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Early voting begins April 27 for municipal, school elections

Early voting in municipal and school district elections begin in a week.

Ballots can be caste for Big Spring and Coahoma city and school district races on Monday, April 27 through Tuesday, May 5, at the election office located on the first floor of the Howard County Courthouse.

Voting will be held during normal business hours. Extended voting hours will be held on Thursday, April 30 and Tuesday, May 5 from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m both days.

The county is still accepting applications to receive a ballot by mail. The cut off date to apply for a mail-in ballot is 5 p.m. April 30. To request an application, call Brooke Wells at 432-264-2273.

People who qualify to vote by mail are those who will be out of the county during the early voting period and election day; persons who are age 65 years and older; or are sick and disabled or are confined to jail during the early voting period and on Election day.

Gas prices edge slightly up in Texas

gasoline prices in Texas have risen 5.0 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.26/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 gas outlets in Texas. This compares with the national average that has increased 6.6 cents per gallon in the last week to \$2.45/g, according to gasoline price website GasBuddy.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices yesterday were 122.1 cents per gallon lower than the same day one year ago and are 3.7 cents per gallon higher than a month ago. The national average has increased 2.4 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 121.5 cents per gallon lower than this day one year

"Oil prices saw notable gains last week, rising to new 2015 highs. That translated into some hefty gasoline price increases in some states, while none were left behind. All fifty states saw gasoline prices move higher," said Patrick DeHaan, GasBuddy senior petroleum analyst. "Largest price increases were witnessed in the Northeast and East, with New Jersey, Connecticut, New Hampshire,

South Carolina Massachusetts and seeing average rise over 10c/gal. I would lay blame for these increases on oversensitive traders, who bid oil prices higher last week after oil inventories rose at their smallest amount since January. Also entering the





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Group seeks rehiring of workers at 5 closed Wal-Mart stores

NEW YORK (AP) - Agroup made up of Wal-Mart workers is asking labor regulators to go to court to force the discounter to rehire all 2,200 employees affected by the abrupt temporary closing of five stores a week ago.

The United Food and Commercial Workers International Union filed the charge on behalf of OUR Walmart with the National Labor Relations Board on Monday, arguing the closings were retaliation for labor activism. Wal-Mart says it closed the stores to fix plumbing issues.

One affected store, in Pico Rivera, Calif., has been a hotbed for worker protests against Wal-Mart. It was the first store to wage such protests, in October 2012. The other stores are in Midland and Livingston, Texas: Tulsa, Oklahoma; and Brandon, Florida.

"This is a new low. even for Wal-Mart," Venanzi Luna, an eightyear Wal-Mart worker and member of OUR Walmart, said in a statement. "Through OUR Wal-Mart, we're going to keep fighting back until the company gives us our jobs

Wal-Mart couldn't immediately be reached for comment on the action. But it has argued it closed the stores because of major plumbing issues, not because of worker protests.

Wal-Mart spokesman Lorenzo Lopez told *The* Associated Press that the stores would remain shuttered for up to six months. The company has said that the workers would be put on paid leave for two months and it would look to transfer some to nearby stores. He did acknowledge

that it was atypical for Wal-Mart to temporarilv close stores for plumbing issues but said the company wanted to improve the customer experience.

"We understand this decision has been difficult on our associates and our customers and we aim to reopen these stores as soon as these issues are resolved and improvements made," Wal-Mart said in a statement.

Lopez noted that the stores have had between 100 and 140 service calls for plumbing issues, the highest incidence of plumbing issues in its 4,500 stores. He declined to elaborate on specific problems but

said they involved water leakage and that equipment needed to be cleaned out.

He also said the retailer would look to make other updates to the stores. Lopez said the company has not filed any local construction permits because it still is assessing what needs to be done.

The worker group wants the labor board to seek a court injunction, which can be quicker than typical NLRB proceedings, the group said. Wal-Mart has gotten

itself in trouble for similar actions. In June 2014, the Canadian Supreme Court ruled that Wal-Mart had violated labor laws when it closed a store in Quebec. The employees in that location had voted to join a union. That made it the first unionized store in North America just before the store was closed.

Wal-Mart has been making moves increase pay for its workers. The company announced in February that it was increasing the minimum wage it pays its hourly workers to at least \$9 this month and to at least \$10 in February 2016. The federal minimum wage is \$7.25 per hour.

Detroit Zoo to turn manure from its animals into power

ROYAL OAK, Mich. (AP) — The Detroit Zoo is planning to turn abundant piles of animal manure into The zoo in the Detroit suburb of

Royal Oak says Monday that construction on the anaerobic biodigester begins this spring and will be completed this year.

The biodigester will turn about 400 tons of manure a year as well as other organic waste into methanerich gas. This gas will be used to help power the 18,000-square-foot Ruth Roby Glancy Animal Health Complex, saving \$70,000 to \$80,000 in annual energy costs.

The system also will convert manure into compost that will be used to fertilize animal habitats, gardens and public spaces.

As part of the effort, the Michigan Economic Development Corp. and the Detroit Zoological Society are conducting a crowdfunding campaign.

Police believed the 2,000-pound animals remained within city limits last week but said Monday that their location is unknown. The six buffaloes escaped from a nearby farm and spent Thursday running through neighborhoods and eluding authori-

One of the animals was hit by a car and three were tranquilized.

Hot Springs is a popular tourist spot with natural hot springs, a national park and horse track.

Kenseth ends 51-race drought with victory at rainy Bristol

BRISTOL, Tenn. (AP) — After four rain delays and 11 extra laps, Matt Kenseth finally drove to victory lane.

It took him nine hours to get there Sunday at a water-logged Bristol Motor Speedway.

Kenseth snapped a 51-race losing streak by holding off Jeff Gordon and Jimmie Johnson on one final restart in NASCAR's determined effort to stage a complete race.

Kenseth, a seven-race winner in his 2013 debut season with Joe Gibbs Racing, was winless all last year. "It feels good to be back here.

Not winning for as long as we did ... it wears on you a little bit," Kenseth said. "We had such a good 2013, and last year there were some races we had some chances to win and just things wouldn't line up for us.

"We just couldn't get it to happen. (Bristol) was kind of the opposite. Everything worked

The start was delayed nearly 90 minutes because of rain and the race was stopped three more times, including one delay that lasted almost four hours.

The final stoppage came when the race had already surpassed the scheduled 500 laps, but a quick rain shower had stalled NASCAR's attempt to race to the checkered flag following an accident with eight laps remaining. So, NASCAR parked the cars on pit road and sent out its dryers to quickly try to give it one more shot.

Johnson slid past Gordon to take second place, and Gordon finished third.

The race had a series of hiccups unrelated to the rain stoppages: Austin Dillon ran out of gas while running third because of the lengthy final caution, Denny Hamlin didn't get back in his car after the first rain break because of a kink in his neck, and the two Team Penske drivers wrecked each other just 20 laps after the start.

Cruz drives in 5 runs as Seattle beats Texas, 11-10

SEATTLE (AP) — Nelson Cruz showed power early on Sunday with two home runs, and patience and resiliency late coming through with the winning hit in the ninth inning after three strike-

It was a display of the many reasons why Seattle added him to its lineup.

"Even when you hit homers you have to forget about what you do the (last) at-bat. I strike out three times and I have to forget about what happened the previous atbats," Cruz said. "That's the beauty about baseball. You have a chance to do damage every time you go up there."

Austin Jackson singled in the tying run in the ninth, Cruz followed with a two-out single for his fifth RBI of the game, and the Mariners overcame a pair of five-run deficits to beat Texas, 11-10.

Cruz homered twice in the first three innings, raising his major leagueleading total to eight, and Jackson hit the 11th leadoff homer of his career.

That was just the start. The big drama came late as Seattle rallied from deficits of 7-2 and 10-5, scoring six runs in the final three innings.

"This team is a very gritty bunch. They're built for this. They're tough.

Character-wise they're tough," Seattle manager Lloyd McClendon said. "We have a nice mix of veterans and young players. This team is built for greatness. I don't know what's going to happen but I like where we are."

Brad Miller led off the ninth with a single off Neftali Felix (0-1) and advanced on Seth Smith's one-out walk. Jackson lined a single to right that allowed Miller to score.

After Rickie Weeks' popout and an intentional walk to Robinson Cano, Cruz lined a 96 mph pitch into left field to score Smith. It was a bit of redemption for Cruz after he struck out against Feliz in the eighth inning.

Feliz had not blown a save chance since Aug. 3 at Cleveland and allowed earned runs to Seattle for the first time in 23 career appearances against the Mariners.

"I was trying to keep the ball low and (Cruz) is a good hitter," Feliz said. "The ball he hit at the end was a low ball and he made good contact on it."

Cruz hit a solo homer in the first and a threerun drive in the third, his first two homers this season at home. Cruz is the first player with eight home runs in a team's first 12 games since Alex Rodriguez in 2007.

got to four hearts anyway.

Culbertson led his singleton spade, won by declarer with the jack. South played a heart to the ace,

catching East's singleton queen.
Dummy's ten of hearts then lost to
the king, whereupon Culbertson
returned a low club.

Lightner won with the queen and

had no difficulty diagnosing the purpose of West's underlead of the A-K of clubs. He returned a spade for Culbertson to ruff, and Lightner later scored the diamond queen to set the contract.

The three-club bid by Lightner had pretty well marked him with the

had pretty well marked him with the queen of clubs; without it, he could scarcely have bid at all. But even if Lightner had not supported clubs, Culbertson's underlead of the A-K would still have been the right play, since a spade ruff offered the only realistic chance to defeat the contract. With a vulnerable game at stake, the 30-point overtrick that might have been yielded if South had the queen of clubs was too negligible a factor to consider.

When the same hand was played

at the other table, Culbertson's teammates bid and made four hearts with the North-South hands, producing a net gain of 720 points on the deal. **West sealed his fate** at this table

when he chose the king of clubs as his opening lead. Even though he shifted to a spade at trick two, there was no longer any way for East to give West a spade ruff, and declarer made the contract easily.

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

Annie's Mailbox ®

Dear Annie: For many years, I have heard about the dangers of secondhand smoke. I am a non-smoker, but was married to a smoker for 13 years and have asthma.

Now that pot is being legalized in some states, including where I live, what are the dangers of secondhand pot smoke? I haven't heard a word about it. Are the states just looking for additional tax revenue and keeping it out of the news? --Concerned Breather in Oregon

Dear Breather: According to the American Lung Association, inhaling smoke is harmful

whether it's from cigarettes, pot or burning wood. Marijuana smoke contains many of the same toxins, irritants and carcinogens as tobacco smoke, and pot smokers generally inhale it for a longer period of time. Secondhand marijuana smoke contains the same ingredients.

How dangerous is it to non-smokers? A 2014 study found that bloodvessel function in lab rats dropped by 70 percent after 30 minutes of exposure to secondhand marijuana smoke and hadn't returned to normal even after 40 minutes. And the rats suffered the same effects even if the pot contained no THC. So, you might not get a

Highlight Today's History:

On April 20, 2010, an explosion on the Deepwater Horizon oil platform, leased by BP, killed 11 workers and caused a blow-out that began spewing an estimated 200 million gallons of crude into the Gulf of Mexico. (The well was finally capped nearly three months later, on July 15.)

In 1889, Adolf Hitler was born in Braunau am Inn, Austria.

In 1912, Boston's Fenway Park hosted its first professional baseball game while Navin Field (Tiger Stadium) opened in Detroit. (The Red Sox defeated the New York Highlanders 7-6 in 11 innings; the Tigers beat the Cleveland Naps 6-5 in 11 innings.) In 1914, the Ludlow Massacre

took place when the Colorado National Guard opened fire on a tent colony of striking miners; about 20 (accounts vary) strikers, women and children died. In 1945, during World War II, allied forces took control of the

and Stuttgart. In 1968, Pierre Elliott Trudeau was sworn in as prime

minister of Canada. In 1972, Apollo 16's lunar module, carrying astronauts John W. Young and Charles M.

Duke Jr., landed on the moon. In 1988, gunmen who'd hijacked a Kuwait Airways jumbo jet were allowed safe





CLEVELAND (AP) — More than hour after his first playoff game with LeBron James and Kevin Love, Kyrie Irving made a statement more profound than anything he did on the floor. "We," Irving said,

"are the Big 3. We have really great players on this team, but we set the

Irving scored 30 points in his playoff debut, James added 20 in his first postseason game with Cleveland in five years and Love shook off a slow start to record a double-double, leading the Cavaliers to a 113-100 victory in Game 1 over the Boston Celtics on Sunday.

James was proud of how his teammates handled their first venture onto the playoff stage.

"They were phenomenal," he said. "Those two guys, they succeeded for the first time being in the postseason."

It was Cleveland's first home playoff game since May 11, 2010, when the Celtics won Game 5 and James left the floor to some boos from Cavaliers fans. He departed for Miami two months later, but he's home now, all is forgiven and Cleveland is aiming to end a championship drought dating to 1964.

Isaiah Thomas scored 22 points to lead the seventh-seeded Celtics. They will try to even the best-of-7 series in Game 2 on Tuesday night.

"We're still confident," Thomas said. "Guys are ready for Game 2, knowing that good or bad you've got to have a short memory. There are possibly seven games in this series and it could go either way.'

The Cavs built a 20-point lead in the third quarter, let the Celtics get as close as six and then finished the

quarter with a 9-0 run — capped a 3-pointer by James Jones — to take a 15-point lead into the fourth. Boston climbed within 10 in the final 12 minutes, but Love made a crucial 3-pointer with 3:32 left to slow Boston.
