A former Howard County Tax Appraisal District employee arrested Tuesday for theft by a public servant and tampering with governmental records has bonded out of the Howard Coun-

Vanessa C. Olivas, 32, was

one for each of her charges — Tuesday after she was arrested by Texas Rangers on warrants for tampering with governmental records and theft/more than \$20,000 but less than \$100,000 by a public servant. Howard County Justice of the Peace Robert Fitzgibbons set the bond.

Rangers conducted an investigation in reference to information received from the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles.

The theft charge carries a potential prison sentence of between 2 and 20 years, while the tampering charge is punishable by up to 10 years in prison.

Boil notice still in effect

The city of Big Spring remains under a boil water notice this morning as city officials await test results showing if contamination in the system has been purged.

On Monday a mechanical failure at the city water department occurred which let too much "dirty water" throughout the plant, prompting officials to issue a boil water notice to residents, said Johnny Womack, city public works director.

Crews have been pulling samples of the water from around the city for testing. Results from the tests takes about 24 hours to be returned, Womack said.

Until the ban is lifted, residents who consume city water should vigorously boil all water for at least two minutes to destroy all harmful bacteria and other microbes that could be present in the drinking water. That means all water used for drinking, cooking and ice should be boiled and cooled

FERGUSON, Mo. — Two officers were shot in front of the Ferguson Police Department early Thursday as demonstrators gathered after the police chief resigned in the wake of a scathing Justice Department report alleging bias in the police force and local courts.

St. Louis County Police Chief Jon Belmar said one officer was shot in the face, just below his right eye, with the bullet lodging behind his ear. The other officer was hit in the shoulder, and the bullet came out his back.

Both men were expected to recover without suffering any long-term damage, Belmar said, but the wounds could easily have been mortal.

"We could have buried two police officers next week over this," he said.

The 32-year-old officer who was shot in the face was from nearby Webster Groves. The

The shots were fired shortly after midnight as protesters gathered following Wednesday's resignation of embattled Ferguson Police Chief Thomas Jackson.

Both were taken to a hospital, where Belmar said they were conscious.

Authorities believe the shots came from a handgun. There were no suspects in custody.

Based on where the officers were standing and the trajectory of the bullets, the shots appeared to be aimed directed at the police, Belmar said.

"This is really an ambush," he said. "You are basically de-

fenseless. It is hard to guard against." The shots were fired shortly after midnight as protesters gathered following Wednesday's resignation of embat-

chanted to show their dissatisfaction with the resignations of Jackson and City Manager John Shaw this week, the St. Louis Post-Dispatch reported. Authorities from multiple law enforcement agencies also assembled at the scene.

The protest was a familiar scene in Ferguson, which saw similar and much larger demonstrations after the shooting death of black 18-year-old Michael Brown last summer by city police officer Darren Wilson. A state grand jury cleared Wilson, who is white, in November, sparking further protests, looting and fires. But Thursday morning was the first time an officer at a protest had been shot.

by the Associated Press, two shots ring out and a man is

heard screaming out in pain. Someone at the scene, unseen and unidentified in the video, says: "Acknowledgement nine months ago would have kept that from happen-

ing." Marciay Pitchford, 20, was among the protesters. She told The Associated Press that the protest had been mostly peaceful until she heard the shots.

"I saw the officer go down and the other police officers drew their guns while other officers dragged the injured officer away," Pitchford said. "All of a sudden everybody started running or dropping to the ground."

Belmar said the shots were fired from across the street from the police department.

After the shooting, officers with guns and in riot gear circled the station, and more than a dozen squad cars blocked the street.



urged "healing and reform," calling the shooting a "criminal act that jeopardized the lives of police officers and protesters both."

Jackson was the sixth employee to resign or be fired after a Justice Department report last

week cleared Wilson of civil rights charges in shooting. Wilson has also resigned. A separate Justice Department report released the same day found a profitdriven court system and widespread racial bias in the city police depart-

Mayor James Knowles III announced Wednesday that the city had

reached a mutual separation agreement with Jackson that will pay him one year of his nearly \$96,000 annual salary and health coverage. Jackson's resignation becomes effective March 19, at which point Lt. Col. Al Eickhoff will become acting chief while the city searches for a replacement.

Jackson had resisted calls by protesters and some of Missouri's top elected leaders to step down over his handling of Brown's shooting and the weeks of protests that followed. He was widely criticized from the outset for the aggressive police response to protests and his agency's erratic and infrequent releases of key information.

He took nearly a week to publicly identify Wilson as the shooter and then further heightened tension in the community by releasing Wilson's name at the same time as store security video that police said showed Brown stealing a box of cigars and shoving a clerk a short time before his death.

During a 12-minute news conference, Knowles said Jackson resigned after "a lot of soul-searching" about how the community could heal from the racial unrest stemming from the fatal shooting last summer. "The chief is the

kind of honorable man you don't have to go to," Knowles said. "He comes to you when he knows that this is something we have to seriously discuss."

The acting head of the Justice Department's civil rights division released a statement saying the U.S. government remains committed to reaching a "court-enforceable agreement" to address Ferguson's "unconstitutional practices," regardless of who's in charge of the city.

Jackson oversaw the Ferguson force for nearly five years before the shooting that stirred

body out there might be listening. This week, I know for sure. My last column essentially asked: What's the big deal about Hillary's emails if she's

turning them over anyway? Thanks to everyone who wrote to

make it clear just what a big deal this is for them. And then, in classic Clinton dam-

ESTRICH age-control mode, Hillary herself held a press conference at the U.N. on Tuesday to try to answer the critics.

In this case, however, rather than putting out the fire, I fear the Clinton machine may be fueling it.

Secretary Clinton acknowledged that using two email addresses — one for official government business and one for private matters — "might have been smarter." For sure. But the Clinton office has refused to turn over the server itself (where the emails and the forensic evidence as to when they were written and where they were sent, etc., are stored), giving Republicans (and my new pen pals) reason to scream bloody murder.

One of the first things I tell my clients is to be careful about emails. People write in emails things they would never actually write down on paper. They speak in shorthand that may make

sense at the time, but sounds pretty bad when read later. They are full of boasting and criticism and loose language. And of course, the first thing the government asks for when it investigates the company or its executives are the emails. In the corporate world, it's common to convict an individual or company based not on evidence the government has collected independently, not on secret witnesses or ex-employees, but solely on their own emails.

No one is better at damage control than the Clintons, so you have to wonder why they haven't just handed over everything, hook, line and sinker, all at once, putting out the fire with the sheer weight of the docu-

I have no inside information, but my guess is that there's no smoking gun on any of the servers, that there is no smoking gun at all, and this is a controversy that centers on talking points for the Sunday talk shows but some of the back and forth correspondence probably would have been better communicated by telephone. My guess is there's nothing in there about the Clinton marriage or her political ambitions that we don't already know — good and bad. So why not turn it all over?

By not handing over the server, Clinton has invited just the sort of speculation she doesn't need. Instead of putting the story to bed, as we say, she has given it new legs. According to Rep. Mike Pompeo, R-Kan., "This is

truly about getting the facts out for these poor families and the American people." Rep Trey Gowdy, R-S.C., who chairs the Benghazi investigative committee in the House, used the failure to produce the server as a justification for further investigation.

"Without access to Secretary Clinton's personal server, there is no way for the State Department to know it has acquired all documents that should be made public," adding that there remain "serious questions about the security of the system she employed from a national security standpoint" — although it appears that it was at least safe from Edward Snowden, which is more than can be said for the official servers. But Gowdy also now has an excuse to call Clinton to testify again.

It's unlikely any of this will end up having a bearing on the 2016 race. Absent a smoking gun, we tend to have short attention spans. Clinton will get by this. But privacy is something you don't get if you're running for president, as the Clintons know better than anyone, and Hillary Clinton's desire to preserve hers is just not going to work in the current climate.

encourage transparency.'

Continuing to address everything but the scandal at hand, Obama said: "Let me just say that Hillary Clinton is and has been an outstanding public servant. She was a great secretary of state for me." ("For me"? Not "for this nation"? Oh well, let's move on.)

You may have heard that Obama — this guy who is so hands-on in his quest to fundamentally transform America that he thinks the secretary of state is his personal emissary — has professed ignorance about a long string of matters that ought to be in his orbit. It truly is astonishing and would have never been tolerated in any other presidency. As long ago as March 2011,

when concerned citizens were trying to alert the public to the sordid facts surrounding the gunrunning scandal known as Fast and Furious, Obama was basking in his own cluelessness, if we are to believe his statements. He told CNN Espanol that he first heard about the scandal on the news. In a March 22 interview, Obama said: "There have been problems, you know.

Wouldn't it be great if Obama had so little curiosity about matters he truly has no business meddling in?

I heard on the news about ... Fast and Furious, where allegedly guns were being run into Mexico and ATF knew about it but didn't apprehend those who had sent (the guns). (Attorney General) Eric Holder has ... been very clear that he knew nothing about this." In other words, "I didn't know and my buddy Eric said he didn't know, and you shouldn't question either of us."

In September 2011, during a White House news conference, a correspondent asked then-press secretary Jay Carney whether Obama had been briefed about the Solvndra scandal. Carnev said: "I think he's probably read some news accounts of it. I'm not aware that he's been briefed. I mean, what happened here is an investment did not pan out. There are a variety of reasons for that that have to do with the international marketplace and the price." In fact, the administration was intimately aware of this scandal as it was developing and actively tried to conceal it.

In my book "The Great Destroyer," I noted that The Washington Post had reported that emails showed "vigorous debate within the Obama White House about whether the solarpanel manufacturer was a smart bet" and that Obama's "greentechnology program was infused with politics at every level." Making matters worse, even when Solyndra was on the brink of collapse, the administration was concerned not with the fate of the employees — rarely, if ever, was there discussion of the impact that Solyndra's collapse would have on laid-off workers but with the political fallout and optics and on Obama's reelection prospects. During a White House press

briefing in May 2013, Carney said Obama had first learned of the Justice Department's subpoenas for The Associated Press on "news reports" while he was on the road.

Also that month, concerning the IRS' targeting of conservative organizations, Obama said, "I first learned about it from the same news reports that I think

most people learned about this.' Remember how outraged he said he was and that he was going to take action? Never mind.

In October 2013, we learned that Obama had supposedly just learned that the National Securi ty Agency had been bugging the phones of world leaders, including German Chancellor Angela Merkel, for almost five years.

Around that time, then-Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius blithely claimed that President Obama was unaware of the enormous problems with the Obamacare website before its launch. Carney dutifully confirmed, saying, "There is no question that we did not anticipate the scale of the problems with the website."

In May 2014, CNN's Jim Acosta asked Carney about when Obama first became aware of the Veterans Affairs scandal, including that fraudulent lists were made to conceal wait times. Carney, exhibiting no more embarrassment than Obama later would with Plante, responded: "You mean the specific allegations that I think were reported first by your news network out of Phoenix, I believe. We learned about them through the reports."

There is a pattern here that demonstrates a combination of presidential absenteeism and overt corruption. If we take Obama at his word that he honestly didn't know about these stories before the public learned about them, we must shake our heads at the unprecedented level of apathy and ignorance he has displayed. If he did know about these matters — which we know is the case with some, such as Solyndra, and is very likely the case with others, such as the IRS scandal — then we have no choice but to conclude that he is among the most deceitful of presidents. But you already knew that.

"They really made an emphasis to get it inside to their big guy," Odiase said.


