent Ivy, organizer of the event. "I would so very much like to see all of our neighbors out there who remember the Alamo, who remember Goliad, who remember San Patricio, who remember why we had to secede from Mexico. This is our heritage. It is unique in the United States. Whether you believe in succession now days or not, please come out and stand with us to remember those who fought for our freedoms before."

The event will be held Saturday beginning at 1 p.m. on the east lawn of the Howard County Courthouse. Also, members will read William B. Travis' "Victory or Death" letter of appeal for the Alamo.

Ivy said he expected the program will last about 30 minutes.

"The Texas Declaration of Independence was hammered out under pressure because the delegates at Washington-on-the-Brazos had gotten word that the Ala-

CISD talent show hits stage Monday

COAHOMA — Bring on the spotlight and roll out the red carpet, it's almost show time for the Coahoma Independent School District.

The annual CISD talent show is set for Monday, featuring the creative artistry of students and faculty as well as a time to tour the district's three campuses and enjoy a pancake supper, all while supporting a local community service organization.

"It is an entire evening of activities," said CISD superintendent Dr. Amy Jacobs. "Beginning at 5 p.m. in our cafeteria, the Lion's Club of Coahoma will host a pancake supper in conjunction with the

evening's activities."

The cost for the supper is \$6 for a large plate and \$4 for the small.

Beginning at 5:30 p.m., tours of all three of the school district campuses will be available through 6:30 p.m.

"This gives people a chance to visit our campuses and see all the wonderful things we are doing at Coahoma ISD," Jacobs said.

At 7 p.m., the main event takes place as Coahoma ISD trustees, students and staff host the annual talent show featuring the talents of Coahoma students.

"Because of the recent weather, we've had to postpone tryouts, but I expect we will see a variety of talents from singing, to performances of musical instruments and even possibly dancing routines," Jacob said.

There is no admission charge to the talent show but CISD will be accepting donations to help fund the creation of a Food2Kids program in Coahoma.

The program provides bag lunches to children during the weekends who are food insecure. According to Jacobs, about 40 percent of the Coahoma ISD student population qualifies for the Federal free and reduced lunch program.



Report: Texas truancy laws are inconsistent and unfair

AUSTIN, Texas — Texas' truancy policies are a "flawed and inequitable patchwork" that led to the criminal prosecution of 115,000 children for not going to school in 2013, and the state prosecutes twice as many teens for truancy than all other states combined, according to a nonprofit advocacy group.

Texas Applesseed released a report Thursday recommending that the Texas Legislature lighten laws that address truancy, defined as an unexcused absence from school. The research and advocacy group also called for decriminalizing truancy, which is now a Class C misdemeanor.

Under state law, students as young as 12 can be ordered to appear in court with at least one parent for missing three days of school during a four-week period. Schools must

file a charge against students who have more than 10 unexcused absences within six months.

The majority of cases are handled in an adult criminal court, though about 1,000 cases in 2013 were classified as complaints of "conduct in need of supervision" and handled in the juvenile system. Only in Texas and Wyoming are truancy cases handled in adult criminal courts.

"There is absolutely no research to support the way that we handle truancy in Texas," said Deborah Fowler, executive director of Texas Applesseed. "We've met with parents who have actually lost jobs because they've had to show up to court."

Fowler said recent numbers show a truancy decline in Texas, consistent with juvenile crime trends nationwide. But she said Texas prosecutes at least twice as many teens for truancy than all other

states combined.

About 80 percent of students sent to court for truancy come from low-income families, the report states. While Latino students make up 52 percent of student enrollment in Texas, they represent 64 percent of truancy cases filed. African-American students represent 13 percent of enrollment, yet make up 20 percent of truancy cases. Students with special-education needs represent 8.5 percent of enrollment, but 13 percent of truancy cases, the report found.

"A flawed and inequitable patchwork of truancy policies and practices in Texas schools and courts disproportionately harm economically disadvantaged children, African-American and Hispanic students, and those with disabilities," the group said in a statement accompanying the

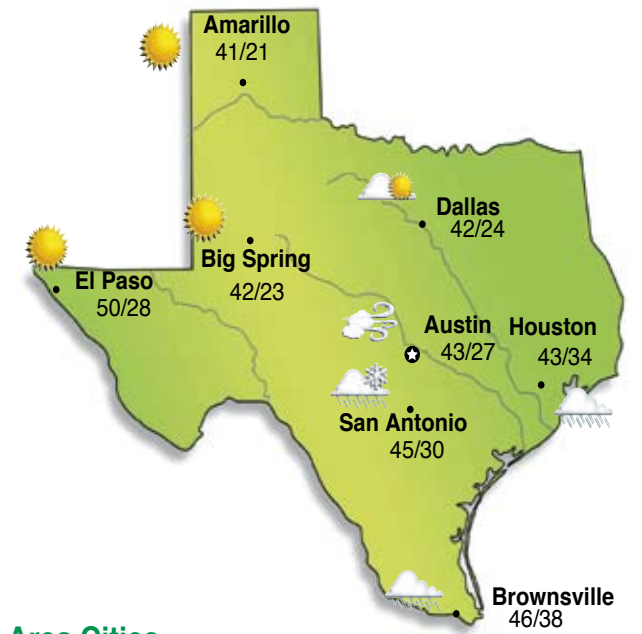

Information security experts: Clinton private email system risked sensitive data disclosure

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hillary Rodham Clinton’s use of a private email address and private computer server for official State Department business heightened security risks to her communications, such as the inadvertent disclosure of sensitive information and the danger from hackers, several information security experts said.

The revelation that Clinton relied exclusively on a private email account for routine exchanges during her four-year stint as secretary of state also raises questions about whether the agency or anyone else in government examined Clinton’s private email server and network before it began operating and continued to regularly review it during her tenure.

Federal regulations subject the computer systems of some federal contractors and other organizations to federal oversight when they interact with government systems to ensure they are protected.

On Wednesday, a House committee investigating the attacks in Benghazi, Libya, issued subpoenas for emails from Clinton and others related to Libya. The Republican-led Select Committee on Benghazi also instructed technology companies it did not identify to preserve any relevant documents in their possession.

For a second day, Washington seemed preoccupied with Clinton’s email practices, which gave Clinton — who is expected to run for president in the 2016 campaign — significant control over limiting access to her message archives.

But they also complicated the State Department’s

legal responsibilities in finding and turning over official emails in response to any investigations, lawsuits or public records requests.

Late Wednesday, a message was sent on Clinton’s Twitter account that remarked on the growing controversy.

US Justice Department finds racist, profit-driven law enforcement practices in Ferguson

ST. LOUIS (AP) — A federal investigation into the police killing of an unarmed, black 18-year-old in Ferguson, Missouri, lays bare what officials contend are racist, profit-driven law enforcement practices in the small St. Louis suburb.

While the Department of Justice cleared Officer Darren Wilson of federal civil rights charges in the August death of Michael Brown, it also called for sweeping changes in a city where officers trade racist emails, issue tickets mostly to black drivers that generate millions of dollars in revenue, and routinely use what investigators called excessive force on people stopped for minor or non-existent offenses.

Attorney General Eric Holder said Wednesday that the department “found a community that was deeply polarized; a community where deep distrust and hostility often characterized interactions between police and area residents.”

Ferguson Mayor James Knowles III said steps are already being taken to correct problems within the department.

“We must do better not only as a city, but as a state and a country,” Knowles said.

report. The report also found that school districts have much discretion in how to handle students

who don’t go to school. Judges can issue fines up to \$500, and students who are unable to pay can be arrested once they turn 17, at which point they enter Texas’ adult criminal system.

According to Texas’ Legislative Budget

Board, 160,000 criminal complaints were filed with justices of the peace and criminal misdemeanor courts in 2014.

Even before the report, Texas lawmakers filed more than a dozen bills to change how the

state handles students who don’t go to school. Decriminalizing the act already has the support of Texas Supreme Court Chief Justice Nathan Hecht and the Texas Judicial Council, the policy-making arm of the Texas judiciary,

which recommended the change to lawmakers this year.

“The point of the truancy law is to get the kid back in school,” Hecht said in a recent interview following his State of the Judiciary speech to lawmakers.

He recommended programs that try to solve the problems causing children to miss school “instead of dragging them to court.”

mo was under siege,” he said. “There was no choice. Santa Ana was coming to kill them. It took about two days to hammer it out.”

“Having a good template to use, which is the United States Declaration of Independence they patterned it along the same the line,” he continued. “They listed the grievances and why they were doing what they had no other choice but to do. Both the United States of Declaration of Independence and the Texas Declaration of Independence, if you change a few nouns here and there, it reads a whole like what we are facing today.”

Ivy said the Texas Nationalist Movement actively supports and works to create an inde-

pendent Texas nation.

“The Republic of Texas bunch has been in the news this week. We are in no way affiliated with that group,” Ivy said. “The Texas Nationalist Movement are working for a legal, peaceful, legislative, voted on by the people of Texas exit from the union. We are in close touch with the legislature, sponsoring legislation geared towards standing alone as a nation.”

Ivy said he hopes the public attends the reading to celebrate and remember Texas history even if there are many who disagree with the organization’s political stance.

“When I was a kid, Texas Independence Day was a pretty big deal,” Ivy said. “When I was a kid I remember getting out of school on Texas Independence Day as we should now.

It was as big an event as the United States Independence Day. Slowly, slowly, we’ve gotten away from that and slowly, slowly there is less and less attention being paid to our Texas heritage and our Texas

history and I think it’s so very important that our kids understand who we are as Texans.”

Correcting the record

An incorrect statement left uncorrected leads often to deception, disillusion and dishonesty. Take this hypothetical: I've agreed to speak at a local event, and the emcee, in her introduction, says something like, "Mark Shields went to the University of Notre Dame, where he played basketball." It's true that Notre Dame is my alma mater and that I regularly played pickup games of basketball while there. But the misimpression would be created that I'd played for my school on the men's basketball team. Before long, another imaginative emcee embellishes the intro to read, "Shields was a star college basketball player." And error would take wing.

Recently, Jay Nordlinger (whom I do not know) of National Review wrote: "The term 'chickenhawk' was coined by Mark Shields, a Democratic operative, columnist, and pundit. He used it to tar Dan Quayle, Dick Cheney (et al.) ... The rule was this: If you did not serve in combat, you could not advocate American military action. ... Only combat veterans had the right to support military action." Nordlinger is wrong on virtually every count. Forget that I did not coin "chicken hawk," which was used as early as 1967

by Rep. Mo Udall, D-Ariz., in a speech opposing the Vietnam War, some 12 years before I ever worked for a newspaper. Forget that I have not worked in politics for 36 years.

More importantly, he incorrectly defined terms. For the record, the disparaging term "chicken hawk" was reserved for those American men who during the Vietnam War, when all males 18 or older were subject to the military draft, employed a student deferment, a family contact, a contrived medical malady or even a calling to divinity school to avoid serving and who then later, as wounded and decorated Marine veteran of Vietnam Robert Timberg unforgettably wrote in the 1996 book "The Nightingale's Song," would reappear "loudly endorsing a confrontational stance with the Soviet Union, aid to the Nicaraguan guerillas, and military ventures into Lebanon, Grenada, and the Persian Gulf." Chicken hawks, Timberg continued, were "men whose testosterone gland abruptly began pumping after age twenty-six, when they were no longer vulnerable to the draft."

Yes, former Vice President Dick Cheney — with his five student deferments and with his under-oath explanation "I had other priorities in the '60s than military service" (when 58,303 Americans of his generation were giving their lives in Vietnam) — who appears since never to have seen a world trouble spot where he would not want to send

American soldiers and Marines, qualifies as a chicken hawk.

The chicken hawk can be counted on to endorse a national policy of military escalation, as long as it involves no personal participation.

U.S. Army Gen. Norman Schwarzkopf, after his successful leadership in the Gulf War, dispatched all the fawning flatterers this way: "It doesn't take a hero to order men into battle. It takes a hero to be one of those men who goes into battle." It would be irrational to say — and nobody I know has ever said it — that only Americans who have served in combat can advocate American military action. By that absurd standard, of the past 11 U.S. presidents since Harry Truman, only John F. Kennedy, Gerald Ford and George H.W. Bush would have been qualified to serve as commander in chief.

In the last analysis, character is destiny. Just as we would spurn the self-proclaimed tax reformer who turned out to be a tax evader, we refuse to honor the call to battle from those who, when summoned to defend their nation, went AWOL. The record is corrected.

Obama smears Netanyahu, coddles Iran

The Obama White House is in full war mode against Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin

Netanyahu, leader of our best ally in the Middle East, for accepting House Speaker John Boehner's invitation to speak before Congress, while it molycoddles that region's most dangerous nation, Iran.

No one crosses Obama without facing his wrath. No one dares. He is the president.

All the administration's long knives are out. National security adviser Susan Rice is front and center. You would think she would be more circumspect after embarrassing herself on the Sunday talk show circuit peddling the administration's lie that the terrorist attack on the U.S. Consulate in Benghazi, Libya, was prompted by an anti-Islam Internet video. But you would be wrong.

Rice told Charlie Rose on PBS that Netanyahu's speech before Congress will be "destructive of the fabric of the relationship" between the United States and Israel — as if the Obama administration hasn't been damaging that special relationship for years.

Secretary of State John Kerry weighed in on the subject on ABC's "This Week." Kerry said he doesn't want Netanyahu's speech to become "some great political football. Obviously, it was odd, if not unique, that we learned of it from the speaker of the House and that an administration (official) was not included in this process. But the administration is not seeking to politicize this." Kerry also said, "We have a closer relationship with Israel right now in terms of security than at any time in history."

White House spokesman Josh Earnest said, "The president has said the relationship between the U.S. and Israel can't just be reduced to a relationship between the Republican Party and the Likud Party."

Do these people hear themselves? They are like windup toys, always on message, always in sync and always the ones politicizing everything.

Obama is refusing to meet with Netanyahu while he is in Washington, bogusly citing his policy against meeting with foreign leaders close to their elections. This is absurd. Obama intervenes in foreign elections anytime he pleases, and he is doing so overtly and covertly in the Israeli elections.

But the howler is Kerry's claim that we have a closer relationship with Israel than ever before on security. If that were true, Netanyahu surely wouldn't have accepted Boehner's invitation to address Congress. Netanyahu is deeply worried that Obama's furtive negotiations with Iran are enabling, rather than impeding, its effort to acquire nuclear weapons. What could be more important to preserving Israel's national security (and ours) than keeping nuclear weapons out of Iran's hands?

The White House has been livid that Boehner invited Netanyahu to speak, citing an egregious breach of protocol and rank partisanship on Boehner's part.

Some Democrats and liberal commentators have even argued it is unconstitutional for Congress to take this step.

This would almost be amusing coming from this White House if it weren't so serious. If Obama had his way, he'd probably dissolve Congress as an inconvenient nuisance and obstacle to his iron rule. He usurps its authority at every turn. So even if this is a departure from protocol, it's not unconstitutional by any stretch, and Obama and his defenders have no standing to complain.

More importantly, let's remember what's at stake here and why Boehner chose to act. Boehner correctly noted that Obama spent only a few seconds discussing the terrorist threat during his State of the Union speech. It was actually worse than that.

Obama portrayed the global threat as being greatly diminished when it is rapidly proliferating.

Obama is either the most naive president concerning threats to our security in recent memory (including Jimmy Carter) or willfully blind to the threats — a matter that has many scratching their heads in disbelief.

Boehner said he wants Netanyahu to speak because "there's nobody in the world who can

talk about the threat of radical terrorism — nobody (who) can talk about the threat that the Iranians pose, not just to the Middle East and to Israel ... but to the entire world — (better than) Bibi Netanyahu."

Exactly so. When Congress witnesses Obama doing nothing but playing footsy with Iran while it feverishly pursues nuclear weapons, it has an obligation to act.

Let me ask you: If you were John Boehner and you believed that Obama's approach is facilitating Iran's nuclear pursuits and you had an opportunity to do something about it — within your constitutional power — would you take it?

Instead of focusing on the petty question of whether Obama has his nose out of joint over Netanyahu's speech or analyzing the alleged partisanship involved, the media ought to be highlighting the growing threat Iran represents and President Obama's reckless disregard for it. Can these people ever inhabit the adult world and look at substance instead of "optics"? Can they ever call our attention to real issues instead of sizing everything up in terms of which American political party benefits or suffers? We are talking about thermonuclear capability in the hands of a radical Islamic theocracy that might well be impervious to any threat of mutually assured destruction and thus far likelier to use these weapons offensively.

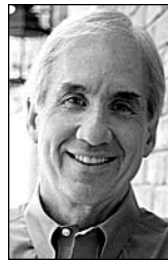
We can be sure of one thing. Neither the mainstream media nor Barack Obama is going to call the world's attention to this impending nuclear nightmare. As such, true peace lovers will welcome Netanyahu and are looking forward to his opportunity to take the stage, with the world in rapt attention, and articulate, unfiltered, the gravity of this threat.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — People aren't the only ones suffering from a seemingly endless winter of bone-rattling cold, record-busting snow and ice-slick sidewalks. Pooches' paws feel the pain, too.

While millions of residents from the Rocky Mountains to the East Coast shovel snow deep into the season and hunker down awaiting relief, their dogs are either missing out on walks or left vulnerable to injury with each salt-coated step.

Rock salt and shards of ice can cut feet or get wedged between toes, de-icing chemicals can burn paw pads and frostbite can happen. That's led to a late-season boost in sales of doggy boots, which can be an annoyance for canines but

allow owners to protect pets that are like family.

Malia Ebel of Concord, New Hampshire, has four dogs — two that will wear boots and two that won't or can't. Either way, when it dips below zero, Ebel cancels the crew's two daily walks.

“My two little dogs won't go out the front door without them when it's snowy,” she said of the dog boots worn by her Cavalier King Charles spaniel mixes.

Ebel trained 13-year-old Seymour and 12-year-old Sanders when they were young to wear boots, which are a necessity instead of a fashion choice.

“My dogs don't have a problem with the snow; it's the salt that hurts their feet,” she said. “So

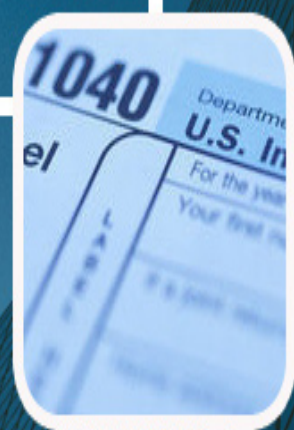
it's great that their feet are protected and they can walk on the street all winter. In a winter like this, there has been so much snow and they've had to salt the roads very consistently.”

The persistent winter has pushed Boston close to its 20-year-old snowfall record with more than 100 inches and seemingly froze Niagara Falls in place. While people throw up their hands at each new storm, the weather is giving a boost to pet clothiers.

At the Barker & Meowsky Paw Firm in Chicago, the number of boots sold each day in the last six weeks was four times higher than a typical day this winter, company President Alice Lerman said.

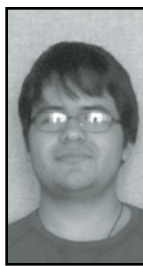
Connor, Rivera place well in All-State band

Weatherford, the third-place team in the North Texas Junior College Athletic Conference, is 19-11. The Coyotes finished 7-5 in NTJACAC play.

HC head coach Scott Raines said he expects a battle every time his team takes the floor in the event.

"It's much more balanced than last year," said Raines. "Hill and McLennan are both good, and I think our four teams are pretty close. Really, I think the team that goes in and gets a little momentum can go all the way."

"Records and rankings don't really mean that much now," he said. "Playoff basketball does funny things to teams," he said. "Everyone is hoping to take it to the next level."

This hand occurred in a multiple team-of-four match. At most tables, West opened with a spade despite holding only 10 high-card points. Most of the North players doubled one spade rather than overcalling with two diamonds, and the bidding then took off in different directions at the various tables.

In one case, the auction went as shown, South taking a blind stab at

six clubs, which proved to be lay-down. At other tables the contract was four or six hearts, or five or six clubs, and in each case — except one — declarer made the obvious 12 tricks.

Our story concerns itself with what happened at this one table, where South became declarer at six hearts rather than six clubs. West was a highly imaginative player who decided that, on the bidding, the chances of stopping the slam with normal defense were virtually nonexistent. And so, instead of leading the king of spades, he led the four!

No truer arrow was ever shot! Declarer followed low from dummy, on which East played the six, and West died a thousand deaths before South produced the deuce.

It did not take long for East to figure out why West had underled the A-K-Q of spades. He dutifully returned a club, and West's ruff sank the slam.

Had West made the more normal lead of a high spade, South would have made the slam easily. But with West's imagination working overtime, South had to pay off to a sensational, but well-reasoned, opening lead.

Dear Annie: My husband and I have been married for 10 years, but I sometimes wonder whether I love him or am just used to having him around. We have no kids, and I've started thinking of how my life would be without him.

This all began when he first displayed an awful temper. He never gets physically violent, but he hurts me tremendously with the things he says. He pays some of my bills, but always puts his wants and needs before household things that are more important, like fixing the car or filling my prescriptions. I have to walk on eggshells most of the time. When it's a holiday or Valentine's Day, he expects me to get

him something, but he never does anything special for me.

My friends think I'm still with him because I'm afraid to be alone. There are times when I enjoy his company, but not that often. I'm not

even sexually attracted to him anymore. Should I continue on because it just might be a phase I'm going through? -- Tired of It

Dear Tired: While all relationships go through ups and downs, yours includes verbal abuse and what appears to be a total lack of consideration. This is not acceptable behavior between loving spouses. If your husband is willing to go with you for counseling and work

on this, there is hope for the relationship. If not (and we suspect not), please talk to a counselor on your own and try to clarify your feelings enough to make decisions about your future. There are worse things than being alone.

Dear Annie: I have a friend who dominates every conversation. Upon sitting down to eat, she immediately starts talking about whatever is on her mind and never pauses to let anyone else get a word in. She never asks how anyone else is doing. If not interrupted, she can go on for hours.

Ironically, she complains about how her sister talks on and on about herself. She can see these traits in her siblings, but doesn't realize she is just as bad. Some days, I feel more like her unpaid therapist than a friend. Evenings out have become unpleasant to the point that we don't socialize

Don't suggest confronting these people. They would be so offended, I would lose their friendship forever. I am not looking to change the relationships. I am writing because I wish each person reading this would ask themselves, "Could this be me?" When you sit down with people, ask how their day was. Listen intently until they are done. Don't interrupt with something you "just have to" tell them. Maybe their conversation isn't fascinating, but neither is yours. Everyone should be allowed to share and be heard. -- Bored in the USA

Dear Bored: Amen. Some folks ramble on and on because they need to be the center of attention. Others have hearing problems and cannot clearly make out the conversation of others. Some fear they will forget what they intended to say if they don't blurt it out immediately. We hope they appreciate your tolerance.

Dear Annie: I read the letter from "A Kansas Caregiver," who asked people to lend a hand to the caregivers. I cared for my husband who had dementia for seven years before he died. My lifesaver during that time was my caregiver support group.

Since then, I have facilitated a caregiver group, and we meet monthly to share happy and poignant stories, medical progress, information about resources, etc. Mostly, meetings are a safe place filled with understanding,

nonjudgmental people who are all on the same journey. -- Baton Rouge, La.
