Vaping back on the agenda

City council to tackle vaping ban Tuesday

Proponents of electronic cigarettes will have one last chance to convince the Big Spring City Council not to outlaw the practice in public places.

The council will consider the second and final reading of an ordinance banning the use of electronic vaping devices — more commonly known as electronic cigarettes or e-cigarettes — in public places when they meet in council chambers at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday.

The council approved the first reading of the ordinance by a 4-3 vote two weeks ago.

Mayor Larry McLellen, along with council members Raul Marquez Jr., Bobby McDonald and Raul Benavides voted for the measure, while Carmen Harbour, Justin Myers and Marvin Boyd were opposed.

Under the new ordinance, vaping will be prohibited in all enclosed public places within the city limits, except in designated smoking areas. Excepted places where the practice will be allowed include bars, cocktail lounges, private clubs and residences, designated smoking rooms in hotels and motels and outdoor areas.

An electronic vaping device, according to an entry in the

Wikipedia web site, is a battery-powered vaporizer which has a similar feel to tobacco smoking. Electronic cigarettes do not contain tobacco, although they do use nicotine from tobacco plants.

They do not produce cigarette smoke but rather an aerosol, which is frequently referred to as vapor, the web entry noted.

In other business Tuesday, the council will consider:

- Approval of a negotiated settlement between Atmos Energy Inc. and a consortium of West Texas cities, including Big Spring.

Big Spring Police Chief Chad Williams said more information about the case will be released later this afternoon.

Gas prices drop slightly

Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 0.9 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.22/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 gas outlets in Texas. This compares with the national average that has not moved in the last week to \$2.42/g, according to gasoline price website GasBuddy.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices yesterday were 111.7 cents per gallon lower than the same day one

year ago and are 10.6 cents per gallon higher than a month ago. The national average has increased 12.1 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 110.6 cents per gallon lower than this day one year ago.

"Gasoline trends are all over the place, depending on where in the country motorists are," said Patrick DeHaan, GasBuddy senior petroleum analyst. "While much of the country saw prices drift lower, two distinct regions saw the opposite."

The Great Lakes saw prices spike as refinery issues plague the region, following in the steps of what happened at the pump in the West several weeks ago. Illinois, Michigan, Indiana, Ohio and Wisconsin saw the largest moves — increases of more than a dime. The Rockies region also saw increases, yet much milder than what was hitting motorists in the Great Lakes. Cali-

fornia led declining states, falling double digits per gallon, as refinery issues have at least for the time being been dealt with, DeHaan said.

When pressed about what lies ahead, DeHaan said, “the coming week shows nothing guaranteed but uncertainty, as refiners begin finishing maintenance season, boosting production, and beginning to draw down on oil inventories that are setting records. This recipe will likely bring the lowest sum-

mer gasoline prices since 2010, but the short term outlook may vary based on region, with West Coast locales seeing falling prices, Rockies and Plains states will see slight increases or stability, with Gulf and East Coast regions seeing mild declines. Price trends in the Great Lakes will hinge on refinery issues being resolved.”

Texas advances to first Sweet 16 in 11 years

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — Lindsay Gottlieb looked to her left and Reshanda Gray, poised to go high in next month's WNBA draft, and wondered why it ended so soon.

California figured it might have the program's second Final Four team, or at the least some Sweet 16 swagger.

A 6-foot-7 center from Texas changed all that with one impressive performance in the paint.

Imani McGee-Stafford had 20 points and 11 rebounds while creating a daunting mismatch

inside, leading the fifth-seeded Longhorns past No. 4 seed Cal 73-70 on Saturday night for a berth in next weekend's Albany Regional.

"I did think this would be a year for some championships, or some celebrating," Gottlieb said. "It turned out to be more of a year of almosts. But sometimes when you don't get exactly what you want, you learn really important things along the way."

Between McGee-Stafford's imposing presence alongside 6-5 Kelsey Lang in the paint and a cast of scrappy guards

jumping in the passing lanes and wreaking havoc, Texas did everything on both ends of the floor to return to the regional semifinals for the first time in 11 years.

Freshman Brooke McCarty scored twice on driving layups down the stretch on the way to 16 points off the bench, and Texas pushed the pace to force Cal into bad decisions.

A year after losing a tough second-round game on Maryland's home floor, the Longhorns insisted they would have no problem taking on the Golden Bears with another feisty

home crowd against them.

Now, they're headed to the Albany Regional and a potential date with two-time defending champion Connecticut.

For Gottlieb, seeing Boyd and Gray bid farewell brought her to tears.

"What a ride with these two young women here, they're ready for the next thing," she said. "They've taken me on the ride of my life. I have zero regrets."

Cal's Mercedes Jefflo scored with 1:30 remaining to cut the Texas lead to 64-60 before Lang answered on the other end.

"We were just trying to keep pushing," McGee-Stafford said.

Lang added 14 points as Texas (24-10) took another impressive step under third-year coach Karen Aston.

Jefflo scored 22 points for Cal (24-10) on a night Pac-12 Player of the Year Gray fouled out with 2:35 remaining and seven points in her final collegiate game.

Boyd had 17 points, 10 assists and nine rebounds, just missing the triple-double while playing her last college game in her hometown.

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — The Big 12 salvaged its NCAA Tournament in Big Ten country.

Oklahoma overcame

Dayton's home-state advantage and moved on to a regional that seems truly up for grabs. West Virginia also had a successful run in Ohio State's hometown, but there is no doubt about the favorite where the Mountaineers are headed.

The Sooners and Mountaineers were the only Big 12 teams out of seven that made the field of 68 to get out of the first weekend.

Buddy Hield, Jordan Woodard and Oklahoma eliminated 11th-seeded Dayton 72-66 on Sunday to advance to the East Regional in Syracuse, New York, where the No. 3 Sooners will be the highest-seeded team.

Oklahoma meets sev-

enth-seeded Michigan State on Friday. The Spartans eliminated No. 2 Virginia earlier Sunday, while top-seeded Villanova was knocked out by North Carolina State on Saturday.

Sooners coach Lon Kruger, who joined Eddie Sutton as the only coach to take four teams to the round of 16, said there is no reason to think the bracket has opened up

for the Oklahoma.

"When you get to the Sweet 16, everyone deserves to be there. They've gotten there for a reason," he said. "Obviously, Michigan State is a terrific program and (coach) Tom (Izzo) does a great job and they've got that NCAA success culture. And our guys respect that. They know that the seeds really don't mean anything."

Hield scored 15 points, including a layup after Woodard's steal to make it 57-56 with 5:56 left. Oklahoma never trailed again, slowly growing its lead from the line. Woodard had 16 points, including seven free throws in the final minute.

Oklahoma held Dayton scoreless for 9:04 and without a basket for 10:32 in the second half.

With the Sooners up

four, Hield stuffed Darrell Davis as he went up for a fast-break layup after a turnover by Woodard. Hield said the turnover was his fault.

"I either had to foul them, don't let them get a shot up, but I made a good hustle play," the Big 12 player of the year said.

Oklahoma is in the Sweet 16 for the first time since 2009.

This Date In History

Today is Monday, March 23, the 82nd day of 2015. There are 283 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On March 23, 1965, America's first two-person space mission took place as Gemini 3 blasted off with astronauts Virgil I. Grissom and John W. Young aboard for a nearly 5-hour flight.

In 1933, the German Reichstag adopted the Enabling Act, which effectively granted Adolf Hitler dictatorial powers. In 1940, the radio program 'Truth or Consequences,' hosted by Ralph Edwards, was first broadcast over four CBS radio stations in New York and New England. In 1942, the first Japanese-Americans evacuated by the U.S. Army during World War II arrived at the internment camp in Manzanar, California. In 1956, Pakistan became an Islamic republic. In 1973, before sentencing a group of Watergate break-in defendants, Chief U.S. District Judge John J. Sirica read aloud a letter he'd received from James W. McCord Jr. which said there had been 'political pressure' to 'plead guilty and remain silent.'

In 1990, the romantic comedy 'Pretty Woman,' starring Richard Gere and Julia Roberts, was released by Buena Vista Pictures. In 2011, Academy Award-winning actress Elizabeth Taylor died in Los Angeles at age 79. Ten years ago: A federal appeals court refused to reinstate Terri Schiavo's feeding tube and the Florida Legislature decided not to intervene in the epic struggle over the brain-damaged woman; Schiavo's parents then filed a request with the U.S. Supreme Court. An explosion at a BP oil refinery in Texas City, Texas, killed 15 people.
