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SMMC's 'radKIDS' program teaches proactive approach to child safety

Scenic Mountain Medical Center, Big Spring YMCA and Safe Kids San Angelo have partnered to bring a program designed to help children to better protect themselves to

Big Spring.

"RadKIDS" – developed by Steve Daley– is a program aimed at providing education and enhancing a child's ability to utilize knowledge, skills and power to protect themselves from violence

and harm. Children are put through an eight-hour course that uses lectures, safety drills, physical skills and simulations to resist or stop violence or harm. Since its inception, more than 250,000 children have been trained as

a radKID.

The Big Spring pilot program began Wednesday and concludes with a graduation ceremony next Friday.

"This program is geared toward giving the power back to our children," said Catie

Wiedenhofer, National rad-KIDS trainer and Safe Kids representative. "Our children are our most prized possession and we need to do everything we can to make sure

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Showdown looms over nuclear deal with I

WASHINGTON — After securing a surprisingly broad and detailed framework for a nuclear agreement with Iran, President Barack Obama must now subject his signature foreign policy pursuit to the gauntlet of partisan American politics.

A blueprint finalized Thursday after marathon negotiations in Switzerland did little to ease the standoff between Obama and some lawmakers over Congress' role in a final accord. The president has vowed to veto legislation giving Congress the ability to approve or reject a deal, and he made a fresh appeal for lawmakers to give the U.S. and its international partners space to hammer out a comprehensive agreement ahead of a June 30 deadline. "The issues at stake here

are bigger than politics," Obama said. "These are matters of war and peace."

But Republican leaders reaffirmed their intent to vote on

legislation giving Congress the last word. Tennessee Republican Sen. Bob Corker, chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, said the panel will vote on such a measure when lawmakers return from a spring recess on April

"The administration first should seek the input of the American people," Corker

said. Some Democrats have backed Corker's quest for a congressional vote on an Iran deal, raising the possibility that lawmakers could override a presidential veto. New who is stepping down as top Democrat on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee after his indictment on corruption charges, is among those who backs congressional ac-

"If diplomats can negotiate for two years on this issue, then certainly Congress is entitled to a review period of an agreement that will fundamentally alter our relationship with Iran and the sanctions imposed by Congress," Menendez said in a statement Thursday.

For Obama, achieving a nuclear deal with Iran would be a crowning foreign policy

achievement and a validation of his pursuit of diplomacy. His overtures to Iran date back to his first presidential campaign in 2008, when he said he would be willing to talk with Tehran's leaders without preconditions. As president, he has staked enormous political capital on the nuclear negotiations, including secretly approving backchannel talks with Iran largely without the knowledge of

Congress and key allies. Senior aides said Thursday that Obama has devoted more time to Iran in recent weeks than any other foreign policy issue, a striking acknowledgment given the upheaval in Yemen and U.S. military engagement in Iraq and Syria.

With Congress in the midst of a two-week recess, the Obama administration has time to wage a campaign to get lawmakers to hold off on legislative action. The president called congressional leaders Thursday afternoon and administration officials



Kenya attack survivor says gunmen early in attack went to room where Christians were praying

GARISSA, Kenya (AP) — The militants who slaughtered 147 people in a Kenyan school appeared to have planned extensively, even targeting a site where Christians had gone to pray.

Survivor Helen Titus told The Associated Press on Friday that "They investigated our area. They knew everything." Titus, a 21-year-old English literature student, was shot in the wrist and is being treated at a hospital in Garissa, where the attack by al-Shabab Islamic extremists happened.

One of the first things that the assailants did early Thursday, she said, was to head for a lecture hall where Christians were in early morning prayer. Also Friday, a few men walked down a road in Garissa with signs including one that read "We are against the killing of innocent Kenyans!!!! We are

Indiana, Arkansas take different tacks in trying to stem uproar over religious objection laws

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Leaders in Indiana and Arkansas are looking to move forward after taking different approaches to tamp down concerns about discrimination over religious objections laws.

The two governors signed bills Thursday that lawmakers hoped would quiet the national uproar over whether the laws offered a legal defense for

discrimination against gays.

For Arkansas, the changes requested by Gov. Asa Hutchinson amid mounting criticism from retail giant Wal-Mart and other businesses meant revising the language to closely align with that in the 1993 federal Religious Freedom Restoration Act.

Russia's role in Ukraine seen as shifting from sending troops to training rebels

YENAKIEYEVE, Ukraine (AP) — On a recent spring morning, an important visitor watched Russian-backed rebels conduct infantry maneuvers in

"The general is very pleased," rebel commander Ostap Cherny told his troops, referring to the figure in camouflage encircled by guards. The man — almost certainly a Russian military

officer — became alarmed when he saw two journalists approach. His entourage shielded him forbidding photos — and the group sped off in a motorcade, the "general" safely inside a black Toyota SUV with no license plates. Nearly a year into the Ukraine conflict, the extent

of Moscow's direct involvement has become clear: They may wear camouflage, but the Russians' presence in eastern Ukraine is hardly invisible. At the same time, there has been a tactical shift

apparently aimed at minimizing Russia's military presence, part of an effort to persuade the West to lift economic sanctions.

Allies of Sen. Bob Menendez working to build support, raise funds after federal indictment NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — Allies of New Jersey Sen.

Bob Menendez have launched a coordinated public relations campaign to support him through what is likely to be a long and expensive legal fight over a litany of federal corruption charges. Menendez pleaded not guilty Thursday to charg-

es that he accepted nearly \$1 million in gifts and campaign contributions from a longtime friend in exchange for a stream of political favors.

His supporters have been working quietly behind the scenes since news reports emerged in March suggesting an indictment was imminent.

officials said Obama is open to discussions about how Congress can play an oversight role, though they reiterated Obama's opposition to any legislative action occurring while negotiators try to hammer out a final agreement ahead of a June 30 deadline. Officials also did not specify what kind of oversight

role they envisioned for lawmakers.

Several **Democrats** rallied around Obama after the framework was announced. Rep. Adam Schiff of California, the top Democrat on the House Intelligence committee, said the framework "indicates that a negotiated resolution of Iran's nuclear program may be possible" and he called on Congress to "ensure that its actions do not preclude reaching an acceptable agreement."

Skepticism of the Iran negotiations extends beyond Capitol Hill. Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, one of the fiercest critics, told Obama on Thursday that a final deal based on the agreement "would threaten the survival of Israel." The White House said Obama assured Netanyahu that the agreement would not diminish U.S. concerns about Iran's sponsorship of terrorism and threats toward Israel.

Arab allies are also skeptical of the negotiations. Obama also called Saudi Arabia's King Salman Thursday, and he invited the leaders of six Gulf nations— Saudi Arabia, United Arab Emirates, Qatar, Bahrain, Kuwait and Oman — to Washington this spring.

The U.S. and its negotiating partners — Britain, France, Germany, Russia and China have been engaged in nuclear talks with Iran for 18 months. After blowing past a March 31 deadline, the parties reached a framework agreement Thursday outlining limits Iran's nuclear program. In return, economic and financial sanctions related to Iran's nuclear programs are to be rolled back by the U.S., the United Nations and European Union after the U.N. nuclear agency confirms Iran's compli-

Another area that rad-KIDS focuses on is bullying. While most schools have enacted a zero tolerance policy, statistics show there are approximately 2.1 million bullies and 2.7 million victims. Students between fourth and eighth grades report that 90 percent are dealing with being bullied in school. Out of those students, there are 22 percent who report dealing with academic difficulties.

Sex among the goofballs

has not emerged a truly goofball politician since Anthony Weiner, the congressman and later

New York mayoral candidate who could not resist sending pictures of his private part so frequently and to so many women that it really was no longer a private part but rather a public spectacle. Go ahead; Google it. In fact, Yahoo it. My guess is

there are dozens of pictures of Weiner's public private part all over the Internet. The best example of a con-

temporary pol's being slightly goofball is Aaron Schock, the Republican from Illinois' 18th Congressional District. Yet he has had the good sense to resign from Congress. My guess is he suspected there was something shameful about his deportment. One cannot really be a goofball pol and accept the notion of shame. Yet what caused him to leave Congress? Was it the hubristic pride he took in his torso? Countless times, he was photographed displaying the exquisite torso of a male underwear model to the world. That was a hoot, and even more of a hoot was his appearance on the cover of Men's Health magazine with his shirt out and daringly unbuttoned to display his welltoned abs.

I am afraid the 33-year-old congressman, first elected at the tender age of 27, began to feel shame when it was discovered that "Downton Abbey" had inspired his congressional office's lavish redecoration. Then the Justice Department became interested. It began looking into who had

on hikes to glacier parks and on a private jet that took him off to football games. He sensed his expense account was more conspicuous than his abs, and he is about to vacate Capitol Hill. That is not the exit of a goofball congressman. That is the exit of a chap but a few steps ahead of the law.

One of the traits that distinguish a really goofball pol has got to be sexual excess. A sexcrazed politician is always the most reliable and entertaining political player. Think of former Sen. Larry Craig, the statesman from Idaho whose encounters with the vice squad in public men's rooms won him the appellation of being the Republican Party's leading lavatorian conservative. There has never been another. Or recall, if you will, the Hon.

Eric Massa, the Democratic congressman from New York who resigned after admitting to charges of groping and tickling male staffers. He told Fox News somewhat boastfully, "Not only did I grope (a staffer), I tickled him until he couldn't breathe." Then there was President Bill Clinton, whose frolics with Monica Lewinsky have been chronicled in that delightful document called the Starr Report.

In researching this column, I made a discovery that may explain why there are so very few goofballs in politics today. From the late 1960s until very recently, there has been a profusion of sexual offenders in politics. Clinton, Craig, Massa and, of course, Weiner are the most amusing. There have also been other famous figures — ex-Sen. John Edwards and ex-Sen. Gary Hart (his real name was Hartpence) — and lesser figures, whom we need not mention. Yet now there are few. Why, you might well

As I wrote some months ago, my guess is that the sexual revolution is now finished. The

infrequency of sex scandals in politics is but another manifestation of changing times. From the late 1960s to 2012, there was an astonishing outbreak of sexual antics in high places. Yet prior to the 1960s, sex scandals were rare. JFK's liaisons were kept under wraps. About the only presidential sex scandals featured Warren Harding and Grover Cleveland. Doubtless, there were other small fry, but I cannot find anything in the faraway past like the upsurge of sexual scandals during and after the 1960s. The times were amazing, and they produced some real goofballs and creeps. But they were also very uncharacteristic of American history. Not for nothing were we called a nation of puritans.

The war on sexual indulgence now being waged in this country, especially in universities, is uneven. Yet I think it is having its effect. Frankly, I think you would have to be crazy to be a fellow who would wink at a pretty girl, at least without first tendering her an application. It seems to me that this is an unfor tunate situation. Yet even worse is the situation that we find politics in. Without the Anthony Weiners, the Bill Clintons and the Larry Craigs popping up on the evening news — saying such things as "it depends upon what the meaning of the word 'is' is" — life is going to be pretty dull.

conservatives, it will wind up as a regional party, capable of winning Senate and House seats but incapable of winning a national election.

"We must nominate a presidential candidate who can reach across racial, religious, cultural and ideological lines," the establishment says, "so the moderate middle is the place to be."

The far right of the party, especially the religious right, hears this and goes crazy. It says, "We keep nominating moderates, and we keep losing! We nominate John McCain, and we lose. We nominate Mitt Romney, and we lose."

"It is time to wake up and coalesce around a true Christian conservative who is unafraid to endorse Christian values and talk about God and Jesus Christ," it says. "This is where America is, and it is where the Republican Party needs to be." The establishment has almost

always won this fight, by the way. The religious right of the Republican Party has not gotten the nominee it has wanted since Ronald Reagan (who wasn't religious personally). "But this time could be dif-

ferent," the right says. "Hillary

Clinton is going to be very vul-

nerable in the general election.

Voters have had eight years of a Democratic presidency, and they are weary to the bone. So this is the perfect time to pick a true conservative, a true Christian conservative, who will take this country back. This is no time to be muddling around in the middle, searching for moderate voters who will never vote Republican anyway."

So the knives have come out. As Trip Gabriel wrote in The New York Times on March 25, "fearing that Republicans will ultimately nominate an establishment presidential candidate like Jeb Bush, leaders of the nation's Christian right have mounted an ambitious effort to coalesce their support behind a single social-conservative contender months before the first primary votes are cast."

So when Sen. Ted Cruz, a rightwing, Christian conservative announced for the presidency March 23 (at a Christian university founded by Jerry Falwell, no less), the establishment instantly fought back. The establishment isn't called

that for nothing. It is established. And the word went out on Cruz: bright, articulate but without any record of accomplishment. A loser, in other words.

Charles Krauthammer said on Fox News Channel: "Cruz talks about 'you have to walk the walk rather than just talk the talk. You have to have done something.' But that's not his record in the Senate."

And The Wall Street Journal editorial page, which is as Republican establishment as you can get, recoiled in horror at the idea of Cruz as the nominee and dismissed him as another — you are reading this right — Barack Obama.

"Can a smart, articulate, 40-something first term Senator trained in constitutional law, who disdains his colleagues and lacks executive experience, make the leap to the White House?" the editorial began.

"President Obama proved it was possible in 2008, and now Ted Cruz will try to show that a Republican can do it too."

But though Obama got to the White House, the editorial strongly suggested that Cruz will not. And that's because the religious right is hopelessly wrong in its assessment of what it takes to win a presidential election in this country.

The religious right, however, does not care about sniffy edito-

This time, it believes, the party will finally wake up and smell the blood.

"Conservatives smell blood in the water," Kellyanne Conway, a Republican pollster, told The New York Times. "They feel they've got the best shot to deny the establishment a place."

Those in the establishment, these conservatives believe, must be elbowed aside like the geezers that they are. It doesn't matter how much money the establishment can raise or how many voters it can deliver. The Republican establishment does not understand religious America and the true power it has.

"Far too many Christians have ceded the public arena to people that aren't believers," Cruz told David Brody of the Christian Broadcasting Network.

And that is the secret weapon. "God isn't done with America yet," Cruz said at his announce-

And the religious right isn't done with the Republican Party.

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

achel's death caused a major shakeup in Jacob's

Rachel's handmaid, Bilhah, took the newborn baby, Benjamin, and 8-year-old Joseph into her tent to care for

Jacob's primary residence had been with Rachel; now he, too, moved into Bilhah's tent. Many scholars

see this as = a major affront to Leah,

who was his first wife. Some, however, take the more rational view that, since Bilhah was Rachel's maid, it was only natural that she

should take the responsibility of caring for Rachel's children. Now that Jacob's favored wife was gone, it seems only natural that he would want to be close to her children, only natural that he moved into Bilhah's tent.

With Rachel's death, Leah looked forward to the end of their rivalry for their husband's affections. Now it seemed she was being replaced by a hand-

Although at times Bilhah is spoken of as Jacob's wife, she actually was considered a concubine and, therefore, had a lower status. Reuben, Jacob's firstborn son, became jealous for his mother's

In the translation from the Hebrew, the short account of this

incident actually says that "Reuben went and lav with Bilhah, his father's concubine, and Israel heard."

However, major commentaries of the time wrote that Ruben was so incensed, that he went into Bilhah's tent and moved his father's bed into Leah's tent. In their culture, the fact that the son entered his father's bedroom was a grave disgrace; the incident was tantamount to adultery.

In the original Hebrew writing of the account, it actually says "Reuben lay with Bilhah, his father's concubine." However, this is followed by an asterisk and a long blank space.

To me this seems that there was more that Moses wanted to actually record it. The



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next sentence begins another subject altogether.

There is much to be considered in this incident. If Reuben actually had lain with Bilhah, wouldn't she have become tainted and shunned? If all the family knew that Reuben had defiled his father's wife, wouldn't he have been stoned? Would he still be spoken of as Jacob's firstborn?

Yet, he continued to be responsible for directing his brothers in their work; and when they wanted to kill Joseph, it was Reuben who persuaded them to put him into the pit instead of killing him. Reuben intended to rescue Joseph from the pit later.

When the brothers went down to Egypt for grain, Reuben took the lead as firstborn, also. It is not mentioned again until Jacob is blessing his sons just before his death. At that time he compares Reuben with water-like impetuosity because he let his zeal and anger out-weigh his common sense in the matter of mounting his father's bed.

This is an example to us. How often do we angrily rush in? We say

or do things that, in the back of our minds, we know are wrong; later we try to justify our actions. Maybe we call it "Righteous Anger." That did not work very well for Reuben. God sees.

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
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Why would you bury a baby?

hat may seem like an absurd question, especially when asked out of the blue. I'm not referring to a baby that has died. I am thinking of a living, growing child, a pure, innocent babe with an innate hunger and thirst for nourishment and love and affection. Why

you bury a baby? Unless a person is psychologically unstable, they would never do such a

thing.



I would like to make a spiritual application to this. Before I do, however, we need to think about the New Testament as a whole.

The books, as we are familiar with them, are arranged topically or by category. Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John (the gospel accounts) reveal Jesus to be the Christ

(Hebrew=Messiah). They record His work here on earth as well as His teachings. They detail the culmination and conclusion of His earthly ministry as He suffered and died on the cross, was buried in the tomb, and was raised by the power of God on the third day, victorious over sin and death!

He was then with His apostles and other witnesses for 40 days further instructing them and preparing them for His physical departure. Next, the book of Acts gives us an historical account of events from the ascension of Jesus until near the end of the Apostle Paul's work while in Rome awaiting his appeal to heard by Caesar.

In Acts we read about the beginning of the kingdom, the church. We see how people responded to the "good news" of the gospel and what they did to become disciples of Christ or Christians (Acts 11:26).

Then, in the epistles (Greek word that means letters), these are the books from Romans through Jude, we have inspired men (Paul, James, Peter, and John) writing to give encouragement and further instruction to those who have already become Christians.

Whew!

Now, back to our spiritual illustration — why would you bury a baby.

A few times in the New Testament, some Christians are referred to as babes (small children). This is because they have recently been converted and are spiritually like a baby who needs nourishment and love in order to grow. In some of his letters

to Christians, Paul reminds and even further enlightens them as to how they came to be in Christ. Galatians 3:25-27, But now that faith has come, we are no longer under a guardian (in context the Law of Moses), for in Christ Jesus you are all sons of God, through faith. For as many of you as were baptized into Christ have put on Christ.

To another congregation of the church he described their conversions thus – Ephesians 4:20-24, *But that is not* the way you learned *Christ!* — *assuming that* you have heard about him and were taught in him, as the truth is in Jesus, to put off your old self, which belongs to your former manner of life and is corrupt through deceitful desires, and to be renewed in the spirit of your minds, and to put on the new self, created after the likeness of God in true righteousness and holiness.

In Colossians 3:1-3, Paul writes to Christians, If then you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth. For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God.

So how does a person do these things that Paul writes about? How do I put on Christ? How do I put off my old self and put on my new self? How can I be raised with Christ after I have died to myself?

How do I become that spiritual babe who has been born again of water and spirit so that I can enter the kingdom of God (John 3:3-5)? Paul explains in

Romans 6:3-4, Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life.

That is why our Lord would give his apostles their final instructions before He left earth by telling them in Matthew 28:19-20, *Go therefore* and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age. And in Mark 16:15-16, *And he said to* them, "Go into all the world and proclaim the gospel to the whole creation. Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved, but whoever does not believe will be condemned."

A person's spiritual rebirth occurs when they die to themselves and their physical desires and are buried with Christ in baptism for the remission of their sins (Acts 2:38). They are now a babe in Christ, a new creation, innocent and pure and in need of spiritual nourishment so they might continue to grow in the grace and knowledge of Jesus Christ (Matthew 5:6; 2 Peter

Why then would you take this precious spiritual baby and bury it?




Reflections: Resurrection faith by Bill Tinsley We may cause pain to

ot long ago I preached the funeral of a woman I have known for 45

years. By the time she ended her long battle with breast cancer she was in her mid-50s. When I

first met her, she





But somewhere along the way, whether in prison or afterward, she came to faith in Jesus Christ. Like the

woman who pressed through the crowd, she touched the hem of His garment. As Jesus said to another woman so many years ago, He said to her, "Daughter, your faith has made you whole."

In the last decade I saw her reunited with her first-born whom she gave up in her youth. She was reconciled with her family who surrounded her in love. God brought a good man into her life who, like her, was a recovering alcoholic.

She often shared with me her testimony of

faith and what God had done in her life. She still wasn't perfect. She still had issues. But she was different. God was healing her on the inside.

The week before she died, we visited.

Family and friends gathered around her, comforting her, praying for her and loving her. On Wednesday of that week, she drew her last breath.

Once again, I thought of her as that innocent blue-eyed girl I first knew. It reminded me of Jesus' visit to the

home of a mother and father whose 12-yearold daughter had died. The house was surrounded by people who were weeping. But Jesus entered the child's bedroom with her parents and spoke these gentle words to her. "Little girl, I say to you, get up!" She immediately breathed, opened her eyes and got

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — John Calipari has endeared himself to Big Blue Nation because he does what Wildcat fans demand — win.

petes annually for national titles. Now he can immortalize himself in the eyes of Kentucky's rabid fans by giving them something they've never had — an undefeated national championship.

And you can bet your last Bluegrass dollar that Indianapolis will be overwhelmingly blue with throngs flocking to see firsthand if their unbeaten Wildcats can get two more wins at the Final

Then again, they always are.

"Ever since we've been going to games we've hoped for a season like this, unbeaten and perfect," said Roy Holsclaw, 81, who attended Kentucky's 1958 title-clinching game with his wife Katherine and has been a season ticket holder since 1959.

"I never thought we'd experience anything like this. It's a once-in-a-lifetime possibility and we hope to see it happen."

An estimated 10,000 turned out in Louisville for the Midwest regional and filled the lower bowl of the rival Cardinals' home court — for practice. Yes, we're talking about practice!

"I think they're crazy, but I've said it before," Calipari said of his fan base. "They're nuts. But it makes them what they are and they're passionate about letting everybody know, 'I'm a Kentucky fan."

Friday's open practice at 71,000-seat Lucas Oil Stadium leaves room for at least twice as many Wildcats fans to invade in hopes of giving Kentucky (38-0) a decided advantage in Saturday night's Final Four rematch with Wisconsin (35-3). Fans of the Badgers, Duke and Michigan State no doubt have similar ideas and are known to travel just as well.

That's just fine with Big Blue Nation, which welcomes challengers to their boasts of being national champions in fandom as well. The fans will take over the city because that's what they do.

Shaka Smart leaving **VCU** to coach Texas

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) - Shaka Smart has been a hot coaching commodity since leading Virginia Commonwealth to the Final Four in 2011. He had reportedly shunned several big-time offers, but the lure of Texas was finally too much to turn down.

VCU sports information director Scott Day confirmed Thursday night that Smart was leaving the Richmond university to take over the program in Austin. Smart met with VCU players earlier in the evening at the Siegel Center, the team's home arena, and at least one player was seen crying when he left.

Smart, who has won at least 26 games in each of his six seasons at VCU, is bolting for a Texas program that hasn't been able to unseat Kansas atop the Big 12. But the Longhorns also boast the wealthiest athletic department in the country and easy access to some of the nation's most fertile recruiting grounds in Dallas and Houston.



♣Q643 First, you should conclude that the slam cannot be made if the trumps

are divided 4-1. This is because if either defender had four trumps and you drew them, you'd have no more trumps and would automatically go down two. You therefore start by assuming a 3-2 trump division. You next consider how the missing five hearts might be divided.

Again you make an assumption before proceeding. Oddly enough, this time you assume that the hearts are not divided 3-2 because, if they are, you are sure to succeed with any reasonable line of play. It's not that you don't want the hearts to be divided 3-2 — you'd be

delighted if they were — but that you would like to arrange your play so as to guard against a 4-1 division, if possible (you have no chance against a 5-0 break).

Once you assume the 4-1 heart division, you have to decide how to

four hearts, and then the ease where South has them. One approach to dealing with the problem is to imagine that North has a hand such as ♦ 62 ♥ QJ73 ♦ 842 ♣ J1085 and proceed from there. At trick two, you cash the ace of


hearts, on which South plays the ten. Next you enter dummy with a dia-mond and lead another heart. If South ruffs, you later play two rounds of trumps, cash the king of hearts, ruff a heart in dummy and so make the slam. If South does not ruff, you win the heart with the king, concede a heart to North and later ruff a heart high in dummy to produce 12 tricks. If North has the singleton ten,

jack or queen of hearts, the play is even simpler. After cashing the heart ace and seeing the ten, jack or queen appear on your left, you draw three rounds of trumps ending in dummy and then lead a heart. If South follows low, you finesse the nine; if South produces one of the two missing honors, you win with the king and return the nine.


If both defenders follow low on the ace of hearts at trick two, your best chance is to cross to dummy with a diamond and return a heart toward your K-9-8-5, playing the king if South follows suit.



Today is Good Friday, April 3, the 93rd day of 2015. There are 272 days left in the year. The Jewish holiday Passover begins at sunset. Today's Highlight

History: On April 3, 1865, Union forces

occupied the Confederate capital of Richmond, Virginia. On this date:

Tennessee, civil rights leader

Martin Luther King Jr. deliv-

ered his famous "mountaintop" speech to a rally of striking sanitation workers. In 1974, deadly tornadoes began hitting wide parts of the South and Midwest before jumping across the border into Canada; more than 300 fatali-

In 1985, the landmark Hollywood Brown Derby restaurant closed after 56 years in business

ties resulted from what became

known as the Super Outbreak.

In 1990, jazz singer Sarah Vaughan died in suburban Los Angeles at age 66.






