Autopsy expected to be performed today on Big Spring man struck by train

The Howard County Sheriff's Office is hoping an autopsy schedule this morning on a 35-year-old, whose body was struck by a train east of Big Spring Friday morning, will shed some light on the on-going investigation. According to Howard County Sheriff Stan Parker, the autopsy was expected

to occur today on Roy Cervantes. On Friday, emergency personnel were called to the railroad tracks east of North FM 700 at approximately 8 a.m. in response to a train/pedestrian accident.

When law enforcement arrived the body of Cervantes was located, according to a news release from the sheriff's office, and officials

suspected foul play. The incident is being investigated by the Howard County Sheriff's Office and the Texas Rangers.

The sheriff's office is urging anyone with information into Cervantes' death to contact authorities, by calling 432-264-2231 or 432-264-2244. Callers may call Crime Stoppers at 432-263-8477.

CBS 7 News reports that family and friends held a fundraiser for the family of Cervantes to help with burial costs.

"He was my world, there's no way to describe how I feel. Just that I miss him, and I'm sorry that he's not with us, and I couldn't be there to help him in anyway," Cervantes' sister, Guadalupe Castro, told CBS 7 News.

Vaping ban on tab at city council meeting

Is a cigarette a cigarette, regardless if it's electronic in nature or chock-full of tobacco?

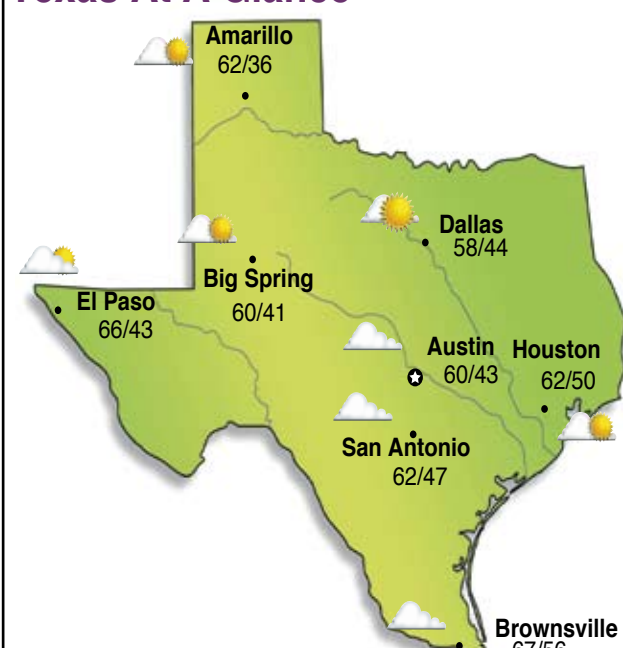

Electronic cigarettes do not contain tobacco, although they do use nicotine from tobacco plants. They do not produce cigarette smoke but rather an aerosol, which is frequently but inaccurately referred to as vapor, the web entry noted. However, there will be no distinction between electronic cigarettes and

their more traditional cousins if the proposed ordinance amendment is passed Tuesday. With few exceptions, smoking is prohibited in all enclosed public places within the city limits, except in designated smoking areas. Those exceptions include bars, cocktail lounges, private clubs and residences, designated smoking rooms in hotels and motels and outdoor areas. Also Tuesday, the council will likely can-

cel planned elections for the District 4 and District 6 council seats, as neither race will be contested this year. As thousands marched across the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, Alabama on Sunday, some of the demonstrators who were attacked by law enforcement there 50 years ago said they fear the country is becoming a place where widespread minority voter suppression is once again tolerated. The U.S. Supreme Court in 2013 eliminated section 4 of the Voting Rights Act, which required states with histories of minority voter suppression to get permission from the Justice Department before changing voting laws. "It's a slap in the face, an insult to all who have given their lives for righteousness sake," Willie White Harris, 70, of Selma, said after crossing the bridge once again Sunday. He was part of the 1965 march and said revisiting the bridge was bittersweet. "The struggle is just beginning really. We've got a long, long way to go. We've got to be vigilant." The weeklong march retracing the steps demonstrators took in 1965

was expected to begin Monday in Selma, Alabama and culminate Friday with a rally at the state Capitol. Police beat and tear-gassed marchers at the foot of the bridge in Selma on March 7, 1965, in an ugly spasm of violence that shocked the nation. The attack on demonstrators preceded the Selma-to-Montgomery march, which occurred two weeks later. Both helped build momentum for congressional approval of the Voting Rights Act later that year. This week's march is the end of a series of events that brought tens of thousands of visitors to the city of roughly 20,000 that became a focal point of the civil rights movement after Bloody Sunday. Those who gathered Sunday heard speeches from leaders including President Barack Obama and Georgia Rep. John Lewis — an Alabama native who was among the demonstrators attacked by law enforcement on the 1965 march. Both gave rousing speeches on the work left to be done to achieve equality and Obama also touched on improve-

ments in American race relations. The president mentioned recent high profile clashes between citizens and law enforcement on the circumstances leading to fatal police shootings and law enforcement tactics toward minorities. "We just need to open our eyes, and ears, and hearts, to know that this nation's racial history still casts its long shadow upon us," Obama said. "We know the march is not yet over, the race is not yet won, and that reaching that blessed destination where we are judged by the content of our character requires admitting as much." The president also addressed notions that characterized the civil rights era exists in more insidious forms today and little or nothing has changed since then. "Ask the female CEO who once might have been assigned to the secretarial pool if nothing's changed. Ask your gay friend if it's easier to be out and proud in America now than it was 30 years ago. To deny this progress — our progress — would be to rob us of our own

agency, our responsibility to do what we can to make America better," he said. The anniversary included a tribute to the late President Lyndon Johnson, who signed the Voting Rights Act into law. Luci Baines Johnson accepted an award at a unity breakfast event on behalf of her father, saying it meant so much to see him honored. "You remember how deeply Daddy cared about social justice and how hard he worked to make it happen," she told a crowd Sunday morning. Many visited Selma with the goal of inspiring a younger generation to continue demanding equality and warning them of what they risk losing by becoming

three-point shots – giving his 13 treys in the two games at the tournament.

De Paulo’s 26 leads NMJC to Region V title

BROWNWOOD – Angelica De Paulo pumped in a game-high 26 points on Saturday afternoon and led the New Mexico Junior College Lady Thunderbirds to a 65-52 victory over the Western Texas College Lady Westerners in the finals of the Region V Basketball Tournament in Brownwood.

With the win, NMJC improved to 30-3 and earned a berth in the women’s national tournament, which will tip off this weekend in Salina, Kansas.

Western Texas didn’t

make the win easy. The Lady Westerners, playing their third game in four days after needing a play-in game on Monday to secure the fourth-place seed in the WJCAC, fought to within 35-32 in the first half.

NMJC, which had entered the tournament as the Western Junior College Athletic Conference champion, blew the game open in the second by scoring a 30-20 advantage.

Brechelle Beachum led all WTC scorers with 13. Jocelyn Jeffrey added 11 more, including nine via three three-pointers.

Dolphins are optimistic about deal with Suh

MIAMI (AP) — The Miami Dolphins have pulled ahead in the Ndamukong Suh sweepstakes, and their lead may be insurmountable.

The Dolphins were privately optimistic Sunday that they would seal a deal with the All-Pro defensive tackle shortly after free agency begins Tuesday. Suh’s multi-year contract is expected to reach nine figures and set a record for an NFL defensive player.

Miami began negotiating with Suh’s agent Saturday to hammer out the framework for a contract, but teams can’t talk directly with players until Tuesday.

Suh and his agent didn’t respond to messages from the AP seeking comment.

Suh, whose contract with the Detroit Lions is expiring, has been hailed by many as the best free agent defensive player in a generation. He’s a three-time first-team All-Pro pick, including the past two seasons.

The Lions and Oakland Raiders were among

other teams bidding for Suh. But the Dolphins were eager to upgrade an aging defense, and they released five veterans in the past 10 days to create more salary cap space.

Suh has 36 sacks in five seasons, including 8½ in 2014, when the Lions made the playoffs with one of the NFL’s top defenses.

He has been fined several times for aggressive on-field behavior, and was nearly suspended for a playoff game last season. But he has been a dominating tackle ever since the Lions made him the second overall pick in the 2010 draft.

An aggressive approach in free agency is nothing new for Dolphins billionaire owner Stephen Ross. The Dolphins signed their top priorities each of the past two years — receiver Mike Wallace in 2013, and left tackle Branden Albert in 2014.

Even with those additions, the Dolphins went 8-8 each of the past two years. They haven’t made the playoffs since 2008.

Jets running back Chris Johnson shot in Orlando

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — New York Jets running back Chris Johnson and another passenger were shot in their shoulders while stopped at a traffic light in Orlando early Sunday morning, and the driver of the vehicle they were in was killed.

The NFL player and the passenger, Reggie Johnson, were in stable condition at a hospital Sunday. A person close to Johnson confirmed it was the running back who was involved. The person spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to speak on Johnson’s behalf.

Sheriff’s deputies said another vehicle pulled up to the Jeep the men were in and opened fire. The Jeep’s driver, Dreekius Oricko Johnson, was killed.

Deputies said no arrests had been made, and investigators were seeking witnesses.

“Our thoughts and prayers are with Chris and everyone impacted by this tragic event,” the Jets said in a statement.

The shooting adds some uncertainty to Johnson’s playing career. While he

is expected to fully recover, Johnson, who will be 30 in September, is still officially on the Jets’ roster but is due to become an unrestricted free agent on Tuesday, when the NFL’s new league year begins. The Jets cut ties with Johnson on Feb. 14, when they declined to exercise their contract option on him — meaning he will be free to sign with another team.

He was signed to a two-year, \$8 million deal by the Jets last April, after six years with the Tennessee Titans, to provide a versatile presence in the backfield. But, he had his worst statistical season while splitting time with Chris Ivory. He ran for 663 yards — his first season under 1,000 — and one touchdown, while catching a career-low 24 passes for 151 yards and a score.

Johnson also rarely resembled the dynamic player with game-changing speed who ran for 2,006 yards in 2009, earning him his “CJ2K” nickname while with the Titans. He rushed for 100 yards just once last season, when he had 105 on 17 carries.

This Date In History

Today is Monday, March 9, the 68th day of 2015. There are 297 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On March 9, 1945, during World War II, U.S. B-29 bombers launched incendiary bomb attacks against Tokyo, resulting in an estimated 100,000 deaths.

On this date:

In 1661, Cardinal Jules Mazarin, the chief minister of France, died, leaving King Louis XIV in full control.

In 1796, the future emperor of the French, Napoleon Bonaparte, married Josephine de

Beauharnais (boh-ahr-NAY'). (The couple later divorced.)

In 1862, during the Civil War, the ironclads USS Monitor and CSS Virginia (formerly USS Merrimac) clashed for five hours to a draw at Hampton Roads, Virginia.

In 1916, Mexican raiders led by Pancho Villa attacked Columbus, New Mexico, killing 18 Americans.

In 1933, Congress, called into special session by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, began its "hundred days" of enacting New Deal legislation.

In 1935, the animated cartoon character Porky Pig first appeared in the Warner Bros. animated short "I Haven't Got a

Hat."

In 1954, CBS newsman Edward R. Murrow critically reviewed Wisconsin Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy's anti-communism campaign on "See It Now."

In 1964, the U.S. Supreme Court, in New York Times Co. v. Sullivan, raised the standard for public officials to prove they'd been libeled in their official capacity by news organizations.
