Analyst: Summer prices should be lowest in 10 years

Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have risen a penny per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.21 a gallon Sunday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 gas outlets in Texas. This compares

with the national average that has increased 0.5 cents per gallon in the last week to \$2.39/ gallon, according to gasoline price website GasBuddy. com.

Including change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices yesterday were \$1.25 per gallon lower than the

same day one year ago and are 3.0 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has decreased 4.9 cents per gallon during the last month and stands \$1.25 per gallon lower than this day one year ago.

"Amid all the talk about gasoline prices, I think there's a few major points no one is remembering," said Patrick DeHaan. GasBuddy senior petroleum analyst. "And that is the climate that is gasoline prices — how today's air is crisp, blue, unlike the past five years when clouds made it impossible to feel optimistic

about hitting the road for summer." GasBuddy last week forecast that summertime gasoline prices would be at their lowest

"Raku is an older Japanese technique developed around the 16th century that uses a very quick firing technique that yields dramatic black and metallic glazes,"

"The fact is, I would have taken 14 under at the start of the week," he said. "I played really well to shoot 14 under and I simply got outplayed by a young player who just played some incredible golf."

On a resume highlighted by five major titles, it was Mickelson's 10th second-place finish in golf's biggest events.

It also completed a Grand Slam of sorts, one he would prefer not to have.

Mickelson has now finished second in every major championship.

This won't hurt nearly as bad as some of the others, especially all those close calls in the only major Mickelson has never won, the U.S. Open.

At 44, Mickelson hasn't played all that well in recent years on the PGA Tour. But he knows how to get up for the biggest events, having won the British Open in 2013 with a stirring final-round comeback, and finishing second in the last two majors going back to the 2014 PGA Championship at Valhalla, where he was one stroke behind Rory McIlroy.

"I don't have a great explanation other than I really focus on those events," Mickelson said. "It's not my motivation to go out and try to grind out wins week after week. I want to zero in on our four or five biggest events, and I've been fortunate in that I've been able to get some of my best golf out of those events."

Spieth dominated this Masters from start to finish. Mickelson started the final round five shots back and never got within four shots of the lead, even after holing out an eagle from the bunker at the par-5

15th hole.

He was doomed by three bogeys spread throughout the round, keeping the popular player from really getting the Augusta patrons on his side. They cheered him all the way, of course, but never unleashed one of those really big roars that would have signaled Lefty, playing just ahead of Spieth in the next-to-last group, was making a serious move.

"Every time I got a birdie here or there, I stalled with a bogey," Mickelson said. "It was a really fun tournament. I thought I played some good golf. I just got outplayed."

Harden has 30 to help carry Rockets over Pelicans, 121-114

Harden didn't score in the fourth quarter against the New Orleans Pelicans on Sunday

The Houston Rockets came away with a 121-114 victory anyway thanks to the work of Dwight Howard and Corey

Harden scored 30 points and the Rockets made a big run at the beginning of the fourth quarter to take the lead and held on for the win.

The Rockets ended a two-game skid behind the NBA-leading 35th 30-point game for Harden.

Brewer and Howard carried Houston in the opening minutes of the fourth quarter combining for all of the Rockets' points in a 14-5 run that put them on top 100-91.

"That first unit in the fourth quarter really cleared the way, pushing the lead up and creating the intensity in the arena and it carried the whole fourth quarter," Harden said.

A highlight of Houston's run at the beginning of the fourth quarter came when Howard converted an alley-oop pass before blocking a shot by Eric Gordon, grabbing the ball and

dishing it to Brewer for a layup to cap the run.

"We got in transition and everything came easy, especially when Dwight was blocking shots," Brewer said. "That's what we needed. We needed a lift. We didn't have a lot of energy or intensity and I felt like I needed to put it upon myself to bring the energy."

New Orleans coach Monty Williams thought Brewer's play early in the fourth was the key to Houston's win. Brewer had 13 points in the fourth quarter.

"The defense at the end of the third and beginning of the fourth and Brewer's energy really changed the game," Williams said.

New Orleans scored six straight points to get within five with about a minute left, but Pablo Prigioni made two free throws to extend the lead.

Anthony Davis had 27 points for the Pelicans who are fighting for the final Western Conference playoff spot.

Howard finished with 19 points and 11 rebounds and Brewer added 20 points.

The Pelicans were down by eight with about 5 minutes remaining when they started in-

tentionally fouling Josh Smith to keep the ball out of Harden's hands. It was the second straight game that an opponent had used the tactic on Smith, after the Spurs did it 12 times in the second half of their 104-103 win Friday night.

New Orleans did it three times, with Smith making 3 of 6 free throws, his last one pushing Houston's lead to 112-100 before he was replaced by Howard.

They continued the hacking tactic on Howard and he also made 3 of 6 free throws before going to the bench. The Pelicans made six points in that span to cut the lead to 115-106 with 2 1/2 minutes remaining.

The Rockets were down by nine points in the third quarter when Harden got hot, scoring 10 points in a 15-6 run that tied it at 86 entering the fourth quarter. Harden made two free throws at the beginning of that run before making four layups to help Houston close the gap.

A 3-pointer by Quincy Pondexter pushed the Pelican's lead to eight points with about 10 minutes left in the third quarter. Houston then used a 10-2 spurt, with two 3s by Jason Terry, to

TexasteammatesPrince Fielder and Adrian Beltre simply stared into right field from the edge of the dugout as Springer ran in celebrating the grab.

The Rangers stranded 15 runners, included the bases loaded three times, and couldn't finish off the rally despite seven walks and four hit batters by Houston pitching. But there was a simple reason in the mind of Fielder.

"If somebody doesn't catch a game-winning grand slam," he said with a smile.

Houston left-hander Tony Sipp, who benefited from the flashy catch, was

my best face for TV on a walkoff," Sipp said. "I thought it was a home run. One catch turns everything."

Conger entered in the 12th inning and homered after Evan Gattis reached base for the first time this season — on a walk in his 21st plate appearance of the vear.

Robbie Grossman ran for Gattis, but it didn't matter when Conger pulled a pitch from Jason Verrett (0-1) into the second row of seats in right field.

Today's hand aptly demonstrates that point. The deal occurred in a playoff match to determine which of two teams would represent the United States in the 1973 world championship.

It was the first deal of a 128board match, and it was a harbinger of things to come. At one table, North-South got to seven hearts as shown and unluckily went down one when Jeff Rubens, partnered by B. Jay Becker, led a spade, which Becker ruffed. Rubens reasoned that, based on

the bidding, there was a good chance that North-South held nine spades, so he chose the spade lead as the best shot to stop the grand slam. At the second table, where

Rubens' teammates, Andy Bernstein and Becker's son Mike, held the North-South cards, the bidding went more quickly: East South West North

4 **♣** 7 **♠** Dble Pass Pass 5 💠 Pass Bernstein, North, naturally started to think in terms of a slam after his partner doubled East's preemptive bid for takeout, and he backed his appraisal with a cuebid of four clubs. When Mike showed more than a fair-to-middling double by

cuebidding in return, Bernstein jumped to seven spades. Strictly speaking, seven spades was not as good a contract as seven hearts — mathematically, there was a greater chance of a heart ruff with spades as trump than a spade ruff with hearts as trump — but seven spades was the winner, while seven hearts was the loser.

Sometimes luck, rather than skill, proves to be the key component in the outcome of a deal.






